LEADERSHIP **Our Emotional Intelligence** Is So Very Important

Our leadership (and our lives) are founded by the quality of our relationships, how we are received and perceived by others, and so I am writing about emotional intelligence.

A number of well-admired business schools are testing the emotional intelligence (EI) skills of its candidates for a Master in Business Administration (MBA). This is for two reasons. First, our EI is a prime indicator of our success in business and in leadership, as well as our overall happiness. It is even more important than our intelligence quotient (IQ) and our subject knowledge.

This is about people wanting to be with us, to work with us, to follow us.

We want the ability to very successfully manage our emotions, to sense the feelings of others, and to effectively establish and maintain relationships. These are critically important skills.

Yes, surely our emotional intelligence is so very important!

Businesses, governments, municipalities, churches, nonprofits and other organizations are all about relationships. If people sense that we truly care about them, their success and well-being, trust us, and feel that we are genuine, then they want to be on our team.

Our EI is about our empathy and our ability to read others, which are so



important in maintaining good relationships.

And it seems the opposite is true, i.e., people can spot it from a mile away if we are self-absorbed, insincere, or undependable.

We could test to access our emotional intelligence, to help us gain a baseline of our skills and encourage us to improve in areas that would help us become even more effective as leaders and teammates.

There are various EI assessments, some simple and quick, some more in depth. They are worthwhile and could very well help our effectiveness in our business and our leadership.

John and his wife, Kerry, live in Charlevoix, was a senior executive in the corporate world in NYC, DC and Chicago, then founded Common Sense Leadership, a leadership coaching and consulting practice, helping senior people in the business, academic and religious worlds improve leadership, their own and their team's. Kerry teaches at St. Mary School in Charlevoix and heads Encounter School of Ministry, Charlevoix campus.

Sara Ward, President of our Charlevoix County Community Foundation, and very much of a community leader herself, recommended that I meet and write about Rob Shooks, co-owner along with his brother, Greg, of Shooks Farms and Celler 1914 in Central Lake. Thank you, Sara, for your recommendation. I really enjoyed my conversation with Rob, which happily took more time than we thought as we met in their area which is set up for tasting their wines and hard cider drinks, and people kept stopping by to enjoy the drinks and comfort and beauty of the area.

Great story about Shooks Farms. It was founded in 1914 about their great grandfather, so Rob and Greg are fourth generation owners. I applaud and love learning this. I was with a wonderful company when we celebrated our 100th anniversary in Chicago. I was excited, asked the Chamber of Commerce for the names of other 100-year-old companies and was shocked and saddened to learn how few there were, and this was in Chicago, one of our countries largest cities. (Sadly, the company I was with was itself sold about ten years later) Shook Farms was a

cattle and grow crop farm on roughly 1,100 acres in beautiful Central Lake, and I do mean breathtakingly beautiful. However, it is becoming very difficult to survive as a fruit and vegetable farm due to foreign imports at much reduced prices and being very weather dependent. Many farms have branched out with an additional service or services, for example, Providence Farms with their very popular café and farm tours, others with roadside stands, if they happen to be on a well-traveled highway. Rob and Greg, realiz-

ing an uncertain future for them and their families, made a leadership decision, to convert the farm to grow grapes and become a destination as a winery and lovely place to visit and even stay.

Before continuing, here's some background about Rob. He and Greg went to Central Lake High School. Rob then went on to Hope College, where he played basketball, and met his wife to be, Mishelle, who was on the track team. After graduated, he became the strength and conditioning coach for the

Oakland Athletics major league baseball team, and then across the country for the same position with the North Carolina State Athletic Department.

Rob and Mishelle knew their heart was in Up North Michigan and helping small businesses and they move to the family farm here. They have twin boys, Jordan and Drew, who are avid, and I mean avid, baseball players and fans. Mishelle worked for a number of years for our Community Foundation, had had an opportunity to join Harvest Hosts, working remotely to spend more time with their sons.

Rob continues his coaching, now 3 rd and 4 th grade basketball in East Jordan while Greg is heavily involved with Michigan's Farm Bureau, which helps our farmers in significant ways.

An important message that Rob wants out to our community is to Support Local, to be aware that so much of the fruit and vegetables we purchase at stores are really from overseas.

I enjoyed Rob's humility, thinking that he really does not deserve to be recognized as a community leader (though he surely does!) and that he is looking forward to doing a lot more going forward. He cares deeply about our community.





Boyne City Charlevoix Trail Funding

Charlevoix County has approved a construction bid for the next phase of the Boyne City to Charlevoix Trail which would extend the trail from Boyne City through the village of Horton Bay. The cost for this portion was \$1.5 million, and the county was more than \$700,000 short in funding.

A budget reflecting that was to be approved at Tuesday's special commissioners' meeting. That is until the planning director said she had had a phone call with good news.

The Michigan Department of Transportation

would cover that entire amount, 74% of the bid's cost. Construction is planned to being next spring and will take about four months to complete.

Operation Christmas Child: Big Joy in a Small Box

We have all heard the phrase, "good things come in small packages." How true is this statement?

This last month was the collection week for Operation Christmas Child through Samaritan's Purse. For those of you not familiar with this project that has been around for thirty years, they collect shoeboxes of small items for children around the world.

These small boxes of joy are then distributed to countries all over the world as a way to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Each box represents an opportunity to share the Gospel to children and families who live in very poor living conditions in third world countries, or countries that are at war.

So, you may be asking what goes in these "boxes of joy?" Well, anything a child would like or need. Things like small toys, clothes, school supplies, and so on. These things may seem small and insignificant to us here in the United States but to a child in a third world country they are boxes of joy.

The church in which I attend in Kalkaska, Michigan was a drop off location for the Kalkaska area. This job meant we collected over 770 shoe-boxes for the Kalkaska area. This total includes five local churches and many participating local businesses. Then shoe-boxes were loaded up into the big cartons and taken to Traverse City where they were loaded into a semi-truck to be then transported to a distribution

from someone who loving packed a box for them from halfway around the world as a tangible way to share the love of Jesus with them.

The reason I chose this project as a project leader you may ask. There are so many worthwhile projects where I spend my time and resources. When I was in Bible college, I had the opportunity to go on several mission trips to the Dominican Republic. It was on one of those trips where I was on the other end of handing out shoe-boxes to children that were packed by a church who had visited the Dominican Republic a couple of weeks prior to my team's arrival.

We were in a small village near the Haiti border that was right in the middle of sugar cane fields. The local pastor and his wife picked children from the church who lived in this very poor village and invited them to the church for a special program. My team members and myself helped with a children's program where we sang songs, did a puppet show and shared a Bible story with these children. My teammates and I got to watch firsthand as these children very carefully opened their boxes of joy! Oh, the joy on their faces was very evident as the children very carefully looked at each item in their small boxes of treasures. Many of these children probably have not gotten a gift like this in their lives.

This memory is still one of my favorite mission trip memories many years later. It made the biggest impact on my life. When I think of this memory it still brings tears to my eyes! We take so much for granted here in the United States. Many kids here get so many things for Christmas they often can't remember what gifts they





were given. A small dollar store toy is played with for a few minutes and set aside and not played with much, if at all again. Where in another country where children don't have anything to really play with, these toys and gifts are treasured! The reason I share this story is twofold. First, next November when you see red and green shoe-boxes in your area, pick one up, fill it and return it! It will change the life of a child for eternity.

The second reason I share this story is this, with Christmas approaching teach your children the value of giving, not just getting without anything expected in return. Also, teach your children the value of what they are given Teach them to be content with what they have and appreciate what things they do have. They are much more blessed than they realize and so are we adults.

Outdoors______ Never give up; never quit.

It's been written and talked about... follow up every shot; blood tracking wounded deer; how to, when to, etc... but do people really follow through? Some thinking "I must have missed. The weather turned on me" "I'll never find it in this thick cover" "I don't have time to look any more." This article is an attempt to help everyone believe in never giving up on a wounded deer or other game animal. The following examples demonstrate the importance that should be placed upon making sure you don't quit on any poor shot placement or perceived "miss." The following three "cases" are examples of what can be achieved by following through and not giving up.

Case No. 1: "I can't believe I screwed up".

This is a quote from my brother. I had heard the shot from his .308 and was waiting for the call to help drag his deer. I finished out a few more hours of sitting before walking over to his ground blind. I asked what happened: "I missed". I asked for details... where was the deer standing, did he follow up the shot, which direction the deer had run, and so on. He assured me he had looked and it was a clean miss. He had to travel back to Grand Rapids so we said our good byes. I decided to sit in his pop up blind until dark before I headed home. As I sat looking at the opening where he said the deer had stood, I wondered how he had missed a standing 40 yard shot... and that's when a nice 8 point buck stepped into the same opening. I raised my 30-30 Marlin quickly... and "pow", made what I thought was a perfect shot. The buck kicked and whirled into the pines with one jump. I waited a bit and then walked over to the spot. Blood... and bone... and hair; this deer would not go far. There was a light snow falling so I began tracking right away. I followed the blood trail only about 35-40 yards into the thick pines and there he was... my buck! Darkness was falling fast so I wanted to tag and gut the buck quickly. "Hmmm, that's odd... he's got a light dusting of snow on him already" I thought to myself as I got out my knife. "He's stiff as a board!" I noted picking up his hind legs. This was not my buck... it had to be my brother's! That deer had not gone 40 yards into the thick brush where he piled up into a tree trunk. So what happened to my buck? I back tracked, and found that my deer had run on the same trail as my brother's buck... but after that, I could find no blood, hair, or other sign. As light rain and snow continued, I did the usual of marking the last spot of blood and made bigger and bigger circles from there since I had lost sight of the buck almost instantly after the shot. Darkness came quickly and I was losing hope. I could not believe that I had missed. I decided to get my brother's buck gutted and then gave him a call. "I've got good news and bad news... you did hit the deer and I found it, a nice 7 pointer... bad news is I can't find the

buck I shot at." He was very happy about his deer and said he would return from Grand Rapids first thing in the morning to help.

Arriving bright and early, we tagged his buck and dragged it to my truck. We then looked for my deer, searching the area of thick brush until noon. Not a speck of blood or evidence of a "hit" other than at the point of bullet impact (either his deer or mine). We walked back to the truck and sat on the tailgate.

I said "One more time... let's go back to the starting point and follow up deer trails...you on one, me on another." After I walked about 100 yards on a narrow deer run way, I stopped... there it was... a small spot of blood on a tag alder... and then another...then lots of blood. I called my brother and waited for him to join me. We followed up, literally crawling through some areas so thick you could not walk upright. My brother waited while I crawled through a thicket, and there, hidden next to a pine tree was my buck. Dead as can be from a double lung shot. He had run in the opposite direction and had gone at least 150 yards. High-fives, fist bumps, hugs and "wahoos" all around. I looked at my brother and said "Never GIVE UP!"

The nice 8-point buck deserved no less.

Case No. 2: Feelin' Minnesota . . . opening day neck-shot buck.

Recently, I was fortunate enough to travel to Minnesota for an opening day deer hunt as part of that state's "Governor's Opening Day Deer Hunt." Local landowners and hunters host guests from around the state as well as media to promote deer hunting heritage. I was hosted by a local farmer and hunter who showed me to my blind after we had scouted the day prior to the opener. It was a nice elevated blind, located on a steep oak ridge overlooking prime deer habitat. As early light broke, a light drizzle began to fall with high winds increasing steadily. My anticipation fell a bit due to the conditions, but that soon changed when a deer snuck in from the east. Checking it with my binoculars... I saw it was a small spike. I watched him for a while and then noticed another deer approach from the opposite direction, headed right for the small buck. I saw it was a big bodied, racked buck. I shouldered my borrowed .308 Winchester, tracking the buck in my scope as he challenged the smaller buck. The spike turned and walked off while the bigger buck walked back where it had come from. Looking ahead of the deer's direction, I saw one small opening... about 175 yards from my stand. As the buck stepped into the opening, it hesitated... I took the shot with confidence but as I did, the buck moved slightly and then after crouched low, bolting up a hill into an old clear cut section of the oak hills... an area full of poplar as thick as corn rows. Had I missed? Waiting a short time, I walked to the area where the deer was standing and looked for any sign of a hit.

No blood. I circled around... hair! Lots of it... "That's not good" I thought. I then noticed where my bullet had struck the ground behind the deer. I also found where the buck had skidded through the leaves at it ran up the hill into the thick poplar. No sign of blood. I marked the area with orange tape and followed the general direction of where I had last seen the deer. I circled through the thick brush looking for sign. I then moved out in larger and larger semi-circles, up the hill and onto an ORV trail. I repeated this several times. After a half hour, I had found nothing. I decided to make one more attempt before contacting my host. I wound up coming to a stop on the same ORV trail. Taking out my cell phone, I was looking down to check reception and at my feet was blood...quite a bit. Even though it was still lightly raining on the red/ brown oak leaves... the blood was obvious. The blood trail went downhill following the ORV trail. I followed for about 50 yards and the blood trail veered off to the left into the hardwoods. The blood was so thick it could have been poured from a bucket. Looking straight out into the mature oaks (that side of the ORV trail was not clear cut) I could see the brown and white hump of a deer. I walked up to a nice plump 6 point buck... but where was the hit that allowed him to run so far (at least 250 yards) through thick brush? Neck shot... I had missed high and left as he had moved just when I fired. His neck was not broken (obviously) but a major blood vessel had been severed. Why it had taken so long to begin bleeding, I don't know but I suspect my shot had nicked the artery and as he ran, the vessel broke open and he bled out. Not a drop of blood had been found for at least 200 yard, only hair.

reply. "Do you want me to help you look?" I asked. He replied that I should wait until around noon so we wouldn't mess up the morning hunt. Joining him later, he showed me where the buck had entered the clearing, where it had stood, and where it ran after he shot. He said there was no indication of a hit. I know Mark is a good shot and the buck had been standing broad side about 75 yards from his blind. I was sure he must have hit it. While he made small circles around the area where the buck had stood, I began to follow deer trails into the thick cedar and spruce. After following one or two deer trails, I found a smaller trail off a main run way. It was a bright sunny day with no snow. Tracks were hard to follow in the thicket but I made my way up one ridge and down another, and then up one more. I scanned the swampy area below me... there it was, a wide 7-point buck. I radioed Mark... "You just might want to come over here... I think there's some work to be done."

Locating Wounded Deer: Use of Leashed Tracking Dogs

"I can't believe I lost that buck, with a good shot and strong blood trail... I just don't get it" was the depressing thought swirling around my mind.

If you are a deer hunter, the loss of a deer may either happen to you or someone you know during your hunting life. An underutilized method to increase your odds of recovery may include the use of a tracking dog.

The first time I observed a "blood tracking" dog was while volunteering as a wounded deer tracker for limited mobility hunters participating in a NWTF Wheelin' Sportsmen Shiawassee National Wildlife Refuge deer hunt. Held during the first three days of the rifle season, the hunt allowed hunters to have a chance at bagging a buck or doe with the assistance of staff and volunteers. One of the volunteers brought along his dog, "Gus". Several volunteers and hunters were watching Gus, the "different looking" dog, wander around the meeting site greeting people as they arrived.

"What kind of dog is that?" people would ask. Gus was a standard wirehaired Dachshund. To the untrained eye, this handsome hound did not appear to be a "wiener dog", which is what most people think of when they hear "Dachshund" (and don't say "dash hound"), in either size or appearance.

After a group of us "master tracker" volunteers could not locate a participant's wounded deer, Gus came in and found the deer, with absolutely no visible blood, in less than 30 minutes. This was a serious "wow" moment for me. The owner told me he bought the dog in New York State. I kept the memory of that experience tucked away. Fast forward 10 years, after sharing the experience with my brother-in-law and loaning him the book: Tracking Dogs for finding Wounded Deer by John Jeanneney, he purchased one. He had great success with his dog which convinced me, especially after I "lost" (as in couldn't find) a wounded buck during my 2016 deer season. Thus my journey began to acquire my own tracking hound.

although primarily used to recover whitetail, tracking dogs are used for many big game animals such as bear, moose, elk and hogs.

The puppy

Seeing our pup for the first time in his pen with 5 other puppies, we fell in love with "Jager"... pronounced "Yager", (the "a" has an umlaut in German), which translates to: "Hunter". It was chosen due to his lineage being direct from Germany (the breed itself was developed there to hunt badgers and foxes... Dachshund translates into English as: badger hound). Tommy, the sire Dachshund for Jager is a proven deer tracker and came directly from Germany.

John and Jolanta spent time showing us how to use a liver and blood "drag" line to train our young puppy on tracking a scent line. At only 9 weeks old, Jager readily followed a one hour-old line which included three 90 degree turns. My wife and I were simply "wowed" by the demonstration. Jager is a born tracker and is now a very happy member of our family now.

Training and use of tracking dogs

There are many breeds of dogs that can be used for tracking deer. These include the scent hounds such as dachshunds, beagles, bloodhounds, coonhound; Pointers/ Retrievers like labs, golden retrievers, Chesapeake's; Curs/Border collies ("Cow dogs and Cur dogs"); Old breeds like terriers, jack Russell, and German shepherds. All have their own advantages and disadvantages of course.

The dachshund has shown to be a formidable and versatile breed for tracking wounded deer and other big game. With their innate hunting sense, training of a newly purchased dachshund puppy can lead to an excellent chance of developing a usable tracking hound. By reinforcing natural instincts, basic obedience training, and motivating and encouraging a young pup, as well as "on lead" (deer tracking in Michigan must be done on leash or lead) training is expected. The owner/handler must work in tandem as a team with the tracking dog. Communication with the hunter is important to determine perceived shot location or "wound" will add to the successful conclusion of any track. Young dogs can be started on a "drag line" of liver and blood and even the preferred German technique of using "Fahrtenshuhe" (Tracking Shoes) which uses an actual deer leg attached to a boot or shoe. The leg from an individual deer must always be used as dogs recognize individual deer through the interdigital gland found between the hoofs of the deer. A 30 foot lead that does not easily catch on brush can be used (different types of line/rope are used). Typical rewards at the end of a drag line include "nibbles" on the liver, or a deer hide/ skin or leg.

I looked at my watch and it had been 2 ¹/₂ hours of searching. My host was very pleased indeed that this Michigan boy had not given up.

Case No. 3: "I just missed a nice 7 or 8 point"

My hunting buddy Mark Milostan had radioed that message to me early in the morning of our hunt. I had heard his shot from my blind and had waited for his call. "Are you sure?" was my response. "Yup, pretty sure... I spent a good half hour looking and found no blood or hair" was his He was too over joyed for words. We had his buck and it was a beauty. We didn't give up.

Take Away:

All three of these examples have one thing in common of course... never give up. My friends and family think I have some kind of "compass in my nose" or that I'm like a hound dog. I was the same way growing up... finding the downed rooster pheasant in the corn field, or the wounded mallard in heavy cat tails, or the gobbler that a friend swore he missed. I don't really have a compass in my nose. I just refuse to give up.

It comes from experience as well as from my dad's advice. He told me that "Every animal deserves all your effort to retrieve it... no matter what... squirrel or 12 point buck... it's all the same. If you take a life, you owe it more than a short look around. Don't give up." I don't and I hope you

won't either.

Good luck and keep looking.

Background

The aforementioned book was written by the man that may be considered the "father" of on-leash tracking dogs in the U.S., John Jeanneney of Berne, New York. First of its kind and in its 2nd edition (2016), his book provides everything needed to start using tracking dogs to recover wounded deer.

Richard P. Smith considers this book a "ground breaking volume..." and also says: "This book should be required reading by all state and provincial commissions and administrators who are also responsible for setting regulations regarding the recovery of whitetails with dogs."

If interested in finding out more, the group United Blood Trackers (unitedbloodtrackers.org) provides a good starting point. They are "...dedicated to promoting resource conservation through the use of trained tracking dogs in the ethical recovery of big game." The term "blood tracking" is most often used, even though it can be misleading in that usually when called into action, the dog will be on a track where there is little or no blood present. With experience and training, dogs can track individual wounded animals by other scents (such as interdigital gland). Also,

Learning more

As previously mentioned, the group United Blood Trackers.org (questions@ unitedbloodtrackers.org) is also a good place to inquire and gain further information, including "Find-a-Tracker" listing and regulations for each state that allows the use of tracking dogs. This season and in the future, whether using a bow, rifle, crossbow or black powder... make every attempt to make a good lethal shot.




