New Plans Announced for Improved Recreation in Charlevoix Township

BY DEAN DAVENPORT

Charlevoix Township is currently updating its Parks and Recreation Plan to stay current with its recreation inventory and its list of prioritized projects. Earlier in the year Township Supervisor Dan Ulrich announced that for the first time they would be hiring a full-time director of recreation and parks and Todd Klinger was appointed Director. He also revealed that a Township Advisory Committee was appointed to support the new emphasis on Parks and Recreation. Work and planning, which included working on a community survey from the public on their use of township facilities, has been going on all year.

The survey received over 200 responses. The opportunities for engagement were advised on flyers posted throughout the community and on the township website.



The feedback from Charlevoix Township and the local community indicates a strong demand for specific amenities. Below is listed a synthesis of the main requests.

- 1. Pickleball courts more are needed to meet the high number of participants.
- 2. Tennis courts a large call for maintaining and

improving tennis facilities.

- 3. Biking and walking infrastructures - more safe and intensive biking and walking paths.
- 4. Dog Park and Beaches – More dog friendly areas including parks and beach areas.
- 5. Indoor and seasonal recreational facilities such as indoor pickleball

courts, basketball courts, volleyball, walking and yoga spaces.

- 6. Water recreation facilities – better access to lakes for kayaking/boat launching
- 7. Natural and educational trails – enhancements to existing trails with educational signage, local flora, facna and history.

Overall the community feedback underscores a strong desire for expanded and improved recreational activities that cater for a wide range of activities and supports the growing interest in both traditional and emerging sports and leisure activities.

Supervisor Dan Ulrich announced, "The Township now will use this survey work for planning decisions and development of an action plan." He thanked the community for their input for this planning exercise which is now planned for the Township Board by November 2024.

The survey was done by Beckett and Raeder, Inc. whose influence of aiding local governments span to over 55 years.



News Stolen Political Campaign Signs near Walloon Lake

On September 6, 2024 a Charlevoix County resident witnessed a woman taking political campaign signs off of a property near the village of Walloon Lake. This witness contacted police, the woman was identified, the political campaign signs were recovered, and the woman has been charged with Larceny. The woman is scheduled for arraignment in the 90th District Court on October 18th. She is presumed innocent until proven guilty in court.

The campaign signs that were recovered belong to a candidate for President, a candidate for the United States Senate, a candidate for Charlevoix County Register of Deeds, a candidate for Emmet County Clerk, and a candidate for the Michigan House of Representatives.

Speaking on the matter, Prosecutor Kit Tholen reiterated that the defendant is innocent until proven guilty. On the charges, he stated "candidates for these positions and their supporters spend a large amount of money and time to put up signs. These charges may signify only a small dollar amount in value but the theft of campaign signs is contrary to democracy and must be addressed by the courts."

New degree programs, transfer pathways, and student support initiatives help drive enrollment growth at NCMC

North Central Michigan College's Fall 2024 enrollment has increased by 4.83% compared to Fall 2023, marking two consecutive years of growth in credit and contact hours and reflecting positive momentum in the college's ongoing student success initiatives. Both new and returning students contributed to this growth, with notable gains in key student demographics.

Among the highlights of Fall 2024 enrollment:

- A 5.57% increase in dual-enrolled students, as more high school students in North Central's service area choose to get a head start on their college education
- A 7% increase in students aged 22 and older, highlighting the college's appeal to adult learners



per semester for NCMC students — are significantly more likely to persist in their studies and continue their enrollment year after year. According to data from the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center, full-time students starting in Fall 2022 had a retention rate of 74.5% and a persistence rate of 82.9%, compared to part-time students, whose rates were significantly lower at 45.7% and 52.3%, respectively.

This upward trend in credit and contact hours, combined with the proven benefits of full-time enrollment, underscores the importance of campus initiatives designed to foster student engagement and belonging, according to Corey Lansing, North Central's director of Admission. As part of its continuing efforts to ensure that students feel connected and supported, North Central launched a new "First Six Weeks" initiative this fall, aimed at helping students find a sense of community through various student-focused activities in the critical first weeks of the semester "The first few weeks on campus are often when students decide whether they feel like they belong, and we know that fostering that sense of community early can make a big difference in whether they persist," Lansing said. "The 'First Six Weeks' initiative is one of the ways we're ensuring that students build connections, feel supported, and stay engaged from the start."

students balance their academic and family responsibilities. Funding available through a Child Care Access Means Parents in School (CCAMPIS) grant is also available to help qualifying student parents pay for child care.

North Central also expanded its counseling services this fall, offering shorter, more informal "Let's Talk" consultations as a complement to longer, one-on-one sessions, both with a licensed professional counselor.

The college also introduced its Zen Den, a new on-campus space dedicated to mental well-being. The Zen Den provides a tranquil environment where students can relax, decompress, and focus on mindfulness with features such as meditation tools, comfortable seating, and soft lighting. North Central's commitment to personalized support extends to its recruitment efforts, Lansing added, noting the addition of a second outreach recruiter to the Admission staff. "Adding a second outreach recruiter means that we're better able to serve and respond to the needs of prospective students," he explained. "This allows us to work more closely with high schools in our service area and beyond, helping students navigate their options and make informed decisions about their next step." Looking ahead, Lansing emphasized a sharpened focus on retaining dual-enrolled students, encouraging them to complete their associate degree before transferring to a four-year institution. "As dual-enrolled students recognize the cost savings and academic head start available to them at North Central, we believe more will stay to finish their associate degree before moving on," he said.

North Central's newest degree programs, including Mechatronics, Digital Art & Design, Global Studies, Teacher Education, and Medical & Health Sciences, offer students attractive transfer opportunities in high-demand fields. These programs not only prepare students for careers but also create clear pathways for transferring to four-year universities, Lansing noted. "State initiatives like

Michigan Transfer Pathways and the Michigan Community College Guarantee also highlight the value of saving money during the first two years of college, while ensuring a smooth transfer to a fouryear institution," Lansing said. "We expect these programs will continue to draw more students to North Central."

The Michigan Transfer Pathways initiative makes transferring from North Central to any public university in Michigan smoother by guaranteeing that completed general education courses at North Central will seamlessly transfer, allowing students to save money on the first two years of their bachelor's degree while ensuring a streamlined transfer process. Additionally, the Michigan Community College Guarantee provides up to \$4,800 in tuition aid per year for recent high school graduates, with Pell Grant-eligible students receiving an extra \$1,000 annually for living expenses. This program significantly reduces the financial barriers for dual-enrolled students and helps them transition from high school to college without accumulating significant debt. In addition to its traditional academic programs, North Central serves nearly 200 students annually through Fast Track career programs and provides more than 7,000 learners with Lifelong Learning opportunities.

3 Vital Questions

The book, 3 Vital Questions: Transforming Workplace Drama, by David Emerald, who also authored The Power of Ted* (* The Empowerment Dynamic), which has been a favorite for its insight, which is relevant to our work, business and personal lives - to our relationships.

3 Vital Questions is insightful and helpful. It is simple – and simple is good!

It is three basic questions to ask ourselves - often - monthly, better

weekly, ideally daily.

1. Where is my focus? 2. How are my relationships?

3. What actions/steps am I taking?

This is about our discernment and self-reflection, leading us to intentional and focused action, which is so very important! 1. Where is my focus?

Is my focus where it should be, what is most important?

As a leader, am I focused on listening to my team members and other colleagues, and really hearing them, i.e., what they are saying and their reasons, and how they are feeling? Am I listening to learn and understand?

Are they feeling my appreciation and gratitude? Leadership is how we help others feel about themselves.

And leadership is about helping others do great work and be successful. Am I focused on doing just that?

Kindness is motivating. Am I communicating with kindness, respect, and dignity?

they are received and perceived by others.

We certainly want to be respected by our team members and other colleagues and for them want to work with and follow us, to do their very best for us.

A key way to develop and maintain sound and productive working relationships is through oneon-one conversations. We must make the time to do this. And to be ourselves, no airs, to allow ourselves to be vulnerable. This opens the door to trust, which is the foundation of solid relationships.

Great leaders focus on their people, not numbers. 3. What steps/actions am I taking?

Even baby steps make a difference. If there is a desired outcome, even doing the little things to get started or to keep us going puts us in a positive mindset. It really does. The most difficult step for a long-distance runner, is the first step, the one out the door. And this is true in our work, to make something happen, take a step forward. We'll feel good, as will our teammates.

I am a believer in "to do" lists. A key to success with "to do" lists is to list maybe just three desired outcomes, only three, and to make them the most important objectives - not the easy ones – the truly most essential ones which, when accomplished, make a difference.

• A 12.28% increase in full-time students, signaling stronger persistence and engagement Additionally, the college saw significant increases in male student enrollment, up 17.39%, and in out-of-state contact hours, which grew by 16.29%.

North Central has seen consistent enrollment growth from Fall 2022 to Fall 2024, with headcount increasing by 4%, credit hours by 8%, and contact hours by 8% during that period.

Associate Dean of Institutional Research and Assessment Erin Sonneveldt noted that such increases are a key driver of student success.

"The increase in credit and contact hours is a strong indicator that our students are building momentum toward degree completion," Sonneveldt said. "When students take more credit hours each semester, they're not only accelerating their path to graduation but also staying more engaged with their studies, which significantly boosts their chances of successfully completing their degree."

Research indicates that students enrolled full-time — 12 or more credit hours

In addition to these efforts, North Central has rolled out several new student support initiatives this fall.

The college has increased its focus on student parents, offering resources such as dedicated study spaces, lactation rooms, and family-friendly campus events, while providing flexible scheduling to help





People at greatest risk of developing severe COVID-19 and flu complications remain adults 65 years or older, children under 6 months old, residents in long-term care facilities, pregnant women, and those with underlying illnesses.


Rayders fall to Cheboygan in close match



Rayders shut out Elk Rapids for third straight win




