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

Create A Family Atmosphere

It is important to recognize the vital importance of a business's organizational culture. It is the spirit of their people. Are they engaged, excited about and have pride in their work, their team members and the business with whom they work – and, really, are they happy?

Happy employees do better work.

Unfortunately, extensive surveys reveal that about half of the people working do not feel as if they have a helpful manager and do not feel they are fully engaged. This is sad – and it is costly. The most important person to someone in business is their immediate boss. Generally, people don't leave their business; they leave their boss. People who are not happy may or may not quit, for certain though, they lose enthusiasm and may even tone down their effort. They do not do their best work.

A business owner and other managers absolutely need to be caring leaders. We need highly effective leadership throughout our business, and this takes ongoing training, oversight, and accountability. Then our business can shine, consistently, year after year.

The businesses, academic and religious organizations which stand out have created and maintain a "family atmosphere". Their people truly feel like they are "family."

We've seen this often, and it is a huge difference maker. Again, happy people do better work.

Developing a sense of "family" requires commitment. We need to:

- Treat people, each one of them, with appreciation, respect, and dignity
- Communicate by speaking with them directly and regularly, and not simply by email, newsletters, and conference calls
- Regularly have one-onone conversations with as many of our people as possible

- Ask people about their family and lives, letting them know we care about their well-being
- Grab a coffee together A handwritten note
- Our soft skills, smile, tone of voice, using a person's name - these mean a lot
- Ask for and encourage people to honestly share their ideas, advice and feedback
- Listen with our full attention, to understand and learn
- Catch people doing good work
- Celebrate successes, large and small
- Help people learn, develop, and be successful. This is what they
- Thank people for their work and dedication
- Help people feel good about themselves. This is leadership!

Creating and maintaining a "family" atmosphere in our business means everything, and these are just some principles and practices. And, certainly, ask our people for their suggestions. They will be appreciative and we will gain valuable ideas.

Hope this is helpful. We love successful businesses with enthusiastic teams. Know we are rooting for

PATRICK McCLEARY

TIRELESS DEDICATION TO OUR COMMUNITY

Mitchell Klooster recommended that I meet Patrick McCleary, as he is a wonderful community leader, which he surely is. Patrick has been involved and held membership in a wide variety of local, State and National historical groups over the years. With the passing of the COVID years, Patrick has returned to a full annual schedule of class instruction and speaking engagements, all aimed at educating the public on the value of history preservation, research, and exploration.

Patrick's principal current involvements are:

- Boyne Heritage Center – Board Member and Director of Collections
- The Charlevoix County History Preservation Society – President
- The Charlevoix County Genealogical Society – Five years as Past-President

Patrick is a fourth generation Boyne City native. At the age of ten, he became enthralled with history after discovering a Bible with family notations dating back into the 1700s. His grandmother and he began their first family tree at that time, and other than during his college years at Northern Michigan University, he has worked on family and local history endeavors. After college, he returned to Boyne City and later moved to Petoskey. However, his historical ties remain with Boyne City and Charlevoix County. At present he is an Administrative Assistant at North Country Community Mental Health.

At one point, Patrick was researching and writing quarterly newsletters for three different history-related organizations. He also enjoyed compiling

and submitting biological material on our Charlevoix County Civil War veterans to both State and National publications, as well as locating the descendants of hundreds of pre-1920 "rescued" photographs. This has enabled him to gain a wealth of wonderful information about our area, including our people, going back numbers of generations, including our earliest pioneer residents.

Patrick is very proud to have played even a small role, as he describes, in the modern-day concept of shared collections and collaborations between historical groups and individuals. Not all that many years ago, most owners of private and public collections, libraries and even genealogical societies, historical societies, and museums tended to foster a "me-mine-ours" mentality, meaning that many felt in sharing their

collections they were losing ownership and control of that material. Today we see a much better understanding on everyone's part that sharing our collections does not detract from what each group or individual has, and by working together we glean new information and further the historic value for everyone involved.

Patrick strongly advocates that whenever possible research should include connecting with people of the area, their stories and the events of their lives and how also they changed and developed the region.

The community in general is more responsive and forthcoming with their contributions when they feel they are being received, cared for, displayed (when possible) and used in a way that further benefits the overall understanding of our shared, historical past.

Patrick currently con-

ducts four classes each year at the Boyne District Library with focus on various aspects of genealogy, family history and local history. In each class he has the opportunity to work with a remarkable group of regular attendees, in addition to a growing number of beginning researchers.

Later this year, Patrick will also be speaking on the history of the Boyne River; the early Boyne City telephone system and its operators; the history of the Wolverine-Dilworth Hotel; and the "how-to" of researching historic homes and properties.

Briefly, here are some of Patrick's suggestions to assist historically based groups and organizations better succeed:


- Advanced planning is definitely key
- Get your message out well in advance
- Photos, particularly early pictures attract attention and help tell the story
- Put in the hours your-
- Push yourself and your group to make every event special and memorable • Speak what you think.
- Stand by what you believe to be right. Do not simply be a "yes" person
- Encourage collaboration with other groups and organizations
- Have specific goals, not "umbrella" concepts
- Frugality in the

public's eye is responded to much better than lavish expenditures for things that could be done in alternative, less expensive ways

Housing North Chosen to Lead Creation of Regional Housing Plan in NW Michigan

In September 2022, the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) launched its First-Ever Statewide Housing Plan, aiming to tackle housing challenges and enhance the availability of safe, affordable, and sustainable housing options for all Michigan residents. Housing North has been selected as the Regional Housing Partnership lead for Northwest Michigan to drive this initiative forward.

Housing North is responsible for bringing together stakeholders across Northwest Michigan to create a comprehensive Regional Housing Plan. This plan will align with the Statewide Housing Plan's priority areas, goals, and strategies, but it will be tailored to the specific needs and challenges of the region.

"We are actively working on a timeline for implementing the plan," said Zachary Sompels, Charlevoix County Housing Ready Program Coordinator for Housing North. "The draft plan has been out for public comment since September. Once finalized, we will submit it to MSHDA to support future projects in our region."

Based on feedback sessions and meetings, the top priorities in the plan include:

Increasing access to stable, affordable qual-

ity housing for households with extremely low incomes.

- Expanding the supply of affordable and attainable housing for all residents.
- Enhancing middle-income and workforce housing options.
- Improving the housing ecosystem's efficiency through enhanced collaboration.
- Promoting equitable and comprehensive local planning and zoning practices.

"As a dedicated advocate for Charlevoix's needs, I've been attending these meetings to address issues such as housing stock, the housing ecosystem, and streamlined funding opportunities," added Sompels. "Our goal is to leverage the partnership between Housing North and Charlevoix to secure more state funding and foster a vibrant, year-round community."


has nothing to do with how much you love your parents, being greedy or anything like that. It has everything to do with consideration and communication, or in this case, a lack of these on their part.


