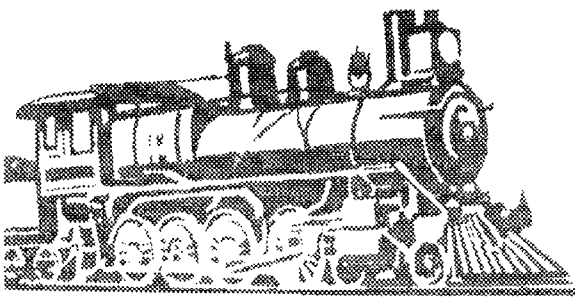


Weather

EJ resident commits suicide in jail

Charlevoix County Sheriff George T. Lasater reported the jail cell suicide of an East Jordan resident over the weekend.

Lawrence Earl Cain, Jr., 23, died by hanging himself in his prison cell at the Charlevoix County Jail at approximately 11:40 a.m. Saturday morning. Cain was serving a Circuit Court sentence of one year for operating under the influence of liquor, third offense.

The death is under investigation by the sheriff. An autopsy will be performed at Blodgett Hospital in Grand Rapids.

Two injured in ORV accidents

Two separate off-road vehicle incidents around 5 p.m. Friday afternoon sent two East Jordan residents to Charlevoix Area Hospital for treatment.

Charlevoix County Sheriff Sgt. Don Sproul reported Christy Williams, 12, and Naomi Lawson, 12, both of East Jordan, were riding a 1987 Honda 4-wheel ORV cycle in Williams Orchard off Phelps Road. Williams, the driver, hit a bump, lost control, and ran over Lawson when she fell off the machine.

The Lawson girl was treated for a fractured foot and lacerations. The ORV was not damaged. Neither girl was wearing a helmet.

Peter Valler, Jr., 36, of East Jordan, was riding a 1984 Suzuki 4-wheel ORV cycle on his property in Ironton when he lost control and flipped the vehicle while climbing a hill.

Valler's left leg was injured while the ORV was undamaged. Sproul indicated that alcohol use was involved in the incident.

Habitat breaks ground

On a recent Saturday morning, with Mother Nature smiling upon them, members of the Northwest Michigan Habitat for Humanity board of directors met with the family of Carol Clabby for a very special ceremony.

The group was there to break the ground for a new home for the Clabbys - Northwest Habitat's third and East Jordan's first.

"It took the work of five very active committees to bring us to this point," board president Dave Knight informed the group. He introduced the committee chairs, who briefly explained how the organization functions.

While the board members and their families came from many parts of Charlevoix and Emmet counties for the ceremony, Knight emphasized the site in East Jordan was a local effort. The lot, near the corner of Bridge and Echo streets was purchased from the East Jordan School District with funds from an unrestricted grant from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation.

"This site demonstrates the kind of community partnership we want to generate," noted Knight.

A partnership with the family is another important aspect of the program. The Clabbys were chosen because of about 12 applicants, they best fit the profile of having a problem with present housing, an ability to pay the Habitat 30-year no interest mortgage but not a traditional mortgage, and demonstrating a willingness to be involved.

According to Knight, the partnership between Habitat and the family continues after the closing, and to prove his point, he introduced the family of Mike and Tina Scott. The Scotts are the proud owners of the most recent Habitat home and came all the way from Alanson to join the ceremony.

Knight said the contracted excavation and foundation should be in place within two weeks, then through Saturday volunteer work bees, the organization hopes to have a closed-in structure by the time snow flies.

Zoning denial sent back to planning

An opinion from the city attorney gave the East Jordan City Council the chance to send a zoning denial back to the planning commission for a review.

Attorney Scott Beatty told the council at the Sept. 6 meeting the commission erred by requiring conditions before granting an application for rezoning.

The possible rezoning of a parcel owned by Bill Drenth from multi-family residential (R-3) to central business district (C-1) sparked the issue. The commission wanted guarantees from potential developer Bryan Noirot that a hotel/motel would be built on the parcel.

Noirot, of Noirot Enterprises, requested rezoning of a segment of Drenth's 22-acre parcel near M-66, just south of the Glen's Plaza shopping center. Noirot Enterprises has a contract to purchase the property, contingent on the rezoning of about 13 acres.

The planning commission denied the request based on the lack of a guarantee available, although Noirot said he has some interest in the site from Hospitality Franchise Systems (franchisers of Days Inn, Park Inn, Super 8 Motel, Howard Johnson and Ramada). He plans to construct a road and utilities for three or four possible building sites and said his primary objective is to attract a hotel/motel to the development.

Noirot appealed the denial to the council at the Aug. 16 meeting when attorney Bryan Graham, sitting in for Beatty, advised the council to table the request until he researched the matter. His concern was the city seemed to be "contract zoning." He said courts were likely to look unfavorably on such action.

Opinion returned

"Based on the research we conducted," Beatty wrote, "I have concluded the city may not lawfully condition a rezoning request on the specific development of a motel on that parcel." He cited a city ordinance, as well as a 1973 court case in the opinion.

Beatty advised the council that if they want control over the development of the parcel, they can consider planned

Isaac Stephens Halstead Metcalf, Ph.D.

On a cool August day, sitting close to his cozy stone fireplace, I visited with this most interesting gentleman, who has been vacationing on Intermediate Lake since 1937.

Dr. Metcalf stirred the coals periodically as we talked. He reminisced on his experiences since he first visited the cottage of Margaret Schnabel, the woman to whom he was married for nearly 50 years. The cottage is nestled in a thick wooded area and you could pass by car or boat and scarcely notice it. Few changes have been made on the original cottage, so it has maintained that special charm of those built in that era.

"It was a 16-hour trip to drive up," he explained, "and there was no electricity until 1952." It was the favorite vacation for the family from Lima, Ohio and young Dr. Metcalf grew to love it along with Margaret and her sister, Zoe Emily.

Dr. and Margaret Metcalf tragically lost one college-age son, Tom, but their eldest son, John, is an assistant professor of pathology at the University of South Carolina and another son, David, has his Ph.D. in chemistry and is employed in research at Oak Ridge, Tenn.

Margaret died in 1989, but Dr. Metcalf continues to spend one month a summer in the family cottage. He maintains a strict daily routine, but said he decided to forego his early morning swim in the lake that day as the temperature read 49 degrees. He thought that a bit cool for a man who turned 82 Aug. 17. A daily four-mile walk in addition to his quarter-mile swim, is his routine throughout the year in his home in Charleston, N.C.

While a professor at the Citadel Dr. Metcalf acquired the nickname ISH (his first three initials) the fish, as he was so frequently seen going to the campus pool. His given name is Isaac

Stephens Halstead Metcalf and he evidently answers to Ted as well as ISH.

"I was born in Cleveland the year of the Titanic," he said. His father was with The Cleveland Plain Dealer. As a young man, he wasn't sure what he would do with his life but, "I would go out into the woods and pray for direction and guidance." As it turned out, he later could see that certain special people he inadvertently met offered the guidance he needed.

He graduated from Oberlin College in 1934 and earned his masters degree at Columbia in 1936. He received his Ph.D. degree in freshwater biology at Western Reserve in 1940. He has an impressive record as an outstanding teacher and his dedication to his profession has touched the lives of many of his students in an extremely positive way.

For 29 years he was a member of the faculty at the Citadel teaching biology, chemistry, comparative anatomy, histology and embryology. The following 14 years he taught gross anatomy at the Medical University of South Carolina. He retired from a full academic position in 1980 and is currently professor emeritus of cell biology and anatomy. Presently he teaches gross anatomy during summers and undergraduate anatomy for nursing and health professions students.

While on the faculty at the Citadel, he became well acquainted with notable personalities who were offered the position of college president after retiring from important government positions. He has a great admiration for President (General) Charles P. Summerall, former Chief of Staff for the U.S. Army. General Mark Clark served as president of the college while he was there and Dr. Metcalf reflected on his approach to that position.

In spite of Dr. Metcalf's demonstration of excellence in the teaching pro-



profession, he modestly gives credit for being financially able to endow the schools he loves so much to his local broker. Hurricane Hugo did irreparable damage to the original pipe organ at the chapel of the Citadel and, in memory of his wife, Margaret, he was able to finance the replacement. The new organ was dedicated in March 1994.

He evidently is reviewing some of the literary classics as at the time of our first contact he was reading *Ben Hur* and later when we were visiting he mentioned having just finished *Alice In Wonderland*.

"I somehow don't believe I did justice to that beautiful book when I read it as a young man," he confessed, then added, "It is a perfectly wonderful story of the imagination." As a child his parents read to him often and he credits them with his love of reading.

When speaking with Dr. Metcalf by phone you'd guess his age to be about

35. He still drives his favorite Mercedes which will soon register a mere 200,000 miles. He plays piano by ear.

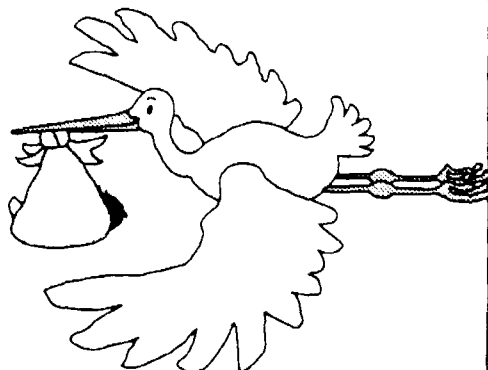
A few years ago a friend who owned a plane convinced him to try flying. After a few lessons the friend said, "Now, why don't you take it up yourself?" With that encouragement he took off, viewed the surrounding area and landed safely. That was the end of his flying career, but he had satisfied himself that he could add that to his many accomplishments.

In a university publication one of his colleagues writes, "Dr. Metcalf is unique in the way he cares about the whole student." One couldn't find a better example to inspire students as he has developed his own God-given skills far beyond what the average person considers doing.

And it should be mentioned, he kindles a beautiful fire.

Thanks to a federal grant of \$4,100, 236 new Large Print books have been added to the Central Lake Township Library collection in the past year.

In keeping with their ongoing sight projects, the Central Lake Lions and Lioness Clubs have also provided funds to purchase 24 new Large Print titles during the 1994-95 year. Six mystery and six western novels will arrive quarterly, in September, December, March and June.

Your library also has a revolving collection of about 30-40 volumes that are provided by the Mid-Michigan Library League and changed quarterly.

visually impaired. The books purchased today, while offering larger type for easy reading comfort are not as heavy and hard to hold as the older editions. If the best-seller they want to read is out, knowledgeable library users head right for the Large Print section where the entire, unabridged selection is often waiting to be checked out. Fiction, mystery, western and science fiction are all available in Large Print, as well as an atlas, dictionary, thesaurus and non-fiction titles.


Sharon Hoffman Russell

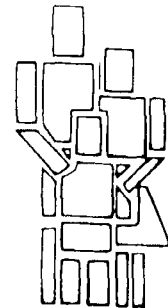

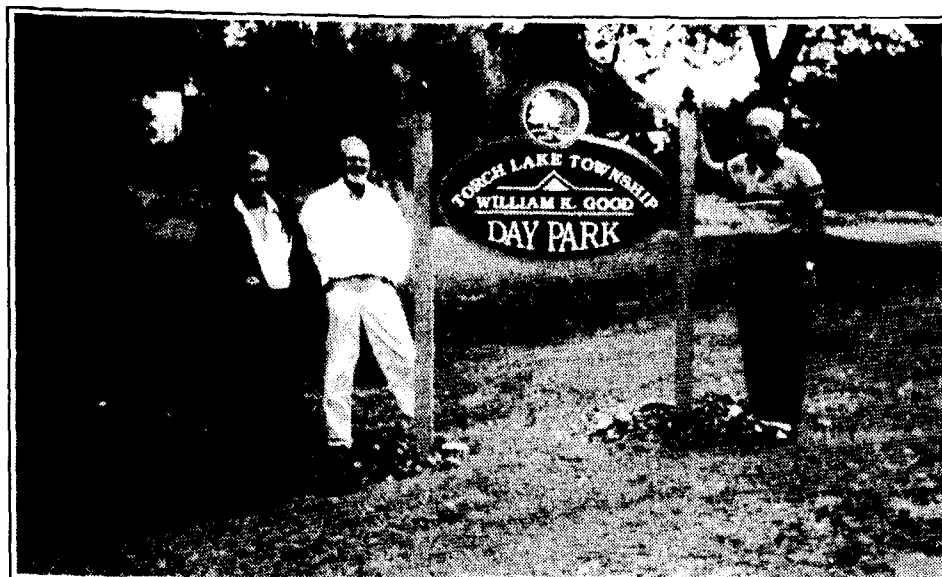

Torch Lake Twp. Day Park dedicated

The Torch Lake Township William K. Good Day Park had its official coming-out party Aug. 27, as citizens and the many volunteers whose efforts culminated in the recreation spot took time to celebrate.

The park, on Torch Lake just east of US-31, cost \$320,000. It features a beach, grassy picnic area, playground equipment, barbecues, picnic tables, a covered pavilion, a blacktopped basketball court, a sand-based volleyball court, bath houses, restroom facilities and ample parking.

Township resident Jack Norris said naming the day park after Good was something he richly deserved.

"He bought this piece of property and held it for the township until they could purchase it for the park," he said.

Norris helped secure a \$176,000 DNR grant to help the township with costs. After the property was assessed at a higher value, a state regulation prohibited Good from selling it to the township at a lower price in 1993. Good closed the sale, turned around and gave the township a check for the overage - a whopping \$55,000.

Good received a plaque of appreciation at the ceremony.

"He's done a lot of extra work that people might not know about," Norris said. "He's come down with his tractor and added fence posts, and he's done borings to check for contamination and ensure the park is safe for the public to use and enjoy."

Resident William Kurtz and other members of the Upper Torch Lake Association were also

instrumental in the park's creation, township clerk Elva Cowell said.

"Bill helped get the playground equipment, and the association has put in a lot of time and effort, and is handling the private monetary donations by many citizens," she said.

Cowell said the township had secured a loan from Alden State Bank to pay costs left over after the DNR grant and donations by Good and others.

"A lot of people donated their time, money and effort to see this day park come to life," Norris said. "So many have contributed - I couldn't possibly name them all."

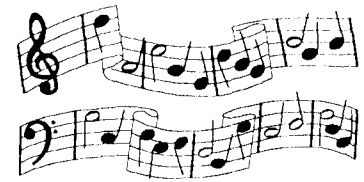

Trojan football team whips first two competitors

Central Lake began its 1994 football season on the road a long ways from home, but still managed to bring home the prize; the second time out in the home opener, they provided heavy drama and late heroics.

With AuGres as host Sept. 2, the Trojans looked to dominate a team they handled the year before. It took just over a quarter to find the right combinations, scoring in the second period for a 6-0 lead.

After the half, the Trojans found the end zone twice in the third, plus the conversions for a 22-0 gap, finishing with a solo score in the final stanza to finish up a 28-0 victory.

Chad Pletcher scored from eight yards out, Chris Eldrington went in from two yards away and added both successful conversions, while John Kingma added the fourth touchdown from a yard out.

Kingma rushed for 60 yards, Eldrington for 56 and 8 tackles on defense. David Henry had a 35-yard reception as the Trojans passed for 66 yards while rushing for 266. Jeff Budzynski and Ryan Newton each had six-tackle games and Nate Miller recovered two fumbles.

Saturday saw a hometown crowd eye the Trojans,

and those friendly eyes got their fill with 5:38 left in the first quarter when Josh Weaver made a sensational one-hand grab while falling into the end zone on a Chad Pletcher pass, the result a 25-yard score and an 8-0 lead after Eldrington's conversion run.

Inland Lakes began a final run in the half from its own 13, moving downfield and converting on fourth down from the 10, the pass to Patrick Clancy over a Trojan defender getting the Bulldogs to within two, 8-6 at the break.

In the fourth, luck ran out on the Trojans, an interception and facemask got Inland Lakes started in Trojan territory. A score with 6:28 to go and a conversion pass put Central Lake into a 14-8 deficit.



Approach cross walks with caution, Roggenbeck added. Many times cross walks will not have

a crossing guard, and kids excited to be on their way home may look as well as they should at an intersection.

"Let's be extra alert this time of year," said Roggenbeck, "we want to keep our kids in school — not in a hospital bed."

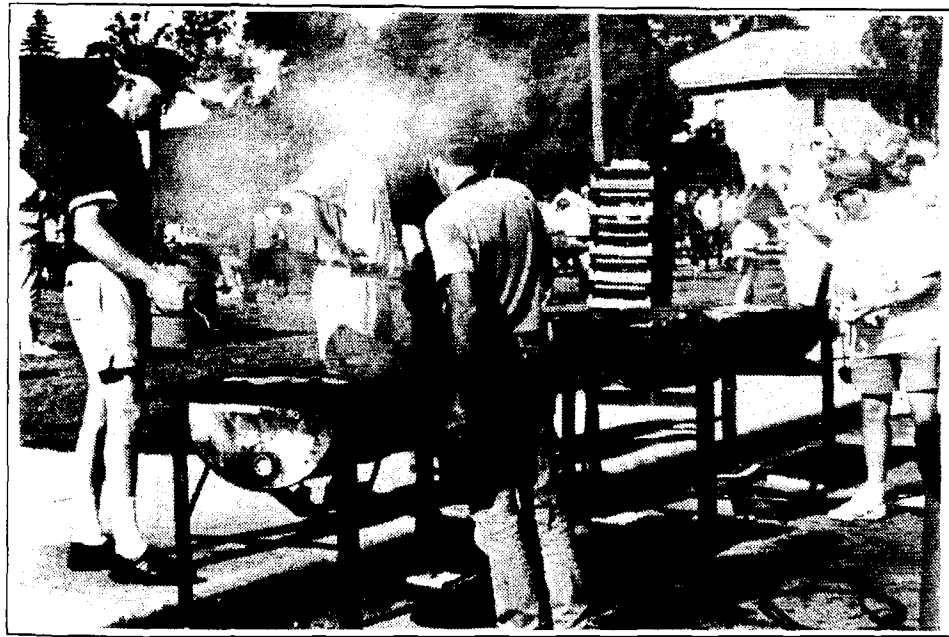

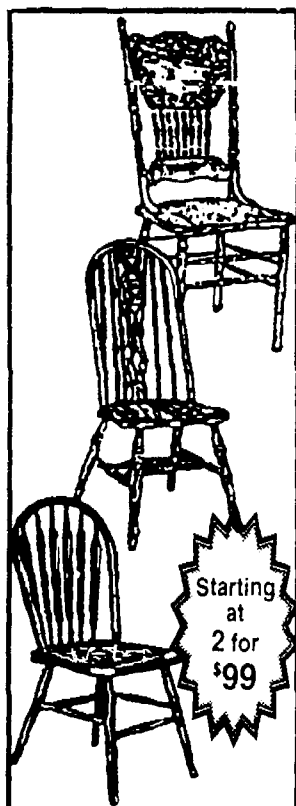
Pat Conroy wrote *The Prince of Tides*, *The Great Santini* and many other books but this one is my favorite.

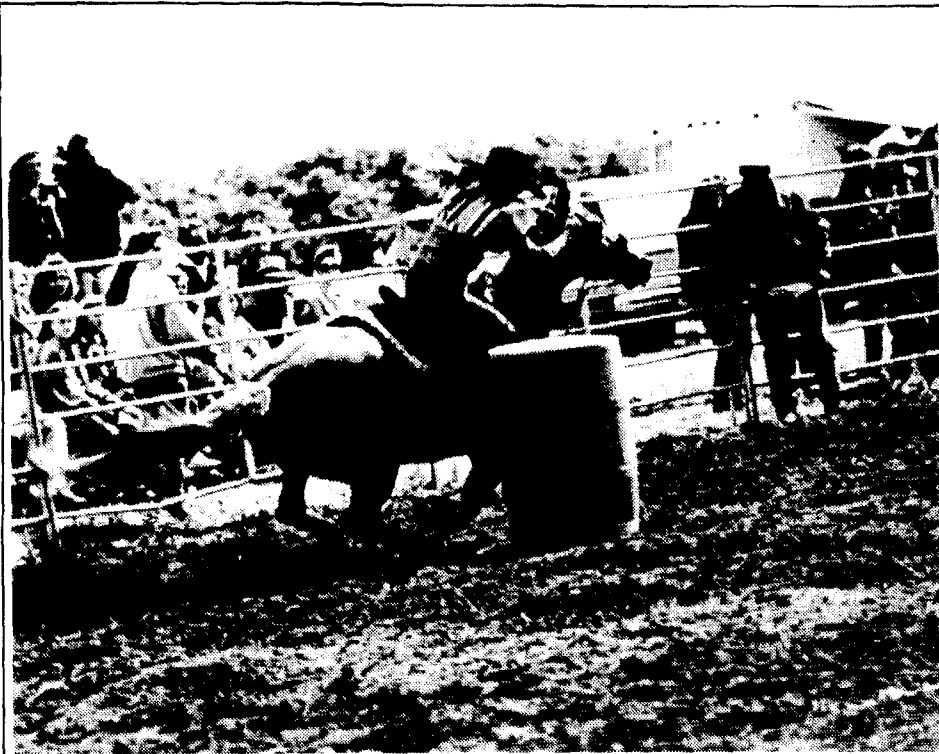

unit development (PUD) zoning. All commercial uses are allowed under a PUD, but every step in the development must be approved by council.

An amendment to the zoning ordinance allowing the establishment of a hotel/motel district was suggested by Beatty as another possible alternative.

Passing back the decision

Based on the opinion, council decide to uphold the planning commission's original denial. A copy of the opinion

was to be forwarded to the commission. Consensus was the council could not act on the issue as it stood.

Several council members encouraged Noiro to re-approach the commission with the zoning request so it could be reviewed in a legal manner.

"So I basically start this whole circle again?" a frustrated Noiro remarked as he left the meeting.

The next meeting of the East Jordan City Council is scheduled for Tues., Sept. 20 at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall.

Get help with home heating costs

Northwest Michigan Human Services Agency's Energy Department has expanded eligibility limits for the Home Weatherization Program. This free-of-charge service designed to reduce heating costs is available to low-income dwelling owners and renters.

Services include a range of weatherization measures from insulation to stopping major cold air infiltration. Each house, apartment, or mobile home is pre-inspected by NMHSA to determine which weatherization measures should be installed according to Federal and State guidelines. Licensed private contractors complete the work.

Studies have shown that the energy conservation services provided will result in a 15 to 30 percent reduction of fuel costs per household. Results vary depending on personal habits, changes in household occupants, and/or weather conditions.

During the next nine to 12 months the agency expects to weatherize over 200 dwellings across its 10-county service region. Because of the large area covered by the Agency and the increase in eligibility guidelines, interested persons are advised to contact the program soon.

Eligibility is determined

by total household income before taxes. If you would like an application mailed to you, phone an Agency Community Services Representative in your area. For Antrim, Emmet and Charlevoix Counties - 347-9070.
