

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

City council takes flack on library board appointment

Concerns about the most recent city library board appointment lead to a change in the appointment procedure when the East Jordan City Council met July 19.

Jordan Valley Library board member Dorothy Archer submitted a letter to the mayor and council protesting the July 5 appointment of Perry Bennett to the board. Archer cited a 1991 lawsuit brought against the library by Bennett's wife Karen for alleged wrongful discharge and unemployment benefits, as well as the fact that Bennett has no library card as indications that he may have an agenda that is not in the library's best interest.

Archer also charged the mayor and council with improperly handling the appointment procedure. She maintains that although there were three candidates for two positions, letters from only two candidates were received by council, and no discussion took place

on the merits of the three.

Although several members of the a council were in favor of reconsidering the appointment, city attorney Scott seatty's opinion is Bennett has already been appointed and will have to be involved in misconduct to be removed from the position.

"The time for discussing whether he should be on the board is past," said council member Ruth Gee. "He was appointed. He has the right to serve now."

Council member Sherry Sineway agreed.

"It's up to Perry to prove his good intentions," Sineway said. "But we need to take very seriously the appointment process in the future."

Both Gee and Sineway are former library board members.

Sineway suggested forming a committee to screen candidates for all future council appointments. The Charter and Ordinance committee was directed by council to develop a procedure in the

form of an ordinance or written policy, as advised by Beatty.

The council also discussed the disposition of two inactive trust funds.

The Century Club Fund, with \$1,843, was established in 1980 to finish civic center and senior center renovations.

The Swan Fund, with \$5,241.32, was established in 1974 to help pay the cost of burying electric lines along Bridge Street. Swans were regularly injured by flying into the wires, especially on the bridge.

City treasurer Susan Moreau researched both funds.

"They are just sitting on the books earning interest," reported Moreau. "I found no reason not to close the funds."

Council member Greg Chappuies said the issue had come up before the Ways and Means committee, which recommended a full council resolution to move the money into the Elm Pointe Fund.

Council member Brian Sweet suggested the DDA, which presently has no funding, as another recipient of the money.

After discussion, a decision was made to transfer \$1,000 to the DDA until its source of funding is resolved and the rest to be deposited in the Elm Pointe fund for necessary building repairs.

In other action, the council:

• approved a \$58,500 partial payment to Riba Marina for work on the harbor dredging project.

• listened to a description of run-off problems causing damage to the home of Arvida Walczak on Mill Street.

The run-off is caused by a plugged culvert, according to city superintendent Bob Johnson. Johnson suggested that eliminating snowmobile traffic through the area may help alleviate the problem. He reported that better trail designation is in the process of erection and will be complete "before snow flies."

• discussed difficulties for disabled pedestrians crossing M-32 in the downtown area and especially at Carey's Corner. The situation was referred to the Public Safety committee for further action.

Lloyd Burns

This a summary of an interview of Lloyd Burns for the Michigan Historical Society. The interview took place April 21, 1994.

Mortensen's Funeral Home used to be a residents home a long time ago. North of the funeral home there used to




be a big hotel on the corner. It was there until about 1940.

The Fire Hall used to be where Jan's Restaurant is now. The south end of the building was where the theater was.

There were two or three grocery stores. There was a hardware store called James' Hardware. Next there was a furniture store. Beyond the furniture store there was a bank called Stevens Bank. After they went out of the banking business the Post Office moved in there. Then The Appleseed took it over.

Up ahead of that, there used to be rooms they rented out to people. The first building used to be a telephone office. Then there was a grocery store. Next there was an appliance shop. There was a variety store in one half of Bachmann's. The northside of Bachmann's was the First State Bank.

Next was another hardware store. Chatterbox used to be a pool room. Then there was a barber shop. The next store was a women's clothing store. Then someone put a restaurant in there. In 1937 a grocery store called A&P



Then there was a beer tavern. Next was the Post Office. (That turned into a beer tavern also.)

Across the street was a drygoods store. Next to it was the Torch Office. That was torn down and beyond that was a hardware store. That was torn down also. Next to that was a barber shop.

Beyond that was a gas station, since 1926. Then it went out of business. Beside that was a hotel. Across from where the laundromat is now, there used to be a canning factory, that was the main source of business. It started in about 1902. It burned down in 1968 and wasn't built back up. The bank used to be a blacksmith shop.

Mr. Burns also told us a bit of local folklore. It was that one time when a circus was in town, an elephant died. They took it out by the corner store and buried it. To this day, it is still there.

Claim Michigan has prettiest lake in the nation

Michigan has the most beautiful lake in the United States, according to the National Geographic Association and the state intends to extend a road which will wind around 18 miles of this lake shore, it developed at the state administrative board meeting here Monday.

Torch Lake, in Antrim County, according to statements made by members of a delegation from that section, not only is ranked first as a scenic American lake, but is given third rank in the world lakes by an International

Geographic Association in Europe.

The delegation, led by State Senator John E. Gillett, pleaded before the board that the state highway, M-66, be extended Northwest from Kalkaska, 38 miles to Eastport, along the eastern shores of Torch and Grass Lakes. The project would extend to Charlevoix and join US-31 later.

Representative Cameron pictured a depressing picture of farmers leaving, garage men unable to make enough at Alden to keep going during winter months and general depression where he claimed a road would bring a boom.

Several of the delegation spoke strongly against running the road easterly toward Charlevoix, passing through the Jordan Valley and then up to Charlevoix.

The board appeared highly impressed with the descriptions and at Governor Green's (1927-1930) suggestion, the project was referred to the road committee with power to act. This was taken to indicate from the trend of questions, that the requested approval would be forthcoming.

Top O' Michigan plans annual meet

Activities for the entire family are planned for the annual membership meeting of the Top O' Michigan Electric Company on Sat., Aug. 13.

Members of the customer-owned, electric cooperative will elect three directors to their board. Candidates vying for three-year terms on the nine-member board are directors John Blair of Charlevoix, Howard Carson of Boyne City, and Edwin Estelle of Elmira; and challenger Thomas Walenta of Petoskey.

The election and business meeting begin at 1 p.m. at the company's Boyne City office. But the fun and activities for all members and their families begin at 11 a.m.

Food, refreshments and prizes will be provided along with music by the Epsilon Jazz Band and entertainment by juggler Tommy Tropic of East Jordan. Special children's activities are planned while mom and dad attend the business meeting, and chicken dinners will be prepared by the Rotary Club of Boyne City.

A silent auction of handcrafted items will also be offered, with winners announced during the meeting.

The entire annual meeting highlights humor and family entertainment, but it also focuses on the serious side of the rural electric cooperatives and, specifically, the important role Top O' Michigan plays in northern Michigan.

This marks the 57th year for the rural electric cooperative which has grown from a four-county service area in 1937 to 12 counties in northwestern lower Michigan. Top O' Michigan is the largest distribution cooperative in the state, serving more than 46,000 customers with 5,500 miles of line.

The company, which began with a \$250,00 Rural Electrification Administration (REA) loan, has now repaid nearly \$23 million in principal and more than \$27 million in interest to the REA and the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corp., another lender to rural electric cooperatives. Total payroll is up to \$3.1 million per year and \$12.8 million in patronage capital was returned to members over the

past 11 years. In addition, Top O' Michigan paid \$884,500 in property taxes to local communities during the past year.

fee.



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



The beautiful setting of the 32nd annual Portside Arts Fair, at Elm Pointe on the shore of Lake Charlevoix outside East Jordan, provides an appropriate backdrop for the art works exhibited. The show is set for Sat., Aug 6, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sun., Aug. 7, from noon to 5 p.m.

"We have a nice mix of local artists and people from all over the United States," said fair committee coordinator Anne Dingman.

Hospitality really sets the Portside fair apart. Numerous volunteers assist exhibitors and cater to fair-goers. A children's booth helps keep the younger set occupied with creative activities while parents shop. Homemade pie and refreshing drinks are available, provided by the Lutheran Church of East Jordan.

Visiting the Portside Art and Historical Museum and the Cygred Riley Art Gallery provides a pleasant and interesting diversion as well. Sadly, the museum's special ambassador George Secord passed away in July and will be deeply missed in his annual role as greeter.

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it's my job

John and Betsy King

John and Betsy King have many different jobs at their orchard on M-88, depending on the time of year. Last week it was cherries, cherries.

King Orchards was abuzz with activity, as the various types of cherries were ready for harvest. The orchard grows sweet cherries, gold cherries (often used for marschinos), and tart cherries for pies.

"This is our first harvest every season," Betsy said. "This year we have 18 kids and eight migrant workers helping us."

"It's exhilarating to put together these three-and-ahalf weeks of intense harvesting and effort," said

John's brother Jim, and sister-in-law Rose also run an orchard in Kewadin. The families often fill work orders together, and lease other fruit fields in addition

During this frantic time, the Kings work about 16 hours a day. At around 6:30 a.m., phone calls start, and deals are struck with packagers and food distribufors. Then, it's off to the fields.

Cherries on the trees don't mean profits for the orchard, the Kings said. There's more cracking and decay of the fruit with every hard rain or strong wind. The more damage to the fruit, the lower the quality grade – and the lower the profits. Prioritizing by the owners becomes important.

"You have to figure out where to pick next – what will get you the most money and the most cherries," John said.

In the fields, a mechanical shaker is often used to get the cherries out of a tree quickly. Black sweet cherries, which bruise easily, must be hand-picked.

After harvesting all day, orders are trucked out of



the orchard, often to packing plants in Elk Rapids and Kewadin, where the fruit is canned or frozen. Some cherries stay right at King Orchards' produce stand just off M-88, which Betsy often oversees.

In the evening, it's more dealing with wholesalers and making sure truck shipments got where they were supposed to. The Kings' day ends around 10:30 p.m.

"In a good year, we bring in more than a million pounds of cherries, including our leased fields," John

What do the Kings love about this hectic work?

"I like the business decisions - leasing farms, dealing with different people, the satisfaction when you make the right choices," John said.

"It's nice having all the kids around, figuring out how to solve all the problems that inevitably arise," Betsy said. "Things never happen exactly the way they're supposed to."

Though the cherry harvest may be wrapped up, the Kings have no time to rest on their laurels.

"Apricots are in, then it's peaches, then apples," Betsy said.

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

Program is "in the swim"

What's an essential skill for all children, especially those living in this waterblessed area?

The answer is the ability to swim, and in Central Lake, they've not only known that for years – they've been doing something about it.

In fact, an annual swim program sponsored by the village has been introducing or upgrading swimming skills among area kids for more than a decade

The 1994 swim program saw 50 youngsters take advantage of the opportunity. For three consecutive four-day weeks, the 4- to 13-year-olds improved their water-worthiness under the watchful eye of Arlene Lueck.

A water safety instructor since her teens, Lueck has been the guiding force behind the Central Lake program since 1988. She teaches the classes (this year at five different skill levels) in 35-minute segments with five-minute breaks from 11:45 a.m. to 4:20 p.m., and does it all without the aid of an assistant.

"Sometimes kids from other classes help out," she said, noting that Brian Aenis assisted with some classes this year and, "That was wonderful."

Introductory classes begin with water exploration, and successful swimmers can continue all the way through to advanced skills, including diving.

Years of experience with small children has provided Lueck with considerable insight into the best way to familiarize tots with the water.

"I'd say the most important thing is to get in the water with them, if at all possible," she said. "That's where it all happens. Too often the adult sits on the

blanket and tells the child, 'Go play in the water.' But many children have to be taught how much fun water can be.

"We play games like tossing sponges back and forth. If they fall, they'll usually get right up without a fuss, because they're concentrating on playing a game and not thinking about being afraid."

The program is underwritten by the Village of Central Lake, with additional funding coming in the form of a \$10-per-student fee.

Snowflake Road public access: Myth or fact?

It's only 24 feet wide. But it leads to "the nicest sandy swimming area on Intermediate Lake," according to Knipe Road resident Louise Ernst.

And as far back as she can remember, it's been a public access — one of the few on the lake's well-traveled west side.

Ernst has reason to remember. The property at the end of Snowflake Road was once owned by her great-grandfather Wilson Eggleston. Foreseeing the day when lakefront development would limit the public's access to the lake, in 1946 Eggleston released at least one right of way "for the sole purpose of conveying to the Township of Forest Home a right of way over the above described lands for highway purposes and to permit the use by the public of the existing line of road and to the parcel of land above described."

Officials say that deed refers to a strip "20 to 30 feet wide" at the end of nearby Eggleston Road that was split and sold to adjacent property owners for \$2,300 each around 1989. (See related box.)

Ernst isn't so sure. She remembers *two* accesses deeded to the public—the Eggleston Road strip (which fell out of public consciousness decades ago), and the more frequented Snowflake Road access.

As a child, she often heard that gift to future generations proudly referred to by relatives, who indicated the specific strip of land now being contested. Snowflake access 'melts' away

Until September 1993, a public access sign confirmed that location. That's when the Antrim County Road Commission, at the request of Forest Home Township, removed the sign.

The written request referred to an attached letter from adjacent property owner Kathy Thompson. "As you can see, this letter indicates the Thompsons own the property in question," wrote township supervisor Arland Lovett in the Aug. 5, 1993, communication. "The Thompsons are requesting the public access signs be removed from highway M-88.

"The township has no objection to the signs being

removed, since we have no legal authority over said property."

The attached letter, signed by assessor Robert Logee, stated in part, "My examination of the current and former assessment cards indicates that this parcel assessment has been based on 165 front feet for at least as long as I have been assessor with the township

... This 165 feet, according to the survey sketch, includes 33.03 feet of what might normally be construed as 1/2 of Snowflake Road."

However, a review of other surveys of the same area shows the Thompson property spanning 165 feet without the inclusion of Snowflake Road.

Meanwhile, spurred by an early '90s lawsuit when a renter was injured on the disputed access site, Thompsons have been seeking to terminate public use of the land.

And Louise Ernst, with support from the Association to Preserve Public Accesses, Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC) and concerned local residents, is seeking to stop them.

While lawyers sift through the details, an Aug. 11, 7 p.m. meeting at the Forest Township Hall in Bellaire will invite the public to debate the issue.

Also interested in the dispute, the Antrim County Road Commission has placed the access question on their Aug. 23 agenda. The public is also welcome at that 9:30 a.m. meeting, in the road commission building (behind Avery's Restaurant).



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Residents try to sink marina plans

Lakefront owners and representatives of the DNR's Parks and Recreation Division met faceto-face at the Torch Lake Township Hall July 20—but not to discuss the public access proposed by the DNR just north of McLachlan Road.

The topic instead was township supervisor Kim Schmidt's attempt to get a marina permit for the facilities at his Torch Tip Resort off US-31. Schmidt said he's been renting two pontoon

boats and two jet skis to cottage renters and the general public for more than a year. The facility also has docks where at least eight visiting boats can be moored overnight.

More than 70 residents came to the informational DNR hearing, the majority opposed to the marina. Most cited congestion on that part of the lake, additional pollution and safety concerns.

"This is a small, highly-developed cove," said resident Norm Milewicz. "It's already an obstacle course of docks, boat hoists, tethered boats and

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swimmers. That will only be compounded by renting watercraft to mostlyinexperienced operators."

Jack Norris, waterquality chairman for the Three Lakes Association, said the last water quality survey on Torch Lake showed a "hot spot" with a high bacteria count just off from Schmidt's resort.

"It's a poor idea to further pollute that area without cleaning up the pollution that exists," he said. "A marina there would be a destructive exploitation of the resource." Resident Jack Pilkington said he didn't like that the rental watercraft were refueled while still in the lake.

"No matter how careful you are, if you're filling a gas tank on a jet ski and it overflows, the gas is going into the lake," he said.

who's family has lived near Torch Tip for nearly 100 years, said increased usage of the area has meant a change for the worse.

"I don't see the swans anymore at the north tip of Torch Lake," he said. "I don't see the ducks I used to see."

Others expressed their support for the marina.

"There's nothing too much different there now than there was under the previous owners," said Donald Gaskell, who said he's resided on the lakeshore for 30 years.

"It's a beautiful lake, and there's plenty of room for everybody," said resident Thomas Deacon.

"I don't think (Schmidt's) two pontoon boats and two jet skis cause all of the noise, traffic and pollution problems on the lake," said Dave Hoeft, a local marina owner.

Many opposed to the marina at Torch Tip pointed out that Schmidt has been operating it without the proper permission from the DNR, and that he received a special use permit from the township planning commission to rent watercraft without having the necessary state permits.

Schmidt said he "honestly didn't know" he needed a marina permit from the DNR, and that he applied for one last summer when he learned it was

Many said they couldn't believe the DNR was letting Schmidt continue to operate while the marina permit was still unapproved.

"This hearing is a reward for Schmidt for violating the law," said resident Virginia Mouch. "We shouldn't even be here."

"If I catch a perch, and the sheriff marine patrol or DNR officers pull up beside my boat and ask me for my license, I can't tell them, 'it's pending,' " said local lakefront owner Walter Rakecky. "Next time you get pulled over for speeding in your car, try telling the officer that your license is 'pending.' "

DNR official Carrie Hardigan, who oversees inland marinas in the state, told the audience that Schmidt was allowed to keep the marina open because "there has been a certain degree of historical use at the site."

John Arevalo, DNR district representative for land and water management, said getting quick action from his department, the police or prosecutor, is often difficult in such issues.

"If you can prove it's destroying the environment through its operation, or that it poses a provable safety risk, then you have an easier time getting a ceaseand-desist order," he said. "Law enforcement and the prosecutor have to weigh these complaints against all of the other criminal activities going on."

Schmidt pointed out that no other rental watercraft are available north of Clam River, and there are no rental operations for Torch Lake off US-31.

"I'm providing a service for people who don't live on the water, giving them access to Torch Lake on these watercraft." he said. "This is a clear case of some of the lakefront owners wanting to keep the lake private."

An opposing resident characterized

the situation differently to the DNR representatives.

"You're granting a franchise to make money off of a natural resource to one individual," Rakecky said.

Hardigan and other DNR officials will make the decision on the marina permit within 60 days. Only one thing is assured: If the decision is appealed by either side, a long wait for a final outcome can be expected.

"We currently have a two-and-a-half year backlog on contested cases," Hardigan said.

Discipline workshop

This training is being offered by the Northwestern Michigan Foster Training Coalition. To register or for more information call 946-8975.



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In the meantime, parents should immediately remove head and neck drawstrings from children's jackets, sweatshirts, and similar clothing or sew a seam through the drawstring in the middle of the hood and neck so neither end can pull out and catch on an object, the safety commission warns.

The string ends on such garments should be cut as short as needed to close the garment.

Drawstrings caught on playground equipment, fences, cribs and an escalator were associated with 12 deaths and 27 near-strangulations since 1985, according to the safety commission.

People can report incidents involving drawstrings on children's clothing, unsafe consumer products and productrelated injuries by calling the Consumer Product Safety Commission at (800) 638-8270.





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
