City fathers castigate area daily newspaper

Boyne City Commissioners spent most of their Tuesday noon meeting castigating the Petoskey News-Review concerning what the commissioners called biased reporting about the former Boyne City Landfill.

Almost all of the com-missioners took their turn

telling about the incident where the News-Review had written a front page headline article making Boyne City out to be the "bad guys" because they have done very little to cap and finally close the landfill which the city operated for the area for many

The meeting was opened by Commissioner Steve Moody saying the article was "unkind" and should have stated all of the facts concerning the landfill. Moody told the audience and the other commissioners that the landfill, when it was opened, was on a site designated by the

authority in charge at the time, the State Department of Health.

It met all of the rules for landfills under those guidelines, Moody continued, and because the landfill operations moved to the Department of Natural Resources, and the rule changes that followed, the city should not be required to comply with the closing of the landfill.

Commissioner Cass Toton jumped in saying, "we could have fought the DNR another five years and kept it open, but we complied with their request to close it. They have mandated the closing of landfills and they, under the terms of the Headlee Amendment, have to provide the funds to do the work. So far they haven't.'

The Headlee Amendment requires the state to fund all costs if they change rules through a governing agency that would require compliance. The DNR or the state is supposed to fund the capping of the landfill, according to Toton.

The newspaper had printed a picture of work in progress, calling it uncapped and uncovered refuse. That picture brought in the former operator of the landfill Clarence Smith, who was contracted to do the work by the city, to say he would take full responsibility for the crushed white goods the picture shows. He has been working since early spring to crush, load and remove the refrigerators. and other large appliances. Smith said the picture is a "total misrepresentation of what the landfill is like.'

He added that the "news media comes to their own conclusions. They never have asked me questions as to what we were doing.'

City Attorney Bill McTaggart then said, "The city was and is, in my opinion, under no obligation to close the dump. When the city did, they did it by

choice to help the environment.
"Now, the DNR wants the city to spend about one-half million dollars to cap it. When the state provides the money, then it will be capped."

As to money for capping the landfill, the city was one of the first to apply for grants under ean Michigan Fund. Toton said. "But everyone around us got money for projecbut none came into Charlevoix County.'

McTaggart said the city ought to be commended instead of critized for closing the landfill.

Moody then told the commissioners that when the dump was opened, the health department had said, according to their scientists, the landfill base should be sandy. Then the DNR changed the rules and said the landfills should have a clay base. He asked which is the right way? He also implied the DNR doesn't know which is right either as they have not been able to answer questions them-

Moody then said the news ar-

ticle showed the city has been doing nothing and failed to respond to a letter sent out to the city and to Evangeline Township where the landfill is located. He said just the opposite is being done, the city has voluntarily closed the landfill and is waiting the funding from the state to see that it is properly capped.

He said "We can't ask just the taxpayers of the community to pay for the capping when every township around the landfill also used it, including the state.'

City Manager Randy Frykberg told the commissioners he was working on a plan with the DNR, the Soil and Conservation crew and an engineer. He did not release any details to the plan as it is still in negotiations with all of the parties. "Until we work all the details, the on'y thing I can say is 'no comment',' he added.

Frykberg also said the DNR can proceed with what they want. The city will continue to work on the plan and then follow it after it is presented and approved by the commissioners.

The letter from the DNR had suggested they would be looking into legal action, if a reply was sent to them within a time limit. The city did not respond within the limit.

The commissioners cited the case where the DNR has sued a landfill in the Upper Peninsula and had lost the case. The DNR had mandated that landfill to be closed and had not provided any money to cap it as they required.

Commissioners also brought up the many other landfills that are not in compliance and have not been under the DNR pressure to have them closed. Cited were the Petoskey landfill, the Indian River landfill, which is on state property and others.

This led to a discussion that the DNR only responds to complaints, and through the efforts of the Evangeline Township Board, they have been working on the Boyne City Landfill case instead of working on landfill problems where they have not had complaints.

One landfill in Petoskey was said to have leaked a blue leachate recently. Their landfill is in the area of the ice skating rinks. Other landfills cited have been closed for years but have

not yet been capped as required. One of the findings of the Boyne City research on the landfill is that the natural water flow is going to the center of the landfill and not traveling, according to Frykberg. That finding along with others are being considered in the plans being proposed for the final capping.

High water causing sewer problems

High groundwater levels are causing a problem for campers wishing to camp in the East Jordan Tourist Park. They are finding they can't use the individual sewer hook-ups at the park because the groundwater is seeping into them and causing the city's sewer treatment plant to run beyond its treatment capacity.

The finding and the closure of the hook-ups was the result of a preliminary evaluation by the Public Works Superintendent, "Mike" Dionne. He said the area of the Tourist Park has the greatest infiltration. Campers using the park will have to use the common pump-out station while the city is seeking bids to replace the sewer line to the bath houses and the hook-ups.

The shutoff of the sewer lines in the park will be affecting 64 campsites.

The city has hiried an engineering firm from Grand Rapids to study the system and make recommendations. The study is to identify the sources of the infiltration, decide alternatives and then prepare plans for increasing the capacity of the sewer treatment plant.

One of the ideas being presented would have the city build another lagoon near the airport, the site of two existing lagoons. The cost for the lagoon would be less and take fewer hours to maintain, according to Mike clarify the billing procedure for Chew, the head of the sewer property owners affected by the plant. It would also allow the

city to eliminate a digester and sludge drying beds near the Sportsmen's Park. The beds have caused an odor problem in the area, residents have said.

Boyne planners okay industrial site plans

Boyne City planners, Monday night, approved two site plans for work that has already started on plants in the new Air-Industrial Park.

The two plants include Prestige Press and Temprel Products Company who were given the approval after a review of each site plan. Both were approved with little changes.


In making the request for Temprel, Bob Cousineau showed the planners a 4,000 square foot building. The planners asked only he provide an area outside of the building for refuse and he

show a designated truck loading area on the plan. Cousineau said he expected to have the building completed by October 15.

The plans call for a building to be constructed on concrete, steel, brick and wood.

While the Prestige Press held their groundbreaking last Wednesday, actual construction was waiting the approval of their new building. President of the firm Doug Shields told the planning board he was going to raise the entire building about three feet so he would have natural





The first-born child has a tough way to go. What with starting life with inexperienced parents and trying to live up to their bewildering array of expectations, as well as interpreting their moods and tastes to the children that come after him, he's heir to a host of responsibilities. But there's a bright side to his lot, a gift amid the grubbiness. As first in the birth order, he's most likely to be the brightest of the bunch.

At least U. of M. psychologist. Robert B. Zajonc, figures it that way. It's part of his "confluence theory", a theory that was laid out in a recent issue of Northwest Michigan Vacationeer.

Zajonc came up with his theory while researching the reason for the drop in SAT scores from the '60s to the '80s. SATs are those white-knuckle tests many college-bound students take that are supposed to predict their success in college, and occasionally do.

researchers that the dirty air or newfangled food was at the root of the problem. But Zajonc is convinced that it was bigger families reducing the level of the in-tellectual climate of the household that did it.

Intellectual climate, in his view, is the key to verbal ability on which academic tests are based. The best climate exists in households where the ratio, of adults to children favors adults. Once the children outnumber the adults, the climate gets diluted.

psychologist further The believes that birth order affects children's intelligence. The firstborn has the richest intellectual

environment, thus the best mind. The more older brother and sisters a child has, the poorer his intellectual enviroment. And the birth of children after him, thins the air even more.

Students taking the SATs from '63 through '80 averaged third-born. Those who took the test in the '80s, when the test scores began rising again, averaged second-born. They also came from smaller families.

As further proof of Zajonc's theory, students from all grade levels taking the Iowa Basic Skills tests did less well during the era of big families and better thereafter.

Zajonc's "confluence theory" clearly points to the first-born as the most favored one in the brain power category. But while brightest, he's not likely to be lightest. He carries the load of child-rearing parent's notions.

First-time parents come to eir roles armed with absolutes like "always" and "never". They also carry bits of information gleaned from child-raising books which they have pieced together as they've seen fit. The child's self-interest meets the zeal of the parents in a struggle of wills. In time, the encounters bend the parents a little, make the child resilient and simplify life considerably for subsequent children.

The first-born is given his position at birth. Then he spends the next eighteen years or so paying for it. Enriched, enlightened climate and all, being number one child is a tough way to go. But Zajonc's "confluence theory" does offer some compen-


