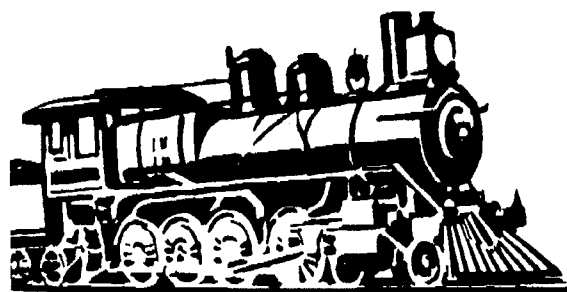


Weather

It was a classic January thaw in local weather last week, with only 2.5 inches of snow falling from Jan. 9 through 16, and temperatures rising into the 40s toward the end of the week. Year-to-date snow totals stand at a scant 63.5 inches, with little further accumulation and daytime highs in the mid-30s predicted in the coming week. **LAST YEAR:** An extended cold snap had county residents shivering, with night lows dipping below zero, and snow falling almost every day. Snowfall totals were closing on 1993 numbers, with 113 inches recorded by Jan. 17.

Sno-Blast royalty featured at dance

A winter ball with the enchantment of the sparkling snow, girls in pretty gowns and handsome young men – completing the scene is a coronation.

This year's Sno-Blast Winter Ball and Sno-Cotillion promises to be such an evening, as the 1995 East Jordan Jaycees Belle of the Blizzard and Winter Knight are chosen from among the eight candidates.

All East Jordan High School students, the candidates were selected by their classmates in a school-wide poll. The Belle and Knight will be chosen by popular community vote.

"Polling" places are Carey's IGA, Glen's Market, and Jordan Valley Pharmacy. Each vote costs \$1, and votes are unlimited. Proceeds fund the competition and other Jaycees projects.

Having the coronation at the dance is a change from the past, and will give the event a more formal quality. The candidates will attend many of the Sno-Blast activities and the Belle and Knight will take part in area events throughout the year.

Belle of the Blizzard candidates are seniors Carrie Brown, Mandy Reid and Mandy Wittingen, and sophomore Amanda Pepin. Winter Knight candidates are seniors Kirk Falco, Karl Redmer, and Jake Ryan, with junior Aaron Aydlott.

The new Belle and Knight will receive a variety of prizes, as will each member of the court. The royal crowning at the Civic Center is a free event, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Saturday evening. The crowning will be followed by the Sno-Cotillion, also at the center, with music provided by D.J. Sound. Admission is \$4 per person or \$6 per couple. Children ages 2-10 are \$2 and under 2 are free.

Although he is a WWII veteran, and worked for GM for a few years in Grand Rapids, Woodcock has spent most of his life in the East Jordan area, serving as a barber for 23 years. He spends as much free time as possible outdoors, and enjoys hunting, fishing, and camping as well as his snow sports.

Sheriff clarifies rabies alert

A rabies alert recently issued by District #3 Health Department was related to an incident involving a possibly rabid fox, according to the Charlevoix County Sheriff Department.

The fox was shot and killed by an unknown person on Boyne City-East Jordan Road near Hickcox Road. When the county animal control officer went to collect the carcass, it was missing. The officer found a spent shell and a blood spot.

It is assumed the carcass was picked up by and handled by someone. Prior to death, the animal was observed to be acting strangely, including wandering in circles and foaming at the mouth.

It is very important that any individuals who handled or had contact with the fox discuss their exposure with a physician. Exposure includes any penetra-

tion of the skin by the teeth of the animal; or scratches, abrasions, open wounds or mucous membranes (lining of the mouth and eyes) coming in contact with the saliva or other potentially infectious material (such as brain tissue) from the animal.

Petting a rabid animal, or contact with blood, urine or feces of the animal does not constitute an exposure in itself, but such contact should be discussed with a physician.

Rabies is a fatal disease caused by a virus. However, the concern of rabies exposure in this case is limited to whoever handled the fox carcass. The sheriff department is urging anyone who did to contact their family physician or the District #3 Health Department immediately to determine if an exposure has occurred.

Farmers should apply now for disaster relief grants

Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., reminded Michigan farmers who suffered crop and tree losses in last year's flooding and freezing conditions that they can apply for disaster relief grants from the federal government.

"The losses suffered by Michigan farmers in this year's extreme weather have been staggering," said Levin. "If you lost a significant part of your crop or orchard you may be eligible for a federal grant or loan. Now is the time to apply so drop by your local Michigan Farm Service Agency to see if you qualify."

The funds will be available to farmers in 44 Michigan counties designated as primary disaster counties as well as an additional 37 counties designated as contiguous disaster counties. Farmers can apply for money to offset their losses now through March 31.

Bean and peach growers were hit particularly hard, with bean growers losing crops to root rot and peach grow-

ers losing entire trees due to the freezing weather. Levin said informal reports put total losses in all crops and orchards around the state at more than 460 million.

Farmers who have experienced a crop loss of more than 35 percent should visit their local Farm Services Agency to see if they are eligible for relief funds. The total amount of benefits an individual may receive for losses cannot exceed \$100,000 and is limited to 65 percent of the average price of the crop over five years, according to the program's guidelines.

Fruit tree growers can get assistance for replanting, reseeding or repairing damage to trees in their nursery or orchard if more than 35 percent of their trees died. Total tree assistance payments are limited to \$25,000 each crop year. Farmers who had gross revenue over \$2 million for the last crop year are not eligible for benefits.

* Cheryl Southard, activity director at Grandvue Medical Care Facility, in East Jordan, says a lot of new things will be happening starting the week of Jan. 22.

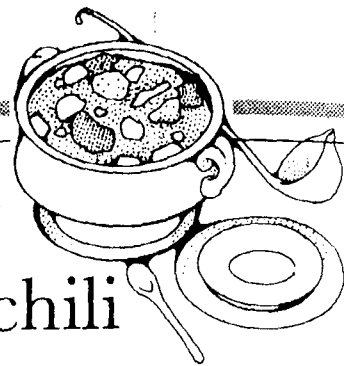
The new program is designed for the alert residents that live at Grandvue. Family and staff are encouraged to join.

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jordan memories

In 1930 the snowmobile was being given a lot of publicity. Quite a few rural mail carriers who spent hours during the day watching their teams fighting their way through the drifts decided they were at least worth a try — they were, too! It certainly was a relief not to have to struggle with the icy harnesses early every morning, and the saving in time required to cover the winter roads and the extra comfort they provide was wonderful.

Mr. Archie Howe really enjoyed his snowmobile and drove it for three winters, 1930-1932. There was one objection though, and that was the expense. All that ease of travel could not be accomplished, even by a snowmobile, without putting a lot into it. For a snowmobile that meant gas and more gas. Besides it needed a lot of care and treads needed to be inspected carefully daily.

After three winters Archie gave up his snowmobile and purchased a Model A Ford. The day of the horse-drawn deliveries were over!

There were many strange articles riding with Archie on his mail route during his 35 years of service, for a part of his route was quite hard to get in and out of during the winter months. He often obliged the patrons by doing errands for them — sometimes he stopped long enough to give someone a hand — twice he helped owners to get one of their cows out of a ditch. Once he took time to climb to the top of a windmill and do a repair job.

There was a day, too, when he came along just in time to help two men whose car had rolled over and pinned them both beneath it; of course, then Archie took time to rush them both to a doctor!

Most days though were without unusual incidents, and he would go the whole route, observing the changing of the seasons and the movements of the wildlife. In all those years Archie says he never saw a lynx, and no bear or deer until 15 or 20 years ago. All stories to the contrary notwithstanding, there was little that could be called big game in the lumbering era of Jordan Township.

Mr. Howe has had very little trouble on his route and no serious accidents. In fact the only one that could have been called serious was so funny he still gets a laugh out of it — that was the time he ran into the river by the Chestonia bridge. While his car was standing upright on its nose in the water, he watched one tire and his hat go floating down the river side by side. Then he climbed straight up over the back end of the car and jumped to dry land without even getting a

foot wet.

There have been a lot of changes made on the roads since Mr. Howe started, both in improvements and locations. The route too has changed. Now known as Route 1, it no longer takes in the Vance District. Although his mileage has increased from 25.5 to 55.5, the improved roads and methods of transportation have cut his time on route down to four hours. In other words, he has doubled his distance and cut his time required on route in half.

Mr. and Mrs. Howe have two sons, Willard and Harold, both of whom are grown and have homes of their own. Willard lives near his parents, but Harold,

who is a gifted commercial artist, lives and plies his trade in more commercial lanes.

Mr. and Mrs. Howe live quietly in their comfortable home in East Jordan where Mrs. Howe takes part in community activities, and Mr. Howe in off hours raises a lawn that reminds one of walking on a Persian rug.

We realize that Mr. Howe has served his patrons long and well — and that the time may soon come when he will retire. When he does, we will all be sorry. You see, we know it was a lucky day for the patrons of this route when they hired Mr. Howe, for on that day they acquired not just a carrier of the mail, but a friend!

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Library gets on the information highway

The Jordan Valley District Library now boasts an information link to one of the world's greatest research centers.

The University of Michigan, through a two-year grant, recently established M-LINK, a community information partnership between Michigan's public libraries and the U of M library. Through M-LINK, East Jordan library patrons can take advantage of almost unlimited information on economic and community development issues.

Accessing M-LINK is easy - the question is directed from the local library through a regional center, then on to U of M, where researchers put together a detailed response based on information collected country or even world-wide.

A detailed report is delivered within days, listing

statistics, referrals and other pertinent information.

Jordan Valley District Library director Dawn Pringle said several area residents have used the service and have been very impressed. Some of the topics researched were designing a new business logo, community service projects for teenagers during the winter months, and the information retention abilities of older adults.

Pringle said the service will be ideal for anyone applying or searching for available grants. For example, information on commercial or municipal building grants, construction companies, health hazards, products and equipment is all available with just a few days wait.

The library itself has taken advantage of the service. With plans to automate the circulation and filing

processes, Pringle asked for research on aspects of the modernization. She said the library received a report which includes research on systems choices, products performance, and manufacturers, along with many other details.

"It's a wonderful service," said Pringle. "They do a really good job."

The service is guaranteed to continue for two years, until U of M's grant expires. After that, the university is hoping for state support of the project. M-LINK is another of the many new technologies that are extending the reach of the local library to the world beyond.

The Secret of the Villa Mimosa

Many questions come into play. Was it an accident, or was she the victim of an attempted murder? Where is the wonderful pink villa with hundreds of song-

birds? Why, under hypnosis can she speak fluent French? What is the common link between Hawaii, Paris and the south of France?

The long journey to discover has past is marked by revenge, scandal, and romance.

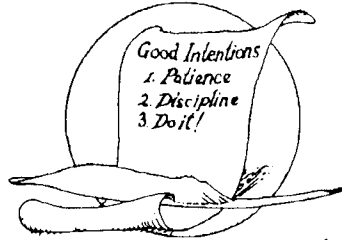

An altering question

Every year millions of unwanted pets are put to death. This tragic scene is repeated daily at animal shelters throughout our country due to the huge pet population.

Unfortunately animal population numbers increase on a daily basis as well, adding to this vicious circle, maybe you are now asking yourself, "What can I do to help end this dilemma?"

The answer is easy: Have your pet altered (surgically sterilized). Neutered pets are unable to reproduce.

Every pet that can no longer add to the overpopulation problem is a small contribution! There are so many dogs and cats in need of homes that "back yard breeding" is a grave injustice.

Contrary to popular belief, there is no reason – medical or otherwise – to allow your pet to have a litter, or to have a heat cycle prior to being neutered.

Bone marrow drive in Gaylord

Northwest Michigan Gift of Life is sponsoring a bone marrow typing drive, Sun., Jan. 22, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the Gaylord Holiday Inn.

A marrow typing drive is a simple one time blood test that determines an HLA tissue type. The HLA tissue type is then entered into the National Marrow Registry for anyone in search of a marrow transplant.

On average, 2,000 people annually are in need of this life saving transplant, more than half are children and more than 7 out of 10 die waiting for their perfect match. Leukemia is the number one disease killer of our children in the United States. A bone marrow transplant can cure leukemia and over 60 fatal blood diseases.

The Northwest Michigan Gift of Life is a non-profit group. All members are volunteers dedicated to saving lives.

In the past two years, 2,750 HLA tissue types have been entered into the National Marrow Donor Program, and to date 13 northern Michigan residents have been a perfect match and successfully donated their marrow.

The Northwest Michigan Gift of Life has received a grant that offers this HLA tissue typing for half price. But even half price will cost the Gift of Life \$18 per blood sample drawn at this drive. Donations are being accepted at the drives. You are asked, if you can afford the \$18 typing fee, that you make the donation on site to save funds for those who cannot afford the typing fee. All people between the ages of 18 and 55 and in good health are encouraged to come and offer the "Gift of Life" to those in need of a transplant.

In fact, neutering physically benefits your pet's health – the younger your pet is altered, the better for him!

At our clinic the minimum age is six months. This applies to cats and dogs of both sexes.

The advantages of having a female cat or dog neutered or spayed are:

- There will be no heat periods to deal with.
- There will be no unwanted puppies or kittens.
- The uterine infections common to older pets cannot occur.
- Chances of mammary cancer are greatly lessened.

If you are wondering about changes in personality, cats and dogs personalities do not fully develop until about one year of age. If there is a personality change after neutering at an early age, it would have occurred without surgery.

The advantages of having a male cat or dog neutered or castrated are:

■ Neutering largely eliminates wandering and fighting.

■ In cats, the strong odor of the urine is reduced.

■ In dogs, aggression is curbed as well as undesirable sexual behaviors (although castration does not replace obedience training by the owner).

■ Eliminates disease of the testicles, such as cancer, and may greatly reduce prostate gland problems.

As a pet owner, you can make the decision to either add to the pet overpopulation problem or to help decrease it; neutering is in the best interest of you and your pet!

Note: Having a pet neutered is a surgical procedure and although it is considered routine, any time general anesthesia is induced there are risks involved. Having a young, healthy pet neutered is far safer and less costly than neutering an older animal or one with a pre-existing health problem. Discuss your concerns with your veterinarian – he or she will be happy to answer your questions and best advise you on your pet's health and how to maintain it. May you enjoy a healthy and prosperous new year!

Steve Wiltfong and Andrew Otis paced the Red

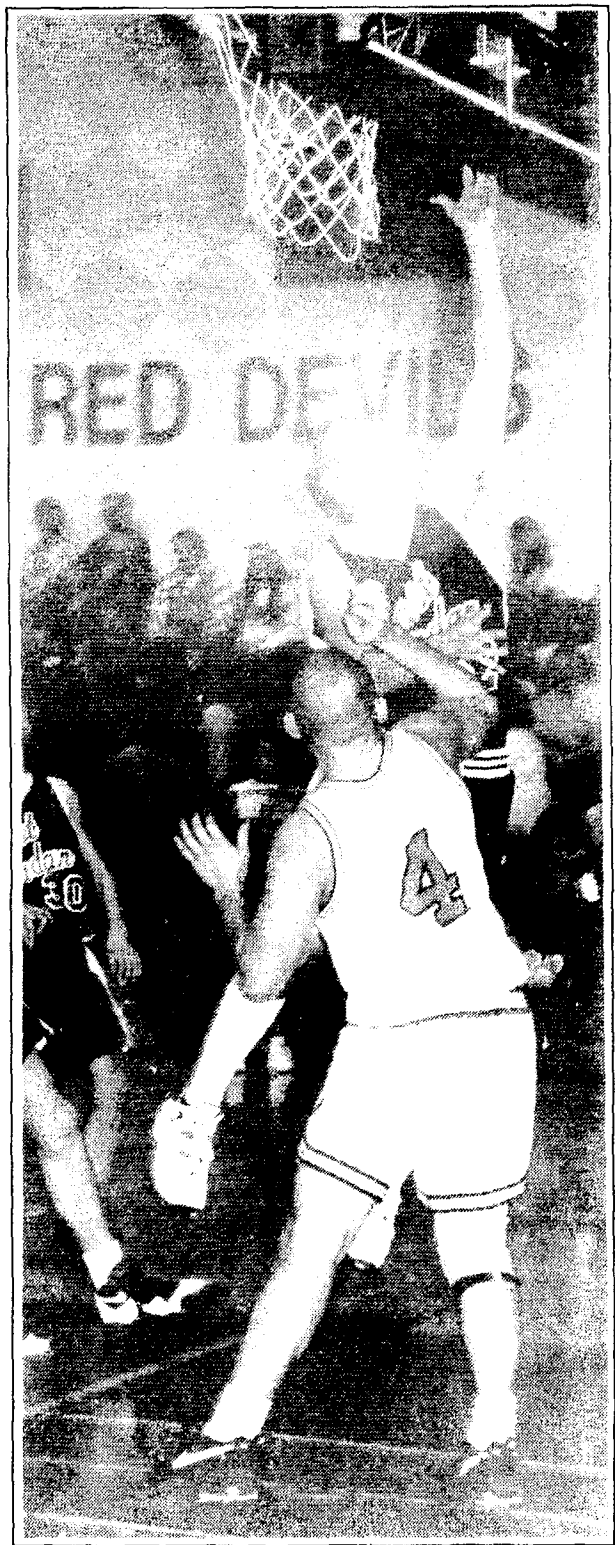
Devils, who shared the wealth across the roster.

Recipes designed with East Jordan cooks in mind

The new year is here and although we don't make New Year's resolutions, it is a good time to start sensible cooking.

There are many foods now available with lower fat content. By using low fat or fat free ingredients, you can create a healthier meal for your family while still offering foods with flavor.

Baked potatoes are a good example of low-fat food, but skip the butter and sour cream – both high fat additions. Try some of these healthier options instead: Molly McButter, reduced-fat sour cream, low-fat plain yogurt with herbs, parmesan cheese, salsa, and reduced or low-fat cheeses. With these toppings in mind, here are a few quick and easy baked potato recipes.

Basic Baked Potatoes

4 medium baking potatoes, scrubbed

Bake the potatoes either in a microwave or conventional oven. After the potatoes are tender, let them set 2-3 minutes. Using a paper towel to protect your hands from heat, roll the potatoes on the counter, pressing gently with hand to make inside light and mealy.

With knife, cut an X in the top of each potato. Gently squeeze lower part of potato to force inside up through the slit. Spoon your favorite topping over potato and serve.

Baked Potato Toppers

■ Sour cream and ham

In medium bowl combine 3/4 cup light sour cream and 1/2 cup chopped cooked ham; mix well. Spoon evenly over four baked potatoes. Sprinkle with chopped fresh chives.

■ Spaghetti sauce

In small saucepan, heat a 15 1/2-oz. jar of meat-flavored spaghetti sauce. Spoon evenly over four baked potatoes; sprinkle each with one tablespoon shredded mozzarella cheese.

■ Sherried mushrooms

In small skillet, cook two cups sliced fresh mushrooms in two teaspoons of margarine or butter until tender, stirring frequently. Stir in one tablespoon sherry. Remove from heat; stir in 1/2 cup light sour cream. Spoon evenly over four baked potatoes. Sprinkle with chopped fresh chives.

■ Sour cream and salsa

Spoon 1/2 cup light sour cream and 1/2 cup salsa evenly over four baked potatoes. Sprinkle with two tablespoons sliced green onions.

Traffic crashes cost more than crime

It's just the facts ma'am: the cost of traffic crashes is more than double that of crime in Michigan.

An analysis, recently conducted by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute, reveals that traffic

crashes cost the state more than \$12 billion in 1993 while the total cost of index crimes was approximately \$5 billion. This translates to \$3,166 for each Michigan taxpayer who filed a return in 1992 vs. \$1,315 per taxpayer for crime costs.

"Traffic crashes are an epidemic that requires the attention of everyone in our state," said Betty J. Mercer, executive director of the Michigan State Police, Office of Highway Safety Planning. "Certainly, crime is of major concern and for good reason. But drunk driving is a violent crime, as is every death on Michigan roads. We must continue to focus adequate resources on traffic safety enforcement and education efforts."

Over 40 percent of Michigan traffic fatalities involved alcohol in 1993 and approximately three-quarters of crash victims were not wearing safety belts.

"We could dramatically reduce those costs if we could increase safety belt use and decrease the incidence of drunk driving in our state," she added.

Over 40 percent of Michigan traffic fatalities involved alcohol in 1993 and approximately three-quarters of traffic crash victims were not wearing safety belts. In Michigan, only 66.1 percent of motorists routinely wear safety belts.

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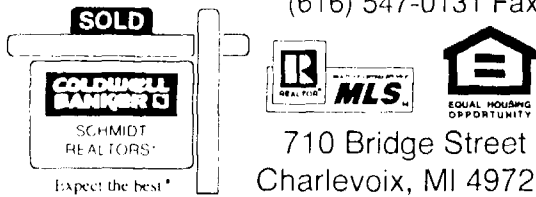

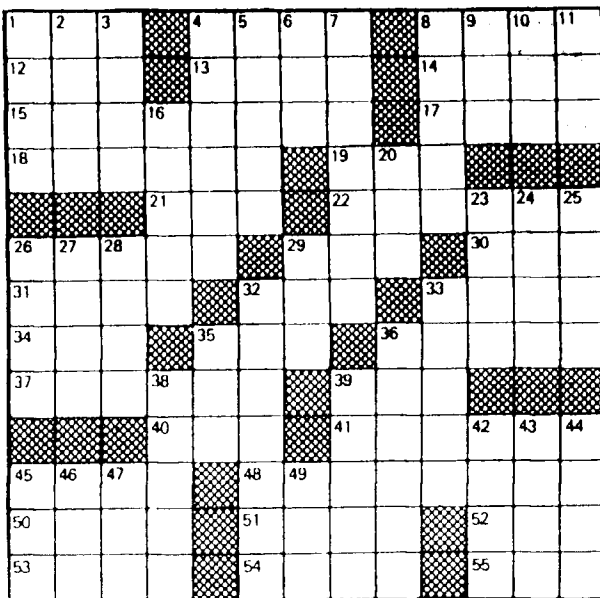

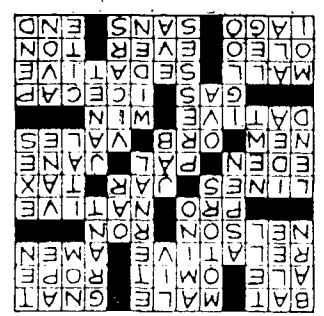
