Judge steps down for a new challenge

Doing a bit of a twist on the honorable career, Judge David W. Fershee is retiring from the bench after six years serving the 90th District Court in order to practice law.

"Basically," Fershee said in an interview with The Press, "when you reach six years you have to decide whether you want to stay with it for another 20 years or so."

Usually a judgeship follows a long career as a lawyer. In Fershee's case, it came after only two years.

Fershee was appointed to succeed Arthur Reibel, and he subsequently retained the position in an election.

Fershee explained his decision further. "If you wait too long, it's harder to leave. And, he concluded, "I felt I needed a new challenge."

After May 30 he will go into general practice, joining the firm of Pointner and Pajtas in Charlevoix.

He said he likes trial work as a lawyer because he likes the feeling of activity. As in his once-a-week teaching job at North Central Michigan College, he said, trial work has you speaking, organizing and presenting a case, being persuasive. He feels at ease in the role.

He sees the course in business law that he teaches at the college like his term as a judge. It is an opportunity to emphasize the benefit of law to the community. He has taught the course for five years.

Asked if he could tell how much change a judge could effect in a community, Fershee mused a bit.

"There is an opportunity to offer some kind of impact," he said, but there's no way of measuring it, no way of knowing when someone decided not to break the law, and so on.

"You can hope that your sentencing measures serve to deter someone from an illegal act."

He then noted he knew he had had a definite effect on administration in his court. He has set up a structure, hired and trained administrators for it, and the result, he said, is "we've gotten commendations from the State Court Administrator for being the best administered court in Region V."

One result, he added, has been "a fast docket."

In connection with the debate between those who want judges appointed and those who want them elected, Fershee agreed with those who argue that women stand a better chance of becoming judges in the elective process.

Election gives the woman a chance when an appointer is not interested in doing so, he noted, but added that there are some people who would give due regard to appointing women.

As to President Reagan's desire to have the states, rather than the federal government, responsible for equal rights, Fershee said, "I doubt that state by state alleviation of unfair laws would be better than the federal Equal Rights Amendment."

Judges are often asked, "Has crime increased?"

Fershee said that, of course, crime has increased in Michigan as the population has increased, and that it is also correlated with the rise and fall of unemployment.

He thinks the mood of despair in the country may affect it because then

people don't care as much. "The positive side—if you can word it that way," he smiled, "is in more and better law enforcement." Because of better trained officers, he said, there are more arrests, but not necessarily more crime.

But what about the balance of justice that seems to punish the common thief but not the sly business practice or the shoddy workman.

Fershee said people want the government to protect them from everything. "I think we are responsible for our own lives!" he stressed. "We have a duty to check around," he said in reference to finding out who did good work and what was a good product.

He agreed, however, that white collar crime was more devious than street crime. "We don't allocate the resources to ferret out white collar crimes. The money that it costs to prosecute these is phenomenal!"

In answering the question he often hears about "what can one person do?" Fershee was emphatic about the first step, which he said was: "A citizen can try not to victimize anyone else, and that includes their children."

He paused on that one, noting it is "a monumentally difficult job to raise children not to abuse themselves and others. That's the greatest thing," he said.

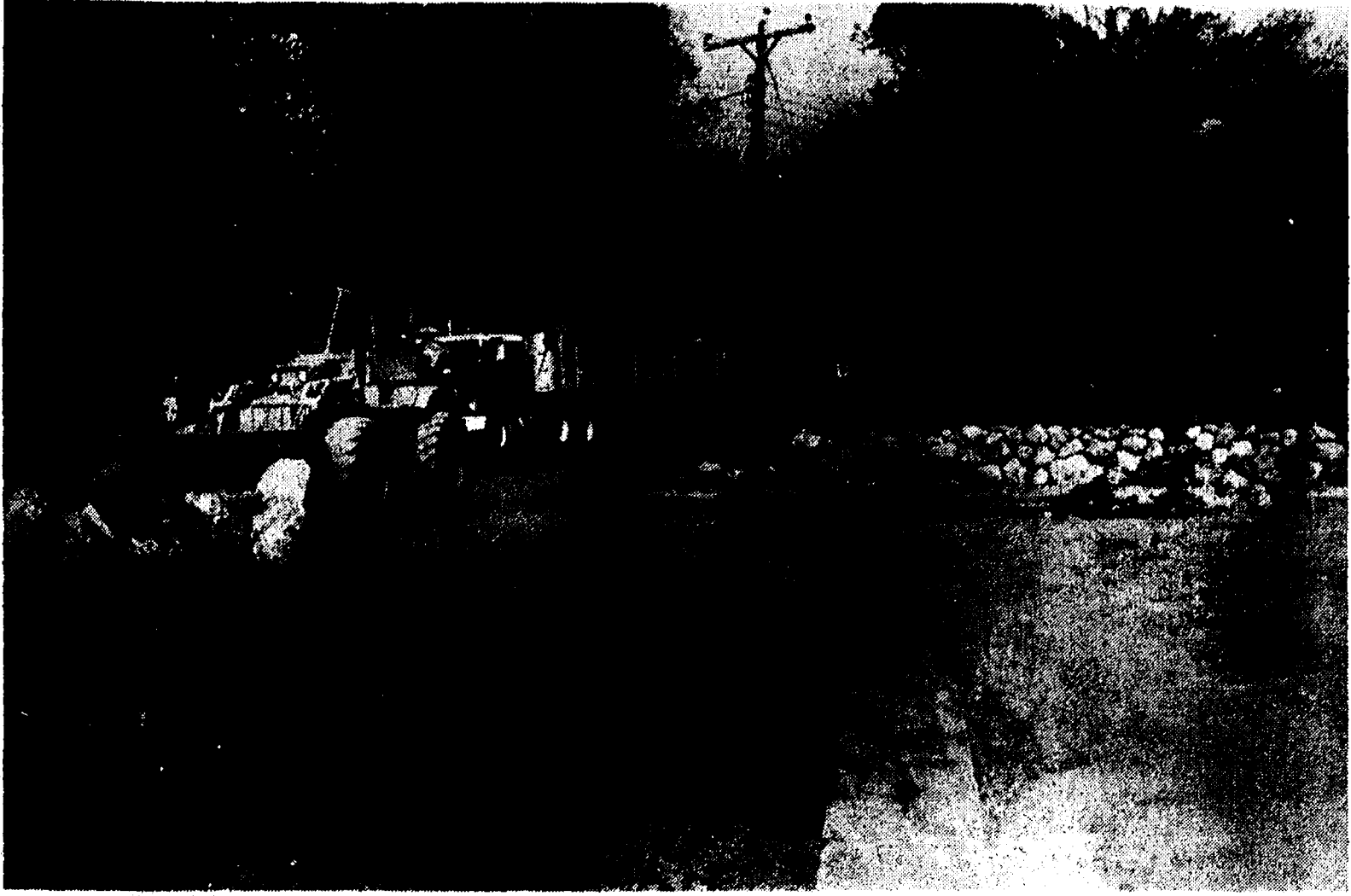
Fershee is married and has three daughters. He takes fatherhood very seriously.

He advised in getting after community problems or world problems, "Pick out your cause and get started. But first look at your family and see what you can do there."

"Beyond that there are certainly organizations." He mentioned the Women's Resource Center in Petoskey.

He added, "A lot of people take a cause and lift it from nothing, and cited as an example a woman who is now touring the state, giving seminars to Chambers of Commerce and other groups on prevention of shoplifting."

Fershee's comments about causes in general were that you often want to throw up your hands, but even if you can't measure the effect, you do keep after things.

Petition drive stalls Eveline condo project

Property owners around Hemingway Point don't like to give their names because they believe it's a whole neighborhood, not just one or two leaders objecting to the proposed condominiums on Lake Charlevoix.

A group of them came to a March 3 hearing at Eveline Township Hall on rezoning the property from R-1 to R-3, later submitting a petition opposed to the Landmark Development Company request for multiple-housing zoning, and signed by about 200 residents.

Art Seaborne, president of Landmark, received approval, in spite of the petition, from the township board on April 14, following favorable recommendations by Charlevoix Planning Commission and the township planning commission.

His proposal is for 72 units, a \$10-million project, to be built over a period of five years along 4,000 feet of lakefront just north of Ironton Ferry on the east side of the lake.

Neighbors at first were concerned about sewage, but Seaborne's plan is for a self-contained system, approved by the Charlevoix County Health Department.

A second petition has been circulated and signed by 123 landholders—27 percent of those voting in the last gubernatorial election. Those who carried the petition said it was an objection to R-3 zoning. They told The Press they "wish to keep the single family tradition in the township."

They stressed they realize more and more people will keep coming up north to summer and to live year around, but they want "healthy but controlled development of the lakeshore."

They object to the condominiums as

precedent-setting. Other townships are watching what will happen here, they said. No townships on Lake Charlevoix have condos yet.

The condos, they pointed out, are like motels, because they are rented out by the week and occasionally even by the night.

"We want a stable type of resident," they said.

Furthermore, they said, condos probably wouldn't supply any larger tax base than the homes would nor any more employment. Seaborne pegs the tax base of his proposal at \$200,000.

They described Seaborne's plan as buildings "strung out as close to the shore as the law allows," and not much screened by the rather stunted trees growing in shallow soil along the lake.

Seaborne's response was that "the real thing is they don't want any more people up here."

He said he and his organization talked to 25 or 30 people who signed the petition, and got a variety of explanations, including just not wanting more people.

Some said they were told, "If you don't sign it, the township will have to pay for water and sewer," which is "a complete fabrication," he said.

Township supervisor Dave Willson said the petition had been submitted, but the clerk hadn't yet cleared it through its various stages to the point of knowing when the referendum would be voted. He said it would take at least several weeks.

This throws Seaborne's plans off. He was ready to begin as soon as possible. As Willson said, "He had all his permits and approvals, and that takes quite a while."

If the referendum vote were to stop

his condo plans, Seaborne said, "We'd sue them because there's no multiple zoning (in the township)."

He explained the law says there must be every type of housing in a zoning code. So far there are no multiples in Eveline. He said his attorneys were confident his suit would be okayed.

On the other hand, he said he was having alternative plans drawn up with detached condos and housing.

His main design had always been for grouping the housing together in 10 percent of the land to leave the other 90 percent open. And he pointed out the total ratio of people to land was less dense than it would be if broken up into lots with houses.

The concept is relatively new and it is a way of keeping large open areas of land from being "waffled" into small squares.

The battle seems to be drawn between the two types of development.

The 100 acres that Seaborne has proposed to keep natural rather fit conservancy programs. Seaborne has conferred with executive director Susanne Dye of Little Traverse Conservancy, and with its chairman, John Fischer.

She said it is possible something may yet be worked out, or possibly the township could hold the conservancy if Seaborne's proposal goes through.

This would ensure the land's being kept from development. Conservancies do not necessarily take ownership, but they do limit what is done on the land. The donation of this kind of conservation easement also acts as a tax deduction for the owner.

But the petitioners say, "If the lake became inundated (with condos), we'd kick ourselves for not having done anything. The tide is moving north."

No! County thumps Proposal A

Charlevoix County turned down Proposal A by about the same overwhelming percentage as voters throughout the rest of the state last Tuesday.

Nearly 74 percent of those voting in Charlevoix County voted against the proposal, which would have cut property taxes in half while raising the state sales tax.

The proposal suffered its worst defeat in Wilson Township, where 83.1 percent voted no, while 82.5 percent voted against it in Melrose.

Proposal A lost in every municipality in the county, but it received more support in East Jordan than anywhere else. Only 57 percent voted against it in East Jordan.

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CHARLEVOIX COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
APRIL 8, 1981

A meeting of the Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners was called to order at 9:35 AM by Chairman Clyde Cunningham.

ROLL CALL

Gardeners arise! Cheer the rain and bacteria!

Everyone is equal under the sun. But in the rain it is different. Under rain clouds the non-gardener is not equal to the gardener.

When it rains, gardeners rejoice. Unlike your regular variety non-gardener golfer, gardeners sit on the porch with contentment curling their toes as they declare to each other, "You can just see the leaves get greener!"

Along with Mothers' Day and Labor Day, gardeners celebrate their own Ecological Gardeners' Day. It's the day in winter when the first seed catalog arrives.

At the proper time, usually as a reward for getting chores done, gardeners sink into a comfortable chair and begin to turn the magic pages.

Some study the new offerings—the zebra-striped petunias, the double-triple hollyhocks. Some practice botanical names, murmuring anchusa, aquilegia as they go.

I tend to fold down corners of pages with pictures of blue flowers on them.

In Michigan I know only two common wild flowers that are blue (not counting

violets)—chicory and viper's bugloss (an appalling name!).

This is a big concern because my garden's most startling success is the wild flowers that volunteer themselves among the broccoli, etc. I haven't the heart to weed them out. Daisies, primroses, cinquefoil, star thistles, Queen Anne's lace, asters, and bouncing bet. White, yellow, pink, and lavender.

By August they are great creatures, a-tumble with bloom, among whom the broccoli try to pursue their civilized way.

So besides hungering for broccoli, one hungers for blue.

From January to August is a long time, but catalog aficionados are helpless before page after page of full-color. Before the January evening is done, they've filled out the order form, and are standing, a little shaken after totalling the cost, but still undeterred, gazing out on the snowbanks where the garden will be.

Among other mysteries of gardening, there's an unexplored but nonetheless pronounced correlation between the depth of snow in January and the size of flower and shrub orders.

Three months later, shaking seed packets like miniature maracas, there the gardeners are, saying to each other, "What am I going to do with all these seeds! Want to trade half my carrots for half of your larkspurs?"

But not if they have cats.

During April and May, I am thankful for the excess sprouting in the outer edges of the flats by the windows. The plants in the middle always become permanently depressed. I haven't yet

determined the perfect anti-cat device.

Just when everything is figured out, the cat leaps for a moth dancing on the window glass.

While the verbena and tomato plants struggle along indoors, the gardener goes out to Prepare The Soil, complaining to the nearest non-gardener but actually drawn like the apple to Newton's head.

In spite of the fact that Nature manages to use every square inch of it,

the gardener feels the soil is never right.

It's true that the first tomato plants I ever set out promptly became a case of arrested development. They stayed that way all summer long. Heavy clay soil.

That fall I became a leaf-thief, collecting the bags of leaves people so thoughtfully left at the curbs.

Hundreds of them. It got so I couldn't drive past a coterie of those fat black plastic bags.

I took them all home and emptied them in what was to be a gigantic compost pile. At first, though, it was a gigantic toy for the children.

In due time the leaves decomposed,

helped by being mixed with thin layers of soil and some kitchen parings. After a couple of years the leaves were no longer recognizable. They had become beautiful, sweet-smelling, black humus. Out of which tomatoes grow the following year in delirious redundancy. I lost count of the tomatoes harvested from my four plants.

They say bacteria in leaf compost know just what a plant wants and arrange it. Even if a plant requires a much more acid soil than Michigan commonly supplies, it will thrive in bacteria-adjusted composted soil.

Now that already it is May, gardeners, arise! Cheer on the bacteria.



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

New superintendent can be turning point for EJ schools

We extend our best wishes, congratulations and most of all good luck to Tom Rossler, East Jordan's new school superintendent.

We also commend the East Jordan Board of Education for conducting a thorough, unhurried selection process. The board members obviously realized that their decision on the new superintendent would probably be one of the most important ones they would make. They interview-

ed no less than 10 candidates for the job and visited the communities of their top three choices before hiring Rossler.

We think the board acted wisely in choosing someone who has been a superintendent, rather than giving "on the job training" to an ambitious but untested applicant.

Only time will tell if the board made a good choice, but all the problems that led up to and followed last fall's teachers' strike in East Jordan, the board certainly didn't have to engage in fantasy to dream up tough questions for the superintendent interviews.

Hopefully, the hiring of the new superintendent (and perhaps even passing the June 8 millage request) will be a turning point for the school district.

No matter what has happened in the past, new leadership should be a perfect opportunity to forget old grudges, find common ground and start building the cooperative arrangements that everyone would like to see in the operation of a school system.

After a high point following the Twin Valley merger and passage of the bond issue for a new high school, the past two years have been quite a

letdown in East Jordan. The first year started with growing pains brought about by the move into the new building and problems getting settled ultimately led to the resignation of the high school principal and calls for the removal of Supt. Mel Rullman. The current year, of course, was doomed by three millage failures, the teachers' strike and failure to iron out contact through the entire school year.

Needless to say, the morale of the teachers, administrators, board members and community has been quite low for some time.

It would be nice if the new superintendent could take over with a clean slate...that is with no unresolved hassles hanging over his head. But there's only a month left before he officially takes the helm—and a breakthrough seems unlikely—especially since school has been prolonged for three weeks because of last fall's strike.

So, Tom Rossler will be saddled with a big headache right off the bat. It could make him or break him very quickly.

If a contract settlement is reached in July or August, whether Rossler has a lot to do with it or not, it will be seen as a big victory for him. He'll have the "honeymoon" period that new leaders deserve.

But if there is no contract in those two short months and another strike is called in September, all those old battle lines will be drawn again. The teachers and the new superintendent will be enemies before his first school year has even started.

Rossler has a big job ahead of him, and we wish him luck. Hopefully, he will be able to offer a clear head, unbiased by past prejudices, in working out compromises that will bring together a polarized community.

He came to Michigan in 1850 and the family settled in Hillsdale Co., where he grew to young manhood...In 1868 he married Miss Clara Sharp, in New Troy, Berrien Co. Two sons, Loren and Schuyler were born to them there, who came with their parents to the then wilderness of Charlevoix Co., in 1872... Mr. Stackus has always been a carpenter and farmer until about eight years ago, when he entered the furniture and undertaking business in Boyne City, but on account of failing health he disposed of his business to his son Schuyler who still conducts the same on Lake Street. Mr. Stackus' father, now

The Boyne City State Bank had capital of \$25,000 and surplus of \$2,000. "There's a dollar at each end of a Thousand, and the first one is the Biggest," read their ad in the February, 1904 issue. That same issue contained an ad for the E.A. Ruegsegger Insurance Agency: "Fire, liability, accident and plate glass."

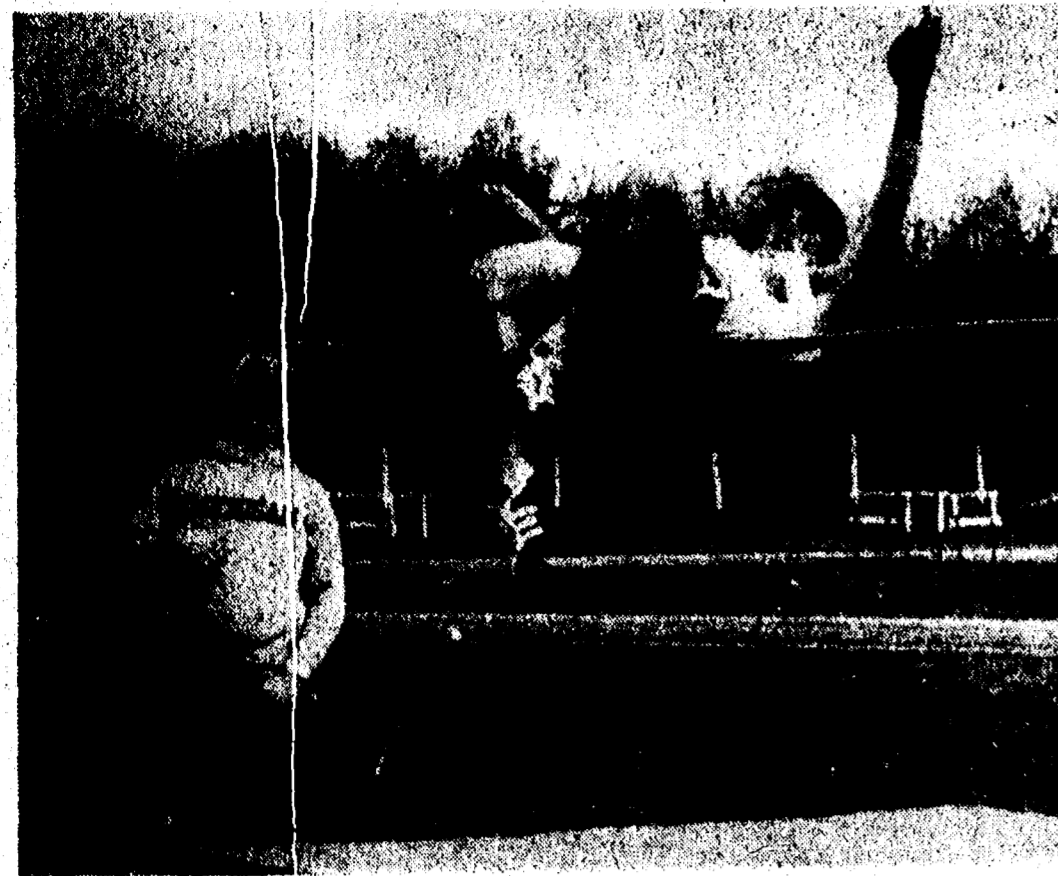

Great week for EJ trackmen

EAST JORDAN - The boys' track team has completed a hectic but rewarding week in which they took first place in the Ski Valley League and the Petoskey Relays, plus second place in a field of 20 teams in their regional meet at Posen.

Seniors Randy Morris and DuWayne Dougherty were the standouts according to coach Mike Bos, but they got plenty of help from underclassmen.

Morris scored 32½ points and Dougherty 30½ enroute to the league title, as East Jordan piled up 150 points to 143 for second place Manclona.

Manclona nipped East Jordan 111-97 in the regional, with Johannesburg a distant third with 39 points.

Seven Red Devils finished in the top three in the regional and qualified for the state meet, which will be held this weekend. They include:

--Dave Karliskin, a junior who won the discus with a throw of 139-10 in the regional and followed it with another first place in the league meet.

--Barry Mumich, a freshman who took second in the regional in the 100 and 200 meter dashes with times of 11.31 and 23.6 seconds, respectively. Mumich also took second in the conference meet in the 100 yd. dash, third in the 220 yd. dash, and ran on two winning relay teams in the regional and one in the conference meet.

--Junior Bill Spence placed second in the shot put in the regional and third in the conference, the latter on a toss of 45'6¼"--just a half inch shy of the school record. Spence also ran on the league champion 440 yd. relay team and placed fourth in the conference in the discus.

--Junior Steve Graham took third in the regional in both the shot put and discus, second in the conference in discus and ran on the winning 400 meter relay squad in the regional and 440 yd. squad in the conference.

--Larry Huckle ran on the regional-winning 800 meter relay team as well as the conference champion 440 yd. squad. Other standouts included Dan Nachazel, a sophomore who placed second in the league meet with a leap of 10'6" (after tying the long-standing school record of 11 ft. earlier in the season.); junior Tim Russell, who finished fifth in the conference in the two-mile run in his first season on the track team; and Rick Hawley, who placed third in the league in the 800 yd. run and sixth in the regional in the 400 meter dash.

Dawson Way, spokesman for the Marion Township Citizens-Safety Committee appears before the Board to discuss the Committee's objectives with regard to Castle Farms. Mr. Way then called on Dennis McClellan, a local business man, who explains that the general consensus among area businesses was that the concerts did not bring an increase in revenue, and that in fact, there were problems with shoplifting, etc. during concerts. Richard Krueger, Charlevoix Area Hospital Administrator, pointed out that the hospital requires additional emergency room staffing during concerts and that there is frequently a serious problem with traffic when emergency calls are received during concerts. She indicated that the Committee is doing research in other counties and other states to see how various localities have handled similar problems.

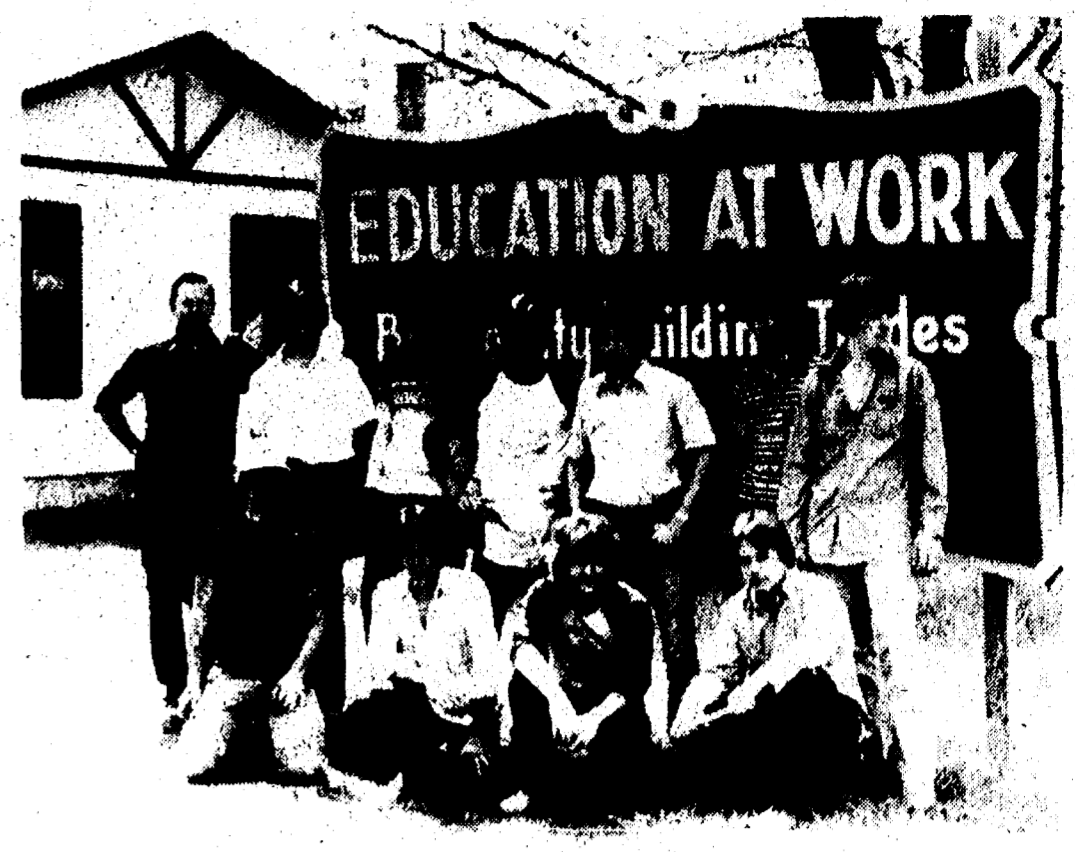
