Protection sought for the lower Jordan River

An effort to preserve the pristine beauty of the Jordan River was encouraged by members of the East Jordan City Council at the Feb. 21 meeting.

John Richter, vice-president of the Friends of the Jordan River Watershed, Inc., told council his group is working to complete what the state began in 1972 when the Jordan became the first river in Michigan to be designated wild and scenic.

Wild-Scenic is the label given protected rivers with wild,

forested borders, near development and moderately accessible. The protection is provided under Michigan's Natural Rivers Act (PA 231 of 1970).

The Wild-Scenic designation already follows the river for 73 miles from its headwaters in Chestonia Township, Antrim County, northwest to Rogers Bridge Road in South Arm Township. Richter said the FJRW is petitioning the Department of Natural Resources to continue the designation through the lower river and estuary to the South Arm of Lake Charlevoix, including Deer Creek as far as Barber Road in Wilson Township.

In a letter to the DNR, FJRW explained the petition as necessary because, "We believe that including the lower Jordan and Deer Creek is an essential element to the initial designation and would complete the original intent of the Natural Rivers plan. This in effect would connect and protect an entire riverine system and conforms with current ecosystem management concepts."

Richter said the eagles taking up residence in the lower river represents the high quality of the ecosystem.

"By luck or by design, we have a true natural river here." Richter told the council, "not levied or channeled. If we don't secure and protect it, this region will be irrevocably changed and could succumb to development pressures."

Richter said when the Wild-Scenic designation was bestowed by the state DNR in October, 1972, the lower river wasn't considered qualified for protection.

"We've learned a lot about rivers since then," Richter noted.

One more recently accepted environmental law has implications for the whole region - that of corridors. Ecological corridors, naturally or artificially developed, prevent biologic communities from becoming "islands" isolated by development. Corridors allow the movement

Protection through zoning

Designation of the lower Jordan River as Wild-Scenic would have some effect on present zoning, but mainly on paper, as zoning within the city of East Jordan aiready protects the estuary to a certain extent.

The Friends of the Jordan River Watershed, Inc., are



hoping the following management restrictions already on the rest of the river will be extended along with the Wild-Scenic designation:

• All new development is limited to where 200-foot setbacks for buildings are possible (100 feet on the tributaries).

· Commercial and industrial structures and uses, except campgrounds, are completely prohibited within the management area.

• Land fills or buildings are not allowed within the 400-foot management area where the ground water is within six feet of the surface.

• No damming, dredging, filling, or channelization is permitted on the protected part of the river.

• Docks, signage, grazing and logging have some restrictions.

• Only underground utility lines can be placed within the management area and other utility or pipeline use is generally prohibited.

• Mineral, oil and gas development is banned within the zoned area.

• No new public roads or highways can be constructed within the zone.



The East Jordan Canners, talk of the north

A half century ago when independent basketball was in its glory, the East Jordan Canners were the talk of the north country. Prior to World War II, independent basketball and baseball teams were as popular or more so than high school teams, and practically every little town had its independent quintet. Some small cities had several squads and would play almost anywhere. With other traveling teams available, it made for added interest in the sports. For a period of five years, 1936 to 1940. the EJ Canners were the kingpins of northern Michigan and were champions, or at least proclaimed themselves so.

The Canners were coached by the late Alex Sinclair, manager of the East Jordan Canning Company and former Ellsworth High School coach. Ed Ruehling, local attorney, served as business manager, and Edward "The Bush" Bishaw did the scheduling.

Howard "Hud" Somerville, a former EJHS all-around athlete who played frosh football at Albion College in the fall of 1932, and Marlin "Spin" Cihak were the players around which Sinclair built his team.

Prior to their championship years members of the squad were: Chris Taylor, Abe Cohn (EJHS coach of all sports), Harry Jankoviak (shop teacher), Arne Hegerberg, Bill Taylor, and Harry Lee.

Along with Howard "Slats" Elzinga (later

to become a Central Michigan College football, basketball and track great), Harold "Skinny" Edson (Grand Rapids University letterman), and Herb Peebles joined the club to shore up the champs. All three were Ellsworth residents at the time.

Others who joined the club during the glory years were: Donald LaPeer, Colin Somerville, Donald Johnson, Clarence "Stub" Bowman, William "Tiny" Cihak, Louis "Monk" Cihak, Ed Stanek, Richard "Tich" Saxton, and brother Gayle Saxton (who lettered in basketball and track at Alma College).

The Canners weren't unbeatable and when they were defeated it was likely by the Bon Tons of Petoskey, a team led by outstanding performer Ted Dombroski.

An aspiring physician from Charlevoix County will soon get help with the high cost of medical school, thanks to a special scholarship fund established through the Charlevoix County Community Foundation.

medical school scholarship

The Julius Gilbert Memorial Scholarship will award its first medical school scholarship in the amount of \$500 this spring. The scholarship fund began several years ago to honor Julius Gilbert, a prominent community activist and dedicated trustee of the Charlevoix Area Hospital. With current assets of nearly \$10,000, the fund was transferred from the care of the hospital to management under the community foundation late last year. Applicants must be from Charlevoix County and have completed their undergraduate degree. The future doctors will be rated on their academic performance, student service, personal interests, and letters of reference. A committee representing the Charlevoix Area Hospital will evaluate applications and recommend a candidate to the community foundation for final approval.

Superintendent discusses city potential

With a month of experience working in the city of East Jordan, interim city superintendent William Hughes is ready to make some observations.

He brought those observations to the Feb. 21 city council meeting.

"It seems the city is in an opportune position to make plans," Hughes told council members. He noted that the annual budget writing is in the final stages and several outside influences need consideration (the recently-adopted recreation master plan and DDA plans, for example).

"Perhaps we should consider a master 'wish list' of the capital improvements the community is looking to the city for," Hughes said.

He asked for an indication that his observations were consistent with the direction the council would like to see the city aim. Hughes included a "shotgun" estimate of the costs of projects, based on his experience, and outlined projects with grant potential, such as airport and industrial park road improvements.

Hughes gave high priority to several DPW and councilrequested projects already in the works and budgeted for the 1995-96 fiscal year, primarily street, water and sewer improvements. One DDA request is on the high priority list – replacement of the Main Street water main. Some ideas considered low priority are the DDA dream of relocating the police department; the recreation plan for resurfacing tennis courts; and a Ninth Street access to the new middle school the school district hopes voters will approve.

"We have more needs than the city can obviously accomplish, but prioritizing them gives us a place to start," Hughes noted.

City services update

The new superintendent's report included an evaluation of city services. Hughes felt the city has done well in budgeting the safety programs (police, fire and ambulance.)

"I haven't heard any real dissatisfaction from council or city residents," said Hughes.

He had the same opinion of the city transfer station, although he would like to see it operating with more profitability.

Hughes said the Department of Public Works needs some attention in the immediate future.

"Water and sewer services need to be self-funding," Hughes said. There are also some problem areas with streets, but he reported the situation is not out-of-hand.

The master plan for parks and recreation in the city is a good start on an another service in need of attention, Hughes told the council.

"The abundance of facilities is an asset to the quality of the community," he noted, "But it is also a financial burden to the city." A council discussion ensued on the state of individual facilities and especially the future of Elm Pointe.

While there is no budget earmarked for economic development, Hughes pointed out its importance to the city.

"My philosophy is to assist in this in as many ways as possible," Hughes said. He suggested industrial park development, a business retention plan, and a city brochure as some ways to promote the economic viability of the city.


Need a helping hand?





Ellsworth proved to be of little difficulty for the Red



Recentlly we featured a recipe created by a man (Jim Pemberton) for all you fellows out there who like to spend a little time at the stove. Well, we hope you didn't drink all your beer with the Tulsa Eggs because this week's recipe is just as hot and fingerlickin' good. Jim created this recipe, which is very quick and easy, but loaded with hot and spicy flavor.

Cajun Barbecued Shrimp 1 c. butter, divided 1 small onion, chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 tsp. red pepper 1 tsp. black pepper 1/2 tsp. white pepper 1/2 tsp. crushed red pepper 1/2 tsp. dried whole thyme 1/2 tsp. dried whole rosemary, crushed

1/8 tsp. dried whole oregano1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce1 lb. unpeeled jumbo shrimp, uncooked1/2 c. chicken broth

1/4 c. beer

2 c. hot cooked rice


Fresh parsley sprigs (optional) French bread

Melt 1/2 cup butter in a large skillet. Add onion and next 9 ingredients; cook 1 minute stirring constantly. Add shrimp; cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly.

Add remaining 1/2 cup butter and chicken broth; cook 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in beer and cook 1 minute. Remove from heat. Remove shrimp from skillet. Mound rice in center of skillet and arrange shrimp around rice. Garnish with parsley if desired. Serve with warmed French bread. Yield: 2 to 3 servings.

Whenever we have this dish at horne, we put the skillet right on the table and go for it. Be sure to dip your bread in the sauce – you won't want to waste any of it. It is also a good idea to give everyone a moist towel or napkin as this dish is a bit on the messy side.

This whole meal takes about 15 minutes to prepare, so guys, how about making it for dinner tonight? We guarantee it will put a little spice in your life!





continued from front necessary to the existence of some animals, such as eagles, which need a massive habitat for survival.

Richter called the Jordan Valley corridor "a crucial and vital link to the entire watershed."

The FJRW hopes to have the support of the city in their petition. Richter noted the identity of the city centers around the river.

"We can't put a value on the eagles, but thousands of people visit annually just to see the Jordan Valley," he said. "The value of preservation outweighs the profits of development."

The FJRW proposal requests that state zoning rules be extended to protect the lower Jordan along with the Wild-Scenic designation. According to the present DNR management plan for the river, the management zone is a land strip 400 feet wide on each side of the river.

Land ownership is not affected by the management plan, but certain types of development and use are controlled. Such management (see box) is designed to protect and enhance the river's unique qualities while continuing to provide quality recreation opportunities. Recreational use of the river would be generally unchanged, as the restrictions against motorized vehicles in the estuary already exist.

Council members seemed not too concerned with the state zoning requirements as most of the affected shoreline within city limits is already zoned with waterfront restrictions. The city would continue administering the management area. Only in the case of a conflict does the state zoning supersede municipal zoning.

The council will consider an endorsement of the designation after reviewing available information and a zoning impact study suggested by interim city superintendent William Hughes.


