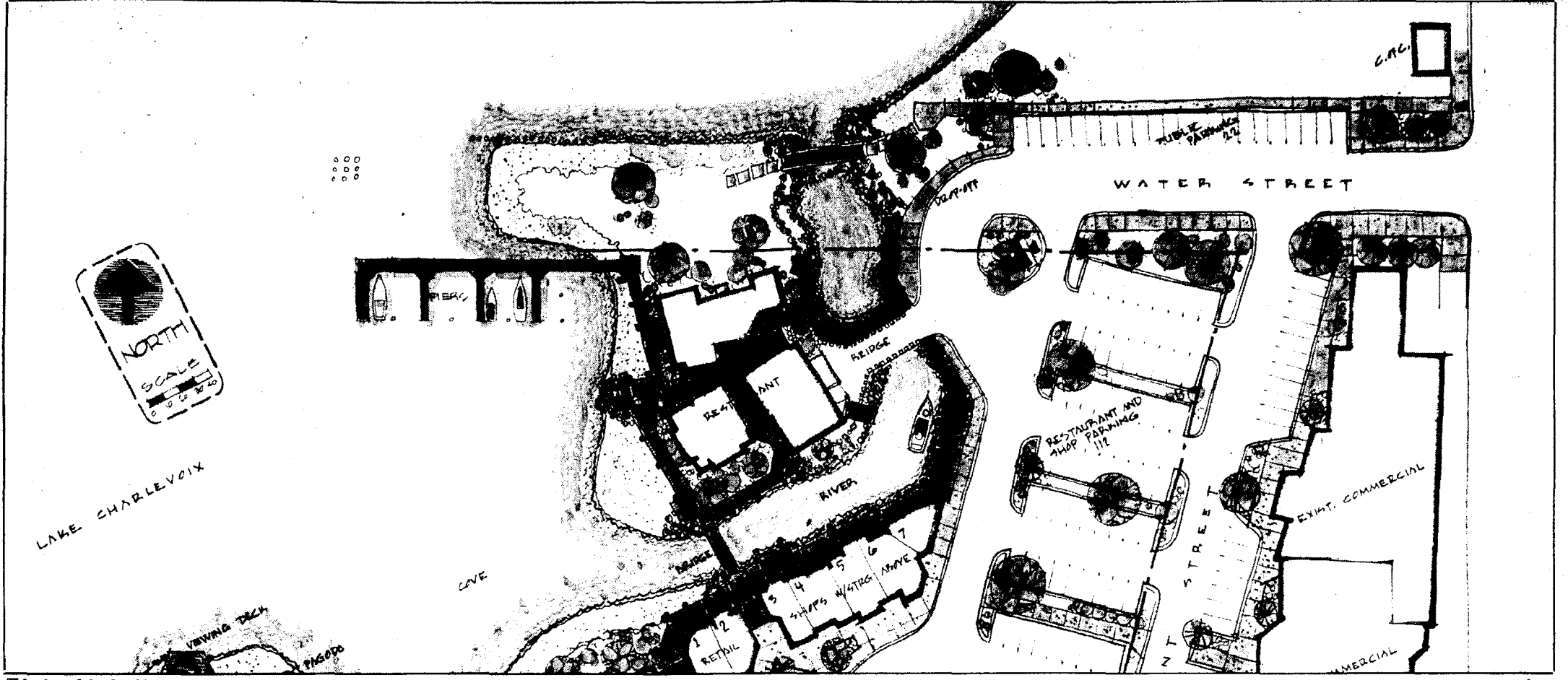

The second phase, projected for construction in 1984, will add an additional \$4 million, while the third phase, a 100-unit motel conference center complex, will cost about \$5.1 million. Expected completion for the first phase restaurant will be Memorial Day 1984.

One Water Street project announced

Citing the fact that it is an "unequaled site in Northern Michigan," Dave Troutman, architect for the Harborage and now the "One Water Street" development showed the plans for the 6.7 million dollar development on the site of the old railroad roundhouse at a Tuesday Brunch for members of the city planning commission, the city commission and members of the press.

The development, which is slated to break ground this spring will be built in phases, say the developers, Rick and Dave Smith, and Arch Wright, the head of the group that owns the land.

In the presentation Tuesday morning, Wright was described that he was a man of vision when he and his group bought the property seven years ago, and even then, Wright told the group that it would be about ten years before any project got off the ground. "We are ahead of schedule," he continued, "in terms of time from first projections. But, after considering many, many proposals, we as owners of the property concluded that we should place the development of the project in the hands of the developers of the Harborage because of the tremendous work they are doing to help the community."

"We are pleased to be part of the team," Wright concluded. The first phase will be the restaurant portion, which will take about a year to be completed. Projected opening is slated for Memorial Day 1984. The restaurant will be built on an island

that is to be created by dredging out part of the land.

"Both Stafford Smith, who will be running the restaurant, and myself as the architect, wanted to take advantage of as much of the water as we could," Troutman said as he showed the different aspects of the development.

The restaurant will seat 250 people in an 8500 square foot building. Parking will be provided for 112 automobiles on the site and will be integrated with and complement the parking already available on Front Street.

"Since we are, in essence, building on the backside of one of the main streets in town, and that we are planning on completing Front Street, which passes in the back of those buildings along Lake Street, we hope that the owners of the buildings could fix up the back side to help enhance their businesses," Troutman suggested.

The new restaurant, according to Troutman, will be an intimate structure, designed to look as though it had been in place for about fifty years. The architectural style could best be described as a cross between a Maine seacoast structure and a Bay View summer home.

The building is designed to be visually inviting to those who will walk onto the island from Lake and Water Street. There will also be transient boat docks for those who want to bring their boat in to dock and have dinner.

Stafford Smith explained that he has

spent many hours on this project since he was first introduced to it two years ago. Smith said that he thinks the concept for the restaurant is excellent. Too many times, he said, he has wanted this or that in one of the restaurants, but it would have taken major changes to create what he wanted. He said that one of his goals was to create exactly what he thought should be in a restaurant and he enjoyed "fitting the pieces together to create something that he and the community can be proud of."

The restaurant will have three main rooms, the kitchen, a small room and bar that seats 125 customers, and a larger room seating 125 persons. The large room could be used for community functions, weddings, and

City extends tax collection

Boyer City will continue to accept tax payments until March 11, in spite of notices circulating to the contrary. The county has extended city collection, so taxpayers will not have to go to Charlevoix until after March 11. But they will have to pay the 4 percent penalty that began with the February 28 deadline.

A second advantage in the 11-day extension, city manager Tim Clifton said, was that the city will get to keep the penalty fees.

meetings, Smith said.

One of the many reasons Smith said he came into the project was that there are few places for families with accommodations on the water in this area. "With this development, we have the cornerstone for a new Boyne, and we are very happy to be on board," he concluded.

Phase two of the project is slated to be commercial retail stores that will be located across from the restaurant. Those are slated to be constructed in 1984, according to Rick Smith.

Phase three will be five buildings

that will make up a 100-unit motel conference center. That part of the project is expected to start the following year.

Besides having a nice sandy beach for the motel users, there will also be a two- to three-foot deep Sunfish harbor for those bringing small sailing craft with them for their vacations.

When the first phase of the project is finished, Stafford Smith expects that it will offer employment to 20 to 25 people year around the first year, 35 to 40 after that. In the summertime, they will be adding about 40 parttime

workers.

When the entire project is completed, about 100 jobs will have been added to the area payroll.

The restaurant portion of the project is presently projected as costing \$1.2 million. The second phase will cost just under one-half million and the motel phase is projected to cost about 5.1 million dollars.

The project will be tied into the continuing Harborage development that is a few feet farther down the lakefront.

State cut-backs don't affect Jordan airport

No hitches about funding cutbacks are expected concerning the East Jordan airport lighting project, city superintendent Mike Dionne said.

Bids were opened in the presence of a Department of Transportation representative on February 16. "We expect Aeronautics Commission approval this week," Dionne said.

The 50-50 grant with Aeronautics will bring the city's share to about \$27,500. About \$20,000 of it is money left from the grant for paving the east-west runway, and \$8,500 from city-budgeted funds.

Concern for resurfacing the runways was negated by Dionne, who said they're not planning any this year. "The airport is fine," he said.

The lighting project will include an illuminated wind cone and remote control runway lighting that can be triggered by incoming pilots. Work will begin when weather permits.

Fiddlers return again to Civic Center

According to city recreation director Pat Berlo, the occasion is similar to previous affairs, with no tickets, but donations at the door.

In the afternoon from one till five it will be the Jamboree for people who play instruments and for those who just like to watch and listen. In the evening from 7 to 11 p.m. the Fiddlers and local musicians will play for square and round dancing.

At 3 p.m. ceremonies, honoring the Lions Club for their donation to the city of a movable stage, will take place. The stage will be assembled and in use for the afternoon's Jamboree.

Dudley Stevens, speaking for Bill

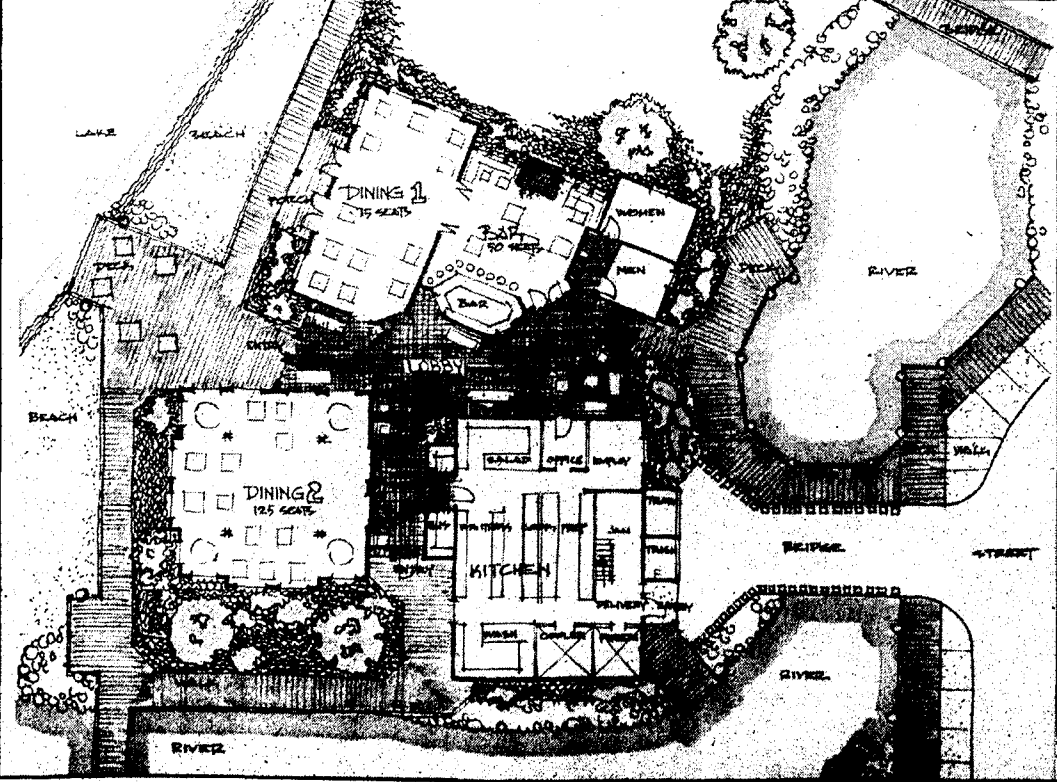
Stevens who is regional coordinator for the Fiddlers, said groups that want to play at the Jamboree should call Berlo ahead of time.

Among those expected are Suzuki violinists from Charlevoix (the youngest being around four years old) and the Harmolings, a blue grass music duo from Petoskey.

Stevens said fiddlers and other non-electrified instrumentalists are all welcome both in the Jamboree and for the evening's dancing. Callers for square dances are also welcome.

The donations received by the Fiddlers are used only for hall rental and advertising. Fiddlers pay their own travel expenses, Stevens said. Any leftover funds go towards equipment.

Civic Center roller skating will be cancelled for the Jamboree.

Reading Conference attracts 375

Speaker Jacque Wuertenberg received a standing ovation from the 375 teachers and parents attending a dinner and her talk on writing through reading.

The speaker was in East Jordan February 24 at the behest of Northern Michigan Reading Teachers Association for their seventh annual conference.

Arline Rullman, who chaired the conference, reported that Wuertenberg's talk emphasized books: writing in the classroom following experience in reading good literature; putting the students' writing into school-made books; books dictated even by children too young to write.

Books that the youngsters write

bring out what is in the child that the child may have never said before, Rullman explained, adding that the East Jordan elementary school teachers were going to do some book-making with their classes.

Teachers need to write, as well, Wuertenberg said. It helps them understand the difficulties their students are going through. She said they too should write the assignment, whether poem or story.

But without reading, writing is nearly an insurmountable chore, Wuertenberg said. She discussed some of the quality books available for children and young people.

Prior to Wuertenberg's speech, a book exhibit had been set up in the

high school gym. Rullman said that books, teaching materials, including computers, filled the gym to overflowing.

Some of those attending the conference came from as far away as Alpena and Traverse City. A contingent of about 40 came from Cheboygan, with a similar group from Kal-kaska.

The Northwest Michigan Reading Teachers' Association is made up of teachers, consultants, and Chapter I coordinators.

Their choice of speaker this year has 17 years of writing and speaking on the subject.

"Helping Children Become Writers" and "Classroom Writing Collection" are two of her books on the subject.

temporary tax increase received only token approval. However, a one percent increase in the state sales tax was highly recommended, as was the repeal of the sales tax exemption on food and drugs.

And everyone agreed that the size and scope of government must be scaled down and further budget cuts need to be included in any economic recovery package. In virtually every letter, it was evident that the voters of this state want meaningful budget reductions, fewer programs, and less

bureaucracy. And you all agreed that now is the perfect time to make substantial and permanent changes in the structure of Michigan government. I could not agree with that sentiment more.

Most of you pointed out your awareness that budget cuts alone would not solve Michigan's current fiscal dilemma, but that cutbacks would prevent future economic crises. And the solution for the short term would be a one percent increase in the state sales tax.

If we are to increase the state sales tax, or repeal the sales tax exemption on food and drugs, we would need a special election by the people, as mandated by the Michigan Constitution. However, if an increase in the state sales tax was not approved by the voters, I believe some members of the Legislature would regard that as a

message from the people to increase the income tax.

As your Representative to the Michigan Legislature, I will do all I can to prevent a permanent income tax increase. I will also continue to use my position on the House Appropriations Committee to see to it that meaningful and permanent budget cuts are made, and that the scope and direction of Michigan's state government meets the approval of its citizens.

Again, thank you for writing and sharing your thoughts with me. And for those of you who wrote to me for the first time, I hope you will continue to express your views and ideas. I greatly appreciate your efforts and support.

NOTICE OF REGISTRATION FOR SPECIAL ELECTION

TAKE NOTICE that any qualified elector of the cities and townships listed below, County of Charlevoix, Michigan, who is not already registered, may register for the special election to be held on the 7th day of April, 1983. The ballot proposition to be voted upon at said election is as follows:

Bonding Proposition

Shall the County of Charlevoix, State of Michigan borrow the principal sum of not to exceed Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$750,000) and issue and sell its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefor, for the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring, constructing, equipping and furnishing a Federal Aviation Administration Service Station in said County?

Registrations will be taken at the office of the city and township clerks listed below each working day until Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 1983.

THE LAST DAY FOR RECEIVING REGISTRATIONS will be Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 1983, on which day the said Clerks will be in their respective offices between the hours of 8 o'clock a.m. and 8 o'clock p.m., Eastern Standard Time, for the purpose of receiving registrations of electors qualified to vote.

During the second half, the Loggers just kind of took it away from the Vikings and the game ended up with the Loggers owning another win.

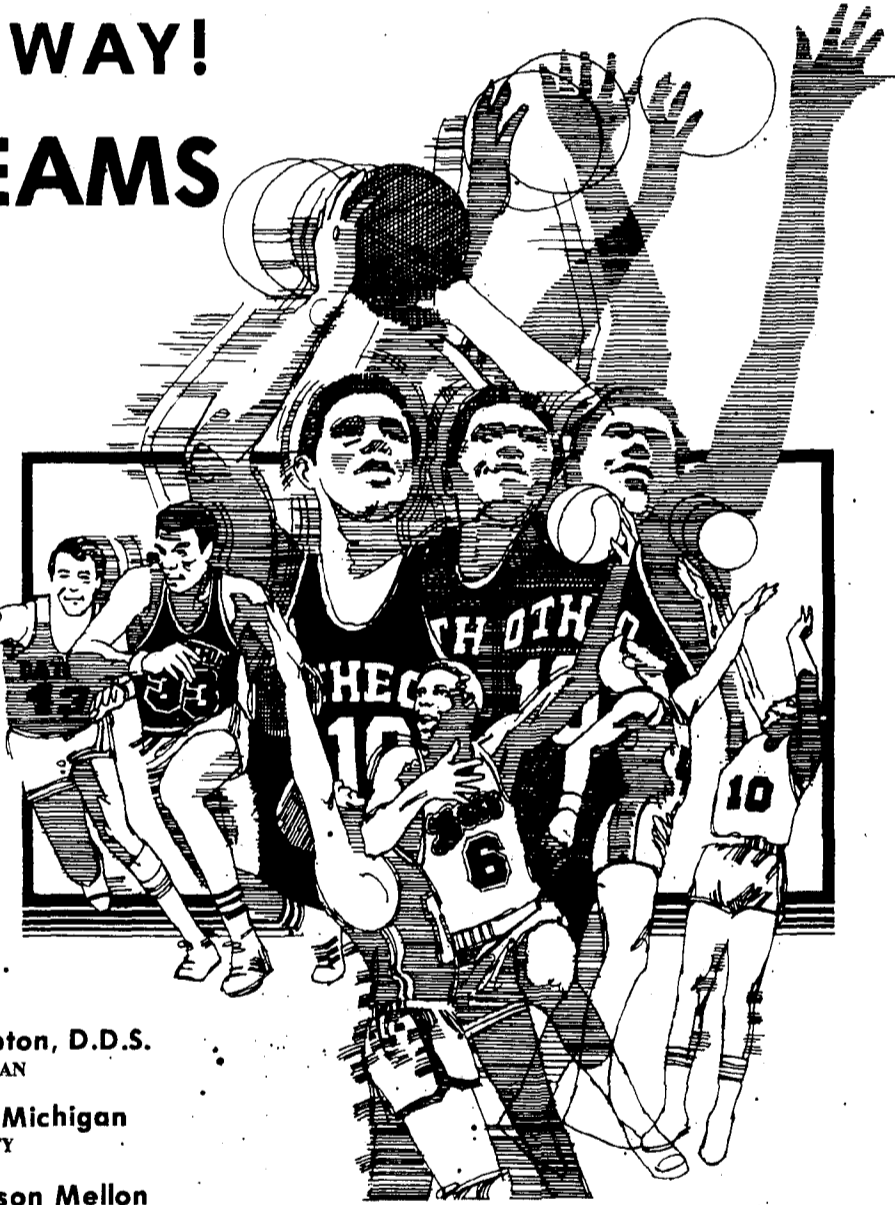

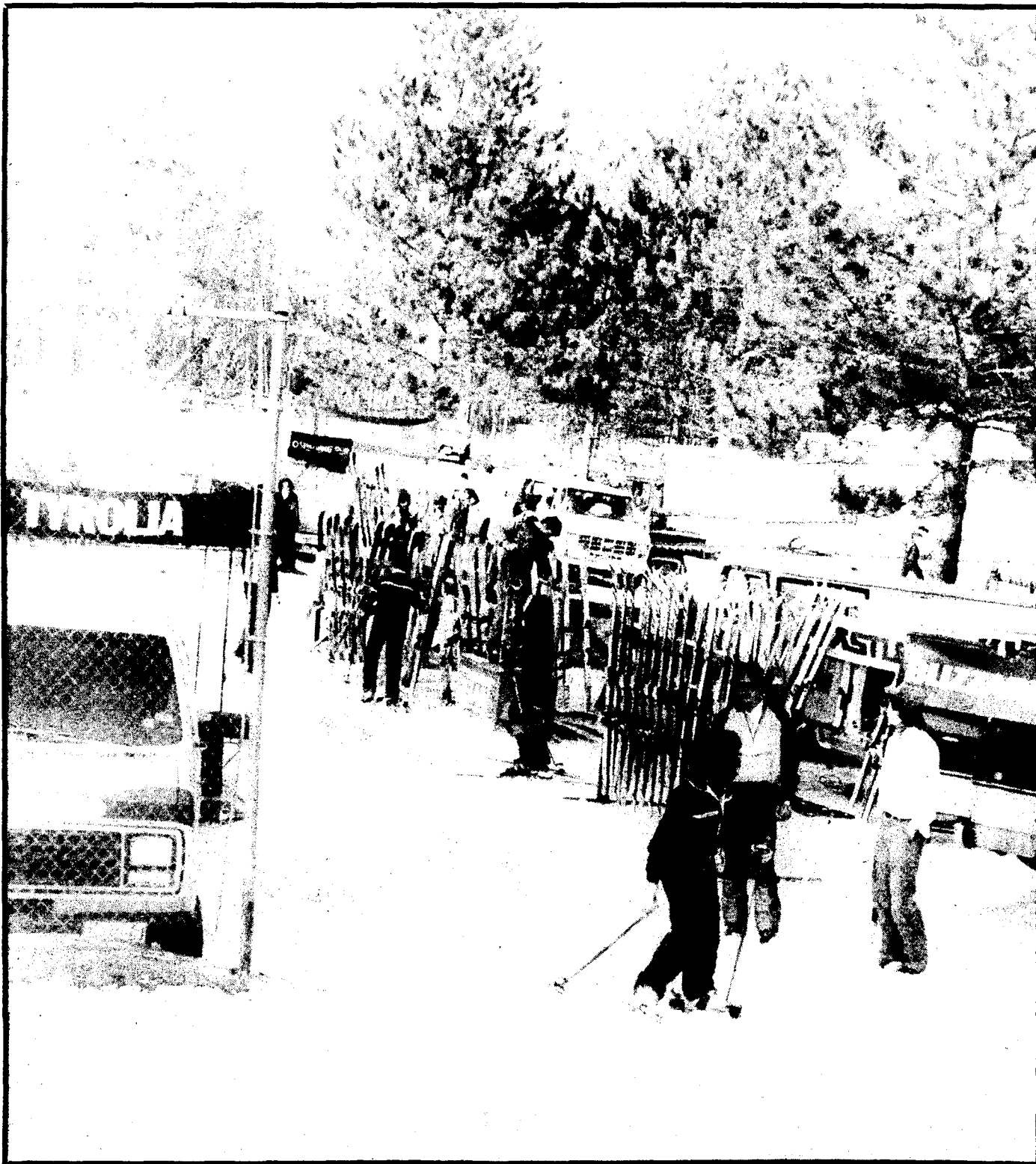

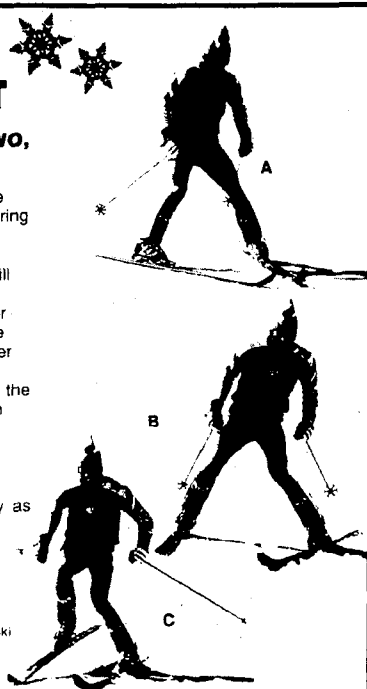
SKI YOU CAN DO IT

TURN AS EASY AS ONE, TWO, THREE

Three main skills are required to make all types of ski turns—weighting, steering and edging. At different ability levels, and for different types of turns, it's the order—as well as the intensity—of skill application that changes.

To make an easy snowplow turn, for instance, just apply the skills you have learned in proper sequence. First, steer your skis toward the fall line (A); next gradually transfer your body weight to the outside ski (B); then apply edging with the downhill (outside) ski through the end of the turn to minimize slipping through the end of the turn (C).

Perform these skills in their proper order and your turns will be as easy as one (steering), two (weighting), three (edging).

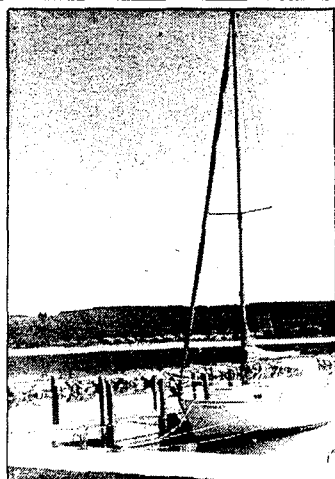

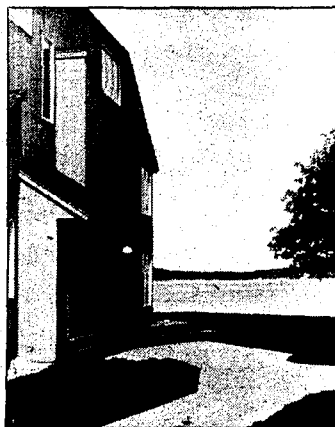

Rules to remember

There are seven rules to remember in buying ski boots:

1. If a boot is not comfortable when you try it on in the shop, you won't ski well. Fit comes first in comparison. Nothing else is nearly as important.
2. Ski boots should fit snugly but not uncomfortably. Toes should wiggle, but the heel, instep and ball of foot should be effectively immobilized.

3. Forward flex should be moderate, but comfortable. You should feel no pressure points on the shin or upper ankle.

4. Boot fit can be modified quickly by an experienced shop technician. Techniques involve cutting, scraping and filling the inner boot, expanding the boot shell, modifying footbeds and heel wedges.

5. Boot height is close-

ly related to stiffness of forward flex. A stiff, high boot may be comfortable—it spreads flexing loads more evenly across a wider shin area than does a stiff, lower boot—but it may not be "forgiving" enough for you. Most recreational skiers are most comfortable in a relatively high, fairly soft-flexing boot. Low, stiff boots

tend to concentrate loads just above the ankle, which can be painful.

6. High, stiff boots usually require more buckles for even closure. A properly designed one-to-two buckle boot will close comfortably and evenly, but you're the best judge of whether the boot closes comfortably.

7. don't forget Rule 1.

DNR reports conditions

Weather conditions last week ranged from a five inch snowfall early in the week to 50 degree tem-

peratures over the weekend. Total snowfall this winter stands at only 74.5 inches with seven inches on the ground in the Gaylord area. The month of February produced only 11 inches of snow.

Fishing activity was generally heavy over the weekend as mild weather caused many people to enjoy standing out in the open on the ice.

The sturgeon spearing season success that ran the month of February was light as only a total of 14 fish were taken. Ten from Black Lake and four from Mullett.

Ice conditions remain generally good on most lakes. However, shanties must be removed prior to unsafe ice conditions.

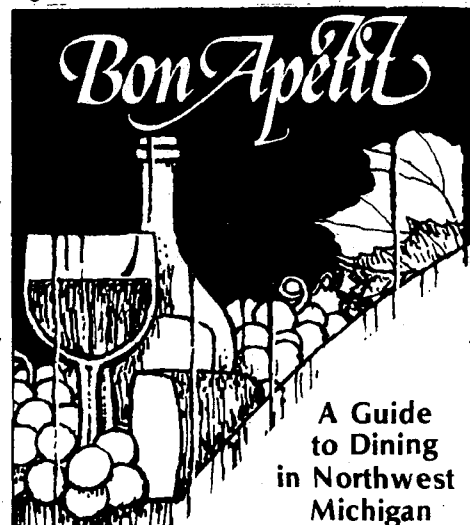
The bobcat hunting season will close the last day of February and in be \$4 per day.

New fishing licenses and pass books will be in the hands of license dealers by the latter part of March as they will be needed on April 1, 1983.

Snowmobile and cross country skiing conditions will become very poor soon if these 50 degree days continue.

If the warm temperatures should continue, smelt runs could be real early this spring. Also, people are reminded that as soon as the ground becomes free of snow, fire permits are needed to do any open burning.

These permits are available from DNR offices free of charge. Some of the forestry campgrounds are beginning to open so camping can take place. The last camping fee this year will be \$4 per day.

How to shop for a shop

Shopping for a ski shop is every bit as important as shopping for skis, boots, bindings or clothing. In fact, it's more important because what you buy is largely determined by the shop itself—what brands it carries, and the influence of the shop's personnel.

A. Type of shop. A shop's reputation is one of the major factors in judging honesty and knowledge, so ask your friends about their experience with individual ski shops. Be aware, however, that a new shop on the block can have some very well informed personnel.

B. To Gauge A Sales Person's knowledge. Ask the sales person about his skiing background, how he skis, where he skis, and his equipment preferences. This can give you some measure of his knowledge.

More important, however, are the questions sales personnel ask you: How much do you weigh? How tall are you? How

turned itmes that have not been used or worn. Policies governing business practices such as returns, particularly on "sales merchandise," should be clearly posted.

If you are combining old equipment with new—old boots with new bindings or old bindings with new boots—be sure the shop mechanic knows how to judge their compatibility.

A professional attitude shows up most in the salesperson's approach toward beginners. A condescending manner or

impatience with a new skier might mean that you're just a turkey, too, when your back is turned.

The kind of comments you shouldn't hear: "I can't help you, that's not my department"... "If you don't see it, we don't have it in stock"... "Everything in that size is on the rack." A salesperson can always find a person who can help you, he can check on future shipments and he can show you something else that is similar to the item you want.

SKI YOU CAN DO IT

WORK YOUR HANDS LIKE A BOXER

Most good skiers recognize the importance of keeping the hands in a position somewhere in front of them. But lots of people are so hung up on keeping their hands out in front of their bodies that they ski like "stickmen" and give the appearance that their upper bodies are made of concrete. This is hardly a relaxed way to ski.

You'll have plenty of opportunity for self-expression and individual style if you keep your hands somewhere within your peripheral vision. And keep them moving! Think of yourself as a boxer who always has to keep his hands ahead and in motion in order to be aggressive. As you finish one turn, move your outside hand into a "ready" position for the next. This way there will be no chance of missing that exact spot on the slope where you want to plant your pole and change direction.

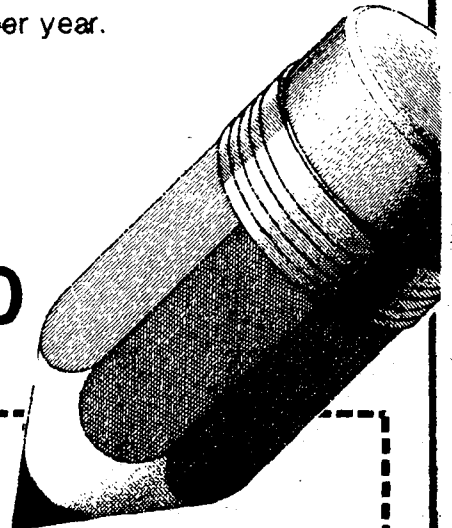
