## New petitions seek removal of EJ's Ashton

A legal petition seeking the removal of Harry (Bud) Ashton, high school principal in East Jordan, is being circulated this week prior to presentation to the school board on Tuesday, April 13.

The board gave notice to middle school principal Doug Shields nearly a month ago in a move to economize. Since then a citizens' committee has been asking that Shields be made high school principal in place of Ashton.

At a special board meeting March 23, the committee presented its own petition, signed by 636 residents.

Approximately 180 of the signers were students, whose signatures, committee leader Gigi Antoine said, are important. The students are right there, she pointed out. About 174 of the students signing were from the high school; another 30 were from the middle school.

Ashton was hired three years ago to provide strong discipline. Petition signers say that Shields would provide discipline, but at the same time keep a better relationship with the students and parents.

They add that Shields has served the school system longer, so that in an economy move it would be more fair to keep Shields.

The carriers of the second petition must be certified voters in the school district and signatures must be made in the carrier's presence, Antoine said.

She said further that about 30 letters have been sent to Dr. Philip Runkle, state superintendent of public education, asking for an investigation of the school board's decision.

On the evening of the school board meeting, April 13, when the petition will be presented, Antoine said, they may be having a peaceful demonstration in front of the school.

Shields was notified March 9 his contract would not be renewed for next year as part of an economy move that would eliminate the middle school.

Middle school age students would go to either the high school or elementary, but the grade split has not yet been determined.

Upset parents and students met March 12 and formed the committee which circulated the first petition asking that Shields be retained as high school principal.

## East Jordan reduces budget for 1982-83

East Jordan's proposed budget for 1982-83, totaling \$1,281,323, is down from last year's \$1,394,025.

But clerk-treasurer Fern Morris said the city may have to alter it after the state provides the state equalization figure.

When that will be is not clear. The new truth-in-taxation state law requires the city council to hold a special meeting if the budget must be amended.

Meantime, the city council will hold a budget hearing on Tuesday, April 13, at 7 p.m. At a special meeting following the hearing, councilmen will vote on the budget.

As it stands, the new budget allows for going ahead with airport improve-

ment (\$35,000), a new roof on the reservoir (\$12,000), higher wages for police and street employees negotiated by the Teamsters' Union, and repairs on municipal buildings to reduce fuel and lighting expenses.

The clerk-treasurer's salary will rise nine percent. The police chief's pay will go up 10 percent to stay on a par with the salary increases negotiated for the police force.

Savings were instituted in such items as insurance coverage, supplies cuts, and in reducing the caretaker term at Elm Point to summers only.

The largest single source of revenue for the city will be local property taxes.

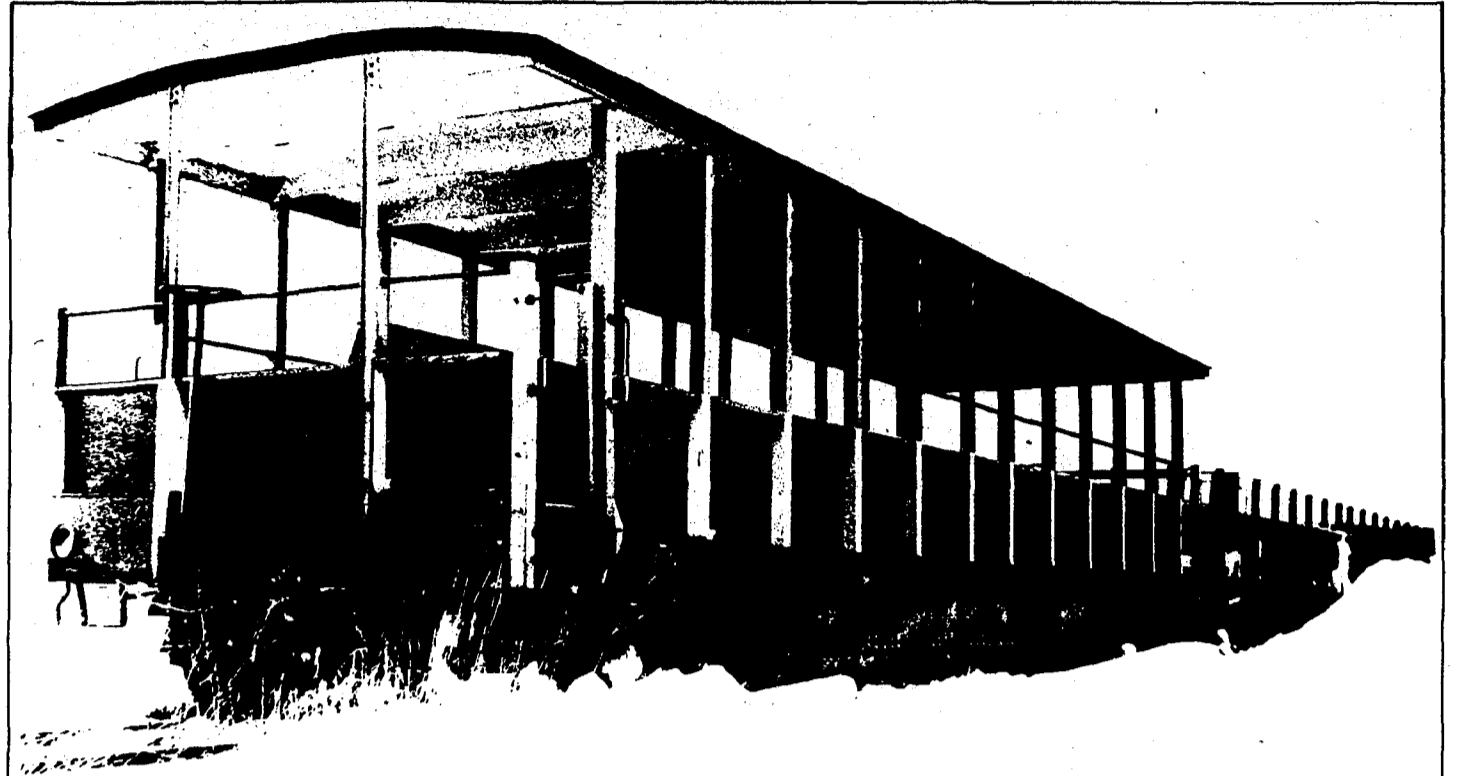
Kuhn finished third in the state finals in the giant slalom event.

## End of the line for BVRR?

The Boyne Valley Railroad may be at the end of the line.

Unless someone comes forward with an offer to buy the entire railroad before May 1, the train and tracks will be sold in pieces.

The citizen-owners of the tourist train are taking bids from possible purchasers of the rolling stock, track and other property of the railroad.

There are three people who have said they may be potential purchasers of the entire railroad, board of directors members Art Rouse and Dennis Coy said, and the board would prefer to sell the whole package.

But the board is prepared to sell off the individual pieces, which include rail and ties, seven cars and a depot building.

The 12-member board will be meeting in closed session on Saturday, May 1, to consider the offers it receives.

If it receives an offer that will keep the railroad intact, it would most likely accept it even if offers for pieces total more than the single bid, Coy said.

The train did not run last summer, but was operated independently for four weeks of color tours in the autumn.

More than 200 stockholders, most of

them area residents, are shareholders in the venture. Last summer they voted to take a return of \$8 a share on their stock, which they paid \$10 a share for in 1976.

The citizens bought the railroad at an auction after it ceased operations in the mid-1970s.

The tourist train ran for 7.2 miles between Boyne City and Boyne Falls. That right-of-way is part of what's being offered for sale. There are over 300 separate parcels of land for sale.

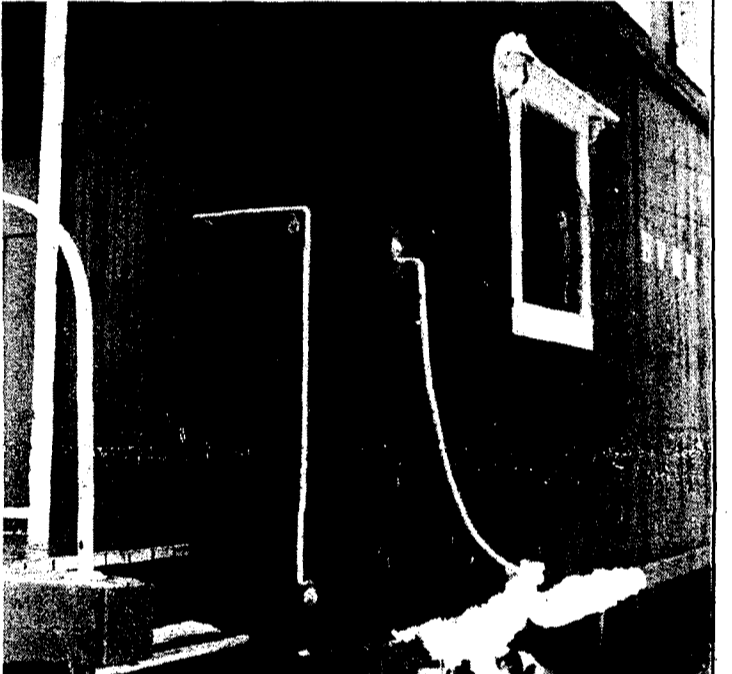
Other items for sale include 10 miles of ties and rails, two Pullman cars, three open cars, a flat car and a caboose. There are also the depot building in Boyne Falls and two water towers.

The railroad does not have an engine at this time.

Rouse has a complete listing for potential bidders. He may be reached at Post Office Box 260, Boyne City, or by phoning 582-9674.

Efforts have been made in past years to obtain a buyer for the railroad. Rouse said he thought he was close to completing a deal in the fall, but negotiations fell through.

The seven-mile rail line is all that is left of what once was the Boyne City-Gaylord-Alpena Railroad. It began as a logging line in 1893.

## Youth art goes on display

"If we had more space, we'd take them all." Edith Gilbert, member of Crooked Tree Arts Council, was speaking of the 10th annual art show of work done by students in Charlevoix and Emmet county schools.

Space requirements, however, limit each school to 18 entries, Gilbert said. The paintings, drawings and sculpture of many kinds are on display Mondays through Saturdays, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., through Thursday, April 29. Always a popular show, the Youth Art exhibit draws adult viewers as well as young people.

According to Sandy Seldon of the arts center, the show will also feature work done by Arts Council volunteers and coordinators, and work by students at arts center classes.

"Marvelous—very creative," is the way Gilbert described the entries, which range from those produced by five- and six-year-old children to those by high schoolers.

East Jordan High School art teacher Dick Cunningham said his students will be represented by everything from small pencil sketches to a three- by five-foot painting.

"It's all very special stuff," he said. He added that he could have sent in things as nice from 20 other students in his classes.

East Jordan's elementary school art classes have been cut this year, although they have entered in previous years.

Elementary school work from Boyne City will be on display. The teacher there is Betty Adgate.

Gilbert noted the McCune Center has been scheduling busloads of students to see the show. She said guides will be on hand to take groups through and to answer questions.

## Irwin seeks business tax changes

Nothing has been as upsetting to our small businesses as the imposition of the single business tax in 1975. And today nothing is more important than seeking to improve our business climate.

The Milliken administration has consistently supported the single business tax as a fair tax and has recently revealed studies supporting its fairness.

Currently before the legislature we find two specific approaches to dealing with the single business tax. First, Senate Bill 240 seeks to amend the single business tax top return small businesses (with business activity under \$6 million gross) to essentially a base profits tax. Second, Senate Bill 166, would among other things, repeal the

single business tax.

The Senate has already passed Senate Bill 240, which now sits in the House Committee on Taxation. I voted in favor of this measure, which would specifically provide single business tax relief for our small businesses, and I hope the House will move the bill.

Outright repeal does not enjoy the support of the governor nor legislative leaders. Recently, a motion to discharge Senate Bill 166 from the Senate Finance Committee was made. I supported the discharge motion primarily to continue the pressure to either repeal or significantly amend the tax.

Although all other Democrats refused to vote on the issue, I felt it my responsibility to press for some form of single business tax relief. Although I can't agree with all provisions of Senate Bill 166, by putting the issue before the

full Senate I feel strongly that the leadership in both parties would press even harder to give relief, especially through Senate Bill 240.

In addition, Senate Bill 360 would also exclude worker's compensation and unemployment insurance from the base for single business tax liability. I support this bill, too.

Frankly, I stood as a maverick Democrat on this issue of discharge. I don't believe Senate Bill 166 is the total answer, but through amendments to the bill, we could have incorporated language of Senate Bill 240 and Senate Bill 360 and made the single business tax a more fair and progressive business tax.

Clearly, we must act to provide single business tax relief for our small businesses, and I shall continue to try to achieve that goal.

## Summer tax collection beneficial

We're in for some valuable spinoffs if the summer school tax collection bill becomes law.

The House passed its version of the legislation last week, which provides a method for local and intermediate school districts to collect one-half or all of their property taxes in the summer beginning in 1983.

While many of our larger school districts already receive property tax

revenue in the summer under an existing law, cities and townships have also been able to refuse to collect summer taxes. The new legislation merely gives schools an alternative when the city or township chooses not to make summer collections. It provides schools with the option of collecting the taxes themselves, either through the county or independently.

Where's the value? Mainly in the money market. An increasingly large number of schools are finding it

necessary to borrow money against local taxes in order to open each fall. Taking them out of a borrowing situation will leave more funds for the private sector.

School financial experts say that Michigan school districts will have to borrow at least \$1 billion in fiscal 1982-83 at interest costs of more than \$100 million. Summer school tax collections will end that need.

Since the legislation prohibits schools from borrowing against current property taxes if they collect summer taxes, they will effectively be removed from the overburdened financial market.

While the first year may be a little awkward for property owners who budget their tax bill for later in the year, there is a potential advantage to taxpayers to have tax bills spread more evenly. An even larger advantage is the savings local school districts will make by avoiding high interest payments for their yearly borrowing. How much better to plunge that \$100 million of interest money into school programs and operation.

## 'Super bullet' should be outlawed in state

They're called assassin's bullets and they can rip through three men standing back to back even though each of them is wearing protective armor. They're manufactured in Michigan, and even though they're marked "for police use only," they're sold over the counter.

The possession, sale, or manufacture of the hard fast slugs made of machine steel or a combination of zinc and brass would be a felony under a bill requested by Republican Leader William Bryant, as well as under an amendment to a bill banning exploding bullets, like the one used in an assassination attempt against President Reagan, requested by Rep. Ernest Nash, a former state trooper.

I support the concept entirely, and I will actively work for the passage of this type of legislation.

Most Michigan police departments, including the Michigan State Police, don't use these bullets for anything other than criminal ballistic tests because their capacity to inflict serious or fatal damage is so much greater than other bullets.

They're powerful enough to stop cars, but our law enforcement agencies generally believe it's a bad policy to shoot at moving vehicles, so they just aren't used as protection or prevention here.

The hard super bullets penetrate farther and faster than the softer core lead bullets because they do not flatten out. They are coated with Teflon to protect the rifling of the weapon. Otherwise the gun barrel would be damaged after firing just a few rounds. And because the Teflon reduces the friction of the bullet, it increases the penetration.

Both proposals would ban bullets that are made from anything other than lead. Outlawing the manufacture of the Pontiac-made super bullet would simply lead to the production of a different bullet from slightly different components, but the devastating effects would be the same.

The Bryant bill would exempt police agencies from possessing the super

bullets so they could be used for comparison tests in crime labs. The Nash amendment, however, would not. But whichever measure comes before us first, we've got to take fast action now to stop the legal sale of a bullet so deadly that few of us could survive it.

Maintaining the police department will cost \$152,700. The fire department and ambulance squad will cost \$40,000 and \$50,000, respectively, to run. Townships receiving ambulance service pay half the city's operating costs.

which will generate \$262,000. Federal and state revenue-sharing plans will contribute a combined total of \$170,000 to city coffers.

The city also expects to make about \$61,000 in interest from investments and will collect about \$59,000 in fees for services it provides at a cost.


The largest single area of expenditures is in general government, which includes the council, office workers, insurance, fuel for city buildings, street lighting and a host of other services.

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

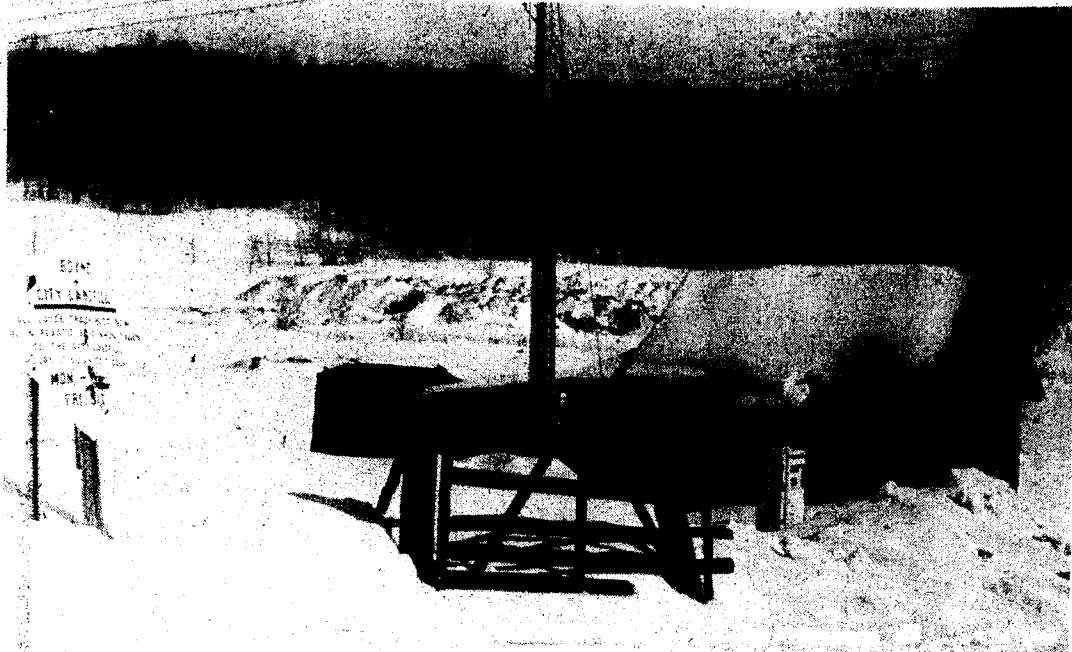

## Iron Works seeks planner view

Concerned with government planners' attitudes about heavy industry, East Jordan Iron Works president Bruce Malpass asked the county planning commission what it thinks is the "right kind" of industry for the county.

Malpass spoke to the planning commission at its Thursday, April 1, meeting.

He said the company is interested in the views of planning groups because it is reinvesting heavily in its East Jordan foundry and wants to know if planners are contemplating any actions which would adversely affect his firm.

Planning commissioners did not directly respond to his questions about what type of industry they desired or how their activities would impact on the Iron Works.

A couple spoke about how heavy industry could co-exist with surrounding property owners and how a resort atmosphere could be retained in a community even with the presence of an industrial facility, such as the Iron Works or the Medusa Cement plant in Charlevoix.

Malpass said it was important for industry and government to communicate well, so that both parties were operating with complete information and proper decisions were made.

Malpass was recently named to the economic development citizens' advisory committee of the Northwest Michigan Regional Planning and

Development Commission.

The Iron Works, he said, has a commitment to its present location — it will celebrate its 100th anniversary in East Jordan next year — even though it is regularly approached by other states to relocate.

Reinvestment of profits into new machinery and processes has exceeded \$2 million annually in recent years, he said, and the firm has experienced a "slow, orderly growth" for the past 30-40 years.

Malpass said he is not sure the recession has bottomed out and the firm is anticipating a slow spring.

While adult education classes in East Jordan and Boyne City continue through the semester, a new series of enrichment classes begins on Monday, April 12.

Classes are usually not large—the minimum is eight—so individual questions are easier to ask. And they also meet at the school buildings in the evenings.

There are about 268 workers on the job at this time, he said. The firm's maximum employment level, he said, is 550 people.

After Malpass' talk, county commissioner Oscar Ward, who is a member of the county Economic Development Corporation, told his fellow planning commissioners that EDC members were intent on trying to help existing businesses before enticing new ones to the area.

The EDC was formed a year ago to help businesses expand, stay in the area or move into the area.

The differences are that adult ed aims the student toward attainment of a high school diploma while enrichment classes are mainly for leisure time activities. And, adult ed is free, while enrichment classes carry a small fee for everyone except senior citizens.

A list of the new class offerings in each city was mailed to all area houses last week.

Some are old favorites—golf, photography, slimnastics—and some are about things people may have never before thought about—herbs, sign language, yoga.

Community education director Shelly Martin said she has tried to combine possible needs with the possibility of widening horizons. Thus, courses on gardening, clothes alteration and small engine repair are also available.

In past classes, people have picked up totally new interests. While it is true, some have put them down again ("I haven't used my camera since then."), others have actually begun careers, and the rest found they could do something new.

Community ed secretary Vivian Pearl said with driving easier now she expects the springtime classes to fill up quickly.

The brochure lists hours, fees and instructors. Information may also be obtained by calling 582-6765.

## Burglar shoots at store owner

Sheriff's deputies are hunting for an armed man who shot at a store owner who confronted him during a break-in.

Frank Cieslak, owner of Frank's Deer Lake Trading Post, was alerted by an alarm system that someone

was in the store on Deer Lake Road in Wilson Township at 2:20 a.m. Sunday, April 4.

When Cieslak entered the store, he saw an armed man wearing a green army coat and a black ski mask, according to sheriff's reports. The man was

about 5-foot-8 to 5-foot-10 and weighed about 160 pounds, Cieslak told deputies.

The man fired several shots as he fled on foot through newly fallen snow. Deputies traced the footsteps for several hours but he eluded capture.

Have solid waste disposal planners green-boxed themselves into a corner? In selecting what they think is the best method to deal with future trash problems, they may be giving one garbage collector the opportunity to drive others out of business.

That is one of the issues the Charlevoix County Solid Waste Planning Committee is expected to deal with when it meets Thursday, April 8, at 7:30 p.m. in the county courthouse annex.

The committee has been working to put together short-term and long-term plans to deal with solid waste disposal. A recent state law governing rubbish elimination requires that each county adopt such plans.

At the heart of the problems the committee has encountered is the law's stringent licensing requirements for landfills. The state Department of Natural Resources says none of the present municipal landfills in the county can be licensed under the statute — Public Act 641.

The only dump which would qualify for licensing is the Charlevoix Garbage Service landfill near Ironton. Both Boyne City and East Jordan have been fighting to keep their facilities open, although the DNR says it can see no way they could meet the licensing requirements.

The possibility of helping to create a monopoly exists because the Charlevoix Garbage Service landfill is privately owned and could, theoretically, charge other garbage haulers such high rates that they could not compete with CGS collectors.

This possibility was brought out by Oscar Ward, a county commissioner and member of the solid waste panel, during last week's county planning commission meeting.

County planner Larry Sullivan has asked prosecutor Scott Beatty to research the law to see if there is some way the county could regulate the landfill — much in the same manner the state regulates private utilities which provide a monopolistic service.

The short-term solution selected by the committee was to designate the CGS landfill as the primary dumping site and the Antrim-Kalkaska landfill as alternate, while setting up small transfer stations in Boyne and East Jordan and keeping present "green boxes" in Melrose and Boyne Valley townships.

The transfer stations are collection and compaction units where refuse is stored until it is carted to a landfill. Green boxes are collection units that are hauled to the landfill, dumped and returned.

These facilities would be municipally owned, as are the present city landfills. The Antrim-Kalkaska landfill is a dump cooperatively operated near Kalkaska by those two counties. It is the only landfill in the northwest presently licensed under Act 641.

Five "type III" landfills — used only to dispose of dry, non-rotting matter such as construction

materials, fly ash from the electrical plant at Advance and foundry sand from the East Jordan Iron Works — would also be established.

The 20-year (or long-term) option selected by planners is to continue the same operation by either enlarging the CGS landfill — which is expected to be full in eight to 10 years — or placing a large transfer station there.

When the solid waste planners meet Thursday, they will be discussing management options that might be built into the plan.

Sullivan said these include the possibilities of offering franchises on service areas, of having municipalities get into the garbage pick-up business and of forming an enforcement agency which would have powers to inspect landfills and issue violation notices.

The solid waste panel is comprised of 13 members representing the county and local governments, the industry and environmental concerns.

Classes are usually not large—the minimum is eight—so individual questions are easier to ask. And they also meet at the school buildings in the evenings.

The differences are that adult ed aims the student toward attainment of a high school diploma while enrichment classes are mainly for leisure time activities. And, adult ed is free, while enrichment classes carry a small fee for everyone except senior citizens.

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Community ed secretary Vivian Pearl said with driving easier now she expects the springtime classes to fill up quickly.

# Sport in the area

## Good sized steelhead catches reported

Good sized steelhead trout are being caught in the Boyne and Jordan rivers, says the state Department of Natural Resources.

Most of the fish are taken on spawn, the DNR reports.

The DNR says fishing on trout streams during the early trout season is generally light because of high water and severe weather.

The peak steelhead runs have been predicted a little later than usual this year because of the heavy snows.

They should be peaking about now on western Michigan rivers, according to the Auto Club of Michigan, which says peak runs won't hit east Michigan until the mid-April to mid-May period. Stated James Drury,

Auto Club travel operations manager, "The melting snow would keep rivers cold, meaning a longer-than-usual period of stream temperatures below the optimum 40- to 45-degree range needed for spawning activity and best fishing."

Some 300,000 six- to 15-pound silvery fighters planted as 6- to 10-inchers in 1979 and 1980

will enter 36 streams, around the state. There also should be a good run of immature "skippers" weighing 2 to 4 pounds.

The best west Michigan fishing should be on the St. Joseph River between Buchanan and the Grand River system. Other good spots are along the Muskegon and Manistee rivers.

Lake Huron standouts

should include the Ocqueoc River near Huron Beach, the Au Gres River's East Branch and the Au Sable near Oscoda.

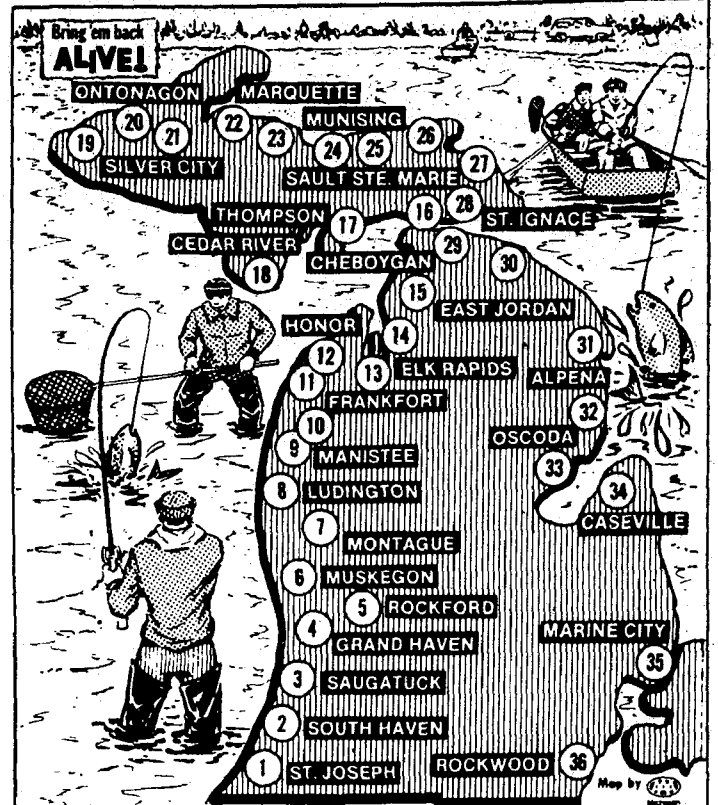
Pier fishermen should find good results at the Pigeon River's mouth at Caseville in the Thumb.

In southeast Michigan, best steelheading should be on the St. Clair River for trollers and on the

Huron River for shore and wading fishermen.

Upper Peninsula anglers should find peak action at Thompson Creek's mouth and on the Big Cedar along Lake Michigan, the Ontonagon, Little Garlic and Two Hearted along Lake Superior and the Carp on Lake Huron.

The regular trout season begins April 24.

## Fish eating warning

Some people must not eat carp, catfish, salmon or trout, says the March issue of the Natural Resources Register.

The advisory from the Department of Natural Resources and the Michigan Department of Public Health also "applies to tributary lakes and streams into which these species migrate as well as the open waters of the Great Lakes."

The warning includes women who are pregnant, nursing, or who expect to bear children. It also in-

cludes children. Others should eat fish no more than once a week.

The reason for the restriction is chemical contaminants and because scientists are not yet sure about long-term effects of eating the fish.

They note that, if fish are eaten, the level of most of the contaminants can be reduced by skinning, filleting, and trimming away fatty portions of the belly and dorsal areas, and by broiling or baking on a rack.
