


Weather

Odyssey of the Mind captures the imagination

Odyssey of the Mind, with its many opportunities for expansion of thinking skills and creativity, was once again an outstanding success for East Jordan students.

Four groups participated this year in the hands-on educational program that challenges each team to seek a unique solution to a specific problem.

For several months, the teams work on problem-solving. Then activities become very intense, finally culminating in competition at the regional level, this year in Alpena Feb. 19. Placing first or second in their division qualifies teams to compete at the state level in April.

There are five problems that teams may chose from. Although a few of the problems are restricted by age level, most can be approached from a variety of ages, or in O.M. terms, divisions.

The distribution of ages is: elementary (Division I); middle school (Division II); high school (Division III); and college (Division IV). A special K-2 primary problem, called Masquerade Party, is not judged competitively.

The problems generally involve building or inventing some type of structure or machine, then developing a skit that should relate, at least vaguely, to the *continued on back*

EJ takes title

East Jordan captured the first district basketball title in several years, taking out a pair of Lake Michigan foes to do the job.

Helping hands came from Charlevoix, who took out Boyne Falls on Monday 64-57, and Elk Rapids, who removed Harbor Springs 74-59. East Jordan then bested the host Red Rayders 66-61 in a thrilling match Wednesday. The combined talents of Todd Loviska, Chad Raymond, Steve Wiltfong and Nate McWatters all came through when the need was greatest.

That set up the final, East Jordan and Elk Rapids, Friday night. Elk Rapids came out gunning, taking a 17-12 lead on the Red Devils to bring cheers from their side of the crowd. East Jordan wowed the fans right back, winning period two to lead 25-23, then expanding the gap to 42-35 with eight minutes to go.

Elk Rapids inched its way back into the game, taking advantage where opportunity presented itself, but still had four points to make up with just over a dozen ticks left on the clock.

A steal and score cut the gap in half. The ball found its way into the hands of the Elks once more, but they could not get a last-gasp victory. East Jordan heard the final horn with the score on their side, 61-59. continued on back

Mini Terrain Vehicles (Divisions II-IV)

Design, build and run a minimum of three vehicles to accomplish specific tasks. The vehicles must overcome obstacles on an eight-section course.

■ OM-Believable Music (Divisions I-III)

Design and construct a minimum of three devices that, when combined, play a tune. During performance of the tune on the devices, team-made illustrations should appear. A conductor is required.

Classics...*The Iliad* (Divisions I-IV)

Create and perform one scene from a given list from The *lliad*. The team must also present a historical scene from the 20th century and either make a transition between the two scenes, or show a connection or relationship between the two. A team-created work of art is required for use in both scenes.

Set It Free (Divisions I-IV)

Design and build a balsa wood and glue structure that will allow a ping-pong ball to be placed inside. The structure is tested by balancing and supporting as much weight as possible while protecting the ball and releasing it when the structure breaks.

Furs, Fins and Feathers (Divisions I-II)

Create and present a humorous performance depicting the life of an animal from the animal's perspective. The performance should include interaction between the animal and humans, while the animal displays four feelings or emotions from a given list. The animal must have some moving parts. 2 Keep personalities out of politics.


3 Cheer for school academics as much as athletics.



Fishing workshop set



The show and sale is Sat., March 26 only. There is a special surprise that will be announced during the show and sale. Be there!




Pastor Tom Welscott, his wife Mia and their family have come to the area from Mississauga, Ontario, a city in metropolitan Toronto.

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

Lancers end season; Campbell era is over



Ellsworth ended the 1993-94 season the same way it started, against Bellaire, but in between things have certainly changed.

This time, Bellaire showed some poise, got a lead and stuck with it to win 57-47; and instead of the start of another season for Ellsworth and Coach Hugh Campbell, it signalled the end, of both the season and the career of a tough competitor and determined adversary.

The March 8 game that opened the Class D district in Ellsworth began on a high note, with Lancer Jeremy Peterson dropping in a three-point shot for a 3-0 lead.

Opportunity knocked for the Trojans, but the open door to the district basketball crown slammed shut with an Eagle holding the knob.



Howard's watermelon patch was at its best and he led us all out to enjoy some succulent melon. As we all were jabbering away, three-year-old Louis piped up, "I don't like watermelon." As we turned our attention to him, we discovered he was trying to eat the rind!

Right after an area was logged, blackberries seemed to thrive. Aunt Pearl was a poor housekeeper, but she sure knew how to fascinate the small fry. When blackberrying up the side road off Six Mile Lake Road, we saw a young woodchuck up a tree.

Aunt Pearl said, "Catch it and I'll cook if for you." We shook it out of the tree. We got home too tired for a party that day, so she told us to come back the next noon and have stewed woodchuck. Very tasty, I might say. One morning, Earl Swain, Clifton Wilson and I caught a very large moss-back snapping turtle from the creek near the river on Old State Road. Of course, we thought of Aunt Pearl. The turtle weighed about 30 pounds, but we managed to haul it snapping and thrashing to the Churchill Farm. problem.

Each team has a coach to help them keep on task. But the coach is not allowed to advise, direct or be involved in any way in helping the group solve the problem.

As East Jordan coach Nancy Brooks explained, if the team wants to sew something, the coach may teach them to use a sewing machine, but she can't sew for them. If they don't want to learn how to sew, they have to figure out a different solution to the problem.

"Our main job is to make sure they clean up," chuckled Brooks. She said it is sometimes frustrating to have to keep out of their problem solving.

But Brooks feels the program is an extremely valuable learning experience. She should know. She has observed all seven of her own children participate in O.M. She has coached for 12 years at East Jordan, partly so she could ensure the program would continue and her children could be involved.

"They learn to work as a team and count on each other," said Brooks. "If someone says they'll bring something and doesn't, everyone is let down. It happens all the time," she added with a laugh, "but they still learn something from it!"

The aims of the O.M. program are for students to develop problem-solving skills, to work within a group toward a common goal, and to display and appreciate good sportsmanship. Creating solutions, evaluating ideas and making final decisions builds self-esteem in students, as well as independent thinking.

O.M. Spontaneous is a competition game that selected members of the group take part in. Participants are given a brain-teaser and are judged on the type of answer they give.

For example, the group is asked to name something that flies. A common answer would be "bird," while a creative answer would be "Superman." The exercise promotes fast, creative thinking.

Eighth-grader Gary Brooks said he enjoys the challenge of Spontaneous. "It prepares you for later situations in life. You don't know what will happen when you walk into the room."

Many students repeat their involvement in O.M. year after year, often requesting the same problem. Yet, the solutions may change, producing a variety of imaginative ideas.

Nancy Brooks said her son Gary grew up on the Set It Free problem, which requires devising a balsa wood structure. Her older son Rich, now in college, did the problem every year from fourth grade through high school.

The Set It Free group never seemed to tire of designing, building and testing (which actually means breaking) their wooden structures. At the same time, other team members developed and rehearsed a skit to tie into the theme. The subject they chose was racism, and they wrote with surprising wisdom and candor.

All the hard work paid off, as the team placed first on their problem in Division II.

Most students agree that one of the main incentives is qualifying for state competition. Students enjoy the road trip, spending the night in a motel and competing with students from all over the state.

The winning Set It Free team includes Gary Brooks, Heather Ingrahm, Mike Mazzella, Kristina Nelson, Raisa Schroeder, Angela Swan and Andrew Wood. All are eighth-graders. Coach is Nancy Brooks.

Also qualifying for state by placing second in Division III, presenting OM-believable Music are Kari Brooks, Bethann Leonard, Beverly Lucas, Heather McLaren and Ember Ransom. Their coach is Dawn Brock.

Presenting OM-believable Music at the Division II level were Kattie Brooks, Mary Ann Brooks, Cynthia Mazzella, Cathy Sleeper and Casey Tonkin, with Nancy Brooks as coach.

The three plays selected will be produced in June, August and September by Jordan River Players, the council's the-



Well, on Sat., Feb. 19, this uncommon ewe presented the Renkiwicz family with *quadruplets* - three boys and a girl.




