

County spends \$100 to protest Proposal A

The Charlevoix County Board of County Commissioners felt strongly enough about their position opposing Proposition A that they used public dollars last week to advertise that position.

Clyde Cunningham, county commission chairman, said the commissioners were not trying to set a precedent of using public funds to advertise a political position, they just felt this particular issue was very important to their constituents.

"It was a mutual feeling on the commission that the public was being sold short," he said.

"The state only told the brighter side

of the story. It was worth spending the money if it made people dig a little deeper into the tax issue before voting on Tuesday," Cunningham said.

The commissioners ran ads in the Petoskey News Review on Friday and Monday which cost a total of \$104. The ads said in bold type: "The Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners goes on record as opposing Proposal A."

"We may get some flak about the advertising, but if there is a controversy about it, we are willing to pay for it out of our pockets. It would cost about \$7 apiece. We felt that strongly about it," Cunningham said.

Commissioner John Haggard of Charlevoix felt his constituents were opposed to Proposal A. "If Governor

Milliken is on the public payroll running around the state endorsing the proposal, we should be able to do the same thing," Haggard said.

Determining the legality of using public funds isn't up to the county board, Haggard said.

"The feeling I have is that it may be illegal, but so is driving 65 miles per hour. The only way to get Lansing's attention is to hit them over the head with a ball bat," said Haggard.

He agreed with Cunningham on the importance of the issue and that the importance warranted taking a firm stand.

County Commissioner Oral Sutliff of Boyne City voted against the resolution to oppose Proposal A and to advertise

that position. The main reason he voted against the position was that he wasn't convinced that Proposal A was bad. He felt the tax proposal was confusing but he hoped that it would provide some relief.

"I'm not in favor of spending taxpayers' money on advertising a position of this sort," Sutliff said. "You can run your position in the published minutes. But, I guess the board as a whole felt strongly enough about this."

The vote on the issue was 11-2, with Sutliff and Marvin Loding of Boyne City voting against passage. Commissioners Delbert Ingalls of East Jordan and Ira Davis of Horton Bay were not present for the vote.

EJ health center chief taking new position

EAST JORDAN - Neal Colburn, administrator of the East Jordan Family Health Center, will soon be leaving his position to become business office manager at Burns Clinic in Petoskey.

Health center board president Wally Goebel hopes to call a meeting of the entire board later this week to officially accept Colburn's resignation and to discuss strategy for finding a replacement. Goebel said he would like to issue an official statement on Friday.

Health center board member Charles Mason commented: "I think the attitude of most of the board members when we learned of Colburn's resignation was surprise."

"He was very knowledgeable, especially in the area of federal funding. We hate to see him go, but he's got his own future to think about," Mason said.

Although the entire board hasn't met about the matter, Mason felt it was

possible that Colburn would continue to help out the center on grant applications.

He said medical director Dr. Bruce Lindsay might "take charge of the ship" until decisions were made about Colburn's replacement.

Colburn felt it was premature to speculate about the future of the center until the board meets, accepts his resignation and discusses the matter. Colburn said the exact date that he would leave his duties will also be discussed at that time.

Board members contacted by The Press gave both June 8 and June 11 as possible dates the resignation would be effective.

"It looks like a really good opportunity for Neal," said Cal Gotts, health center board member.

"The reason Neal began looking around for other positions was the uncertainty of our federal funds," Gotts said. "Then our grant was approved

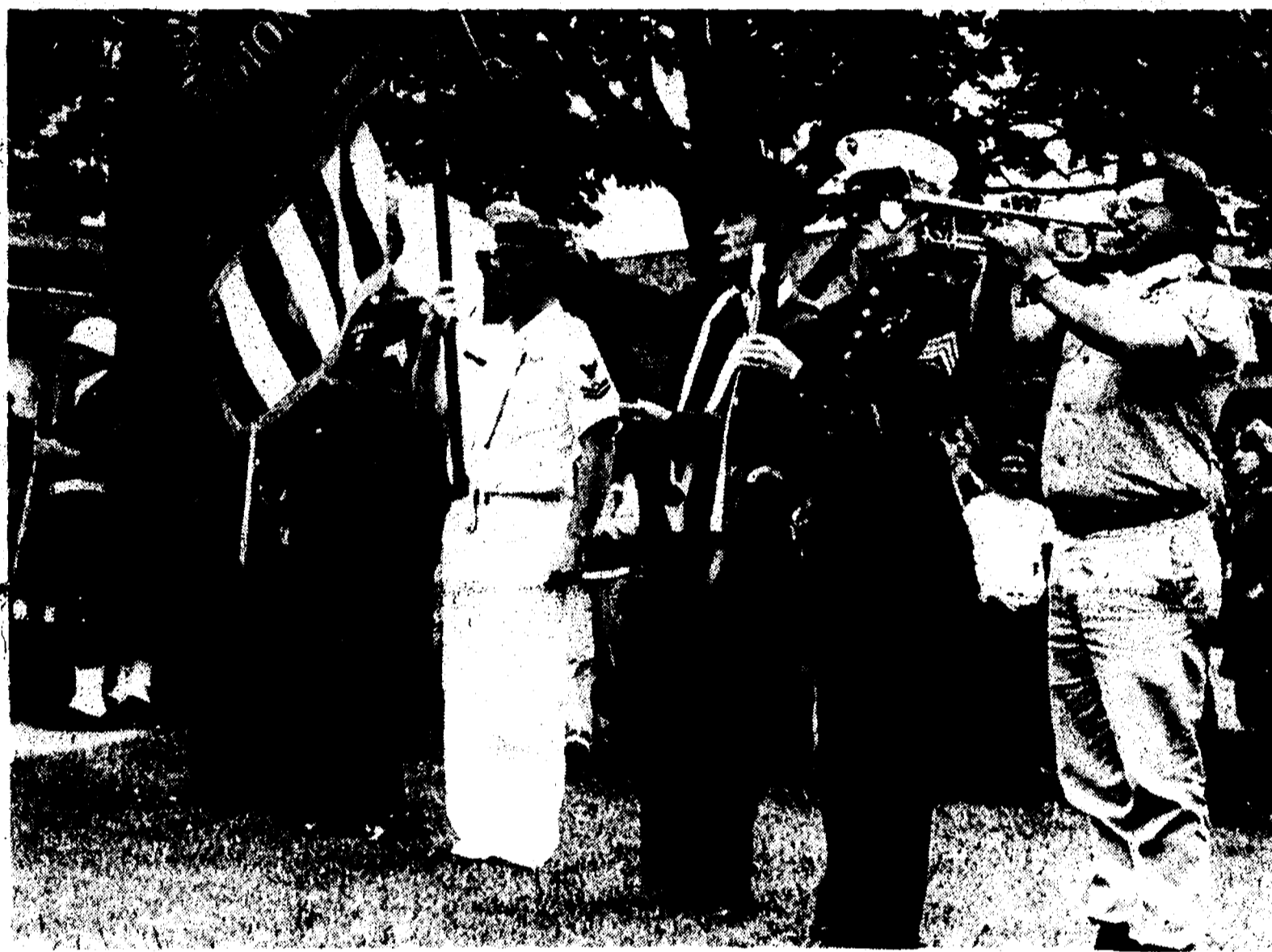
and this opportunity for him came along."

"I called him up to congratulate him. When I talked to him he said he'd be willing to be a consultant for us to help a new person. I wish him the best. I think he's done a good job."

Gotts thought the future of the administrative position would have to be discussed by the board. "If that federal funding does get cut, we won't need that position. About half of Neal's time is spent on duties associated with that funding," Gotts said. He felt some sort of office manager would still be needed but expertise in federal funding might not be necessary.

The health center building, which opened in April, 1978, was paid for largely by local contributions and loans, but federal grants have provided more than \$700,000 for staff and equipment since that time.

Colburn has been the health center administrator since July 24, 1978.

E. Jordan plant owner helps state pinpoint business woes

EAST JORDAN - Amend workers' compensation and unemployment compensation laws. These were the top two of 15 proposals made to the Michigan legislature last week by representatives of small businesses.

East Jordan businessman Dick Wheeler was one of about 500 delegates to the Conference on Small Business that was appointed by Governor William Milliken for May 11, 12, and 13 in Lansing.

Wheeler, who for 17 years has owned and operated a metal stampings business, said, "Michigan ranks 48 in the contiguous states, in business." He explained the conference was called in order "to tell government what is wrong with the State of Michigan so far as small business is concerned."

A regional caucus back in January of about 1500 delegates began the consolidation of viewpoints. Some of the delegates, like Wheeler, were appointed by state senators; others were elected from business organizations.

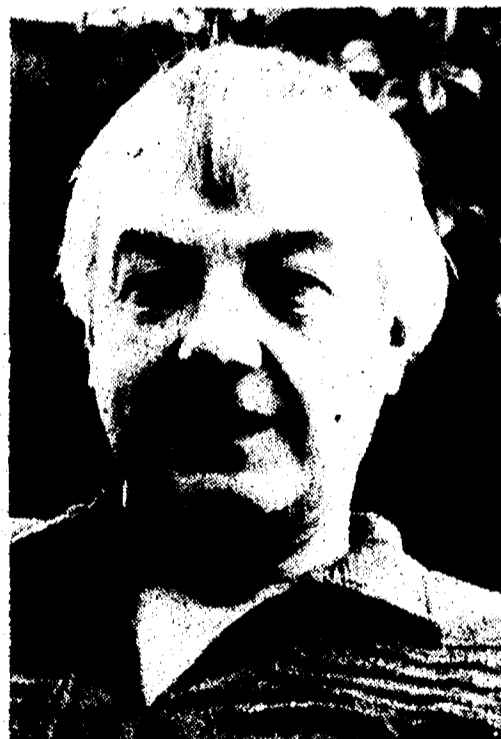
They sent 60 proposals to the conference, from which with difficulty, Wheeler said, 15 were chosen to be the most pressing.

They want the Workers' Compensation Statute tightened in relation to injury claims, and they want small business specifically represented on the Workers' Compensation Review Board.

Similarly, tightened requirements for obtaining unemployment compensation were asked, including a prohibition on drawing compensation while in another state—a practice shown, in a 60-Minutes segment on TV, where the unemployed were golfing in Florida, and picking up their checks forwarded to them to a Florida office.

The third biggest reason that business is either falling or fleeing from the state, according to the delegates' vote, is the Single Business Tax.

They said, abolish it and enact a business income tax, calculated on

and judicial branches of government... set as a priority of public policy their intent on establishing an attractive business and job climate in Michigan."

Wheeler pointed out that small business, designated by the conference as companies employing up to 250, was responsible for 80 percent of employment in the state.

In seventh position the conference asked for closer enforcement of equal credit laws and practices in relation to women in business.

Wheeler said 30 women, owners of a variety of businesses, including a railroad, a print shop, and a furniture factory, were delegates to the conference.

The other concerns, from eight through 15, were: public school courses in small business, "a Michigan Right-to-Work Law," prevention of competition from state-funded industries, tax aid to minority-owned businesses, defeat of House Bill 4330 (the Industrial Hostage Act), a resolution to ask the state to stop spending, export assistance for small business, and reimbursement "for legal fees and court costs incurred combating a wrongly issued citation."

The rest of the 60 proposals referred to energy, technology, campaign contributions, more on minorities and women, more on international trade, and one on reducing government-related paper work by 25 percent.

Wheeler commended a documentary film produced by WXYZ, Detroit, and shown at the conference. He said the conference organization bought copies for use by business organizations.

He noted one scene in which one-way trailers for moving were piled up in sun-belt states. "You can't rent (one) in Michigan due to the exodus," Wheeler reported.

Wheeler himself moved to East Jordan from Detroit. His wife Barbara is native to the area. He doesn't plan to join any exodus from Michigan.

Memorial Day services

A time to remember

Traditional parades and other salutes to those who have died fighting for our country will be held on Memorial Day, next Monday, in Boyne City and East Jordan.

The Memorial Day parade, which was not held last year due to organizational difficulties, is again being held in Boyne City. The Chamber of Commerce, with assistance from the local American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, has organized this year's parade and memorial services at Veterans' Memorial Park.

The Boyne parade line-up will be at the Legion Hall, at the corner of Lake and Main Streets, between 9:30 and 10 a.m. The parade begins at 10 a.m. with the route being from Lake to Water

Street to Park Street to State Street and into the lakefront park.

The high school band will play several selections at the park. Rev. Tim Holcomb-Densmore will give the invocation and benediction, while Devere Middleton will offer a prayer.

In East Jordan, parade lineup will be from 10 to 10:45 at the middle school. The parade starts at 10:50 and proceeds from the school to City Hall for 11 a.m. memorial services.

This year's services will be held on Main Street in front of City Hall, Memorial Park, former site of the services, is not being used because of construction activity relating to the shoreline stabilization project.

Guest speaker for the memorial service will be Cecil McCoon, a

Veterans Administration official from Traverse City. Christopher Taylor Memorial Bridge for another service honoring those who died at sea.

The day's activities will conclude with the raising of the flag and playing of the national anthem by the high school band at GAR Park on Main Street.

Early morning services at area cemeteries will also be held. Coffee and doughnuts will be served at the Legion Hall on Main Street at 6 a.m.

The veterans will leave the Legion at 7:20, holding services at Calvary Cemetery at 7:30, Pesek Cemetery at 8:00, Bohemian at 8:15, Dunsmore at 8:35 and Sunset Hill at 9. Breakfast will then be served for veterans at the Legion Hall by members of the auxiliary at 9:30.

Boyne MESC office may close

BOYNE CITY - Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) has asked for the closing of its temporary claims office in Boyne City.

Duane Cox of the Petoskey MESC office said the branch office case load dropped about 25 percent in April, and May appears to be the same.

He called it a substantial decline and said he expected another 40 to 60

percent drop by the time the branch office closes, probably June 15.

It was the first temporary claims office, Cox said, that Petoskey has had.

Chamber of Commerce director Kate Schafer is requesting that the possibility of reopening the branch office "be reviewed periodically" because the employment situation is likely to go up and down.

The reasons for the MESC office in Boyne City were to save gas mileage. "More reasonable to have one or two travel," Schafer said, "than many, many." Besides that, there is the increased likelihood that the money would be spent locally.

Cox explained the closing was not yet definite. Meantime the office is running on reduced hours—9-12 a.m.

Chamber objects to state park cuts

BOYNE CITY - Reduction in staffing at Young State Park from 21 people last year to nine this year will necessitate the kind of cuts that not only will affect the park but also the welfare of Boyne City business.

These views were sent in a letter to state lawmakers by Kate Schafer,

Boyne City Chamber of Commerce executive director.

According to Schafer the staff cut will mean some or all of the following at the park:

1. Elimination of night patrol.
2. Closure of at least one of the three campgrounds.

3. Relaxed maintenance standards. She pointed out that closing one campground in the busy season would mean about 162 fewer people would be potential visitors to Boyne City.

In addition, the reduced quality of the park would discourage use, just at a point when commitment to tourism is being stressed by the state.

Johnson's resignation will take effect by Aug. 1. Her replacement has not yet been chosen.

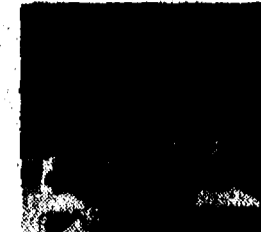
Also resigning is school board

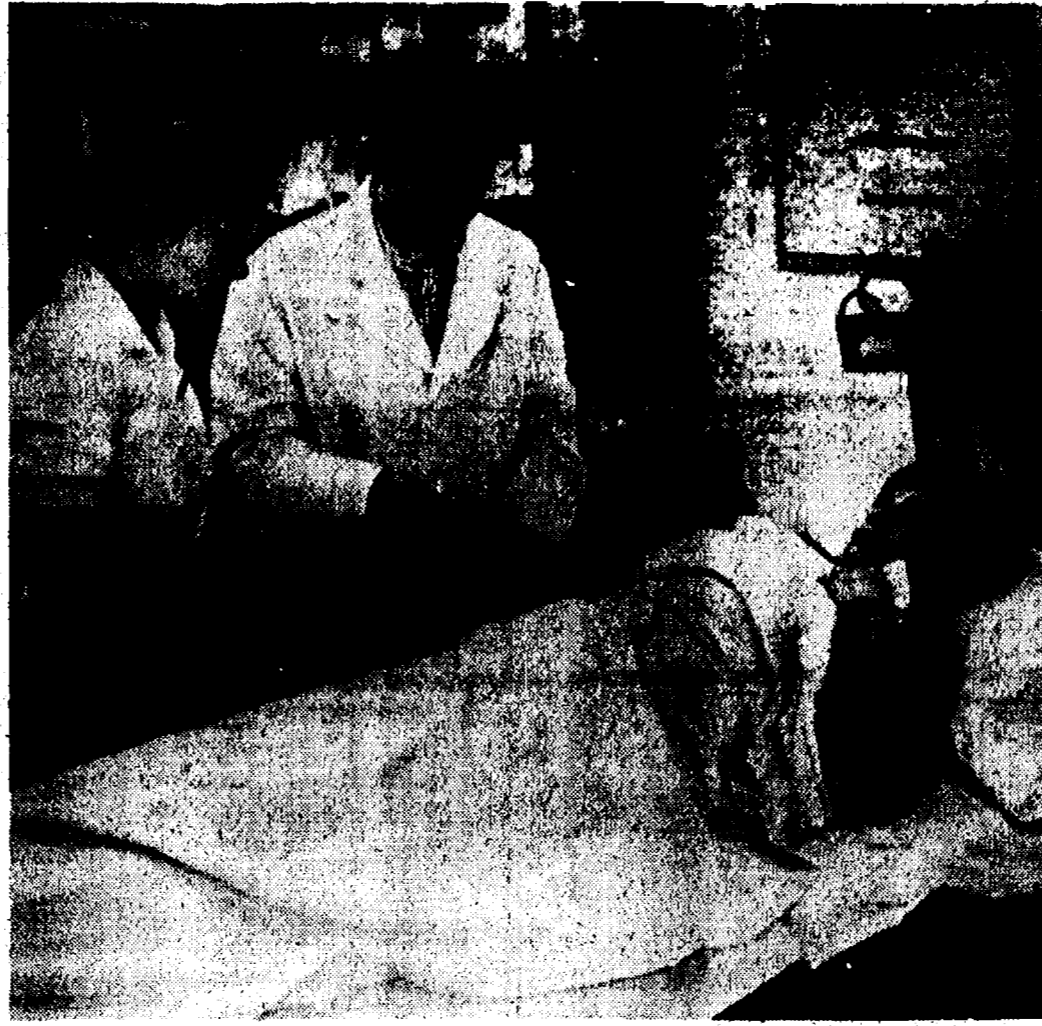
"Woodburning is here to stay," Reinhardt said. "Not only do we have abundant forests in Northern Michigan,

Hospital helps train EMT specialists from East Jordan

EAST JORDAN - Five members of the East Jordan Ambulance Service have been studying to become Emergency Medical Technologist Specialists, with the cooperation of the physicians and staff at the East Jordan Family Health Center and Charlevoix Area Hospital.

The five, each already licensed Emergency Medical Technologists (EMTs) have spent 30 hours in classroom study and 29 hours in clinical work at the Family Health Center and the hospital. Doctors Bruce Lindsay, Mitchell Carey, and Reed Freidinger provided the classroom teaching.

The final step in their licensing as EMT Specialists is a three-hour state examination, which they will take June 1.

The addition of the "specialist" designation to the EMT will mean that the ambulance crew members will be able to administer intravenous medication for shock to patients, establish life lines for victims of cardiac arrest, and perform additional medical procedures not permitted of EMTs.

"We are pushing hard to offer this advanced service," Bernie Hammond, ambulance administrator for the City of East Jordan explained.

Hammond said the EMT Specialist classification was designed "to fill the gap between the basic EMT classification and Paramedic classification."

He explained that in addition to the training for the personnel the EMT Specialist classification has required the

acquisition of a \$6,000 radio service, linking the ambulances with the health center and hospital.

The radio link, Hammond continued, permits the EMT Specialist to communicate with a physician who may direct him to administer the intravenous medication or apply other life saving procedures.

As of July 1, all ambulances in Michigan will be required to have an EMT on board whenever they are carrying a patient, Hammond stated.

The East Jordan Ambulance Service will become licensed at the higher classification as a "Limited Advanced Service" with the addition of EMT Specialists.

The five crew members who undertook the study are Donald Bowers, Tom Vanderwall, Guy Vallance, Vicky Sutliff and Hammond.

Hammond was appreciative of the cooperation of the two medical facilities provided for their training.

"Without the hospital's cooperation we could not have gone into this. We had to have hospital training," he said.

The five aspiring EMT Specialists each spent 29 hours either at the East Jordan Family Health Center or the Charlevoix Area Hospital, working with emergency room staff, learning their techniques, and treating those patients who agreed to participate.

"This will definitely improve the initial care we can give patients," Hammond said. "We are doing this because we know the patients will benefit in the end."

Thorsen grew up in East Jordan, moved away in 1934, started his own management consulting company in



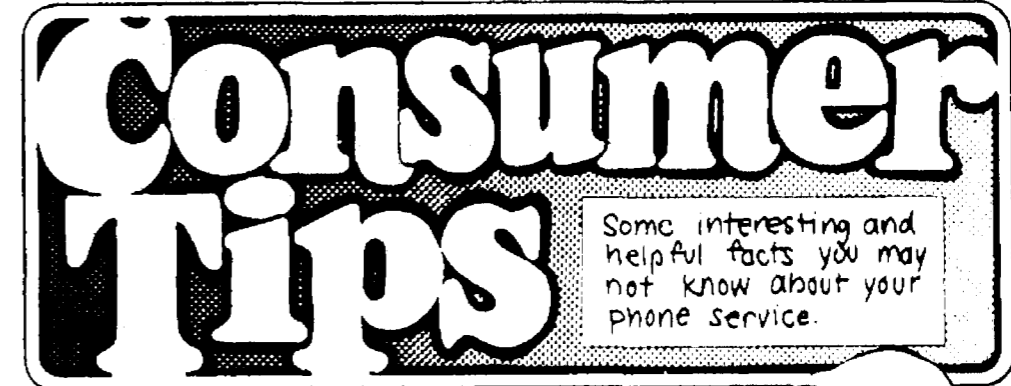

He helped organize the local Chamber of Commerce in 1960 and founded East Jordan Tool and Die in 1963. He sold that company in 1973.

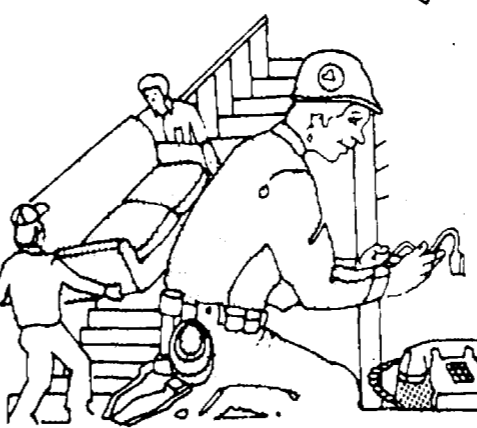
Thorsen and his wife Norma live on High M-66 north of East Jordan.

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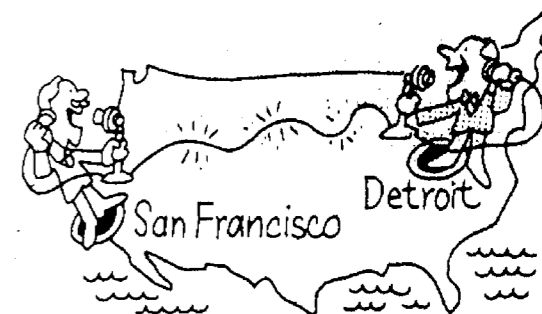

Chandler Township Gathering Ordinance

Charlevoix County, Michigan

AN ORDINANCE TO PERMIT, REGULATE AND CONTROL, IN THE INTEREST OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE, OUTDOOR GATHERINGS OF PERSONS IN EXCESS OF 250 IN NUMBER.

Section 1. Preamble

The Board of South Arm Township finds and declares that the interests of public health, safety and welfare of the citizens of South Arm Township require the regulation, licensing and control of assemblages of large numbers of people in excess of those normally drawing upon the health, sanitation, fire, police, transportation, utility and other public services regularly provided in this township.

Section 2. Definitions

a. "Outdoor Assembly" hereinafter referred to as "assembly," means any event attended by more than 500 attendants, all or any part of which includes a theatrical exhibition, public show, display, entertainment, amusement or other exhibition, including, but not limited to musical festivals, rock festivals, peace festivals or similar gatherings, but does not mean:

1. an event which is conducted or sponsored by a governmental unit or agency on publicly owned land or property; or
2. an event which is conducted or sponsored by any entity qualifying for tax exempt status under Section 511(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, being 26 U.S.C. 501(c)(3), as incorporated by reference in Section 201 of the Michigan Income Tax Act of 1967, Act 281 of the Public Acts of 1967, being Section 206.201 of the Compiled Laws of 1948; or
3. an event held entirely within the confines of a permanently enclosed and covered structure.

b. "Person" means any natural person, partnership, corporation, association or organization.

c. "Licensee" means any person who organizes, promotes, conducts, or causes to be conducted an outdoor assembly, and to whom a license is issued pursuant to this Ordinance.

d. "Attendant" means any person who obtains admission to an outdoor assembly by payment of money or by the rendering of services in lieu of payment of money for admission.

Section 3.

A person shall not sponsor, operate, maintain, or promote an outdoor assembly in South Arm Township unless he shall have first made application for, and obtained, as hereinafter prescribed a license for each such assembly. (Licensee)

Section 4. Application for License

Application for a license to conduct an outdoor assembly must be made in writing on such forms and in such manner as prescribed by the South Arm Township Board, and shall be made at least 60 days prior to the date of the proposed assembly. Each application shall be accompanied by a nonrefundable fee, which shall be set by the South Arm Township Board annually, and shall include at least the following:

- a. The name, age residence and mailing address of the person making the application. (Where the person making and application is a partnership, corporation, or other association, this information shall be provided for all partners, officers, and directors or members. Where the person is a corporation, a copy of the articles of incorporation shall be filed, and the names and addresses shall be provided of all shareholders having financial interest greater than \$500.)
- b. A statement of the kind, character, and type of proposed assembly.
- c. The address, legal description and proof of ownership of the site at which the proposed assembly is to be conducted. Where ownership is not vested in the prospective licensee, he shall submit and affidavit from the owner indicating his consent to the use of the site for the proposed assembly.
- d. The date and hours during which the proposed assembly is to be conducted.
- e. An estimate of the maximum number of attendants expected at the assembly for each day it is conducted and a detailed explanation of admission which will be used and the sequential numbering or other method which will be used for accounting purposes.
- f. Application for license by applicant who proposes to conduct more than one (1) outdoor assembly during the calendar year.

Notwithstanding Section 4, 5 and 10 of this ordinance, where a prospective applicant for a license to conduct an outdoor assembly proposes to conduct more than one (1) outdoor assembly during the calendar year such applicant may:

1. Submit one annual application to the Township Supervisor at least sixty (60) days prior to the date of the first proposed assembly of the calendar year. The annual application shall contain all information required of the prospective applicant by Sections 4, 5 and 10 of this ordinance and shall be made in writing on such forms and in such manner as prescribed by the South Arm Township Board.
2. After approval of the annual application by the Township Board, the prospective applicant must submit a supplemental application at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the proposed assembly. The supplemental application shall contain any information required by Sections 4, 5 and 10 of this ordinance which would differ from information contained in the annual application.

g. Within 5 days of the filing of the supplemental application, the Township Board may: (1) set specific conditions that must be met before the issuance of the license; (2) they may issue the license, or (3) they may deny the issuance of the license. When specific conditions are imposed as a pre-requisite to the issuance of a license, or when a license is denied, notice thereof shall be mailed to the applicant by certified mail within 1 day of such action. In the case of denial, the reasons shall be stated in the notice.

The Supervisor shall notify the Sheriff's Department, Health Officers and any other departments of any denial or cancellation.

Notwithstanding anything contained in this Section, if the supplemental application: (1) contains no information required by Sections 4, 5, and 10 of this ordinance which differs from the information contained in the annual application or differs from the annual application only in the date and hours which the proposed assembly is to be conducted, the Township Supervisor shall issue the license upon the receipt of the supplemental application.

h. Within thirty (30) days of the filing of the annual application, the Township Board may: (1) set specific conditions that must be met before the approval of the annual application; (2) they may approve the annual application, or (3) they may deny the annual application. When specific conditions are imposed as a pre-requisite to the approval of the annual application, or when an annual application is denied, notice thereof shall be mailed to the applicant by certified mail within five (5) days of such action. In the case of denial, the reasons therefor shall be stated in the notice.

i. Application for license by applicant who has submitted information required by annual application prior to the time of enactment of this ordinance: Notwithstanding any other section of this ordinance, an applicant for a license who has submitted all information required by the annual application in writing to the South Arm Township Board prior to the time of enactment of this ordinance, shall be treated as having satisfied the requirement contained in this ordinance of having had submitted an annual application at least sixty (60) days prior to the date of the first proposed assembly of the calendar year 1981.

Such applicant shall be treated as having satisfied the requirement of this ordinance that an annual application had been approved by the South Arm Township Board.

Section 5.

Each application shall be accompanied by an explanation, including drawings and diagrams where applicable, of the prospective licensee's plans to provide for the following:

- a. Police and fire protection.
- b. Food and water supply facilities.
- c. Health and sanitation facilities.

- d. Medical facilities and services, including emergency vehicles and equipment.
- e. Vehicle access and parking facilities.
- f. Camping and trailer facilities.
- g. Illumination facilities.
- h. Communication facilities.
- i. Noise control and abatement.
- j. Facilities for clean up and waste disposal.
- k. Insurance and bonding arrangement.

In addition, the application shall be accompanied by a map or maps of the overall site of the proposed assembly.

Section 6.

On receipt by the Township Supervisor, copies of the application shall be forwarded to the chief law enforcement and health officers for the county, and to such other appropriate public officials as the supervisor deems necessary. Such officers and officials shall review and investigate matters relevant to the application and within 20 days of receipt thereof, shall report their findings and recommendations to the township supervisor.

Section 7.

Within 30 days of the filing of the application, the township board may (1) set specific conditions that must be met before the issuance of the license; (2) they may issue the license, or (3) they may deny the issuance of the license. When specific conditions are imposed as a prerequisite to the issuance of a license, or when a license is denied, notice thereof shall be mailed to the applicant by certified mail within five (5) days of such action. In the case of denial, the reasons therefor shall be stated in the notice.

The supervisor shall notify the sheriff's department, health officers and any other departments of any denial or cancellations.

Section 8.

A license may be denied if:

1. The applicant fails to comply with any or all requirements of this ordinance, or with any or all conditions imposed pursuant hereto, or with any other applicable provision of state or local law; or
2. The applicant has knowingly made a false, misleading or fraudulent statement in the application or in any supporting document.

Section 9.

A license shall specify the name and address of the licensee, the kind and location of the assembly, the maximum number of attendants permissible, the duration of the license and any other conditions imposed pursuant to this ordinance. It shall be posted in a conspicuous place upon the premises of the assembly, and shall not be transferred to any other person or location.

Section 10.

In processing an application the board shall, at a minimum, require the following:

a. **Security Personnel.** The licensee shall employ at his own expense such security personnel as are necessary and sufficient to provide for the adequate security and protection of the maximum number of attendants at the assembly and for the preservation of order and protection of property in and around the site of the assembly.

No license shall be issued unless the chief law enforcement officer for the county, in cooperation with the director of the State Police, is satisfied that such necessary and sufficient security personnel will be provided by the licensee for two (2) hours prior to the planned audience arrival, during and after the assembly, as determined by the law enforcement officer.

b. **Water Facilities.** The licensee shall provide potable water, sufficient in quantity and pressure to assure proper operation of all water using facilities under conditions of peak demand. Such water shall be supplied from a public water system, if available, and if not available, then from a source constructed, located, and approved in accordance with Regulations for Certain Water Supplies in Michigan, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable state or local law, or from a source delivered and stored in a manner approved by the county health officer, State Health Department, when required.

c. **Restroom Facilities:** The licensee shall provide separate enclosed flush-type water closets as defined by Act 266, Public Acts of 1929, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto and in accordance with any other applicable state or local law. If such flush-type facilities are not available, the county officer, State Health Department, may permit the use of other facilities which are in compliance with Act 273, Public Acts of 1939, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable state or local law.

The number and type of facilities when required, shall be determined on the basis of the number of attendants, in the following manner or as required by the State Health Department.

| Facilities | Male | Female |

| Toilets | 1:300 | 1:200 |
| Urinals | 1:100 | |
| Lavatories | 1:200 | 1:200 |
| Drinking Fountains | 1:500 | |
| Taps or Faucets | 1:500 | |

All facilities shall be installed, connected and maintained free from obstructions, leaks and defects and shall at all times be in operable conditions as determined after being inspected by the County Health Officer, under the directions of the State Health Department.

d. **Food Service.** When food service is made available on the premises, it shall be delivered only through concessions licensed and operated in accordance with the provisions of Act 269, Public Acts of 1968, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable state or local law.

e. **Medical Facilities.** When the assembly is not readily and quickly accessible to adequate existing medical facilities, the licensee shall be required to provide such facilities on the premises of the assembly. The kind, location, staff strength, medical and other supplies and equipment of such facilities shall be as prescribed by the County Health Officer.

f. **Liquid Waste Disposal.** The licensee shall provide for liquid waste disposal in accordance with all rules and regulations pertaining thereto established by the County Health Officer. If such rules and regulations are not available, or if they are inadequate, then liquid waste disposal shall be in accordance with the United States Public Health Service Publication No. 526, entitled "Manual of Septic Tank Practice." If liquid waste retention and disposal is dependent upon pumpers and haulers, they shall be licensed in accordance with Act 243, Public Acts of 1951, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable state or local law, and prior to issuance of any license, the licensee shall provide the County Health Officer with a true copy of any executed agreement in force and effect with a licensed pumper or hauler.

This agreement shall be a legal and binding contract to assure proper, effective and frequent removal of liquid waste from the premises so as to neither create nor cause a nuisance or menace to the public health.

A copy of the above agreement shall be sent to the Township Supervisor after approval of the Health Officer. The supervisor shall be notified of any cancellation of the above contract by the Licensee.

g. **Solid Waste Disposal.** The licensee shall provide for solid waste storage on, and removal from, the premises. Removal shall be done on the first business day after the assembly. Storage shall be in approved, covered, fly tight and rodent proof containers, provided in sufficient quantity to accommodate the number of attendants. Prior to issuance of any license, the licensee shall provide the County Health Officer with a true copy of a legal and binding agreement in force and effect with a licensed refuse collector, which agreement will assure proper, effective and frequent removal of solid waste from the premises so as to neither create nor cause a nuisance or menace to the public health.

The licensee shall implement effective control measures to minimize the presence of rodents, flies, roaches and other vermin on the premises. Poisonous materials, such as insecticides or rodenticides shall not be used in any way so as to contaminate food, equipment, or otherwise constitute a hazard to the public health. Solid waste containing food waste shall be stored as as to be inaccessible to vermin. The premises shall be kept in

such condition as to prevent the harborage or feeding of vermin.

A copy of the above agreement shall be sent to the Township Supervisor after approval of the Health Officer. The supervisor shall be notified of any cancellation of the above contract by the Licensee.

h. **Public Bathing Beaches.** The licensee shall provide or make available or accessible public bathing beaches only in accordance with Act 218, Public Acts of 1967, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable provision of state or local law.

i. **Public Swimming Pools.** The licensee shall provide or make available swimming pools only in accordance with Act 230, Public Acts of 1966, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable provision of state or local law.

j. **Access and Traffic Control.** The licensee shall provide for ingress to and egress from the premises so as to insure the orderly flow of traffic onto and off of the premises. Access to the premises shall be from a highway or road which is a part of the county system of highways or which is a highway maintained by the State of Michigan. Traffic lanes and other space shall be provided, designated and kept open for access by ambulance, fire equipment, helicopter and other emergency vehicles. Prior to the issuance of a license, the chief law enforcement agency of the county, county road commission, State Department of Highways, and the State Police must approve the licensee's plan for access and traffic control.

k. **Parking 6.** The licensee shall provide a parking area sufficient to park not more than one (1) car per 300 sq. feet, including driveways and access to all parking spaces, but in no case shall he provide less than one automobile space for every four (4) attendants.

l. **Camping and Trailer Parking.** A licensee who permits attendants to remain on the premises between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m., shall provide for camping and trailer parking and facilities in accordance with Act 171, Public Acts of 1970, and the rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto, and in accordance with any other applicable provision by state or local law.

m. **Illumination.** The licensee shall provide electrical illumination of all occupied areas, including parking areas, sufficient to insure the safety and comfort of all attendants. All lighting shall be inspected by the county or state electrical inspector.

n. **Insurance.** Before the issuance of a license, the licensee shall obtain public liability insurance with limits of not less than \$500,000 and property damage insurance with a limit of not less than \$250,000 from a company or companies approved by the Commissioner of Insurance of the State of Michigan, which insurance shall insure liability for death or injury to persons or damage to property which may result from the conduct of the assembly or conduct incident thereto and which insurance shall remain in full force and effect in the specified amounts for the duration of the license. The evidence of insurance shall include an endorsement to the effect that the insurance company shall notify the supervisor of South Arm Township in writing, at least 10 days before the expiration or cancellation of said insurance.

The Licensee shall furnish proof of insurance to the supervisor of South Arm Township ten (10) days before the assembly.

o. **Bonding.** Before the issuance of a license, the licensee shall obtain, from a corporate bonding company authorized to do business in Michigan, a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$10,000, or in a form to be approved by the township attorney, conditioned upon the licensee's faithful compliance with all the terms and provisions of this ordinance and all applicable provisions of state or local law, and which shall indemnify the township, its agents, officers and employees and the board against any and all loss, injury or damage whatever arising out of or in any way connected with the assembly and which shall indemnify the owners of property adjoining the assembly site for any cost attributable to cleaning up and/or removing debris, trash, or other waste resultant from the assembly.

p. **Fire Protection.** The licensee shall, at his own expense, take adequate steps as determined by the local fire protection agency, State Fire Marshall, and enacted by the local fire department, to insure fire protection.

q. **Communications.** The licensee shall provide public telephone equipment for general use on the basis of at least one unit for each 1,000 attendants.

r. Such outdoor assemblies as require a license from the South Arm Township Board shall be conducted only between the hours of 12:00 noon and 11:30 p.m., except by special written permission from the township supervisor.

In case of inclement weather, the township supervisor may give permission. However, no assemblies shall extend beyond 12:00 p.m.

s. **Miscellaneous.** Prior to the issuance of a license, the board may impose specific conditions reasonably calculated to protect the health, safety, welfare, and property of attendants or of the citizens of the township. (See Section 7)

Section 11. Revocation

The board shall revoke a license whenever the licensee, or employee or agent fails, neglects or refuses to fully comply with any and all provisions and requirements set forth herein or with any and all provisions, regulations, ordinances, statutes, or other laws incorporated herein by reference.

Section 12. Violations

It shall be unlawful for a licensee, or employee, or agent, to knowingly:

- a. Advertise, promote, or sell tickets, conduct, or operate an assembly without first obtaining a license as herein provided.
- b. Conduct or operate an assembly in such a manner as to create a public or private nuisance.
- c. Conduct or permit, within the assembly, any obscene display, exhibition, show, play, entertainment, or amusement.
- d. Permit any person on the premises to cause or create a disturbance in, around, or near the assembly by obscene or disorderly conduct.
- e. Permit any person to unlawfully consume, sell, or possess intoxicating liquor while on the premises.
- f. Permit any person to unlawfully use, sell, or possess any narcotics, narcotic drugs, drugs, or other substances as defined in the Controlled Substance Act.

Any of the above enumerated violations is a separate offense, is a nuisance per se immediately enjoined in the circuit courts, and is punishable by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 90 days; or by a fine or not more than \$100.00, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

It is further provided that any of the above violations is a sufficient basis for revocation of the license and for the immediate enjoining in the circuit court of the assembly.

Section 13. Severability

If any portion of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be found to be invalid by a court, such invalidity shall not effect the remaining portions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid portion or application, provided such remaining portions are not determined by the court to be inoperable, and to this and this ordinance is declared to be severable.

Section 14. Conflicting regulations

Where there exists a conflict between any of the regulations or limitations prescribed in this ordinance and any other regulations applicable to the same matter, the regulations or limitations of this ordinance shall prevail.

Section 15. **Effective date:** This ordinance shall be effective 30 days after publication.

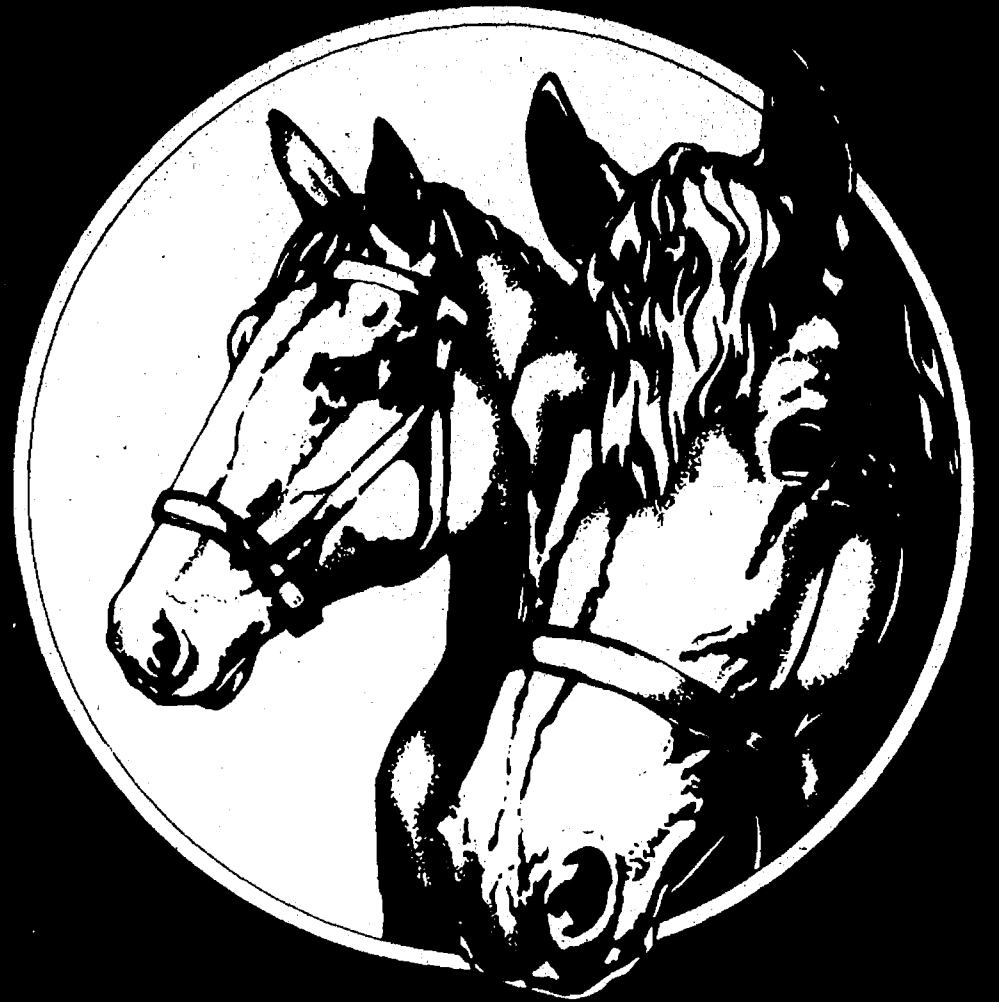

Newville pitched all eight innings to pick up the victory, as he allowed just five hits.

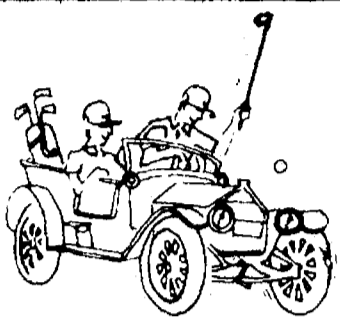
