

MAURA SNABES

COMMUNITY LEADER

HELPING BUILD CONFIDENCE, TEAMWORK, AND LEADERSHIP

Maura Snabes is a model community leader. I could not be more serious. Her contributions are endless, and she gives of herself quietly, without seeking attention.

Maura grew up in Redford, a Detroit suburb, attended school there, then on to the University of Michigan for two years, when her desire to do something different ignited a transfer to Chaminade University of Honolulu in Hawaii. She majored in English and minored in Communications. She had planned to enter the broadcast journalism field, but when she moved back to Michigan, there were no jobs available in the field. So, she took a position in advertising.

Not fulfilled, Maura considered what to do next, and with her dad encouraging her to become an attorney, she enrolled at University of Detroit Law School, and found real estate law especially interesting.

Maura and her husband, Chris, knew they wanted to raise their family (now three children) Up North and they moved to Charlevoix. Initially, in 1994, she joined Northern Michigan Title Company as Associate Counsel. The very next year, Maura realized there was a niche that needed to be filled in the real estate market-1031 tax-deferred exchanges. In 1995, she started her own Qualified Intermediary company (Northern Michigan 1031 Exchange Company now known as Corporate Exchange Services) to assist sellers in the deferral of their capital gains taxes. She has been very busy helping people ever since, nearly 30 years now, with 1031 exchanges as well as other real estate transactions, in her role as SVP, Corporate Counsel of Corporate Settlement Solutions and with her law firm of Jelinek & Snabes, PLLC.

What amazes me is how with a busy title, 1031 and legal practice, Maura is able to contribute all she does in our community. I am in awe.

I will describe just some of Maura's community contributions, and believe me, these are just some. She has served the Charlevoix Chamber of Commerce in multiple capacities, including Chairperson, is very active with Zonta Club, serving as President of the Club and also of its Foundation. Zonta is definitely a high priority as she is all about helping women and there is such a need! So many women lead very challenging lives, which affect them and their families. Maura is totally committed to help as she can and does!

When her daughter was younger, Maura was a Girl Scout Leader for 13 years, and is still active helping middle school and high school girls with events such as Sights on Success (SOS), groups like the Z Club and awarding Zonta scholarships to high school girls.

Maura also is active with St. Mary Parish, being on the Pastoral Council and the parish Foundation. Oh, and she is a cantor in the choir.

As mentioned, Maura is all about helping women, children, and others in our

community. She encourages us to step out of our comfort zone, grow our self-confidence, understand that knowledge is power, and the importance of continuing to learn every day.

Maura urges us all to volunteer as we can, realizing that even just an hour or two can make a difference to the people and the organization you are serving and can be very rewarding and fulfilling.

Additional things Maura has learned over the years that she tries to encourage others to follow, especially the younger women she mentors: Do our best not to judge others, rather be supportive, helpful and encouraging; focus on what is really important in life; don't sweat the small stuff; learn to forgive and move on; and again, to challenge our self; continue to learn every day; and step outside of our comfort zone—it's how we grow.

Cybertronic Lancers, Ellsworth High School Robotics Team, Embarks on 2024 Season

ELLSWORTH – Ellsworth High School announces the start of the 2024 season for its robotics team, the Cybertronic Lancers, team #6087.

This year marks the eighth anniversary of the team, which competes annually in the FIRST Robotics competitions, demonstrating skills in engineering, teamwork, and problem-solving.

Guided by Mr. Clayton Faivor, a science teacher at Ellsworth Middle and High School, the Cybertronic Lancers have grown significantly over the past decade. Mr. Faivor's expertise has been essential in mentoring students from 8th to 12th grade, helping them thrive in this challenging and enriching field.

A key element of the team's success is the dedicated group of adult mentors who work with the students daily from 3:00 to 5:00 PM throughout the winter. These mentors are crucial in providing guidance in programming, electronics, and robot construction, making the program a reality.

Later this winter, the Cybertronic Lancers will participate in events in Lake City and Traverse City, where they will



showcase their skills and ingenuity. Despite being from a smaller school, the team has consistently made its mark, regularly qualifying for the Michigan State Championships at Saginaw Valley State University.

The team's 2024 season commenced with an event in Boyne City, marking the kickoff of the season and the introduction of the new challenge. This event is pivotal as it sets the stage for all teams to understand the specific problem their robots will need to solve in the upcoming competitions. Mr. Faivor shared his enthusiasm for the new sea-

son: "This program is about more than building robots. It's about developing skills, inspiring innovation, and working together towards a common goal. Our aim this year is to excel in competition and continue to grow as a team."



An Emergency Fund Isn't About Instant Gratification

Dear Dave,

We've all our debts paid off, except for our home, and our fully funded emergency fund of six months of expenses is in place. In talking to people, it seems there are lots of different opinions as to what constitutes an emergency. What guidelines do you suggest when deciding whether to use our emergency fund?

-Ingrid

Dear Ingrid,

There are three things to ask yourself when you're tempted to dip into your emergency fund. One, is it unexpected? Things like Christmas, birthdays and even certain bills come around at the same time every year. If you're not already budgeting for these things, it's time to start. Otherwise, you might use your emergency fund for something that's just the result of poor planning.

Number two, is it absolutely necessary? Most of us think we know the difference between needs and wants, but sometimes the line gets a little blurry. If your car goes completely kaput, and you need transportation, use your emergency fund to buy something affordable and reliable you can pay cash for. But don't dip into your emergency fund just to upgrade your good car for one with a million bells and whistles. That's

a want, not a need.

And three, is it urgent? Sometimes, you have act like a grown-up. Every idea that pops into your mind isn't unexpected, necessary or urgent. You can live that way if you want, but the result will be a quickly depleted emergency fund. Then, what're you going to do when a real emergency comes along?

Practice the art of patience. Avoid impulse buys. Urgent things include stuff like a broken air conditioner in the middle of summer, a busted transmission or sudden, unexpected medical expenses. A big sale at Wal Mart? No. Concert tickets? Definitely not. That great new pair of shoes you just saw in a store window? Give me a

Your emergency fund is about long-term security, not instant gratification. Don't use it on a whim. But don't be afraid to use it when you really

Lake sturgeon season on Black Lake begins Feb. 3

Anglers may register online to participate

CHEBOYGAN COUNTY - The 2024 lake sturgeon fishing season on Black Lake in Cheboygan County will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 3. All anglers must register online to participate in the fishing season, and those age 17 or older must have a valid Michigan fishing license. The harvest limit for the 2024 season on Black Lake is six lake sturgeon. Officials will close the season when one of two scenarios

☐ The sixth fish is harvested.

☐ Five fish have been harvested at the end of any fishing day.

Fishing hours are 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day of the season. The season will end either at 2 p.m.

Wednesday, Feb. 7, or when one of the above scenarios is met, at which point anglers will be notified via text message and on the ice by DNR personnel that they must immediately stop fishing for lake sturgeon.

Anyone who wants to participate this year must register online by Feb. 2. Get more registration and season information at Michigan.gov/Sturgeon.

Participating anglers must bring their own bright red flags (1-foot diameter or larger) to hang on their fishing shanties so that DNR personnel can identify those who are sturgeon fishing. Season officials emphasize that anglers are asked to hang one or more flags in highly visible locations on their shanties, because DNR personnel must be aware of which anglers are pursuing sturgeon fishing.

Anyone harvesting a lake sturgeon must immediately contact DNR personnel on the ice. Official registration of each harvested fish will take place at a DNR trailer located on or near the ice at the end of Zollner Road in the northwest part of Black Lake. Harvest registration may include an examination of the fish's internal organs and removal of a piece of fin tissue for DNA analysis or aging.

Lake sturgeon rehabilitation efforts in Black Lake over the last two decades have been a successful collaboration between the DNR, Sturgeon for Tomorrow, tribal agencies, Michigan State University and Tower-Kleber Limited Partnership. This population

has increased in the past 20 years due to lake sturgeon rearing and stocking efforts, research and protection of spawning adults, and this trend is expected to contin-

Sexual Assault Jury Conviction

On January 10, 2024 Stace Ryan Smith, age 48, of Petoskey and Boyne City was convicted by a Charlevoix County jury of Criminal Sexual Conduct, 1st Degree and Criminal Sexual Conduct, 2nd Degree. The facts which led to the conviction were his sexual penetrations and sexual touching of a child starting when the child was approximately 7 and continuing until the child was approximately 15. Additional evidence was presented for the jury regarding Smith's multiple sexual penetrations of another child while that other child was 9-10 years old.

Both situations involved the victims disclosing the abuse after many years of remaining silent. Such delays in disclosure are far

more common than immediate disclosures. Both situations involved a lack of DNA evidence, no video footage was present of the assaults, no eyewitnesses other than the victim observed the assaults, and Smith denied wrongdoing. Despite these issues which are commonly present in cases of this type, justice

has occurred. Smith is due to be sentenced for his crimes in the 33rd Circuit Court for Charlevoix County on February 16th, 2024.

Charlevoix County

Prosecutor Christopher "Kit" Tholen prosecuted the case and stated "I am continually in awe of the courage of children and adults who make the choice to confront evil and come forward about such crimes. They have done a great service to our community through speaking up for themselves, taking back the power that was taken from them as children, showing others that speaking up can be done, standing up for others who have chosen to remain silent, and protecting others from abuse."

Shame On You Shame on Rep. Jack Bergman for implying, falsely, in a January 4 press release that noncitizens seeking unauthorized entry are responsible for a majority of fentanyl seizures at the U.S. southern border.

In his press release Bergman stated, "During 2023, Border Patrol seized enough fentanyl to kill the entire U.S. population" then followed in the same sentence that "in December alone, over 225,000 migrants

were encountered along the

The facts, according to a CATO Institute report, are that 86.3% of fentanyl drug traffickers convicted in 2021 were U.S. citizens and over 90% of fentanyl seizures occurred at legal crossing points or interior vehicle checkpoints; just 0.02% of the people arrested by Border Patrol for crossing illegally possessed any fentanyl whatsoever (source, 9/14/2023 blog by David J.Bier at cato.org).

It's very unlikely these statistics have changed much in the last 2 years. Rep. Bergman, stop disseminating this kind of party-line disinformation and propaganda that unjustly inflames hatred and fear. Rather, I ask you and Congress to update and improve U.S. immigration laws—you can start by supporting HR 3194, the U.S. Citizenship Act of 2023.

Low interest loan may help city update & expand sewer system

The Boyne City Commission on Tuesday approved an application for a \$12.8 million loan at 2% interest from the Clean Water State Revolving Fund to update and expand portions of the city's

sanitary sewer system. The treatment plant was built 20 years ago. The loan would be repaid via revenue bonds financed by a rate increase for sewer customers that would amount to a 3% for three years, followed by an

estimated 1% increase in subsequent years. \$5.6 million of the total loan would be used to expand sewer service to unserved areas. The estimated first year additional cost for a typical sanitary sewer customer is

about \$3.00 per year. Engineers and other experts told the Commission that the construction, engineering and loan interest rates would only increase in the future.

Charlevoix's boys basketball team is cruising along with a 9-1 record, and notched its fourth in a row last Wednesday when the Rayders turned back Traverse City St. Francis, 69-55 in a Lake Michigan Conference matchup.

It puts the two teams in a three-way tie atop the conference standings with Elk Rapids as all three are 3-1. St. Francis fell to 4-4 overall.

So, what has been behind the Rayders fast start?

"Big thing is our ball movement," says Rayders coach Anthony Troshak. "Moving the ball on offense. We're pretty guard heavy. Hudson Vollmer, Troy Nickel and Joe Gaffney are our leading scorers.

"Their strengths are their ability to catch and shoot, take people off the drive and then make the right read."

Ryan Pearl kind of holds down the inside spot for the Rayders. The focus is also on defense.

"In terms of our inside game we do a lot of attacking the paint, either with hard cuts or off of a dribble," Troshak explained. "We don't technically have a traditional post player who we're going to throw it inside and they're going to do post moves.

"Defensively, the guys are an athletic group, quite a few football players. They're in the weight room and do a lot of speed and agility drills. "We kind of hang our hat on defense and rebounding. We know we're not big, so we've got to keep other teams to one and done, we can't give them second chance opportunities."

The Rayders edged out to a 19-14 advantage on the Gladiators at the end of the first quarter, and stretched their lead to eight points, 32-24 at the half.

Each team scored 20 points in the third period which left the Rayders holding a 52-44 advantage going into the fourth quarter. Charlevoix out-pointed the Glads, 17-11 in the finial eight minutes.

Vollmer had a big game for the Rayders with 20 points and also had four assists. Gaffney added 17 points and four steals, Nickel contributed 14 points and Peyton Scott finished with eight.

St. Francis was led by the game's leading scorer Max Ogden who had 29 points.

"We had a solid start, which is important because St. Francis can be a tough place to play," Troshak said. "All credit to the players. They were focused, they had a tremendous ball movement and the guys played as one.

"Ogden was tough for St. Francis. He made some incredible shots. It seemed like every time we started to pull away he would hit a big shot.

"I thought Logan Wadkins and Vitale Collins did a good job on him in the fourth quarter."

"Defensively, we've got to be able to recognize when we're switching from a 2-3 to a 1-3-1 (zone) to a man ... and recognizing that 'Hey, we've got a shooter over here and we've got a rebounder over here.' They do a real good job communicating that."

East Jordan struggled offensively in the first quarter against the Rams and were outscored 18-4. The Rams had a 19-10 advantage in the second period and went into the half with a 37-14
