New charter transition begins

"The new charter will create some changes for our community," Tom Sheridan told the East Jordan City Council at the May 2 meeting.

As chairman of the charter commission, Sheridan was there to arrange a transitional workshop with council members. The session, scheduled for Tues., May 23, 7 p.m., at City Hall, will include the city council, charter commission, and attorneys for each organization.

Sheridan said the session is necessary to educate the council on re-writing ordinances and other charter directives. Transitional elections will also be outlined.

The new charter takes effect Wed., May 24 - 30 days after the election.

One of the first actions taken by city council to comply with the new charter was to adopt a resolution consolidating city

voting precincts. The complete boundaries of the city now define the one precinct, eliminating the former three wards.

All registered voters will be issued new voter registration informing them of the change.

During the first transitional year, 1995, voters will elect four commissioners as representatives. Those elected will serve a term of almost four years, beginning Jan. 1, 1996, and ending in November, 1999. Mike Dionne, Lyle Etcher, Russ Peck, and Brian Sweet face re-election.

After this November's election, the new city commission will elect a mayor from among the seven members. The commissioner chosen must have already served at least one year on the council or commission.

The deadline for submitting nominating petitions for commission seats is Tues., May 16, at 4 p.m.

"I regret I won't be able to take on the opportunity," Hughes told the council. He cited both economics and the long winters in the area as reasons.

"After living in California," said Hughes, "My family and I had problems becoming climatized."

"I won't say I'm not disappointed," said council member Brian Sweet.

With customary efficiency, Hughes provided a job description draft and other information for council to begin the search for the right person to fill the position, as required by the new city charter (see box on back page). He agreed to stay on as interim superintendent until June 10, and said he hoped to be involved in at least the first screening of candidates.

Hughes also brought up the subject of price.

"It's to the city's benefit to establish a salary range," he told council. "You'll get more serious candidates."

He recommended considering a salary of about \$45,000, and offered a survey of regional city administrator salaries as a guideline.

After some discussion, council fixed the range at \$36,000-\$46,000, and determined to advertise in local newspapers, Michigan Municipal League (MML) publications, continued on back

It seems strange that during the past week I have had three different parents tell me their children, former students of mine, have just received their driver's license. It causes the parent some concern as they realize that their son or daughter is growing up.

Do you recall how you learned to drive? If you are like me, you did not have the benefit of driver's training. I was 14 years old at the time and barely able to reach the pedals of the Model T Ford, or "Tin Lizzy" as it was commonly known. One could get a driver's license in those days at age 14 for a mere 50ϕ – no written test or demonstration drive.

As I recall, my dad gave me approximately five minutes of instruction and told me to get behind the wheel. I had long before learned how to crank the Model T that's the way you started a car in those days, at least in the summer. Our Model T was a mighty hard starter in the winter months.

There were two levers attached to the

gency brake; the center pedal was for backing up and the right pedal was the brake.

With all these instructions firmly in mind, I took off with a chug. I don't think my dad trusted my steering, because he had me drive for the first time on a country road. I was safe as long as I kept the wheels in the ruts and didn't meet an approaching car.

Passing in those days on such roads was out of the question, but that was okay with most people as they weren't going any place in a hurry. It's odd how the speed capabilities of the automobile have also sped up our lives. Most of us always seem in a hurry.

Today there is the question of whether a teenager should learn to drive with a stick shift or an automatic transmission. I didn't have either to contend with – nor did I have a turn signal, speedometer or stop light.

I found one of the most difficult tasks I had in driving a Model T was operating the windshield wiper. One had to operate it by hand. Notice I said wiper not wipers, for they were only on the driver's side in those


There were three pedals and the emergency brake. The left pedal was used to put the car in gear as you lowered the emer-

Tribunal reinstates original Jordan assessments

It was nearly a clean sweep of vindication for fired Jordan Township assessor John McDonald in the commissioners room of the county building last month.

After reviewing the assessments of seven Jordan Township agricultural property owners April 26 and 27, state tribunal hearing officer Douglas Lasher ruled the reductions granted to six of them by the township board of review last year were unwarranted.

"I am restoring the assessments to their original 1994 levels," Lasher said. "All of the data and testimony support that the assessments were not excessive to begin with."

At about 8:45 a.m., Larry Smith was backing his 1995 Ford pickup from a parking space in the Mill Street FMB Northwestern Bank lot when he struck the side of a passing 1988 Toyota driven by Mary Barnum.

Review board chairman Lawrence Nemecek had the lone board of review reduction upheld by the tribunal. His two parcels were originally lowered \$15,600 by fellow board of review members.

"I think his will end up pretty close to where the board of review put it," Lasher said.

The tribunal hearing officer did not rule on the case of Jordan Township agricultural property owner Lawrence Trojanek, pending review of the documents he provided.

The agricultural assessments were appealed to the tribunal by the state tax commission, an unusual occurrence, Lasher said. Tax commission representative Patrick Suboski, who attended the hearings, declined comment.

"Upon investigation, it was determined that the board of review acted improperly and the reductions that were made are unwarranted," Suboski said in a written statement to the tribunal explaining the tax commission's involvement.

Five township property owners waived their tribunal hearing and agreed to pay the pre-board of review assessment on their disputed agricultural parcels. Property owned by township clerk Leona Stanek and her husband Charles was among those assessments reinstated without a hearing. The assessments on the Staneks' two parcels were lowered \$10,000 by the board of review last year.

Property owners ruled against by the tribunal included: • Review board member Sue Falco. Three parcels owned by her and husband Roger were lowered \$9,500 by the review board.

· Township supervisor Joseph Haney, Sr., whose original assessment was lowered \$5,100.

The amount the landowners are now to pay will not include the factor that was placed on all agricultural property in the township by the tax commission, due to an unfair distribution of the tax burden. While those farm owners who didn't have assessments lowered by the review board paid more than their share of property taxes, those who ended up at the tribunal will not.

Lasher offered no explanation, only saying, "This is the way it's done almost all of the time."

McDonald, who attended the hearings to answer questions about his 1994 assessments, was satisfied with the tribunal's rulings. He was fired as assessor last month by the township board, which originally cited "repeated mistakes" as the explanation for his dismissal.

"It makes me feel good - I thought they (the original assessments) were fair all along," he said. "I thought I did a good job, and this verifies it.'

Suboski's written statement to the tribunal concurs.

"I was favorably impressed with the correctness of McDonald's appraisals and resulting assessments, and request that these assessments be reinstated," he wrote.

Jim Galbraith, part of a Jordan Township Citizen Committee seeking to recall Stanek, Haney and trustee Lucille Lercel for reappointing Nemecek and Falco to the review board (among other reasons) said he was pleased with the tribunal's findings - but not surprised.

"I couldn't imagine them doing anything other than reversing the board of review's actions - it's the correct thing to do," he said.

Individual property owners may not receive notification of the tribunal's rulings for two to four months, Lasher said, due to a small clerical staff processing departmental paperwork for the entire state.

Health-related scholarships available through auxiliary

The Northern Michigan Hospital Auxiliary is overseeing the awarding of 15 scholarships for students enrolled in accredited nursing or other health services programs.

"The auxiliary's goal is to encourage new students into an accredited health care field and to assist those who are continuing in their health courses," said Ruth O'Gawa, Manager of Volunteer Services at Northern Michigan Hospital.

Ten scholarships in the amount of \$750 each are funded by the Northern Michigan Hospital Auxiliary, and two in the amount of \$750 each are funded by the Northern Michigan Hospital Board of Trustees. In addition, three nursing scholarships will be awarded-one in the amount of \$450 funded in memory of Ruth H. Reberg, one in the amount of \$500 funded by the Little Traverse Bay Quilt Guild, and one in the amount of \$1,000 funded in memory of Drs. George and John Reycraft.

Candidates applying for the scholarships must reside in Emmet Charlevoix Otsego, Chippewa, Mackinaw or Alpena counties.

The scholarships may be awarded to the same student for a second year only upon extreme financial need. Students enrolled in pre-nursing or other prehealth care programs will not be considered for this scholarship until they have been accepted into an accredited health service program.

Although she obviously enjoys motherhood, she realizes her children must also face disappointments in life, and that's tough for her.


"But being there to help when it happens is what counts," she emphasized.
