Petoskey heart health program judged promising

have been lowered by more than 50 percent.

Last September, six participants entered the Petoskey Heart Reversal Program, a program whose goal is to reverse heart disease without surgery.

The six pioneer participants, who make up this first heart reversal group, came with risk factors such as high cholesterol, high blood pressure, cigarette smoking, sedentary lifestyle, excess weight and diabetes. Some of them have actually had heart attacks and coronary bypass surgery.

In addition to sharing common risk factors for heart disease, they also share a sincere desire to become more actively involved in their health. The Petoskey Heart Reversal Program requires this type of desire since the lifestyle changes are comprehensive and take a great commitment.

The potential payoff can be significant however and these first six participants are showing some dramatic results. For instance, total blood cholesterol levels have been reduced up to 12 percent, and weight has declined by up to 17 lbs. Reports of angina have been reduced or eliminated and insulin requirements

Dean Ornish, M.D. was one of the first to demonstrate that heart disease can be reversed without the need for risky and expensive surgery. When asked

what he felt most contributed to his success, he stated that the group support was especially important. He felt that group support helped reduce feelings of isolation as well as helping to implement comprehensive lifestyle changes.

group support. Initially the group concentrated on their own fears of heart disease. These concerns soon gave way to shared concerns and difficulties about the low-fat diet. In the future, the group's focus will no doubt change and evolve to concentrate on other important issues such as exercise and stress manage-







Students enjoy musical treat

Recently the East Jordan High School and Middle School students were treated to a performance by the Traverse City Encore Society of Music ensemble, The Encore Brass. The performance was funded by a grant from the Malpass Foundation.

The ensemble presented an hour-long program, demonstrating many different styles of music ranging from Rondeau, a piece composed in the early 1700s, to Junk Man Rag, an early jazz piece.

Kathy Bowerman, a senior at EJHS, conducted the ensemble's performance of Sousa's Washington Post March.

During the performance each member of the ensemble demonstrated their instrument, and the different sounds that could be produced by them. Particularly popular with the audience was Richard Goldsworthy's demonstration of his trombone.

For his demonstration, he used a technique pioneered by Joe "Tricky Sam" Nanton, a member of Duke Ellington's band. The technique combined a "pixie" mute (a device fitted into the horn to change its tone), a common plumbing plunger, and "flutter tonguing" (the process of fluttering your tongue rapidly) to create a sound which drew scores of applause.

The performance was concluded with two Christmas selections.

Pork Tenderloin Dijon

Two pork tenderloins, 1/2 lb. ea. 3 cloves garlic, mashed 2 tbsp. fresh parsley 1 1/2 tbsp. Dijon mustard 1/2 tbsp. Dijon mustard put the

Make a paste of the garlic, parsley and mustard; put the tenderloins together, rub with paste. Wrap with 2 or 3 strips

of bacon, putting toothpicks through the tenderloins. Let set 30 minutes.

Heat oven to 420° F. Put meat on rack for 40 minutes or until 170° with meat thermometer.

Lift out meat. Pour 1/4 c, white wine and 1/4 c, chicken broth over the meat and save the drippings to use as gravy.

Cherry and Pistachio Stuffing

1/2 c. butter or margarine 1 large onion, chopped 3 stalks celery, sliced

8 c. day-old firm white bread cubes


1/2 c. dried sweet or sour cherries

In 8-quart saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Add onion and saute 5 minutes. Add celery and cook until tender crisp. Stir in bread cubes, cherries, pistachios, thyme, salt, and pepper until lightly mixed and remove from heat. In a cup, combine water and egg; stir egg mixture into bread mixture.

Spoon stuffing into greased shallow 2-quart casserole.



Place into 325° F. oven about 45 minutes.

Serve from casserole or spoon stuffing into serving dish. Garnish with parsley if desired. Makes 10 servings.

Peppermint Fudge Pie

I chocolate flavored ready-crust pie crust

1 6-oz. semi-sweet chocolate chips 2 c. miniature marshmallows

2 c. miniature marshmallows

1/4 c. milk or cream 2 tbsp. chocolate-mint liqueur 3 c. whipped cream, divided

2 tbsp. crushed peppermint candies or candy canes

In microwave-safe bowl, combine chocolate chips, marshmallows and milk. Cook at medium (50 percent power) 2 to 3 minutes, stirring twice, until smooth. Stir in liqueur. Cool at room temperature.

Fold in 1/2 cups whipped cream. Spoon into pie shell. Fold crushed candies into remaining 1/2 cups whipped cream. Spread over chocolate layer. Cover and freeze until firm, about 3 hours.

Pie may be made up to several weeks ahead. Remove pie from freezer and garnish with miniature candy canes and mint leaves if desired. Slice the pie. Let stand 3 to 5 minutes before serving. Store leftovers in freezer. Makes 8 servings.

From Looking around Jordan Township by Mrs. Vern Bundy (Rosalind Westcott)

To introduce you this week's subjects, our neighbors Mr. and Mrs. William Kupp, I will take you back to the late 1890s. At that time a great deal of Jordan Township was still in timber and Detroit was just beginning to produce the first cars. It was then that a couple by the names of William and Minnie Kupp, Detroiters, became the proud parents of a boy whom they named William.

Young William grew with that city and in the next decade many changes came about in little William and also in the city. As the city was gaining width and breadth, William was acquiring growth too, both in knowledge and is stature.

In attaining a mature status Detroit espoused itself

to the automobile industry, an industry that was born right in the city; likewise, William in maturity met a native Detroit girl named Lavina Lotz and made her

The years that followed were full ones; Lavina making a home for her husband and the sons that were born to them and William in his profession as school engineer, serving a full 30 years in that capacity.

The wear and tear of city life began to tell on Mr. Kupp though, for during the later years of their residence in Detroit, his health began to fail, so at every opportunity they availed themselves of the chance to vacation with friends who had a place in Deer Lake.

Besides enjoying these vacations thoroughly it was always a pleasant surprise to them to see how much Mr. Kupp's health improved after a few days or weeks

spent in the north, and this finally convinced them that they would settle here permanently.

The home they bought in 1950 was unfinished, but that only provided them with something to do on weekends and vacations, and made them more anxious than ever to settle in their new home. This was finally accomplished on December 31, 1954, and this was the beginning of a new kind of life for them both. 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
