## News Briefs

Cheese, rice and flour will be given away at this month's food give-away to those who are qualified. The distribution will be Oct. 30, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. or until all the food is gone, at the Community Services Center in Boyne City, V.F.W. Hall in Charlevoix, and the Civic Center in East Jordan.

Halloween hours have been set by the Boyne City police in conjunction with several of the other towns in the area. On Oct. 31, the hours for these young ghosts and goblins to come knocking on your door is set between 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. The departments are trying to regulate the hours so that the children will have a safe time for the candy gathering.

Boyne City will have their free leaf pick-up during the first week of November. Those wanting leaves picked up are reminded to have them in bags and along the curb of the street.

This is also the weekend to turn the clocks back one hour. So, before you go to bed Saturday night, remember, Spring ahead, Fall back.

Chris Wright, the regional rep for Senator Riegle, will be speaking to the Charlevoix County Democrats at the U.A.W. Hall located at 110 Main Street, Boyne City, Saturday, October 26 at 9:00 a.m.

Using a great amount of time in the state legislature, the house recently approved a bill that would allow us to use a check mark as well as an "X" on our ballots when we vote. ## Boyne Falls School gets energy award

Boyne Falls School was the top energy saver in its class of school systems according to word received by superintendent Robert Redmond Monday afternoon.

The school will be awarded a plaque at a luncheon Oct. 30 at the Southfield Holiday Inn. At least one school board member is trying to figure out his schedule so that he could attend.

While the energy saving program was started before Redmond's appointment by the previous school board, Redmond said congratulations are in order for all who worked on the project over the years.

The school board also formally appointed all of the "Schedule B" employees, those in the positions of aides and other jobs in the

school system.

Then the board tried to find a solution to a snow removal problem at the school barn. Redmond told the board that the agreement the school had worked out with an adjacent property owner last year was not acceptable this year. He was told to check with the school attorney to find out the liability problem and to try to check back with the property owner to see what could be worked out.

The owner last year objected to the heavy equipment that was brought in to remove the snow around the building after the roof was cleared. The school barn is

approximately one foot from the property line and the snow from the roof falls on someone else's property.

The school agreed to spend some money for a ventilation fan for the science room to help clear up the smells from when the students do their lab work.

The fan, which will be installed after final specifications are determined, is expected to be in the 800 to 1000 cubic foot range as far as air exchange rates are concerned. Redmond said that it would probably be installed in the wall of the school, rather than the roof.

In other action, Royce Rolls was

given the snow removal bid for the season. His bid was the lowest of two received. Rolls did the work last season, also.

Graduation ceremonies will be held Saturday at 7:00 p.m. next May after the board agreed to the change from 2:00 p.m. The move to a later time removes a possible conflict the graduation exercises have had with the finals in girls' softball when quite a few of the team members could miss the ceremony because of the state tournaments.

Then the board agreed to hold an employee breakfast at the school Dec. 18th. The school day

will start one hour later so that all of the employees could eat breakfast served by their bosses, the school board.

Board members will be rising early that day to serve, Redmond told them, and he added jokingly, those that are not here on time will have to wash the dishes.

The board also agreed to let school principal Mike Wallace handle the requests for the school gym. Wallace told the board that he was going to be involved with the alumni-adult recreational basketball program and would be responsible to make sure the building is secured after the sessions.

## Boyne City okays \$3,000 for plant

Boyne City Commissioners agreed at their Tuesday noon meeting to spend an additional \$3,000 for the installation of a heating system at the Boyne City Library, after hearing the bids for doing the work came in higher than the estimated cost.

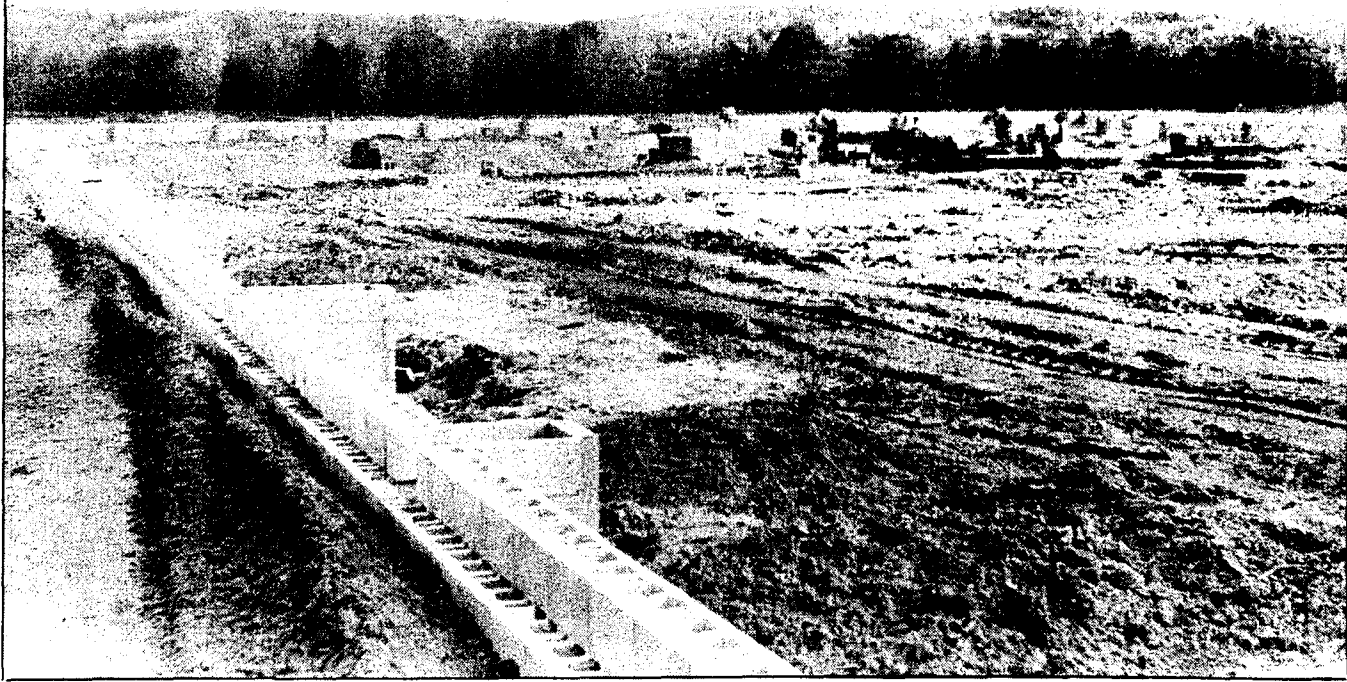
The cost of the system will be \$13,300 and will include a gas fired boiler and hydronic heating system.

City Manager Randy Frykberg also told the commissioners that 82 acres of the new Air-Industrial Park is now fully owned by the Magna Corporation after they brought in the money to the city and closed the deal.

In the meantime, the building of the new LexaMar plant is progressing nicely, he said, and the co-operation of all parties involved in the transaction are to be congratulated for doing nine months work in just a few.

In other remarks at the meeting, Frykberg reminded the commissioners that hunting and vehicles are prohibited from Avalanche Preserve.

While the commissioners did not pass a formal resolution, Bob Simmons, who is in the process of purchasing Boyneland Refuse, asked that the license given by the city be continued. The commissioners had no objection and granted the request. Simons told the commissioners that he intends on installing a transfer station in the future for those who may want to use it rather than taking the refuse to the landfill in Charlevoix. He is also going to be upgrading the equipment to handle the influx of new business the company is getting since the closure of the Boyne City Landfill.



Construction of the new LexaMar plant is progressing fast as the foundation is almost completed and the back filling started. The general contractor building the new plant is the Behling Construction Company of

Boyne City. Walls for the plant are expected to be started next week if all goes well.

## Planners approve mini-mall in B.C.

Boyne City planners will now be requiring pictures to show the surrounding areas of land and the neighborhood when they appear before the board with a new site plan, after the board saw what the pictures could do to help them understand what the proposed development will be like.

The planners agree to the new

rule after looking at a proposed site idea from Randy Kruzel who wanted to show what he would like to do when he remodels the former Second Ward School on Park St.

His pictures, showing the former school house, along with other pictures of Morgan-Shaw, another former school house similar in design, were eventually tabled, as

Kruzel had not made a formal request to the board.

In other action to come in front of the planners at the regular Monday night meeting, a request from Tom Fiel, who is in the process of remodeling a former store located at the corner of Division and Pleasant Valley to have some apartments on the

lower level. His request was referred to the Zoning Board of Appeals as it would mean a change in the non-conforming use permit the property now has.

Planners also approved the site plan for the west half of the former Schaffer building. The request

## Vallance admits guilt to detective at hearing

It appears that David Vallance, 22, of East Jordan will go to trial for an open count of murder in the death of Patricia Swanson, after testimony was received in the 90th District Court last Thursday.

As the case was explained before Judge Harvey Varnum, two witnesses, Donald Anthony and Detective Sgt. Don Chappell of the State Police, told the court what they saw and determined from interviews with the suspect.

Vallance was identified by Anthony as a person he saw in the Swanson residence that Friday afternoon.

Swanson was found dead in her home at 507 N. Maple St. on Oct. 4. Police and ambulance crews were sent to the scene after receiving a report of an injured woman at that address.

According to testimony, the mother of two was found face up, with a pool of blood under her head, on the kitchen floor. A bucksaw or bowsaw was also found, partially under the body,

with what appeared to be blood and hair on it.

A hammer was also used in the crime, according to state police, and was located in the East Jordan Auto Parts scrapyard after the investigation was started.

The County Medical Examiner, Dr. Mitchell Carey, and a pathologist, Charles Iknayan of Gaylord testified that the woman died because of blows to her head, possibly from the saw or a hammer.

At one point, Carey told the court the back of the head "was like hamburger".

After it was determined how she died, the prosecutor, Kragg Lieberman brought Chappell to the stand. Chappell was the officer who was the lead investigator on the case.

Chappell told the court that he questioned Vallance on two occasions, Oct. 5 and Oct. 7, in connection with the case. He said he questioned Vallance because Anthony had told police of a brown

Ford he had seen in the driveway of the home.

Anthony had gone to the home early that Friday to find someone who was going to help rebuild some nets that Anthony uses in his fishing business.

When he was at the home he saw Vallance inside the house. Not finding the person he was looking for, he left the home, noticed that the brown Ford had its lights on and returned to the house to inform Swanson that the lights were left on.

Anthony identified Vallance in the court room.

Because Anthony remembered the car, the police were informed and Vallance was picked up for questioning by Chappell.

During the testimony by Chappell, the State Police Detective said that he questioned Vallance thoroughly, notifying him several times of his rights and making sure that Vallance understood them.

Vallance first told the detective on that day he went to work,

came home from work at 4:30 and showered then went to sleep.

When confronted with the information concerning his car being seen in the driveway, Vallance broke down and told the detective, "I don't know why I did it. She was just talking fresh-mouth, the next thing I knew she was on the floor. Maybe I went crazy."

He also said that he did not want anything to do with her.

According to testimony, he continued to say that he put the hammer in a bucket, wiped off the blood with a rag and took the bucket out to the junkyard where he hid them under a green van on the hill.

The next day, Police Chief Joe Hammond and the detective went to the junkyard where they found the hammer and other evidence.

The hammer used in the violence was used by occupants of the house to open a wood stove.

Chappell then again questioned Vallance who started to remember more of what happened at the

scene.

Chappell said that Vallance was pretty much in control of himself until he blurted out "I don't know..." Vallance then got emotional and was arrested after the first interview.

After composing himself, Vallance told the officer more of what went on, saying that there was no fighting or arguing, "She was like a sister to me".

During the autopsy, it was determined that the cause of death was a traumatic head injury caused by a skull fracture. At least six blows were made in a five inch by two-and-a-half inch area. The back of the head did have lacerations, possibly from the bowsaw as well.

After hearing the testimony, the court appointed attorney for Vallance asked the court to enter a Second degree murder charge against Vallance.

The prosecutor then asked for a continuance pending more evidence that had not been returned from the state crime lab.

# Cooking

## BEANS

The American Indians grew and cooked many different kinds of beans. There were some beans grown in Europe before the discovery of the Western Hemisphere, however the navy bean and lima are native to America. The old timers always had a few cooked beans in the house. "Eating cold beans" was an old way of saying that a man's wife was lazy, gadding about, or she might just decide that the "bum" was not worth cooking for some days.

This is a story of how beans could have changed the life style of a young boy growing up in a southern Illinois town. The late Otis Newton told this about himself. He was fascinated by the life of the hobos along the railroad track, and his mother "whopped him good" for hanging around them, but he still persisted. Once when he and a young friend decided to go "begging" they went to a house and asked for food. The housewife gave him a bean sandwich. "If this is all we are going to get, I'm going home." That cured him of the hobo life!

Baked beans have long been considered part of the colonists' diet. My friend Nony Irey of Connecticut says that her family have always made Boston Baked Beans with the small red beans. When I left California last winter, Tim Manlon gave me a bag of little red beans grown in his home area in Lompac, Calif. "In the valley of the flowers," I made bean soup like this with those beans.

### TIM'S BEAN SOUP

1 lb. beans (small red or pinto)  
1/2 lb. sliced bacon, chopped fine  
1 medium onion chopped fine  
1 tablespoon mild salsa sauce or to taste. (start with 1 tablespoon)  
Salt and pepper to taste.

Wash and soak the beans over night or add boiling water, cover and let set for 1 hour. I find either way is OK. Then start cooking, covered with fresh water. Add the onions, bacon and seasonings. Cook slowly until tender or use the pressure cooker method.

These red beans take well to hot seasonings if you like them that way.

Now, here is a way to put cold beans in the gourmet class; another delicious recipe from a

colorful calendar.

### PORK AND BEAN SALAD

1 - 1lb. can pork and beans with tomato sauce  
1 teaspoon soy sauce  
1/4 teaspoon ground ginger  
Dash of garlic powder  
1 - 8 oz. can pear halves, drained and cubed  
1/4 cup diagonally sliced celery  
1/4 cup sliced green onions  
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper

In large bowl, combine beans, soy sauce, ginger and garlic powder. Stir in pears, celery, green onions and green peppers. Chill about 2 hours.

Serve on crisp salad greens and sprinkle with toasted almonds if you wish.

How about green beans? A generation or two back, stringless green beans were unheard of. They were tough and Grandmother cooked them a long time with salt pork or ham. Our new varieties of stringless beans are a delight to use in so many different ways. Cook until crispy tender, serve with a sour cream sauce, like this

### SOUR CREAM SAUCE FOR VEGETABLES

1 cup sour cream  
1 tablespoon cider vinegar  
1 1/2 tablespoons sugar  
2 teaspoon salt  
Dash of pepper

Just before serving pour over cooked and well-drained green beans.

The following is a good main dish for a supper.

### TUNA MACARONI BEAN SALAD

1 - 8 oz. package small shell macaroni  
1 lb. green beans, cut into 1-inch pieces  
1 - 13 oz. can tuna  
1/2 cup bottled Italian dressing  
1/4 cup chopped parsley  
2 medium tomatoes, cut into bite-size chunks  
4 hard-cooked eggs, cut into wedges

Cook macaroni in boiling water until tender, drain. Cook beans in a small amount of boiling, salted water until tender-crisp. Drain.

In large bowl toss macaroni, beans, tuna, dressing, parsley and tomatoes until coated.

Garnish with hard boiled eggs.

proposed would turn the building into a mini-mall with three store units on the lower level and five units on the upstairs level.

The plan was presented to the board by the new owners of the property, Greg and Cheryl Drutchus.

Then the planners approved a one-year extension to the Seaway Review Company for the completion of their project. They had originally come to the planners with a request for a one-year completion date on their building improvements in order to qualify for a tax abatement. The company asked for the extension, as they may have to expand the building. The area of concern is a porch that was proposed along the back of the building. The firm may use the

remaining space on the back of the building for a new addition.

Another request was also referred to the Zoning Board of Appeals when Ray Palicki appeared before the planners showing them what he would like to build in addition to his property at the former Morgan Shaw school.

He had remodelled the school into an apartment complex and now is considering the building of four additional apartments on the same property. He had asked the planners to help provide some input into the proposed plan which would require a setback variance because of the lot lines of the site.

Planners also added two people to the board when they approved Robert Dunnette and Trudy Clark as new members of the board.

# Jottings

According to the mail this past week, what could be one of the greatest breakthroughs in history was discovered by a Wayne State researcher.

He has figured out how to increase the life span, nearly double, of the common fruit fly in an attempt to understand the aging process.

While this is just work with an insect, the aspects of this discovery could end up being used for humans in the near future.

Think of it, a newspaper publisher like myself running this same newspaper for another 100 or so years.

That is, providing some irate reader doesn't take my life into his hands and wring the holy bejeebers out of it.

Anyway, the chances of my living that long are doubtful as the professor doing the work with the insects says the way he increased their longevity was by a program of selective breeding.

Since we who are reading this have already been born, there is little chance we will live to double the present lifespan the insurance companies figure we should have.

Why do scientists use the fruit fly you may ask, when they are looking to help humans? The answer lies in the life span of the insect, which is only about 50 days. The scientist has had some last as long as 120 days in his research.

Using a relatively short-lived insect, the ordinary human can observe many genetic changes in many generations instead of just a few generations if longer-lived animals are used.

It is the same with plants. Genetics have changed the way we eat, grow, and live. Who knows, some day they will figure out how

to grow morels.

Another piece of mail told me why Michigan lost the Saturn plant. No, one of the reasons wasn't that they couldn't find a proper place here in the north country, but mentioned in the analysis by the Michigan Director of Government Relations were factors like wages, unions, taxes, workers' compensation, share of the national wealth and others.

Adding up all those factors makes it easy to see why Michigan lost the bid. But the losses are even bigger when you consider all of the small business that such a plant could bring to the communities around it.

The same is true if a large firm declares bankruptcy or relocates out of the state.

In those cases, the smaller firms lose revenue because the larger customer has disappeared. Local stores lose revenue because many customers no longer have jobs or the spending power. And the ripple effect draws in other companies, jobs and people.

There is a substantial loss in the tax rolls. The citizens of the community have to make up the difference if they want the same lifestyle the community gave them before the plant left.

Another aspect of the fallout of a large company is that the smaller business, due to the economic recession or depression in the area, have fewer resources, staying power or ability to remain in business.

If we had the privilege of having a Saturn plant, the 200,000 businesses in Michigan would definitely be greater as the business climate and the local economy would be stronger.

Maybe we can get the Toyota plant.

# Ware-withal

The matter of what it means to be and to act grown up has kept great minds and great pens busy for centuries. Philosophers have defined and re-defined how mature people should act in an effort to improve society, or justify their existence, or both. In recent years, though, there has been a lack of new directives from learned men on how to act grown up in today's complex society.

But, as of this month, the drought of information is over. A new opinion poll has just been circulated that offers up-to-date guidelines on mature behavior.

Public opinion polls in the United States are one of the growth industries of the 80s. Surveys are taken on all manner of things from opinions on foreign policy to whether it's good for the morale of the people to see their President on horseback to whether chewing bubblegum makes children slack-jawed. The prevailing wisdom appears to be that what the citizens think is the last word on any subject. It seems a loose arrangement, but it's certainly democratic.

The poll in this instance, an independent one, was taken of those standing in the express check-out line of a grocery store on Saturday afternoon. A spokesman for the pollsters indicated that those interviewed seemed a bit rushed but not at all reluctant to give their answers. The pollsters noted their impressions of responders as well as answers given for added clarity. Below is a partial but representative listing of responses to the question, "What does being or acting grown up mean?"

"Understanding that other people have rights the same as I do." The respondent paused and

then added, "Some of them don't deserve them though."

"Hanging up your coat the same day as you wear it." This man spoke as one who had the definitive answer to the question.

"Not publicly calling friends and relatives 'crazies' even when they come up with the dumbest ideas in the world." The man polled looked angry.

# Ramblers lose 26-0 to Grayling in "Battle of Basement" match-up

The Boyne City Ramblers varsity football record dropped Friday night to 0-7 while their opponents, the Grayling Vikings, went up to 1-6 after a 26-0 outcome in the "battle of the basement!"

The game opening series for the Ramblers began on the right foot as they moved the ball downfield at a good clip. The Ramblers converted to their first new series of downs at the Boyne City 45 and quickly moved across mid-field to the Viking 45. Another first and ten was earned at the Grayling 35 on a pass from Pat Weeks to Glen LaCroix. Boyne City's third first down was at the Grayling 25 on a one yard rush from Weeks. Dan McGeorge set up the new series on a short run to the G30, but later in the same series the Ramblers came up empty on two pass attempts and turned the ball over on downs.

Grayling took their first series all the way in six plays that included a 10 yard run and a T.D. pass play that went for 44 yards.

The Ramblers gained 12 yards on their next possession, picking up another first down on the way

from McGeorge, but had a pass knocked down on third and long, setting up the first Rambler punt.

It took Grayling two plays to score from their own 37, a run around the left tackle went to the Rambler goal and the Vikings lead 13-0 with 1:26 left in the quarter. A penalty was called on the conversion attempt and the Vikings set up to kick an extra point, but Brandon Billings made it to the backfield in time to knock down the kick.

McGeorge got a 15 yard runback on the kick-off, setting up the Ramblers with good field position near the BC 40, but were unable to advance any further and lined up to punt. The snap carried past the punter and was downed on the Rambler 24.

The Vikings advanced to the Rambler 20, but ran into trouble against the Rambler pass defense, and after two attempts at a first down were forced to turn the ball over.

The Rambler offense struggled to gain yardage, but were hampered with penalties and stiff pressure from the Viking defense, and punted the ball to the BC 48. From

there the Rambler defense held fairly well, but after trading punts several times the Vikings used the last two minutes of the half trying to up their lead. Five plays later Grayling was at the BC 5 yard line and passed into the endzone to lead 19-0. On the point after attempt both Darren Everest and Billings made it to the kick and knocked it down.

Opening the action in the second half was the Vikings who made it to the Rambler 36, and punted. Boyne completed two passes from Weeks to Lasater and Beebe for 26 yards, but wound up punting the ball again.

The Rambler defense held the Vikings again, and Weeks intercepted a pass, running it to the Grayling 31, but the Ramblers were called for a klip and set themselves back to their own 46. Weeks completed a pass to Lasater on second and eighteen but the Ramblers did not get the yardage required and punted.

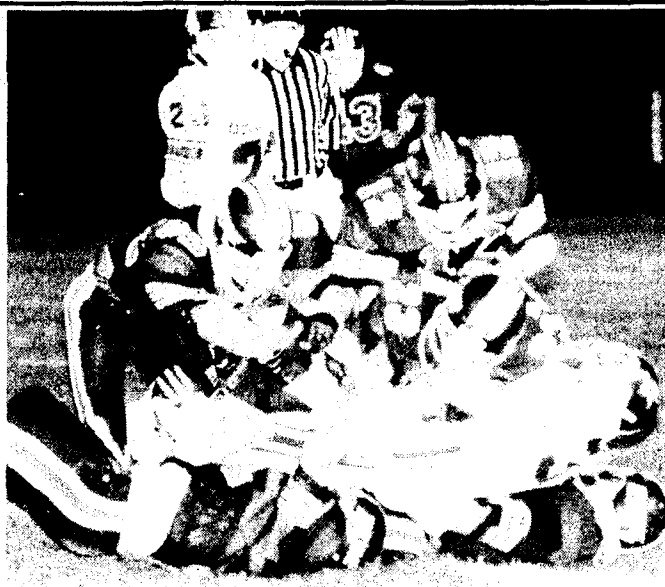
Two plays later Keoki Kuheana recovered a Viking fumble and Boyne took possession at their own 37. The Ramblers were sacked on

first and ten, but came right back passing to LaCroix as the quarter ended.

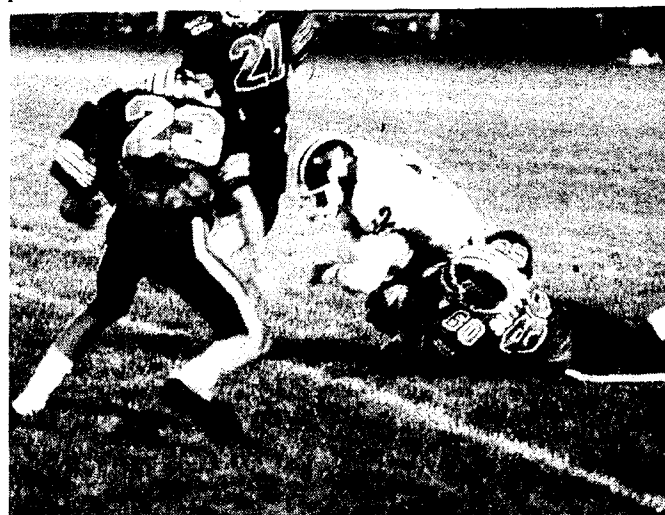

Grayling jumped on the opportunity and threw for a 30 yard gain to the Rambler 45, rushed for 12 yards on two plays, and ran into trouble with penalties. After being penalized for five yards and throwing an incomplete pass, the Vikings broke away to the Rambler 18. Five plays later Grayling scored from the one yard line up the middle. This time the Ramblers were unable to block the kick and the Vikings led 26-0.

In the closing minutes of the game the Ramblers passed for nine yards to LaCroix and McGeorge sprinted 10 yards around the right side, but Boyne fell behind on yardage and was intercepted on fourth and 15 to halt the Rambler drive.

The East Jordan Red Devils (5-2) remained on top in the Ski Valley Conference by defeating the Mancelona Ironmen, 22-0, last Friday. The Red Devils did not allow Mancelona to cross the 50 yard line all evening.

For the first time all season, the Devils did not turn the ball over. They fumbled the ball once in the second quarter, but were able to recover it. The 60 yards in penalties the Devils racked up did not really hurt them, but they still would like to lower that number.

For the second straight week the Red Devils were successful in mixing their passing and rushing game. The variety of plays caused the Ironmen to be a step behind all night.

East Jordan forced Mancelona to punt on their first possession. The Red Devils took over on their own 31 yard line. On their first play from scrimmage, Ted Snowden broke tackles left and right and galloped 69 yards to paydirt. Junior fullback, Darren Graham, carried the ball in for the two point conversion, giving East Jordan an 8-0 lead.

Less than a minute later, Graham gave the Devils great field position when he recovered a fumble at the Mancelona 23 yard line. East Jordan moved the ball down to the nine, with help from an Ironman penalty. Senior quarterback, Bill Lytle, then hit Jim Raymond in the endzone for an

apparent touchdown, but a penalty nullified the play. Three plays later, Lytle connected with Mike Goebel for another apparent touchdown, but off-setting penalties nullified the score once again. The Devils then turned the ball over on downs, but Mancelona had a long way to go.

As was the case almost all night for the Ironmen, all they could manage was to run three plays and then punt. The Devils took over at the Mancelona 39, and on nine plays had built a 14-0 lead. This time, Graham plowed in from the two. The two point conversion try failed.

East Jordan was not through in the first half, however. With 3:46 remaining, the Devils had the ball at their own six yard line. A 31 yard pass from Greg Kitson to Goebel gave East Jordan a first down at the Mancelona 49. Four plays later East Jordan was at the 38, but time was running out. With 30 seconds left, Kitson found Snowden open in the middle of the field. With Snowden's blazing speed, he was able to outrun everybody on his way to a 38 yard touchdown reception. Graham, again, ran in the extra point, which put East Jordan up 22-0 at halftime.

The Devils toyed with the Ironmen the rest of the game. The biggest thrill for the Devils came when Dave Russell attempted his

first field goal of the year, a 35 yard attempt. He had plenty of distance but missed to the left by no more than three feet.

The Devils gained 242 yards rushing on 45 carries. Ted Snowden was their leading rusher gaining 114 yards on 13 carries. Others gaining yards for the Devils were Darren Graham with 60, Dave Russell with 32, Aaron Spence with 18, Bill Lytle with eight, Gerald Clark with six, and Darcy Bennett with four.

Bill Lytle and Greg Kitson combined for the most yards passing (141) by East Jordan this season. Lytle completed seven of 12 passes for 72 yards, while Kitson was right on two of five passes for 69 yards.

Ted Snowden had three receptions for 60 yards to lead the Devils in that category. Mike Goebel grabbed two passes for 59 yards

while Aaron Spence also had two receptions and Darren Graham and Dave Russell each had one.

Defensively for the Devils, Dale Schroeder got the hit on 10 teckles. Dave Russell and Bill Kraemer each had seven, Darren Graham collected six, Jeff Gee totaled five, and Terry Burt and Darrin Bishop each had four. The Devils sacked the Mancelona quarterback three times with Bill Kraemer, Dale Schroeder, Darren Graham, Ron Cook, and Darcy Bennett each getting a hand on him.

East Jordan's junior varsity football team lost a tough battle with Mancelona on Wednesday, 6-0. They dropped to 2-5 on the year. They will travel to Gaylord tonight to take on St. Marys.

On Friday, the varsity squad will host Gaylord St. Marys. The game will be East Jordan's last home game and parents' night.

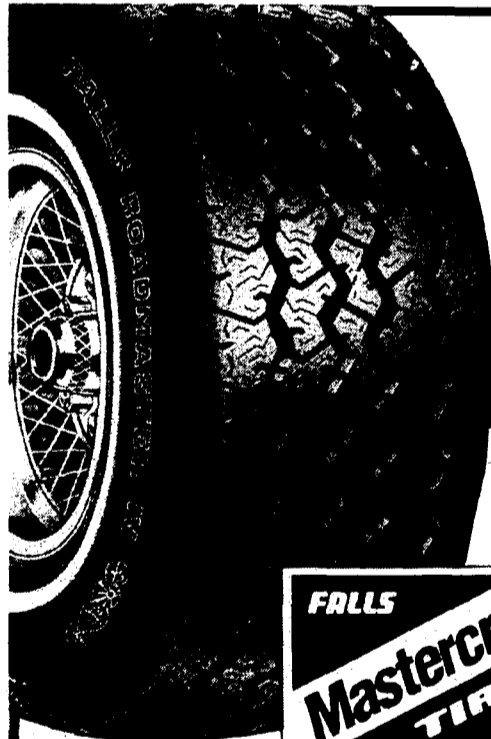
## Rambler golfers off in state meet

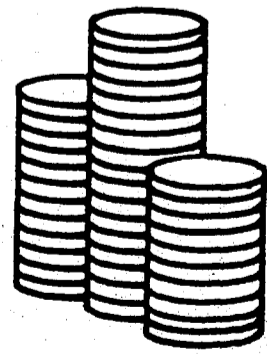
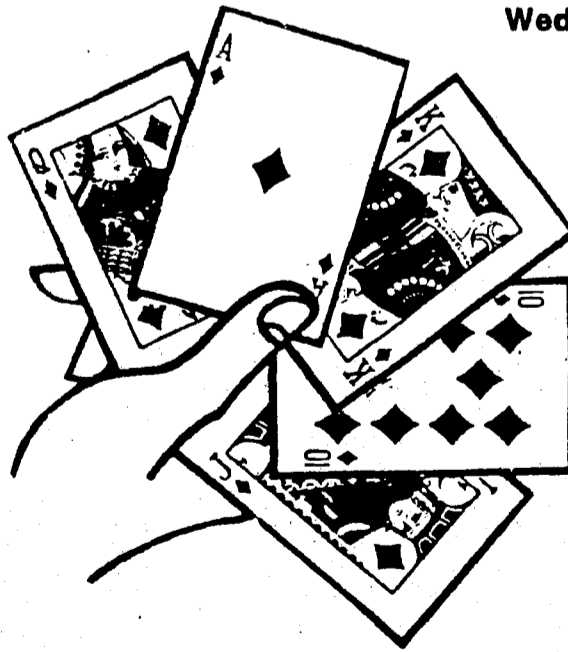

Thorp finished up with a game high 17 points while Dillon totaled 8. Cynthia Boydston and Martinez had two points each.

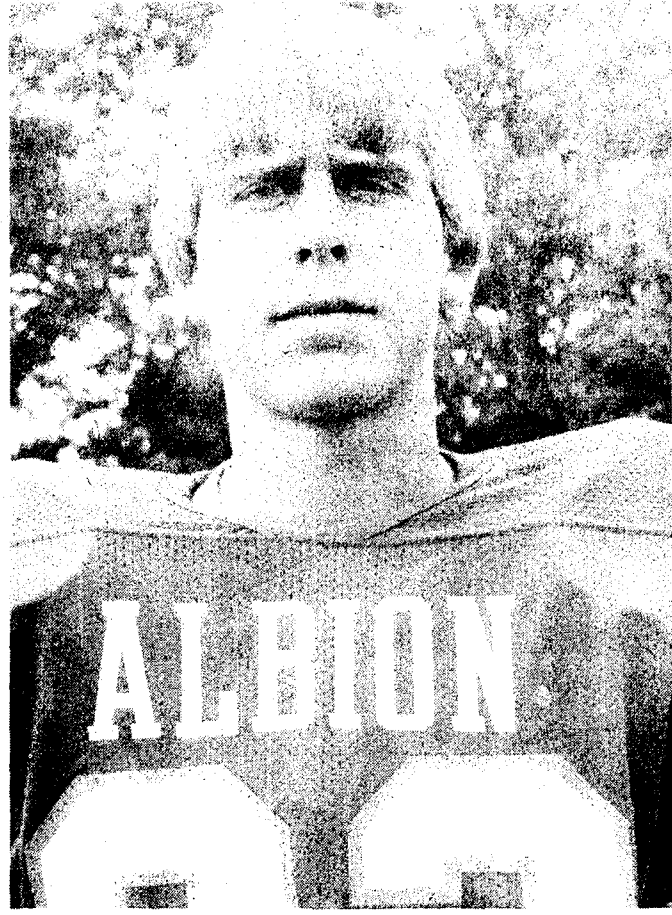
