Sevener is not new to the position, he served once before back in 1967 when he replaced Commissioner Blessington. Sevener then spent several terms on the commission after being elected. He said he doesn't want to spend another ten years on the commission this time around. Sevener, 87, was the auditor, prior to retiring, on the former Boyne City Railroad. He will serve as a Boyne City Commissioner until the November election.

## Mushroomers weekend in BC set to go

Over 150 contestants are expected to try for the annual Lions Club-Boyne City Chamber of Commerce National Mushroom Picking Championships this weekend, while hundreds more are expected to be taking part in the many other activities planned around the festival, according to officials of the weekend.

The city is gearing up for the contest which will see registration for the contestants being held up to the morning of the Saturday hunt at the pavilion of the Veterans Memorial Park. From there, the contestants will form up at the Boyne City High School for the parade of contestants as the officials of the hunt lead them out to the secret location to start picking.

Those entering the contest are a small part of the estimated 600 thousand mushroom pickers who are visiting the north during the morel mushroom season.

Another part of the local and visitor interest will be the carnival that will be setting up in the park starting today. If the weather holds and is nice, Lions Club members hope to see thousands visit the city over the three days of the festival.

Many area clubs and restaurants will be featuring mushroom dinners, some using the wild morel, while others using the standard mushroom available at the local stores.

New this year will be children's activities during the early afternoon at the park behind the Chamber office. These

will be taking place between two and three p.m. Judging for a coloring contest for children will take place at 2:30 p.m.

Then at 3 p.m. Saturday, those interested in learning more about morels will have an opportunity to talk with Larry Lonik, author of *The Curious Morel*. Lonik has been featured on Michigan Outdoors television

and has earned a reputation as an expert in the field. He will be at the Depot Restaurant in downtown Boyne City. The seminar is sponsored by the Charlevoix County Press.

Later that evening, mushroom visitors and fanciers will find plenty of activities ranging from the Lions' Vegas Night at the Boyne City Lanes to a Dixieland

Band concert being held at the elementary school at 7:30 p.m.

Then Sunday morning, the finalists from the Saturday picking will again head out into the woods to try to find more mushrooms to win the top prizes.

Award ceremonies will take place shortly after 1 p.m. when the mushrooms are counted at the Veterans Park pavilion.

Those interested only in mushroom picking will find them abundant, according to local pickers. The season for picking "black" morels should just about be over, which means the "white" morel season is starting. Locals have said the area needs a little rain though, to help make the mushrooms "pop" out of the ground.



Last year, over 150 contestants ran off into the woods to start the National Mushroom Hunting Championships. This year, officials expect to see the number grow as early response to the contest has been great. This, along with many other activities, will make for a fun filled weekend.

## Boyne City okays plan for streets, raises fees

Boyne City Commissioners authorized Granger Engineering of Gaylord to provide the engineering design, bidding, and partial construction phase services for more of the continued project of rebuilding the city's infrastructure at their Tuesday noon meeting.

Streets included in this phase of the project include North Park Street between State Street and Vogel where the city intends to replace the sanitary sewer lines and then repaving the street, replacing the east side sidewalk and installing new curb and gutter. North Park Street between Vogel and Collins will see a new water main, the replacement of the sanitary sewer and repaving. From River Street to State Street, the city will be replacing the sanitary sewer line.

On North Street, the city intends to replace the water line and will be repaving. On Vogel Street, the sanitary sewer line will be replaced, the street will be resurfaced, a sidewalk will be added and the northside swale will be asphalted. The city will also replace the sanitary sewer between N. Park and N. East Streets.

### BC school discussing gym roof

Boyne City School officials met in a special meeting with their new architectural firm, MJK Architects Engineers Planners, Inc. Tuesday evening to discuss the future of the Boyne City High School gymnasium roof. Expected to be decided was to

Jersey Street is also included in this phase and will have the sanitary sewer replaced, the new storm sewers, and be repaved.

An alley located north of and behind the businesses along Water Street, between Lake Street and Park Street, will be seeing a replacement of the sanitary sewer and a sump reconnection to the Boyne River. All of the services are in addition to the work slated at many other locations throughout the city, including N. Lake Street, where a major part of the funding will be used to rebuild the sanitary sewer and water lines as well as repave the street. Some of the other streets being worked on include streets like Pearl, where city crews have replaced a water line.

Cost for the work authorized Tuesday is estimated to be in the area of \$560,000 with Granger Engineering costs not to exceed \$93,000. Granger's costs also include other work as specified by the city. The time schedule set up by the city shows the engineering will be done this summer. Permits will be obtained by June 10 while bids are expected to go out by July 8. All of this will be done prior to the bond sale closing which is expected to be August 6.

In other action, the commissioners approved the raising of the rates for zoning permits and public hearings. Zoning permits were raised from a maximum of \$500 to \$700 with other fees raised on a sliding scale. For those buildings with a construction cost up to \$5,000 the fee was upped to \$15 from \$10.

Sign permit costs were raised from \$10 to \$15 for all sizes of signs. Costs for public hearings were raised \$25 in all categories. The last time rates were raised was two years ago, according to City Manager Randy Frykberg. He said the raises would almost cover the city's costs for advertising and notices necessary for each permit or action.

Frykberg also announced that the form for the new Marvin Lading Community Pride Awards were available at many locations throughout the city and at the city hall. The awards will honor those who have fixed up their houses, businesses and industry within the city.

The Commission okayed the use of the Veteran's Park south side for the annual arts fair held in conjunction with the Fourth of July Celebration.

The Commissioner heard a

short report on this weekend's Mushroom Festival by Gloria Anderson, the spokesperson for the Chamber of Commerce.

She also asked the city to continue looking into some rule to

help control the skateboards and bicycles in the downtown district. She was told the city has asked the city attorney to write up a proposal covering the problem.

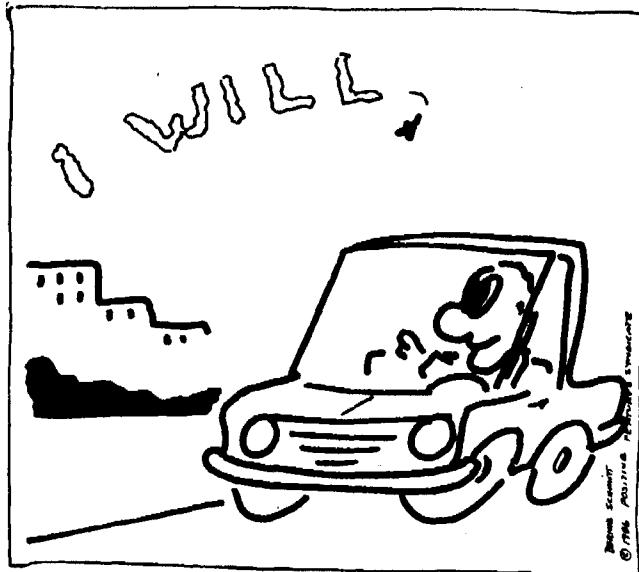

lot. The beeper has its own phone number which the owner shares with a select few. 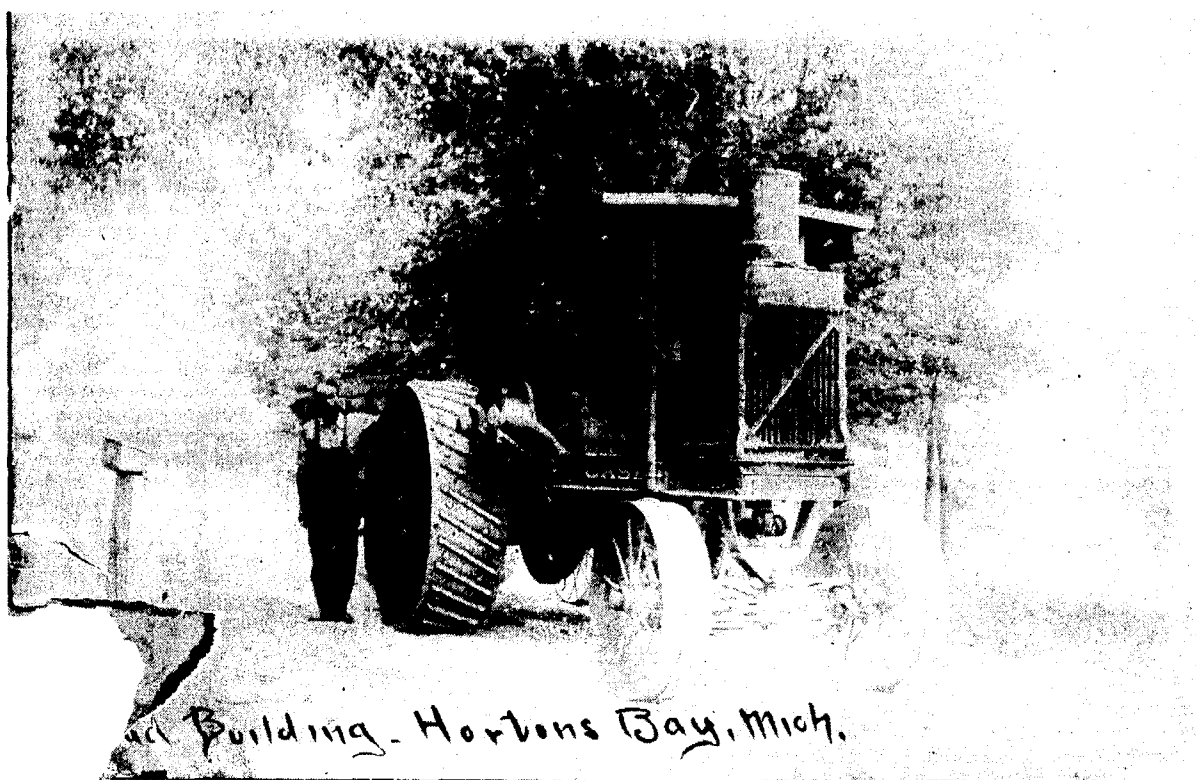

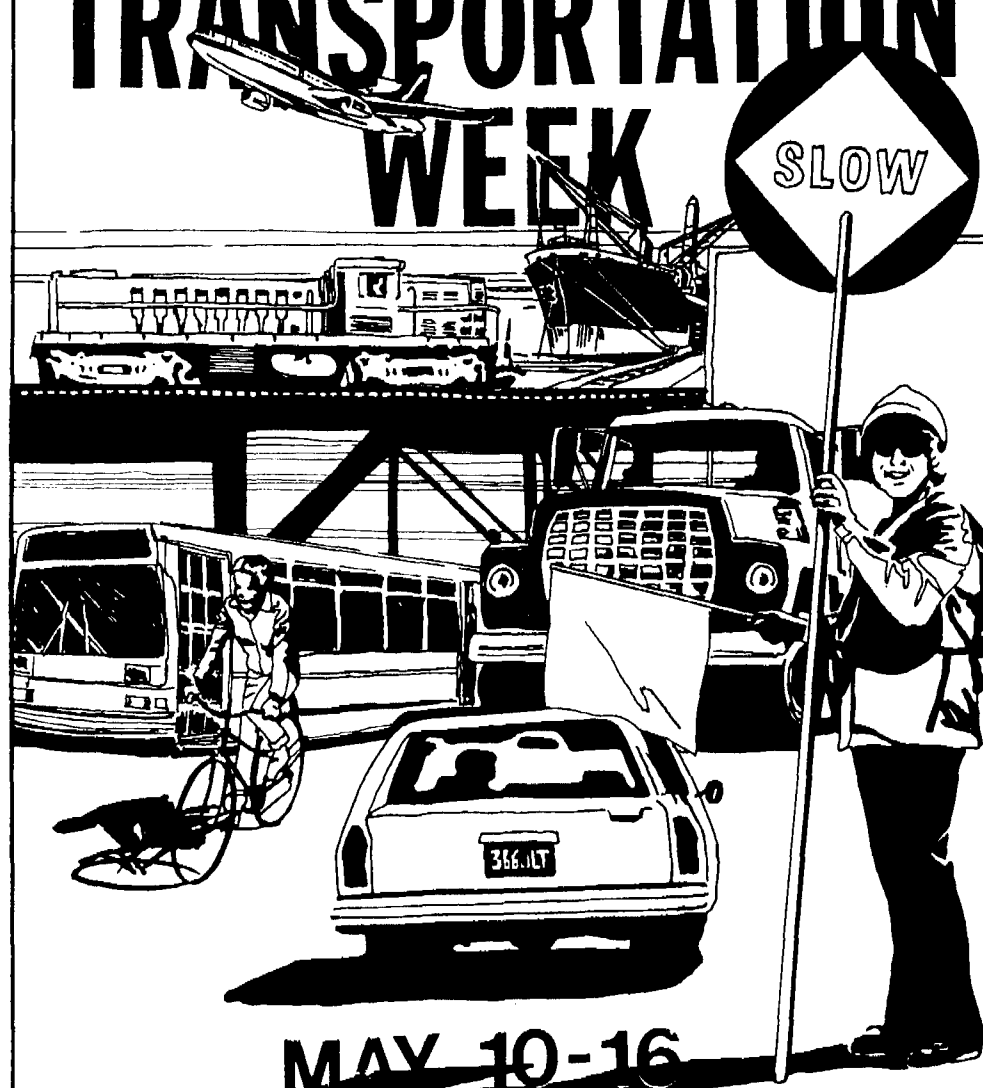
I will now let my readers in on a deep, dark secret that has been kept under a bushel basket since

## Polio Plus—Rotary's battle against disease

PolioPlus is a Rotary program designed to help other world wide health organizations in an effort to free all children from polio and five other childhood diseases which can be prevented by vaccine.

Seventy five children will die from polio somewhere in the world today and another 750 children will contract polio today. Measles, diphtheria, tuberculosis, whooping cough and tetanus will also take lives. These diseases have been almost eradicated from the children of the United States; however, they still exist in many countries. The additional five disease are the "Plus" in PolioPlus.

John Smith, Area Coordinator of East Jordan, Boyne City, Kalkaska, and Mancelona-Bellaire Rotary Clubs for the PolioPlus Program, has met with each of the four clubs and has helped each one establish a goal for the PolioPlus Campaign. East Jordan has proposed a \$16,000 goal; Boyne City plans to raise \$12,000; Kalkaska is aiming for a \$6,000 goal; and Mancelona-Bellaire also plans a target of \$6,000. Mr. Smith, a member of the East Jordan Rotary, is pleased at the amounts each of

the clubs plan to raise in the period of July, 1987 through June, 1990.

Rotary International has set a \$120 million campaign which is the estimated cost of the polio vaccines for the 60 to 70 million children who go without vaccination each year in developing countries. World Health Organization and UNICEF and Rotary International have joined efforts to immunize children worldwide and to eliminate polio. The original target date of World Health Organization for worldwide immunization of children against polio, measles, diphtheria, tuberculosis, whooping cough and tetanus was 1990. With the additional aid from Rotary and UNICEF the goal becomes more and more attainable.

The efforts of local Rotary Clubs should be lauded by the community and supported cheerfully as we all think of the opportunity to help children everywhere grow up healthy and uncrippled. As citizens of a medically and technically advanced society, we can show our appreciation for the reduction of fear we have for our children by helping others achieve this standard of health.

## Mrs. Housers second grade students study eye

Students in Mrs. Laura Houser's second grade class at the Boyne City Elementary School, and their parents, had an eye opening experience as they cut apart a cow's eye as part of a section they are learning about vision.

The class had previously studied the parts of the eye and the eye's functions before tackling the project of actually cutting one apart.

The second graders were first

amazed at the overall size of a complete eye as most of them could only relate to the eye part they see when looking at a cow. The majority of the eye is housed inside the skull.

During the dissection, the students and their parents were able to locate the muscles on the outside of the eye, the cornea and the optic nerve. After opening the eye, they were able to observe and see the pupil, iris, lens, optic fluid, retina and were

even able to find the blind spot within the cow's eye.

Another part of the learning experience was to increase the students' understanding of how a blind person copes with their handicap. Students took part in a blind walk after they were instructed in the proper way to lead a blind person. They experienced what it would be like to be blind and have to rely on another person to lead them.

Students were also pleased to have Carol Dougherty, a blind resident of Boyne City, visit the class and tell how she utilizes her leader dog. Mrs. Dougherty will

come back to the class to talk to students about the use of Braille, the white cane and how a sightless person functions in a sighted world.

After having all of these experiences the educators involved hope the second graders will have a better understanding and appreciation for one of the five senses.

The experience was part of the Michigan Model For Comprehensive School Health Education. Mrs. Houser had to take special training in order to teach the session on the eye, according to Ed Snyder, Principal.

PROPOSED BED AND BREAKFAST AMENDMENT  
TO BOYNE CITY ZONING ORDINANCE

Amendment #19-87

Section 1.40 DEFINITIONS

52.A Tourist Homes - Bed and Breakfast

A single family dwelling in which the owner of the dwelling resides and where transient guests are provided a sleeping room, with or without board, in return for payment; PROVIDED:

- (1) Not more than three (3) sleeping rooms for transient guests shall be provided with no more than two (2) adults and three (3) children per room.
- (2) All cooking facilities shall be confined to the owner's single kitchen. There shall be no cooking facilities in the guest rooms. No meals shall be provided to any guest who is not a resident in one of the sleeping rooms.
- (3) No signs shall be permitted except a single, non-illuminated sign which is attached to the residence and is not larger than four (4) square feet.

Section 5.20 GENERAL PROVISIONS AND EXCEPTIONS

R. Tourist Homes - Bed and Breakfast

Tourist Homes and Bed and Breakfast uses shall be permitted in all Zoning Districts of the City as a Conditional Use provided that Conditional Use approval shall have been first granted by the Planning Commission as set forth in Section 2.70 of the Zoning Ordinance.

In addition to the standards of determination set forth in Section 2.70 of the Zoning Ordinance, the Planning Commission shall also review the application and requiring compliance with the following standards prior to approval of the application.

- (1) The owner of the structure must be the resident manager of the tourist home or bed and breakfast operation.
- (2) The structure must maintain the appearance of a single family residence.
- (3) A single off-street parking area shall be provided for the occupants and employees with at least one (1) parking space for each sleeping room provided for transient guests plus at least two (2) parking spaces for the owner.
- (4) The applicant shall submit a floor plan of the entire structure showing the present use and proposed use of each room in the structure. Any permit granted allowing the Conditional Use shall designate the number of bedrooms for transient guests and such number shall not thereafter be increased without further application and approval of the Planning Commission.
- (5) The use shall be in harmony with the existing neighborhood in which it is located and will not be detrimental to the future orderly development of nearby properties.
- (6) All refuse and garbage collection area and devices shall be screened and located in an area designated by the Planning Commission.
- (7) The Planning Commission shall limit the number of Tourist Homes and Bed and Breakfast operations permitted in any neighborhood area so that no such operation shall be located within five hundred (500) feet of an existing Tourist Home or Bed and Breakfast operation.
- (8) The Planning Commission shall be entitled to compel installation of such exits and other safety measures as it shall deem advisable, however the City shall have no obligation or liability in connection therewith.

Any Conditional Use granted by the Planning Commission for use of a residence as a Tourist Home or Bed and Breakfast use shall be subject to future review by the Planning Commission at any time upon petition for review submitted by the Zoning Administrator and following public hearing thereon by the Planning Commission.

The Planning Commission shall have authority to impose conditions for operation and shall have authority to revoke the Conditional Use entirely if it finds that the operation violates the original conditions, or any subsequent conditions of operation, or constitutes a nuisance to the neighborhood.
