Sheridan switches posts by DEB SAYGERS HOBBS

The city of East Jordan recently lost the services of long-time Planning Commission Chairman Tom Sheridan.

But in exchange, the city gained the services of Tom Sheridan, newly elected president of the city charter commission.

Sheridan, a 28-year veteran of the planning commission, resigned to avoid a conflict of interest between the two posts.

Sheridan was elected in November, along with eight other commissioners, to draft a revision to the antique city charter.

"We're hard at work and things are getting underway," Sheridan reported to the city council at the Dec. 7 meeting.

The commission has been meeting for several weeks already and is forging ahead with the complex job.

At an organizational meeting Nov. 16, the commission determined that a consultant would be necessary to establish duties and focus for the group and assure strict adherence to a schedule.

According to Sheridan, the consultant will be hired after the first of the year. Several candidates have already been interviewed.

"We thank Tom for his many years of service to the community," said Mayor Russ Peck. Peck extended his good wishes to the commission as they take on the difficult task of rewriting the charter.

'Michigan Snowmobiler'' an East Jordan original

Twenty-six years ago in East Jordan, a publication was born that became the prototype for an industry.

Since that first issue in 1967, Michigan Snowmobiler has gained the respect of experts in the many aspects of the sport.

And if imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. then Michigan Snowmobiler has the gratitude of many copycat publications.

But the Snowmobiler was the first regional magazine devoted to the sport and industry of snowmobiling.

"We are the first and only publication that covers all the aspects of snowmobiling; racing, recreation and legislation," said editor Lyle Shipe with pride.

The Michigan Snowmobiler has another first as the only official publication of the Midwest International Racing Association for the past 25 years.

East Jordan News-Herald owners Marshall and Wilma Sayles published the first issue of Snowmobiler in October 1967.

The idea came to them via Tom Galmore, Sr., East Jordan's venerable snowmobile enthusiast and dealer. The Sayles sold the News-Herald to finance the new project.

Sold for a mere 25 cents, the infant publication was distributed to manufacturers, dealers and Chambers of Commerce. By the early 1970s when the snowmobiling craze peaked, the magazine was published every month of the year and distributed across the United States.

Lyle Shipe joined the staff as an advertising and sales associate in 1972. His wife Nancy had been an employee of the Sayles' publications since the days of the News-Herald.

Before joining Michigan Snowmobiler, Shipe was a production manager at East Jordan Iron Works.

The Shipe family moved to East Jordan in 1965, refugees of Detroit, where Lyle served as a police officer on the vice squad.

Shipe, also a snowmobile enthusiast, enjoyed the magazine work enough to take on more responsibility with the firm. He worked as advertising manager, editor and finally in his position today, editor/publisher.

For convenience, the Shipes moved the magazine out of downtown East Jordan into their home several years ago. The publication layouts are done in-house, while Shipe jobs out typing, coloring, and printing.

Michigan Snowmobiler is issued six months a year, from September to February. The magazine has grown from 20-25 pages in the early issues to 70-75 pages today.



Production values have increased in sophistication. The cover is printed in four colors, as well as several four-color advertisements in each issue.

Snowmobiler employs several free-lance writers, but the main contributor is Karen Holcomb of Traverse City. Writers chase all over Michigan and the Midwest, covering races, conventions, even fashion shows.

Nancy Shipe is vice-president and general manager of the publication. The Shipes and daughter Patti Tisron, circulation manager, put together the magazine in their basement.

By the looks of the Shipe's well-organized and relatively uncluttered office/basement, the impression is of a small operation.

But the magazine has a circulation of 29,000, with subscriptions to Japan and Germany, Hawaii and Florida.

And a short visit to the office will reveal how Shipes spends most of his time.


"The phone rings from 6 a.m. to 11:30 p.m., seven days a week during the season," said Shipe. As if to prove his point, the phone rings.

During the hour-long interview, Shipe sells several hundred dollars worth of advertisements, including some high-priced four-color layouts to Grand Traverse Resort.

"If we go away on Saturday, we'll have 20 messages on our answering machine when we get back," grinned Shipe. He calls their phone bill "humongous."

Shipe is proud that, at \$1.50 a copy the magazine is below the price of most competitors, in both subscriptions and advertising.

"I like to keep the prices down, so regular people can but it, especially advertisers. Mom and Pop businesses are our bread and butter, so I wouldn't want to



push them out."

Shipe is also proud the magazine runs all original copy. He explained that several of the competitors just pick up stories from an industry press service.

Shipe thinks that the other magazines copy Michigan Snowmobiler because the style works so well.

After the hectic and intense publication season, the Shipes like to get away to Las Vegas for several weeks. They also spend time in Florida before headcontinued on page 3

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



Off to an early lead in the East Jordan Bridge Tournament are Barbara Adams and Barbara Worgess with a threemonth point total of 17,120 points.



Make Sunday Dec. 19 an 'unsilent' night

The Michigan State Firemen's Association (MSFA) is urging Michigan homeowners to buy a new battery for battery-powered smoke and fire detectors this holiday season, and test their systems on "un-silent night," Sun., Dec. 19, at 7 p.m.

The 1992 statistics indicated that there were 14,052 incidents in Michigan. Of those incidents, 12.7 percent of the smoke detectors did not work. All of those failures were caused by human error - a lack of fresh batteries. If homeowners put in fresh batteries (even if the old ones work) and then tested their detectors Dec. 19, at 7 p.m., it may well be the loudest sound ever heard for fire safety anywhere.

Over 50 percent of Michigan homes are now equipped with smoke detectors. Remember smoke detectors save lives, but only if they are properly maintained.

Leland visited Ellsworth Tuesday, the Lancers going to Vanderbilt for a league contest Friday.




Son of former resident joins medical staff



Central Lake hosted East Jordan Tuesday, then visits Forest Area on Friday to begin Ski Valley action.




"Kids will step forward and the program will continue," said Velding, who is entering his fifth season as head coach.



The wind will be blowing from the proper direction to hit me square in the face.


And I will have forgotten my gloves. Oh, yes, I certainly believe that cars

Author of the popular Deadly Sin and Commandment series, Lawrence Sanders has created a likable character in Archy McNally, resident of South Florida, head of a one-man investigative team, and ardent proponent of the "Good Life." /

In this novel, the witty, affable McNally is again (slogging) his way amid the filth of the filthy-rich in Palm Beach. McNally's father's prestigious law firm is hired to investigate the background of a stunningly beautiful newcomer who is to marry stuffy, boring Chauncey Wilson Smythe-Hersforth, son of an important and wealthy McNally client. Although McNally is not an attorney (he was kicked out of Yale), he's a gifted snoop. When the local painter for whom the prospective bride posed is murdered, things begin to get nasty. A nude dancer in Lauderdale is killed, then the psychotic daughter of the artist. But McNally connects the dots, solving all three

murders, never abandoning his gourmand appetite, mussing his puce ultra-suede blazer, or scuffing his Gucci loafers (no socks).

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



The two brothers were dressed and ready for a rodeo, although there was none that day. But there was a chance to talk about how they got involved in riding "rough stock" rather than playing as running backs on the football team or guards in basketball, and that was enough.

Jake and Caleb Wiltse of Ellsworth are two young men who have a spirit for riding broncs and bulls.Wearing their black cowboy hats, colorfully patterned shirts, and resting their thumbs in the belt loops next to the shiny, silver belt buckles, they spoke of their young rodeo days.

Caleb, 12, holds the runner-up state rodeo title of "Cowboy of the Year." Competing in the Junior Novice age division (10-12) for Region I of the state, which covers the entire western half, Caleb finished the season with a first place in bull riding and a second place in bareback bronc riding. That first-place finish in bull riding earned him the highly prized belt buckle that lit up his eyes when he talked about it. His overall standings in the state this year were second in bull riding and sixth in bareback.

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and touching the horse when its front feet hit the ground from the first jump out of the chute. There is a wide rope tightly wrapped around the back of the horse that helps in scoring points. "That irritates the horse," said Jake. "It mak _s it buck."

How many points Caleb scores while on the bull, also for six seconds, depends on his body control and position regardless of what moves the bull makes. It is very important to have an animal that bucks well, because bucking ability is figured into the point total awarded to the rider. Dull spurs and a bell that hangs underneath the bull are both used to keep the animal agitated.


Two judges can score up to 25 points for the rider and 25 points for the animal in evaluating the rides on both broncs and bulls.

The boys have made amazing strides in their short rodeo careers, considering they have had to make opportunities for themselves rather than have opportunites offered to them. The closest 4-H rodeo club available was just formed in Misasaukee County two years ago. Jake and Caleb were two of its first members. And because Region I in-

> cludes the entire west side of the lower peninsula, rodeos are scattered all around.

"We do a lot of travelling with the rodeos," said the boys' mother Ranelle.

According to their father Bill Wiltse, there are a lot of area kids who would be interested in such a program here in Antrim County and they are hoping to get one formed at some point.

barrel" in their barn which they use to imitate the real thing. They also have grown up riding horses which gave them a feel for riding early on.

There is also some natural riding talent that Jake and Caleb inherited from their father, who spent many years as a pro rodeo rider. Mom provides inspiration, too, as she enters barrel racing in amateur rodeos with Caleb.

"I think we are all hooked on it," she commented.

It is important to have that kind of family support in a sports activity that definitely involves a element of danger. Not to say that the Wiltses don't worry about their children when they are riding, but they have a lot of faith in their sons' abilities.

"They are like little pros," remarked the boys' father. "We've had the usual bumps and bruises but nothing serious."

In order to compete in 4-H rodeos, the boys must complete three seasons of training that coincide with their first three years of participation. These clinics put a lot of emphasis on safety. The boys know the right way to fall. They know to never get off a standing bull because it could easily cause an injury with a quick turn of its head. And they know that the clowns and "pick-up" men are in the circle to protect them. When the rider falls, they are right there between them and the animal to prevent any charging.

Both Caleb and Jake are sharp on their rules and regulations and understand the animals deserve a great deal of respect.

It is an anxious time of year for these boys as they are already anticipating next year's competition. So they study pictures and videotapes from the year's rodeos to see how they can improve. And they of course they watch the pro rodeo competitions on television whenever they can.

"Riding has been very rewarding for them," their mother said. "It has taught them a lot."

gate, Jake Wiltse competes in one of the year's first rodeos.

Although Caleb rides both animals, it is clear that he enjoys bull riding more.

"It's a thrill!" he explained, in a voice filled with enthusiasm.

Jake, 13, moved from the Junior Novice division up to the Junior division this past year. Competing against 13to-15 year-olds exposed him to some more seasoned riders, but he still was a force in the field. His final rankings were third for Region I and fourth in the state in bareback competition only. And even though he earned his belt buckle last year as "all-around cowboy" for Eden County, he still remembers all the effort it took to receive it. To make a successful bareback ride, Jake must "mark" the horse and stay on the bucking animal for six seconds.

the bucking animal for six seconds. "Marking" involves having the rider's spurs in front of the animal's shoulders "We want to show Antrim County the talent

that they have here," said Wiltse.

In addition to 4-H rodeos there are amateur rodeos around the state that anyone can enter, and the boys do. By the end of the four-month season (from June to the end of September), they have competed in nearly 15 roedo events. This schedule gives them a lot of experience with the stock as the same stock is used in the amateur rodeos as in the 4-H rodeos. And even though it is "small" stock, the boys are still attempting to handle bucking animals between 500 and 600 pounds.

"What these kids ride is not easy," commented Wiltse. "It is a smaller stock, but they still turn and twist and buck and slam ."

It takes a lot of practice, as with any sport, and the boys look to one another for discipline. They have a "bucking



City council briefs : December 7 meeting

Letter of support

The council passed a motion of support in an effort to end illegal hunting and trespassing in a section on the southern boundary of East Jordan.

South Arm Township will be solicited by the city for cooperation in solving the problem.

The issue was brought to the council's attention by Tom Breakey, Sr.

"With the coming of deer season, it becomes a virtual war zone on the south of town," said Breakey.

The area of concern is commonly known as the Four Mile Square. Township jurisdiction juts into city jurisdiction directly south of Seiler Park.

Breakey, who once owned the property and still lives along the boundaries, says the area is annually inundated with hunters.

He reported seeing illegal activities, such as driving of deer, and has often complained to the police.

The area was at one time a protected wildlife conservation area. But when the DNR lifted the hunting ban, the problems began. Area residents often feel threatened by flying bullets.

City clerk Kathy O'Rear was instructed to contact South Arm Township with a letter broaching the subject.

Rezoning approved

Council approved rezoning of a residential property to a Planned unit Development Zone (PUD).

The property, on M-66, is owned by Cal Gotts. Gotts originally requested a C-1, or commercial zoning, but the planning commission decided a PUD would allow more city control.

Gotts will have to submit plans for review by the commission in every action taken on the property. The city council will then have final approval before any units are built.

Gotts is planning either a motel or strip mall for the site.

Medicare contract

The council voted to continue contracting with Medicare for ambulance use.

The decision was made despite the \$10,000 the city has lost since April 1993 when Medicare changed reimbursement rates. The city is forced into subsidizing Medicare patients because Medicare assigns payment considerably lower than the actual service cost.

Ambulance administrator Bernie Hammond explained that the base fee for ambulance service is \$100

plus \$2.00 per mile.

Presently, Medicare pays \$45.27 plus \$1.50 per mile. The patient is billed \$13.50. This means the city is left with an outstanding fee of at least \$41.23 per use.

The city could opt out of Medicare and bill the patient directly, but council members felt that would cause too much hardship for their elderly residents.

It was also thought that the administrative costs of billing and collecting could create nearly as much expense as subsidizing Medicare patients.
