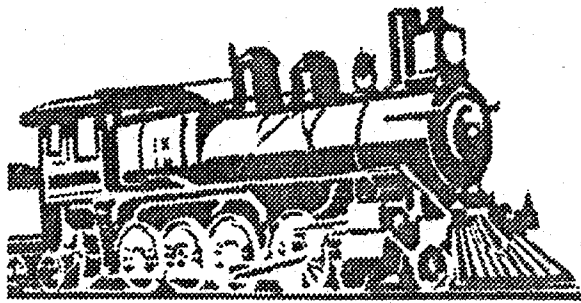
### Weather

## EJ students attend statewide alcohol forum

Two students from East Jordan Middle School attended a statewide forum March 11 on teenage drinking moderated by national talk show host Maury Povich.

Betsey Banfield, 13, and Brad Carey, 14, were chosen to represent East Jordan on the hour-long televised program, "Innocent Fun, Deadly Results." The program was broadcast live, com-

mercial free to schools and communities across Michigan.

The two students, along with their parents, joined hundreds of other eighth-grade students at Grand Rapids East Kentwood High School to learn about the dangers and effects of alcohol - the number one drug problem of American young people.

### "Innocent Fun, Deadly Results"

focused on "binge drinking"; consumption of five or more drinks at one occasion or 15 drinks in a week. Binge drinking is particularly dangerous for teenagers. More than five million students nationwide have tried binge drinking, according to sponsors of the event. The average binge drinker is just 16 years old and first began drinking at age 12.

The discussion panel included young alcoholics, parents and several experts on the issue.

"Students heard how binge drinking can cause alcohol overdose, including death. Tragic stories were told by parents of a 14 year old Michigan boy and a 16 year old Michigan girl who died recently of alcohol overdose in separate incidents.

"Incidents of alcohol overdose are more common than most people realize," explained Penny Norton, Director of the FACE initiative - Facing Alcohol Concerns through Education. "In one six month period in rural central Michigan, three teens died of alcohol overdose."

The risk is highest if the drinker consumes large amounts of alcohol quickly, as in "chugging." The alcohol effects increase even after the drinker loses consciousness, leading to possible death from respiratory or heart failure, or suffocation on vomit. Anyone who passes out from drinking is at immediate risk.

Of course there are many side effects of drinking; death and injury in auto crashes, drownings, fights and other violence, as well as school failure and unplanned or unwanted sexual behavior.

## Elementary students on technology's cutting edge

In the few months since East Jordan School District incorporated Integrated Learning Systems technology into the elementary level, there has only been one problem - getting the kids to stop using it.

Elementary teacher Heather Pater is in charge of the program. With the computer-based system set up in a portion of her classroom, Pater was worried about what might go on behind the divider, while children were moving in and out all day long.

"But the only behavior problem is getting them to leave," said Pater. She said for many of the children, it is the most focused 15 or 20 minutes in their day. She has children using the system

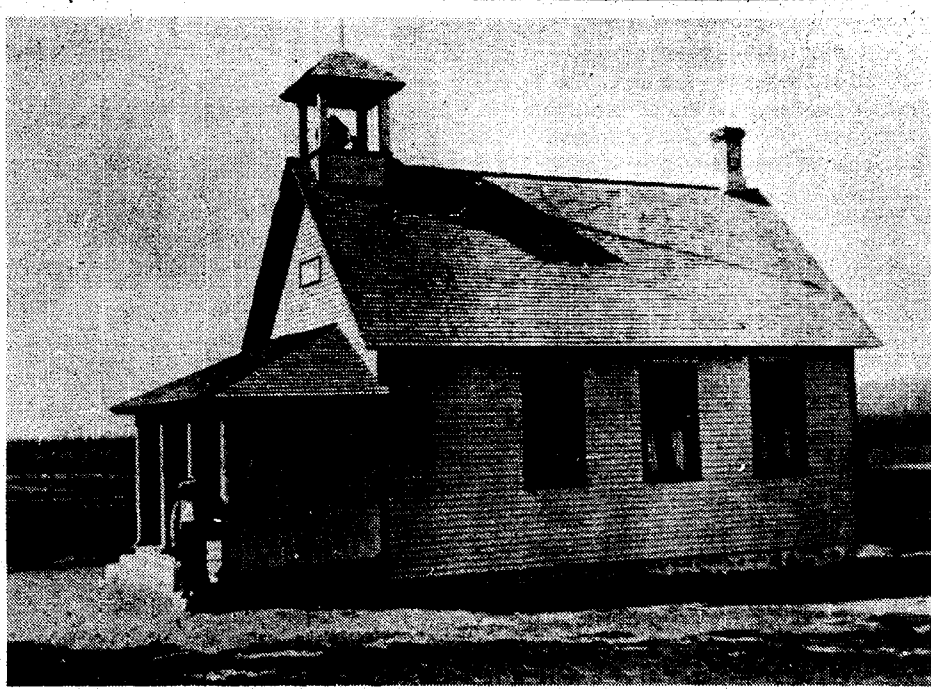
from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. every school day.

The ILS, mainly funded by Chapter I (federal funds for at-risk students), is designed as an individualized tool to guide students through math and language skills. According to Char-Em Intermediate School District Technology Specialist Sandi Whiteford, the ILS can be used to remediate or allow advanced work.

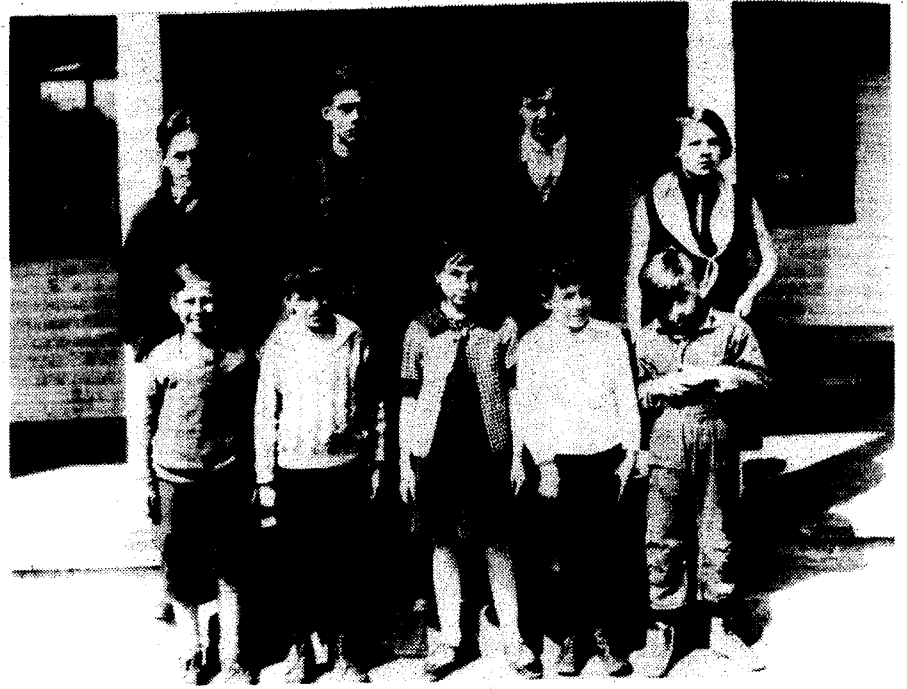
"The system can be geared specifically to problem areas," said Whiteford. "And it can provide immediate assessment."

East Jordan is presently using the ILS "to close the gaps in student learning," according to District Superintendent Chip Hansen. The elementary and middle school staff have targeted 147 students to use the system. Teachers

## Our Interesting Neighbor: Lynda Derenzy Brown

There are countless miles between Wexford County, Ireland and Bellaire, Michigan, and many years have passed since the potato famine in Ireland. But there is a definite thread that binds the two places and eras together, adding another interesting piece of Antrim County history.

Lynda Derenzy Brown is bringing this history into the limelight because she has an appreciation for history and feels a responsibility for its preservation. So often those interested in the preservation of history of an area are of an older generation. Lynda, however, is a young wife and mother of two children. She attends college and works in the East Jordan post office in addition to running her family household.

Lynda traces her heritage back to the Irish potato famine that brought her great-grandfather to Canada and, subsequently, to the United States. They homesteaded a large piece of property on Derenzy Road and after they cleared it for lumber and farming, the land on both sides of the road supported several generations of Derenzys.

Lynda and her husband Jim live on the Derenzy homestead property. The site originally held the first log cabin her ancestors built. There have been two additions to the original log cabin but the cabin finally had to be removed. The home was built using lumber

cut on the property and Lynda and Jim endeavor to keep the style and architecture close to the original when they remodel.

In 1898 Lynda's ancestors, Henry and Elizabeth (Derenzy) Sissons, deeded a piece of land on the south west corner of the intersection of Derenzy and East Intermediate Roads for a school building. "The Little Red School House" served for the education of local youngsters from 1901 until 1938. No longer used as a school, it serves the community as a well-known landmark.

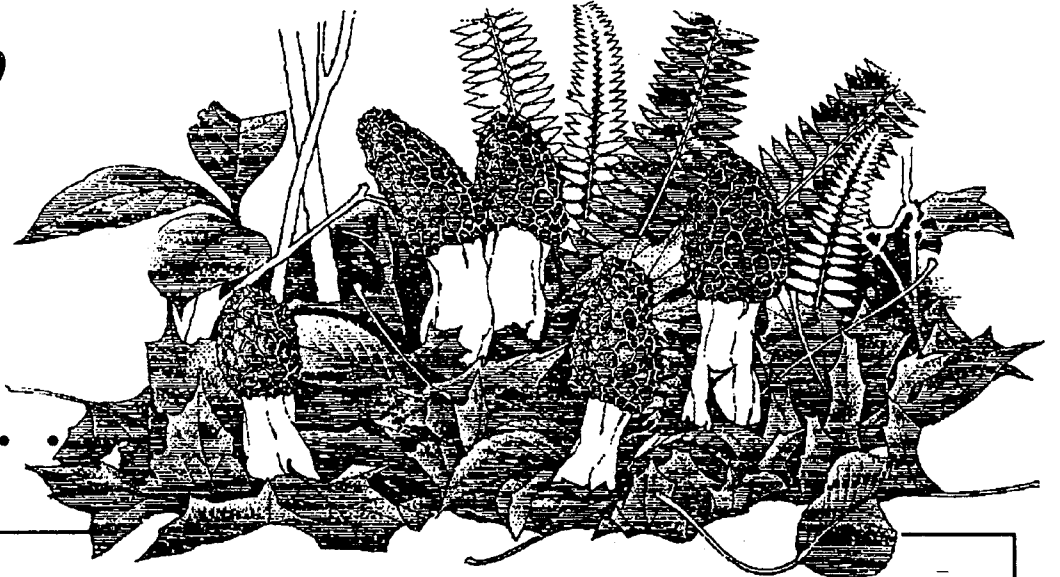
"It hasn't always been red," Lynda explains. "It was originally painted white with green trim." She has pictures taken over the years the school was in session.

Unfortunately the building is deteriorating. The village of Bellaire now owns it and restoration would cost the taxpayer thousands of dollars.

The subject of "What will happen to the little red school house?" comes in and out of discussion periodically. As a result of a survey conducted by the

## Crop Walk aids area food pantries

Food pantries in East Jordan, Boyne City and Charlevoix each received \$937 as their share of funds raised by the 1993 CWS/Crop Walk, according to local coordinator Margaret Thompson.

Last October, 143 walkers raised \$11,238 in

a best-ever effort, sponsored by the Charlevoix County Ministerial Association. Funds from the Church World Service/Christian Rural Overseas project are used to fight hunger locally, in the United States and abroad.

One-fourth of the money raised by each

walk is returned to the local food pantries. In 1992 the county walk earned \$541 for each pantry.

1993 marked the tenth year for the Charlevoix County walk. East Jordan coordinator is Mary Glenna Malpass, assisted by Margaret Thompson. Boyne City coordinator is Diana Walls, assisted by Pat Hamondtree. In Charlevoix, Mary Helen Riggle and Kay Smith are co-coordinators.

Crop Walks began in Michigan in 1971 with two areas participating. Since then the project has grown to 134 Michigan walks with 30,755 vol-

unteers walking to fight hunger.

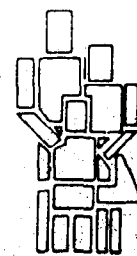

■ Well, we have had the last and the worst week of winter. March came blustering in with weather that developed into an old-time, zero blizzard in Eastport.

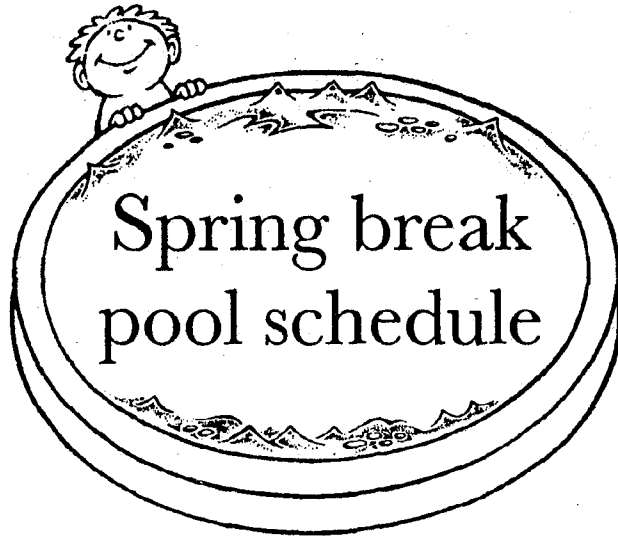

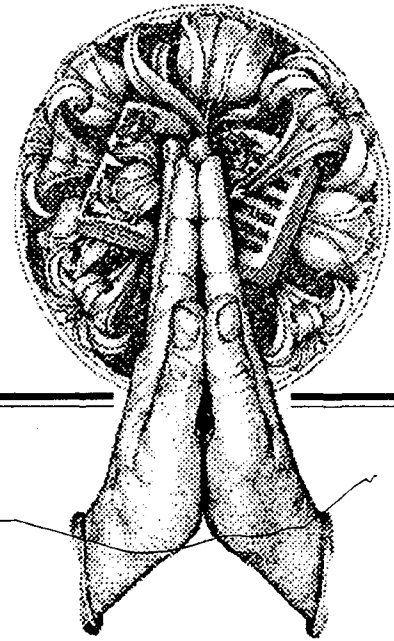

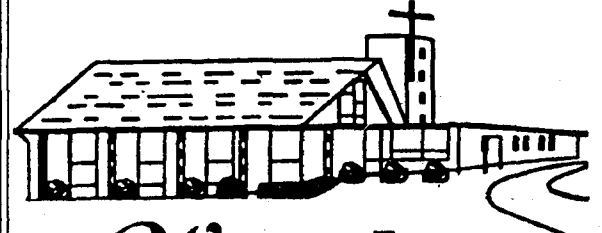

Bellaire Schools, an organization known as The Derenzy Schoolhouse Preservation Association, Inc. was formed by a handful of Bellaire citizens led by Lynda Brown.

The group is motivated by the fact that there may be a limit to how long the structure will stand without repair. They would regret its sale for a commercial purpose, thus destroying the historical value of the quaint building. More than once local farmers and friends have come to its rescue when demolition threatened.

On one of those occasions when it was threatened, a group of friends and neighbors banded together and formed what is known as The Kearney Kommunity Klub. They see that it is kept clean and neat and they use it at least twice a month in good weather to hold pot luck suppers.

Among the papers Lynda has available is a short list of former pupils of the school. There undoubtedly are more and Lynda is interested in adding to this list as part of her history of the school.

Lynda is currently planning a craft show in connection with Bellaire Chamber of Commerce Easter Egg Hunt on April 2. Proceeds will be put toward stabilizing the school's concrete foundation.

The Association has hopes of creating a museum in the schoolhouse where pictures, artifacts, oral histories and educational programs could be offered. "I'm really dedicated to this project," Lynda explained. "The school just has to be saved."

# Churchill's Corner: A willow switch, yellow jackets and a wagon

I must have been about six or seven years old when I did something that displeased mother very much. I can't remember what it was but she thought Floydey Boy needed a switch on his bare legs. I took off for the hills and Ma cut a willow switch and plodded along behind.

She nearly caught me up behind the gravel pit but I switched back down across the ball diamond. She was catching up on me when I climbed the baseball backstop. Two or three shakes on that chicken wire screen brought Floydey down to her level.

By then she was laughing so hard I only got one light brush of the switch.

At the head of a gully, on the north side of our back 40, there was a bubbling spring. It was the source of

Beal Creek and always was an attractive, cool place to spend some time on a hot, summer day.

One day we kids lingered there a while and on the way out picked some ripe apples from an seedling apple tree. We crossed the field to the entrance of the short corduroy road going out to Old State Road. About 10 feet from the road, on a high bank to the west, we noticed a huge yellow jacket nest. Someone threw a rock and hit it dead center. A yellow jacket came out of there like a bullet and got our buddy Earl Swain right between the eyes.

As we walked through the swamp to the road, Earl started staggering and broke out with the hives all over his body. Luckily we had our Badger coaster wagon along and loaded Earl on the wagon and headed for home. That was the first but not the last experience we ever had with bee sting allergies. We got Earl home safe and sound.

We were all out playing in the back yard a few days

later when one of those sudden Antrim County electrical storms came up. We no sooner got in the house when a very large basswood tree came down with a crash right across the coaster wagon. That was a sad day for the Churchill Kids.



# East Jordan students attend statewide alcohol forum

The central issue of the panel discussion was prevention of binge and other teen drinking problems. Both Banfield and Carey said they found the discussion interesting, although they have heard all the basic information before.

Banfield said her mom learned a lot, though. "She didn't realize how bad of a problem it is," said Banfield. She and Carey both confirmed that some students at EJ Middle School have drinking problems.

As far as changing either student's view on drinking, the program was confirmed their beliefs.

"I wouldn't drink before and I wouldn't drink now," said Carey, with Banfield in total agreement.

The students were chosen from a teacher-recommended group as the two that could most afford to miss a day of school. A discussion with Gov. Engler preceded the program.

Although East Jordan was not one of the ten schools chosen to ask a question during the televised program,

an East Jordan telephone call was the first one taken by Maury Povitch.

Melissa Waldron, 14, was the caller. Her question: What do you do when you have a drinking problem in your family?

Waldron was given several suggestions by the panel before they moved to the next call. Carey and Banfield thought it was pretty neat, hearing the call as part of the audience, and recognized Waldron right away.

"I was on hold almost an hour," said Waldron. She listened to the show over the phone while she waited.

Waldron was chosen to make the call because she was the only eighth-grader to submit a question. Although she was quick to mention that there is no one in her family with that problem, she thought someone might need the information, but might be afraid to ask.

Waldron is the daughter of Dave and Renee Waldron. Banfield's parents are Mike and Carol Banfield. Both

girls have lived in East Jordan since they were small children.

Carey, an East Jordan native, is the son of Marty and Debbie Carey.

The forum was endorsed by the Michigan Department of Public Health, Michigan MADD and Michigan SADD. The broadcast was sponsored by McDonald's Restaurants of Outstate Michigan.

guide the content of the experience and get printed feedback of the student's work.

While Chapter I students have first priority, the staff sees the ILS as a means of reaching students at all levels.

"This system can service a broad range from very low function to gifted," explained Pater.

Unfortunately, there are only seven ILS units, so expanding into the rest of the 920 pre K-8 students is unlikely at this time. Each station costs about \$3000 for hardware and software, with a annual on-line fee of \$145.75.

But both the East Jordan district and the Char-Em ISD are writing grants to supplement the program.

"There's money out there for these technologies," said Whiteford.

But grants may not ease the problem of cramped quarters. Already crammed into the corner in Pater's classroom with only seven units, the prospects of finding more space are dim. Hansen projects the need for another third grade classroom next year in a building that has been stretched to the limits by a growing student population.

# Portrait artist revives her talent

Starting over again in art was easier than she thought it would be.

Bonnie Deschamps put her creative juices on the back burner for a number of years, calling on them occasionally as a teacher and mother, but for the most part letting them simmer unattended.

Then about a year and a half ago, Deschamps picked up a pastel and began to draw - faces. And she realized something she never had in all her school years of art study, that she was really good at drawing portraits.

"It's really magical - like the people are coming out of the paper instead of me putting them on the paper," says Deschamps.

Ever since then, the East Jordan native has been drawing, finding great satisfaction in watching her vision of family and friends unfold under her fingers.

The medium of pastels (a type of chalk) has a great deal of flexibility, both in the execution of the portrait and in common use.

That flexibility is what attracted Deschamps to pastels, that and affordability. With a busy lifestyle that includes teaching English at Alba High School, a small child (her daughter Nicole, 6) and a college-age daughter, Jill, Deschamps found it much easier to work within her stolen moments. It was just a matter of picking up the chalks and beginning. No special paper, mixing, preparation, drying space or time is needed.

Also unlike oils, no toxic cleaners are necessary. While pastels can cost as much as \$2000, they are also available in more accessible and reasonable charges within a teacher's budget.

Deschamps also likes the portability of the supplies, because she enjoys working outdoors.

"And if you like colors, changing or blending them is easy with pastels," says Deschamps.

Deschamps has begun showing some of her work in the area. She displayed three portraits at the Jordan River Arts Council Angel Show in December. She currently has a show at the Jordan Valley Library through April.

Her portraits are often taken from photographs, yet the effect is never photographic. The pastels offer a

vision that's softer, more three-dimensional. Deschamps' special touch with color brings the subject to life.

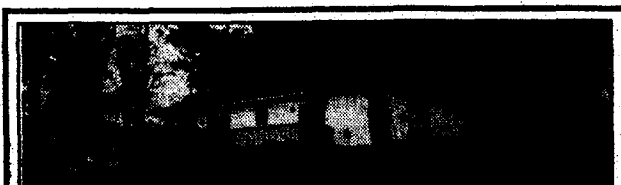

"Because she is," says the fond mother.

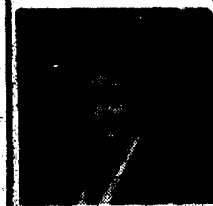
Deschamps believes she will never allow her art to be set aside again, as she did for so many years.
