He's not an owner, but Rasch has close ties to contractor

EAST JORDAN - The question of City Superintendent Herman Rasch's involvement with a local contracting firm has popped up again.

Under questioning from Councilman Ken Hagen last October, Rasch said he had no "ownership interests" in KD Contractors, the firm hired by the East Jordan Family Health Center to build an addition to the center.

Hagen had raised the ownership question because city residents had complained to him that Rasch was spending city time supervising the health center project.

Although Rasch does not have any direct ownership in KD Contractors, The Press has learned that:

--His nephew David Rasch is part owner of the firm.

--The city superintendent has loaned "a considerable amount of money" to the firm.

--He has at times acted as an agent for the firm.

--His home address and phone number is listed as the official address of KD Contractors on its invoices and its articles of incorporation.

--His wife does the firm's book-keeping.

--Rasch himself signed the final bill to

the health center, under the words "Kindly remit. A copy of that invoice is printed adjacent to this story. It was presented to The Press by a health center board member who "thought it looked funny."

--Rasch has hired the firm to do carpentry work at the city owned Community Center, which is now being remodeled.

DONATED HIS SERVICES

When asked about these findings, the city superintendent maintained that the main reason that he had spent time supervising the building project at the health center was that he was the engineer of record for the project—a service he performed at no cost.

He also points out that the city council had agreed when he was hired that he would be allowed to do outside consulting work as long as it didn't interfere with his job performance.

"The health center is a community service organization, and by the time I took the job here, it was half built," Rasch said.

"I had never donated anything to it, so I wanted to help them out by doing the engineering work for nothing. And when they wanted to know the name of a good architect and a good contractor, I told them about some guys I've worked with."

KD Contractors ultimately submitted the lowest bid for the health center project.

CONTRACTORS' AGENT?

When asked about Rasch's involvement with the firm, health center administrator Neal Colburn said Rasch "has acted as their (KD Contractors') agent, but he said he had no financial interest in the company. It wouldn't have mattered to us if he did."

"As far as I'm concerned, Herm did us a favor by providing the engineering work for free, and he kept costs to a minimum," Colburn said.

"I have no ownership in the company," Rasch said. "The reason my

address is on their invoice is that my wife does their bookkeeping—she does other people's bookkeeping and taxes, too. These guys are busy laying brick and mortar. They're too busy to do all the paperwork."

Did he act as an agent for KD?

"Well, I wouldn't really say I was their agent," Rasch replied. "I'm just trying to help these young guys get established. I've loaned them a heckuva lot of money till they get their feet on the ground."

"SELFISH MOTIVE"

"I've got a big of a selfish motive here for the city. We sometimes have trouble getting good bids. If these guys can come in with low bids, that will keep (other contractors) honest in their bidding, and my job is a little easier."

He cited the example of the Community Center remodeling project. Rasch had estimated that the project would cost \$70,000, but bids came in considerably higher than that. "I look like a fool when that kind of thing happens," he said.

Rasch told the city council he was sure he could still get the remodeling done for that price, and the council gave him the authority to finish the project by getting the best prices he could—without advertising for formal bids.

The city superintendent said KD Contractors is one of the firms he is using (Continued on page 3)

BCHS baseball team nixed again

BOYNE CITY - After discussing it for almost a month, the athletic committee of the Boyne City School Board recommended that a baseball team program should be offered during the summer if it is offered at all.

The board last month received a petition signed by 52 high school students requesting that a baseball team be formed. The project was tabled until Monday's meeting so that the athletic committee could look into it and other athletic programs.

The board accepted the athletic committee's recommendation but tabled the matter until further study is done. They said poor spring weather and a tight budget were determinants in okaying the sport.

The committee was also looking into six spring coaching positions and employee admittance fees to games.

The committee recommended and the board approved the following coaching positions:

Fred Rice, high school tennis; Joyce Baker, high girls' track; Bob

McCullough, high school boys' track and Sara Bricker, high school junior varsity volleyball.

The board swayed a little from usual coaching appointments and appointed Dave Bricker head coach of middle school boys' and girls' track and Sara Bricker was named assistant coach for this spring. Usually a coach is named for the boys' track and one is named for the girls' track but Dave Bricker recommended he be assigned both positions because there would be less duplication of coaching tasks, there would be better communication between himself and the students and he could discipline the students better since he is already on the middle school staff. There would be more uniform policies between boys' and girls' track teams also, he said, with one head coach.

Since no staff member applied for the girls' coaching job, this would have been the third coach in as many years, and Bricker said he could add more continuity to the overall program since he would be back for next year's season and a girls'

coach may not. Track meets and practices for both boys and girls teams are at the same time.

Bricker also recommended that rather than the usual four percent of base salary each coach would receive, he should receive five percent and the assistant coach would receive three percent.

The board approved the salary change and the appointment of Dave and Sara Bricker as head and assistant middle school track team coaches.

Since there are only three games left in the basketball season, the board tabled the employee admittance fee question until later in the year. The athletic committee was to discuss whether employees should be allowed free entry to sports events.

The athletic committee recommended that baseball be offered as a summer sport rather than a spring sport because of several reasons.

Spring weather is very unpredictable and the games may end up being played in the snow. It may also detract from other spring sports like track and tennis which are already offered and the

school's budget might not be able to support another sports program.

Two years ago the Michigan Huron Shores Conference, which Boyne City belongs to, rescheduled baseball from a summer to spring sport. Since then, Boyne City has not had a baseball team.

Board member Tom Neumann agreed that there's not enough money to support another spring sport, but favored a baseball team at the high school level.

School Superintendent Rich Kelly pointed out that according to Title IX, if a boys' baseball team was started there would also have to be a girls' softball team. The school may not be able to financially support one, let alone both projects, he said.

The board tabled any further action on the baseball program but did say they'd be willing to look into a baseball team in the summer through the Community Education summer recreation program.

In other matters, the board accepted the bid of \$2,236.01 from The Bus Mart of Indiana for a 1972, 72 passenger International bus.

New doctor visits EJ

EAST JORDAN - Dr. Bruce Lindsay will join the East Jordan Family Health Center in July, but he already has high hopes for his place of employment.

Lindsay said the center has "everything he could ask for in a hospital. It's a tremendous facility and is well equipped," he said.

Dr. Lindsay will join Dr. Mitch Carey at the center. Dr. Carey joined the center last July.

Dr. Lindsay and his wife Liz were in East Jordan last weekend to look around the area. He talked with Dr. Carey and figured they'll be "quite compatible," he said.

Lindsay grew up in Philadelphia and then moved to New Jersey. He attended medical school at Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia. He has been attending school at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and will complete his internship at the end of June. He plans on moving to the area the first week of July.

The Lindsays have an 11-month-old son, Shane. Liz taught junior and senior high school math classes before settling down to raise their son.

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EJ Community Ed director resigns

EAST JORDAN - Community Education Director Jamie Baumann is resigning at the end of the year.

The school board was notified of the resignation at its meeting Monday night. The director is expecting a baby this summer and wants to have full time at home with her children.

School Superintendent Mel Rullman noted to The Press that during Baumann's three years of "really creative" service, she had brought in a wide variety of new activities and set up a

cooperative program with Central Lake and Ellsworth schools.

Rullman said no one had been named yet to replace her, but he was emphatic that the varied activities and course studies in the program would be continued.

Vocational teachers Tom Sheridan and Jerry Hawes reported to the school board on the new high school vocational program, planned under the leadership of middle school Principal Doug Shields.

The school is currently operating eight

state-approved programs, enrolling 161 students.

Two of these, automotive mechanics and secretarial skills, have been brought into the new competency-based education articulation program, which breaks each two-year course into numerous specific skills. According to Sheridan, each skill is separately evaluated.

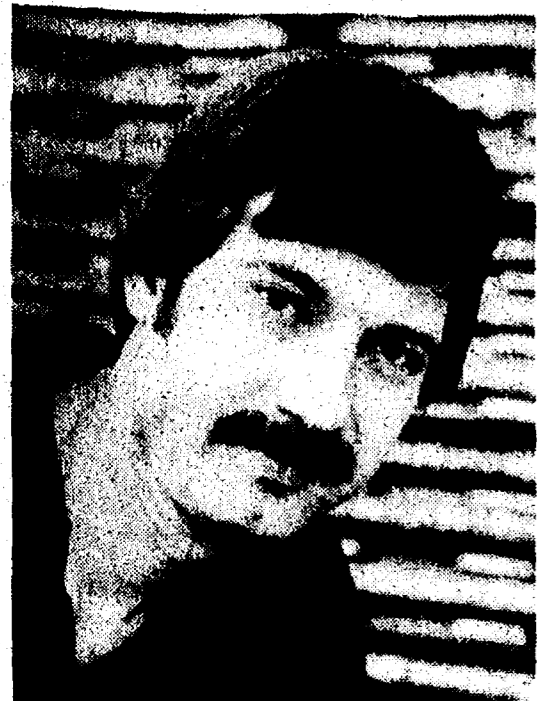
The courses, he said, are continually updated, and the program will be extended to all the vocational courses.

Credit for these courses may be

allowed as experience when a student applies for a job, and will be accepted as credit applied to programs in schools of advanced training, Sheridan said.

The school board approved special permission for the use of school buses for students participating in a bowling tournament at Sault Ste. Marie. The students will pay the expenses for the Saturday trip.

Tenure was granted to elementary teacher Mary Murray who has taught in the system for two years.

Stephen Pond appointed county register of deeds

CHARLEVOIX - Stephen K. Pond, 31, has been appointed Charlevoix County Register of Deeds to fulfill the term of Grover C. Geneit.

Pond was appointed by a committee composed of Probate Judge John T. Murphy, County Prosecutor Scott T. Beatty and County Clerk Clarence F. Rabach. His appointment is effective starting March 16.

Pond was one of two candidates to apply for the appointment. Carla Spencer who has been with the county Equalization Department for 14 years also applied for the position.

Pond has served as deputy register of

deeds and deputy abstractor for the past seven years. Geneit trained Pond and recommended he be appointed to fill his seat when he retires.

Geneit, 62, and his wife Jean, a clerk in the same office, will both retire March 15. Geneit's term doesn't expire until Dec. 31, 1980.

Pond has lived in Charlevoix since 1967, and he and his wife the former Loraine Ager, have two children, Michelle, 13 and Stephen, seven.

Pond said he will be a candidate for the office in the August primary election.

Spencer said she is undecided whether she will run in the primary election.

Fershee seeking new post

CHARLEVOIX - Emmet and Charlevoix County District Judge David Fershee has announced his candidacy for Circuit Judge.

The 33rd Judicial Circuit judgeship he is seeking is newly created and includes Emmet, Charlevoix and Cheboygan counties. The circuit judgeship was created last year by the state legislature as part of the state's re-districting of several courts.

Fershee, if elected will join Circuit Judge Martin B. Breighner in covering the districts. Breighner was appointed in 1978 for a six-year term which expires in December, 1984.

Fershee, 35, of Charlevoix, was appointed 90th District Judge in 1975 by Gov. William Milliken to succeed District Judge Arthur Reibel.

to help finish the project. "They are top-notch guys. They do a lot of work for the bucks, and I've got to get this done within my budget."

HAGEN'S REACTION

Councilman Ken Hagen, who originally questioned Rasch's involvement with KD Contractors four months ago, said, "I feel I've been misled," when he learned about the latest developments.

"I wasn't just trying to find out whether Herm had any ownership in the company—although that may be how he answered my question. I asked very direct questions, and it was my impression that he had no vested interest in the company at all," Hagen said.

"It appears to me that if you loan money to someone, that's a financial

interest. If they go under, you lose your investment. No wonder he was spending time making sure the job was done right."

Hagen said "I just wish Herm would have owned up to all this at the time I was asking him about it. It would have been a lot easier to understand if he had volunteered the information at the time."

"I want the city superintendent to be open and above board with the council. My trust in him is way down at this point," Hagen said.

MAYOR SUPPORTS RASCH

Mayor Jim Meredith, on the other hand, doesn't think the superintendent's involvement with KD Contractors is anything to worry about.

"Herm has done more for our com-

munity in the short time he's been here than any of the other guys we've had in his position, Meredith said.

"I'm not saying Herm is lily white. Nobody is. But as long as the job is being done, I don't care if he helps the health center. He's been able to get things rolling on the Community Building, the Tourist Park, the lakefront and now maybe even the airport."

Asked whether he thought it was wise for Rasch to hire a relative to work on the Community Center, Meredith said "I don't care who he hires as long as he gets the job done. We already tried going through the bidding process, and that didn't work. We gave him the authority to hire whoever he could to get the job done with the budget."

Keep school sports in proper perspective

It's not hard to understand why some schools are taking a hard look at their sports programs—with the increasing number of teams, the rising cost of transportation and the general mood of inflation-weary taxpayers.

But despite the rising costs, it is hard to argue with the fact that sports are a worthwhile experience for kids. They learn discipline, responsibility and (hopefully) sportsmanship.

Our hope is that school officials, parents and fans keep sports in a proper perspective. Sometimes, too much emphasis is placed on winning.

There have been some recent rumblings among a few members of the Boyne City Board of Education, partially because the football and basketball teams aren't winning, and because attendance at games is low.

This type of criticism not only sets a poor example for young people, but it results in low morale among other coaches who can't help but feel the pressure to win.

All schools have good years and bad years in sports. Just three years ago, Boyne's basketball team went all the way to the semi-finals of the state tournament. But now, after a couple of losing seasons, the coach is taking a lot of heat. We can't help but wonder if there aren't some personality clashes somewhere, with critics waiting for an off year to go in for the kill.

One problem Boyne City has in trying to win consistently is that it has

the smallest student body population in its conference. As athletic director Paul Pfahler said in our feature story on the topic last week, "There's no way, year in and year out, that Boyne City can compete with these schools and come out on top."

Just the opposite is true in East Jordan. The Red Devils are one of the biggest schools in their conference. When they have good teams—as they have for the past couple of years in

football—they'd like to get some state recognition. But that's difficult, even when you're undefeated, if you're only beating small schools.

So East Jordan entertained the idea of dropping nearby Boyne City from its football schedule so it could play a larger school from 100 miles away. It's hard to fault them for seeking the glory, but this, too, seems to be placing too much emphasis on winning.

A healthy balance needs to be struck. Good competition is healthy, but in a time of high costs, economic realities must be faced. Perhaps shorter seasons, shorter trips, elimination of weeknight games and other economies should be considered.

And while we're stepping back and taking a look at the financing of sports,

there is one inequity which is universal but hard to understand: Extra-curricular activities other than sports always have to raise most of their own money.

All high school sports get subsidized for nearly any amount of money they don't raise in ticket sales. But the drama clubs and yearbook staff get no support other than facilities and advisors' salaries.

If the band needs uniforms, its members and parents must raise the money—but when was the last time you saw a football player selling candy or serving a chicken dinner to make a few dollars towards next year's shoulder pads?

We don't have any easy solution for that particular bit of unfairness, but there seems to be no reason for conducting business that way. It would be wise to make the system more fair and equitable for all extra-curricular activities.

All in all, considering the number of students who participate, the cost of running a sports program does not seem out of line.

In the 1978-79 school year, the athletic programs cost about \$38,000 in Boyne City, \$32,000 in East Jordan and \$11,000 in Boyne Falls.

But if current trends continue, the figures will rise considerably in future years. That's why we think it's a good idea to start considering cost-saving options.

School board was first to raise sports issue

Last week's front page articles on sports caused some uproar in the community. The criticism and approval we received on those articles were appreciated and it's good to know so many people read the articles and then came forward with questions.

A lot of people wondered where we came up with the idea for the article. It wasn't something created to sell newspapers or that was done for our own personal vengeance. Jon Denison and I wrote the stories. Jon was active in sports during high school, and although I wasn't very active in sports I was a faithful fan and attended many games. We think sports programs are very important for students, the community and for school spirit.

So where did all this begin? Last October, the athletic committee—Shirley

Crozier, Mark Behling (filling in for George Shiotelis) and Bill Chipman (filling in for Ray Towne)—met and unanimously decided not to rehire Russ Harvey as high school varsity boys' basketball coach.

At the Oct. 15 school board meeting, when the topic of hiring Harvey as basketball coach was brought up, Behling reversed his earlier position and recommended rehiring Harvey.

The committee would not publicly state why they did not want to rehire Harvey. Board members Chipman, Tom Neumann, Shiotelis, Behling and Betty Johnecheck voted to rehire Harvey, while Crozier voted against the hiring. Ray Towne was absent at the meeting.

The issue seemed dead until the January school board meeting, when Johnecheck said she had received comments from people that the athletic programs were not being supervised strictly enough. She also said there should be a more stringent reviewing procedure when coaches are hired. Both subjects, Johnecheck said, were brought to her attention by members of the community.

The athletic committee was told to look into the complete district athletic program and try to find out why, as one school board member described it, the sports programs have "low morale and no local support."

So that started the wheels turning at The Press office to see if there really was "low morale and no local support."

We contacted school administrators, coaches and board members from Boyne City, East Jordan and Boyne Falls to try to get a complete picture.

We do have options to a nuclear future

Editor,

Our municipalities and rural electric cooperatives are struggling with the difficult decision of whether to buy into large nuclear and coal plants downstate, build out own plants locally, or continue to buy power wholesale from the big utilities. The intent of this letter is to bring out some serious reservations about buying into nuclear power plants.

COSTS

In 1974 Detroit Edison's Fermi II was to cost \$412 million. In 1977 the cost was estimated at \$914 million. At this point Northern Michigan Electric Cooperative, the wholesaler for Presque Isle, Top O'Michigan and Cherryland Rural Electric Cooperatives borrowed approximately \$100 million to buy an 11 percent ownership of Fermi II.

Now they are back before the Michigan Public Service Commission for permission to borrow another \$100 million to keep the 11 percent ownership according to the open ended contract. The present estimated cost of the plant has risen to \$1.6 billion. These costs will start showing up in our rates when Fermi II becomes operational, perhaps as early as 1981.

Consumers Power's Midland I and II reactors were expected to cost \$349 million in 1967, \$1.6 billion in 1976 and over \$3 billion now. While electricity from the old, subsidized, nuclear plants was relatively cheap, electricity from these plants costing in the billions will be very expensive.

Consumers Power is now asking the Public Service Commission for \$14 million per year from the rate payers, to decommission Big Rock and Palisades shortly after the year 2000.

This breaks down to decommissioning costs, in inflated dollars, of five times the

building cost for Big Rock and about equal building and decommissioning costs for Palisades.

How much will the rate payers pay for decommissioning the \$2 billion Fermi II and the \$3 billion Midland I and II plants?

LIABILITIES

Owners of nuclear plants are going to risk being liable for damages from accidents beyond the limits set by the Price-Anderson Act of \$560 million. Three pieces of federal legislation have been introduced calling for a repeal of the act.

A recent Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) study shows that Three Mile Island was within one hour of a meltdown. A worse case meltdown could cause thousands of immediate deaths followed by tens of thousands of cancers and genetic defects. Property damage could run as high as \$17 billion.

The NRC study advised that nuclear power plants not be built near population centers. Fermi II and the Midland reactors do not meet this recommendation. Rural areas, such as northern Michigan, are apparently acceptable.

WASTES

Buying into a nuclear plant, in a sense, is an expression of the acceptance of nuclear power. The argument is made that by accepting this technology we are obligated to accept a nuclear dump, in our area, for lethal wastes.

Three years ago, federal officials were investigating the salt beds of northern lower Michigan for a nuclear waste dump. A state law was passed forbidding such a facility in Michigan. Even so, researchers hired by the Department of Energy (DOE) are again investigating the area from Traverse City to Alpena for such a dump.

A nuclear waste dump in Michigan

could become not only regional, but international, since the Great Lakes are open to international shipping. Mark Ross, professor of physics, at the University of Michigan, says that the people in any community threatened with a nuclear waste dump should fight it with their lives.

OPTIONS

We do have options. We could buy into coal plants, especially one being planned in Lansing. The Lansing Board of Water and Light opted for coal after a poll showed that 73 percent of the rate payers rejected buying into a nuclear plant.

We could build our own wood burning plants. A Michigan Tech. study shows these plants could be fired from waste wood in our forests. We could continue to buy wholesale. A report commissioned by the utilities themselves shows that Michigan has enough electrical generating capacity to last until the year 2000.

Our best option is conservation. Many studies are concluding that saving electricity by better light bulbs, appliances, insulation, etc., is cheaper than building new generating plants. Conservation is the most readily available source of energy. Off-peak reduced rates and increasing rates with increasing consumption encourage conservation.

A permanent solution to the waste problem has not been demonstrated. For now, wastes might be sent to locations, some of which are already contaminated, where people accept the technology and have long lived off it. Such locations are the nuclear reservation at Hanford, Washington; Idaho Falls, Idaho; Oakridge, Tennessee; Savannah River and Barnwell, South Carolina and the Nevada bomb test site.

WHEREAS, the County of Charlevoix, Michigan (the "Municipality"), is a municipal body corporate organized and existing under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Michigan and is authorized by Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Act No. 62"), to acquire lands within or without its corporate limits and to construct and/or acquire, improve, enlarge and remodel industrial buildings thereon and to acquire and install industrial machinery and equipment therein and to lease the same in order to alleviate and prevent conditions of unemployment, to assist and retain local industries, to meet growing competition for new industries and to strengthen and revitalize the economy of the Municipality in general; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality is authorized by Act No. 62 to issue industrial development revenue bonds payable solely from the net revenues derived from the Project thus acquired or constructed through the issuance of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has made necessary arrangements with Medusa Corporation, an Ohio corporation (the "Company") for the location of the Project within the Municipality, from which Project the Municipality will receive the benefits contemplated by Act No. 62; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to and in accordance with Act No. 62, the Municipality shall finance the cost of acquiring the Project by the issuance of the Bonds to be issued in accordance with the Indenture (as hereinafter defined) and to be paid solely from the net revenues received by the Municipality from the Project and neither said Bonds nor any interest obligation thereon shall ever constitute a general obligation of the Municipality within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory or charter provision or limitation; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the estimated amount necessary to finance the cost of the Project, including necessary expenses incidental thereto and to the issuance of the Bonds will require the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds in the principal amount of \$1,000,000; and

1. The following words and terms are used in this resolution and the preambles hereto shall have the following meanings unless the context or use clearly indicates another or different meaning or intent:

"Acquisition Fund" or "County of Charlevoix Industrial Development Acquisition Fund - Medusa Corporation Project" means the fund created by Section 9 hereof and by Section 601 of the Indenture.

"Bond" or "Bonds" means the \$1,000,000 principal amount of the County of Charlevoix, Michigan Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (Medusa Corporation Project), Series A dated February 1, 1980, authorized to be issued under the Indenture.

"Bond Fund" or "County of Charlevoix Industrial Development Revenue Bond Fund - Medusa Corporation Project" means the fund created in Section 8 hereof and by Section 502 of the Indenture.

"Bondholder" or "holder" (when used with reference to Bonds) or "owner of the Bonds" means The Northern Trust Company an Illinois banking corporation, Chicago, Illinois, and any assignee of the Bonds.

"Company" means Medusa Corporation, an Ohio corporation, lessee under the Contract and its successor and assigns.

"Contract" means the Lease Purchase Contract executed by and between the Municipality and the Company, dated as of February 1, 1980, approved by this Resolution, as the same may be amended from time to time.

"Depository" means the Depository and Paying Agent under the Indenture, The Northern Trust Company an Illinois banking corporation, Chicago, Illinois, and any successor Depository appointed by the Municipality in accordance with the provisions of the Indenture.

"Guarantee" means the Guarantee Agreement executed by and between the Company, guarantor under said guarantee and the Bondholder of even date herewith.

"Indenture" means the Mortgage and Indenture dated as of February 1, 1980, to be made and entered into by and between the

Municipality and the Bondholder, as approved by this Resolution, as may be supplemented from time to time in accordance with its terms.

"Municipality", "County", or "County of Charlevoix" means the County of Charlevoix, Michigan, or any successor municipal corporation succeeding to its rights and obligations under the Contract and the Indenture.

"Project" shall mean the industrial building and the machinery, equipment and the site therefor, as set forth in one or more Exhibits to the Indenture, including such modifications thereof, substitutions therefor, and improvements to the Project (as defined in the Contract), and excluding deletions therefrom as shall be made in accordance with the Contract, but not including the Company's own machinery and equipment installed under Section 6.3 of the Contract.

2. The Board of Commissioners of the Municipality based on advice of the Company does hereby determine that it is necessary and for the best interests of the Municipality to acquire the Project and lease the Project to the Company, and does hereby determine that the estimated cost of the Project including all costs of the issuance of the Bonds, all engineering, architectural, inspection, fiscal and legal expenses and all other costs and expenses in connection therewith as provided in the Contract and Indenture is not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000). The Board of Commissioners, based on the advice of the Company, does hereby determine that more than two-thirds of the cost of the Project is for industrial machinery and equipment and that the estimated period of usefulness of such machinery and equipment is not less than ten (10) years.

3. The Municipality shall borrow the sum of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) and issue the Bonds therefor in the form of a non-convertible single fully-registered bond as provided herein to provide the funds to defray the costs of the Project as set forth in Paragraph 2 above and as provided in the Contract and Indenture.

4. The Bonds shall be designated "County of Charlevoix, Michigan Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (Medusa Corporation Project) Series A". The Bonds shall be dated February 1, 1980, and shall bear interest from the date thereof until due at the rate specified in the form of Bond set forth in Section 7 hereof payable August 1, 1980, and semiannually thereafter on February 1 and August 1 of each year. The Bond shall be issued in the form of a non-convertible single fully registered bond in the denomination of \$1,000,000, which matures on the days, in the years and principal amounts as follows:

Both principal of and interest on the Bond shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of the Depository.

The Bonds are subject to prepayment prior to maturity and shall be registered as to both principal and interest as provided in the form of Bond set forth in Section 7 hereof.

5. The Bonds and the interest obligation thereon shall not be a general obligation or indebtedness of the Municipality and shall never constitute nor give rise to a charge against the general credit or taxing power of the Municipality. The Bonds and the interest obligation thereon shall be a limited obligation of the Municipality payable solely from the net revenues derived from the Project (except to the extent payable out of moneys attributable to Bond proceeds or the income from temporary investment thereof and, under certain circumstances, proceeds from insurance and condemnation awards, as provided in the Contract and Indenture). All net revenues from the Project shall be pledged and a security interest therein shall be granted in and unto the Bondholder and unto the respective successors for the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds and the performance of the other obligations of the Municipality contained in the Indenture, except amounts payable under Article V of the Contract and the rights of the Municipality under such paragraphs. The payments when paid by the Municipality, pursuant to the Contract, except those payments received under Article V of the Contract, shall be paid directly to the Depository for the account of the Municipality so long as any of the Bonds and the interest obligation thereon shall be outstanding and unpaid. The Municipality shall assign, set over to, and grant a security interest in the Contract and its right, title and interest therein, except the Municipality's rights under Article V of the Contract, to the Bondholder. In addition, payment of the Bonds and the performance of the Municipality's other obligations contained in this Indenture shall be secured by a security interest in and mortgage lien on the Project.

6. The Bonds shall be signed on behalf of the Municipality by the manual signature of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and countersigned by the manual signature of the County Clerk and the corporate seal of the Municipality shall be affixed thereto and shall be delivered in the manner provided by the Indenture and the Bond Purchase Agreement.

7. The Bonds shall contain a recital that they are issued pursuant to Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended, and said Bonds shall be in substantially the form of Exhibit A attached hereto with such appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as are permitted or required by this Resolution and the Indenture.

8. There is hereby created by the Municipality and ordered established with the Depository a fund to be designated "COUNTY OF CHARLEVOIX INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE BOND FUND -- MEDUSA CORPORATION PROJECT" which shall be used to pay the interest on and the principal of, and prepayment premium (if any) on the Bond. There shall be deposited into the Bond Fund, as and when received, (a) the accrued interest received on delivery of the Bonds; (b) all rents specified in Section 4.5 of the Contract; (c) all other moneys received by the Depository for deposit in the Bond Fund under the Contract, the Indenture or the Guarantee.

Except as provided in Section 507 and Article VII of the Indenture, moneys in the Bond Fund shall be used solely for the payment of the interest on the Bonds, and for the payment or prepayment of the Bonds at or prior to maturity and the payment of prepayment premiums, if any, on prepayment of the Bonds.

The Bond Fund shall be in the custody of the Depository but in the name of the Municipality, and the Municipality hereby authorizes and directs the Depository to withdraw sufficient funds from the Bond Fund to pay the Bonds and interest thereon and prepayment premiums, if any, as the same become due and payable and to make said funds so withdrawn available to the paying agent for the purposes hereinbefore described.

9. There is hereby created and established with the Depository a fund in the name of the Municipality to be designated "COUNTY OF CHARLEVOIX INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT REVENUE ACQUISITION FUND - MEDUSA CORPORATION PROJECT". The proceeds of the Bonds shall be paid to the Depository for deposit in the Acquisition Fund, except that the accrued interest shall be deposited in the Bond Fund.

The Acquisition Fund shall be used to pay the Cost of the Project as defined and in the manner provided in the Contract and Indenture. Moneys in the Acquisition Fund shall be expended and disbursed upon requisition of the Company in accordance with the provisions of the Contract. Upon completion of the Project and payment of all costs and expenses incidental thereto as provided in the Contract and the Indenture, the balance remaining in the Acquisition Fund, other than amounts retained by the Depository for the payment of Costs of the Project not then due and payable, shall be transferred to the Bond Fund, as provided in the Contract.

10. The maintenance and repair costs of the Project, all taxes in connection therewith and other charges will be assumed and paid by the Company under the Contract and, accordingly, the Municipality has no obligation with respect thereto and all such costs, expenses, taxes and fees and charges shall be paid by the Company, as provided in the Contract.

11. The Company will take out and continuously maintain in effect or cause to be taken out and continuously maintained in effect during the term of the Contract, insurance with respect to the Project of the types, in the amounts and with coverage and insured parties as provided in the Contract. The Municipality shall not be obligated to take out such insurance or to pay the cost thereof, but shall be protected thereby, it being the intent and purpose that the Company pay all costs in connection with obtaining, procuring and maintaining the foregoing insurance coverage. The proceeds of any recovery under the foregoing insurance policies shall be used and disposed of in the manner provided in the Contract and the Indenture.

12. Upon occurrence of an Event of Default (as defined in the Indenture) and which has not been remedied as provided in the Indenture, and upon the filing of a suit or other commencement of judicial proceedings to enforce the rights of the Bondholder and under the Indenture, and at all times subject to the Indenture, the Bondholder among other rights and remedies, shall be entitled to the appointment of a receiver of the Project and the income and revenues therefrom with such powers as the court making such appointment shall confer. In addition, the Bondholder shall have all the rights, powers and privileges, upon the occurrence of an Event of Default, as are specified in the Indenture or as may be provided by law.

All moneys received by the Bondholder pursuant to any right given or action taken under the Indenture shall be applied as provided in the Indenture.

13. The Company shall have the options and obligations to purchase the Project provided in Article XII of the Contract for an amount of money specified in the Contract. The Municipality recognizes all of the rights of the Company to purchase the Project as provided in the Contract. The Municipality recognizes the right of the Company to make additions, improvements or modifications of or to the Project, and to remove any machinery and equipment that may ever comprise a portion of the Project in the manner provided in the Contract and Indenture.

14. The Northern Trust Company, an Illinois banking corporation, shall also be Depository under the Indenture, and shall signify its acceptance of such duties imposed by the Indenture by its execution of the Indenture.

15. The Bonds shall be sold to the Bondholder in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the Bond Purchase Agreement to be executed and delivered by the Municipality in accordance with Paragraph 18 hereof.

16. The Contract, including all exhibits thereto, on file with the County Clerk and on which has been endorsed by the County Clerk the date of adoption of this Resolution, is hereby approved. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Contract, in substantially the form approved with such necessary and appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as required, for and on behalf of the Municipality, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to affix thereto the corporate seal of the Municipality.

17. The Indenture, including all exhibits thereto, on file with the County Clerk and on which has been endorsed by the County Clerk the date of adoption of this Resolution, is hereby approved and incorporated in its entirety. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Indenture, in substantially the form approved with such necessary and appropriate variations, omissions, and insertions as required, for and on behalf of the Municipality, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to affix thereto the corporate seal of the Municipality.

18. The Bond Purchase Agreement for the sale of the Bonds on file with the County Clerk and on which has been endorsed by the County Clerk the date of adoption of this Resolution, is hereby approved, and the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Bond Purchase Agreement in substantially the form approved with such necessary and appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as required, for and on behalf of the Municipality, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to affix thereto the corporate seal of the Municipality.

19. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, County Clerk, County Attorney, their deputies and/or all other officials of the Municipality are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such other opinions, certificates, affidavits or other documents or instruments as may be required by said Contract, Indenture or Bond Purchase Agreement, or take any and all such action which may be necessary or convenient to effectuate the execution and delivery of said documents or the Bonds referred to in the preambles hereto. The instruments of conveyance conveying the Project to the Municipality, as required by the Contract, are hereby accepted when delivered.

20. This Resolution shall be published in full in the Charlevoix Courier, Charlevoix, Michigan, which the Board of Commissioners hereby determines and declares to be a newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality.

21. This Resolution shall be effective upon such publication.

22. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this Resolution be, and the same hereby are, rescinded.

This Bond is issued pursuant to and in full compliance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan, particularly Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended ("Act No. 62") and pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Municipality

adopted and approved on 19. This Bond and interest thereon shall never constitute a general obligation of the Municipality within the meaning of any constitutional, statutory or charter provision or limitation and shall never constitute nor give rise to a charge against the general credit or taxing powers of the Municipality but shall be a limited obligation of the Municipality payable solely from and secured by certain mortgaged property under a Mortgage and Indenture (the "Indenture") dated as of February 1, 1980, from the Municipality to The Northern Trust Company, as Bondholder, which mortgaged property includes a pledge of the Net Revenues derived by the Municipality from the Project and a mortgage lien on the Project.

The payment of principal and interest on this Bond has also been unconditionally guaranteed by the Company, pursuant to a Guarantee Agreement, dated as of February 1, 1980, from the Company to, and for the benefit of any registered holder hereof.

The Indenture and the Contract are recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds, Charlevoix County, Michigan, and the Indenture, the Contract and the Guarantee are on file at the principal offices of the Municipality and Bondholder. Reference is hereby made to the Indenture for a description of the mortgaged property and to the Indenture, the Contract and the Guarantee for the provisions, among others, with respect to the nature and extent of the security, the rights, duties and obligations of the Municipality, the Company, the Guarantor and the Bondholder, and the terms upon which this Bond is issued and secured.

This Bond may be assigned upon ten days prior notification to the Municipality and the Company by the registered holder in person or by his attorney in writing with a duly executed instrument of assignment in the form set forth below, and any assignee shall take this Bond subject to these conditions and the further condition that The Northern Trust Company shall continue as Depository and until any bank or trust company qualified to be such is requested by the assignee to be successor Depository and is approved by the Municipality in writing. Such assignment shall be noted on the registration books of the Municipality kept by the Depository and no assignment of this Bond shall be valid unless made on said books.

Installments of principal hereinafter set forth are not subject to prepayment except as hereinafter provided.

This Bond is subject to voluntary prepayment on any interest payment date on or after February 1, 1983 in its entire remaining unpaid principal amount, or lesser portion thereof in inverse chronological order of the aforesaid installments and in multiples of said installments at 100% of the principal amount hereof plus accrued interest to the prepayment date.

Unless the Bondholder and Municipality should otherwise agree in writing, the Bond is subject to mandatory prepayment at 100% of the unpaid principal amount hereof on any interest payment date on or after August 1, 1981 following exercise by the Company of its option under the Contract to purchase the Project, but only when following:

- (a) damage or destruction of the Project or the related plant of the Company to such extent (i) that the Project cannot be reasonably restored within six months to a condition thereof immediately preceding such damage or destruction, or (ii) that the Company is prevented from carrying on normal operation of the Project or the related plant of the Company for a period of six months; or
- (b) condemnation of the Project or the related plant of the Company or taking by eminent domain of such use of the Project or the related plant of the Company that the Company is prevented from carrying on normal operation of the Project or the related plant of the Company for a period of six months; or
- (c) constitutional, legislative, judicial or administrative action voiding the Contract or rendering it unenforceable or impossible of performance or imposing unreasonable burdens or excessive liabilities, including tax liabilities, on the Municipality or the Company; or
- (d) in the event of a final determination by the Internal Revenue Service or a court of competent jurisdiction which causes interest on this Bond to fail to be wholly excludable under the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, from the gross income of the holder of this Bond (other than a holder who is a "substantial user" or "related person" as such terms are used in said Internal Revenue Code).
- (e) changes, which the Company cannot reasonably control or overcome, shall have occurred in the economic availability of materials, supplies, labor, equipment or other properties and things necessary for the efficient operation of (i) the Project or (ii) the related plant of the Company or technological or other changes shall have occurred which, in the judgment of the Company render the continued operation of the Project or the related plant of the Company uneconomical.

Notice of any such prepayment shall be given at least 30 days prior to the prepayment date by mailing to the Bondholder a notice fixing such prepayment date, the amount of principal and the premium, if any, to be prepaid. Prior to the date fixed for prepayment, cash funds shall be placed with the Depository in an amount sufficient to pay the principal fixed to be prepaid, accrued interest thereon and the premium, if any. Upon the happening of the above conditions, the installments of principal thus prepaid shall not bear interest after the date fixed for prepayment and shall no longer be protected by or deemed outstanding under the Indenture.

The Bondholder shall have the right to enforce the provisions of the Indenture or to institute action to enforce the covenants therein, or to take any action with respect to any event of default under the Indenture, or to institute, appear in or defend any suit or other proceedings with respect thereto, as provided in the Indenture; provided, however, that nothing in the Indenture contained shall affect or impair any right of enforcement conferred on the Bondholder by Act

No. 62 to enforce the payment of the principal of and interest on this Bond at and after the maturity thereof, or the obligation of the Municipality to pay the principal of and interest on this Bond at the time, place, from the source and in the manner in this Bond and in the Indenture expressed. BOND AUTHORIZING RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the County of Charlevoix, Michigan (the "Municipality"), is a municipal body corporate organized and existing under and pursuant to the laws of the State of Michigan and is authorized by Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended (hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Act No. 62"), to acquire water and air pollution control equipment within or without its corporate limits and to sell the same under an installment sales contract to encourage the acquisition, purchase, construction, reconstruction, enlarging, remodeling, improving, repairing, operation and maintenance of adequate and proper water and air pollution control equipment for industrial buildings and the facilities of public utilities now or hereafter located in the State of Michigan; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality is authorized by Act No. 62 to issue industrial development revenue bonds payable solely from the net revenues derived from the Project thus acquired or constructed through the issuance of such bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has made necessary arrangements with Medusa Corporation, an Ohio corporation (the "Company") for the location of the Project within the Municipality, from which Project the Municipality will receive the benefits contemplated by Act No. 62; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to and in accordance with Act No. 62, the Municipality shall finance the cost of acquiring the Project by the issuance of the Bonds to be issued in accordance with the Indenture (as hereinafter defined) and to be paid solely from the net revenues received by the Municipality from the Project and neither said Bonds nor any interest obligation thereon shall ever constitute a general obligation of the Municipality within the meaning of any constitutional or statutory or charter provision or limitation; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the estimated amount necessary to finance the cost of the Project, including necessary expenses incidental thereto and to the issuance of the Bonds will require the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds in the principal amount of \$9,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the acquisition and leasing of the Project and the issuance of the Bonds by the Municipality as herein recited and provided will serve the intended accomplishments and in all respects conform to the provisions and requirements of Act No. 62;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the Municipality:

1. The following words and terms are used in this resolution and the preambles hereto shall have the following meanings unless the context or use clearly indicates another or different meaning or intent:

"Acquisition Fund" or "County of Charlevoix Pollution Control Acquisition Fund - Medusa Corporation Project" means the fund created by Section 9 hereof and by Section 601 of the Indenture.

"Bond" or "Bonds" means the \$9,500,000 principal amount of the County of Charlevoix, Michigan Pollution Control Revenue Bonds (Medusa Corporation Project), dated February 1, 1980, authorized to be issued under the Indenture.

"Bond Fund" or "County of Charlevoix Pollution Control Revenue Bond Fund - Medusa Corporation Project" means the fund created in Section 8 hereof and by Section 502 of the Indenture.

"Bondholder" or "holder" (when used with reference to Bonds) or "owner of the Bonds" means Mellon Bank, N.A., a national banking association, and any assignee of the Bonds.

"Company" means Medusa Corporation, an Ohio corporation, lessee under the Contract and its successor and assigns.

"Contract" means the Lease Purchase Contract executed by and between the Municipality and the Company, dated as of February 1, 1980, approved by this Resolution, as the same may be amended from time to time.

"Depository" means the Depository and Paying Agent under the Indenture, Mellon Bank, N.A., a national banking association, and any successor Depository appointed by the Municipality in accordance with the provisions of the Indenture.

"Guarantee" means the Guarantee Agreement executed by and between the Company, guarantor under said guarantee and the Bondholder of even date herewith.

"Indenture" means the Mortgage and Indenture dated as of February 1, 1980, to be made and entered into by and between the Municipality and the Bondholder, as approved by this Resolution, as may be supplemented from time to time in accordance with its terms.

"Municipality", "County", or "County of Charlevoix" means the County of Charlevoix, Michigan, or any successor municipal corporation succeeding to its rights and obligations under the Contract and the Indenture.

"Project" shall mean the air and/or water pollution control machinery and equipment and other facilities as set forth in one or more Exhibits to the Indenture, including such modifications thereof, substitutions therefor, and improvements to the Project (as defined in the Contract), and excluding deletions therefrom as shall be made in accordance with the Contract.

2. The Board of Commissioners of the Municipality based on advice of the Company does hereby determine that it is necessary and for the best interests of the Municipality to acquire the Project and lease the Project to the Company, and does hereby determine that the estimated cost of the Project including all costs of the issuance of the Bonds, all engineering, architectural, inspection, fiscal and legal expenses and all other costs and expenses in connection therewith as provided in the Contract and Indenture is not less than Nine Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$9,500,000). The Board of Commissioners, based on the advice of the Company, does hereby determine the Project is entirely industrial machinery and equipment and that the estimated period of usefulness of the Project is not less than ten (10) years.

3. The Municipality shall borrow the sum of Nine Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$9,500,000) and issue the Bonds therefor in the form of a non-convertible single fully-registered bond as provided herein to provide the funds to defray the costs of the Project as set forth in Paragraph 2 above and as provided in the Contract and Indenture.

4. The Bonds shall be designated "County of Charlevoix, Michigan Pollution Control Revenue Bonds (Medusa Corporation Project) Series B". The Bonds shall be dated February 1, 1980, and shall bear interest from the date thereof until due at the rate specified in the form of Bond set forth in Section 7 hereof payable August 1, 1980, and semiannually thereafter on February 1 and August 1 of each year. The Bond shall be issued in the form of a non-convertible single fully-registered bond in the denomination of \$9,500,000, which matures on the days, in the years and principal amounts as follows:

Both principal of and interest on the Bond shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of the Depository.

The Bonds are subject to prepayment prior to maturity and shall be registered as to both principal and interest as provided in the form of Bond set forth in Section 7 hereof.

5. The Bonds and the interest obligation thereon shall not be a general obligation or indebtedness of the Municipality and shall never constitute nor give rise to a charge against the general credit or taxing power of the Municipality. The Bonds and the interest obligation thereon shall be a limited obligation of the Municipality payable solely from the net revenues derived from the Project (except to the extent payable out of moneys attributable to Bond proceeds or the income from temporary investment thereof and, under certain circumstances, proceeds from insurance and condemnation awards, as provided in the Contract and Indenture). All net revenues from the Project shall be pledged and a security interest therein shall be granted in and unto the Bondholder and unto the respective successors for the payment of the principal and interest on the Bonds and the performance of the other obligations of the Municipality contained in the Indenture, except amounts payable under Article V of the Contract and the rights of the Municipality under such paragraphs. The payments when paid by the Municipality, pursuant to the Contract, except those payments received under Article V of the Contract, shall be paid directly to the Depository for the account of the Municipality so long as any of the Bonds and the interest obligation thereon shall be outstanding and unpaid. The Municipality shall assign, set over to, and grant a security interest in the Contract and its right, title and interest therein, except the Municipality's rights under Article V of the Contract, to the Bondholder. In addition, payment of the Bonds and the performance of the Municipality's other obligations contained in this Indenture shall be secured by a security interest in the Project.

6. The Bonds shall be signed on behalf of the Municipality by the manual signature of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and countersigned by the manual signature of the County Clerk and the corporate seal of the Municipality shall be affixed thereto and shall be delivered in the manner provided by the Indenture and the Bond Purchase Agreement.

7. The Bonds shall contain a recital that they are issued pursuant to Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended, and said Bonds shall be in substantially the form of Exhibit A attached hereto with such appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as are permitted or required by this Resolution and the Indenture:

8. There is hereby created by the Municipality and ordered established with the Depository a fund to be designated "COUNTY OF CHARLEVOIX POLLUTION CONTROL REVENUE BOND FUND --MEDUSA CORPORATION PROJECT" which shall be used to pay the interest on and the principal of, and prepayment premium (if any) on the Bond. There shall be deposited into the Bond Fund, as and when received, (a) the accrued interest received on delivery of the Bonds; (b) all rents specified in Section 4.5 of the Contract; (c) all other moneys received by the Depository for deposit in the Bond Fund under the Contract, the Indenture or the Guarantee.

Except as provided in Section 507 and Article VII of the Indenture, moneys in the Bond Fund shall be used solely for the payment of the interest on the Bonds, and for the payment or prepayment of the Bonds at or prior to maturity and the payment of prepayment premiums, if any, on prepayment of the Bonds.

The Bond Fund shall be in the custody of the Depository but in the name of the Municipality, and the Municipality hereby authorizes and directs the Depository to withdraw sufficient funds from the Bond Fund to pay the Bonds and interest thereon and prepayment premiums, if any, as the same become due and payable and to make said funds so withdrawn available to the paying agent for the purposes hereinbefore described.

9. There is hereby created and established with the Depository a fund in the name of the Municipality to be designated "COUNTY OF CHARLEVOIX POLLUTION CONTROL REVENUE ACQUISITION FUND - MEDUSA CORPORATION PROJECT". The proceeds of the Bonds shall be paid to the Depository for deposit in the Acquisition Fund, except that the accrued interest shall be deposited in the Bond Fund.

The Acquisition Fund shall be used to pay the Cost of the Project as defined and in the manner provided in the Contract and Indenture. Moneys in the Acquisition Fund shall be expended and disbursed upon requisition of the Company in accordance with the provisions of the Contract. Upon completion of the Project and payment of all costs and expenses incidental thereto as provided in the Contract and the Indenture, the balance remaining in the Acquisition Fund, other than amounts retained by the Depository for the payment of Costs of the Project not then due and payable, shall be transferred to the Bond Fund, as provided in the Contract.

10. The maintenance and repair costs of the Project, all taxes in connection therewith and other charges will be assumed and

paid by the Company under the Contract and, accordingly, the Municipality has no obligation with respect thereto and all such costs, expenses, taxes and fees and charges shall be paid by the Company, as provided in the Contract.

11. The Company will take out and continuously maintain in effect or cause to be taken out and continuously maintained in effect during the term of the Contract, insurance with respect to the Project of the types, in the amounts and with coverage and insured parties as provided in the Contract. The Municipality shall not be obligated to take out such insurance or to pay the cost thereof, but shall be protected thereby, it being the intent and purpose that the Company pay all costs in connection with obtaining, procuring and maintaining the foregoing insurance coverage. The proceeds of any recovery under the foregoing insurance policies shall be used and disposed of in the manner provided in the Contract and the Indenture.

12. Upon occurrence of an Event of Default (as defined in the Indenture) and which has not been remedied as provided in the Indenture, and upon the filing of a suit or other commencement of judicial proceedings to enforce the rights of the Bondholder and under the Indenture, and at all times subject to the Indenture, the Bondholder among other rights and remedies, shall be entitled to the appointment of a receiver of the Project and the income and revenues therefrom with such powers as the court making such appointment shall confer. In addition, the Bondholder shall have all the rights, powers and privileges, upon the occurrence of an Event of Default, as are specified in the Indenture or as may be provided by law.

All moneys received by the Bondholder pursuant to any right given or action taken under the Indenture shall be applied as provided in the Indenture.

13. The Company shall have the options and obligations to purchase the Project provided in Article XII of the Contract for an amount of money specified in the Contract. The Municipality recognizes all of the rights of the Company to purchase the Project as provided in the Contract. The Municipality recognizes the right of the Company to make additions, improvements or modifications of or to the Project, and to remove any machinery and equipment that may ever comprise a portion of the Project in the manner provided in the Contract and Indenture.

14. Mellon Bank, N.A., a national banking association, shall also be Depository under the Indenture, and shall signify its acceptance of such duties imposed by the Indenture by its execution of the Indenture.

15. The Bonds shall be sold to the Bondholder in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the Bond Purchase Agreement to be executed and delivered by the Municipality in accordance with Paragraph 18 hereof.

The Indenture, including all exhibits thereto, on file with the County Clerk and on which has been endorsed by the County Clerk the date of adoption of this Resolution, is hereby approved and incorporated in its entirety. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Indenture, in substantially the form approved with such necessary and appropriate variations, omissions, and insertions as required, for and on behalf of the Municipality, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to affix thereto the corporate seal of the Municipality.

18. The Bond Purchase Agreement for the sale of the Bonds on file with the County Clerk and on which has been endorsed by the County Clerk the date of adoption of this Resolution, is hereby approved, and the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners and County Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Bond Purchase Agreement in substantially the form approved with such necessary and appropriate variations, omissions and insertions as required, for and on behalf of the Municipality, and the County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to affix thereto the corporate seal of the Municipality.

19. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, County Clerk, County Attorney, their deputies and all other officials of the Municipality are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such other opinions, certificates, affidavits or other documents or instruments as may be required by said Contract, Indenture or Bond Purchase Agreement, or take any and all such action which may be necessary or convenient to effectuate the execution and delivery of said documents or the Bonds referred to in the preambles hereto. The instruments of conveyance conveying the Project to the Municipality, as required by the Contract, are hereby accepted when delivered.

20. This Resolution shall be published in full in the Charlevoix Courier, Charlevoix, Michigan, which the Board of Commissioners hereby determines and declares to be a newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality.

21. This Resolution shall be effective upon such publication.

22. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this Resolution be, and the same hereby are, rescinded.

KNOW ALL PERSONS BY THESE PRESENTS that the County of Charlevoix, Michigan (the "Municipality") for value received, hereby promises to pay from the source and as hereinafter provided, to Mellon Bank, N.A., Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, or registered assignee (the "Bondholder"), the principal sum of Nine Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$9,500,000), unless prepaid prior thereto as hereinafter provided, in semiannual installments of Nine Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$950,000) commencing February 1, 1983, and on each February 1 and August 1 thereafter to and through August 1, 1987, and to pay on the first day of August and February interest from the date hereof on the balance of the principal sum from time to time remaining unpaid at the rate of SIXTY-THREE PERCENT (63%) of the prime interest rate per annum announced from time to time by Mellon Bank, N.A. at its principal offices in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, for new ninety day loans to commercial borrowers of substantial size and high credit standing (the "Prime Rate"), such rate to change automatically from time to time effective as of the effective date of each change in the Prime Rate, but in any event the interest rate shall not be less than SIX AND ONE-QUARTER PERCENT (6-1/4%) per annum and shall not exceed EIGHT PERCENT (8%) per annum, provided, however, that in the event that the interest on this Bond shall be asserted to be included in the gross income of the holder of this Bond by the Internal Revenue Service or an agent thereof or for any other reason fail to be wholly excludable under the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, from the gross income of the holder of this Bond (other than a holder who is a "substantial user" or "related person" as such terms are used in said Internal Revenue Code), this Bond shall bear interest from the date as of which interest shall so fail to be excludable from gross income at a rate equal to 116% of the Prime Rate, such rate to change automatically effective as of the effective date of each change in the Prime Rate. The date as of which interest shall so fail to be excludable from gross income shall be as set forth in said assertion of the Internal Revenue Service or agent thereof or as specified in a notice of deficiency of the Internal Revenue Service or the written opinion of an attorney or firm of attorneys of recognized standing on the subject of the tax-exempt status of the interest on municipal bonds selected by the Bondholder.

In no case however shall this Bond bear interest in excess of the maximum rate permitted by law.

In the event that Mellon Bank, N.A. ceases operations and does not have a Prime Rate, then the Prime Rate referred to in the paragraph immediately preceding this paragraph shall be the average of the prime commercial lending rates of the three largest (as measured by assets) banks in the City of New York, New York, in effect at the close of business on the first business day of the month next preceding any interest payment date. Both principal of and interest on this Bond are payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of Mellon Bank, N.A., as depository, or at the office of any successor depository.

This Bond is a single fully-registered non-convertible Bond limited in aggregate principal amount to \$9,500,000 authorized and issued for the purpose of acquiring and constructing air and/or water pollution machinery and equipment (collectively the "Project"), and leasing the same to Medusa Corporation, an Ohio corporation (the "Company"), pursuant to a Lease Purchase Contract dated as of February 1, 1980 (the "Contract"), and paying necessary expenses incidental thereto and to the issuance of this Bond so as to encourage the acquisition, purchase, construction, reconstruction, enlarging, remodeling, improving, repairing, operation and maintenance of adequate and proper water and air pollution control equipment for industrial buildings and the facilities of public utilities now or hereafter located in the State of Michigan.

This Bond is issued pursuant to and in full compliance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan, particularly Act No. 62, Public Acts of Michigan, 1963, as amended ("Act No. 62") and pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Municipality adopted and approved on , 1980. This Bond and interest thereon shall never constitute a general obligation of the Municipality within the meaning of any constitutional, statutory or charter provision or limitation and shall never constitute nor give rise to a charge against the general credit or taxing powers of the Municipality but shall be a limited obligation of the Municipality payable solely from and secured by certain mortgaged property under a Mortgage and Indenture (the "Indenture") dated as of February 1, 1980, from the Municipality to Mellon Bank, N.A., as Bondholder, which mortgaged property includes a pledge of the Net Revenues derived by the Municipality from the Project and a mortgage lien on the Project.

The payment of principal and interest on this Bond has also been unconditionally guaranteed by the Company, pursuant to a Guarantee Agreement, dated as of February 1, 1980, from the Company to, and for the benefit of any registered holder hereof.

The Indenture and the Contract are recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds, Charlevoix County, Michigan, and the Indenture, the Contract and the Guarantee are on file at the principal offices of the Municipality and Bondholder. Reference is hereby made to the Indenture for a description of the mortgaged property and to the Indenture, the Contract and the Guarantee for the provisions, among others, with respect to the nature and extent of the security, the rights, duties and obligations of the Municipality, the Company, the Guarantor and the Bondholder, and the terms upon which this Bond is issued and secured.

This Bond may be assigned upon ten days prior notification to the Municipality and the Company by the registered holder in person or by his attorney in writing with a duly executed instrument of assignment in the form set forth below, and any assignee shall take this Bond subject to these conditions and the further condition that Mellon Bank, N.A., shall continue as Depository and until any bank or trust company qualified to be such is requested by the assignee to be successor Depository and is approved by the Municipality in writing. Such assignment shall be noted on the registration books of the Municipality kept by the Depository and no assignment of this Bond shall be valid unless made on said books.

Installments of principal hereinabove set forth are not subject to prepayment except as hereinafter provided.

This Bond is subject to voluntary prepayment on any interest payment date on or after February 1, 1985 in its entire remaining unpaid principal amount, or lesser portion thereof in inverse chronological order of the aforesaid installments and in multiples of said installments at 100% of the principal amount hereof plus accrued interest to the prepayment date.

Unless the Bondholder and Municipality should otherwise agree in writing, the Bond is subject to mandatory prepayment at 100% of the unpaid principal amount hereof on any interest payment date on or after August 1, 1981 following exercise by the Company of its option under the Contract to purchase the Project, but only when following:

- (a) damage or destruction of the Project or the related plant of the Company to such extent (i) that the Project cannot be reasonably restored within six months to the condition thereof

- (i) immediately preceding such damage or destruction, or (ii) that the Company is prevented from carrying on normal operation of the Project or the related plant of the Company for a period of six months; or
- (b) condemnation of the Project or the related plant of the Company or taking by eminent domain of such use of the Project or the related plant of the Company that the Company is prevented from carrying on normal operation of the Project or the related plant of the Company for a period of six months; or
- (c) constitutional, legislative, judicial or administrative action voiding the Contract or rendering it unenforceable or impossible of performance or imposing unreasonable burdens or excessive liabilities, including tax liabilities, on the Municipality or the Company; or
- (d) in the event the Bonds begin to bear interest at the Taxable Rate as provided in the Bonds.

Notice of any such prepayment shall be given at least 30 days prior to the prepayment date by mailing to the Bondholder a notice fixing such prepayment date, the amount of principal and the premium, if any, to be prepaid. 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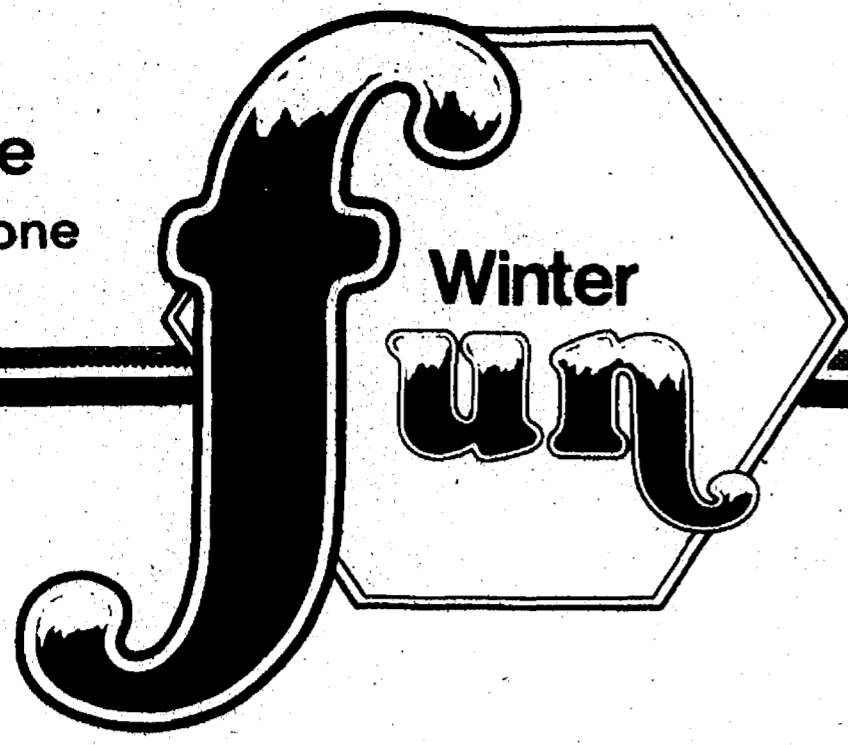

Charlevoix Winter Festival - family entertainment

CHARLEVOIX - Always wanted to bump-jump? Maybe you're more of a Pablo Picasso and want to try your hand at snow sculpturing. Or you'd like to earn local fame by winning either a cross country or downhill ski race.

Wherever your talents may lie, the Charlevoix Winter Cup Festival this weekend, Friday through Sunday, has several events guaranteed to entertain everyone in your family.

The events range from a snow sculpture contest to bunny, grandmother and grandfather downhill races to a citizens' cross country ski race, and are designed for spectators as much as for participants.

To get into the weekend festival mood, Charlevoix restaurants and lounges will serve special drinks and dinners Friday and Saturday nights.

Saturday the festivities begin with a snow sculpture contest. The theme of the contest is "snow fantasy." Three categories are available: student, business or general entries which include any organization outside of school.

Interested sculptors should contact John Zaremba and register their snow sculpture ideas to avoid duplications. The sculpture can be built anywhere in the city.

The sculptures will be judged on conformity to theme, originality, class-manship and visual impact. Cash prizes and merchandise will be awarded to the top sculptures in the categories. Judging will be done by a team of five people at 10 a.m.

The festivities next turn to downhill racing at Mt. McSaubia. Anyone seven and over may register beginning at noon for dual slalom races. The races begin at 1 p.m.

Age groups for the girls' and boys' races are seven to nine, 10 to 12, 13 to 15 and 16 and over. A bunny race for two to six year olds is also offered. Adults over 21 can register for grandmother and grandfather races. There's no entry fee for the races.

Racers go through gates and will be timed by age groups. Medals will be awarded to the top skiers in each category.

The bump-jumper contest begins at 3 p.m. at Mt. McSaubia. The one-runner, fanny-thumping, bone-rattling device is

the area's answer to the summer skateboard. Spectators will have fun watching this contest because two out of three entrants wipe-out before reaching the bottom of the hill.

Jacque Merta of the Charlevoix Chamber of Commerce, one sponsor of the festival, said judging will be on how far the entrant makes it down the hill, not speed.

For those unfamiliar with the sport, a bump-jumper is a seat perched atop one runner that's about two-feet long. They are made of metal, plastic and sometimes wood materials.

Riding the bump-jumper is hard to do and still be dignified. Hands clutch the seat on either side with legs stretched out in front, throwing the torso into a half-lying position.

The entry categories for the bump-jump contest are the same as the downhill race. Prizes will be awarded to the top men and women winners in each category.

After registering for the downhill races or the bump-jump contest, there will be a ski demonstration by "The Wing-O-Matics."

Skiers Joel Tolle and Scott Evans, both employees of the Bahnhof Ski Shop in Traverse City, will perform a free style exhibition. They have been doing exhibitions in northern Michigan ski areas for the past five years and should put on quite a show.

Sunday's events turn from downhill skiing to cross country skiing.

Windmill Farms on Boyne City Road west of Charlevoix, will host a United States Ski Association sanctioned race and a citizens' race.

Late registration is from 9 to 9:30 a.m. Sunday. The race begins at 11 a.m. for sanctioned racers, noon for citizen racers 14 and over and 12:30 p.m. for citizen racers 13 years and under.

Only USSA members are eligible to enter the five, 10 and 20-kilometer sanctioned race. Non-USSA members may enter the two, four or 10-kilometer race. Registration fees for adults is \$10 and \$6 for those 17 years and under.

The course will be on 500 acres of rolling scenic terrain, with approximately one third uphill, one third downhill and one third level terrain, according to Windmill Farms owner Nellie Hiehle.



A bump-jump contest will be one of the events during the weekend Charlevoix Winter Cup Festival. Prizes will be awarded not to the fastest rider, but to the person who makes it farthest down the Mt. McSaubia hill without falling.

"It's not a dangerous course—which is important for all citizen racers—but it is challenging," she said.

Last year about 130 people registered for the race but only 110 showed. Temperatures ranging to 40 degrees below zero kept many racers from showing because they couldn't get their cars started, Hiehle said. She is expecting the same number, if not more, racers this year.

There are two good lookout points for people who want to watch the race.

Maple Grove Road gives observers a good place to see the skiers in action as they round one of the curves. The finish off Burgess Road right by the Windmill Farms registration house, is also a good place to watch the race.

A presentation of trophies, medals and T-shirts will follow the races.

The Fourth Annual Winter Cup is sponsored by the Charlevoix Chamber of Commerce, the Charlevoix Lions, the Charlevoix Jaycees and the Northwestern REACT organization.

Sunny skies bring out big field for ski race

BOYNE CITY - Sunny skies brought a record number of entries to the third annual Natural Light Avalanche Ski Classic here Saturday.

More than 110 people from the ages of six to 50 entered the 5 and 10-kilometer cross-country ski races.

The number of entries was a pleasant surprise for race officials, who were not sure if they would surpass last year's field of 100 racers because of a lack of snow. The race had to be postponed from Jan. 19 to Feb. 9.

Bob Kemp of Roscommon won the 10-km race in 38:49, more than two minutes ahead of second place finisher David Delrorge of Lansing.

The 10-km race was actually closer to 9-km, because the race course had to be re-routed due to a lack of snow in some spots on the original 10-km course.

Rounding out the top 10 finishers in the 10-km race were Ray Clark of Mackinac Island, Joe Stephansky of East Lansing, Greg O'Gawa of Petoskey, Mark Chambers of Mackinac Island, Bruce Cartford of Conway, David Hays of

Roscommon, Wolfram Meingast of Grosse Pointe Park and John Newbury of Harbor Springs.

The first woman finisher was Randi Talsma of Houghton Lake, who finished 14th overall with a time of 49:53.

Top finishers from Charlevoix County were Pete Spieles and his son Jon of Charlevoix, who finished 18th and 19th, respectively, with times of 52:36 and 52:37.

In the 5-km race, Ray Collar of Orchard Lake took first in 30:24, just seven seconds ahead of John Stewart of East Lansing. Ed Boyer of Boyne City took third in 30:50, Glen Taylor of Charlevoix was fourth and Mark O'Gawa of Petoskey was fifth.

Rounding out the top 10 in the 5-km race were Herbert Meingast of Grosse Pointe Park, William Aten of Boyne City, Bryon Drackman of East Lansing, Keith Hausler of Boyne City and Vasco Zucchiatti of Boyne City.

The first woman across the finish line was Susan Thomas of Mancelona, who finished 12th overall in 43:17.

Racers competed in 24 different divisions, and the top three finishers in each division won Olympic style medals. The first place winners in each category won additional prizes donated by local businesses. All entrants also received souvenir Avalanche Ski Classic T-shirts.

Other prizes were also awarded to: --Jennifer Schafer of Boyne City, who at six years old was the youngest skier to enter the race.

--Darwin Gilbert, age 50, of Lansing, the oldest racer.

--The Mills family of Bellaire, who had the most entrants from one family—John, Shirley, Neil and Paul.

--Joe Lamour of Monroe, the last one to finish the 10-km race. His time of two hours and 25 minutes was, however, 20 minutes faster than last year's slowest finisher.

ZPG and Housing Market

This country has reached a new threshold in its population growth. Now, as the experts have predicted, zero population growth (ZPG) is here. Families are smaller than ever and the elderly are living longer. How has this affected the building industry?

Nationally, it has caused builders to plan somewhat smaller houses to house smaller families and with less frills to accommodate the lessening purchasing power.

The national birth rate has now plunged to 1.9 children per family - lowest in history - and well below the "replacement level". Marriages decreased last year the first time since 1958. Upward trend started in 1962 and continues to accelerate.

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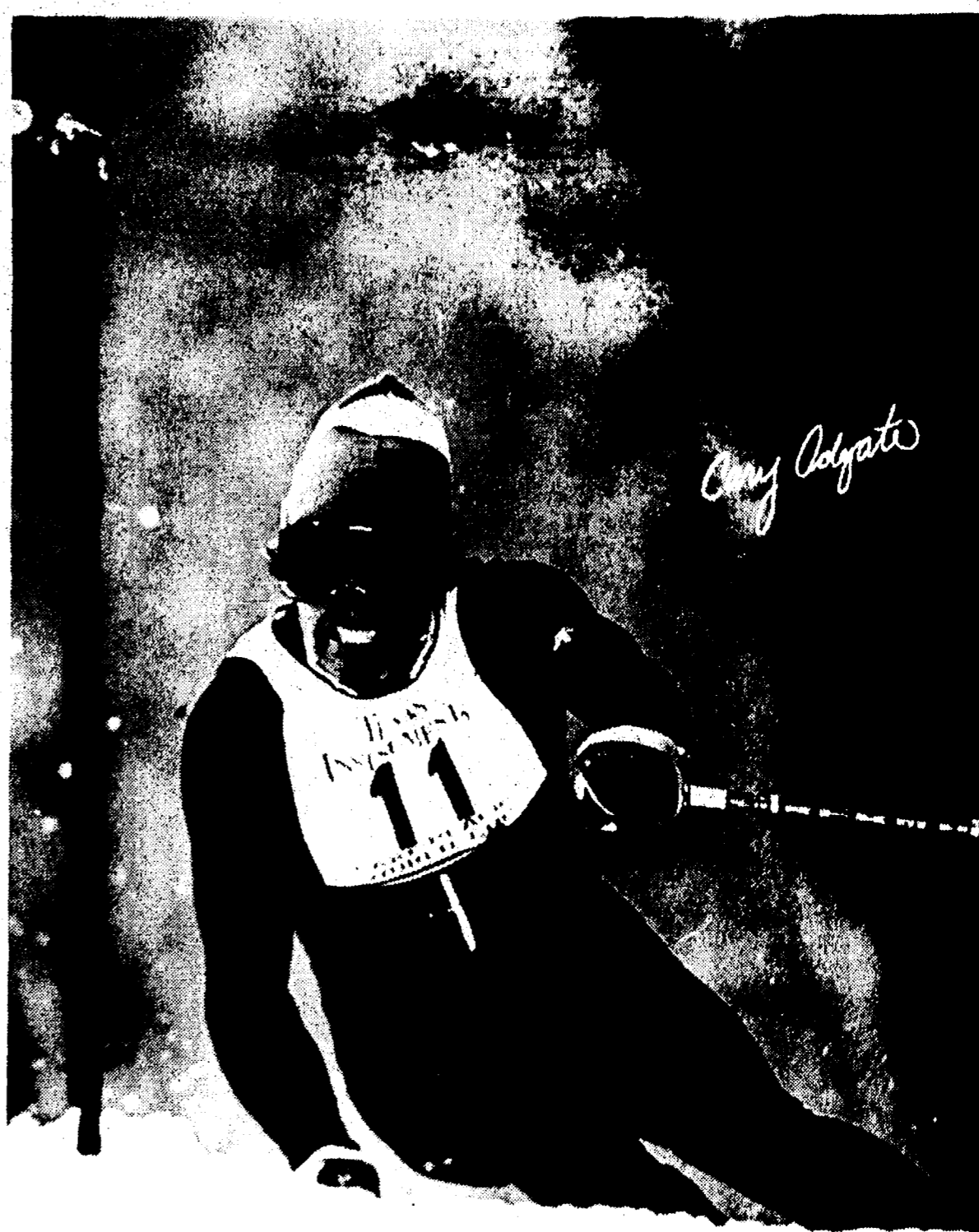
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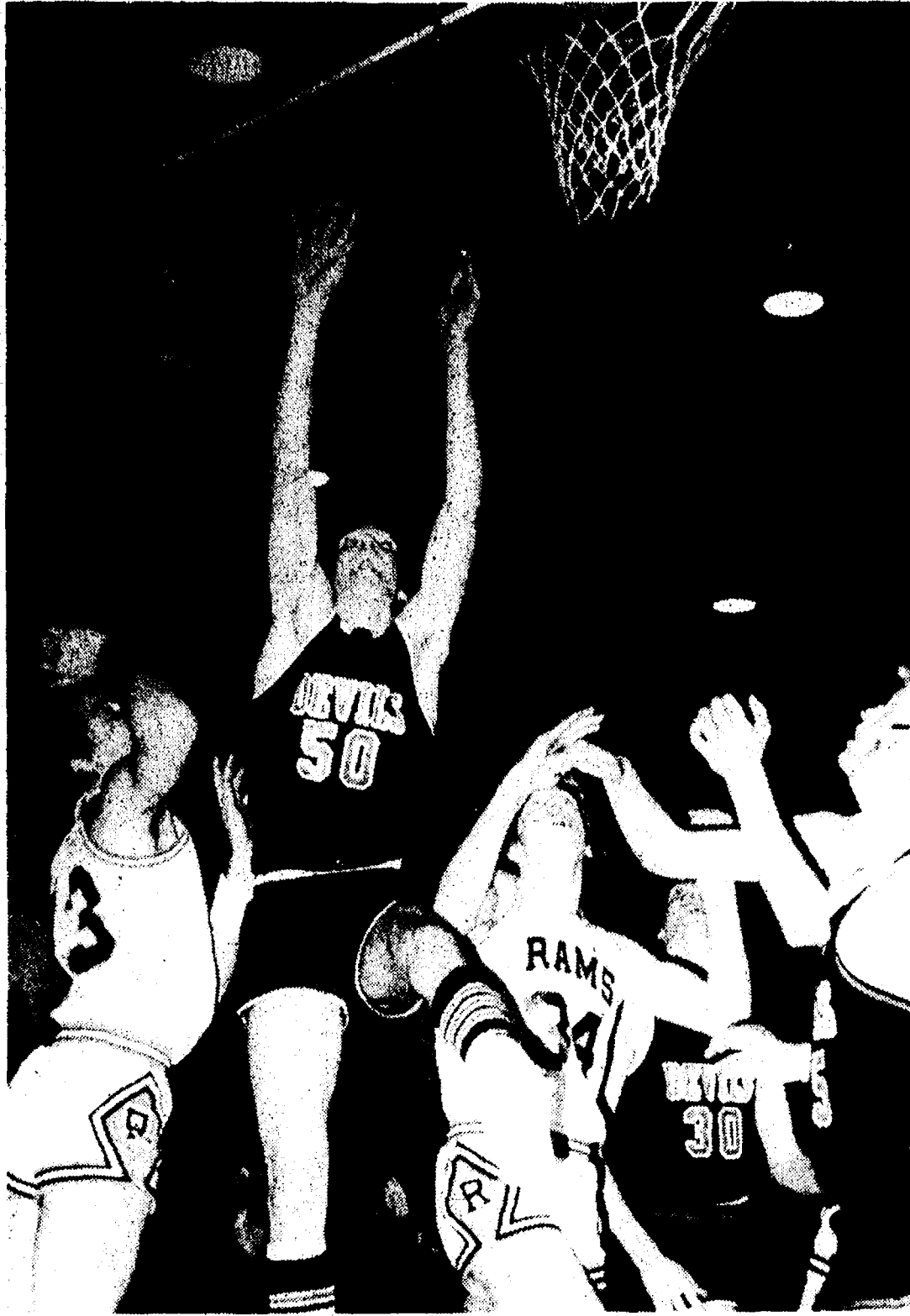

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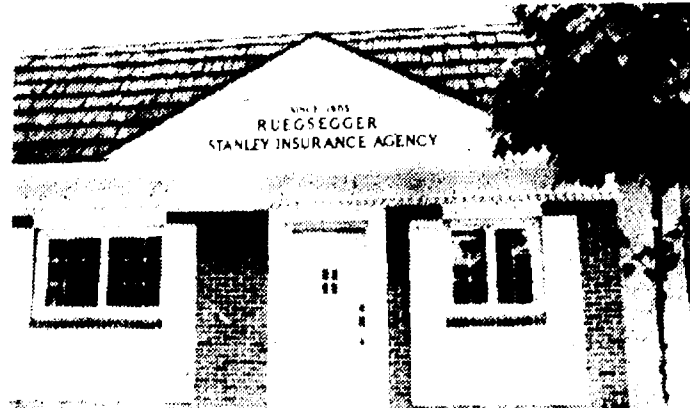
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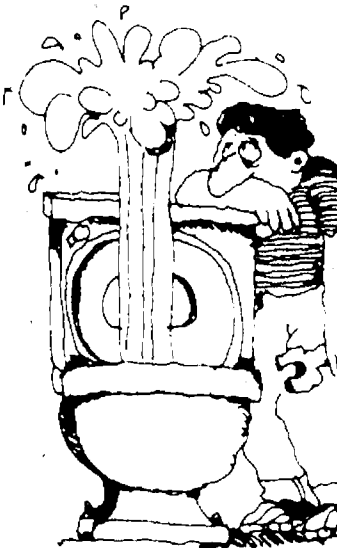
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Northern, Michigan Electric Cooperative, Inc. and Wolverine Electric Cooperative, Inc. announce that they have made application for a loan guarantee from the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) which will provide financing assistance to Northern and Wolverine for deficiencies in the original loan to the cooperatives for the purchase of a 20% share in the Enrico Fermi Nuclear Generating Station Unit #2, located in Monroe County, Michigan. The generating station is being constructed by the Detroit Edison Company and is now 80% completed. These loans will also include financing assistance for the first reload of the nuclear core. The approximate total amount of these loans is estimated to be \$181,000,000.

A Final Environmental Statement concerning the generating plant was prepared by the Atomic Energy Commission in July, 1972. A Final Environmental Impact Statement concerning REA financing of the cooperative's participation was prepared by REA in December, 1976. A Borrower's Environmental Report has been prepared by the Cooperatives to cover this loan application. Copies of the environmental documents

mentioned above can be reviewed at the Cooperative offices or the offices of Martin G. Seipel, Area Director, Northeast Area-Electric, Rural Electrification Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. The Cooperatives have been notified that REA will prepare an Environmental Assessment to determine whether or not a supplemental Environmental Impact Statement will be required. Northern and Wolverine do not believe the continued participation in this project will result in any significant effect on the quality of the human environment. If there are any comments on the environmental aspects of the proposed action, they should be submitted to the Cooperatives within 30 days of the publication of this Notice. 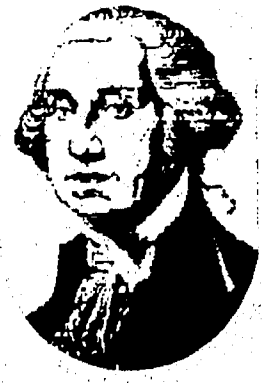
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EJ girls win volleyball tourney

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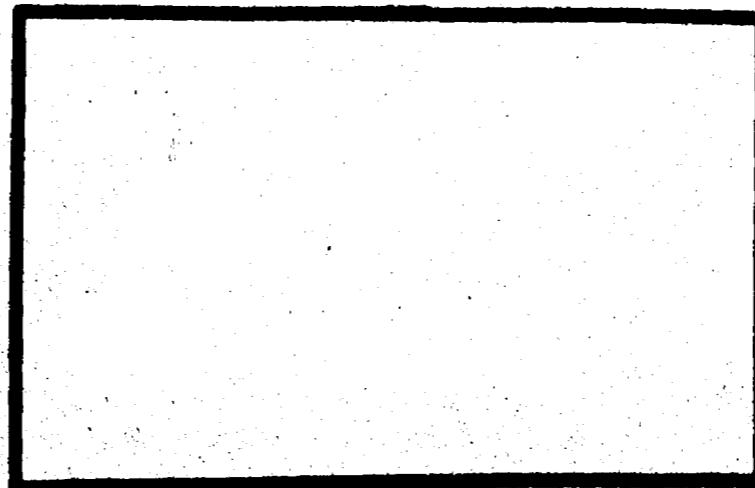
