News Briefs

Almost every park in the Michigan State Park System will be holding an open house on June 7 in celebration of the system's annual open house festivities. Park entry fees will be waived that day and at Young State Park, outside of Boyne City, officials are expecting to host an antique auto demonstration, nature hikes, girl scout programs and refreshments.

Two events in East Jordan are sure to draw crowds. First will be the Harbor and Marina dedication, June 5, at 3 p.m. at the Harbor and the annual Day of the Eagle Pow Wow, June 6-7 at the tribal grounds on Mill Street. Everyone is invited to both.

Boyne City High School has had its North Central Association accreditation extended through the 1987-88 school year, according to Warren Wade, School Principal. He said he received word recently that the accreditation was given for the 1986-87 school year, which also means the 87-88 year.

Residents of Evangeline Township are now eligible to get flood insurance if they want it. The insurance became available as the township met all of the criteria asked by the federal agency that grants approval. Infrastructure bids sought by Boyne

Bids are being asked for some of the infrastructure repairs that will be made in Boyne City as part of the \$3 million dollar bonding issue. The announcement for accepting bids went out this week by both the city and

Granger Engineering. Some of the streets proposed to be worked on yet this summer include Lake Street, North Park, Vogel, North East, Jersey and the alley behind Lena's, Huff's, Atrium Mall, Penny's Plants, and

Kaden's. On the south side of town, Second, Front, South, Harris and Douglas Streets will have water mains installed or replaced. The bid deadline is expected to be June 25 for the work the city

engineered and the first week of July for the Granger Engineering. Once the contractor is approved, City Manager Randy Frykberg said the work could start within six to eight weeks.

In other action at the Tuesday noon meeting, the city commissioners approved the final reading for the rezoning of land for the new Burns Clinic building. Officials from the clinic said they

hope to get started on their construction as soon as possible.

The city also decided where the fireworks will be set off on the Fourth of July. They feel the Peninsula Beach site will be used depending on the number of boats at the neighboring marina. If too many boats are in the marina, they will be moved to a location behind the Little League Field at Veterans Memorial Park.



Boyne City firemen responded almost instantly to a fire call at the Boyne River Inn Monday when an employee smelled smoke coming from the kitchen area. Members of the fire department were cautious as they searched for the source of the fire which was found to be a nail that had gotten hot enough to scorch a stud within the wall. The BRI is hoping to be back in complete operation by the time you are reading this, as the fire department had to cut away part of the wall to determine whether or not there was a fire.

Twp looking at assessment proposals

Evangeline Township will be reassessing every parcel of land within the township after the township board receives and decides on who will get the job.

Three candidates for the assessing submitted preliminary costs and figures at Monday night's monthly board meeting. The board asked each to submit full proposals for the July meeting so they could decide at that time.

A representative of Manatron, based out of Kalamazoo, JoAnn Hass from Melrose Township and another party from Kalkaska

submitted bids. All were around the \$20.00 per parcel figure.

Manatron assists in the assessing of Boyne City and the county as well as many other municipalities throughout the state. Hass said she recently was the assessor for Melrose Township and has dropped assessing for them because of a possible conflict of interest with her present position. She said she would like to get back into assessing and figures it would take her about six months to complete the job.

There are about 640 parcels of

land within the township.

According to township officials, it has been twenty years since the entire township was assessed. The assessments were factored this past spring and many residents received valuations about twice what they had previously.

In other action, the board approved the purchase of a snowblower for the township hall and decided to look for bids on a cemetery fence for the township cemetery.

EJ marina filled, dedication Friday June 5

In anticipation of her dedication, the East Jordan Harbor and Marina is putting on its best look. The construction has been completed of the marina and of the office and rest room areas. Sodding has enhanced Memorial Park which joins the marina and had to be torn up to complete construction. The parking lot is waiting to be finished in asphalt, but is presently usable.

All 37 slips available for rent for the season have been filled leaving 24 slips open to be used by visitors. These numbers of slips were negotiated with the

Waterways Commission, who control how many can be used for what purpose. The slips available can handle boats up to 65 feet long on the interior harbor and up to 100' boats can be moored on the outside wall for short periods of time in fair weather. Courtesy or shoppers' docks are also available for a two hour tie-up at no charge.

Additional wave attenuation will be added to break the force of the waves as soon as materials arrive. This will not interfere, however, with the operation of the harbor and marina.

LETTUCE
 What would a salad, a sandwich, or in fact, any meal be without some kind of lettuce? Some of the old cookbooks used the term "lettuces" which seems correct as there are so many varieties. Lettuce is so much a part of our day-to-day living that we hardly give it a thought. I will have to admit that I have been in a rut when it concerns lettuce, I grab up a head of lettuce without even looking to see if there are any other choices. I hope to change this and choose some of the other varieties of lettuce on the market, because they are all so good and so good for us. They are rich in vitamins A and B and furnish that needed bulk in our diet.

The Iceberg is our most common head lettuce. Cos or Romaine with its long narrow leaves that curl lengthwise are just right for a finger salad; put on some dressing, meat or cheese and roll up. Then there is the dark green and so tender Bibb lettuce, also the Boston variety and the not quite so common, Celtuce, which combines the flavor of lettuce and celery and last, but not least, is our wonderful garden leaf lettuce.

Lettuce has been on the world's table since the first century A.D. and most likely before that; our leaf lettuce was probably cultivated first, the easiest way to grow it.

Sometimes I think that we overdress our lettuce; we smother it with dressings and so many other vegetables that we do not know that it is there. How can one garnish a beautiful garnish? I am recalling how we were often served head lettuce in wedges with a slice of orange or lemon on the side. This brought out the flavor of the lettuce instead of covering it up. We put a bit of sugar on it if the lemons were too tart. Lemons really compliment all kinds of lettuce. Here is an interesting tidbit about lemons; they originated in South Eastern Asia and were grown in the Middle East for centuries. They were not known to Europe until the crusaders brought them home from the wars in the Holy Land.

The first vegetable from our gardens in the spring is the leaf lettuce and how we relish those tiny tender leaves served with a little cider vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper in a pretty glass bowl! For a nostalgic accent, I am going to give you mother's recipe for boiled salad dressing. It makes the most delicious sandwiches made by spreading this dressing on homemade bread and leaves of new lettuce. Does anyone make lettuce sandwiches any more?

MOTHER'S BOILED DRESSING
 In a small heavy sauce pan, put in:
 1/4 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. dry mustard
 1/2 tbsps. flour
 2 tbsps. sugar
 Dash of red pepper
 1/4 cup cider vinegar
 1/4 cup water
 2 eggs, beaten
 Cook over low heat until thick, stirring constantly. Thin with a little cream or evaporated milk for the right consistency for whatever you are using this dressing. This is the very best dressing for potato salad. My family always wanted me to dilute the vinegar a little in the above dressing, also when serving lettuce with just the vinegar

sugar and salt. I believe that they had a "sweet tooth".

This next recipe is from Frances Ridgeway, of Sacramento, CA. She says that it is something different. I made it and it "turned out" perfect—very tasty and pretty. Just the thing to serve plain or with butter or cream cheese with that cup of tea.

LETTUCE LOAF BREAD
 1 head iceberg lettuce
 2 tsp. baking powder
 1/2 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. soda
 1/8 tsp. ginger
 1/8 tsp. mace
 1 1/2 cups flour
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 cup oil
 1 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind
 2 eggs
 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
 Core, rinse and thoroughly drain lettuce; chill in plastic bag. Finely chop enough to measure 1 cup. Chill remainder of lettuce for salads.
 Sift flour with baking powder, soda, salt and spices. Combine sugar, oil, and lemon rind; mix in flour combination and add chopped lettuce. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in walnuts. Turn into greased and floured 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inch loaf pan. Bake at 350° for 55 minutes or until wooden pick comes out clean. Cool in pan 15 minutes then invert and cool on wire rack. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

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East Jordan Garden Club hears talk about China

A June 1st city-wide planting bee was finalized by members of the East Jordan Garden club at the regular monthly meeting held May 18 at the Presbyterian Church. Martha Annear, club president, chaired the meeting and also announced a pot luck luncheon and plant and bulb exchange to be featured at the June 15th meeting to be held at Elm Pointe.

Featured speaker for the May meeting was Doris Lundteigen of Charlevoix, retired area teacher and world traveler. Lundteigen and Edith Gilbert of Charlevoix traveled to China last fall and her speech was entitled "Octoberfest in China."

The women were part of a guided tour that included a five day trip on the Yangtze River, the longest river in Asia, which rises in the highlands of Tibet and flows first southeast, then northeast to the East China Sea. The food was, at best, "iffy" and the travelers were told not to eat anything bought on the streets. Chinese cooking is greatly influenced by the influx of Europeans who came when China was first opened to the outside world.

The tour included a stay in Sian, where the life-sized statues were found that had been buried for thousands of years. Lundteigen brought along a small replica to show the amount of work and detail on the statuary.

In Shanghai, the visitors saw many sycamore trees, planted years ago by the French. The Chinese view trees as their first defense against the horrible air pollution and people everywhere are encouraged to plant trees and shrubs.

In Shanghai the group visited a completely walled garden which contained a tea house. It is the first time since 1949 that

the Chinese can visit many of these places, as they were off-limits during the Mao regime.

October 1st is the Chinese equivalent of Independence Day and red flowers are everywhere—mostly chrysanthemums and salvia. These flowers are planted in plastic pots, artfully arranged, then taken up and stored in greenhouses to be used the following year.

Chungking was the high point of the trip, however, there was "no room in the inn" when they arrived, so a busload of the tourists rode two hours into the mountains on unpaved, narrow roads to a country hotel. The Americans felt as if they were actually seeing the real China on this occasion.

The Great Wall in Peking was a thrill to see and walk. Four people can walk abreast and there are camels that give rides to children. Guilin is known as a garden spot in China, where one can drift down the Lee River amid old weathered, volcanic rocks looking at beautiful views. It is the setting for many famous works of Oriental art.

China's four main problems are pollution, housing, building and the economy. Plans are to educate all Chinese to the ninth grade, a seemingly impossible situation at the moment. Mrs. Lundteigen also showed many articles brought back from her trip and her talk was followed by a question and answer period.

Tea hostesses for the meeting were Deanna Hurwitz and Bernie Greig. The tea table was centered with an interesting arrangement of fresh vegetables and flowers.

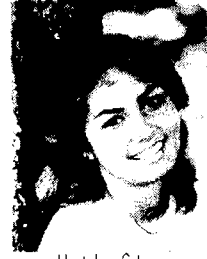

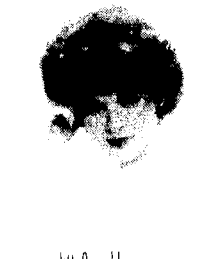

Watershed Council receives funding from Mott Foundation

The Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council has recently received funding from the C.S. Mott Foundation for the third and final year of a comprehensive wetland protection project. This project, begun in June, 1985, is designed to preserve and protect fragile wetlands from destruction through a system of evaluation, education and advocacy.

"Michigan once had 11 million acres of wetlands, but only 3-4 million now remain," states Gail Gruenwald, Executive Director of Wetland Project Coordinator for the Watershed

Council. "Wetlands play an important role in protecting water quality, in flood and erosion control, and in providing wildlife habitat. It is critical that we protect this valuable resource."

During the coming year, the Wetland Protection Project staff will conduct several workshops throughout the state to promote wetland protection. These workshops will be targeted for members of planning boards, lake associations, activist groups, and other interested individuals. The Watershed Council's booklet on local involvement in wetland protection,

which is being prepared under the second year of the grant, will be distributed, as well.

Another major project will be a shoreline survey of all wetlands on the following lakes: Black, Burt, Charlevoix, Crooked, Douglas, Mullett, Paradise, Pickerel and Little Traverse Bay. The information gained through these surveys will be made available to local governments, lake associations, and land trusts to assist them in protecting these areas from destructive development.

In the first year of the project, Gruen-

wald and her staff selected and field-tested a system for wetland evaluation which measures each wetland's value. This system can be used to determine which wetlands are most important and in need of protection. Critical wetlands in northern Michigan were identified using this system.

The Watershed Council also published a brochure about the importance of wetlands which has been widely distributed. Presentations on wetland values have been given to lake associations, local government boards,

and other groups. A voluntary wetland stewardship program to encourage wetland property owners to agree to protect their wetlands was begun in 1986.

One of the project goals has been to encourage townships to enact protective wetlands ordinances. Gruenwald has developed a model ordinance which has been made available to townships. Hayes Township in Charlevoix County is the first to adopt the ordinance.

The Watershed Council also monitors activities which may have a harmful impact on wetlands. "The

Michigan Wetlands Act requires wetland property owners to obtain permits before draining or filling a wetland. We review dredge and fill permit applications to assess their impact on wetlands and water quality," explains Gruenwald. "Research done by the Watershed Council on wetland values was cited by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in one of its recent permit denials."

"During the third year of the wetland project, we look forward to tying all of these efforts together into a comprehensive wetland protection

program that can be used, not only in our region, but throughout the state."

The Watershed

Council is a non-profit conservation organization which serves the area of Emmet, Charlevoix, and Cheboygan Counties.

Its goal is the protection of the region's water quality, including lakes, rivers, and ground water, as well as wetlands.
