

# Local playwright wins award in state contest

A play by East Jordan playwright Lenore Bechtel was the 1994 first place winner in the statewide playwriting competition sponsored by Community Theatre Association of Michigan.

A cash award was presented to Bechtel for her two-act comedy, *Hocus-Pocus*, Sept. 24, at CTAM's fall convention at Boyne Highlands. The play revolves around a fun-loving hypnotist whose unorthodox methods of helping clients leads to some hilarious entanglements.

The original version of *Hocus-Pocus* was produced jointly by Antrim Regional Theatre and the Jordan River Players, the theatrical arm of Jordan River Arts Council, with performances in Bellaire and East Jordan. ## City to hire professional recreation planners

The East Jordan City Council approved hiring professionals to develop a city parks and recreation master plan

at the Oct. 4 meeting.

"We don't get grants because there is no recreation plan," parks and recreation committee member Brian Sweet told council. He recommended Gove Associates, Inc. of Lansing for the job. With the potential development of old Boswell Field, as well as the deteriorating condition of buildings at Elm Pointe in mind, members of the committee believe the future support of grants may be imperative to maintain-

ing high quality facilities in the city park system. Without proper language, the DNR would be unlikely to approve the master plan – a necessary step to obtaining such grants.

Gary Roberts, of the East Jordan Rotary Club, encouraged the idea at a recent committee meeting. Rotary has already donated funds for a study on developing old Boswell. Those funds, which combined with the city budget contribution equal \$1,500, will be diverted to finance the professional planning instead.

## Robbery suspect back in court

An East Jordan resident, in the Antrim County Jail awaiting trial for a June 15 bank robbery in Mancelona, now faces more legal troubles for allegedly assaulting a trustee in his jail cell.

A pretrial hearing was to begin Oct.5 in 87th District Court in Bellaire for Paul Isaacs, 29, who was arraigned on assault and battery charges late last month. Isaacs allegedly smashed the

head of the trustee against a window in his jail cell.

The assault charge is a misdemeanor punishable by up to 90 days in jail and/ or a \$100 fine. If found guilty, Isaacs could begin serving a jail sentence for the assault while awaiting or undergoing trial in 13th Circuit Court on the bank robbery charges.

## Camcorder stolen from car

A tourist returned to his car after canoeing the Jordan River Oct. 2 to find his rear window smashed in and his camcorder stolen.

Robert Gaggioli of Palo Alto, Calif., told an Antrim County Sheriff deputy the break-in must have occurred while he was on the river, between 3 and 6:30

p.m. His car was parked on Graves Crossing Road near the river.

The stolen camcorder was in a black fabric carrying case that also held five video tapes.



# what's cooking?

## Recipes designed with East Jordan cooks in mind

"Don't forget, Mom. I have to take the snack tomorrow."

Are these familiar words from a child, arriving home from school in the late afternoon—or even worse—as you're putting her to bed?

For the many variations on this scenario, here is a quick and easy cookie recipe from the Classic Pillsbury Cookbook. Invite your children to help make the cookies (if you had more than an hour's warning before the event!). This will be fun for everyone.

#### Teddy-Go-Rounds

1 20 oz. pkg. refrigerated sugar cookies \* 4 cups (216) any flavor bear-shaped graham crackers

Heat oven to 350degreesask evelyn F. Slice well-chilled cookie dough in 1/4-inch slices. Place 3 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheets. Arrange 6 bear-shaped graham crackers in circle around each cookie, with legs pointing toward center of cookie; press in slightly.

Bake at 350 F for 7-11 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from cookie sheets. Makes 3 dozen cookies.

\*Tip: Refrigerated chocolate chip cookies can be substituted. Place dough in freezer for at least 1 hour before slicing. Bake at 350 F for 11-13 minutes.

## Walkers reap funds for food

The annual Walk for CROP drew 34 walkers Oct. 1 in an effort to fight hunger both locally and abroad.

East Jordan walkers began their trek at Elm Pointe and joined with 34 Charlevoix walkers and 25 Boyne City walkers to enjoy a picnic at Ironton provided by the Boyne Valley Lions Club.

Although sponsor collections are not yet completed, East Jordan coordinator Mary Glenna Malpass believes the group will total about \$2,900. Combined with the other two participants, county walkers earned

an estimated \$6,400.

Although the figures are down significantly from last year's \$11,238, Malpass noted that 1993 drew unusually high sponsorship for Nancy LaCroix of East Jordan, a wheelchair bound walker. LaCroix was unable to walk this year because of an injury.

Twenty-five percent of the county collection will be returned to be divided between the three food pantries of the participants. This was the 11th year for the CROP Walk in Charlevoix County.



## an unlikely hero

We all like to hear and read about heroes. There are countless stories of heroic efforts, ranging from someone pulling someone from a burning building, to life-saving heroics on the battlefield. We have recently read of heroic efforts during the terrible raging floods in Georgia.

Heroic stories always tug at our heartstrings, even more so when the persons saved are small children.

This is a true story about a rather unlikely hero, but a hero nonetheless, one who saved the lives of many small children. In September, 1991, on M-119 in Bear Creek Township, our hero saved

the life of eight-monthold David Hill of Charlevoix, when the vehicle driven by his mom was struck by another vehicle that drove left of the centerline.

Then in February, 1993, our hero struck again, saving the life of nine-month-old Logan Clark of Gaylord when the car he was riding in on I-75 skidded on ice, left the roadway and rolled over several times.

Often times, despite the satisfaction of saving someone's life, heroes are left saddened by the circumstances. That is the case with our hero. Our hero is heavy with regret that he cannot save more. That was the case in July

in Osceola County, where a four-year-old girl, riding unrestrained was killed when the car she was in rolled over. Her two-year-old brother was seriously injured.


Yes, our hero is a child safety seat, a proven lifesaving device, that is designed for the sole purpose of protecting small children from the number one killer of American children: traffic crashes. You see, both David's and Logan's loving moms had secured them correctly in child safety seats, an action that, according to police, saved both youngsters from fatal injuries.

The great majority of small children killed or

injured in traffic crashes do not have to die. They would survive if they were placed in child safety seats.

C'mon folks, let's keep up the great American tradition of heroic efforts. Place children up to age 4 in a safety seat, and older children in lap and shoulder belts, every time they ride with you. Give our hero a chance to save lives.

The Devils got both, using big plays and timely defense to roll on with a 28-13 win.

East Jordan caught break one, literally, intercepting a pass as Karl Redmer got in the way of one. Traver Goodrich did the same for Mancelona to start their next drive, which ended on a fourth and two at the Devils' 20 yard line, Matt Sherman and Sean Russell slamming the door for the Devils.

Two plays later, Sherman burst through the line for 72 yards and the first touchdown of the game, 6-0.

Three plays and an Adam Skrocki interception later, East Jordan was back in business.

Seven plays later, Yaro Middaugh went the final seven yards, gaining 21 on the drive, for score number two for East Jordan. Cory Cutler hit Skrocki for the conversion and a 14-0 lead in quarter one.

Mancelona finished the first period with a 35-yard run by Steve Buyze and a 39-yard pass to Rick Spires, starting the second quarter with a third and goal at the three. Two plays later, the hard charging Red Devils had the ball back, thanks to a superswift defense that was getting to the handoffs quicker than the rushers were!

Two Matt Sherman runs netted 14 yards, then Middaugh was stopped for a loss. Next play, Yaro wasn't stopped, going 79 yards for a touchdown, Soloman Townsend adding the extra point for a 21-0 lead for East Jordan.

Mancelona punted on the next drive, only to get the ball quickly back on a fumble, which led to an injury to Steve Schram, who went to the hospital for his

The teams traded possessions into the half's final minute, when East Jordan took a punt and two plays later watched Redmer loft a 66-yard touchdown pass to Steve Wiltfong with 41 seconds to go. The extra point gave Mancelona a 28-0 hole to try and get out of after the half.

For East Jordan, the half was glorious, from the juniors winning the float title with "Marvin and the Martians," to Yaro Middaugh earning the King, Belgie Caballero taking the Queen honors.

East Jordan enjoyed the pleasures of substitution as Mancelona tried to get into the end zone, finally combining a 19-yard run and a 36-yard scamper by Steve Buyze late in the third quarter to score. The conversion failed, leaving the Devils up 28-6.



## School facility review at work

Although the FRC was otherwise empowered to make suggestions concerning the scope, design and financing of any construction project, members were also directed to provide rationale that "ensures the committee believes the recommendation satisfies the needs of students and the community both in the short term and with an eye to the future." A minimum projection of fifteen years was advised.

## FRC in action

The FRC began operations from a well-informed base, each member having received a collection of statistics on enrollment, facility usage and financial information to review before the first meeting. Much of it was updated information compiled from the original review committee two years ago, and gave a solid background from which to expedite this go-round.

Working methodically, with "lots of good debate," according to Kempton, the group quickly came to consensus that the only logical choices are to add on to existing facilities or construct a new building.

The committee completed a comprehensive review of all present school facilities, graphing strengths and weaknesses of each facility, and prioritizing needs. After two months of meetings. the group had developed a list of 20 guidelines that should be contained within the scope of any construction project. The elementary/middle school complex was targeted as the one in most need of improvement.

Wayne Fries, an EJIW employee and father of an 11th-grader at EJHS, said the process has been very positive. Fries was involved with the original committee, which met over a period of two years, and he feels this has been a much more efficient and positive process.

He believes considering the construc-

tion options is perhaps difficult, but necessary.

"We have to make the decision on what we need, and what's good for the kids," he said, "not necessarily what we want as taxpayers."

Fries emphasized that the decisionmaking is still in process and the committee isn't ready to make a recommendation yet.

At the next meeting, scheduled near the end of the month, the committee will begin hearing solid figures. GBKB architectural firm of Traverse City, chosen from four candidate firms, will present initial numbers, along with possible designs for a new middle school.

## Agenda for solution

If and when the committee recommends a building project to the community, all members have agreed it should:

- end the overcrowded conditions that currently exist.
- prepare the district for further growth.
- optimize learning success for all
- reflect need and be without "frills."
- be at an acceptable price for taxpayers and voters.

Committee and board members alike realize the potential difficulty in selling the concept to the community. With the effects of Proposal A still undetermined in the minds of many voters, an added element of caution may also be in-

Kempton reported to the board the committee's opinion that many community members will be unconvinced of the need for a new facility. Both groups will work diligently in the coming months to educate neighbors on the pressing needs of the district.

The district is presently paying off 2.25 mills on a bond passed in 1977 to build the high school. That debt will be retired in the year 2003.







# School facility review at work

The East Jordan School District may soon need to appeal to voters for a new building and is preparing to present a strong case.

A facility review committee (FRC) of community members has been meeting since July to develop a plan for the district that will serve the needs of not just the next few years, but decades into the future.

"The committee has been and continues to wrestle with many issues relating to creating space for our increased enrollments," committee facilitator John Kempton told the district board of education in a report Sept. 19. Kempton said group debate revolved around the best way to "intertwine the growth and educational needs of students with the anti-tax mood and general political distrust prevalent among the tax-paying population."

Overcrowding prompts committee

The school board decided to form the FRC earlier this year when census figures, coupled with already overcrowded conditions in the elementary and middle schools, made evident the increasing problem.

Remembering the sting of a failed attempt to convince voters more space was needed two years ago, the board appointed the FRC with very well-defined parameters, while empowering

the group to make recommendations for the good of the community and the students as well.

The FRC represents a cross-section of East Jordan voters (see box). Although several board and administrative staff members attend meetings, none, including Kempton, are voting members.

One very firm direction given the FRC was that neither incorporating split-scheduling, or portable classrooms would be considered acceptable solutions.

"Those options are just not conducive to the quality education that is our goal for East Jordan students," district superintendent Chip Hansen emphacontinued on back
