## This class could save your life

**EAST JORDAN** - Would you know what to do if your child stopped breathing? How could you keep a heart attack or drowning victim alive until an ambulance arrived?

Seventy-five people in the East Jordan area have learned a life saving method called cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR). Instructor for the class, ambulance director Bernard Hammond says that CPR is not just a method of pounding on the chest and blowing in the mouth of the victim. "You have to know what you're trying to accomplish," he says. "It's like fixing a tractor, you have to know about the engine before you can fix it."

If the heart stops, resuscitation alone is useless. There must also be circulation so oxygenated blood can reach the brain. Students in the class practice the CPR techniques of artificial ventilation and artificial circulation on a human-like doll

called Resusi-Annie.

Within four to six minutes after the heart stops the brain can be severely damaged because of oxygen loss. Hammond says this is why CPR must be started as soon as possible. The chances of recovery decrease every minute anytime there is a stoppage of breath and the heart.

CPR can be used on victims of electric shock, heart attack, drug overdose, "restaurant heart attack" (choking on food), drowning, for instance.

Drowning victims stand a good chance of being revived, Hammond says, because the heart is all right and will begin beating quite easily. The CPR method is 33 and one third percent effective, which means that one out of three people who receive CPR treatment will be saved.

Hammond will teach a CPR class at the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department Wednesday night, but says he has no plans right now for another class open to the public.

One person can blow it for all of us," Doug Stark, head of the youth

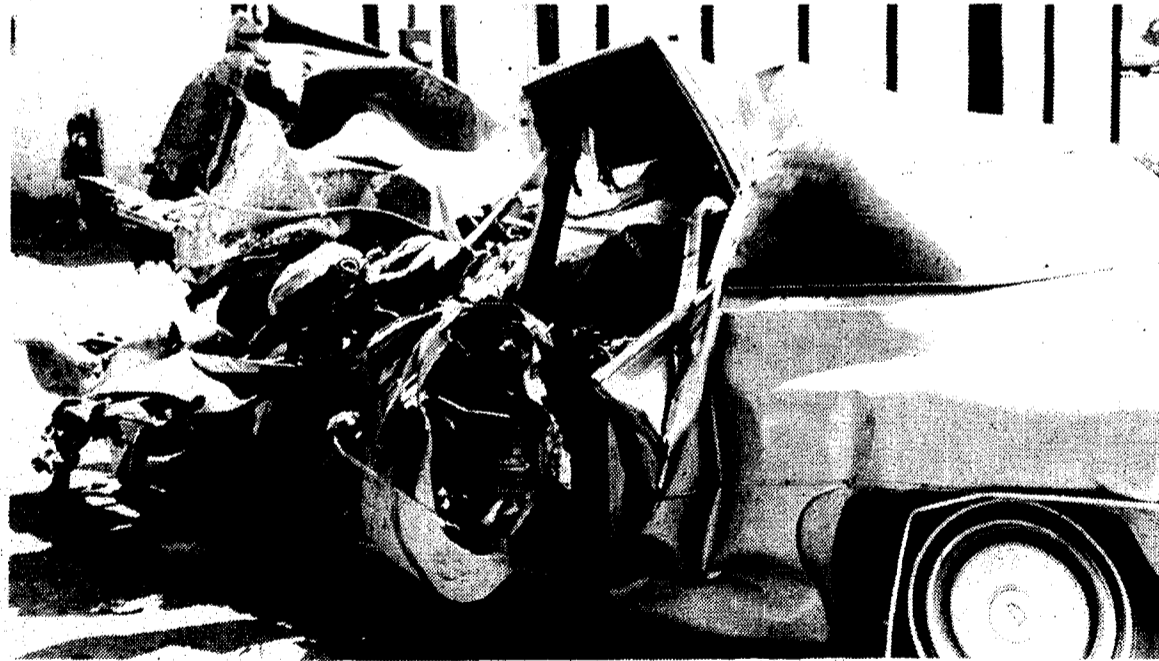

## Lots of plans for Tourist Park

**EAST JORDAN** - The plans for the Tourist Park are almost final, according to Councilman Gil Fox.

The first phase includes a green strip along M-66 highway the full length of the park. One of the entrances from M-66 which are now part of a semi-circular drive will be closed off and a parking lot will be put in. Playground equipment will be moved back from the beach itself and the beach area will be extended. Picnic tables will be placed behind the community building in the park for use by tourists and the community.

One of the roads that lead into the trailer park will be cut off to through traffic so the trailer park will be separate

from the beach area.

"One of the problems now is that people drive around and around in there," Fox said.

Eventually the city wants to put boat wells in and so some dredging off the shore of the park.

"A lot of this will depend on money available and how fast we can get this we don't know," Fox said.

He said the city is hoping to find a matching funds grant for the beach area. The rest of the money will hopefully come from tourist park revenues. "We don't want to use tax money," he said. "And since it's operating as a business, it must pay for itself."

Another decision for the city, is how quickly to phase out permanent residents that are now in the park. Fox said the city had planned the phaseout over a five year period, but there seems to be some feeling that it may be shortened. "If they are there for the next five years we will have to decide what area to put them in so they are separate from the rest of the park."

The city would also like to do some repair work this year, Fox said. The restrooms need to be insulated because they are heated throughout the winter. "The heating bill is fantastic," Fox said. "We may have to close the restrooms for the winter, but as long as permanent residents are there, the restrooms have to remain open."

## More unusual fires here

**EAST JORDAN** - For the third time in less than two weeks, unusual fires have been set in the East Jordan area.

A shed in South Arm Township on Deer Lake Road was destroyed by fire at 1:05 a.m. Sunday, May 28, according to East Jordan Fire Chief Dick Barnett.

In another incident, fragments of issues of the Charlevoix County Press were found burning next to the home of Hazel Blair, 708 Milton, at approximately 9 p.m. Monday, May 29.

The series of suspicious fires began Saturday, May 20, when the home of Ted and Joyce McNeil on Belleaire Road was completely destroyed by fire.

A man was seen running from the scene

of the fire at the Blair residence shortly before it was discovered. Fire officials have not ruled out arson as a possibility in the other two incidents.

Regarding the shack fire on Deer Lake Road, Dick Barnett said, "How a little building like that with nothing in it could set itself on fire is beyond me."

Asked if he thought all three fires might have been set by the same person, he said, "That's what I'm not sure of right now. We have to have more to go on."

"There aren't great similarities, at least not at this point." Police Chief Joe Hammond said, "We're just trying to piece everything together to see if they're connected."

Hazel Blair is a reporter for the Charlevoix County Press and wrote a story in the May 25 issue about the McNeil fire. Asked if he thought there was any connection between the article and the fire at her home, Hammond said, "I couldn't see where that would fit."

"She didn't slander anyone. It was a very open-minded article."

The newspapers at Blair's home were circled with a ring of stones. A babysitter's brother saw somebody near the house and then discovered the fire and put it out.

Hammond said he didn't think somebody was trying to set the Blair home on fire. "If I wanted to burn a house down," he said, "I'd do a lot better job than that."

## Emergency care improves

Residents in both the Boyne City and East Jordan areas will be happy to know that both communities now have improved ambulance service.

East Jordan recently bought a new \$18,400 ambulance to replace the 1971 Chevrolet Suburban ambulance sold to Boyne City for \$2,050.

Acquiring East Jordan's old ambulance will enable Boyne City to retire the unreliable 1965 blue hearse that had been used as a backup vehicle.

Ambulance directors Henry Erber of Boyne City and Bernie Hammond of East Jordan say their new ambulances will help improve service.

"This will better serve the people because they'll have dependable transportation," says Erber. "They didn't have that before with the second unit."

Hammond says East Jordan's new ambulance will give his men more room to work and store equipment. "That's why we got this kind of ambulance," he said.

East Jordan's backup ambulance is a 1974 Chevrolet intensive care unit, Hammond said. He said the new ambulance gives the community top flight medical transport facilities. "I don't think there's anyone set up any better," he said.

Hammond said the new ambulance has special equipment for cardiac patients, including a built-in electrocardiogram machine.

"Our percentage of accident calls isn't as high as over in Boyne City," he said. "But we probably have more heart patients than most towns because of all the older people we have here."

Henry Erber said Boyne City's new backup ambulance has a built-in radio and also offers more room to hold two patients. He added that the city hopes to eventually buy a new ambulance of its own.

"This is just a temporary deal until the city can afford to buy a new one," Erber said.

According to Erber, Charlevoix County

is blessed with above average ambulance care. "The people of Charlevoix County are fortunate to have three highly competent ambulance services," he said.

"I think people get more benefit from a volunteer unit. They care more because they're doing it for almost nothing."

The Boyne City ambulance team recently finished a 97 hour medical training course at Little Traverse Hospital and are now certified Emergency Medical Technicians.

Erber said the course included training in how to treat burns, bleeding, poisons and childbirths. Those who completed the course were John Talboys, Tom Smith, Jo Anne Bennett, Skip Young, Fred Lehto, Henry Erber and Tom Garlock.

Members of East Jordan's ambulance squad are Hammond, Don Bowers, Guy Vallance, Howard Stanek, Reno Lane, Roy Gokce, Jack Zoulek and Dick Barnett.

## Help stop fireworks

Fireworks might be appropriate for special occasions like the Fourth of July and graduation night, but the situation in Charlevoix County has gotten completely out of hand.

### Editorial

Seldom does a day go by without another alarming story surfacing. One day we hear about teenagers throwing firecrackers at pedestrians from cars; the next day we hear about a box office clerk at a movie theater suffering a temporary hearing loss after some imbecile throws a firecracker under the window.

Ever since a federal court ruled Michigan's fireworks law invalid, the problem has gotten progressively worse. Every time another store starts selling fireworks, the surrounding neighborhood gets a little noisier and more dangerous.

No, the fireworks being sold locally aren't particularly large or dangerous in the proper hands. But who is able to see to it that they stay in the hands of responsible persons? There is no legal age limit for

fireworks, so the police cannot legally confiscate them from anybody, no matter how young.

Merchants who are selling fireworks say they impose their own age limits, but what's to stop big kids from buying fireworks for little kids? And age is certainly no guarantee of responsibility, as is proven by those who throw firecrackers from automobiles.

So people are upset, but what can they do? Right now the hands of the police are tied because city attorneys and county prosecutors have advised them that they risk legal repercussions if they arrest anyone for exploding fireworks.

But there are a couple of things that citizens can do. The stores that are selling fireworks aren't owned by cold-blooded money-mongers, but by honest small businessmen who see a good chance to make a big profit selling items that for now are perfectly legal.

Given these economic facts, citizens who do not appreciate the local sale of fireworks can express their displeasure most effectively by not patronizing stores that sell merchandise they consider objectionable. If selling fireworks becomes bad business, fireworks will more than likely become scarce.

But the root of the current fireworks problem is the state law, or lack of a law. Bills currently in the state legislature would plug the loopholes that have allowed fireworks to spread. But fireworks manufacturers are well organized, well funded and therefore a powerful lobbying force.

To get anything accomplished, those against the sale of fireworks must prove that they are more powerful than the fireworks lobby. This is an election year so politicians up for re-election will be looking for issues that will attract the attention of voters.

Few issues are causing as much discussion locally as fireworks and citizens can let their representatives know this by writing and expressing their feelings.

Government might often seem unresponsive, but letters to congressmen, if sufficient in numbers, really can bring results. The Boyne City Commission has made matters simple for you by providing the appropriate addresses and a form on page five of this newspaper.

If you feel strongly about the fireworks issue, let your elected representatives know about it today. You could put it off until tomorrow, but tomorrow might be the day a firecracker explodes in somebody's eye. Let's not let that happen.

## The years pass quickly

Sometimes we need a jolt to bring us to reality. Thus it was, recently, when I stopped in at the Press office and Ye Editor looked across the desk and asked, "Hartung, why don't you write your memories of E.J.?" I blurted, "Who me? I ain't no native!" He asked, "How long you been here?" Answer, "30 years come Dec. 18". He just looked at me and said, "W-e-e-l!" It was like a bomb exploding! I suddenly thought, "30 years! Why that's near one third of E.J.'s history!" I could hardly believe we'd been here that long! Thirty years in one place! The move here was the 37th time I'd changed residences in my 34 years!

But first, what brought us to E.J. We were looking for a farm. We'd sold the one we had. We'd been to E.J. a couple of times, had inquired about the school system, noted the beauty of the area and liked what we saw and heard. So a Saturday in late June or early July 1948, we spent with a real estate agent who showed us three places in the area, none of which even approached what we said we wanted! We went home disgusted!

The next day the Detroit News carried the following ad, "For Sale: 160 acres on state highway good house and land!" Widow anxious to sell". Hey that sounds good! So on Monday we came down. An elderly man, brother-in-law to the owner, met us at the door and took me around to see the land. The cows pasturing were sleek and I thought "nothing wrong with this land!"

Anna showed my wife the house. We had brought along hot dogs and stuff for dinner and "Joe" got us some kindling to build a fire by the creek! Ah, that beautiful creek! We were having water troubles on our old place. We liked what we saw but thought the price was too high. This time we went home feeling sad.

Next morning when I came in from milking the wife said, "I couldn't sleep

last night. I kept hearing that beautiful creek babbling along! Let's go back and buy that place!" I said "I slept O.K. but I want to go back and buy it too!" And so we made the deal and then I realized I hadn't even been inside the house! On Dec. 18 we brought the cattle and the rest of the "vitals" and we were in!

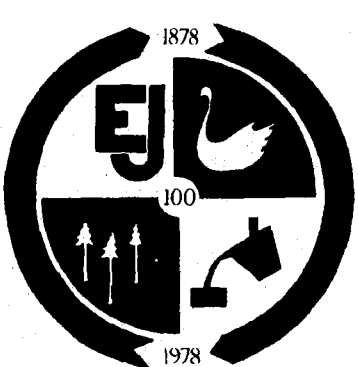
What was the area like then? Well, Bill Kerrige, who used to drive horses for my dad, had just completed bulldozing the first slopes for Boyne Mountain! There were only three families between Chestonia and E.J. that didn't have cattle! There were seven grocery stores in town. Two at Chestonia. And three sawmills within a mile and a half of us! We were acquainted with the Vances and L.B. Karr.

We'd only been here two or three weeks, when crossing the street one afternoon, we were approached by a couple about our age. They stopped us - somehow they'd found out our name - and flatly announced, "We'd like to have you two be Mother and Father Vice Presidents in our PTA! With 3 children in school we accepted! And for the next several years we were!"

We soon found that we had wonderful neighbors! I went to Don Hots and asked to borrow his livestock trailer to take an animal to Gaylord. When I went to pay him for it he refused to take any money! So I gave him some maple syrup. And I found out the rest of the neighbors were like that. You could give them "something" but seldom would they take money. And if I did something to help them out always some small gift showed up within a few days! Each of us knew that if something went wrong, we need only to call and a neighbor would be right there to help.

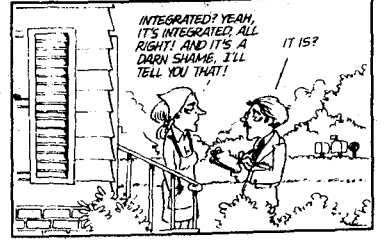
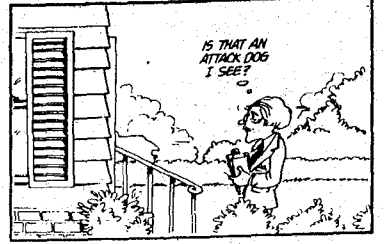
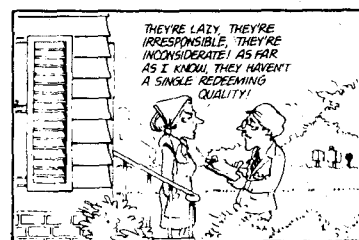
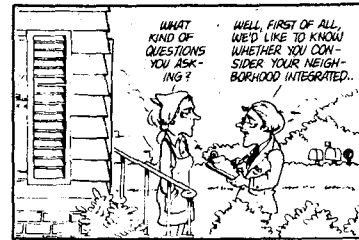
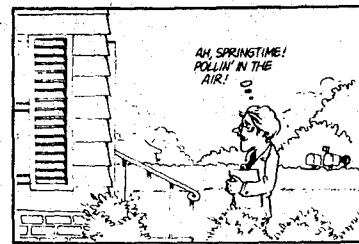
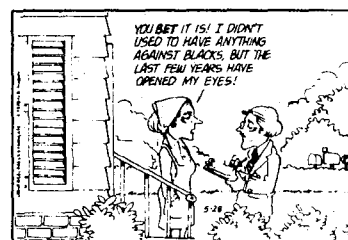
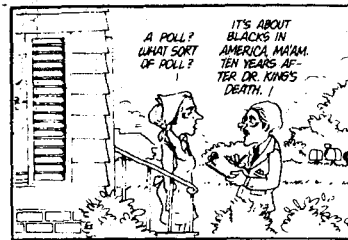
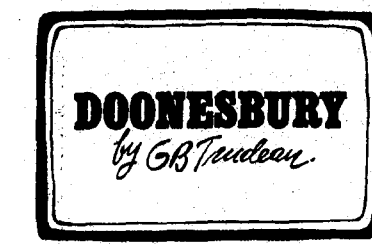
Little things along the way stick in our memories. Scott Bartholomew had a pair

of work horses that weighed in at about 1800 pounds apiece. As we went to town one day, his great granddaughter - only about two years old - was standing by one of the horses, in the pasture, with her arms around its front leg! She came barely to the horse's knee! But "horse" seemed to know it should not move!



Over the years five buildings have burned from here to town. Only two farms now have cattle. Both stores at Chestonia are gone. Only four grocery stores in town. The Gulf and Western parking lot was Archie Howe's pasture! Mt. Clemens Metal Products hadn't arrived yet. The foundry that had about 75 men then, now has over 400. There's the ITT plant. Three plants on M-32 near the airport. The railroad is gone.

Most of the traffic when we came here was composed of one foundry truck going south each evening and an occasional gasoline tanker. Plus grocery and meat trucks. A flurry of cars every Friday afternoon and at fishing and hunting seasons. Now there is a continual procession of trucks literally 24 hours a day. Hauling nearly everything you can imagine. And a pretty steady stream of

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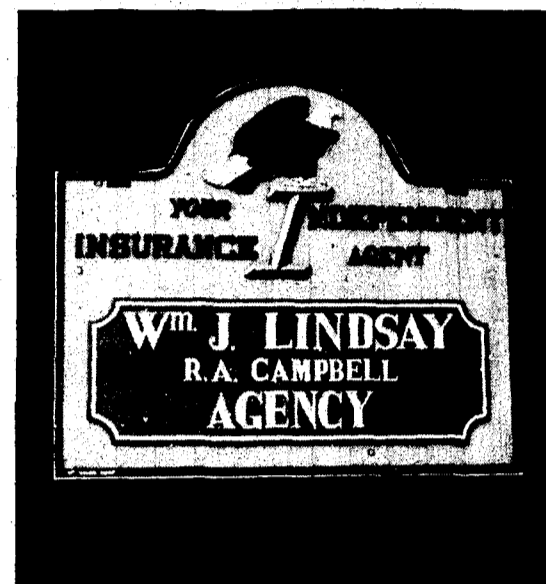

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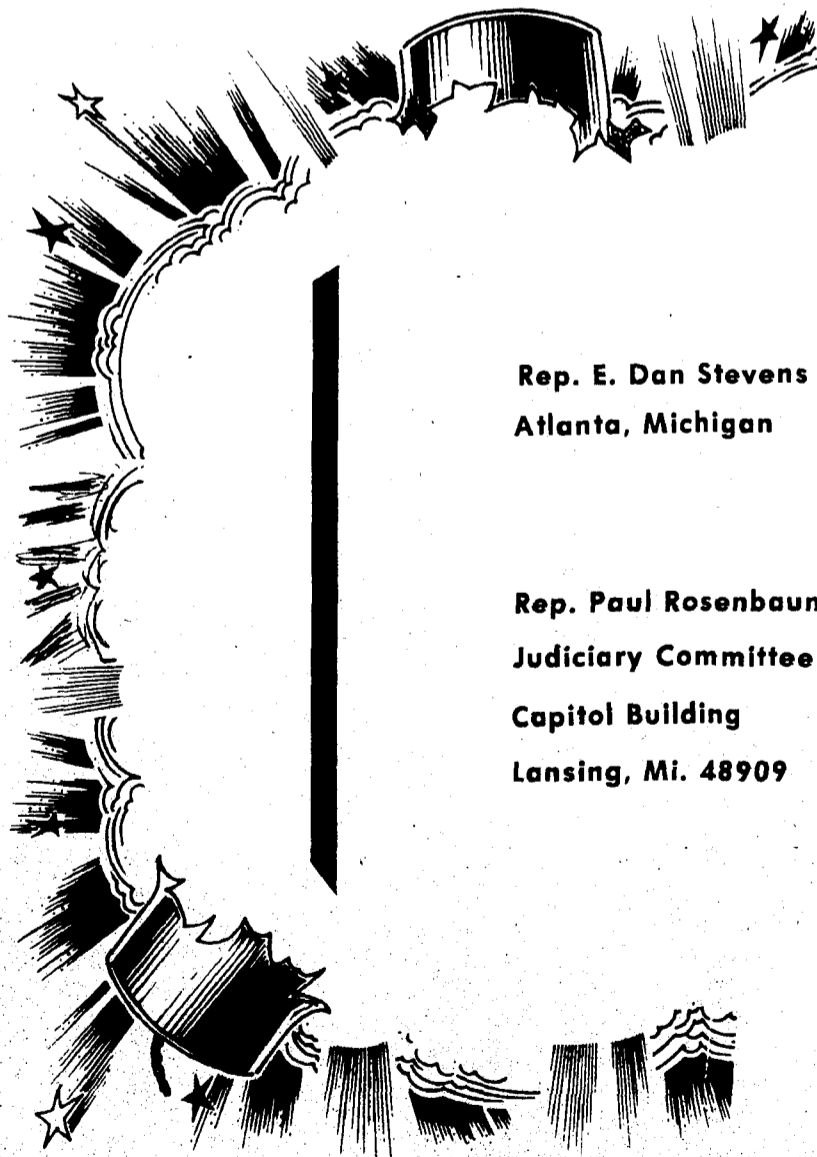

# The importance of a real estate appraisal

If you are considering selling your property, an appraisal by a recognized professional can be most important to you as well as to the potential buyer.

**The Income Approach.** Income approach is used where income or rental properties are being appraised. It is sometime referred to as "Capitalization Approach." The determining factors involved are present and future net income of the property.

Although the East Jordan girls track team fell short in its bid for first in the Ski Valley conference coach Mike Bos had plenty of reasons to feel proud of his girls, as they broke seven school records plus one conference record at last Saturday's conference meet, won by Inland Lakes. "They did a fantastic job out there," was the comment of coach Bos. "I'm really proud of them. They really did a great job."

The Devil girls took 66 points during their record-shattering performances. In other highlights, Jane Noiroit missed a new school record in the 880 by five tenths of a second. Her time was 2:58.5 for fourth place. In the 440 dash, Kim Morris finished just two seconds behind Melissa Hite's new record with a time of 63:90 for third place.

In the shot-put, Kim Helland threw 30 feet 11 inches, good enough for third place. Anita Thomas outdid her previous best in the discus by fourteen feet to capture sixth place with a toss of 85 feet 10 1/4 inches. Laura Osowski took sixth in the mile run with a time of 6:25.5.

"People have been great," Pols said. "They hear about us and then come out to cheer us on."

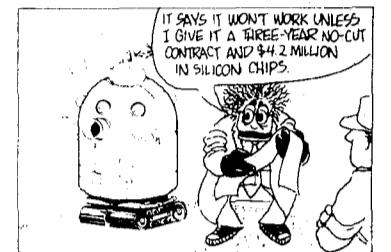
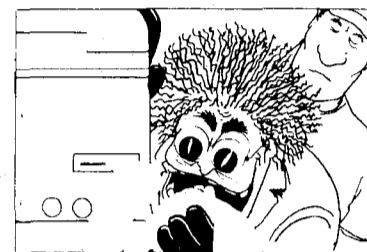
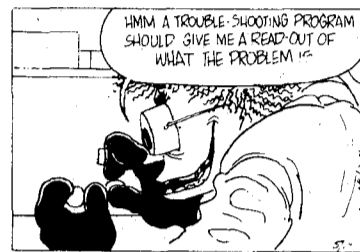
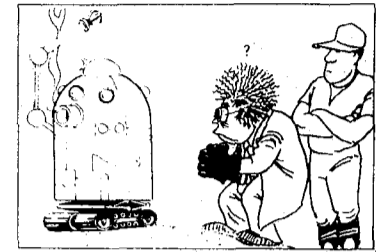
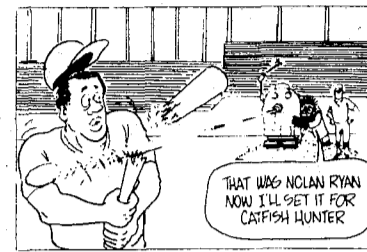
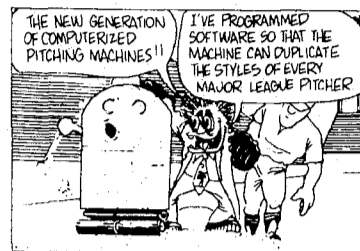

## Jail inmates get The Word

BOYNE CITY - When Christ told his apostles to feed his sheep, he meant all of them, including the black sheep.

That's why Rev. Cliff Molnar of Boyne City and Rev. Dale Turner of the East Jordan Missionary Church visit the Charlevoix County jail each week, ministering to the spiritual needs of the inmates.

In appreciation of their work, Sheriff George Lasater recently came to Rev. Molnar's Assembly of God Church to present his department's Good Citizen Award to the two ministers.

"I can't say enough good about the program," Lasater said. "I would estimate that both these men have put in over 200 hours."

"They have different styles that complement each other very well. The ones that one doesn't reach, the other will."

Organized last year shortly after Lasater was elected, the Jail Ministry Program is sponsored by the Charlevoix County Ministerial Association.

The ministers conduct Bible studies and discussions at the jail, and report that the inmates often raise thought-provoking questions.

Rev. Molnar says, "One time an inmate said to me, 'God is love, but if God is really love, then there would be no jails. So why am I in here?'"

"I told him that love demands justice," Rev. Molnar says, "and God is a just God. I tell them that they can't blame God for them being in jail. It's their own fault."

Not everybody asks the ministers such sticky questions. Molnar admits that, "Some of them come just for the chance to get out of their cells."

But Molnar believes he and Rev.

Turner have reached some of the inmates. Rev. Molnar says, "One fellow told me he's learned more about the Bible since he's been in jail than in the other 18 or 19 years of his life."

Rev. Molnar said many of the inmates have become familiar faces in the jailhouse. "They've been there many times," he says. "They've established a pattern in their lives."

Often this pattern is caused by liquor. "Over half of them say they've been in because they committed some kind of crime while they were drinking," Rev.

Molnar said.

"I point out to them the many things that scripture has to say about drinking. God's word says you have to keep things under control."

Before coming to Boyne City four years ago, Rev. Molnar worked at a minimum security prison near Grayling. Although he is happy that he and Rev. Turner have been able to devote time to the jail, he hopes the program can eventually be expanded.

"Even with what we're doing," he says, "there's a lot more that could be done."

## Can do canoe

### Hitting the water in style

BOYNE CITY - When middle school teacher Gary Graye hits the water this year, he'll be doing it in style, thanks to the industrial arts class at Boyne City High School.

Graye is the proud owner of a new 18 foot, 6 inch redwood canoe built by the students in Russ Harvey's three classes. It's a good deal for all concerned. Graye gets a beautiful canoe for \$175, the cost of materials, and the students get to participate in an interesting class project.

Harvey's students began the project in April after seeing a prize-winning canoe at a state-wide high school industrial arts exhibition. The Boyne City students decided to see if they could do the same thing.

"We're doing it just to show everybody what it's like," Harvey said. "In following years we'll build them for other people at cost."

The four-passenger canoe has a fiberglass skin inside and out. It is made of over 80 strips of redwood which had to be curved to fit the design of the canoe.

Harvey estimates that a similar canoe would bring a retail price of \$500-\$700. Each class had a group leader for work on the canoe. The leaders were Tom

Carson, Bruce McGeorge, John Pearl, George Britton, Tom Bajko, Park McGeorge and Jim Johnson.

A total of 18 students worked on the canoe, which was successfully tested in the Boyne River last week.
