Senior center celebrates 20 years of service

A large group gathered at the Charlevoix County Senior Center in East Jordan Nov. 14 to celebrate a milestone.

It was the 20th anniversary of the center, and some long-time friends came to help celebrate.

Art Saworski, Commission on Aging director, both then and now, was one of them. He recalled how the operation was completely voluntary, including his own job, in 1974 when 10 people met to form the center.

"I went out door-to-door and found seniors," he said. "I'd ask at every house, 'Is there a senior living here?"

Saworski said the COA began transporting seniors to the center, which was housed in the East Jordan Community Building right from the beginning. in 1975.

"We started with two leased buses," he noted, adding that the transportation system eventually evolved into the county-wide transit available today.

The poured concrete building was a natural place for the COA to set up shop. Built before World War II by WPA workers, the project was abandoned half-completed when the war began. Saworski said behind some walls there still exist concrete staircases leading to a second floor that was never added.

The building housed the Post Office and Secretary of State office for a time, and also served as a teen center. The city eventually added the Civic Center, and continues to rent the senior center to the COA for \$1 a month – the same rent that was negotiated in 1974.

The COA received a state grant to remodel the center and add a kitchen in 1978, but just as work was to begin, a fire gutted the inside.

"The timing couldn't have been better," said Saworski. "It actually made the renovations easier."

By the end of 1980, the seniors were back in the building (they met in the American Legion Hall in the interim), and meals were prepared on site.

Under the guidance of director Jeanette Norton, the center offers daily activities including bingo and a choir, meals five days a week and a monthly Sunday continued on back

The East Jordan Cooperage Company manufactured barrel and keg stock that was shipped throughout the U.S. and beyond. The plant was one of 23 factories owned by the Grief Brothers Company, the largest cooperage company in the world.

The East Jordan plant was located along the west side of the Jordan River near the East Jordan and Southern Railroad track (where the present Cooper-

age Street runs off M-32). At least 160 workers were employed from 1903 to 1910, and the two-week payroll amounted to \$2,334.48.

Workers produced about two railroad cars of barrel staves daily. The plant was destroyed by fire and rebuilt in 1905. The dry kiln burned in 1910 or 1911, and the mill was torn down and moved to Manistique.

Man arrested in fatality

Charles Shafer, 20, of Traverse City was arrested Nov: 14 following an investigation into an Oct. 23 accident which claimed the life of a Central Lake man.

Michael Joseph Basse, 20, died of head injuries received from falling off the hood of a 1977 Oldsmobile, which was westbound on Ferry Road near the Ironton

Based on the investigation of the Charlevoix County Sheriff Department, Prosecuting Attorney Richard May authorized a warrant for negligent homieide. The maximum penalty for conviction of this crime is two years in confinement and/or a \$2,000 fine.

Shafer turned himself in to the

Charlevoix County Sheriff Department. He was taken before Magistrate David Karchinski, where a bond of \$7,500 was set, and was released after posting the personal recognizance bond. He is reported to be married with one child and expecting a second child in January.

Arraignment in the 90th District Court in Charlevoix is scheduled for Tues., Nov.

After the accident, Basse was rushed to Charlevoix Area Hospital where he was treated before being ransferred to Northein Michigan Hospital in Petoskey. He died five days later as a result of his head injuries.

Circuit court update

Cases pending or decided in the 33rd Circuit Court. Charlevoix:

■ John Nelson Denemy. 46, East Jordan, was sentenced to 90 days in jail. with a credit for two days served, for breaking and entering a garage and stealing a box of returnable bottles.

Denemy was ordered by Judge Richard M. Pajtas to serve two days, with the rest of the sentence held in abeyance. During a 12month probation period. Denemy must refrain from alcohol use, and submit to breath and urine testing on request. He was also ordered to pay \$250 court costs, \$40 to the crime restitution fund and \$1 restitution to the victim of the B&E. Denemy was sentenced Oct. 12.

Barbara Yonlanda Howes, 44, of Schoolcraft, is charged with the murder of Donald Lee Baker, 49, at Baker's home on Wilson Road in Wilson Township, Aug. 23.

Howes was bound over to circuit court from the 90th District Court, Oct. 20. She has been ordered to undergo psychiatric examination, and is presently awaiting a trial date, which is scheduled to be decided Mon., Nov. 28.

Howes' court-appointed attorney, Gordon D. Boydston of Charlevoix. told the court he intends to present an insanity de-

The open murder charge is a felony punishable by life imprisonment. Howes also faces a weapons charge of use of a firearm to commit a felony. Also a felony, the charge carries a two-year term consecutive to and preceding any term imposed for the felony. Howes remains in custody in lieu of a \$100,000 bond.

■ Sharon Pittiglio, 49, Boyne City, was arraigned Nov. 14 on a felony charge of knowingly and unlawfully appropriating funds for her own or others use while holding a public office. The charge is punishable by up to 10 years in prison or a fine of up to \$5,000. She stood mute to the charges and a not guilty plea was entered on her

Pittiglio is accused of embezzling up to \$90,000 from May, 1992, to August, 1994, while serving of a \$1 million bond.

A scheduling conference to set a trail date was set for Mon., Nov. 28. Pittiglio's attorney is Kevin G. Klevorn of Boyne City. Pittiglio is free on a personal recognizance

Daniel Sylvester Puroll, 29, Boyne City, is awaiting trial for the murder of Clark Washburn, 81. The trial is set to begin March 6, 1995.

Puroll is accused of shooting Washburn at his Rogers Road mobile home in Wilson Township. Defense attorney Richard J. Zerafa of Elk Rapids has indicated to the court that an insanity defense will be

Puroll was ordered to undergo psychiatric evaluation, and some evidence from the crime scene is still being evaluated.

The charge carries a possible sentence of life imprisonment. Puroll is also charged with a weaponsfelony firearms count. He remains in custody in lieu



Fifth-grade experiment was full of hot air

Mr. Peters' fifth grade class at East Jordan Elementary School recently designed home made hot air balloons and on Nov. 15, they floated them.

The class constructed the balloons out of tissue paper and glin, with paper clips at the bottom for ballast. The perimeter of the balloons was about if air feet and they were about three feet tall.

The purpose of the experiment was to show that when air molecules are heated they move around really fast, making the air in the balloon less dense than the air outside of the balloon, so that it will float.

To heat the balloon, they were held over camp stove with a chimney of coffee

cans for two minutes. Then they were released and the students recorded how many paces they went, how long they floated and an estimated height they rose to. The best launch was recorded at 113 paces from launch site. It floated for 45 seconds and rose to a height of approximate is 60 feet.

The balloons weren't big enough to carry people, but they were still a lot of fun.


Charlevoix went on to win the district Friday over Mancelona, 58-42.





USDA reorganization begins with name change

The reorganization of the United State Department of Agriculture began with the official change in name of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) to the Farm Service Agency (FSA).

"There will certainly be more in the future than name changes, but that is the first step," said Jim Byrum, acting state executive director of the new Farm Service

Byrum who was head of the Michigan ASCS, points out that with the exception of a few very minor programs, everything that ASCS has been doing for years has been transferred to the Farm Service Agency. As the reorganization moves forward, the farm loan program from the current Farmers Home Administration and responsibility for crop insurance, including writing catastrophic crop insurance, will also be included in the duties of the FSA.

"In the immediate future, Farmers won't see much difference at the county level, though," Byrum contin-

Isaacs pleads guilty to Mancelona bank heist

An area resident became, a convicted bank robber Nov. 21, after admitting to two counts of armed robbery in 13th Circuit Court in Bellaire.

Paul Isaacs, 28, pled guilty to the robbery of FMB Bank in Mancelona June 15. He could now face up to life in prison on either robbery charge.

In a plea agreement, a felony firearms charge against Isaacs was dropped. If convicted on that charge, a minimum two-year prison sentence would have been mandatory.

"We believe he'll be serving longer than that, anyway," Antrim County Prosecutor Charles Koop said.

Isaacs stood before Circuit Court Judge Philip Rodgers, Jr. and gave his account of the June 15 bank robbery prior to the judge accepting his guilty pleas.

"On the morning of June 15, I was having some personal problems, some financial problems," Isaacs said "Heft the house. I didn't know what I was going to

Isaacs got in his car and took off driving, taking with him a .22 automatic pistol and a loaded ammunition clip.

"I was debating whether to kill myself," he said.

When he reached Mancelona, Isaacs pulled into the bank, stuffing the pistol into his belt but leaving the clip in the car. He accosted one female bank employee, sitting at a desk near the door. She led him to the cash drawers, where he took money. Pointing his gun at a, female bank teller, he took money from her cash drawer as well.

The judge pointed out that because of the recent passage of Proposal B, Isaacs will have no right to automatically appeal his conviction. A pre-sentence investigation will now take place before Rodgers makes a decision on imprisonment.

Koop said more cash was taken from the bank than Isaacs admitted to stealing. Isaacs testified in court that he took about \$5,000. Koop said bank audits have revealed a larger amount missing. About half of the stolen money was recovered when police arrested Isaacs

in Detroit June 22.

"I would be inclined to trust the bank on the amount taken, rather than a convicted felon," Koop said. "We will ask at sentencing that full restitution be made."
