Class project benefits Habitat for Humanity

"We were building something and so does the Habitat for Humanity," explained fifth-grade teacher Gary Peters. "It gave the project an appropriate world connection."

The project he was discussing is the handsome gambrel-roof, 6-by-8-foot storage shed built by the fifth-graders of East Jordan Elementary.

The project, funded by a Malpass Mini-grant, was a lesson in measurement, algebraic functions, geometry, the Pythagorean Theorem, and construction skills, among many others. Every student built a 1/6 scale model of the shed, said Peters, adding fractions and ratios to the collection of necessary proficiencies.

The completed project will be sold through auction, with the total sales price donated to the Habitat for Humanity, so the students gain the more worldly lesson of charity to their fellow humans.

Peters said working together helped strengthen cooperative skills, while lan-

guage abilities will undoubtedly be improved as the students write advertisement copy for the auction.

The shed, which is now on display in front of the elementary school, will be sold to the highest bidder in a silent auction, now in progress. The school will accept daily bids until Wed., June 7, at 12 noon. The highest daily bid will be posted on the shed, so interested buyers can try to outbid until closing.

The shed was built with 2-by-4-foot walls and Wolmanized 2-by-4-foot floors under 3/4-inch OSB tongue-andgroove floor decking. The siding is OSB, rough-sawn look, a slate gray with pine trim, and the shed is roofed with 3-tab fiberglass shingles.

The starting bid is \$200, although more than \$500 worth of materials have gone into the construction. The successful bidder must pay the full price by June 15, and the shed will be delivered to the location of choice within the East Jordan School District. The new owner must arrange for transportation outside the district.

• "Ice cream people," providing weekly treats





city council briefs May 16 meeting

■ The council agreed to a request from Cheri Leach of Raven Hill Discovery Center to donate a section of old railroad track in storage at the transfer station.

Leach explained that a donated caboose will be mounted on the tracks to provide another attraction at the education center.

Interim city superintendent William Hughes reported that another possible hotel/motel complex may be in the works for the property behind the Jordan Valley Express Dance Center. He said the company may present a proposal to lower the cost of installing water and sewer lines to the site, since city ordinance requires a payment of \$1,200 for each hook-up. The proposed building would contain 40 units, costing \$96,000 to the developer.

The council heard a report that 35 junk ordinance violations have been issued by the East Jordan Police Department over the last two months. Chief Jerry Alward said 21 properties have been cleaned up, 13 received a 10day extension to clean up, and one property owner will be jailed if the property is not cleaned up by June 1.

Five petitions were filed for the upcoming city commission election in November. Running for the four commission seats are former council member Greg Chappuies and current members Mike Dionne, Lyle Etcher, Russ Peck and Brian Sweet.

Assessor questions reimbursement

ECHO TOWNSHIP -A significant disparity exists in per-parcel payments for assessors in Antrim County's 15 townships.

At the Echo Township Board's May 9 meeting, township assessor Patricia Niepoth pointed out wage differences of up to \$8.40 per unit in 12 townships responding to a request for information (see chart).

While Forest Area, Chestonia and Jordan townships didn't supply information for the chart, subsequent phone contact revealed the two latter townships average \$5 to \$7 per parcel, Niepoth said.

"Five dollars per parcel is about the average in Antrim County," she noted. "At this time, I'm being paid \$2.73 per parcel."

According to available figures, only two townships pay less than Echo -Mancelona (\$2.61) and Star (\$1.07).

The highest per-parcel payment is made in Central Lake Township, where the assessor earns \$9.47 per parcel.

The board will discuss the assessor payment issue at their next meeting, supervisor Bob Pearsall said. The next meeting of the Echo Township Board will be July 11 at 7:30 p.m. in the Echo Township Hall (a week later than usual, due to the July 4th holiday).




Daniel Sinclair


Game two was tight-that is until East Jordan posted a six-run inning to give Bellaire a double-dose of the blues, 7-5.



also mentioned a very special appreciation for the Grandvue Auxiliary.

"Volunteers make a big difference in the quality of life of Grandvue residents," said Southard.

Southard said the continuing rise in numbers of Grandvue clients with some form of dementia makes the future work of volunteers even more important. Presently with 63 percent of the residents in this category, at least 63 percent of staff programming efforts are dedicated toward them. Volunteers provide more and more for the other 27 percent - the alert residents who have interests and activity needs.

Grandvue Administrator Penny Drury added that

future projections point to an increase of Alzheimer residents to as much as 90 percent of total Grandvue residents.

Drury also outlined some of the changes at the facility, including a kitchen renovation, and expanded dining area. The kitchen is designed for more accessibility for residents. Both improvements make possible expanded resident-directed activities, and a need for volunteer help.

But Drury's primary focus was to thank the volunteers. She called the dinner a small token.

"We really can't express our appreciation in just one dinner," she told the group. "You provide a service we couldn't do without."

Big saving in paving

The township's costs for paving 2.33 miles of Skinkle Road have been reduced by \$25,000, thanks to cooperation from the Antrim County Road Commission.

Originally budgeted at \$96,000, asphalt costs will tumble by taking advantage of the availability of materials being used to pave a portion of M-66, supervisor Bob Pearsall said.

The cost-saving measure reduces total township outlay for the project to about \$114,000. An additional \$43,000 in road preparation costs will be paid by the county.
