•Plans for East Jordan's "Operation Facelift" began. Community members are looking to "spruce-up" the downtown area.


•John Whiteford of East Jordan was named Rotary's 1993 Father of the Year.

East Jordan adopts Downtown Development Authority

The issue of whether or not to establish a Downtown Development Authority in East Jordan dominated the Dec. 21 city council meeting.

Despite a previous two-hour discussion at a public hearing Dec. 14, the issue continued to elicit argument.

The debate was sparked by a motion by council member Brian Sweet. He proposed sending the DDA back to committee for revision of designated boundaries.

Sweet would like to exclude residential property owners who object to being in the district. He also wishes to eliminate school property and add the East Jordan Iron Works foundry and yards to the DDA.

"We shouldn't do this (adopt the ordinance) until we get it right," Sweet said.

Sharon Jackson, co-owner of Busy Bridge Antiques, spoke as a member of the ad hoc committee that spent two years developing and promoting the DDA proposal.

"We think we did it right the first time. We're tired now, tired of waiting," Jackson said with evident frustration.

Primary focus of the discussion were the proposed DDA boundaries.

As at the public hearing, council member Greg Chappuies lead the defense of the boundary lines.

"These boundaries were not drawn arbitrarily by idiots," he said. "Every line was chosen for a specific reason."

Chappuies is also a member of the ad hoc committee.

Although the committee was a volunteer citizens group with no authority to take action, the city council accepted the committee's proposed boundaries for the district.

Also at issue was whether the proposed district would generate enough revenue should the DDA board plan for a two mill tax to fund the ordinance. The tax would raise approximately \$10,000 per year.

Sweet feels it is not enough money.

"A DDA without funds is doomed to failure," he said.

Sweet reasoned that inclusion of the entire EJIW instead of just the office building within the district would increase the amount of captured funds.

Tad Malpass, Iron Works Vice President, responded to suggestions at the hearing that there had been negotiations concerning how the DDA boundaries would effect the Iron Works.



Malpass said he was unaware of any discussions taking place concerning the placement of the Iron Works.

"We're open to doing the best for our community," said Malpass. He said only the city council can decide whether to direct the plant tax-base toward the DDA or its own general fund.

Malpass said the Iron Works supports the DDA and civic improvement, and will agree to whatever decision the city makes concerning boundaries.

The other topic of debate was raised by Holland resident Jan Koster.

"I don't think you realize how much power a DDA has," she told council.

Koster owns vacation property at 300 Water Street. She expressed concern that the DDA could develop her property without her permission.

City attorney Scott Beatty pointed out that city council already has the powers that will be included in DDA entitlement.

In addition, the DDA board will have to submit all plans and funding efforts to council for approval.

"It will never be exactly the way every person wants it," said council member Ruth Gee.

"It's time for action now. We need to have the courage to make the decision," Chappuies agreed.

Sweet's original motion to table the DDA again was voted down, with Sweet, Vallance and Russ Gee in support of the motion and Chappuies, Etcher, Peck and Ruth Gee against postponing the ordinance.

Chappuies immediately offered a motion to adopt the DDA. Supported by Chappuies, Etcher, Peck and Ruth Gee, the motion carried.

In addition, the council adopted a procedure for residents within the district to appeal their inclusion.

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Residents may present their objections to full council on either Tues., Feb. 22 or Tues., May 10.

Both opportunities will be at 7 p.m. at City Hall. Each complaint will be heard individually on a firstcome, first-serve basis.

The deadline for objections is May 31.

In the interim, city council will implement the DDA ordinance by appointing a board of directors and researching the boundary issue.

Downtown business owners in attendance applauded the adoption of the ordinance.

Jordan Valley Pharmacy owner Debbie Chappuies was especially jubilant.

"Thank you, thank you, thank you!" she told the council.

The scholarship was designed by Dr. Tim and Lynn Grauel Smith, Grauel's sister and brother-in-law, in conjunction with Michigan State University.

Grauel's parents, William Sr. and Frannie, also cooperated in the process.

Grauel, a 1975 graduate of EJHS, passed away about a year ago.

Application procedures will include submission of academic record, extra-curricular activities, and community service experiences.

In addition, MSU will provide a topic, to be changed annually, on which the student will submit an essay.

The scholarship will provide full tuition coverage for four years at MSU. Selection will be based on the criteria rather than financial need. There is no course of study requirement.

"This is a tremendously substantial gift," said superintendent Chip Hansen. "It is a wonderful addition to the wealth of scholarship opportunities for East Jordan students."

MSU will administer the scholarship. East Jordan school officials will have no voice in the selection, which will be announced at graduation ceremonies.

In her letter of resignation Swan thanked the board for a fruitful experience and concluded "Everything I've learned I'll take with me."

She has mixed feelings about leaving. While very glad to be near her family again, she will especially miss the middle school staff.

"The teachers here are wonderful," she said. "I'll miss the kids, too."

"We're really sorry to lose Eivor," said superintendent Chip Hansen. "She's been an outstanding middle education leader."


Shirley Bishop has been appointed as interim principal to fill the post until June.


Bishop, the wife of East Jordan High School principal Gus Bishop, has an extensive background as an educator, both in the classroom and as administrator.


Her previous post was as director of student services in Mountain Village Alaska, at the Lower Yukon School District.



Syrup producers offered education program

Michigan State University Extension and the Michigan Maple Syrup Association (MMSA) will co-sponsor a day-long educational program on Sat., Jan. 15, for any interested local maple syrup producers.

This year's program will feature aspecial presentation on marketing by Dr. Greg Passewitz of the Ohio State University Extension Service in Columbus, Ohio. Dr. Passewitz has worked extensively with maple syrup producers and Christmas tree growers.

His approach is to help producers improve their skill at marketing by focusing on getting more income without neces-

sarily producing more product.

Also featured on this year's program will be a beginner's session for new producers, a question and answer panel on maple syrup production and tips on selling timber from your woodlot.


In addition to the educational program, there will be several maple syrup equipment suppliers on-hand to exhibit their products for those who attend, plus a short business meeting by MMSA.

The program will be held at the Holiday Inn in Grayling, on the I-75 Business Loop, and will run from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

•EJ Iron Works and the Chamber of Commerce joined together to contract new development coordinator, Rod Benson.


DECEMBER

•The issue of whether or not to develop a DDA in East Jordan drew both supporters and detractors but was eventually adopted at the Dec. 21 meeting.


•Long-time planning commission chairman for East Jordan, Tom Sheridan, was elected to a new post. He is now president of the city charter commission.


