

Jan. 10 US-31 Charlevoix bascule bridge overnight closure cancelled

Due to faster-than-expected work progress, an overnight closure of the US-31 Charlevoix bascule bridge, scheduled for the night of Jan. 10, will not be required and has been cancelled.

As part of a \$6.3 million Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) project to replace the US 31 Charlevoix bascule bridge tread and track components, which are critical to the bridge's operation, MDOT had expected the bridge would be closed to US-31 traffic overnight from 7 p.m. Jan. 10. to 7 a.m. Jan. 11.

MDOT still expects 15-minute intermittent closures of the bridge from 8 p.m. to midnight on Jan. 10. No detour will be needed during the 15-minute closures.

Additional overnight closures are expected for

the bridge between January and April, which will be announced in advance. The exact schedule of all expected closures has not yet been determined. During overnight closures, which will be dependent on weather and work progress, traffic will be detoured on US-31, M-66, M-32, and US-131.

Pedestrians and bicyclists will not be allowed to cross the bridge during the overnight closures. The bridge deck will be an active construction site, with equipment and contractors performing work, making it unsafe to allow pedestrians or bicyclists to cross at those times.

MDOT also expects 15-minute intermittent closures of the bridge between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. the nights of Jan. 18 and 19. Exact dates of those closures are also dependent on weather and work progress, but no detour will be required for those intermittent closures.

At most times, the bridge will be open to two-way traffic. Beginning this month, traffic will be shifted to the west half of the bridge for approximately six weeks. In mid- to late-February, traffic will then be shifted to the east half of the bridge for another six weeks.

During this time, the bridge will be closed to marine traffic in the channel that would require the bridge to open. Work will require unscheduled intermittent closures to vehicle traffic of less than 10 minutes, a shorter duration than typical openings of the bridge for marine traffic.

From mid-April until the project is completed in late May, the channel will reopen to marine traffic while remaining work is finished. The bridge will return to normal operation for vehicle and marine traffic.

The project, which began in late October, also includes work on the bridge railings, electrical components, joints, curbs, and gutters, all with a goal of extending the 74-year-old bridge's service life and maintain its reliability.

Based on economic modeling, this investment is expected to directly and indirectly support 89 jobs.

What is a Well-Woman Exam?


During her four years of active service, she was proud to serve our country and traveled all over the Pacific. Kelly remembered the strictness of her immediate officer during that time.

News Charlevoix Man Arrested for Carrying a Pistol Under the Influence and Operating While Intoxicated

CHARLEVOIX COUN-TY – On Monday, January 1, 2024, at approximately 9:16 p.m. a trooper from the Michigan State Police (MSP) Gaylord Post stopped a vehicle on US-31 near Big Rock Road in Hayes Township for multiple violations.

The driver, 52-year-old James Robert Johnson of Charlevoix, displayed signs of intoxication. When asked if he had any weapons in the vehicle, Johnson stated

he did. Johnson refused to participate in sobriety tests

and a preliminary breath test. Johnson was placed under arrest.

During the arrest, the trooper found Johnson was in possession of multiple knives, a pistol magazine, and a pistol in his waist band. The trooper found two more handguns inside the vehicle.

Johnson refused to submit to a chemical test. A search warrant for blood was obtained. Johnson was transported to a local hospital for a blood draw and then lodged in the Charlevoix County Jail.

Johnson was arraigned in the 90th District Court in Charlevoix County for one count Dangerous Weapon, one count Retired Officer Carrying Under the Influence, and one count Operating While Intoxicated. His next scheduled court appearance is on January 23, 2024, at 2:30 p.m.

Former Boyne City Man Arrested for Multiple Counts Criminal Sexual Conduct Against Victim Under 13

CHARLEVOIX COUN-TY – In May 2022, an adult contacted the Michigan State Police (MSP) Post in Gaylord and alleged she had been sexually assaulted when she was between the ages of eight and sixteen years old. The assaults began in 2006. The perpetrator, Jessie James Wisdom formerly of Boyne City, was incarcerated in Mississippi and eligible for parole in October 2022. A lengthy investigation followed, and troopers

were able to determine the venues of the assaults. Wisdom was interviewed while incarcerated in Mississippi. He denied the allegations. A report was turned over to the Charlevoix County Prosecutor's Office and an arrest warrant was issued on September 13, 2022.

Wisdom was denied parole in 2022. The MSP 7th District Fugitive Team traveled to Mississippi and took custody of now 41-year-old Wisdom after being released from prison in Mississippi. He was brought back to Michigan and lodged in the Charlevoix County Jail on December 20, 2023.

Wisdom was arraigned on December 29, 2023, in the 90th District Court in Charlevoix County on two counts Criminal Sexual Conduct First Degree (Victim Under 13), and one count Criminal Sexual Conduct First Degree Relationship. He is being held on a \$200,000 bond. His next scheduled court appearance is on January 16, 2024, at 2:30 p.m.



Guide Them, but Let Them Learn from Their Mistakes

Dear Dave,

My wife and I have started teaching our fiveyear-old son about money. Do you feel we should step in and fix things when he makes mistakes, or let him experience the consequences of his actions? It's so hard on my wife, especially, to see him disappointed when he makes a mistake, and his plans don't work out. —Lane

Dear Lane,

I know this might sound mean to some folks, but sometimes a good financial disappointment when you're young is the best thing that can happen to you. They're hard to watch happen, or to experience, but often they'll teach life-long lessons. No decent parent wants to see their child sad or hurt, but reality is a pretty good teacher when be found in accomplishing a given task successfully. Then, once you pay him for the work he does, you have another perfect chance for teachable moments, because you can help him learn about saving, spending and giving, and how to do all three wisely.

It's always hard on parents when they see their kids unhappy. I know we went through it with ours. As a parent and protector, you want to jump in and make everything okay. But the hard truth is that fixing or doing everything for them is the easy way out. And in the process of doing that, a child will begin to develop a sort of learned helplessness.

Sometimes, Lane, you need to love kids enough to not do things for them. Let them make some mistakes, experience the consequences and fix things themselves. And it's better for them to do all this while they're still under your guidance and protection. —Dave



News 2024 Banished Words List Press Release

At the end of the day, Lake Superior State University slays once again, leaving a lasting impact on the linguistic world with the release of their 2024 Banished Words List

(SAULT STE. MARIE, MI) — As the new year inspires us to look ahead to the future, it also gives us time to reflect on the past. Lake Superior State University (LSSU) proudly unveils this year's Banished Words List, a lively tradition that began in 1976.

This tradition highlights certain words that are often misused, overused, or have lost their meaning over the past year. It encourages us to laugh at ourselves as we reconsider and reflect on the importance of our vocabulary.

Language is a dynamic, ever-evolving entity. The banished words list recognizes the rapid changes in expression, encouraging a reassessment of the impact and relevance of our vocabulary. We think you will find this year's submissions truly cringe-worthy.

"This season is marked by various joyful traditions, and the Banished Words List remains one of the most iconic, humorous, and quirky traditions in the region," expressed Sheridan Worth, Director of Marketing at Lake Superior State University.

"The tradition provides a lighthearted opportunity to pause and reflect on the past year—our experiences, communication styles, and the phrases we commonly use. At the end of the day, it serves as a platform for considering how we can progress into the new year with a more mindful approach to language," stated Worth.

LSSU received over 2,000 nominations from around the world, including submissions from Australia, Bangladesh, Belgium, Canada, China, Croatia, Germany, Guam, Ireland, Lebanon, Namibia, New land, Uganda, Ukraine, the United Kingdom, with the majority coming from the United States.

Here is the list of the banished words and terms for 2024 and the reasons for their banishment: **1. Hack**

The term "hack" has increasingly become a popular buzzword, frequently utilized to impart an aura of innovation or sophistication to various subjects. Its widespread adoption in multiple contexts, extending beyond its initial technological context, has the potential to lessen its inherent significance. Using it everywhere, even beyond its tech roots, could make it lose its magic.

2. Impact

Especially as a verb, why use this word when we have a perfectly good word that makes more sense: "affect"? Overusing it not only takes away its pizzazz but also robs other words of their spotlight.

3. At the end of the day

Sometimes a word needs to be re-banished, and this is one of them. Many comments note that it is overused and meaningless, often employed as a rhetorical device that attempts to encapsulate the complexities of a situation summarily, lacking nuance and depth.

4. Rizz

Rizz, derived as a shortened form for "charisma," gained prominence as Oxford's word of the year and has become a familiar presence in the realm of social media discourse. The ubiquity of this term prompts contemplation on whether it retains its relevance. With language doing the cha-cha of change, we're wondering if this word still rocks the charisma scene or if it's time for a language remix.

5. Slay

While perfectly acceptable in specific contexts, "slay" has transcended its original meaning and infiltrated situations where its usage no longer aligns with its intended significance. Its transition from a specialized term denoting exceptional accomplishment to a commonplace expression for any achievement prompts scrutiny into its misapplication, particularly in the characterization of routine or mundane actions. Now, it's sprinkled everywhere—from wearing a stylish outfit to tackling the art of parallel parking. 6. Iconic

This one appeared on the list in 2009, so perhaps it's time for another attempt to point out its overuse and lack of meaning in most situations. Despite its initial recognition as a word worthy of distinction, its repeated application in contexts that don't merit such acclaim challenges its genuine iconic status. It's like that one-hit wonder playing on loop.

7. Cringe-worthy

From the comments: "The use of this term is cringe-worthy." The irony is served hot, as the very term "cringe-worthy" finds itself under the spotlight. It's like a word caught in its own cringe-worthy moment. Now, as we usher in the new year, it's time to decide if this linguistic drama deserves an encore or if we should bid "cringe-worthy" adieu to make room for fresh, less cringe-inducing expressions in 2024. 8. Obsessed

The use of this word for things that are not truly being obsessed over makes it a good candidate for rethinking how we use the word. The casual use of underscores a potential misappropriation of the term, prompting a reconsideration of its application. Should one be obsessed with a new kitchen gadget or a new shade of paint? This year's contributors think not. **9. Side hustle**

The term "side hustle" has gained widespread use, prompting considerations about its impact on how we perceive economic challenges. It may be worth reflecting on whether its prevalence inadvertently downplays the genuine reality of the situation. While 'side-hustle' adds flair to our language, our contributors feel that the only hustle is the one needed to get to their second job.

10. Wait for it

If we're watching the video, then we're already waiting for it, right? While "wait for it" is trying to be the hype master, let's question if it's adding extra sparkle or just stating the obvious? Concluding the 48th year of this tradition, bidding farewell to banished words reflects our collective awareness of language's constant evolution. The Banished Word list acknowledges the swift changes in modern communication, encouraging a tongue-in-cheek reassessment of our vocabulary's impact.

As we part ways with words and phrases that have overstayed their welcome and enter a new era, let the banishment be a reminder of language's dynamic nature and the joy found in embracing its ever-evolving landscape.


"It is important for the public to know that although we are in a transitional period while relocating, we are still here to help people" said Envoy Roman Hank.

Michigan Community Capital is proposing to redevelop two sites for workforce housing in Downtown Boyne, and everyone is invited to attend one of the four Q&A sessions at the Boyne District Library Community Room. Here is the schedule:

Wednesday, January 10, 11:15 am and 6 p.m. Friday, January 12, 11:30 am and 7 p.m.

Lofts on Lake would be located at 110 North Lake Street with 60-65 apartments and approximately 6,000-10,000 square feet of commercial space. Ray and Park would redevelop 211 South Park Street and 214 Ray Street into approximately 40 apartments, 4 live-work units and a new community room for the Boyne District Library. We hope to attract an impactful commercial tenant such as a high-quality childcare provider, a healthy food tenant, small business or another commercial tenant that positively serves yearround Boyne residents.

The new apartments will be year-round, 12 month minimum rentals. Shortterm rentals or subleases would not be allowed in these properties. The apartments will be made up of studios, 1 bedrooms, 2 bedrooms, and 3 bedroom apartments.

- 55% of the apartments will be affordable to household incomes ranging from \$35,050-\$60,080

Over Pricing Property?

A high price conveys the message that the seller may not really be interested in selling. And, when a home is priced too high, agents and buyers usually just cross it off their list and move on. After all, there are plenty of other listings.


