

Voters to decide on proposed city charter

With the vote for the proposed East Jordan city charter only days away - Mon., April 24 – members of the charter commission are making every effort to promote understanding of the document.

The commission was elected in November, 1993, to rewrite the present charter, which has not been revised since it was composed in 1911.

The proposed charter is a vision of East Jordan, both present and future. Chairman Tom Sheridan said the focus of the charter commission was to form a city government that would have the best opportunity to function in today's world and the future.

Sheridan explained that in many ways, the document officially sanctions practices already in effect because of state statute.

"The 1911 charter is in conflict with the state," said Sheridan. "It often causes discomfort for city government officials." He noted that state statute overrides city statute, forcing actions and decisions which may be in violation of the present city charter.

Sheridan said there are many examples of activities already in practice or within the realm of city powers not included in the old charter. The city's power to tax or to secure property easements are well-established practices regulated by the state, yet are not defined in the 1911 version.

Sheridan noted that anyone reading the proposed charter can easily identify the required state statutes (there are dozens of them), as each is followed by a Michigan code that looks something like this: MSA 5.2083[1]: MCLA 117.4k.

A look at details

One of the most positive aspects of the proposed charter, Sheridan feels, is the opportunity to provide more effective leadership of the city.

"The charter enhances the position of city council members," he said, "and makes the mayor a more effective leader."

The way the charter does this is, Sheridan explained, is through several changes:

■ Treatment of the city as a business organization - with a professional administrator that deals with daily activities, has the expertise to design and handle a million dollar budget, and is supervised by a board of commissioners elected by the people.

"The day is gone when the average citi-

zen can comprehend huge budget decisions," noted Sheridan.


■ Provides for the board of commissioners to be elected by all the people, thereby eliminating wards.

"There will be one precinct in the city," continued on page 3

A charter for the future

Some details of the proposed city charter:

- Mayor elected annually from within council membership by council members at the first organizational meeting after general elections; has one vote on council; serves as representative of the city
- All city voters elect seven council members for 4-year
- Seven member council oversees policies, ordinances and city administrator
- City administrator manages all departments; designs and implements an annual budget; executes policy directions of council; keeps council advised
- Each city resident has seven representatives on council
- A zoning ordinance, planning commission, and comprehensive land use plan are sanctioned
- The city is required to adopt a six-year capital improvements

Fire damages Iron Works

A stray spark during repairs of steel decking set off a blaze in the emissions control unit at the East Jordan Iron Works the afternoon of April 14.

Vice president Tad Malpass said the blaze was quickly contained and caused minimal damage. He attributed the limited damage, estimated between \$10,000 and \$50,000, to the quick response of the East Jordan Fire Department.


"They got here in a hurry and got it under control," he said. Boyne City and Charlevoix fire departments also responded, but the fire was extinguished before their arrival.

Malpass said the most visible damage was to fiberglass siding on the outside of the unit. A few extra workmen came in over the weekend and have already repaired the inside damage. The plant regularly shuts down operations for the weekend, and Malpass said everything was running normally on Monday. Operations are not expected to be hampered by the fire.

Malpass praised the fire department for quick action.

"They prevented what could have been an extremely serious situation."

It's about 59 years since I first had two of my top front teeth knocked out while playing baseball under the late Raymond "Chirp" Swafford at Harbor Springs in the middle 1930s. That was my initial experience with a dental injury. There have been more, but at the price of teeth today, I certainly hope it never happens again.

The Harbor Springs incident happened in my senior year while playing baseball for my native East Jordan High School in 1936. The bases were loaded with no one out and Coach Swafford ordered me to move in from my position at third base. Although I felt that I was in as far as I dared, I obeyed his order.

"Spike" Russell, a left-hander, was on the mound. The late Clarence "Stubb" Bowman was behind the plate. At bat was the hard-hitting Ram's outfielder, Mose King, who later played with a number of semi-pro teams before World War II.

I had no more than arrived at my closein position when I heard a wham! as King connected, and a bam! as the sphere sped through the lacing of my glove, and knocked two of my upper teeth somewhere – I never was able to find them.

Shortly after graduation, I was raking the ball diamond at the old Charlevoix County Fairgrounds, smoothing the surface for the ball game that was about to start, when I heard and felt the same "Bam!" This time I had one tooth missing in my lower jaw.

I immediately looked down and there was my pearl-white tooth. I picked it up and one of my brothers drove me to a dentist, Dr. George Betchold, who gently put it back in place saying, "This may work, but if it does it will likely give you trouble some time in the future."


That particular "some time" was three or four months ago, when it appeared that I had an infection in the area where the tooth was implanted almost 60 years ago. I called my dentist, Dr. Raleigh Newman, who did a root canal or something like that to it. I am back in circulation with no pain and the tooth is solidly in place.

I'll take inventory of what has happened to my teeth since 1936 – three times broken playing football at Alma College, and two other occasions when playing basketball in the U.S. Army while stationed in Chicago.

So help me, this is the Gospel truth, though I am not going to fight with you or anyone else for fear of again having dental difficulty.

Who knows – sometime soon I may even have a set of dentures, but I hope not!

Sheriff recognizes efforts

When this case was reported to the sheriff's office on May 6, 1994, investiga-

tors had to start with limited evidence and no suspects. Between Friday, May 6, and the arrest of the perpetrator on the following Thursday, investigators put an excess of 200 hours on the investigation, working several nights 16 hours straight.

This was a true case of team work and cooperation between members of the sheriff's office and crucial assistance from the crime lab. As sheriff, I'm very proud to have the professional caliber of officers working for the sheriff's office and the citizens of Charlevoix County.

In this issue I will acquaint you with the community as a whole. Perhaps I should say township, as our communities are seemingly divided by our hills. There is a highland district on either side and a long broad valley district between. This is the district in which I live.

It reminds me of a gravy dish sent to me from Japan. There is no handle on it, but instead a lip at each end.

M-66 comes in at the south end of the dish, at the division. The new road skirts the Hogs Back range of hills all the way along the west side of the valley (or gravy dish) finally leaving at the north end and entering East Jordan in Charlevoix County. You can also turn right at Chestonia on the Old-68 Road and skirt the Bohemian hills, joining the eastern side of the bowl. That also brings you out the northern lip into East Jordan.

The valley is about one mile wide at the widest point with the Jordan River flowing the full length of it.

Probably many of you are well acquainted with these facts. But if you have not driven over these roads, let me tell you that the valley has a very special beauty, both during the growing season and in the fall when

the hills glow with color. Every road seems to call for exploration.

Have you ever sat down with an old atlas of our county (1910) and studied the old roads? Looked at the names on the old homesteads and tried to locate them on existing roads or to connect them with people now living?

I have, and to me there is as much mystery and romance to be found here as on our western frontiers. What adventures in homebuilding they must have had, and where are they now?

Some of them are still here! We have some newer neighbors too, and some visitors. Would you like to meet some of us through this column?

You might even see someone from home!

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Sheridan feels the proposed charter provides the best of two worlds - the city council will do all the policy-making, yet won't have the responsibility of enforcing the policies. Council will hire someone to

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"A lot of people have studied the charter and have intelligent questions." He and other commissioners have fielded a number of concerns, often coming from people misunderstanding what they have read or

heard about the proposed charter. There is a great deal of "legal language" in the document that can be difficult for the layman to comprehend.

"Most have responded favorably to an explanation," he noted. "People have been overwhelmingly positive that it's time for an update of the charter."

He emphasized the proposed charter has a built-in review schedule of every 10 years. An appointed citizens committee will be charged to study the document and any recommended amendments must be approved by the voters.



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

The fee for a one-week session is \$290 and includes all meals, lodging, activities and diabetes medical supplies. Campers are accepted on a firstcome, first-served basis.

City completes budget process

The East Jordan City Council approved a resolution to adopt the 1995-96 fiscal year budget at the March 21 meeting.

The budgeted general fund expenditures total \$960,487, about \$80,000 more than in 1994-95. Expected revenues of \$1,113,306 are an increase of \$163,000 over last year.

The overflow between revenues and disbursements will be distributed among other tax-supported funds including the transfer station, which will be in the red for about \$8,000, and street maintenance costs (\$293,535), both of which are budgeted at a deficit. The transfer station is expected to eventually break even.

Other tax-supported funds go to purchase and maintain city equipment. That fund is balanced at \$254,460.

Self-supporting city services include the harbor (\$107,897 - down about \$30,000 from 1995-96); Tourist Park (\$91,144 - down about \$2,000 from last year), sewers (\$265,269 - up from last year's budget of \$180,980) and water (\$265,130 - an increase of about \$30,000).

Debt funds and capitol projects the city manages have balanced revenues and expenditures. They include harbor debt (\$68,505), and sewer lagoon debt (\$117,128).

The police department's budget request was trimmed by about \$10,000 for a total of \$273,826. The fire department faced similar treatment with the budget request of \$89,965 trimmed by \$13,000. The ambulance department actually requested less than the final figure of \$104,593.

Elm Pointe buildings will receive some sorely needed repairs with \$5,000 budgeted for garage improvements, and \$3,500 budgeted for general repairs. These account for the increase in Elm Pointe's budget from \$15,120 last year to \$27,745 in 1995-96.

Burglary suspect spotted leaving home

A person checking on the home of a vacationing friend may have disrupted a burglary in progress April 8.

A friend of Douglas Bennett, owner of the home at 4317 Mount Bliss, was inspecting the residence while Bennett was on vacation. While approaching the home, the complainant noticed a white male running out from the back of the building and into the woods.

The suspect is described as weighing about 200 pounds, is six-feet tall, and was wearing a black jacket with white sleeves.

Entry had apparently been gained into the home by breaking out a west side bedroom window. Windows in a storage building and a camper on the property were also discovered broken.

It is believed nothing was taken, but the sheriff department is awaiting confirmation by the home owner.

No injury in rollover

Janice Fenske, 40, of East Jordan escaped injury when she lost control of her vehicle and rolled over in the ditch April 4

Fenske was southbound on M-66 just south of Eddy School Road about 7 a.m., when she hit an icy patch and ran off the road into the west side ditch.






Graduation Day

During Frank's working years, his wife, Mariadna, with their two daughters and son, summered in the Walloon Lake area. Frank spent time with them when he could. Mariadna's grandfather built the first house on the north shore of Walloon Lake and she had been coming to the area since she was a young girl.

Frank likes to keep busy. In addition to swimming, he bicycles from Boyne City to Boyne Falls and back, usually five times a week during the summer months. He says he doesn't like to read because he falls asleep.

He is also a member of the Northern Michigan Hospital Auxiliary and volunteers at the hospital one day a week.

While there he helps patients - guiding them to their rooms, helping them get settled, helping those who are wheelchair bound, and so on. As a member of RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program), he is frequently called upon to pick someone up and take them to appointments, or otherwise help out.

Frank's daughters are in Boyne City, and Maine, and his son lives in Washington State. He has seven grandchildren.

For those who swim regularly with Frank, he is an inspiration to stay active and keep physically fit. With his 82nd birthday just around the corner (April 24), he is a role model who should motivate us all!
