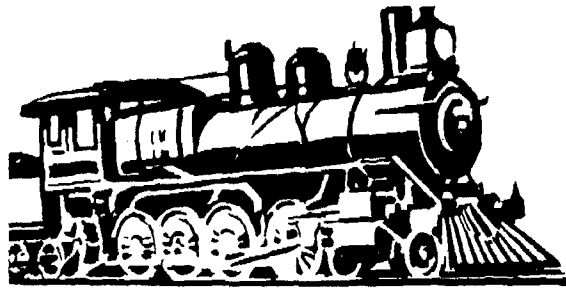


Weather

The snow disappeared all over the county last week, as daily temperatures climbed to unseasonably warm highs in the mid-to-upper 40s, leaving year-to-date snow totals mired at 24 inches. Forecasters were calling for the first green Christmas in more than a decade, with no appreciable snow accumulation predicted until mid-week. **LAST YEAR** - Nearly 24 inches of snow fell over the holiday weekend, with the mercury falling below zero one night. The 1993 snowfall total was 47 inches by Dec. 27 - still far behind 1992's 96.5 inches by the same date.

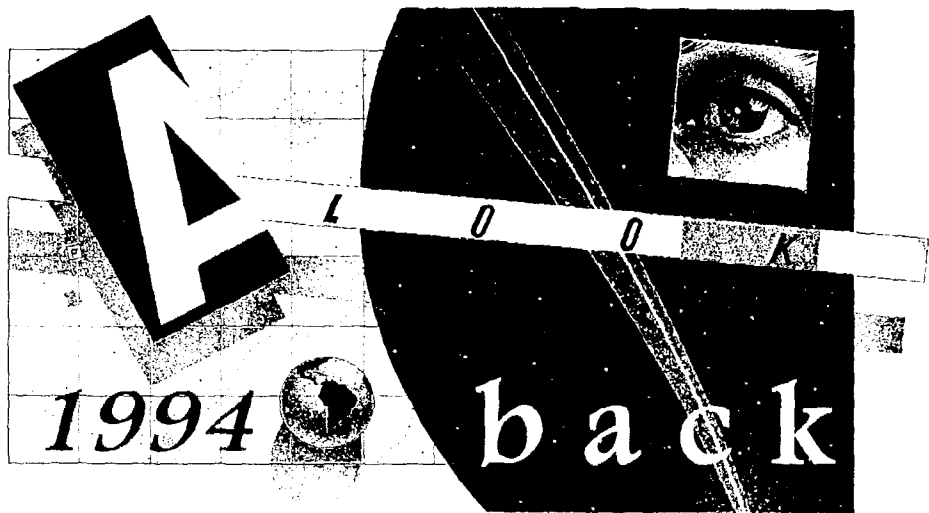

- East Jordan High School cheerleaders placed in the top ten in competition against 85 schools at the Detroit Piston's

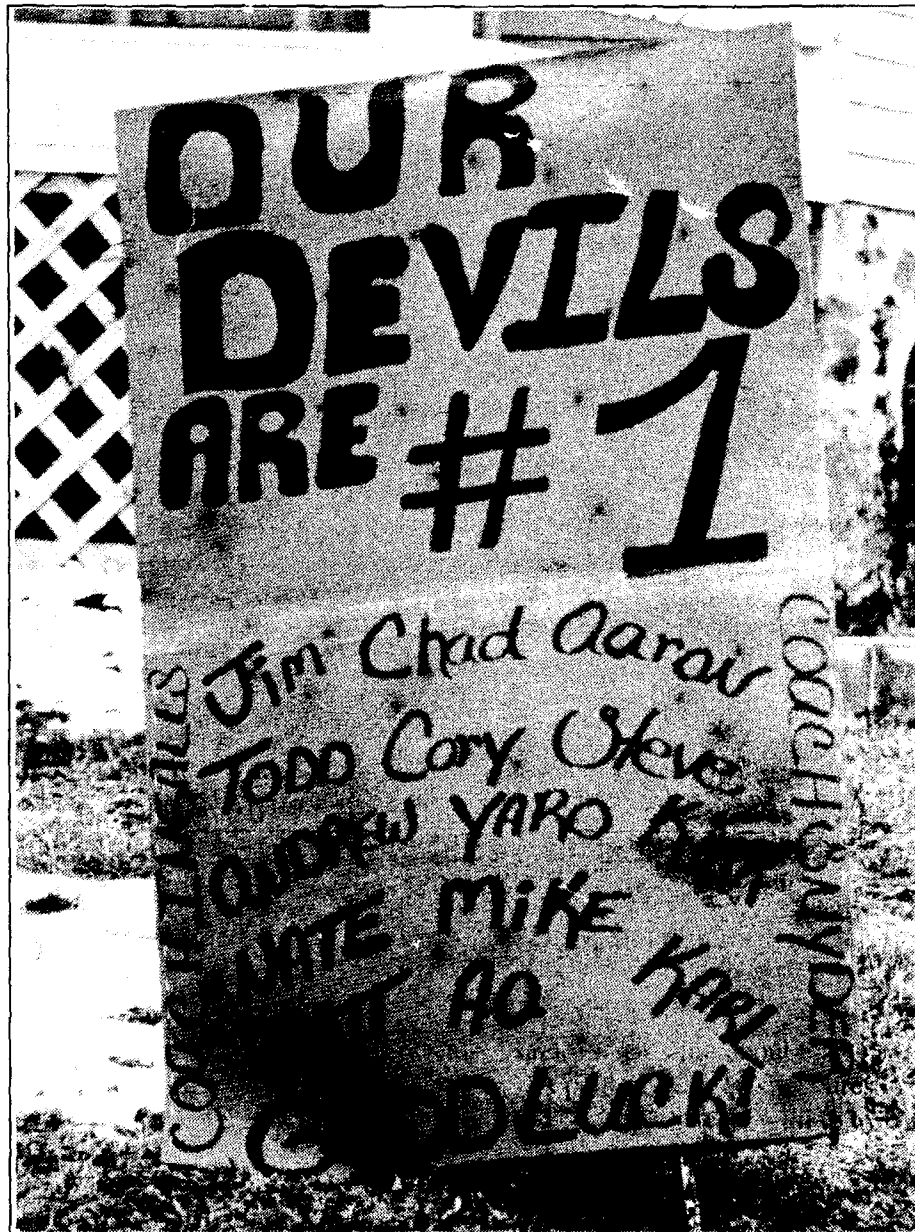

Drive begins to oust review board members

A newly-formed group called the Jordan Township Citizen Committee is calling for the township board to rescind its reappointment of two review board members.

The committee gathered signatures on a petition-style document, which states:

"We, the Jordan Township Citizen Committee, are requesting that (the township board) hold a special meeting, before January 1, 1995, to rescind the appointment of the new Board of Review made at the November meeting; and in the best interest of our township, appoint a completely new Board of Review. If this is not done, a recall action will be started against the Jordan Township Board."

Resident James Galbraith, who started the petition drive Dec. 19, said he formed the group when Lawrence Nemecek and Sue Falco were placed back onto the Board of Review for two years by the township board at their Nov. 28 meeting.

Nemecek and Falco were on the review board this year, when 49 of 50 assessment appeals were lowered. Review board members also had their own assessments lowered, and parcels owned by township supervisor Joseph Haney, Sr., clerk Leona Stanek and trustee Lucy Lercel were among those lowered.

When property assessments became less than 50 percent of property values, the state tax commission placed a factor on all agricultural property in the township. The state tax tribunal is expected to rule on some of the lowered assessments in 1995, after complaints were

filed by the tax commission.

"It's just the impropriety of it - appointed board members having their own taxes reduced," Galbraith said. "That's a cozy little deal."

The letter the township board received from the state tax commission in October, which said "a non-uniform distribution of the tax burden" existed, should have been a signal to the township board to make changes, according to Galbraith.

"At that point, it would have been prudent for them to appoint an all new review board, to relieve themselves of any supposition," he said. Instead, two of the three who wished to serve again were given new terms.

"If you're really concerned about the appearance of up-front government, you don't do things like that," he said.

The review board's job is to correct

errors by the assessor - not to reduce people's taxes, Galbraith added.

"By lowering their own assessments, and everybody else's that came before them, they put an additional burden on those who didn't get theirs lowered," he said. "What's fair about that?"

A petition with 16 signatures was to be sent by registered mail to township board members Dec. 20.

"We figured that was enough to indicate how people feel," said assessor John McDonald, who helped gather the signatures. "We could have gotten more, but it would have taken more time."

Galbraith said the Citizen Committee is open to any township resident that wants to be involved. The group may also address concerns with the township board as well.

"They have been cavalier and arro-

that lasted for weeks.

- Charlevoix Area Hospital celebrated the beginning of its 75th year with the dedication of a new building.

- EJPD apprehended Terry Lee McCall, who confessed to a spree of crimes against East Jordan and other Charlevoix County businesses as long ago as 1991.

- East Jordan City Council heard a presentation on city holiday decorations by Debbie Chappuis that set the wheels in motion for new decorations by Christmas, 1994.

- The city council approved eight members for the new Downtown Development Authority (DDA) board, and the group began organizational activities.

- East Jordan cheerleaders took second place in conference competition at Charlevoix.

- Michigan 106th District House Representative Beverly Bodem met with East Jordan residents and civic leaders at the East Jordan Senior Center to discuss Proposal A and hear citizen's concerns.

- The city requested residents to keep water running despite warming temperatures because of particularly deep frost making plastic underground pipes susceptible to freezing.

- The East Jordan School Board began serious consideration of the overcrowding problem at the elementary and middle schools.

- The school board approved sale of an empty lot to Habitat for Humanity. Habitat would later begin building a home on the property. The Charlevoix Foundation gave the grant that helped Habitat purchase the property.

- The Charlevoix Foundation also approved grants to other area projects including to the Jordan Valley District Library, Camp Daggett, and the district health department.

- New Chamber of Commerce officers announced plans to focus on continued revitalization of the East Jordan area, especially downtown.

- The city council heard disgruntled property owners within the new DDA district at a special meeting.

- East Jordan Elementary students were treated to a MAPEX unit on Na-

tive American cultures.

- Citing US census figures, the *Grand Rapids Press* dubbed East Jordan, "the fastest growing little city in the state," in a feature article.

- The East Jordan JayCees were named number one new chapter in the state at their quarterly state conference for overall accomplishments and projects demonstrating a well-rounded chapter.

- The Castle Farm Community Center project kicked off its major fundraising campaign, gearing up to raise \$300,000 for a down payment to purchase and repair the deteriorating Castle Farm complex outside of Charlevoix.

- Local students participated in Odyssey of the Mind, a hands-on educational and problem-solving program. One team each from mid-high school qualified for state competition.

- East Jordan High School varsity basketball team captured the first district title in several years by defeating

Elk Rapids 61-59.

- The annual Fiddler's Jamboree attracted hundreds of musicians and spectators to the Civic Center for a day of great music, food and fun.

- March Madness grabbed East Jordan as the Red Devils basketball team defeated Tawas City 59-57 to advance to regional finals. Although McBain edged the roundballers out, 74-67, many returning team members are back to make another championship run in 1995.

- Director Paula Vollbach put together another successful EJHS musical as *Hello Dolly* charmed sell-out audiences.

- East Jordan Chamber of Commerce, in partnership with CB North and FMB Northwestern banks, continued offering a re-investment program of low-interest loans intended to increase economic viability within the DDA boundaries.

- Three East Jordan Middle School students participated in a national broadcast hosted by Maury Povich. The pro-

Workshop offered for grant applicants

Applications are now available for the third of three rounds for mini-grant funding for fiscal year 1995, made possible with the support of the Michigan Council for the Arts and Cultural Affairs.

A grant writing workshop will be held on Mon., Jan. 9, at 7 p.m., in the Janis Multi-purpose room at the Denos Museum Center at Northwestern Michigan College, Traverse City. There is no cost and registration is not necessary. Those attending should park in the museum section of the parking lot.

Each mini-grant will fund up to \$2,000 to any non-

The deadline for grant applications is Fri., Feb. 10, for projects beginning June 1 and terminating by Sept. 30.

The Traverse Area Arts Council is the local Regrant Agency for Region 10 for Northwest Michigan which includes the counties of Antrim, Benzie, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, Leelanau, Manistee, Missaukee, and Wexford.

Grant to foundation benefits youth

A \$100,000 grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation will help fund a variety of programs for youngsters and teens throughout Charlevoix County. The grant, awarded last week, will become part of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation's permanent endowment set aside for youth projects.

The foundation qualified for the Kellogg gift by raising \$200,000 in local donations over the past year. As part of its Youth Project Challenge, Kellogg has pledged to match 50 cents for every local dollar the foundation collects - up to \$1 million over the next two years - to help build a special fund for young people in this area. To date, the Charlevoix County Community Foundation has received \$400,000 from Kellogg.

A Youth Advisory Committee, made up of three students from each of the high schools in Charlevoix County, oversees the community foundation's youth endowment and makes recommendations about how to distribute money. Only interest earned on the endowment is used to fund projects. Last spring, the youth committee granted just prevent child abuse and neglect, and Castle Farm. The committee expects to grant an additional \$7,000 in the next month.

"All of us are excited about being able to help kids this way," says Belgie Caballero, a senior at East Jordan High School who serves as president of the Youth Advisory Committee. "We've learned a lot about what kinds of programs are needed and it feels good to be able to do something positive for the community."

According to Vel Kammermann, newly-elected president of the Charlevoix County Community Foundation, the Kellogg Foundation's Youth Project Challenge has acted as an incentive to encourage local

gifts.

"People find out their donation can practically double in value through matching gifts like Kellogg," Kammermann said, "and they see this as a way to do twice as much good, while they invest in a permanent fund to benefit our area's youngsters."

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation was started by a group of citizens in 1992 as a way to develop a lasting fund that could support worthy projects for years to come. The foundation accepts charitable donations and manages them in a permanent trust. Earned income is then used of fund a variety of human service, educational, health, civic, and cultural programs in the county.

The W. K. Kellogg Foundation was established in 1930 to "help people help themselves." As a private grantmaking organization, it provides seed money to organizations and institutions that have identified problems and designed constructive action programs that are aimed at finding community solutions.

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Tax takes effect soon

Michigan's Real Estate Transfer tax of 0.75 percent on the sale of real property takes effect on Jan. 1, 1995. The new tax was approved as part of the Proposal A package passed by voters on March 15. The new tax will be applied to the sale price of property and will be in addition to the existing county transfer tax. Combined, the real estate transfer tax will be 0.86 percent of the sale price.

"As part of the financing package for schools, Michigan residents received an annual cut in their very high property taxes. As part of the replacement revenues for this cut, we now have a one-time real estate transfer tax that is only paid at the time a property is sold," noted State Treasurer Douglas B. Roberts.

"Most homeowners were paying 3 to 4 percent in property taxes each and every year," he added. "Now, they pay much less in annual property taxes and pay less than one percent when they sell their property."

The real estate transfer tax will be collected from the seller at the time the deed is passed from seller to buyer. The tax is accounted for in closing documents prepared as part of the sale. The money is sent to the local county treasurer who forwards the tax to the state on monthly basis. It is expected that \$111 million will be collected in real estate transfer tax revenues annually and all these funds will be deposited directly into the state school aid fund.

- Members of VFW Torch Post 6985 constructed new monuments in two Echo Township cemeteries. The monuments were dedicated on Memorial Day.

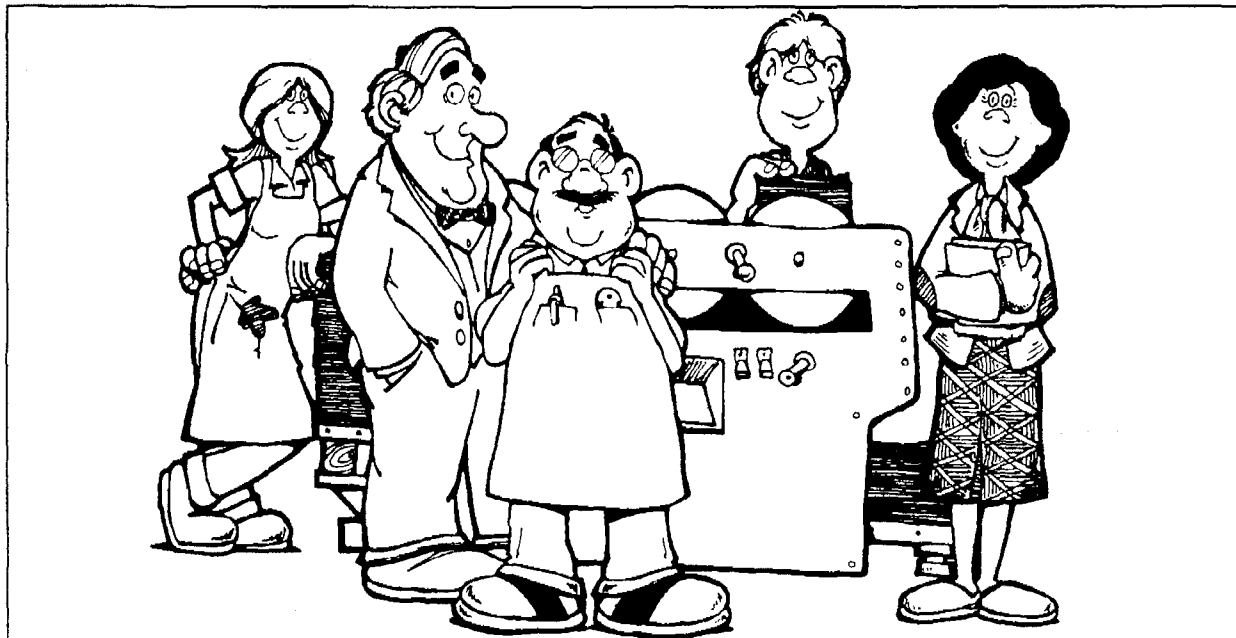

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

what's cooking?

This New Year's Eve, we plan to relax at home with quiet dinner and, hopefully, relieve some of the stress of the holidays.

If you're thinking along the same lines, we have a menu suggestion. The main entree was originally intended for partridge, but if your true love didn't give you one, you may use cornish game hens with great success.

Roast Partridge (or Game Hens)

2 birds, thawed
1 medium onion
2 bay leaves
6 strips of bacon
4 oz. dry white wine
2 oz. heavy cream
2 tbs. melted butter
salt, pepper, melted butter
chopped parsley
heavy duty foil

Lightly salt and pepper inside of each bird. Place 1 bay leaf and 1/2 onion quartered in each cavity. Place bird on 12-inch square of foil. Bring up corners loosely.

Baste with melted butter and arrange 3 strips of bacon on top of each. Pour 2 oz. of wine over each and seal foil.

Place in pie pans and roast 1 hr., 15 min. at 375°. Open foil and brown 10-15 min. more.

Remove birds to serving dishes reserving liquid in foil envelopes. Pour liquid into a saute pan, and reduce over medium heat.

Add cream and let simmer about 5 minutes. Pour over birds and garnish with parsley.

To keep the preparation time to a minimum, serve Uncle Ben's wild rice, Chicken flavored Stove Top Stuffing, some steamed vegetables and your favorite wine. For dessert try ice cream with cream de menthe poured over.

gant about this whole thing," he said. "It's as if they feel nobody can tell them what to do.

"I think they function from a personal level, and have little vendettas against people. They don't function by the rules of government."

"He's got a vendetta against us," Leona Stanek said in reply.

Not all assessments were lowered just for the sake of lowering them, the clerk said.

"Lawrence Nemecek had his assessment lowered two or three years in a

row by the tax tribunal, and John McDonald raises it back up every year," she said.

The new terms for Falco and Nemecek will officially begin Jan. 1. If any changes are to be made, Galbraith said, they must occur before then. The township board should listen to the demands for action by angry township residents, he said.

"To avoid a recall, I'd suggest they move really fast on this," he said. "If they choose not to appoint an all new board of review, I'd say they're in deep trouble."

Drenth appointed new road commissioner
