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## News Briefs

## Fire destroys most of EJ Plastics Co



Smoke and flames billow from the East Jordan Plastics plant as the warehouse and other portions of the building were destroyed by fire. The plant hopes to reopen next week after undergoing a clean-up. Warehousing will be in their new building in the EJ Industrial Park.

## Six area departments assist in 4th of July blaze

Fire last Thursday destroyed the East Jordan Plastics plant and started the Fourth of July off with a bang that required help from six fire departments within the county.

The fire, which according to witnesses, started early in the morning when they heard popping sounds which they thought were early fireworks. The fire spread until a Charlevoix County sheriff deputy noticed smoke coming from the building and alerted the East Jordan Fire Department. They arrived on the scene at 8:41 a.m. About 9:15 a.m. fire departments

from Boyne City, Charlevoix, Charlevoix Township, Ellsworth, and Banks Township were called to assist as the building had become totally involved.

Smoke from the fire could be seen as far south as Mancelona and throughout the county as the plastic within the warehouse sections of the plant went up in flames.

The non toxic smoke caused some alarm among county residents as Earl Muma, the county emergency coordinator and other officials warned residents in the area about the smoke which they

thought at the time could be dangerous. While the smoke was non toxic, particles of carbon and soot covered the immediate area of the plant.

Water to fight the blaze was brought in by transporting from areas along the lake where one of the fire crews set up a post for filling the shuttling tanker trucks.

The fire was the largest in the county since the Lexalite fire two years ago. Sheriff's deputies closed off M-66 to allow the water trucks to go back and forth without hindering traffic.

Cal Diller, the president of the

firm, said that he was the last one to leave the plant on Wednesday evening, although the plant had been shut down for vacation time earlier that week. The plant employs about 30 people at peak times and makes flower flats that are used in greenhouses.

The plastic is vacuum formed and the stockpile of the plastic oozed out of the building as it was burning.

Diller said that he was pleased that the office part of the plant had been saved, and that no one was injured or in the plant at the time of the fire.

Diller said that a new plant was under construction in the East Jordan Industrial Park and he was hoping that the operation could be restarted in a few weeks.

The fire is still under investigation by the state fire marshal and other fire crews. Firemen worked on putting out the blaze until 6 a.m. Friday.

Work crews found that much of the equipment is salvageable in the production area of the plant and Diller said that he hopes to start production July 15 in the same location. The new plant will act as the warehouse for the production facilities.

officers, had to face the fact that the entire board would be relatively recent as board member Dick Wulff resigned before the end of the meeting.

Wulff, who had been a board member since 1981, was the member with the most tenure. His resignation was told to the board verbally, and although the board took no action at the meeting, Superintendent Rich Kelly informed members of the board Monday that the resignation was official.

The board now has 20 days to name a replacement or to let the Intermediate School District name one for them. Those interested may call a board member or Kelly at the school district offices.

Elected president was Phil Bowman, a board member who was elected last year. Vice-president will be Richard May, a newly elected member of the board, while Larry Monshor, was named to be treasurer. Bea Reinhardt was elected to the secretary position.

In other action at the organizational meeting, the board approved a resolution that will allow Boyne City to participate in Michigan High School Athletic contests, named Monshor to be the liaison member to the Michigan Association of School Boards, updated the standing committees and hired a new teacher to replace Mrs. Rosemary Mackowiak.

Hired was Deborah Neidhamer of Boyne City, who had been teaching in the Alba School District. She is

certified in Home Economics for the kindergarten through high school level.

Before the board could hire her, they accepted a resignation of Laura Keller, who the board had hired recently. She submitted a resignation when she accepted a full time position with the Charlevoix School District.

The board also accepted the retirement resignation of Mrs. Evelyn Newville, who was a cook at the high school for the past 24 years.

## Planners OK abatement, church addition

Boyne City planners gave their approval for another 12 year tax abatement for an addition that is under construction at Hair Unlimited Beauty Salon located at 212 S. Park Street. The addition will house a new tanning salon the firm is planning on installing.

The new addition meets most of the thirteen point criteria that the planners use in making the recommendation to the city commission. They are recommending to the city commissioners that the firm be given a 12 year abatement on the improvements.

The firm is constructing an 18 by 22 foot addition to the present building for the tanning salon, according to Karen Habasco the owner of the salon.

## BF schools doing same things with same board

It was the same old thing with the same crew and the same committees after the organizational meeting of the Boyne Falls School Board Monday night.

Elected president was Art Saworski with Jim Churchill being re-elected vice-president, Bob Winhusen as secretary and Bill Cousineau as treasurer.

The board will also have the same standing committee assignments as they had last year.

About the only change that was made at the meeting was the approval, after a truth in taxation hearing, of setting the millage at the full allowable rate of 30.47 mills for school operation. This is an increase of .6923 mills over what the board was allowed prior to the hearing.

The board also approved the low bid of First National Bank and Trust of Petoskey for the tax anticipation note that the board will borrow. Their bid was at 5.7 percent interest or a total of \$13,700 for the \$300,000 the school system will be borrowing. The other bid was from Northwestern State Bank who bid 6.50 percent.

School principal Mike Wallace told the board that the money gained from the school auction earlier this summer was used to buy new textbooks in various classes.

Superintendent Bob Redmond then told the board that he is trying to reach Foster Construction to complete work done on the school previously. While he has not been able to reach the firm, he said he would keep trying and has set a date of the end of July for the work to be completed. The work remaining is the repair of the construction defects the school had done last year.

Redmond gave the board an update on the progress of the

## Summer rates on water eliminated in EJ Wednesday golf

In a very short meeting on July 2, DPW superintendent Mike Dionne recommended to the East Jordan City Council that a reduction in summer sewer rates be eliminated because of the revenues lost and because of the amount of time spent in adjusting each bill.

After lengthy discussion, city council followed this recommendation.

In a related matter, the council authorized Dionne to advertise for bids for a sanitary sewer extension between Erie and Bridge streets on the west side of M-66 and for bids for a sewer tie-in for property parcels located on the east side of M-66 between Erie and Bridge.

In the future, Tri-Vest Corporation will be developing this area for low-cost housing.

Under an ordinance approved by city council earlier this year, Ray Olson sought to restructure lot lines in Shirly-Ray Acres to make the lots larger. Council approved this under local ordinance 138. Council then endorsed a propos-

al drafted by the city library's board of trustees to become a district library. A district library requires the cooperation of two or more governing entities to join in the proposal. The city library is looking to the East Jordan School District to become the other partner in the district library. The school board is expected to take up the proposal at its next board meeting.

Final passage of the proposal would spread the cost of supporting the library among the local governments and the residents in the district. Additionally, more funds would be available for growth and maintenance of the library.

At an earlier meeting, the city council approved the Harbor Commission's plan for renewal of the city's harbor. The commission has been authorized to seek bids for Phase I of the renewal.

This phase would include a main pier, a fuel and pumpout station, restrooms, parking lot, 20 floating docks and a concrete walkway.

## Residents favor seat belts

Michigan residents favor the state's new safety belt use law (due to take effect July 1) and overwhelmingly intend to buckle up, according to a new public opinion study.

Results of the survey were announced today by leaders of the Michigan Coalition for Safety Belt Use, including Secretary of State Richard H. Austin.

The Coalition also unveiled an extensive public information program based on the theme, "Buckle Up, Michigan, It's Our Law!"

According to the survey, conducted by

Nordhaus Research, Inc. of Farmington Hills, 67 percent of those questioned said they favored the new law. An even higher number of respondents — 82 percent — stated that they would wear their safety belts all or most of the time once Michigan's safety belt use law goes into effect.

The survey results also indicated strong support for enforcement of the law. When asked about how they felt about enforcement of Michigan's new safety belt law, 71 percent said that they wanted the law strictly

enforced.

In addition, an overwhelming 79 percent said that they thought a significant number of lives could be saved each year if everyone wore safety belts. "We are extremely encouraged by the results of the Michigan survey on the safety belt use law," said Thomas O. Reel, executive secretary of the Coalition. "We view it as an endorsement by the citizens of Michigan for the most effective means presently available for reducing death and serious injury on our roads and highways—the regular

use of safety belts."

"The survey results confirm what we in the Coalition have been saying for quite a long time," said Austin. "The safety belt use law will enjoy not only popular acceptance, but popular approval. It's a good law that will save lives, and the people of Michigan recognize that."

"It's good to know that the public is behind our safety belt use law," said Captain James Kneale, district commander of the Michigan State Police. "Having been on the front lines, we know how effective safety belts can be in reducing fatalities and serious injuries on our highways. If we can look forward to the kind of support indicated in the survey, a lot of lives are going to be saved starting almost immediately."

Robert VanDam, president of Nordhaus Research, Inc., noted that the results of the Michigan survey closely parallel results reported in other states where similar surveys have been conducted. "The Michigan results reflect the national mood on the question of safety belt laws," said VanDam.

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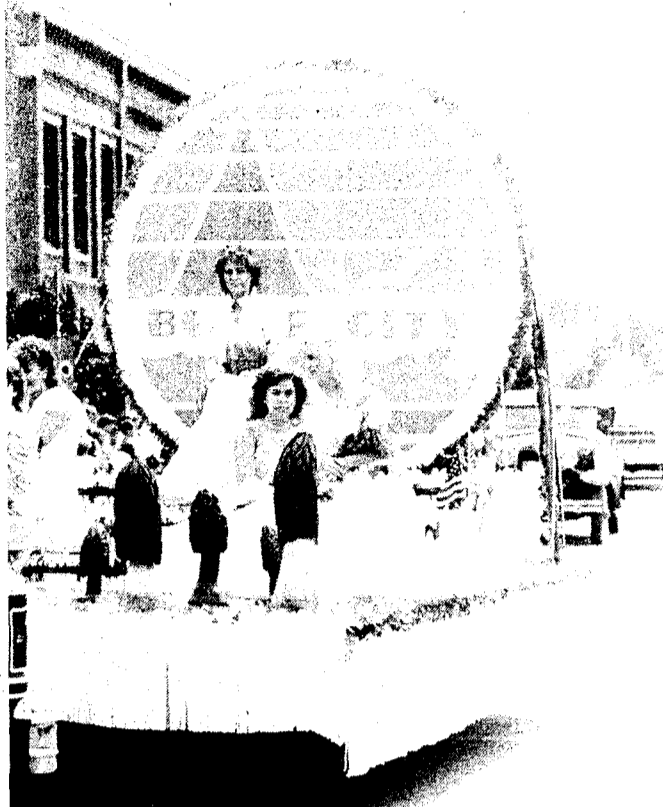

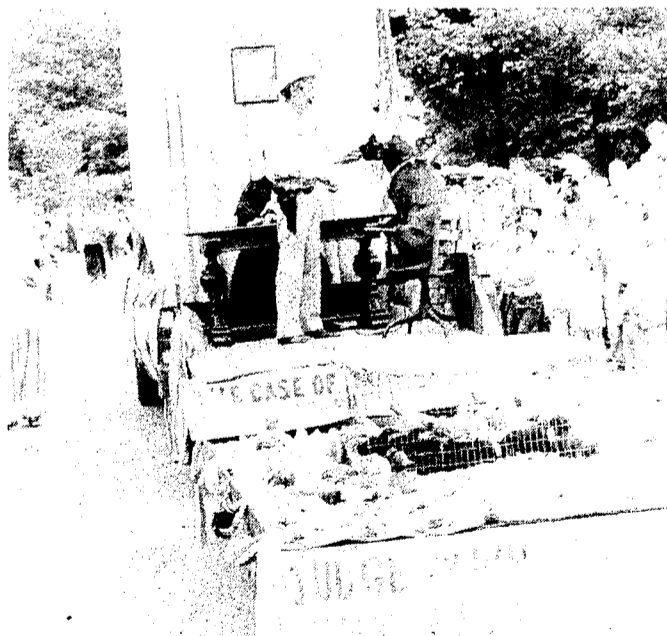

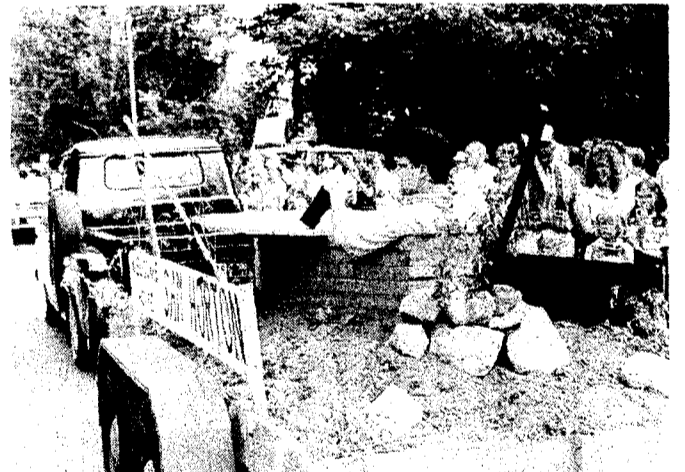

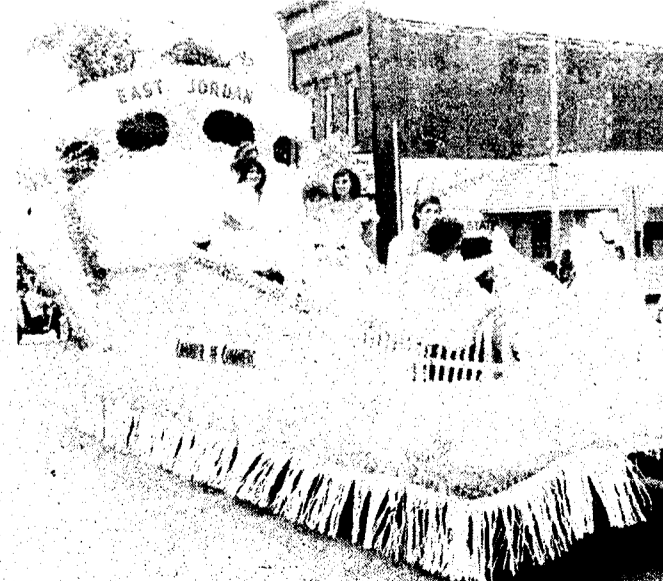
