Board chairman: "We only corrected mistakes"

"There's been a lot of name-calling, head-bashing and bad press on your local board of review, and the township board as well," review board chairman Lawrence Nemecek told more than 30 audience members at the township board's Jan. 23 meeting. "I want to explain our position."

Many township residents are up in arms since the 1994 review board led by Nemecek lowered assessments on 49 of the 50 agricultural parcels they examined. The state tax commission said an unfair distribution of the tax

burden was created in the property class, and a factor was applied to all agricultural property – effectively raising the taxes of those who didn't have their assessments lowered by the board.

Nemecek defended the review board's actions, saying they only corrected errors by township assessor John McDonald.

"There were a lot of mistakes," he said. "I could stand here and list 40-plus mistakes if I had to, but I don't have the documentation with me.

"Everyone of these properties examined had a mistake. That should tell you what shape your books are in, and the job that's being done."

Nemecek's assertion conflicts with a recent independent study by the state tax commission, in which they appraised 23 properties in Jordan Township whose lowered assessments they are preparing to contest before the state tax tribunal later this year. The tax commission study found all of the parcels examined were reduced too greatly by the review board

Two former review board members spoke from the audience at the meeting, saying they didn't notice a poor performance by McDonald during their tenure.

"I couldn't find that many errors," said Fern Morris. "I did not find (McDonald's assessments) to be out of order," said Skip Osborne.

The agricultural properties appraised by the county equalization department, which are used to determine year-to-year changes in agricultural assessments, do not effectively portray property prices in Jordan Township, Nemecek said.

"Our (total) township SEV has gone up \$1 million a year for three straight years," he said. "Technically, every (agricultural) assessment in Jordan Township is wrong, because of the appraisal property they use to set assessments."

Nemecek said the equalization department randomly picked out agricultural properties for appraisal, but then threw some out of the averaging because they deemed them "ridiculously low."

"When I went to school, we used the high and the low numbers to find an average," he said.

County equalization director Dan Bolle said he did not recall throwing out lower appraisals from the averaging in Jordan Township particularly, but said his department will take that action on occasion for more accurate averages.

"If there are a number of parcels assessed around a particular percentage (of total appraised value), say 48 percent, we will throw out the one or two at 35 percent or 78 percent," he said. "If the appraisals are all over the board, generally we factor them all in."

School bond election scheduled for March 20

The East Jordan School Board met briefly Feb. 6 to approve a resolution scheduling a bond issue election for Mon., March 20. The board will ask voters to approve a 2.25 mill levy to pay for a new middle school and renovations to existing school buildings.

The board originally expected to hold the election a week later, but found the March 20 date to be available. Superintendent Chip Hansen said the earlier election will allow the district to purchase bonds sooner, possibly saving interest points.

The board's choice to finance at 15 rather than 29 years means a substantial interest cost savings, according to bond management consultant Susan E. Brennan.

"I praise the board for choosing this financing option," said Brennan, who is assistant vice president for public finance at Kemper Securities, Inc., of Lansing.

The price of financing will also be reduced by the district's debt fund balance on the 1977 2.25 mill bond levy that built the present high school. A balance of \$180,000 will be applied in portions over the next few years to pay principle and interest obligations. These debt funds result from the 1995 reduction of the bond from 2.25 to 1.50 mills.


"It allows us, in effect, to pay a down payment," said Hansen.

If voters approve the issue, Hansen said taxpayers will actually pay just a 1.5 mill increase over present millage because of the reduction of the 1977 bond. The older bond retires in 2003, again reducing tax burden for the new construction.

Hansen emphasized that the two bond obligations will not be connected, and the older bond will retire as scheduled. He noted that if new construction is needed in 2010 because of further district growth, taxpayers will be debt-free before necessary new millage.

Brennan called the financing plan unusually moderate for a school district.

"This is the most conservative financing package issued," she told the board.


If the bond issue passes, taxpayers will see a 1.50 mill increase on their tax bill. What does this amount to in real figures?

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Recall petitions filed on Jordan Township officials

Recall petitions seeking to oust three Jordan Township board members were submitted by the Jordan Township Citizen Committee to Antrim County Clerk Laura Sexton Jan. 26.

- The three petitions call for the removal from office of:
- township supervisor Joseph Haney, Sr.
- township clerk Leona Stanek
- trustee Lucille Lercel.

The petitions state the named officials "do not have the township's best interest in mind by: a) Reappointing two members to the township tax board of review whose actions caused an unfair distribution of the tax burden; b) Repeated disregard of the wishes and opinions of the township citizens; c) Dereliction of duty to inform the board and the public of correspondence from the State Tax Commission and the resignation letter from the township treasurer."

A clarity hearing to examine the wording on the recall petitions is scheduled for Tues., Feb. 7, at 3:30 p.m., at the Probate Courtroom in the 1905 courthouse in Bellaire. The hearing is open to the public.

The three officials named in the petition voted to reappoint Lawrence Nemecek and Sue Falco to the review board through 1996. At the board's Jan. 23 meeting, no mention was made of letter sent to individual property owners from the Michigan Tax Commission, stating that their appraisals showed many agricultural properties were lowered too far by the board of review in 1994.

Treasurer Laura Stanek also sent a letter of resignation dated Jan. 17 to the supervisor. Neither the letter nor Stanek's absence were mentioned at the meeting.

Both Leona Stanek and Haney declined comment on the recall petition. Lercel said she had been away on vacation until the day of the Jan. 23 meeting, and knew nothing about Laura Stanek's decision to not attend meetings for the rest of her tenure and resign effective April 1.

Although her property assessment was lowered last year, Lercel pointed out her parcel is zoned residential, not the factored agricultural. She does not believe hers is one of the properties recently appraised by the state tax commission, and she said she has received no letter from them.

A county election commission, consisting by statute of county clerk Laura Sexton, county treasurer Beverly Edgington and Probate Court Judge John Unger, will examine the language of the petition at the clarity hearing to make sure it is not too vague or broad. They do not determine if the allegations contained within the petitions are correct or without merit. The commission also cannot interpret or re-word the petition. If rejected, the petition can be resubmitted, in which case the commission then has 10 to 20 days to determine its clarity.

If approved at the clarity hearing, petitioners will have 180 days to gather signatures for the recall. To force a recall election, a particular petition must contain the signatures of 51 Jordan Township registered voters. That is based on a state formula requiring the number of signatures to equal 25 percent of the vote for governor in the township's last gubernatorial election. A total of 203 Jordan Township residents voted for governor last November.

Slippery driveway puts would-be thieves on ice

A slippery driveway at a residence in Eveline Township foiled the plans of three would-be thieves.

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department responded to an intrusion alarm at the residence Feb. 1, and discovered the three male subjects in a vehicle stuck in the driveway. An investigation showed evidence the three had broken into the residence.

All three are Charlevoix County residents. The names are withheld pending arraignment in 90th District Court, Charlevoix.

The sheriff department was assisted at the scene by the Boyne City Police Department and the Michigan State Police.

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East Jordan school district realigns curriculum director position

The retirement of East Jordan Schools curriculum director Anne Dingman at the beginning of the new year means changes for several other district staff members as well.

The administration views Dingman's departure as an opportunity to consider restructuring of the position. Superintendent of schools Chip Hansen said the district will cover the position internally for the remainder of the school year.

"Internal coverage will allow us to save money," said Hansen. "It will also give us the time we need to determine how to reallocate (Dingman's salary) in such a way that the dollars support students in the best way possible."

High school principal Gus Bishop will take on Dingman's curriculum and school improvement, testing coordinator, and Title V coordinator duties. To allow Bishop the extra time to perform these duties, Jackson has assumed some of the high school administrative duties. A substitute was hired to teach Jackson's high school health and physical education classes in order to allow her more time.

athletic director Tammy

Hansen is acting as staff development director and adult/community education director. Elementary principal Charles Hershberger has taken Dingman's place on the district Technology Committee and middle school principal Shirley Bishop is administering Section 57/Chapter Two duties.

To prepare for any permanent realignment of the curriculum director position, the district will focus on completion of a K-12 curriculum that meets Outcomes Driven Developmental Model (ODDM) and mastery learning objectives. Another goal of the curriculum development is to improve Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) test results. The first four staff in-

services of 1995 have been dedicated to curriculum development.

"We want teachers working with the completed curriculum by next fall," said Hansen.

Hansen said Dingman will continue to assist in the process on a part-time contractual basis.

"Anne Dingman is a quality person who added a great deal to the overall strength of our administrative team," said Hansen. "We need her services through this transitional period."

Hansen said the process of restructuring Dingman's position will be considered within the bigger picture of continued district improvement. Any changes must be consistent with the recently adopted strategic planning initiative as well as ODDM objectives. The situation will be re-evaluated for the 1995-96 school year. "We intend to realign

the curriculum director's duties in a way appropriate to the changing needs of the district," said Hansen.





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
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Since the first campaign in 1983, PeopleCare has raised more than \$4 million in direct contributions and provided \$4.8 million in energy bill credits.



In a small microwave-safe bowl, sprinkle gelatin over cold water and let stand two minutes. Microwave on high power 40 seconds. Stir well and let stand two minutes or until gelatin is completely dissolved. Cool slightly.

In a medium bowl, stir together yogurt, strawberry syrup and gelatin mixture until smooth. Refrigerate about 30 minutes or until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon.

Place cake on a serving plate. Using a serrated knife, slice a one-inch layer from the top of the cake. Lift off in one piece and set aside.

Cut a trench in the cake about an inch wide and 1 and 1/2 inches deep, leaving one-inch wide inner and outer walls of cake.

With a fork, remove cake in trench without breaking through side or bottom. Spoon strawberry mixture into trench. Cover with reserved cake top. Wrap cake and refrigerate while preparing chocolate syrup whipped cream.



county didn't inform them they were nearing a point where the tax burden was unevenly distributed.

"If we would have had some help, we could have absorbed or adjusted the entire SEV in Jordan Township so we wouldn't have had a factor," he said.

Bolle subsequently said once assessment rolls are turned in by individual townships to his county office, they only note the changes enacted by the review board and check them against comparable surrounding townships.

"We have to assume that when they turn in their rolls, the assessments are uniform," he said.

Brian Meade, a Jordan Township farmer in the meeting audience, complained about property values - and taxes - that

seem to increase every year.

"Wheat prices have steadily dropped for the past 15 years, but because of all the lakes in this county - even as far away as we are from them - our taxes go up every year.

"You can have five millionaires come in and buy up these large pieces of land at whatever price, and that raises everybody's assessment. To be put out of business because rich people can afford it - that's not right."

Nemecek closed his comments at the meeting by reasserting that mistakes were being made on assessments - and encouraging residents to get them corrected this year.

"Come to your board of review next spring," he said. "We'll be there."




