Hansen named superintendent for EJ schools

Robert "Chip" Hansen, Jr. 32, was hired as the new superintendent of the East Jordan Public School system after details were worked out last Wednesday evening between the board and Hansen.

He is presently superintendent of the Vanderbilt School District, a position he has held for the last five years. Prior to that, he was the athletic director and coach and teacher for the district.

Hansen will be starting on a parttime basis in East Jordan after January third, working between the two communities for half of the month to ensure them an easier transition until they get a new superintendent.

Hansen said he was leaving the Vanderbilt district with some reservations, but that the East Jordan position was too good to pass up.

"I am thrilled to have been offered the position," he said. "And excited about the professional challenge East Jordan has to offer."

"My wife Laura and I are looking forward to moving to East Jordan and participating in the community."

Hansen was chosen for the position after the board sorted

through 48 applications. The search to replace former Superintendent Tom Rossler was helped by Dr. Carl Brautigam of the Michigan Association of School Boards Superintendent Search Service.

Hansen said the first things on the agenda after he starts work will be to look and listen. He intends on learning as much about the district as he can in a short time by working with the faculty and staff, as well as the community so he can get a broad perspective as to the direction he would like to see the school system head toward.

Hansen has said he made large gains in the Vanderbilt school system in the last five years, and he hopes to be able to do the same in East Jordan.

He has spent his entire educational and professional years at the Vandy school system, starting as a teacher upon graduation from Alma College in 1978 with a degree in Physical Education and Sociology. He earned a master's degree in Educational Administration from Central Michigan University in 1982.

Hansen has also served as a coach of the Vanderbilt basket-

ball team. He taught American History, Civics, Consumer Economics and Government while he was a teacher with the system.

He was also involved with many activities outside the school, and is a member of the Vanderbilt Lions Club, is a member of the Alpenfest Board of

Directors for Gaylord, and was the Otsego County United Way Chairman for two years.

He said the family intends to move to East Jordan as soon as possible and intends to rent until the summer months. Hansen has

one son, 18 month old Eric.

Hansen said that although he is new to the system, he is familiar with East Jordan as he was raised in Mancelona and is a graduate of the high school there. His parents still live in the area.

Boyne chamber, schools, sign partnership pact

Boyne City's Chamber of Commerce and the Boyne City Public Schools signed the first of many "Partnership in Education" certificates during the monthly school board meeting held Monday night.

The "partnership" is based on an idea that education is everyone's business, which is the motto the program will be using.

While the school and the chamber have been working on developing a program that would help both business and students during the past year, the formal signing of the agreement was made Monday.

Partnerships are based on workers from businesses involved to come to the school, bring items that are used in everyday business and show the student what they do during a business day. The intent is to show the students the need for learning reading or math skills as they are used in local businesses.

So far, two informal partnership agreements have been made. Industrial Magnetics has been working with students

showing them what skills are needed for workers at their facility.

Glen's Market is another partnership arrangement where workers from the grocery chain are showing what skills are needed for their workers.

According to Superintendent Bob Nakoneczny, the idea of Partnerships in Education is to provide a "better quality of product," in the school's case, better students for the area workforce.

In order to do that, he said the school system and the community businesses have to work together to determine what kinds of programs are or will be needed to develop students who could enter the local work force after they graduate with the skills already in place for the business.

He said an example may be a computer software program that the businesses are currently using. The school could train the students so the business would not have to spend the time

BC board OKs new position, fills it

Boyne City School Board members approved a new position for a parttime secretary, then acknowledged the resignation of Maxine Bates so she could fill the position at the Boyne City School Board meeting held Monday night.

The position will be filled by Bates as she submitted her resignation effective at the end of the school year. As Bates has several vacation days, and she wanted to ease up her workload, the board gave permission to Superintendent Bob Nakoneczny to start the new position so she could continue to help with the bookkeeping and payroll.

Her previous position will be filled by an applicant shortly after the start of the new year.

Also in personell action, the board agreed to hire Bob McCullough and Phyllis Hosier as the high school and elementary school academic advisors. They also granted an extension of the leave of absence to Arlene Collins until February 16, 1989.

In other action, the board approved a resolution, similar to resolutions in the past, that will allow the school district to collect summer taxes from those communities or townships that wish to have summer taxes collected. Up to this year, only Boyne City and the portion of Hayes Town-

ship within the school district has collected the summer taxes.

The board then set a special meeting to be held January 5 for a workshop session that will review the draft proposed school budget for the present year. The board has been operating the school using an extension of the budget for the last school year.

Nakoneczny said he hopes to present a budget for the school system to adopt at that meeting. The formal adoption, with possible changes would be made at the monthly meeting January 9.

Another proposed budget will also be presented to the members of the budget planning advisory group for their review of the upcoming school year to start in July, 1989. That budget will be subjected to review by the community and other groups before it is presented to the school board for their approval.

The board then had a short discussion about school policies and are suggesting to start a policy review to make sure they are following their own guidelines.

It was brought up by a board member that the student council representatives guidelines should be followed and the board member thinks they may not be complying with some of their own rules.

Boyne City to get Chevy instead of Ford

Boyne City's Police Department will be driving a Chevrolet instead of a locally purchased Ford after the city commission agreed to buy a new police car from the State Purchase Plan at its noon meeting Tuesday.

The purchase will be saving almost \$3,000 over the local dealer's price, according to Police Chief John Talboys.

City Manager Randy Frykberg told the commissioners that a comparably priced Ford would cost a little more than \$15,000 because the factory, which has had special pricing for police type vehicles, stopped the program for local dealers.

The state price for a Chevrolet was set at \$12,250 for all police type vehicles purchased by the state. They then transfer the

title to the cities or other units of government that want such a vehicle.

The city has in the past tried to purchase cars locally, but when the price difference became so apparent, the commissioners said they had no choice but to go with the lower cost.

They expressed disappointment over the failure of the Ford Motor Company to continue the program so the local dealer could submit a comparable bid. The commissioners will be sending a letter to the dealer thanking him for his bid although they have already spoken with him to explain what was occurring.

The new police car will replace

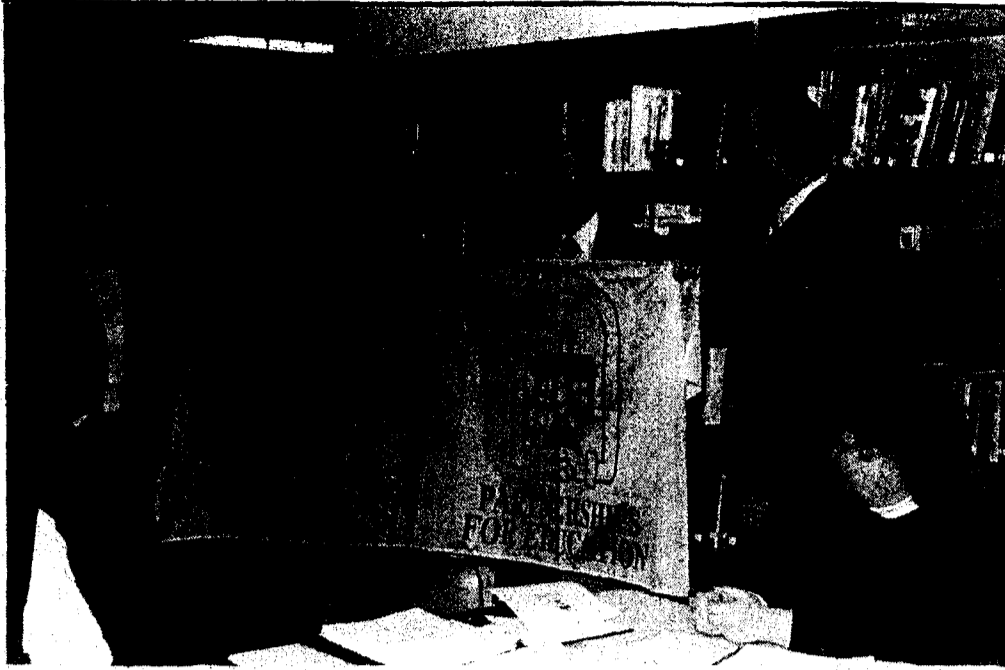
East Jordan schools will be dismissed at 11 a.m. Friday, December 16, instead of Thursday as previously announced, to provide a half day of inservice for the teachers.

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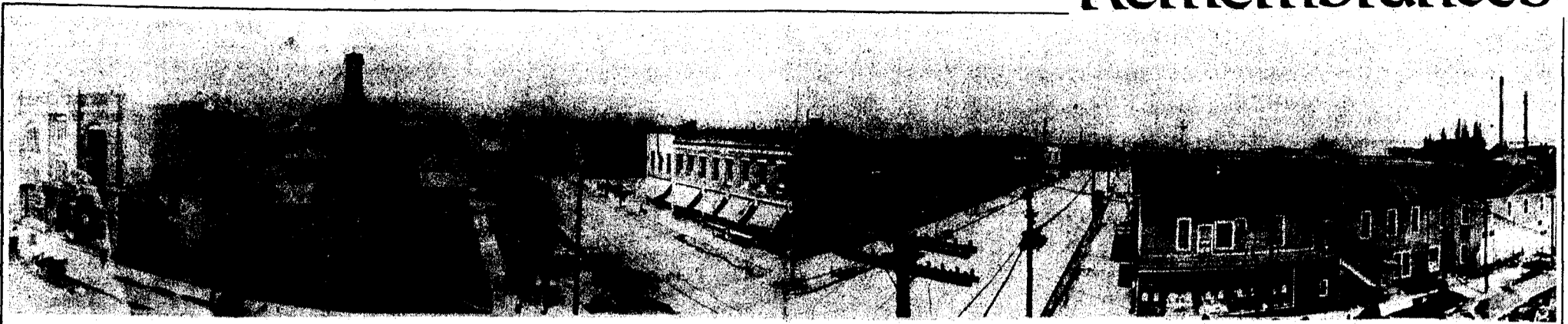
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Remembrances

I read in the newspaper this morning that a man with horse sense never goes hog wild.

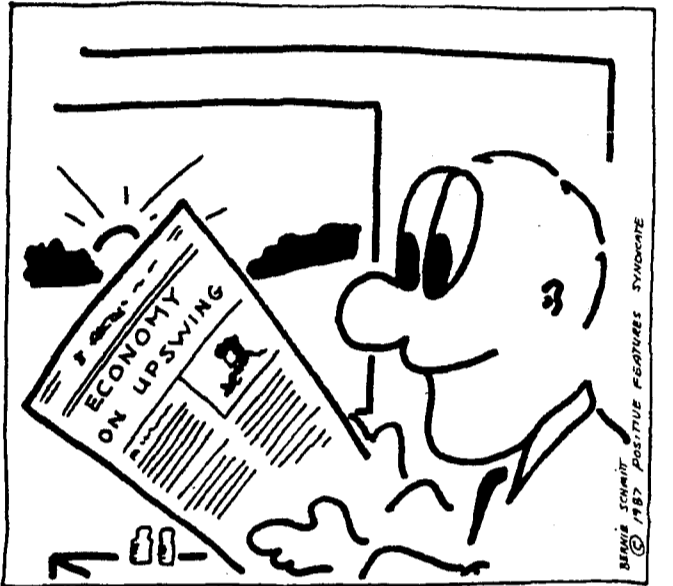
Expect the areas to be fully open with all the slopes by this weekend if the cold stays with us.

CHRISTMAS DINNER
Christmas dinner is the Grand Finale of the holiday celebrations. The tree has been decorated, gifts given and received, the community and school programs are over and we are ready to top it all off with our traditional and favorite foods. The turkey is roasted to perfection, the snowy mashed potatoes are piled high and the cranberries, favorite salads and desserts are ready.

First we will have an appetizer—as if it were necessary. I am going to serve a sea food cocktail. I have made this one through the years and served it as a first course. However this year I will serve it mixed together in a bowl as a dip or spread with crackers and chips and a holiday punch. This has quite a long list of ingredients, but it is worth all the effort.

SEAFOOD COCKTAIL

1 can crabmeat rinsed in cold water and drained
1 can shrimp (the very small ones are fine), remove vein if any, blanch in hot water, drain and chill
When ready to serve mix with this

COCKTAIL SAUCE

To 1/2 cup mayonnaise add:
1/4 teaspoon salt and a little pepper
1/8 teaspoon paprika
1/8 cup India relish or finely chopped pickles
1 hard-cooked egg, finely chopped
1/2 cup chili sauce
1 teaspoon minced chives or green onion
1 tablespoon minced pimiento (1 small jar)
1 tablespoon minced celery
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
A dash of tabasco
Chill. For more than 6 you will want to double this recipe.

Just the spicy aroma of this stuffing will make everyone hungry.

A number of recipes were sent to me from Bob Evans Company and I chose the following because I knew that my family would approve of all of the delicious ingredients.

Bob Evans offers these timely tips for making safe and delicious holiday stuffings.

1-Before stuffing poultry, line the body cavity with cheesecloth for easier removal of the stuffing after cooking.

2-To avoid food poisoning, stuff poultry immediately before roasting. Remove stuffing after cooking is complete.

3-For an appealing presentation, bake stuffing in a greased ring mold. After removing stuffing from the mold, the center may be filled with a vegetable.

4-This stuffing recipe may be used with turkey, chicken, cornish hens, capons or pork; and may be served year-round, as well as during the holidays.

SAUSAGE STUFFING

Makes enough to stuff a 12 pound turkey
8 oz. Savory Sage or Original Roll Sausage
1/2 cup margarine or butter
1 1/2 cups onion, chopped
1 cup celery, chopped
4 cups dry bread cubes
7 oz. cornbread stuffing mix or 8x8x1 inch pan cornbread, crumbled.
1 1/2 cups water
1 cup toasted instand chicken bouillon
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup toasted pecans, broken
1 egg beaten

In large skillet, crumble and brown sausage; remove from skillet. Drain. In same skillet melt margarine. Add onion and celery; cook until tender. In large bowl, combine all ingredients with sausage; mix well. Stuff turkey loosely with stuffing immediately before roasting. Roast turkey as directed on wrapper. Spoon remaining stuffing into greased baking dish. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes if cooking separately. Refrigerate leftovers.

This meal calls for a light yet colorful dessert, and I would like to suggest this beautiful cake.

JOYCE'S CHERRY CHIFFON CAKE

First part:
Sift together
2 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
Make a well in center and add, in order:
1/2 cup cooking oil
5 unbeaten egg yolks (medium)
1/4 cup maraschino cherry juice
1/2 cup cold water
1 teaspoon vanilla
Beat with a spoon until smooth
Second part:
1 cup egg whites (7 or 8)
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
Whip until whites are very stiff—do not underbeat.
Third part:
Pour egg yolk mixture gradually over whites and fold gently, do not stir. Gently add 1/2 cup thinly sliced well drained maraschino cherries.
Bake in 10" tube ungreased pan. 325 degrees for 55 minutes. Then at 350 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes. Invert to cool.
Sift powdered sugar over this cake after it has cooled if you wish, it makes a beautiful dessert.

The saw filing owl

Of course most of us never heard the sounds of a sawyer wheting (sharpening) the teeth of a large lumber mill saw for it's an occupation of yesteryear.

However, there's a small bird of prey in these parts whose nighttime voice begats his moniker (name), skreigh-aw, skreigh-aw, like a sawyer running a file across the teeth of a saw.

Only around 8-inches in length this "owl-eyed" night hunter is seldom seen.

Its prey consists of small birds, insects, red squirrels, chipmunks and the likes.

Like all owls it hunts on silent wings, the feathers, unlike swift flying day-birds of prey are soft and resilient. Hence the air passing over and through the flight feathers makes no sound, allowing the owl to pounce on prey without warning.

The little saw-whet is a tame, trusting critter.

I recall some years ago that I received a call from a man of the cloth who said there was a little owl roosting in a thick cedar tree next to his house; that something appeared to be wrong with it as it didn't fly away when he approached it.

I had a good idea why the bird didn't fly away.

But, never the less, my curiosity was aroused so I tooled over to the good man's house to have a looksee.

Peering into the cedar I beheld a little saw-whet owl, its large

yellow eyes staring back at me. So I reached in and picked up the little fellow, taking him into the house so we could look it over.

Allaying the preachers fear that the owl was sick I told the good man that it was a saw-whet owl; that nothing was wrong with it; that they make good pets; that, however, it was against the law to have one in possession.

After looking the little night raider over I put it back in its fragrant daytime retreat and received a blink of approval from the staring yellow eyes.

Saw-whets go about the task of reproduction from late March into early July. The female deposits 5-6 white eggs in abandoned woodpecker holes, tree cavities, or even nesting boxes for wood ducks and the likes.

Incubation takes around a month, and the white, fuzzy chicks first fly a month later when fully feathered.

Saw-whets are fairly long-lived, that's if they don't fly into cars along the highways at night, or are nailed by big brother, the fierce great horned owl.

In captivity saw-whets have been known to live for up to seventeen years.

But don't go out looking for the little owl with the idea that it would make an exotic pet. Again, it's a no-no. A federal law says no.

So if you should be fortunate enough to see one of these "night people" take a good look and consider yourself fortunate to have seen the wee saw filer.

College basketball at East Jordan

The East Jordan Sports Boosters will be hosting Collegerama II in East Jordan this Saturday, Dec. 17, starting at 5:30 with the women's game. The teams competing are Adrian and Lake Superior State University.

Adrian is aiming to improve on last year's 5-17 overall record which includes a 4-8 record in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association. With the return of four starters and eight letter winners the year is starting on an encouraging note.

The stabilizing force on the team is Jr. Captain Dione Walker of Honor, and a graduate of Benzie Central. Walker earned 1988 all-MIAA First Team Honors and was 5th in the league in scoring (14.3 per game) and was 9th in rebounds.

In the backcourt, sophomore Shelly Taylor of Bryan, Ohio and

Jodi Condron, of Saline, started all 22 games in 1987-88. In league competition Taylor sank 25 of 28 from the charity line for a 89.3% average ranking her second in the MIAA last winter. In all games, Taylor averaged 11.3 points per game and ranked 13th in league scoring. Condron accumulated the second most assists in the MIAA a year ago with 4.9 per game and was tenth in league field goals shooting at 37.3% and 15th in MIAA scoring with 10.2 points per league game.

After graduating seven seniors and coming off a 24-5 season, L.S.S.U. has great hopes, but will be in a developmental process this year with the addition of seven new freshmen to the roster. The Lakers will be led by senior Vickie Hill from Grand Rapids. Hill tallied 446 points in the 87-88 season and averaged 15.4 points per game.

L.S.S.U. women's basketball records show Hill 7th in points, 7th in field goals, 8th in rebounds and fourth in free throws with one year eligibility left.

A 6' 1" sophomore, Deanna Sutton, from Rudyard will be a dominating factor with a year's experience and rebounding ability. As a freshman, Sutton pulled down 211 caroms for the Lady Lakers. Adding additional strength that first year coach, Fred Procter, formerly of Detroit St. Martin Deporres, will be counting on 5' 7" guard Dorene Archambault, a junior from New Baltimore, and Collen Lamoreaux, a sophomore at 5' 10" from Grand Rapids West Catholic.

The men's game will be played at 7:30 featuring the L.S.S.U. Lakes, coached by 7th year mentor, Bob Eldridge, against the St. Mary's Eagles of Orchard Lake coached by veteran mentor Glen Donahue who enters this year's campaign just one victory shy of the 500 win mark.

The Eagles of St. Mary's are led by Captain Jerome Washburn, a senior. The 6' 6" West Branch native has just completed a rehabilitation program on an injured knee and is ready to play. Washburn led the N.A.I.A. No. 23 District last year in rebounds and also was in the top ten in scoring. Junior James Lake will be counted on this season to take over where he left off last year. Lake shot 59% from the floor and averaged 12 points per game. The Eagles are blessed with plenty of height this year with the addition of 6' 8" freshman Luk VanDeWatering of Belgium and 6' 7" Kevin Nicefield from Port Huron. With 6' 5", 220 lb. senior Mike Moreney holding down the post position, Coach Glen Donahue can look forward to a very rewarding season.

Coach Eldridge will be in a rebuilding year this season. With the graduation of 6' 6" John Gilbert who provided leadership for the team, including a season high 48 points against the Baptist last year at East Jordan. The burden will fall this year on 6' 8" senior Dave Jokisch and 6' junior guard Chris Wooley. With the team's record at 1-5 so far, Coach Eldridge has said we are working hard but coming up short including a one point loss 97-96 Sunday to Grand Rapids Aquinas in the U.P. Classic held at Sault Ste. Marie. Point guard Chris Wooley returning from a stellar season that included 593 points, will have to take over the floor general's position and guide the Lakers this year.
