News Briefs

Boyne City officials again stated the Beautification drive was set for the weekend of May 17th. City departments will pick up old appliances and allow all trash, not garbage, to be dumped in a dumpster to be set up next to the City Hall. Those wanting appliances picked up should call before Friday of next week to arrange an appointment for pick-up times. There is a \$2.00 fee for the refuse and the white-goods.

Almost \$4,000 in art grants have been awarded to northern Michigan communities. Among them, the City of Charlevoix received two. One for the July 5th performance of Dr. Goodhart's Home Remedy at St. Mary's Church and the other for a July 26th performance of Iowa Rose.

Boyne Falls High School will be presenting the play "A-Fueding' over Yonder" this Friday, May 9th at 7:30 p.m. Tickets will be sold at the door for \$2.00. The presentation is being made by the speech and drama class.

Also in Boyne Falls, seniors will be leaving Saturday for Florida for their Senior Trip. They are set to return the following Sunday, May 18. While in Florida, sights they are scheduled to see include Disney World-Epcot Center, Kennedy Space Center, Sea World and Daytona.

May 14th, the Char-Em School district will be holding a developmental screening clinic for those East Jordan area children who will be entering Kindergarten in 1987. The clinic will be held at the East Jordan Elementary School. The purpose of the clinic is to provide parents of three-year-old children with information and to identify any potential learning difficulties. An appointment is necessary and can be made by calling 547-9947 for further information and times available.

Group to try raising \$30,000 for beach

Boyne City -- A citizens group presented a plan to the city commissioners at the Tuesday noon meeting that would allow the city to retain ownership of the two parcels of land the city has pro-

posed to sell to Northern Associates for \$65,500.

The money would then be used, if sold, to help provide the matching grant monies needed for the city's share of the new Peninsula

Beach currently under construction.

The group, which was formed last Sunday, presented a petition to the city with 429 signatures asking the city to look at another alternative.

That alternative would be to give the group 30 days with which to come up with money that would be donated to the city to meet the matching grant.

The group told the commissioners they have already received pledges for \$12,000 so far and hope to raise at least \$30,000 for the two parcels.

The commissioners asked City Attorney Bill McTaggart if they could accept such an offer and he told them the city does not yet have a contract with the developers to sell the land as there are many details to be worked out concerning a proposed lot swap where the developers would gain ownership of the Main Street Access in trade for an equal amount of land that would tie the beach site together.

The group, headed by Richard May and Gary Mellon, told the commissioners they feel the city needs all of the land in the area. They want the new beach to be as

aesthetically looking as possible and not have a building blocking the view of the beach. They also said they wanted the additional 50 foot lot to be used as greenspace while the city has proposed to use the lot to make further parking.

Commissioner Cass Toton made a motion to table the whole matter for thirty days and it was approved.

When asked what could happen if the developers do not buy the parcels by Linda Christensen, a member of the Parks and Recre-

Melrose decides to reappraise twp.

Melrose Township--After officials of the township found they could do it, use Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for a reassessment of the entire township, members of the board concurred and agreed to let the present assessor do the job.

The action stemmed from a question raised at the annual meeting held last March when the assessor said many of the parcels of ground have incomplete information making it difficult at best, in trying to figure out the assessment for the township.

It was suggested the answer might be to reassess the entire township to take care of any of the problems that have risen from the time the township was last totally assessed.

That was back in 1972 and was done by the county. While officials have not said they were dissatisfied with that appraisal, they have started to question whether or not the entire township was correctly appraised on an individual basis.

The township has had one of the lowest factors in recent years because of the assessors' keeping on top of property changes. But, according to one township official, someone who purchased a piece of

property back in the thirties may still be paying on the assessment made at that time. That piece of property today may be worth millions, the official said.

The question of assessments was brought up by the present assessor, Tony Keller, when he reported he was having problems bringing the assessments up to date as many parcels he was working with had answers missing from the records.

According to Larry Olliffe, the Township Supervisor, Keller was doing a great job. "We have been extremely satisfied with the work he has done so far, and I think the entire board concurs with me on this," Olliffe said.

The work will be starting as soon as Keller can work out the details. "Some property owners may be in for a surprise," Olliffe said, "Because of the records being incomplete, some properties may have been paying too much, while others too little. This will bring everything current and right.

The cost estimated by Keller to reappraise the township was about \$18,000.

With the board's approval, Keller hopes to have the job completed within the year.

Falls to ask 2.5 additional millage in June

Boyne Falls --Boyne Falls school officials are asking the voters of the school district to approve an additional 2.5 mills for three years for school operations in the upcoming school election this June.

The monies, if approved by the voters, would allow the school to keep the present level of education. That was one of the considerations the board had to look at when they were presented three different school budgets by superintendent Bob Redmond at last month's board meeting. The school is proposing to add

high school math and science course on a yearly basis instead of alternate years as they have had in the past, allow the purchase of replacement textbooks, let them begin replacing student typewriters, replace broken chairs and desks, repair plumbing and bathroom fixtures in the high school boys' and girls' restrooms.

The cuts that would have to be made even if the millage passes include reducing the chapter one math services and cutting back on some travel, conference and supply monies

Landfill still problem to Evangeline Twp. board

Evangeline Township -- "After a walk through the Boyne City Landfill, and being accosted by several residents who didn't know what I was doing in the landfill, I discovered seven refrigerators with doors still intact, the white goods that had been promised to be removed still there, and some erosion problems," Evangeline Township board member Doug Shields told the board at their meeting Monday night.

"I think we should send another letter to the City of Boyne City and ask when the work that was promised to be done when the weight restrictions were lifted will be done," he continued.

The board agreed and will again come in force to a city hall meeting to express their concerns over the ongoing landfill problem.

In a meeting last month, the operator of the landfill had said he was going to remove the white goods, bury the brush, try to take care of the erosion that is starting as soon as possible.

"It has been about three or four weeks since that was said to us," Trustee Bruce Janssen added. The board also wondered when the trees the city ordered would be planted.

That matter brought to the attention of the new board, they also discussed a trash problem with a

home on Springwater Beach. Evidently, a home had been rented to skiers during the winter, and the trash was allowed to accumulate. With the advent of warmer weather and the danger of rodents, Shields said he would call the home owner to see if the problem could be taken care of soon.

The board passed a new no smoking rule for the township hall. The new rule was to take place immediately and includes all functions held at the hall. The township is looking to make the new rule an ordinance to give it more strength.

WORKING MOTHER'S TIME SAVERS

The size of the family and the hours that they are home indicates the way the working mother needs to plan meals for her family.

When my friend, Gail, and I had to drive about 20 miles home from work our main topic of discussion was: "What will we have for dinner?" We were hungry then which is the ideal time to plan a few menus. One idea would follow another, and we were getting hungry by the mile. Gail liked to put chicken in the oven then she could relax a little while. Here is one of those chicken oven dinners that the whole family will approve of. It's easy to prepare.

Joyce's Onion Crusted Chicken
4 chicken breasts or desired pieces
1 stick butter, melted
1 tsp. dry mustard
1 tbl. Worcestershire sauce
2 cans (3 oz each) fried onion rings (crushed)
Melt butter and add mustard and Worcestershire. Dip chicken in butter mixture then roll in onion ring crumbs. Place in 9 x 13 pan and top with any remaining crumbs and butter. Bake at 350 degrees 30 to 40 minutes.

Many mothers cook ahead when they have time, then meals can be zapped in the microwave or put in the oven when she arrives home. Casseroles, lasagna, and chili are good for this or she might bake a ham or turkey over the weekend. Salads that keep like copper pennies, sauerkraut salad, and cabbage salads are handy to serve with these meals. Variety breads or rolls from the bakery make these meals special.

This is a nice entree for the working gal to fix ahead and be able to serve a nice dinner very quickly.

Meat Balls in Sour Cream
1 1/2 pounds lean ground beef
2 eggs
1/2 cup fresh bread crumbs
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped parsley
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 cups beef broth
1 cup sour cream
1 tablespoon prepared horseradish or to taste
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
In large bowl mix beef crumbs, onion parsley and salt. Shape into about 24 balls. In large skillet over medium heat bring broth to a simmer, add balls in a single layer. Cover and cook 20 minutes. Refrigerate up to 3 days or freeze one month.
To complete: thaw if frozen.

remove fat and discard. Reheat meat balls and broth, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Stir in sour cream, horseradish and pepper. Simmer 1 minute or until heated. Do not boil. Sprinkle with parsley.
Six servings. Serve with baked potatoes, noodles or rice and do not hesitate to pick up a salad at the deli-many are very good.
Serve fruit in season, strawberries are beginning to be available they are also good frozen. Even a dish of apple sauce with a cookie would be a tasty dessert for this dinner.

Then there are the breakfast type meals. Those egg Benedict, French toast, omelettes, and the new sandwiches using croissants, even the old time bacon and eggs or sausage and pancakes are great for dinner. Many people tell me that they prefer these meals later in the day, also many do not have the time in the morning to prepare them. I believe that this is the reason that the brunch has become so popular. Most of us love breakfast dishes.

This next recipe is one of the breakfast type which will be a complete dinner dish, so pretty to look at and so good!

Broccoli Benedict
10 oz. pkg. frozen cut broccoli with cheese sauce in a pouch
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
2 slices bread, toasted or 1 English muffin, split and toasted
2 slices cooked ham
1 egg, hard cooked and chopped
Place unopened broccoli pouch in vigorously boiling water in a saucepan. Do not cover. Bring water to a second vigorous boil and heat for 18 minutes.

In a small bowl, combine broccoli and mustard. Place toast on serving plate. Top each with ham slice and broccoli mixture. Garnish with egg to serve. 2 servings. Could easily be doubled.

An Open Letter to Representative Robert Davis, Senator Carl Levin and Senator Donald Riegler: Dear Sirs:

Every week I get letters from you, franked and sent free and paid for by the taxpayer. Not just one letter each, but about three to five each and every week.

Some of the letters are very informative, but most are just letters looking to have your name placed in the newspaper every week to further your political careers.

Your letters are not the only governmental letters my office receives every day. I would venture one-third of the mail I receive each day comes from governmental agencies, using taxpayer monies to mail tons of information out to people with little or no use for all of it except to keep the landfills a problem area because of use.

In any case, I wish to inform you that effective immediately, I will not be running any letters or information from any of you.

The reason for the stopping of providing free information is the cost of doing business.

In the past few years, the postage bill for mailing out news to our readers has risen drastically—about 1100 percent.

In just the last few months, we have seen a 28 percent increase. Due to a suit filed by newspaper mailers, one area of the postal rates was reduced slightly. But another classification was eliminated that all publishers use, making an overall rate increase.

I had always thought the Congress and the Senate ran the country. That the members had control of all of the purse strings. My thinking has changed 1100 percent from the time I used to think that.

You fellows have done a lousy job of containing costs. You have used what some call "pork belly" bills to create new and different projects within certain states. Not too many for Michigan, however, as we always seem to be the last for receiving money back from the

government as compared to the money going into the government.

You fellows have not made a commitment to containing costs. About the only thing you guys have done is to get the Gramm-Rudmann Act passed to try to control what you do not want to control.

But in the passage of that act, you have created, perhaps, the greatest excuse for fiscal responsibility to come down the pike.

All of the federal agencies are now saying that certain things can't be done due to the act.

They forget the items being done have been done more effectively and efficiently in the past than they are today.

As an example... Why does it take many months for the governmental agency called the Corps of Engineers to make a simple decision concerning a shoreline protection device? It should only take a couple of days. It used to take in the "old days" prior to 1980.

Why do you let the governmental agency, like the postal authority, the right to set rates? Why can't you? Are you afraid to take the bull by the horns for fear of losing your jobs?

But, back to the other reason for stopping your free publicity.

I literally cannot afford to give you the space.

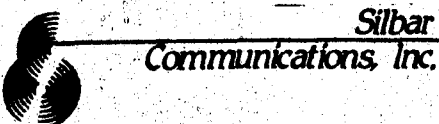

Tax breaks? Writer says too many groups given breaks

Editor
The Governor, a Democrat, says property taxes in Michigan are too high so he proposes to increase taxes on insurance companies and banks, so he can lower property taxes for selected groups.

The Senate Majority leader John Engler, a Republican, says property taxes are too high so he proposes an increase in the sales tax to lower property taxes for select groups.

In the past both parties have agreed to programs designed to lower the tax burden on targeted groups. These proposals known as tax abatements, industrial facilities taxes etc. have effectively lowered the property tax burden on commercial and industrial property. Another effect of some of these programs has been to reduce the property tax burden on cities and increase the burden on townships. These facts are all supported by statistical data emanating from the Senate Fiscal Agency, and the Department of Management and Budget.

At this point we should also discuss the breaks that property taxpayers are given. For example; If your property tax burden exceeds 3.5 percent of your income, that state will give some money back in the form of a rebate. If you are a senior citizen, disabled, or certain categories of Veteran, they will also give you a property tax break.

Se we can readily see that special groups get special breaks, but how about the rest of our citizens? And how about the legality of the property tax system itself?

In essence, our property tax system has become a form of a graduated income tax. The Michigan Constitution contains a prohibition against graduated income taxes.

As we can see from the above special groups are given tax breaks, however, the Michigan Constitution says that taxes must be levied equally and fairly. Again, are these breaks a violation of our Constitution? Both the Democrats and Republicans agree that property taxes are too high, so why don't they lower them for everyone?

The answer is very obvious. All federal and state revenue sharing formulas and school aid formulas take into consideration the value of our communities. When assessments are increased and the total value of our communities are increased by the State Tax Commission, revenue sharing, federal, state and school decrease. To put it another way, the State Tax Commission determines the final value of our property if they believe the value is to low, they will force the county and or your local assessor to raise assessments. The higher our assessments are raised, the less financial aid we receive for our

schools and our communities. If we carry this system to a logical conclusion, there could come a point in time when property taxpayers will pay all the money necessary to operate our county, city or township governments, and bear the entire school tax burden. In fact about 1/3 of the school districts in our state are funded exclusively by local property taxpayers.

We pay state taxes not only to operate state government, but also to use that government as the collector of taxes to be returned to our

local units of government.

The unique system we have in Michigan could soon force all of us into the poor house if positive action is not taken in the very near future.

An attempt at correcting the problem occurred when the citizens of our state approved the Headlee Amendment. We said in that amendment that for every dollar collected in state taxes, 41.7 cents was supposed to go directly to our local units of government. The state has cheated us in this area and there is at least one lawsuit

pending, and another anticipated to compel the state to comply.

Every attempt at lowering property taxes has eventually resulted in a tax shift and higher taxes. Example: When the sales tax was first enacted, a portion was set aside to fund public education for the foreseeable future. But today we can see that even with increased sales taxes, the lotto, cigarette and liquor taxes (a portion of which are dedicated to fund education) that the local property taxpayer is forced each year to shoulder a larger portion of the education cost burden.

If our citizens are truly interested in making Michigan a better place to live and work, then they will have to take matters into their own hands if they truly wish property tax relief. It's obvious that both the majority of Republicans and Democrats want to increase taxes to lower taxes. In the end we will pay higher taxes for ever decreasing levels of service.

We of the Macomb County Taxpayers' Association are disgusted with the performance of the majority of politicians in our state. We are disgusted with the promise of higher taxes to lower taxes. We are disgusted with the formulas that force us to pay an ever increasing share of the education burden while the state squanders our money in other seemingly frivolous areas. We are disgusted with the threat of higher taxes to

fund state and local infrastructure repair, mass transportation, parks (local and state), higher education, people movers, building expansions, etc. etc. etc.

We are prepared to offer yet another Constitutional Amendment that would once and for all solve the problem of higher taxes in our state. ation Board, Rick Smith one of the owner of Northern Associates said a lot of things could happen and they would have to take a look at each item.

"While I am delighted to see the interest in the project," Smith said, "It is unfortunate that it comes at this point." He explained all of the processes the city and the developer have gone through

the years it has taken to get the beach to this point, beginning with the first efforts of the City Manager Tim Clifton. He said it has always been assumed the developers would be providing the match with the sale of the two properties in question.

He then explained the proposed land swap which was being promoted by the Department of Natural Resources, the granting body for the project.

"We all want the same thing," he added speaking to the group, "We all want an excellent beach and we don't want to construct anything to detract from the city property as well as our own interests."

"If the sale cannot go through, there is a likelihood there would be no swap of lands, and no buildings of public piers along the beach peninsula," he added.

After the meeting, he said the developers and the group can get

Consumers Power cautions spring time tree trimmers

CAUTION: TREE TRIMMING CAN BE HAZARDOUS TO YOUR HEALTH. There's no such warning on trees or pruning saws, but Richard G. Dahlquist, area community services director of Consumers Power Company's Cheboygan area, urges prospective tree trim-

mers to exercise care just the same. With warmer weather finally here, Dahlquist warns people planning a tree trimming project to make sure they stay away from overhead power lines while doing their cutting. "If a limb does become entangled in your

electric service lines, call the local power company right away. Don't try to remove it yourself and take the risk of a disabling injury," Dahlquist said. In 1985 there were 336 temporary electric service outages affecting 34,639 customers due to tree trimming

incidents throughout Consumers Power's 27,800 square-mile service area in Michigan. One of them became an accident when a man received a shock while trying to disentangle a felled tree from a 14,400 volt primary power line. People can receive an electric shock

simply by touching a tree that has fallen against an energized power line. "Many people are not aware that trees can conduct electricity, but they can particularly when they're wet," Dahlquist said. Dahlquist offered the following suggestions for safe tree cut-

ting: -Before any pruning, check thoroughly for the possible presence of electric wires. -Plan your cutting to prevent falling limbs from coming in contact with power lines. -If just a branch touches a live power line, stop and call your local power company. Don't risk injury by

attempting to remove the branch or tree yourself. Consumers Power is Michigan's largest and the nation's safest utility, serving almost six million of the state's nine million people in 67 of 68 counties in the lower peninsula.

City officials said the thirty days given after the tabling would not be holding up the project as it would take that much time to get the survey and other work completed before a swap could be initiated.

The motion to sell the land to the developer was made contingent upon the land swap being done, according to McTaggart.

In other action the commissioners agreed to purchase a new air compressor for the Fire Department to refill the air tanks they use when fighting fires. The present system is not adequate and takes too long to refill a tank. This was made apparent earlier this year when there was a fire and the City of Petoskey had to be used during it to refill tanks used along with the Boyne departments. The new compressor should be able to provide quicker refilling, according to Fire Chief Butch Erber. The low bidder for the compressor was West Shore Services of Allendale, MI. The firm will include the setting up, servicing and liability for the installation as well as a warranty on the equipment. The cost was \$6,345.

The City then agreed to file suit against Elmer Crain who says he holds the rights to the former Boyne City Railroad property.

Crain installed some cedar fence posted along the right-of-way he holds and that is in the way of the

new airport runway extension.

McTaggart told the commissioners he feels Crain only holds the rights to run a railroad through the property and the property is owned by the city. He recommended the suit to be filed to have the court determine ownership and use rights.

They also heard reports on the progress of the barrier free ramp the township is trying to have built at the township hall, heard a report from the cemetery committee, and decided to buy a lawnmower and lawn tractor from Frank's Total in Boyne City to mow the township's public areas as well as the cemetery. Total cost of the new equipment was estimated to be about \$1,500 after trade-ins and deals the Bolens Company has with municipalities.

The board then agreed to recess until next Tuesday after the noon Boyne City meeting when they will reconvene to look at all of the access parcels on Lake Charlevoix along Glenwood Beach, Pinehurst Shores, Nelson Road and Springwater Beach to see how the lake has eroded the shoreline over the winter with the high water. They will also be looking at what needs to be done to protect the shoreline for the neighboring parcels to the accesses.

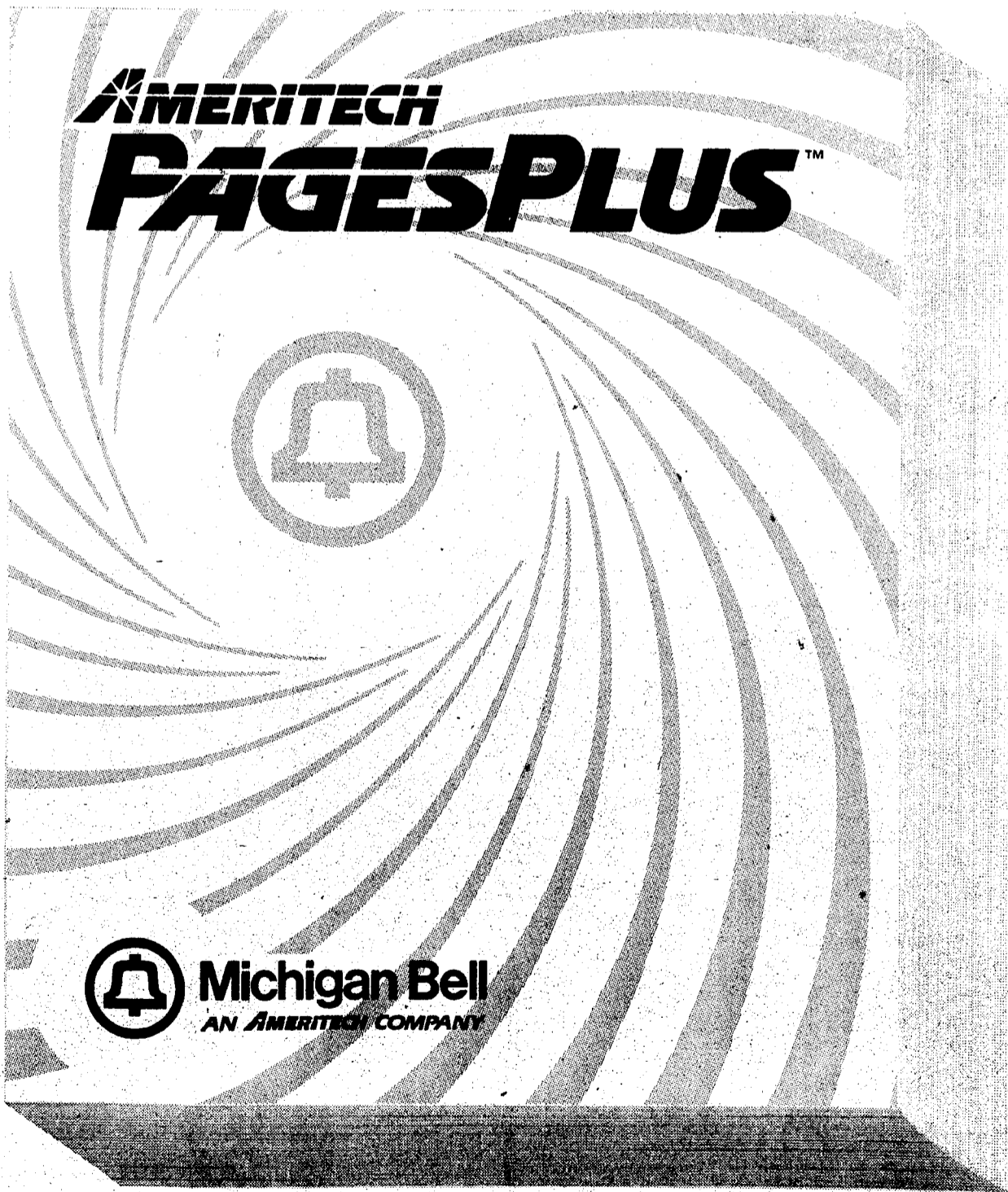
