While Jimmie Heuga of the Jimmie Heuga Express skied and watched, groups of skiers were trying to see how many vertical feet they could ski and how much money they could raise in a day last Wednesday at Boyne Mountain for the Jimmie Heuga Center located in Vail. Heuga was at the top of his ski career when he was diagnosed as having multiple sclerosis. After a year of feeling ill, he resolved to get back in shape to go skiing. His work with physical conditioning has started to generate some excitement in medical circles as he has almost beaten back the disease through conditioning. The center was started to further the research Heuga started. Although the teams did not ski a million feet, they hit a total of 906,750 vertical feet during the day. All of the team members skied over 70 runs, most of them down Hemlock. Over \$10,000 was raised for the center as well as the Challenge Mountain program which was also involved with the sharing of the funds generated. The winning team, called Coca Cola Two of Jim Coon, Claudia Kenifeck and Judy Stowe from Boyne City and Charlevoix, won a free trip to Vail for the finals. Taking second place was the Over the Hill Gang, from Boyne City, followed by the Boyne Highlands team. Heuga said the event was a success and he will bring the Express back next year for more.

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## News Briefs

This month, cheese, rice, and flour will be given away in the continuing federal food distribution program for those with low incomes. Next Wednesday, Feb. 25, the food will be distributed from the Community Services Center in Boyne City, the Civic Center in East Jordan and the V.F.W. Hall in Charlevoix.

The food program will start at 10 a.m. and continue to 2 p.m. or until the food is distributed.

Continuing the programs about drug abuse at the Boyne City High School, Principal Warren Wade said the next program will have Bill Essex, fast becoming America's most respected expert on drug/alcohol abuse prevention. Essex will have two programs, Monday, Feb. 23, at 7:30 p.m. at Boyne City Elementary School for the community, and a combined assembly with Boyne Falls and Boyne City Middle and High School the next day at 1:10 p.m. The public is invited to either session. The program is being sponsored by the Boyne City Lions, Rotary club and the P.T.O.

Boyne Falls P.T.O. is still trying to get donations for carpeting the classrooms at the school. Those wishing to purchase a yard or so of carpeting are asked to call the school or P.T.O. members. So far, Bob and Judy Wagner, Dan and Ruth Goldsmith, Floyd and Jeanette Glem, Arnold and Margaret Massey, Ron and Vickie Skop, Joann Gibes, Bill and Ellen Massey and the Ace Hardware have purchased one or more yards, while Four Season's Motor Lodge and Sleepy Fawn Country Inn Motel sponsored 10 yards or more. Each yard is priced at \$10.

## Redmond resigns Boyne Falls position

Robert Redmond, Superintendent of the Boyne Falls School District submitted his letter of resignation to the school board at their monthly meeting in order to accept a similar position at the Mason County Central School District, located in Scottville, Michigan.

His resignation was accepted by the board with great regrets. The resignation will be effective with the end of the school day on April 11, 1987.

In his letter, Redmond said the school district has seen some tremendous progress in the two and a half years he has been here in areas such as curriculum, computer instruction, office automation, new equipment, cutting utility costs, improving the facility and he started a good line of communication with parents.

He said the district has reduced costs by seeking alternative forms of vocational education, and has a unique program of dual credit instruction with North Central Michigan College.

He said he was proud of the part he has been able to play and thanked the board for the opportunity to do it.

He acknowledged the tremendous contribution the teaching and support staff gives to the school district, saying the school has some of the most able and dedicated educators and employees he has ever worked with.

His last paragraph in his resignation letter told the board, the parents and public can be proud of the school and should continue to demand the best possible educational opportunities for their children.

The school district Redmond is heading for is about the size of the Boyne City School system with about 1350 students. They have been without a superintendent since January when the former superintendent retired.

The school district wanted Redmond to start as soon as possible so he would become familiar with the new system prior to the end of the school year. He starts in the new

position April 13. The school district said they would allow Redmond time to come back to Boyne Falls to help wrap up the school year here.

Redmond said of the district, "I urge the continued support of the Boyne Falls Schools. There is a lot of potential here that needs to continue to develop."

In other action, the school board approved a three day vacation without pay for Ruth Goldsmith, heard a report on some upcoming programs the school wants to start and will present to the board at the March meeting concerning a Junior Primary Program, music department, and teachers who will be eligible for tenure.

The board then agreed to hire Marilyn Seelye as a new secretary for the school.

They also heard how the new experimental program to bus kindergarten children was going. The school is providing lunch for some of the children before they get on the bus to go home after the morning session. Redmond

said the experiment is going well and it has only added about five to six minutes to the total bus time. He also said he was happy with the co-operation the union, hot lunch people are showing to help out the situation.

Redmond said the only discouraging part he has heard was that some of the other children were a bit jealous they couldn't get lunch.

The board then okayed the resolution allowing the Char-Em Intermediate School District to hold an election with a polling place at their school.

The board then started a discussion concerning corporal punishment after a parent had asked what the policy was for the district. She had heard that a teacher had used punishment on a student in a classroom.

She was told the board follows the state guidelines and was starting to work on a policy for the district. They agreed to set up a committee of parents, staff, administration and board members to work out a written policy for

punishment in the district. Board member Massey said, "We need steps to follow for teachers. Parents need to be aware."

The practice of the school has been to bring the student to the principal for punishment and not the teacher. In one instance, the teacher did not do that.

The board also started to work on a new policy to set up guidelines for retention and promotion of students. The final version will be presented at the March board meeting.

Principal Mike Wallace told the board the school district did very well in the MEAP testing done by the state. He told the board the school was at the top in science testing in the 10th and seventh grades.

Wallace then told the board some of the upcoming events. Drivers Education will be starting the last week of February and will continue through to May.

The board then went into an executive session regarding the continuing negotiations with the

## Clinic takes option on bank lot pending rezoning

Boyne City planners tabled recommending a lot rezoning proposed by the Northwestern State Bank concerning their parking located on the corner of Park and State Streets.

The bank had asked for the split to allow the sale of the lot to

Burns Clinic as they are proposing to build their new facility at that location if the approvals can be met.

Clinic representatives said they are proposing a 2976 square foot structure on the site. Builder Gene Scott of Gaylord, and Bob

Prebble were at the meeting to discuss the proposed plan.

Prebble said the three lots making up the parking area needed to be rezoned from the R-2 classification to the Professional Office District classification.

Planners then asked if the present bank would still have enough parking spaces since they have come into compliance with the present zoning ordinance at their facility. Prebble said he thought there would be enough space but since he didn't exactly know the size of the present bank building, he didn't know if the

bank would be in compliance with the parking allotment that would be needed. He told the advisory board members he will find out the dimensions and see if they are in compliance with the proposed change.

The losing of a parking lot brought out one letter saying it would be okay, another letter saying it could be bad, and Dr. and Mrs. Karkosak who asked if the city could afford to lose parking in that area as it is needed for those occasions like the Fourth of July and the Antique Car Show weekends.

City manager Randy Fryk-

berg said the matter of the city losing a privately owned parking area is not in their control, although if the property is needed for parking by the bank, then perhaps the rezoning would not be allowed by the planning board.

Planners were also given a preliminary site plan for the conversion of the former Granary Restaurant and building by Ron Makino, a developer from Belleville.

The developer had hoped the building would not need site plan review as he was not changing

## EJ primed for OM competition

School administrators and all involved in the OM (Odyssey of the Mind) formerly Olympics of the Mind program in East Jordan are in the final stage of preparations with the event to be held on Saturday, February 28.

Registration for the competition will begin at 8:00 a.m. and things will get underway at 9:00. It will be held in both the middle and high school buildings with a shuttle bus running between the schools, transporting spectators back and forth throughout the day.

Approximately 3,500 people are expected to attend this event which involves schools from all over Northern Lower Michigan and the U.P. "It will draw more people to our community than any other event," says Anne Dingman, director of the East Jordan Community Education Program and the UP (Unlimited Potential) program that helps promote OM.

Groups participating in the event were given information back in October and began practicing soon after. "Finding volunteer coaches and forming teams were difficult tasks," explained Dingman.

Two weeks ago the judges and scorekeepers attended an all day seminar to become familiar with the categories and rules pertaining to them.

OM is an international event

that has seen an increase of foreign country participants in recent years. Of United States involvement, Michigan is the second largest state with about

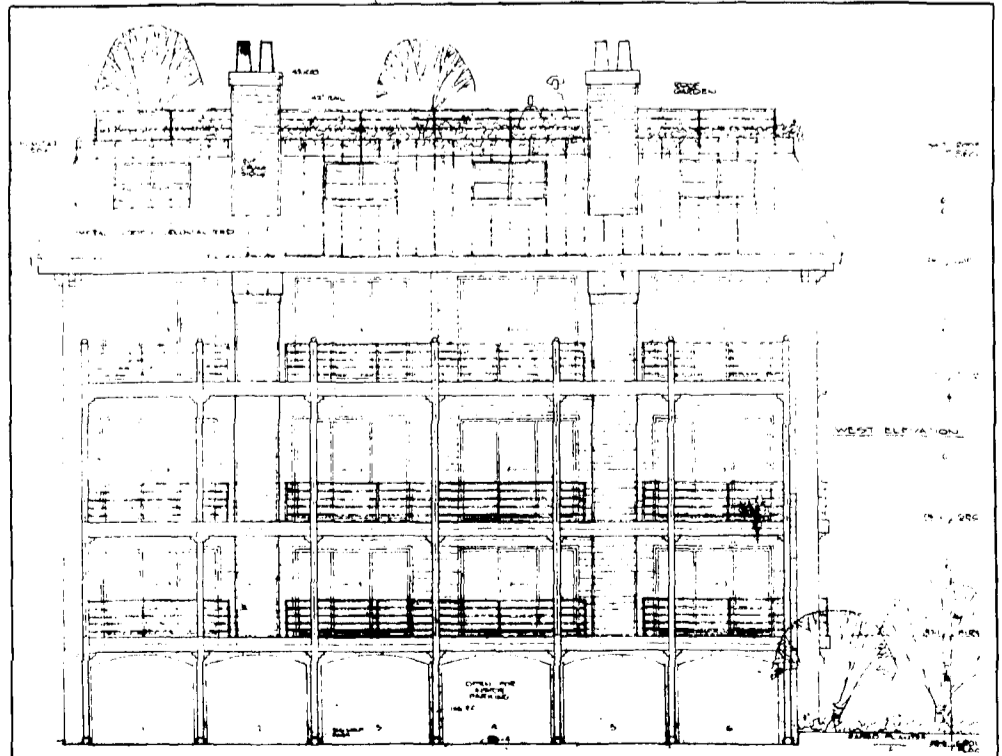
## BC asking for landfill cap grant

Boyne City Commissioners gave their approval to the submission of a Clean Michigan Fund application at their noon meeting Tuesday.

The grant, if approved by the state, would allow the city to cap the former landfill site located in Evangeline Township. The application requesting the funds totalled \$394,125, with another \$131,375 listed as a matching funds for a total of \$525,500. That amount is about \$25,000 short of what the city will need to complete the job as some of the expenditures would not be covered by the granting body in charge of giving out the funds.

City Manager Randy Frykberg said the requests would probably be made in August. He hopes the city would be able to get a grant this year as they have done a lot of the engineering

## SOUPS

Remember the story of Jacob and Esau of how Esau sold his birthright for a pottage or stew? This took place about 2000 B.C. and according to Bible sources it was most likely made of wild lentils, wild onions and spices with meat, probably lamb or venison, cooked in a large clay pot. Now, almost 4000 years later, we are still using the same ingredients in our soups and stews. We appreciate the lentil as a very rich source of protein and it is tasty and nourishing.

According to the dictionary the lentil is a leguminous plant, native to the Old World, having broad pods containing flattish edible seeds.

In some recipes you can use lentils the same way you use navy beans. Use your favorite recipe for bean soup and you will be eating the same kind of food eaten all through the thousands of years during Bible times. I cooked lentils this way; they are available at the supermarkets.

**BAKED LENTILS OR SOUP**  
1 lb. lentils  
1 cup onions chopped (you could use leeks)  
3 tablespoons vegetable oil  
4 teas. of instant chicken bouillon or cubes  
Water, about 1 qt.

Wash the lentils as you do beans. Then soak them 3 hours or overnight in water to cover, remembering that they double in size. In a pot cook them in the same water, simmer gently for 1 hour or until barely tender. Add a little more water if needed. Add the chopped onions sauteed in the oil until yellow but not brown.

Add the bouillon and a dash of pepper. I did not need to add salt. Then put the mixture into a bean pot or large 3 qt. casserole and bake at 325 degrees for another

hour. These are like baked beans; add more water and bouillon if you want soup.

The old cookbooks tell us how to make soup stock and broth with bones. I am sure they are very good, though our working mothers today do not have the time to simmer something on the back of the stove for 8 to 12 hours.

So we use those wonderful, delicious convenience foods like canned broth, bouillon cubes, canned soups and those packaged soups in envelopes. I recently tried some of those soup mixes; oriental noodle soup, also noodle soup with pork flavor. I highly recommend them, especially for a family of one or two. A delicious lunch; cooks in 3 minutes.

If you want something a little more nourishing try this

**PLANTATION  
HAM & NOODLE SOUP**  
1 cup cooked ham, cut in strips  
1 cup chopped onion  
1/2 teas. thyme leaves, crushed  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
2 cans (14 1/2 oz.) chicken broth  
1 can, about 8 oz., tomatoes cut up  
1 cup frozen cut green beans  
1 cup uncooked medium noodles  
In large saucepan, brown ham and cook onion with thyme in butter until tender. Add remaining ingredients. Cover; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cook over low heat 10 minutes or until done. Stir occasionally. Makes 4 servings.

You can even make a Brunswick Stew the modern way.

**BRUNSWICK STEW**  
4 cups chicken broth  
2 cups cubed cooked chicken  
1 (10 oz.) package frozen cut okra  
1 (10 oz.) package frozen baby lima beans  
1 (16 oz.) can tomatoes, cut up  
2 cups chopped peeled potatoes  
1/2 cup chopped onion

1/2 teas. salt  
1/2 teas. dried marjoram, crushed  
1/2 teas. dried rosemary, crushed  
1/4 teas. pepper  
1 bay leaf

In a four or five quart casserole combine all ingredients; stir well. Cover and place in microwave oven. Cook for 40 minutes at high till vegetables are tender, stirring once. Remove bay leaf. 8 servings.

Or you can combine all the ingredients at the same time and simmer in a pot on the stove until the vegetables are tender, stirring occasionally.

## GOLDEN CREAMS OUP

3 cups chopped potatoes  
1 cup water  
1/2 cup celery slices  
1/2 cup carrot slices  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1/2 teas. parsley flakes  
1/2 teas. salt  
Dash of pepper  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
1 1/2 cups milk  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 cup Velveta cheese, cubed  
Combine potatoes, water, celery, carrots, onion, parsley flakes, seasonings and bouillon cube. Cover; simmer 15 to 20 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Gradually add milk to flour, stirring until well blended. Add milk mixture to vegetables; cook until thickened. Add cheese; stir until melted.

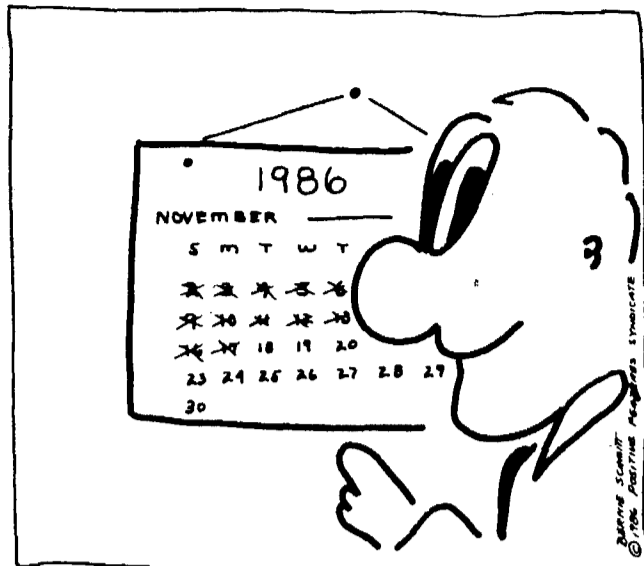

work already to help in the grant application process.

The city had applied for a grant from the same fund last year but was turned down in favor of other landfill cleanups in the state.

Commissioner Bill Grimm asked if it would help to have the surrounding townships and former users of the landfill as well as county officials send letters expressing their hopes the project be funded. Frykberg said he

would try to get those letters to include with the application.

The city then approved the purchase of a new police car from Bob Mathers Ford as they were the only bidder. The price of the new vehicle was listed at \$13,134.65. Delivery for the car would be in May.

Also approved was the purchase of a used truck from Pat

the structure, but under the advice of City Attorney Bill McTaggart, the board decided to call for a formal site plan review of the project.

Makino hopes to do a total renovation to the building, stripping it to the bare walls and building condominium units into the structure. He plans to have 12 units utilizing all three floors of the building. Parking for 12 cars will be located on the first floor, under the units.

Makino was in front of the planners on another site within the city several months ago, but that was turned down by the planners. He proposed building some condominiums along Front Street.

Makino said he hopes to start the project as soon as possible, and may start removing trash and other unneeded material from the building prior to the site plan okay, according to Frykberg Tuesday morning.

The planners also recommended the lot splits on two sites, one at the corner of Park and Ray Streets within the Central Business District across from the Depot Restaurant. A sale is conditioned on the split according to a local real estate agent, who said the purchaser did not need the entire piece of property for a building he is proposing. The planners recommended the lot be split into two sections, leaving a 30.25 foot wide lot. That lot would still be buildable under the

provisions of the CBD zoning.

The other lot split concerns lots in the area of West Michigan Avenue. That lot split was needed as the house was constructed on the site wrong and needed four feet of the next lot in order for the title work to go through, according to the broker asking for the split. The planners, after determining the remaining portion of the lot would still meet standards, approved the request and sent it on to the City Commission for approval.

The planners then discussed whether or not they needed to grant a six month extension to the zoning and building permit for the Fountain Square project as the architect, Don Glowinski, had requested. They decided that since zoning and building permits are good for one year, and the project still has six months before the approvals would run out, an extension was not needed.

The planners also gave approval for the City Attorney to begin to write a proposed ordinance covering "Bed and Breakfast" locations.

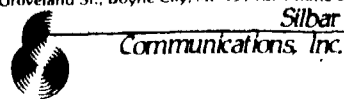

# Boyer Falls resident named DNR Officer of Year

It has to be tough, but nice when you are awarded a state honor for doing a great job, but Walter Mikula seems to be taking it in stride, just as he has other awards he and his department have received.

Nice to be awarded the honor, but in Mikula's case, tough because the recognition value and the job he is doing for the state means he can't have his where-abouts, or his face pictured.

Mikula is a special Investigative agent working for the Department of Natural Resources. In other words, he is an undercover conservation officer who is continually working on cases as part of his job of trying to uncover and investigate unlawful conservation practices.

Mikula, who lives in the Boyne Falls area, was given the Shikar-Safari Wildlife Officer of the Year award recently by the DNR for his work throughout the past

few years.

The award has traditionally gone to conversation officer II's, but according to Lt. Bruce Gustafson, Mikula's supervisor, he thought the department should break tradition and have the award go to Mikula. Evidently, Herb Burns, the Chief of the Law Enforcement Division, thought so too, as he made the award to Mikula designating him as the Officer of the Year.

Mikula has been assigned to the Special Investigative Unit for the past five years. Prior to that he was a conservation officer serving this area since 1971.

In the letter recommending him for the award, Gustafson said Mikula's file had numerous and repeated letters of commendation from his supervisors, peers and prosecuting attorneys. Gustafson said his work performance has been repeatedly recognized to be of the highest quality.

In 1971, his first year, he received a commendation for a narcotics violation from Herman Haedicke, a Regional Law Supervisor. Mikulas was again commended by Haedicke in 1972 and 1974 for other work.

Mikula seemed to have gotten letters of commendation for his actions almost every year leading up to 1986 where one letter of commendation said, "Officer Mikula is not limited to any one specialty. He has proven his abilities in all phases of conservation law enforcement; a proven leader with a high degree of job dedication, who has and continues to lead the way in Natural Resources Law Enforcement investigations through tireless, innovative and unselfish dedication to duty thus providing an inspiration and proper example to all associates." That letter came from Ransom Hill, a Regional

Law Supervisor.

Although Mikulas has not worked much in the Boyne City area for many years, his work has continued to draw letters of commendation. Antrim County Prosecuting Attorney James Young said of Mikula, "It is always a pleasure to work with him. I have found him to be a

dedicated, intelligent law enforcement officer. His is not just a good officer, he is an excellent one."

Mikula takes the letters of commendation in stride, and although he is proud to have been chosen, he acknowledges that his type of work is never done.

Mikula is probably involved

### Remembers early days of skiing

Editor,

Skiing was introduced to Northern Michigan long before the skiruns. When the pioneers came they learned from the Indians how to take long strips of bark, equip them with a cross strap of leather for their feet and practically with no effort, no lifts, no lodges, no money, no publicity, and certainly no suits or ski boots. They even managed without chalets. When I attended the First Ward School in North Boyne, there were a few pairs of store bought skis made of wood. My father made ours down in the Round House where he worked as a pattern maker for the White Lumber Co. Their big vat did a better job of preparing the ends of the white ash to bend correctly. He also made us a 12 foot long bobsled that took the hills with the sparks flying. There were hand sleds everywhere, the low kind with round runners that went like the wind, and the higher kind with flat or hollowed runners that could be steered with a cross piece in front instead of with your feet. We made skis out of barrel staves, and pieces of finished flooring, and used old pieces of harness strap for our feet. We waxed them and skied on them standing up. We also made bump jumpers from barrel staves equipped with seats—a guaranteed wild ride. We had ice skates that we clamped, buckled, and tied on our shoes, and we made our own skating rink in North Boyne on Lake Charlevoix back when it was Pine Lake. Logging teams with sleighs full of logs were driven along Groveland St. and on out of town on West Michigan Ave.

There were three coasting hills in North Boyne: Townsends' Hill coming down from the North Boyne Gravel Pit, the Beulah Home Hill on Charlevoix St., and the Burdick Hill that intersects Groveland in front of the present Charlevoix County Press building. I knew the Beulah Home hill best. We would belly flop on our sleds at the top, then see a team and load of logs coming up West Michigan Ave. If we were too close the driver merely stopped the horses at the bottom of the hill in the exact position so we could slide right under the horses' bellies on over the big bump and down to the lake. I can see you all turning pale but we didn't consider it a big deal. We were having fun.

We skied down all the hills in North Boyne. It was like flying. Now skiruns are big business—a matter of status and big expenditures. What ever happened to all the kids and all the fun? I know many adult ski enthusiasts who certainly enjoy themselves on the slopes today but when it comes to the kind of fun we had growing up on the hills of North Boyne, I am still hunting for it.

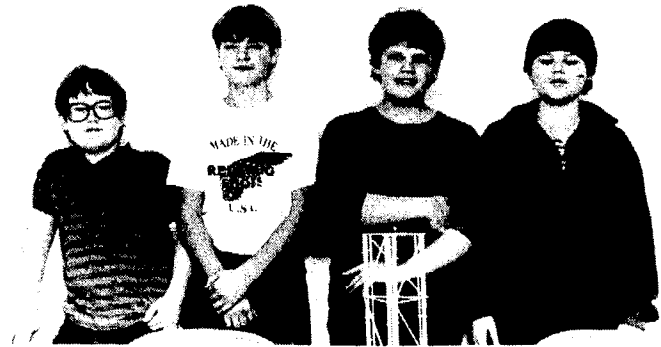
proximately 7,000 groups participating. The state with the largest involvement is New York.

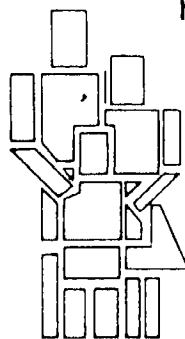

THE CITY OF BOYNE CITY ORDAINS:

the adoption of Amendment No. 15-87 to the City of Boyne City Zoning Ordinance No. A-28 concerning Home Occupations. The Amendment would revise the definitions of the term "Home Occupations" as presently listed on Page 4, Item 25. The new wording for Home Occupations would be as follows:

**Home Occupation:** An occupation or profession customarily carried on by an occupant within the dwelling as a secondary use which is clearly incidental to the use of the dwelling unit for residential purposes. Such home occupation shall not have more than one (1) employee outside the family members residing in the dwelling.

There shall be no exterior display other than one (1) non-illuminated name plate or sign, which is not more than two (2) square feet in dimension and which shall be attached to the dwelling.

The space in which the home occupation is conducted shall be within the area of the dwelling used as living quarters by the family and the dwelling shall have the appearance of a single family dwelling or duplex. No addition to the dwelling constructed or used for the specific purpose of the home occupation shall be permitted.

Provided, however, an automobile storage garage which is attached to and an integral part of the dwelling may be used for operation of the home occupation provided that prior application has been submitted to, reviewed by, and approved by the Planning Commission under the standards of review required for conditional uses under Section 2.70 of this Ordinance.

All home occupations shall be registered with the City Clerk on registration forms which show the use proposed, the address and area of the dwelling to be used, the site plan of the parcel and structures thereon, proposed off-street parking for the single employee (if any) and family members, and proposed area designated for parking for customers whether on-site or on the street.

In the event any home occupation shall be complained of as creating or causing a nuisance or as being conducted in a manner of a business not customarily carried on as a home occupation, then the Zoning Administrator may order the operator of such home occupation to appear before the City Planning Commission for a review of the use.

If the Planning Commission finds, following hearing thereon, that the requirements for conditional uses of Section 2.70 are not being met by the operator of the home occupation, then the Planning Commission shall have the authority to order a limit of the hours of operation, impose conditions of operation or, if deemed necessary, order a complete termination of the activity.

This Amendment shall take effect fifteen (15) days following final enactment.

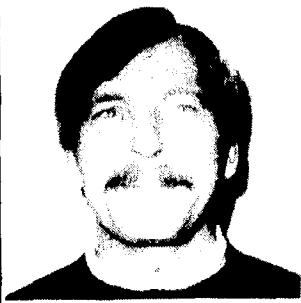
