East Jordan City Council Briefs: July 5

City Superintendent Bob Johnson possible. presented a check for \$20,314 in emergency assistance provided by the federal government to cover damage caused by last winter's extreme weather.

Johnson thanked Charlevoix emergency coordinator Earl Muma for the work he did to secure the funds. Over \$200.000 was distributed in Charlevoix County, the largest portion going to the city of Charlevoix. Boyne City also received a sizable check.

Resident Tom Breakey, Sr. remarked about inequities of the distribution, but Johnson explained that the amount was based on damage sustained.

"We had a fraction of the damage they had," he told Breakey.

The council adopted a resolution to construct and replace sidewalks by special assessment throughout East Jordan.

Johnson said he took a walk with Superintendent of Schools Chip Hansen, and learned that the sidewalks around the middle and elementary school are in dangerous condition, especially on Fourth Street. Hansen feels strongly that repairs must be made before school

The city's share is \$720.

Council member Ruth Gee resigned from her position on the library board, citing her wish to avoid the appearance of a conflict of interest. Another council member, Sherry Sineway, did not apply to continue her membership on the board for the same reason.

The council appointed two new board members to represent the city. They are Perry Bennett and Carlton Bishop, both residents of the city.

A third applicant did not apply in time, but was encouraged to try at the next opportunity.

The city has four representatives on the board. Dorothy Archer and Shirley Etcher will continue as city appointees.

Resident Jerry Cihak requested council look into the problem of boat trailers left unattended for long periods of time at the city boat ramp.


The issue was directed to the Parks and Recreation Committee with suggestions to consider signs prohibiting trailers left without vehicles, and suggesting alternate parking, along with more enforcement.

McDonalds (#15,082!) opens in East Jordan

McDonald's, the giant of the fast food industry, opened restaurant #15,082 world-wide in East Jordan, July 1.

In keeping with McDonald's policy of always giving back to the community, the ribbon used for opening ceremonies was made of 100 \$1 bills. Afterward, the money was donated to the Freedom Festival fireworks fund.

The drive-through express is owned by Tom Holka, who also owns franchises in Boyne City and Kalkaska. Although the restaurant is drive-through only for the general public, it also serves as an indoor snack bar for patrons of the new Jordan Valley Express Music Center, where it is housed. East Jordan community and business leaders joined Holka and McDonald's Field Representative Larry Lownesbery for the opening, then enjoyed lunch at the snack bar. Lownesbery said the new restaurant will provide 20-25 jobs.

Holka won't predict whether the drive-through will eventually expand into a full-service restaurant, but said he is optimistic about the success of the chain in the area.

"We're looking to the future of East Jordan," he told the group.

Drive-through hours are 6:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m daily. Inside, the snack bar is open during Jordan Valley Express hours and serves a variety of food, including nachos, pretzels and sparkling water, as well as traditional McDonald's fare.

Improved park playground possible

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Visitors to the Echo Township Park may soon enjoy the addition of some new playground equipment.

Trustee Dale LaVan-way told fellow board members at the July 5 meeting that several residents have expressed an interest in expanding play options for children at the park on Six Mile Lake Road.

"There's nothing there for the little ones," he said, noting the installation of items like a self-propelled merry-go-round or play fort not only adds to kids' fun, but offers relief for busy parents as well.

Concerns over liability in case of accident have quashed such acquisitions in the past, officials noted. However, it was agreed that if insurance concerns can be satisfactorily addressed, one or two unspecified pieces of equipment will be ordered, hopefully for installation this season.

No dollar amount was identified; however, board me: ______emed inclined to keep the total expenditure in the under-\$2,000 range. In other business, the board:

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

The next problem: The bare-bones city budget had no extras dollars to pay a construction crew, though the materials were already owned by the city.





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

Singing peacemaker to entertain in EJ

Singer-songwriter Rick Meisterheim will present a free show Fri., July 22, at 7 p.m. at East Jordan Memorial Park. His appearance is the third of series of Free Fridays in the park sponsored by Jordan River Arts Council.

An East Jordan educator, farmer and artist, Meisterheim uses music to share his perspective on our world and its people. His underlying theme is peacemaking, which he considers his life's work.

His repertoire of original music includes "Like the Dove," "Season's Promise," Swords to Plowshare" and "Peace in Your Soul." He will accompany himself on acoustic guitar, mandolin, lap dulcimer and sweet stick – unique handmade instrument that sounds like a banjo.

Meisterheim teaches environmental education to school groups at nature centers around the country. Maintaining a simple lifestyle that includes farming with draft horses, he and his wife Tracy are developing the Wagbo Peace Center south of East Jordan. He has entertained at coffee houses around the country, including Scottsdale and Phoenix, Arizona; Lake Placid, New York and the Kerrville, Texas, Folk Festival. In northern Michigan he has appeared at Bliss Fest, Lumberjack Fest, Sylvan Resort and the Castle Farm Story Tree.

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

Central Lake Citizens Group outlines platform

Since January, I have been meeting with a group of people and discussing local events. We originally got together because of our opposition to the anti-blight ordinance, but soon discovered that we felt that there were other problems that needed to be addressed as well. We attended township meetings and became informed on the local issues. We call ourselves The Central Lake Citizens Group. We believe that at the township level:

1. The annual spring meeting should be reinstated to discuss the officials' salaries and the budget.

2. There should be a local newspaper report of the meeting and the minutes reported.

3. There should be a notice of future meetings posted at a prominent main street location as well as the township hall door.

4. We feel that there are too many special meetings and that most township business can be handled at the regular business meetings.

5. There should be more information on the issues available at the monthly meetings and more discussion so the public can voice their opinions or objections.

6. We would like to see a New England-style meeting that offers more public input. It might not be as speedy or as efficient as the present system, but

would allow dissenting opinions to be aired.

7. We feel that township offices are part-time jobs, and that the money spent for officials' pensions and health insurance is wrong and could be better spent on roads or other projects to benefit the citizens of Central Lake Township.

8. We feel that the condition of our local road system is deplorable, there has been no resurfacing of our highways in years and no money is budgeted by the township officials to match county or state funds.

9. We would study the budget and if there is not enough surplus that can be diverted to road improvecontinued on page 7

aware of the ordinance's drawbacks and when again presented for vote, opposed it. This does not mean that blight problems do not still exist. It does mean we should attempt to find a better way to deal with these problems. The ordinance as written would pit neighbor against neighbor, and poor man vs. wealthy. I feel a better ordinance can be written and with the clause that anyone wishing to lodge a complaint against their neighbor pay a NON-REFUNDABLE filing fee of \$100.

Now I will turn to the other side of the coin and request that the township come up with a general, simple zoning ordinance within the next three months. We have a lot of available land here in Central Lake

Township and a fat-rendering, chemical, noise and/or air-polluting plan (or a visual producing pollution i.e. cellular phone towers) could come in and set up business tomorrow.

We can not expect township board members to do it all. The negatives have spoken, now let us all come up with positive solutions - either by serving on committees or attending committee and board meetings and expressing our constructive opinions. If we are not willing to give a little time and thought to these important problems, we have no right to complain about the final results.

A 66th wedding anniversary celebration was held for Ivan and Luella Barnes of East Jordan, July 15, at the Union Local #598 Pavilion in Flint.



AS A FREQUENT visitor to Central Lake, your community (and in a way, mine) has become familiar. When I refer to community, I refer to the village and Central Lake Township.

Arriving from any direction always brings mixed emotions of the joy of being here again, and the apprehension of wondering whether the next curve will bring into view another abandoned car, a cedar pole teepee stressed with the weight of an engine held by a chainfall, or another lakefront polebarn done in Central Lake Harvest Gold.

What sad entertainment it is to speculate what, if anything, must be on the minds of those who signed a recall petition to oust an intruder who would even suggest that their community have a planning commission, a zoning board, or heaven forbid, an antiblight ordinance.

I think what we have here is a fundamental issue requiring no reinvention of the wheel. The people who signed the petition simply want to continue to be able to burn garbage in their yards, to perpetually store several generations of abandoned cars behind the garage, and will not be baited into a discussion as to whether a pole barn is legitimate architecture.

They simply want to be left alone, and will generally sign anything they think will further being left alone. It's called apathy. It's an insidious disease affecting millions in this country, whether inner-city Detroit or Central Lake Township.

I don't even know Paul Vernon. I never met the man. I do wish him the best in his efforts because I do know that dealing with people who don't care is a much larger project than passing a simple anti-blight ordinance.




Physician assistant joins Burns Clinic





Ellsworth school board adopts handbook changes

ELLSWORTH – The Ellsworth school board adopted a new detention policy, and addressed the use of legal substances in a drug-like manner in its student handbook changes for the 1994-95 school year.

"In many cases, these are policies that we have been operating under," said principal Marvin Ruis at the board's July 11 meeting. "We needed to change the wording in some spots of the handbook to reflect our active policies."

The school's drug policy now includes"improperuse of legal substances such as glue, paint, over-the-counter medications, etc." Following state guidelines, the school must now inform both parents and law enforcement officials if a student violates the drug policy. In another policy change, student detentions cannot be served before school begins in the morning starting next year.

"A lot of the time, they were already here before school started, so we decided after school was more of a punishment," Ruis said.

Detentions not served by the end of the year now must be made up within two weeks after school is out, or a student's class grades will be marked incomplete.

"This puts a little teeth into getting students to serve detentions,"Ruis said. "This is the policy we operated under this year, and we didn't have anybody who didn't make up their detention days this year. So it does work."

Students also cannot use motor ve-

hicles during a school day, even if they are not parked on school property.

"We would have kids parking uptown, then on lunch break, they would be zooming all over the place," Ruis said.

Other changes will include:

• a raising of ticket prices for athletic events.

"We haven't raised the prices for several years now," Ruis said. The principal told the board he will ascertain what nearby schools and other schools in the Great Northern Conference charge to "find a fair price."

 converting the elementary grading system to a letter-grade system like the high school's.

"It makes it easier for all concerned," Ruis said. "It will get kids used to it as they come to the high school from the elementary school."

• closing the school at 3:30 p.m. instead of 3:45 p.m.

• not allowing students back in to sporting events after they leave.

"With the old policy, they could pay to get back in," Ruis said. "But if students leave, they could be out drinking, and not letting them return might discourage the practice."

In other action, the board approved the hiring of Matt Peters of Manistique as the new math and computers teacher, replacing the retired Hugh Campbell. Peters will also coach the boys varsity basketball team.

The board also voted to change the time of their monthly meetings from 7:30 p.m. to 7 p.m.



She never forgets to praise the commitment of the team. They have the same eligibility requirements as any other sport, but a small budget that doesn't include annual uniform replacement.



Child safety seat campaign begins

More children are killed and crippled in traffic crashes than from any other cause of injury.

In Michigan 21 child passengers under age five were killed and 2,636 injured in 1991, the last year statistics are available.

For these and other reasons, District Health Department No. 3 is undertaking a Child Safety Seat Educational Campaign that began in May and ends Sept. 30.

It begins with the formation of a community coalition to provide leadership, community support and resource development for programs in the counties of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego.

The target audience of this campaign is the infants and toddlers who are not placed in safety seats, their parents and caretakers and the overall community.

This activity is made possible by a grant from the Michigan Department of Health and will be coordinated by Robert V. Cullen, a long time traffic safety professional. "It is imperative that the correct use of child safety seats be increased in the four county district" stated Cullen. "There is great concern about estimates that only half of the children age birth to 4 years may be protected by a safety seat when riding in a motor vehicle. This means that as many as 2,450 children are constantly exposed to the risk of injury or death."

Cullen also reported that safety seat usage observa-


tions will be conducted throughout the district to establish an up-to-date use rate.


•conduct training programs for 500 women through the Family Health clinic and individual counseling for an additional 500.

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Senator McManus begins re-election campaign

State Senator George McManus, R-Traverse City, kicked-off his campaign for the 36th District State Senate seat.


"Northern Michigan needs representation of the north and for the north, not of Lansing and for Lansing," said McManus, a life-long resident of northern Michigan. "As your state senator I will continue to put our communities first!"

McManus highlighted the fact that since he was elected in 1990 Michigan has cut taxes six times, including last month's passage of Proposal A which caps property assessment increases at the rate of inflation or 5 percent, whichever is less. He also mentioned that Michigan's unemployment rate in 1993 was 7 percent, its lowest in 15 years and that Michigan leads the Midwest in job creation.

If elected in November, McManus said he'll focus on welfare reform, anticrime legislation, and expanding upon the state's job creation gains.

"If a family has a job, if people are able to earn a living, if they have a chance to buy a house, that is the beginning of a healthy Michigan," McManus said. "It doesn't matter how many social programs we establish – none is as valuable or important as a good job."

McManus is a cherry farmer who was elected to the Senate in 1990 in the 37th Senate District which stretches from Traverse City to Escanaba. Redistricting in 1992 placed McManus' home in the new 36th Senate District which includes Leelanau, Benzie, Manistee, Wexford, Missaukee, Roscommon, Crawford, Otsego, Antrim, Kalkaska and Grand Traverse.





Gov. Engler signs Farmland Exemption Act

Gov. John Engler recently signed legislation that allows virtually all Michigan farmers to pay six mills in school property taxes and exempts farms from the additional 18 mills levied by local school districts.

The governor signed the bill at a mint farm in St. Johns on May 24.

"Two months ago, I made a promise to Michigan farmers that they would be treated fairly and that they would pay the same property taxes as other families," Engler said. "And with my signature on this bill, we mark another promise made and another kept." Engler commended the sponsor of the bill, State Rep. Dan Gustafson, R-Williamston, and said kind words to State Rep. Alan Cropsey, R-DeWitt, and Sen. Joel Gougeon for their support of the bill.

"Agriculture is one of the largest job providers in our state," Gourgeon said. "This bill clarifies the Legislature's intent to treat all farmland equally and increases the ability of Michigan farmers to compete with other farmers from all over the country. If we want farmers to thrive, we must have a fair tax system," he added.

Forestry activity grants are available

Grant applications for community forestry activities are available from the Department of Natural Resources Urban and Community Forestry Program funded through the USDA Forest Service.

Public agencies and non-profit private entities are eligible to apply. All projects must be performed on non-federal public lands or land open to the public.

Community forestry activities considered for funding include local government and non-profit organization programming, urban and community forestry education and community volunteer tree planting projects.

Grant applications must be postmarked by Aug. 22, 1994 in order to be given funding consideration. Projects must be completed by Aug. 31, 1995.

Grants are available up to \$20,000 and require matching funds of at least 50 percent. The match may be made up of cash contributions or in-kind services but may not include federal funds.

Under terms of Proposal A, school property taxes for non-homestead agricultural property would have been 24 mills, while the same tax for farm homesteads would have been six mills. House Bill 329 eliminates that disparity and requires that all qualified agricultural property be taxed at the lower rate.

The legislation states that an affidavit claiming the exemption on qualified agricultural property should have been filed with the local assessor by June 1, 1994. However, farm owners need not file the form if the property is classified agricultural or if they have already filed a homestead exemption for their farm property.

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Pesticide safety urged


Although homeowners who apply weed and feed fertilizers to their lawns possibly do not think of themselves as "pesticide applicators," they are, according to Michigan State University Extension.

One university study recently found that homeowner use of pesticides exceeded agricultural use when measured on an area basis. Homeowners applied proportionately more pesticides to their homesteads than farmers did to their crops.

The fact that many homes are situated on lakes and streams makes them a greater potential threat to water quality than threats from agricultural uses of pesticides and fertilizer.

For the homeowner who is interested in learning more about safe pesticide use, some materiers and commercial businesses are required to study and know to become certified pesticide applicators are also available to the general public. 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



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Kirtland's warbler census shows 30 percent increase

The 1994 Kirtland's warbler census indicates that Michigan's current population of the endangered bird is the largest ever recorded since the annual census began in 1951. Researchers, biologists and volunteers counted 633 singing males during the official census completed in mid-June.

This year's count is a 30 percent increase over the 1993 count of 485, and surpasses the previous record of 502 singing males counted in 1961. The numbers have increased every year since the record low of 167 singing males counted in 1987.

"This is great news, and it shows that the Endangered Species Act can and does work," said Department of Natural Resorces Director Roland Harmes. "It is a testament to scientific wildlife management and the cooperation among the DNR biologists, the U.S. Forest Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in restoring the warblers' needed habitat." The Kirtland's warbler is a small, blue-gray and yellow, sparrow-sized bird that nests only in jack pine stands located in northeast lower Michigan. As a ground nester, it

selects stands of trees between five and 20 feet high, with branches that extend to the ground.

ties were: Alcona, 23; Clare,2;

According to DNR Endangered Species Coordinator Thomas Weise, this year 92 percent of the warblers counted were located in Oscoda, Ogemaw and


Upper Peninsula sightings are rare, although one was located in Marquette County in 1981 and 1982, and one was seen in Schoolcraft County last year." Weise said.

The Kirtland's warbler is a small, blue-gray and yellow, sparrow-sized bird that nests only in jack pine stands located in northeast lower Michigan. As a ground nester, it selects stands of trees between five and 20 feet high, with branches that extend to the ground.

Historically, these stands of young jack pine were maintained by naturally-occuring wildfires that frequently swept through northern Michigan. Fire suppression programs altered this natural process, reducing the Kirtland's warbler habitat.

Wildlife biologists from state and federal agencies now conduct a combination of clearcutting, burning, and replanting to mimic the effects of wildfire. These techniques appear to be successful. DNR wildlife biologist Jerry Weinrich of the Houghton Lake Wildlife Research Station said that this year the plantations showed a dramatic increase in the number of Kirtland's warblers using them. Fifty percent of the warblers counted in this year's census (314 males) were located in the areas specifically planted for the warblers' nesting habitat.





All's well that ends well?

New well site on Jordan River on line soon

City well #6, the new well site on the west side of the Jordan River, may soon be on line.

A major construction project in planning since 1990, the well will serve city residents that presently get their water from across the lake.

"We're trying to get the west side self-supportive," said city superintendent Bob Johnson. "It's important in case we ever lose the underwater pipe." Johnson said the goal is to eventually install a reservoir on the 29-acre parcel where the new well is located.

The \$254,000 project was funded by the city, along with a federal community development block grant of \$154,000. Directed by Timothy Roache, P.E. of Gosling Czubak Associates Engineers and Surveyors of Traverse City, the undertaking was actually two distinct construction projects.

The well drilling and construction, still incomplete, was awarded by bid to McNeily and Son Contracting of Farwell. The new water main, required because the former pipes were of insufficient size and outdated materials, was contracted to Corvette Construction of Grawn.

Both contractors and Gosling Czubak have been receiving payments as work progressed over the past eight months.

"It wasn't a difficult project," said Johnson. "Underground projects usually have difficulties, but actually, this project is coming along well."

The perception has been somewhat different in city council. In March, council member Guy Vallance urged the council to withhold final payment of \$1,180 from Gosling Czubak. He was angry about the need to drill several times before finding a satisfactory well site.

Test sites were drilled in 1992, but were too close to a neighboring property line. The sites were marked as possible for the well by the former engineering company on the project, Williams and Works of Grand Rapids. Last fall, the mistake continued, as Gosling Czubak engineered the final well site. After two borings, water was found, but in an area that should never have been considered, less than the 100 required feet to the property line.

The city appealed to the health department, which issued a variance after neighbor Francis Pepin agreed never to build within a 50-foot restricted area.

DPW committee chair Brian Sweet believes lack of communication during the transition between the two engineering companies was the cause of the error.

"There seems to have been no coordination of the change between the engineering companies," Sweet said. "When the project changed hands there were

some problems."

To add insult to injury, the first boring pulled water out of what Roache called a "dirty aquifer." He explained the site was pumping water with grit and pieces.

"Unfortunately, we're working with a variable aquifer," he told council.

Johnson explained that the East Jordan area lies on a "glacial dump." Soils change unpredictably and quickly within a small space because as the glacier receded it left deposits of materials collected while in motion. Johnson said soil can easily be two completely different types within 10 feet.

Sweet feels that the city had to pay for two "dry" (faulty) wells that shouldn't have been drilled.

"Those wells cost \$30,000 each," said Sweet.

Even the satisfactory well site ran into problems when developed.

"The aquifer can only deliver about 200 gallons per minute instead of the 400 we were hoping for," said Roache. The pump had to be refigured to allow a faster rate of water flow.

Because Gosling Czubak had offered no contractual guarantees on the well, council eventually released the final payment, but were then faced with another payment decision, this time by the water main contractor.

Dick Brye of Corvette Construction approached the DPW committee with a request to pay \$7,100 above the contracted price of \$126,000. Brye submitted notice for the additional compensation citing extra construction delays and expenses, including the replacement of gravel on the parking lot of the Jordan Valley Express Music Center.

Council member Lyle Etcher said he believes the problem with the music center parking lot was caused by Corvette waiting too long to work in that area. Neither the DPW committee or the council were receptive to the contractor seeking additional money over the bid price.

Johnson said the difficulties were typical and contractors bid to provide for such problems. He didn't see any extraordinary or burdensome circumstances that would justify the extra payment. He also pointed out that the contract specified pre-approval for any



extra expenses incurred by the contractor and Corvette had never requested such approval.

"The contractor told us in no uncertain terms that he will press this claim," Roache told the council.

"He made that clear at the DPW meeting," said council member Greg Chappuies, adding Brye said he would contact an attorney.

At the July 5 council meeting, Chappuies supported Vallance's motion not to pay the extra, as did the rest of council.


"I have worked with Brye a long time and never seen him do this," said Roache. "He is generally very cooperative and good to work with."

At the same meeting, Roache reported well progress was poor. On that date, the walls of the housing were up, but no well casing, floor pump, or electrical installation had begun. The contract had a completion date of July 9.

"This contractor has been unresponsive to continuous correspondence," said Roache. "I see no reason not to assess damages of \$300 per day (as specified by the contract) and contact the bonding company to notify that the contractor is in default."

While the pump system still needs to be installed, Johnson said the pace of the contractors has picked up some since the meeting. The job was bid by McNeily and Son at \$93,463.

When the well finally goes on line, the city will have four wells in operation. The other three are located on the east side of the river.
