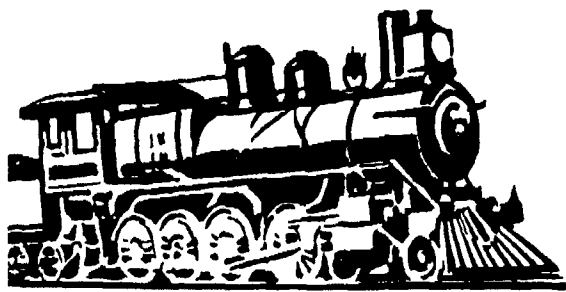


Weather

East Jordan hires new DPW superintendent

An interim city and DPW superintendent has been named by the East Jordan City Council.

William G. Hughes, of East Jordan, was selected from about five candidates for the temporary position.

Hughes moved to the area this summer after serving as head city engineer in Vista, Cal., since 1989. He began working for Vista as a junior civil engineer in 1980, and moved rapidly through the ranks to achieve his standing as department head.

His experience in developing capital improvement projects, successful grant-writing, and working with other officials in local government are some of the qualities that attracted the attention of council members.

Although DPW committee chair Brian Sweet was not able to attend the Jan. 19 meeting when the decision was made, he is happy with the selection. The main candidates were equally qualified, Sweet said, but Hughes had an extra advantage.

"One thing he brings that the others didn't is an engineering degree," said Sweet. Sweet noted the \$25,000 annually paid for engineering fees will be saved with the presence of an in-house expert.

The council decided to make the position temporary in anticipation of the

upcoming city charter election in April. If the local government reorganization is approved, the position of superintendent will no longer exist, although the new city manager's job description will have some similarities.

Sweet and other council members noted that Hughes may have the qualifications to be a potential candidate for city manager. However, the position will be opened for application and a search will be conducted.

Snowmobiles finally allowed on Antrim roads

This winter will prove historic for county snowmobilers - for a reason other than the uncooperative weather.

The Antrim County Road Commission, in consultation with local law enforcement officials, voted Jan. 17 to allow snowmobiles to travel on the plowed shoulders of roads within the county. The resolution will take effect as soon as signs required by state law are posted at the county lines.

Antrim has been one of only two counties in northern Michigan to not allow such road-shoulder travel. Darrel Mitchell, president of the 375-member Antrim County Snowmobile Club

(ACSC), said the ruling can only have a positive impact on the local economy.

"A survey by the Michigan Snowmobile Association and the state showed \$225 million is spent by snowmobilers statewide each year," he said. "If you are one of the few counties restricting it, people will just ride elsewhere."

Half of ACSC members live downstate and have property in the county, according to Mitchell.

"Many have told me they were looking to sell their property or their cabin up here, to move to a county less restrictive on riding," he said.

The ruling will benefit local residents the most, Mitchell pointed out.

"It will make for more pleasant riding,

My subject today, Mrs. Emma Shepard, proprietress of the Chestonia store, takes me back to the year of 1905 when she entered the county - but first let's take a look at the county itself at that time.

By 1905, Antrim County was considered settled. Though much of Michigan's virgin forest was already gone, here in Antrim County there were still quite a few acres of the "big trees".

At first the settlers, in order to find room for their buildings, their gardens and their orchards, had to cut the big trees by hand. Burning them in huge piles, they destroyed what in later years could have made them independently wealthy, but what else could they do? They had to have a place for their families and there were no roads, no mills and no markets.

Often they used just the outer slabs with the bark attached to make their first crude homes. Later, with more time, they learned to hew the smaller logs, shaping and laying them one on another and using only wooden pins to hold them together, making a comfort-

able home that lasted very well.

By 1905, there were roads of a sort, and transportation, mills and markets. Though the price they got for their wood might seem negligible now, it was life to many of the settlers. There were lumber men too, and the big lumber camps imported much of their help. These men of the woods we knew as "lumberjacks".

As financial circumstances improved and population increased, the demand for food, implements and comforts also increased, and to meet this demand small towns and villages sprang up. In Antrim County there were several, and of them Chestonia seemed a likely prospect. Located there at that time were two blacksmith shops, a potato warehouse, a school and 20 shanties with families living in them.

There were also two railroad depots, the D & C being situated east of the present M-56 highway. The EJ & S depot was across the track from the site of the present station and store. That depot also housed a grocery known as the Davis store that served also as Post Office where the mail was received twice a day, coming by train from East Jordan and Bellaire.

At this time a young couple moved

into the store. Coming from Barry County, Michigan, they were Homer Shepard and wife, nee Emma Valentine. The next year they built the present store on the opposite side of the tracks and operated it for three years. During that time their children, Vail, Marshall and Velma, were born. They decided to move to a farm and Mrs. Shepard's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Valentine, took over the store, operating it as long as they lived.

Mrs. Shepard's husband passed away in 1929 and when her mother also passed

away in 1935, leaving the store unattended, Mrs. Shepard returned. By this time her children were married and she was alone, but she still carries on the business of the store, taking care of the customers herself, and whether you want ten gallons of gas or a spool of thread you get service with a smile.

Mrs. Shepard also has had built and furnished a very nice cabin which she rents. You might keep this in mind in case some of your friends would like a homelike place to spend their vacation.

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MEAP results a mixed bag for EJ schools

MEAP results were one topic of discussion at the Jan. 16 meeting of the East Jordan School Board. The scores indicate improvement, according to high school principal Gus Bishop.

"We're happy with the fact that scores are moving up," Bishop told the board, "while we're not happy with where they are yet."

Scores on the math portion of the test had the greatest consistent improvement of the three tested subject areas. The test is given annually to fourth, seventh, and 10th-graders.

The composite score for fourth-graders this year was 46.4, nearly 20 points higher than in 1991. Seventh-graders scored a 52.6, also about a 20-point improvement from 1991's 31.9.

Tenth-graders who took the test improved by 10 points, from 10.1 in 1991, to 20.0 in 1994.

Bishop explained that while the figures are encouraging, graphing the results by groups rather than ages shows a less positive trend. For example, when this year's tenth-graders took the test in 1991 as seventh graders, the composite score was 31.9, indicating a decline in the group's performance.

Bishop said many factors can affect those numbers, including a heavy turnover of the student population; lack of teacher continuity; how the student feels at test

time; and reading skill levels. The faculty continues to work at identifying such weaknesses and developing programs as a response.

Bishop said the new Chicago Math program, introduced to some middle school students this year and scheduled to eventually expand through the middle and high school programs, is expected to support the upward trend.

Reading scores, while not as consistent, generally reflect the improvement as well, but included isolated drops in scores. For example fourth-graders in 1991 achieved a 73.1 in story reading while this year's fourth graders had a 64.9. But the same group spiked upward in reading for information, scoring 39.2 in 1994 while the 1991 group only scored a 28.

The science test, taken by this year's fifth, eighth, and 11th-grade classes, showed a drop on all three levels from 1993 scores. But the eighth-grade score, 64.0 did increase from 1991's 58.5, while 11th-grade stayed about the same as the 1991 score with only a one-point drop.

The board discussed the merits of aligning the curriculum more closely to the tests. Bishop said such a strategy is more effective than focusing on intense student training during the weeks prior to the tests.

However, the bigger picture should be kept in mind, cautioned board member John Kempton.

"We should align the curriculum to the students' needs for life," said Kempton, "Not just for MEAP

tests."

Other board members agreed that standardized tests are just a barometer for determining some weaknesses and not an indicator of the whole student.

Elementary principal Charles Hershberger noted that concerns are being heard by the developers of MEAP.

"MEAP test changes seem to be addressing that," said Hershberger. In the meantime, he said the tests are a good tool to pinpoint where improvements are the result of intervention.

"Introducing calculators in the third grade made a difference in this year's fourth grade MEAP," he said.

"We know from the tests," said district superintendent Chip Hansen, "When you make an intervention, it works. The key is deciding where to intervene."

MSU names honor students

Two East Jordan students were among the 4,550 Michigan State University students to earn Dean's list recognition for the 1994 fall semester.

Barbara A. Lercel, a zoology major, and Renee M. Ruhlman, a major in social and international studies, both earned a 3.5 or higher grade point average to receive honors at the East Lansing campus.

Charlevoix County Community Foundation awards grants

Education, recreation, and cultural enrichment activities received some needed financial help from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation when trustees of the organization approved grants totaling \$8,700.

The grants are made with interest earned on the foundation's permanent endowment, which has grown this year to nearly \$1.7 million. Projects selected for funding include:

- *The Boyne Area 4-H Hockey Program:* \$1,200 to complete construction of an official outdoor ice hockey rink that will be used by area children.

- *St. James Township, Beaver Island:* \$1,000 toward development of public tennis courts.

- *East Jordan Community Schools:* \$500 to purchase special lighting for the auditorium, where students and the Jordan River Arts Council stage drama and musical productions.

- *Charlevoix County Probate Court:* \$1,000 to help purchase interactive computers that will allow children temporarily placed in state-licensed homes to continue their schooling through the Char-Em ISD.

- *Camp Daggett:* \$2,000 to construct a new, barrier-

free bath and shower house.

- *Charlevoix Township:* \$3,000 toward the cost of re-engineering and resurfacing the Shanahan Soccer Field, used by children throughout the county.

Vel Kammermann, president of the foundation, said the programs chosen for funding address a good mix of issues and serve people throughout Charlevoix County.

"In reviewing grant requests, we attempt to select programs that target a variety of social needs," she explained. "These programs involve the arts, education, and recreation, and they have the potential to enrich our communities in many ways."

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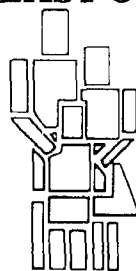

and make life much easier for riding and non-riding residents," he said.

■ Easing began in '93

Road commission manager John Pemberton said his department began to look at reducing the road shoulder restriction a little less than two years ago, when the state legislature passed an amendment greatly easing the liability burden on road commissions caused by snowmobile accidents.

In consultation with the ACSC, travel was allowed on some shoulders beginning last winter, to provide access to the major trails in the eastern portion of the county. Deciding who could go where simply became too difficult to enforce, Antrim County Sheriff Dale Roggenbeck said.

"None of us have even received maps

yet showing the trails," he said. "People would get to Antrim County and get written up for a citation, for what they had been doing perfectly legally in surrounding counties."

"It got confusing," Mitchell agreed, citing as an example Cinder Hill Road near Alba, which is near a major snowmobile trail.

"Parts of the road you can ride on, parts you can't," he said. "People head to town to get gas or something to eat, and they get ticketed by the police."

Addressing the road commission on the enforcement issue, in addition to Roggenbeck, were Mancelona Police Chief Jeff Helmboldt, acting Bellaire Police Chief Terry Johnson, Elk Rapids Police Chief Jack Blesma, local DNR officer Mike Borkovich and county prosecutor Charles Koop.

"Law enforcement is in a Catch-22 situation," Roggenbeck said. "We get complaints from business owners that we're handing out citations to these tourists who are spending their money here. Other residents complain because they're on the roads."

■ Restrictions don't prove safer

The sheriff said he has long opposed allowing the sleds on road shoulders, due to safety and county liability concerns. Why, then, does he support the change?

"There just aren't any statistics that show more fatalities in counties that allow shoulder travel," he said. "Most fatalities occur in the woods, where speed is a factor. I'm sure the first time there's a fatality on the road, though, we'll get people coming out saying we

never should have opened them up."

Roggenbeck hopes the new rules will reduce one common complaint — trespassing snowmobiles and property damage caused by sleds crossing yards.

"I think a lot of that's been happening as they try to avoid traveling on the road," he said.

Mitchell said people will also see fewer sleds riding at high speeds along the roads.

"They're probably going so fast to get off the shoulder as soon as they can, so they don't get a ticket," he said. "Now that riders can relax, people should see less speeding."

Pemberton expressed optimism the necessary signs can be put in place for sledders to hit the roads yet this winter.

"We hope to have them up by February if all goes well," he said. "Of course, we can't be out installing signs if we have snow to plow and sand to spread."

■ ACSC job not completed

Mitchell said ACSC don't feel their mission is fully accomplished by the road commission's action.

"Now that the roads are open, the club needs to further promote safe snowmobiling," he said. "We have to use suggested, less-traveled roads, and work with the DNR, the sheriff and the road commission on any problems that arise."

"I want to emphasize to any community members that if they're having a particular problem with snowmobilers, please call me at the club."
