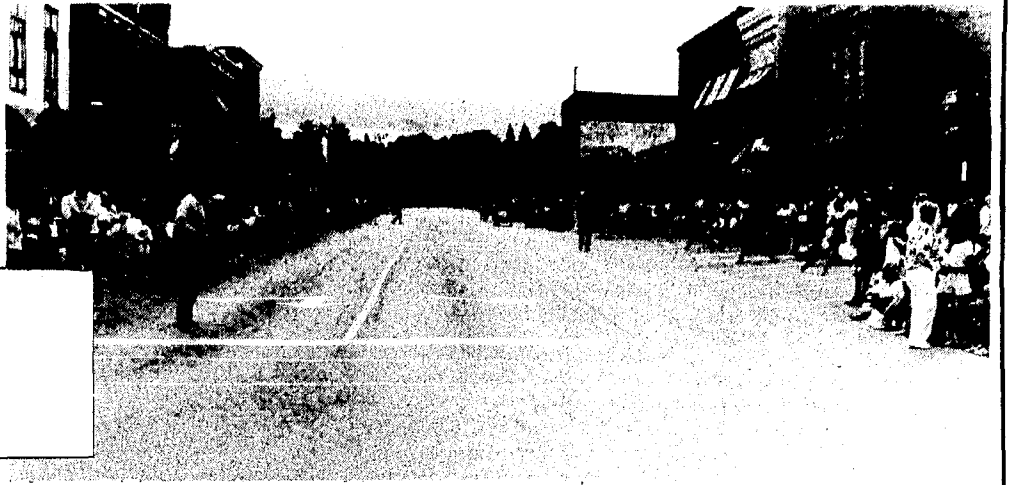


## Area swamped with crowds over Fourth

## News Briefs

Lottery winners who owe the state money will see their winnings reduced by that amount if a bill is approved by the state legislature. Debts covered include such things as child support, back taxes, or student loan defaults.

A new barn will be built the old fashioned way over the next four weeks on the Walt Matelski farm on M-75 South. A crew of Menonites will be arriving shortly to construct the cedar barn. It will be located across from the R.B.I. Sheet Metal Company.

Charlevoix County will be getting \$100,000 due to the passage of a new bill in the State Legislature. The money will be a payment in lieu of taxes by the State of Michigan. Commonly called the "Swamp Tax," the recently passed senate bill raised the amount of payment from \$1.50 per acre to \$2.50 per acre. Those counties which will be getting the money are north of Clare.

Charlevoix County Republicans will be holding their annual chicken bar-B-Que picnic on Sunday, July 12, at Whiting Park. The festivities start at noon with Ralph Osling, our State Representative, being the man of the hour. Tickets are available at the door or from Republican party members.

While it looks like Boyne City is starting a construction boom with all of the projects planned and started, just remember, we ain't Traverse City yet, and we darn well sure are not Detroit or the suburbs.

## Nursery school, gas station plans OK'd

Boyne City planners okayed two site plans at a special meeting of the planning board in Boyne City Monday night, covering the sites of the Boyne City Nursery School and the Alpena Oil Company.

While the discussion concerning the site plan for the nursery school took over two hours, the site plan for the new four bay and convenience store gas station was approved almost without change or discussion.

Representing the nursery school, Jim Daniels presented plans for a 28 foot by 42 foot building that will be located on Division Street. The site called for the use of two lots, one for the building and the other for a playground until it was determined the school is only leasing the playground lot and has only a first right of refusal to purchase it.

This necessitated changes in the site plan as the planners would not agree to a conditional use of the land unless everything was under the control of the property owner.

By moving the building on the site to accommodate the septic system and the play area, the lot required the building to be facing Alice Street, which is not a usable road since it had never been developed, just platted.

It took almost an hour of discussion as all of the details

were worked out between the board and the builder.

A compromise was set on the conditional use and the board agreed providing the school meets all of the state regulations.

With the conditional use okayed the site plan came under severe looks by the planners who finally agreed to accept the plan with the following conditions:

The building must be sited to meet all setback requirements, fencing for the play area must be provided within one year, seven parking spaces must be provided, and have only a 16-foot driveway in and out, must move the drainfield on the lot, and having Alice Street be considered the front of the lot.

The planners had asked the school to provide for "children playing" signs, but that idea was dropped after City Randy Frykberg said the city would provide the signs.

In hearing the request for the site approval two neighbors thought the site was too small and asked if the school had considered other sites. An area by the present elementary school was suggested. Pat Kujawski said she thought the project would devalue property in the area and that the site was too small.

Planners noted the objection but backed off after hearing the complaint out of all of the property owners in the area that were

informed by mail to come to the meeting or to send letters to the city hall.

The site plan for the new gas station was presented to the board by Dick Crittenden of Devere Construction who will be building the project.

Located across the street from Carter's Food Market, the

station will have a deceleration lane, four covered bays for pumping gas and a 30 by 60 foot Mini-Mart. It would be similar to the one the company recently opened in Kalkaska, Crittenden told the planners.

After reviewing the site plan, the only condition the planners asked for on the site was to have

the refuse area fenced and contained. Crittenden readily agreed to the condition, saying it was something the engineer who drew the site plan forgot to add.

Immediately after the meeting, Crittenden was on the site looking it over as construction is to start as soon as next week.

## Weekend a success say parade observers

In Boyne City, a crowd estimated at about 10,000 watched the parade held during the morning, and afterwards descended upon Veteran's Park for the many other activities that started from there.

Craftsmen who had set up in the park also said they had a good day selling their wares.

Even businesses in town said they had a good weekend, one even said he should have stayed open longer so it would have been even better. For those who didn't take Friday off, Monday was also a good day in most places.

In the float contest during the parade, the winners were: antique cars, Bob Mathers with his 1922 Model T taking the first, Pete and Charlene Gaskin with their 1915 Model T, second, and

Howard Johnson with his 1914 Saxon coming in third.

In the individual float contest, Chris Bandy took the first place with his capturing of Windigo. He was followed by the Baldwin Bunch Band and Linda Christensen's Younger Friends.

In the retail division, Bunny Haven took the first, followed by Consumers Power, second and Barrett's of Boyne, third.

In the group and organizations division, the Boyne Valley Garden Club took first with the Boyne Valley Lions and Lionesses in second. Third went to the Boyne City All-School Boosters.

In the Civic classification, the Boyne City Chamber took the first, the Polish Festival second, and Charlevoix the Beautiful finished third.

## Cousineau elected pres of BF school board

Bill Cousineau was elected president of the Boyne Falls School Board at a special organizational meeting held Monday night in Boyne Falls. The meeting was also the first meeting Charles Smith, the new superintendent of the school system officiated over.

Former Board President Jim Churchill switched chairs with Cousineau and was promptly elected vice president. Katherine Massey was posted as the board secretary while Art Saworski was named as treasurer.

In other action taken at the board meeting, the times and dates for the monthly school board meetings was set. They will be held the third Monday of the month at 7:30 p.m. in the

school cafeteria.

Tax Anticipation bids were opened and First National Bank of Gaylord was the lowest bidder to lend the school system money to get the school year started next fall. They bid 4.94 percent interest. Other bids came from three other banks at rates asked as high as 5.72 percent.

The board decided to ask for bids for insurances they cover from area agents. While they thought they could just continue with the present carriers, they decided getting bids would be the correct way to handle the matter. They have asked for bids each year for the past several years.

The board then agreed to join in with Boyne City and the Straits Area Consortium for the adult education courses.

## Boyne lets 1st museum bid

Boyne City commissioners opened the first of the many bids for the new museum to be constructed adjacent to the city hall at their noon meeting Tuesday.

O.D. Sayles Masonry was the low bidder for the foundation, the first bid let for the project. He bid \$5,068 for the construction of the 42-inch footings needed to hold the weight of the building.

Money for the project was

voted several years ago by the residents of the city when they approved a special one mill for one year tax. Sayles is expected to begin construction shortly, according to Randy Frykberg, City Manager.

The city let another bid of \$700 for the installation of lighting for the flagpole in front of the city.

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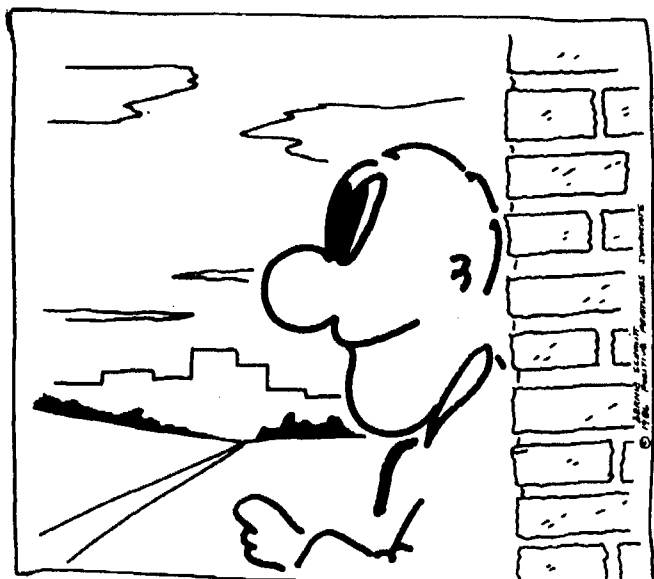

There were too many things going on all at once.

And when that happens, the crowds that may want to go to all of the events, can't. Can't because of little things like traffic problems and the time allowed between all of the happenings that help make you either late or miss them.

It would be nice if the Boyne City parade started at 10 a.m., the Horton Bay parade at 2 p.m., and the East Jordan parade at 6 p.m.

Then we who want to go to all three can do it on a leisurely pace instead of frantically waiting for the traffic to clear so we can go.

From a man whose natural inclination leads him away from the momentous events to the small potatoes in life, one could hardly expect a good showing, much less success especially in the competitive world of newsmen. But Charles Kurault has made it, has done it, with his "On the Road" segments for CBS News.

Probably part of the success has come because he so obviously enjoys what he does, which is to interview ordinary people as he travels about the country. And it doesn't do any harm that those he interviews he puts so at ease that they enjoy themselves too. This fact has always been evident, but it never came through quite so clearly as when Kurault hosted a

kind of family reunion recently on which he showed some of his favorite pieces.

The series was born out of the explosive events of the summer of '67. That season featured riots in the cities' streets along with increasing student protests against the country's involvement in a war in Vietnam that was killing and wounding more and more American servicemen.

Kurault, a writer for CBS News during that miserable summer, decided that he'd had all he could take of the big news stories. So he went to the president of CBS and suggested that he be allowed to "go for a little ride" to see what was hap-

pening on the back roads of America.

As soon as the CBS president decided that Kurault had a good idea, he took off with a cameraman, a sound man and an open mind. What he encountered had nothing to do with the violent headline news. He found people who "were living in peace with their neighbors and trying to get the kids off to school on time." So that's what he filed his reports on.

His cameraman took pictures of the scenery - autumn having come to Vermont by the time he made his first stop. But more importantly, the cameraman caught candid pictures of the people. Kurault got some of them to tell about their lives, like the fellow who's collected the world's largest ball of string and the mechanic who fixes up old bikes so that every kid in his town, no matter how poor, can have a bike.

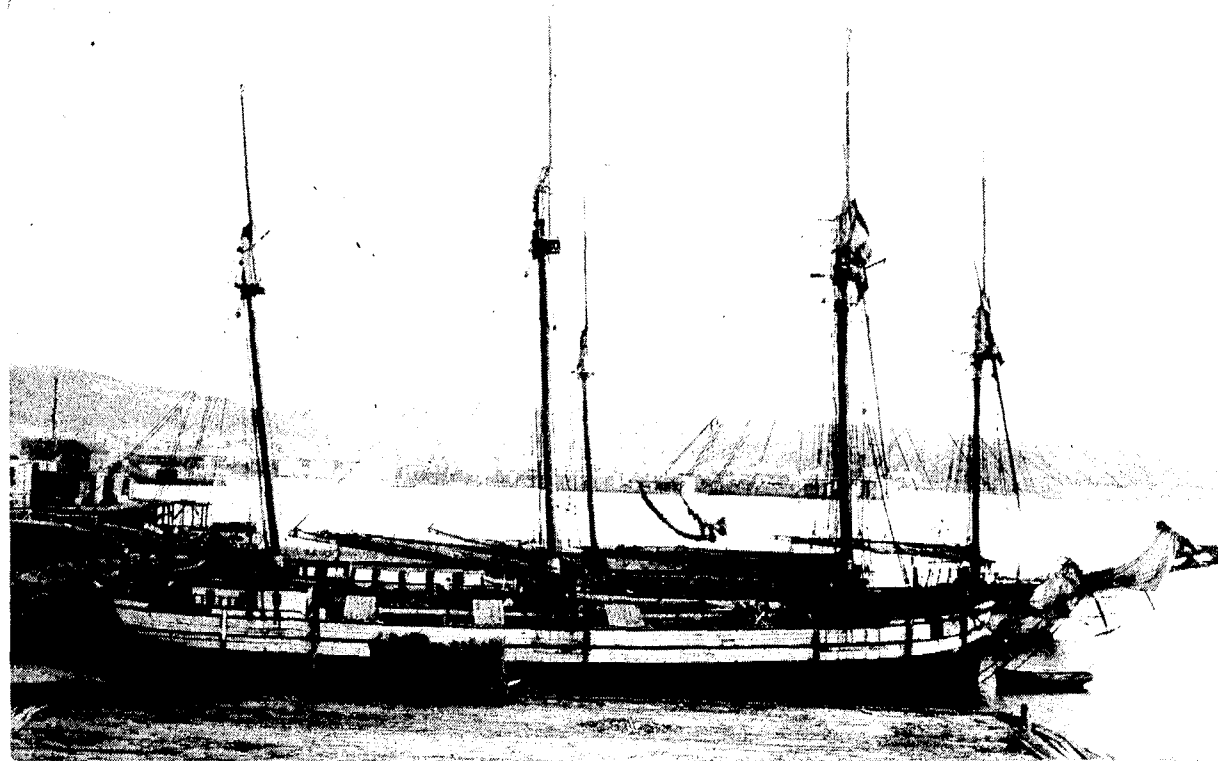
When Kurault's various guests have in common is that they've all followed their own star and none has, or probably ever will, make big city newspaper headlines. This puts them in a class with the bulk of the TV viewing audience, which is probably why "On the Road" segments on the news.

Unfortunately, they've turned off the TV set when the news was over and haven't remembered to turn it back on when "On the Road" was tried as a prime time series, or not enough of them anyway. So it's died, several times.

The genial Kurault will try again for prime time soon, though, hosting a recent history program of the "pop" variety. If that doesn't make it, he'll just go back on the road where he's made a name for himself turning small

Bowers Electric was the low bidder.

There was some concern about the cost of lighting the flagpole so the flag could be flown at all times. Commissioner Austin Sevensen voted against the project saying that the cost was too much compared to the other options. One of those options would be to have the dispatcher or the police raise and lower the flag when they get time.

The city also agreed to a change work order to have the new Peninsula Beach area served with an underwater sprinkling system. The cost of that was \$12,140. The change was allowed due to other bids low enough to have some money left from the project. Since that money cannot be spent in other places, the city agreed to let Northern Associates add that to the cost of the project.

Steve Moody and Bill Grimm suggested that the system that is installed have several places added to it so the city could add underground sprinkling systems to the waste water treatment plant area at some time in the future.

The reason for the sprinkling system is that the grass area of the beach project will be needing

some type of watering system that could be controlled by someone turning the water off and on, rather than dragging hoses every hour of watering.

After hearing of a complaint from John Howard, city commissioners agreed to his suggestion to allow a line to be painted and signage installed at the Boyne City boat ramp.

Howard told the commissioners several boaters are parking in the wrong area, parking overnight and or longer, requiring those that want to use the ramp for a day having to back up long distances and park farther away from the ramp.

The city will be installing a painted line to differentiate an area for day use parkers and for those wanting to park longer. Storage of boats at the ramp had been a concern and last year the commission approved seven long term storage spots that are rented out.

Currently, boaters are allowed to use the ramp and park during the day. Overnight parking is not allowed unless the boaters check in with the city police. Overnight parking is also designated on the ramp site.
