


Boyne awards bid to Seals and Roberts

City commissioners awarded a contract Tuesday to Seals and Roberts Construction Company. The company was low bidder at \$13,159.25 for putting the prefabricated airport terminal on foundations at Boyne City Airport. Also involved will be the terminal's

Three companies bid on the job. A fourth bid was also submitted but parts of it were either missing or not dealt with. Although it was the lowest bid (\$11,454), because of the omissions, the commissioners discard-

The airport building will be trucked here in four parts at the end of next week, city manager Randy Frykberg said. The terminal will be ready for use within 60 days from


Financing of the project is to be through a Michigan Aeronautics Commission low cost loan of \$2,250 and a grant from the state of \$25.000

Frykberg said the city engineer's estimate for local construction work

was \$16,704, about half way be tween the high and low bids.

commissioners also approved the submission of final application papers for a grant for Peninsula Beach construction, having garnered required approval from the Department of Natural Resources. The grant of \$215,000 is for half of the total cost of making a landscaped peninsula on the new city beach to protect swimmers from boaters as well as to protect the beach from

Post office opens 'branch' at 1st National Bank

Boyne City area postal customers will now be able to rent a box, pick up their mail and conduct other postal business, while doing their banking at the First National Bank and Trust located at 502 West Boyne

This is the result of the establishment of a mail convenience center at the branch bank featuring post office lock boxes, mail acceptance and stamp sales. Also included is a drop box collection box in the drive at the bank,

The contract station will benefit the Postal Service, local businesses and the mailing public. It will give customers ready access to postal services (primarily retail services) at a new location 1.6 miles from the main office in downtown Boyne City.

The new convenience center will be operated by bank employees with

all services except, International Mail, Postal Meter Settings and the Acceptance of Bulk Mailings, being provided during their regular banking hours. 105 post office boxes have been installed at the new location, which will enable mailers to conduct postal business while on shopping trips or traveling to work. Small boxes rent for \$20 per year and mail will be available for pick up at 9:30 a.m. on regular banking service

Guidelines set for home meals by A·C·E·

The ACE (Antrim, Charlevoix, and Emmet Counties) Nutrition Project, of which Charlevoix County is a member, has put into effect a new suggested donation schedule for their meal sites. This schedule is abased on the annual household income. No one will be denied a meal. if unable to contribute to this scale. \$6,000 or less, 60 cents; \$6,000-\$10,000, \$1; \$10,000-\$15,000, \$1.50; \$15,000-\$20,000, \$2; under age 60,

A certain percentage of the nutrition project must be raised through donation, or county government assistance. For the current fiscal year (83-84) this amount is \$32,207, of which the county contributes \$2,916.

At the present time the project income for meal donations \$16,854 (at the end of July). It should have raised \$24,409. This does make the project short of \$7,550.

At the present suggested donation of 60 cents it is making it only 10 cents more than when the program began in 1974.

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

The Selective Service System is remind-ing all male citizens or aliens residing in the United States, who were born after January 1, 1960, that they must register with the Selective Service System within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Individuals born anytime during 1966 may, if they wish, register and not wait until 30 days

before their birthday. Registration is simple process which requires the registrant to supply his name. address, date of birth, social security number, and telephone number. Identification should be brought along when

registering. Registration may be completed at any U.S. Post Office.

In addition any individual who has registered since July 1, 1980 and has since legally changed their name,

permanent address, or current address are also urged to update their change with the Selective Service System. Again, these change of information

forms may be obtained

any U.S. Post Office.

If an individual born after January 1, 1960, has not registered with the Selective Service System they are urged to do so at once. Currently a man must register to receive federal student aid and job

training benefits. To date over 11.3 million men have registered with the Selective Service System. This

When I first went to the movies and watched how the camera dwelt on the women putting on her coat and getting into a car, or the man stirring about the kitchen to fix himself a cup of coffee, I could understand that their gestures were significant even while they did everyday things. There was an edge of drama in them

I'd think about that when I'd put on my own coat or do the dishes. But, no drama then! Drama disappears, I found, when the looker is what is looked at.

Still, the drama of gesture, is of

endless interest. Look at what cigarette advertisers have done with the tough, the sophisticated, the languid, or the tense ways of holding a cigarette

Look how psychologists have analyzed the smallest gestures for their tell-tale meanings: the crossed arms, the side-slipping glance, the tapping foot.

And then, how we enjoy the movements of animals: of a waterborne swan, or the hunched-around glare of a cat, or the stretched-up alertness of a rooster, about to crow.

I don't know how city people manage with only the gestures of pigeons or of other people to

The last evening I had a visitor whose gestures struck me as pure comedy. Katy didn't mean to be funny. In fact she was the epitome of solemnity, slowly moving about the room with stately steps. I thought

she might be about to give forth on some serious matter. I prodded her. "What's on your

mind?" I asked.
"Katy did," she answered, her green face unsmiling.

Not to be bewildering—the visitor

was a 11/2-inch insect called a katydid, and her pacing was along the wall. Her long green legs made each step something of an event. I know people dislike bugs, and I can be as cross as the next about

flies. But, I think that, contrary to

familiarity's breeding contempt, be-

coming acquainted with insect life makes for a degree of fascination. And not that the katydid actually chose to be solemn, but her gestures represented a style, an idea, even though they are said to be biologi-

cally determined. I took her outside, and tonight I think I recognize her voice once in a while in the night, through the jazz racket of crickets and other insects.

I smile because I'm reminded of her most endearing gesture. It was when she had walked out on an electric cord, strung overhead, and then decided to turn and go back. This involved bringing six long green legs into a fulcrum-like gripslowly, slowly moving to a crosswire position, rocking just perceptibly off-balance like an elderly judge on top of a stepladder, and finally making the 180 degree turn to tightrope-walk back to the wall

Out in the country there are a lot of miniature gestures like this-a squirrel trembling with anger, a grouse thumping his feathers. I'd hate to leave bugs out. They have some momentary drama, too



Paper into paper from area business

"Don't waste paper," tree lovers say, reminiscent of their mothers who said to them, "Don't waste money. It doesn't grow on trees."

Recycling paper does save trees, of course, and money. But it is mainly his interest in trees and the environment in general that started John Magee in the business of recycled paper.

In northern Michigan it was next to impossible to buy recycled paper, and plenty of people have wanted to. It's a matter of pride with them. Magee, with his wife Carol started up the business near Petoskey

about six months ago to meet that need. He said he wanted recycled paper himself

and this was one way to

get it.
"I can make paper,"
he said. "You can
make paper out of
straw or anything you

can first make into a

pulp."

But Magee was interested in a more commercial grade and a larger supply than can be achieved through hand-

processes.
Prior to the venture he had served in nature centers in Michigan and in Massachusetts. He has a Colorado university environmental degree.

His first step was to purchase 1000 pounds of recycled paper from a recycling mill and to share it one way or another with friends and groups.

He said he read a lot of books and talked to a lot of people before deciding to go fully into the business of selling recycled paper—''primarily offset paper especially made for printed material,'' he said.

The Magees also sell a grade made for use in ditto machines, but the machines are "very touchy," he explained, being precisely set for a certain weight of paper and this prevents some

machines from accepting any other paper.

"The papers we sell are all heavy enough to print on both sides," he said. The Magees also market stationery, as their free catalog states.

The catalog goes all over the United States to individuals and small groups as Earth Care Paper is a unique service. Carol Magee said it had just been written up in the September "Mother Earth News."

Recycling mills do

small markets, so Earth Care Paper buys from mills in Michigan and Wisconsin for retailing by catalog.

not sell directly to such

Magee said some paper mills also buy used paper from paper brokers for recycling. It's not cheap to produce recycled paper, Magee said, but it does cost less than cutting and shipping trees to

the mill

Unfortunately paper brokers operate mainly in large metropolitan areas; it hasn't yet economically been feasible for them to buy small amounts. But Magee recently completed a recycling feasibility study for the county, his wife said. The study included a survey with surprising interest shown those questioned.

She said half of those

surveyed said they'd be willing to pay an increase in taxes to support recycled paper action.

"Maybe in the next year," she said, "the county could have used-paper collection." As a result of the report, she said, the possibility is being seriously studied.

The Magees live and work, appropriately enough, at 325 Beech Lane, Harbor Springs.

Carol Magee divides her time between the business and Tip of the Mitt Water Council cirectorship. Both Magees demonstrate their concern for the environment.







fishing should peak from now through mid-September. Streams should have heaviest pressure between mid-September and mid-October. By the end of November, anglers will find few salmon along Great Lakes shores and in streams.

Some two million coho and chinook, the same number as last year, should return for spawning runs across Michigan. Forty-two 'hot spots' are listed on the Auto Club's 1984 Salmon Guide.

Best West Michigan results are expected on Lake Michigan at Charlevoix and at the mouths of the Betsie, Grand. Manistee Muskegon, Pentwater, Pere Marquette, Platte and St. Joseph rivers, according to a survey of DNR offices. Best runs in East Michigan should occur on Lake Huron at Port Hope and in Southwest Michigan on the Huron River south of Flat

Major Upper Peninsula runs are expected from Lake Superior into the Black, Big Iron and Dead rivers and from Lake Michigan into the Manistique

River.
Fishermen will find limited action in some areas where wiers block salmon runs.

Those streams include:
the Little Manistee
and the Jordan rivers
in West Michigan and
the U.P.'s Ana River.




