

The year in review

A look at 1994

j u l y

- Four days of activities, including one of the few fireworks shows in the area to be unhampered by rain, marked the 1994 Jordan Valley Freedom Festival. Featured were two parades and a baby elephant named Laura.
- Long time business and civic leader Bill Grauel served as grand marshal of the Freedom Festival Grand Parade.
- The East Jordan School District facility review committee, consisting of community, business, and school staff members, began meeting to determine the best way to alleviate overcrowded conditions at the elementary and middle school.
- Castle Farm Community Center held a grand opening with a variety of family events to celebrate.
- The city of East Jordan received \$20,314 in emergency assistance from the federal government to cover damage caused by the previous winter's extreme temperatures.
- City council adopted a resolution to construct and replace sidewalks in several areas of the city, financed by special assessment.
- Fast food giant McDonald's opened a drive-through restaurant in the recently completed Jordan Valley Express American Music Center.
- City well #6, a year-long, \$254,000 project, went on line to provide backup to the west side water system.
- The East Jordan School Board ap-

proved initiating the strategic planning process, a method of affecting change through team work and resolution rather than reaction.

- The East Jordan Garden Club held a special open exhibit at the Jordan River Arts Council.
- The city council heard concerns about the library board appointment process from several citizens and took steps to make the process clear and specific.
- The Echo Township Board approved the purchase of new playground equipment for Echo Township Park.

- The East Jordan City Council heard a proposal from McDonald's to build a full-service restaurant on city property at the edge of Tourist Park. The plan was referred to the planning commission, which later rejected use of that location.
- U of M assistant coach Jay Smith brought his basketball camp to EJHS, attracting 132 kids from many area school districts.
- The annual Portside Art Fair was blessed with beautiful weather, attracting thousands to view artwork of local as well as artists from all over the United States.
- The first annual "Ducky Derby" reaped \$5,000 for the Holiday Decoration Committee.
- The Jordan River Players presented a continued on page 2





CHARTER COMMISSION members gathered to make public a draft of the potential new city charter after nearly a year of weekly meetings and hard work.


completed renovations that modernized the look of the front office, improved storage and meeting space for officers.

- The Charter Commission, elected in November 1993 to revise the city charter, presented the proposed charter in a

- A new ambulance was added to the city fleet at the bargain price of \$60,000.
- Wilson Township treasurer Sharon K. Pittiglio was arraigned in 90th District Court on an embezzlement charge. Pittiglio is accused of taking over \$89,000 and faces trial in 1995.

Unfair tax burden resented

MY WIFE AND I live in Jordan Township, own agricultural land and are now paying an unfair penalty for both.

Our land suffered a \$5,100 increase in its assessed value in 1994. We debated taking the increase to the Tax Review Board but felt our land was worth double the assessed value based on today's real estate market.

What a mistake! We could have been one of the fortunate 50 agricultural land owners who had their taxes reduced by the Jordan Township Tax Review Board. Instead, not only does our \$5,100 increase stand, we and the remaining

agricultural land owners get to add an equalization factor to our existing assessment to balance the tax books. This factor boosts our 1994 assessment increase to \$6,600. This is about a 20 percent increase.

While the Jordan Township Tax Review Board's intention may have been noble, the result was disastrous. We are now paying an unfair tax burden because of their action. I resent having to pay more property taxes to support those who are now paying less.





creatures great & small

Fleas and your pet

Help! We are being overrun with fleas! This is a very common complaint frequently heard from the majority of pet owners – almost daily.

People generally consider this to be a warm-weather problem but as the chill of winter hits us, the fleas do, too! They seem to want to find a warm place to spend their time – unfortunately, it's in our homes!

Several types of these small, flat brown insects infest the hair coats of animals; some may occasionally feed on people. These blood-sucking pests cause considerable irritation and dis-

If your pets ingest fleas (by biting at itchy spots), they could become infected with a tapeworm. A pet that is heavily infested could become anemic.

Some pets and people are allergic to flea bites. They can develop rashes and

Check for fleas on the hind quarters, base of tail, stomach and groin areas. Sometimes you may not see fleas but if your pet has little dark crumbles that look like pepper, then fleas have left

Those little specks are the waste of the flea. To be sure, catch some on a damp paper towel and smudge it. If you see a reddish color, your pet has fleas. (These droppings consist of blood which the fleas have digested.)

After taking a blood meal, fleas drop off your pet to lay their eggs. This occurs whereever your pet goes. The eggs also fall off the pet. Cracks, crevices, upholstery and carpeting are the favorite targets.

A single breeding pair may produce 20,000 fleas in three months! Eggs hatch after two to 12 days into larvae. These will then molt two times within two to 200 days. The older larvae then spin a cocoon in which they can remain for a week to a year.

The long period during which the larvae remain in the cocoon explains why it is so difficult to eradicate these resilient pests.

There are many products available for flea control. To be rid of the problem, you must apply the insecticide correctly and at proper intervals.

All pets, as well as the premises must

Check with your veterinarian for a complete flea control program. He or she can best direct you to which type of products are best for your pet and their correct application.



Superintendent Johnson leaves city government

The final regular meeting of the year for the East Jordan City Council closed with the announcement the city will end its relationship with city superintendent Bob Johnson.

"A mutual parting of the ways is desired," DPW committee chair Brian Sweet told the council.

The council authorized city attorney Scott Beatty to draw up a separation agreement with Johnson, whose tenure will end at the close of the year.

Sweet noted that with the expected change in city charter in April, the DPW/city superintendent position will be eliminated anyway. In the proposed new form of government, a professional city manager will administer all departments, not just the DPW.

April 24 has been set as the election date for the proposed charter. The document is now in the governor's office, awaiting final approval of the wording.
