School board candidates voice ideas, opinions

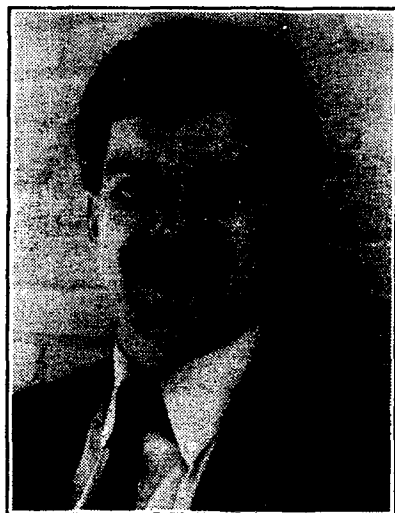

With two school board seats open this coming election day, and just two candidates – John Kempton and Kevin Keane – the results of the vote are given.

Keane will be the newest member of the board, replacing the retiring Herb Griffin. A consultant in information systems technology, Keane came to East Jordan in 1992 to provide his expertise in a systems upgrade at East Jordan Iron Works.

Keane has been involved with the district through membership on the technology committee and as a member of the Facility Review committee (FRC) instrumental in recommending a new middle school.

He made the decision to get involved because of family – parents who served as both school teachers and administrators – and his own two pre-schoolers.

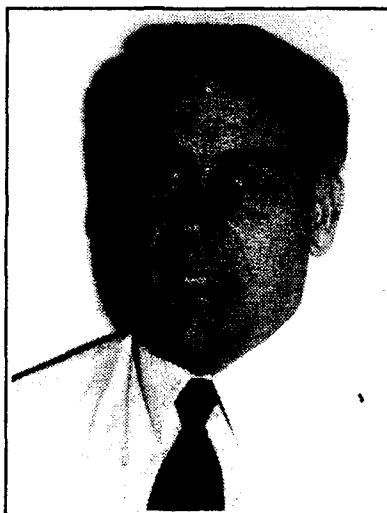

"I want to be involved even before they enter school to help provide really good schools for them," said Keane.

Keane feels his strong business background, as well as his technology expertise, will be an asset to the school board.

"It's important for schools to be able to

compete – both academically and as a business," he said. "I can help prepare the school district for that competition."

But Keane's strongest goal is to promote appropriate technology while also focusing on fundamental skills. He feels technology can provide important sup-

port for those skills through self-paced educational programs such as the present elementary Integrated Learning Systems, and PACE, the interactive television network that allows students to take courses the district is otherwise unable to provide on site.

"Information technologies are key to helping students perform in society," Keane said.

John Kempton, a one-term veteran of the school board, will focus his attention in the next four years on resolving the problem of overcrowded facilities and test score improvement. As the facilitator of the FRC, he saw the defeat of the millage for a new middle school and renovations of existing buildings with disappointment.

"It is my intent to help educate and/or negotiate a resolution to this very critical issue," he said.

Schools face more financial difficulties

A Michigan Supreme Court decision to require the state to pre-fund retirement benefits will have a profoundly negative effect on all schools, according to East Jordan district superintendent Chip Hansen.

"State schools are reeling from this multi-million dollar issue," Hansen reported to the school board at the May 25 meeting. "It could cost East Jordan as much as \$300,000 next year."

The pre-funding requirement is an effort to keep the retirement fund solvent. School districts would be expected to pay now for future staff retirement benefits.

Hansen said the district finance committee is developing the budget with a close eye on the issue. The pending 1995-96 budget may have to be re-written to drop as much as \$172,000 to balance, if

the worst case occurs and the district has to come up with the money.

Other budget considerations include the addition of a fifth first-grade classroom, the purchase of an elementary language arts curriculum, and a \$135,000 commitment to continued upgrading of the technology infrastructure.

Some internal shifting of teachers will provide staff for the new first-grade section. Margaret Lasater, presently assigned to fifth grade will teach the new section. Margo Brandell will replace Lasater, transferring from her position as Exploratory Arts teacher, and Laura Reid will transfer from her part time PREP position to the full time Exploratory Arts.

Some other internal staff changes may help save the district money. Hansen explained that replacing retired curriculum director Anne Dingman with a certified staff member would cost more than other options presently in consideration.

"We're looking at supporting all the principals with administrative assistants to handle discipline and some other responsibilities, so principals can spend more time on curriculum and education issues," said Hansen. "This direction is more cost effective."

The final budget will be reviewed at a public hearing set for Mon., June 19, 6:30 p.m., at the elementary media center.

Close-up view of Lake Charlevoix

Sixth graders from East Jordan Middle School had a unique opportunity during the recent Student Lake Days sponsored by the Lake Charlevoix Association.

Science classes from East Jordan, as well as Boyne City and Charlevoix, received hands-on experience monitoring and recording the factors that determine the health of the Lake Charlevoix ecosystem during two days of lake excursions, May 10 and 11.

The students, in groups of about 50, were bussed to the Beaver Island Boat Company dock in Charlevoix, where they boarded the vessel *South Shore* for the trip out on the lake. Despite the cold and rainy weather the students were warmly enthusiastic.

After a short demonstration of water safety devices, the group split into working parties of about 12 students, with each party rotating through the four stations on board.

At the Water Chemistry station, students handled electronic meters and probes, charting temperatures and oxygen values at different depths.

Millage renewal on ballot

Along with the election of two school board members, East Jordan district voters will consider a non-homestead millage renewal, Mon., June 12.

Because the Headlee Amendment rolls back the 24-mill non-homestead tax intended by Proposal A to 6 mills, most schools have been forced to ask voters to approve the remaining 18 mills to achieve the total necessary for school operations.

Many school districts in the region presented this renewal a year ago, after the March, 1994 passage of Proposal A, but East Jordan had a 25.6-mill levy already in place from 1991. Through the State Aid Act, the district

had the authority to continue that levy for one more year.

The millage renewal, requested for a 20-year period, will not effect taxes on primary homes. Realistically, the renewal will not effect taxes on businesses or other non-homestead property either, but maintain the same rate currently in effect.

East Jordan Schools are asking for the 20-year commitment in an effort to ensure a stable millage rate, stable funding, and minimal election costs, according to district superintendent Chip Hansen.

Polls will be open at the East Jordan Civic Center from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., Mon., June 12.

With the start of summer, youngsters are looking around for jobs, and oldsters, like myself, are trying to figure out ways to get out of work.

Reflecting on my youth in the heart of the Great Depression, I recall my initial wage earning experience. I bought candy bars from my uncle at three cents each and sold them for a nickel in the afternoon at the East Jordan Iron Works. If I sold a dozen or more, I considered myself lucky.

A quarter in those days would buy two hamburgers and a bottle of pop, though I could ill afford the luxury. Like other youth of that era, I mowed lawns, picked strawberries, cherries, apples and beans, and hoed gardens for as little as ten cents an

hour. Later I washed dishes in my uncle's restaurant and finally worked up to a short-order cook.

As I look back now to my many years of toil, I can rightfully say that I was a "jack of all trades and master of none." Later on in my youth, I commenced to write a little for area newspapers – most of the time for nothing. I also worked as a woodcutter, shocked hay, did janitor work and helped my dad in the draying business.

After graduation from high school I worked for a couple of summers in a canning factory and officiated high school athletic contests in the winter.

It took me four years to decide that back-

Help prevent dog bites

This June 12-17, the Charlevoix County Humane Society, in conjunction with the Humane Society of the United States and the United States Postal Service, is introducing the first annual National Dog Bite Prevention Week. The goal of the week is to reduce dog bites in this country by promoting responsible pet ownership.

The HSUS estimates that over 2-3 million dog bites are reported annually. Millions more go unreported. Sixty percent of all dog bite victims are children, and the elderly – delivery persons, and letter carriers are also affected. Last year, over 2,700 letter carriers were bitten while on the job – an average of 10 attacks daily.

Fortunately, dog bites are a problem we can all help solve. Studies have shown that most dog bites are a result of irresponsible dog ownership. Unsterilized dogs are up to three times as likely to bite than dogs who are spayed and neutered. In addition, dogs who lack proper training and socialization, or who spend long hours chained out in the backyard, are much more likely to develop inappropriate behavior problems such as aggression.

These factors remain consistent in dogs who bite, while other characteristics, such as breed, change from year to year depending on the popularity of a certain type of

dog.

As dog owners, we can prevent dog bites by spaying or neutering our pets, prohibiting our dogs from roaming, training and socializing our dogs, and making them true members of our families. As parents, we can teach our children safety around dogs.

Please join us in reducing dog bites in our community.

breaking labor, though honorable, wasn't for me. I figured there must be an easier way and packed my shoe box and headed off to college. There my previous working experiences paid off. I again washed dishes, raked and mowed lawns, shoveled snow and continued to officiate as I worked my way through college.

Uncle Sam took care of my employment for a period of almost four years, appointing me as an Army ROTC instructor. With the end of WWII, I returned to college, picking up where I had left off.

During the summers between my junior and senior years, I worked on construction jobs — mixing, pouring and wheeling cement, carrying cinder blocks, operating a jack hammer and for a while served as a flagman. How I lived through those two summers is still a mystery to me. I didn't earn much money but I got in shape for football and that was mighty important to me at the time.

Some of the jobs that I have held since graduation from college include serving as a teacher, coach, athletic director, school administrator, summer recreation director, writer, sports-

caster, deputy sheriff and summer graduate student.

Of all my occupations, I liked classroom teaching the best. Hard labor was not for me. Like the fellow said, "I've had no trouble finding a job — I had 11 of them the past year."

Today I like work so well that I can sit right down beside it and fall asleep.

East Jordan native Gayle Saxton has been writing, reporting, and broadcasting sports for many years. Now a retired educator in Houghton Lake, "Sax" will share his memories of East Jordan and his many friends through this column in future issues of the Journal. fought for permanent tax cuts for small businesses and families.

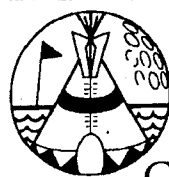

Program gives the joy of reading

Three times a year, students from the Prep program through eighth grade at East Jordan Schools – about 900 in all – have the opportunity to choose a free book.

The books are provided by a federal program called Reading is Fundamental (RIF), established to promote the joy of reading.

Although a federal grant comes with the program, it only partially funds the book give-away. The rest of the support comes from donations of community groups such as East Jordan Rotary, East Jordan Lioness Club, and the East Jordan Bridge Club.

Fundraisers such as book fairs, and the annual elementary school Dinner with Santa, along with the continuous support of the East Jordan Elementary PTO also contribute to the project.

But the greatest source of community funding for many years has come from the Charity Bowling Tournament sponsored by Gemini Lanes. 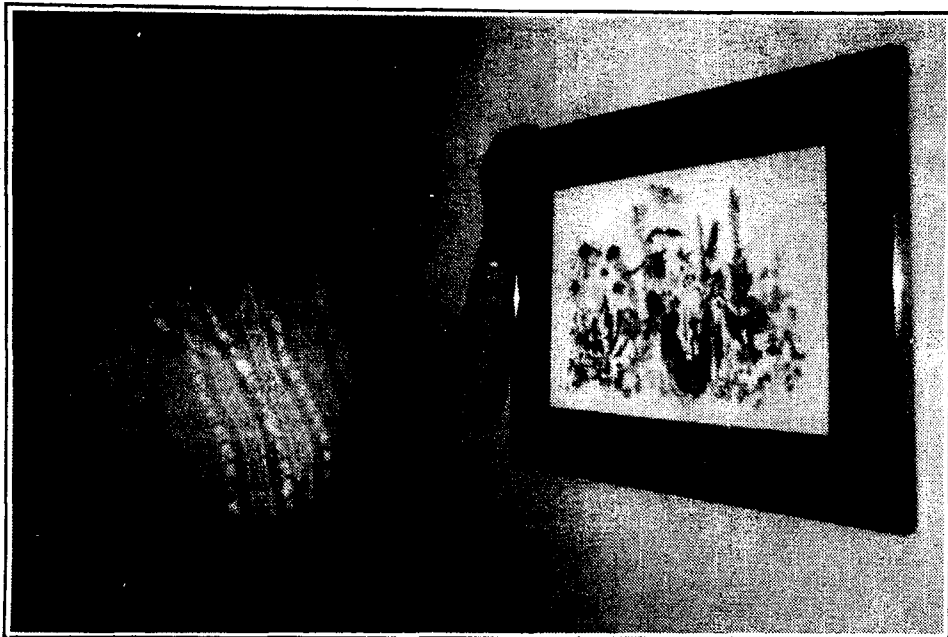

Mancelona native and East Jordan Superintendent of Schools, Robert "Chip" Hansen served as guest speaker at the June 4 graduation ceremonies.

His career has spanned the positions of teacher, coach, assistant superintendent and (at the age of 27) superintendent of Vanderbilt Area Schools from 1978 to 1983. He assumed his current post at East Jordan in 1989.

In spite of his move to another town, Hansen's long roots in the Mancelona area continue to be noticeable today. His father was a 1948 MHS graduate, and a Memorial Scholarship in Bob Hansen's name is

awarded annually to an outstanding scholar/athlete by the Mancelona Educational Foundation.

"My father worked his whole life in Mancelona," Hansen said. "He was very committed to education and athletics."

Bob Hansen was a nine-year member of the school board, including several years as president in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

The scholarship in the senior Hansen's name was established after his March 1993 death, and has since become self-perpetuating, his son said.

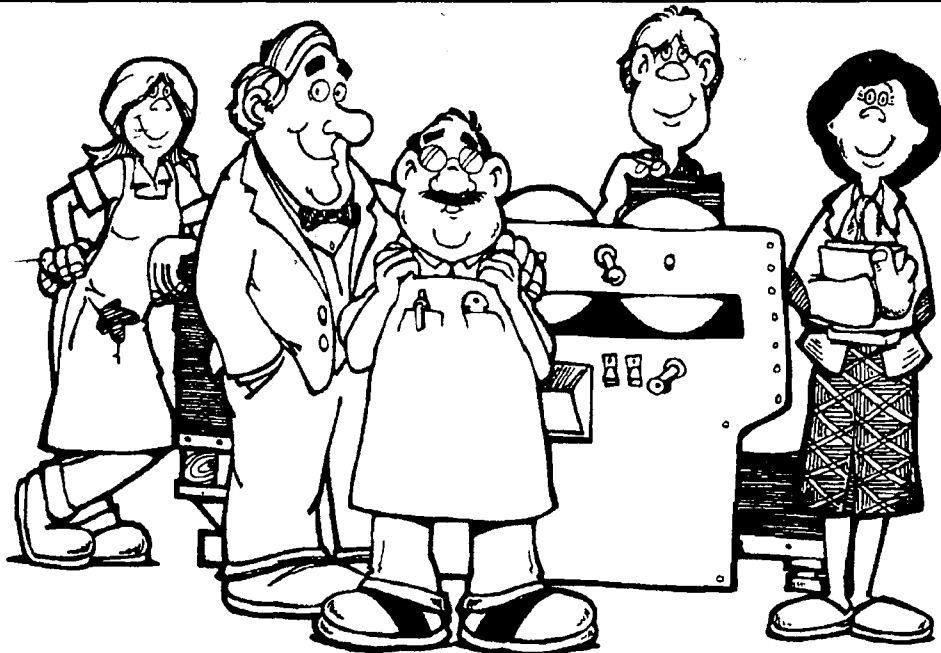
"I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to speak to this year's graduates," said Hansen. "And to say thanks to the many people who were so helpful to me when I was a student."

East Jordan re-investment program

The East Jordan Chamber of Commerce, along with FMB Northwestern and CB North banks, recently announced the continuation of the very successful re-investment program for a fourth year.

The cooperative investment program is a special fund of low-interest loans intended to encourage economic viability in East Jordan. Qualified borrowers can obtain up to \$25,000 at a floating interest rate of two percent below prime, with a payback of up to 15 years.

The program offers loans from a \$200,000 fund for renovations, additions or improvements of existing commercial buildings within East Jordan's Downtown Development Authority district. Loans may be obtained through either partner bank, according to the borrower's preference.

Application is made through the Chamber of Commerce.

For the past two years, Matt has worked at Carey's Corner Market, and enjoys listening to music or playing pool in his free time.

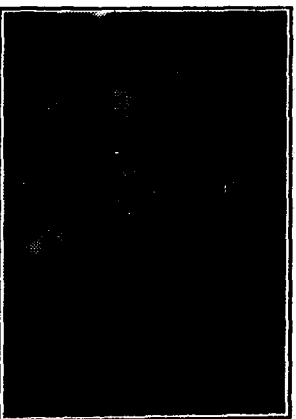

Cathy has also been involved in Student Council (as president her senior year,) National Honor Society, SADD, and the new Multicultural Diversity Club.

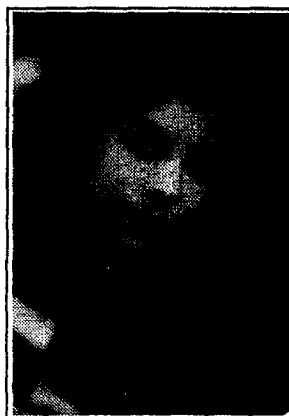

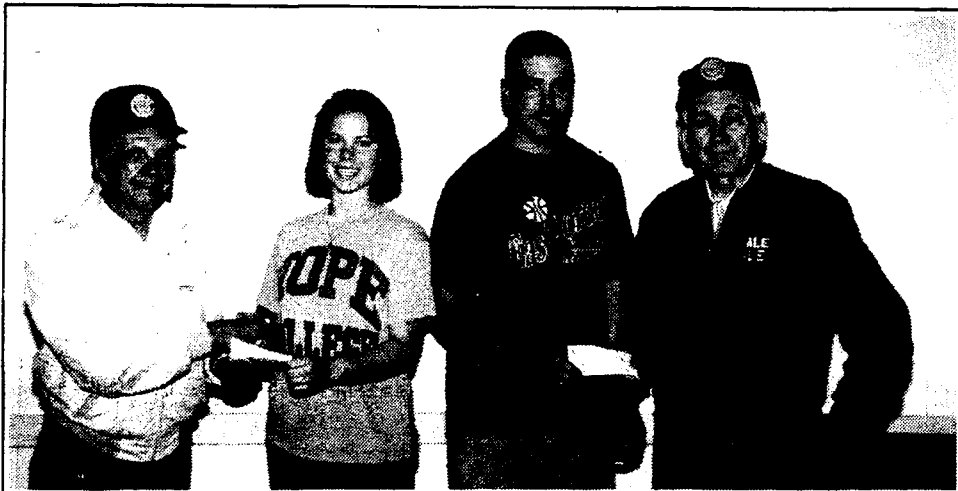

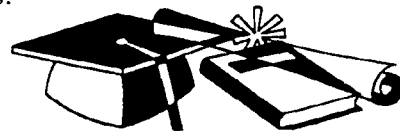

Track

When the basketball season closed a call was made for track men. Although handicapped by the fact that East Jordan had not been represented by a track team in the past five years, it was hoped that a fair amount of talent might be found.

A triangular meet was soon scheduled at Petoskey on May 5, between Petoskey, Harbor Springs and East Jordan – both opposition teams being of known caliber due to their last year's performances. Fate, however, favored East Jordan, and due to rain, the meet was postponed a week which allowed more time for much needed practice.

On May 12, a squad of 12 practically untried men were taken to Petoskey. Although nervousness was quite apparent, the squad came through in fine shape and showed that they possessed what is sometimes termed the "necessary ingredients."

The performances of four men in particular, classes them with the best in the state. Streeter proved himself the best all around hurdler in northern Michigan by placing second in the high hurdles. He won the low hurdles in the fast time

(considering the heavy track) of 30 seconds flat, only to be disqualified by a misinterpretation of the rules.

Philips showed his speed and ability by beating Bailey of Petoskey, the individual point winner of the meet, in the 220 yard dash. He also made a leap of 18 feet, 9 inches, in the broad jump, which almost captured another second place.

The honors of the day go to Ken Love, a freshman, who beat Petoskey's star runner, Bailey, in the quarter-mile. The finish was the most thrilling ever witnessed on Petoskey's track. The pair came neck and neck down the last hundred yards, Love beating Bailey across the finish line – both runners falling after putting every ounce of energy into the race. The time was 58 seconds flat on a track that was heavy as the proverbial lead.

"Swede" Olson, running mate to Love, got nosed out of third place in the last two yards by Myers of Petoskey, but he shows promise of being a potential quarter-miler.

The work of Hegerberg in the weights classes him with the three best in northern Michigan. He placed second in the discus and third in the shot-put, but promises to be second to none in the course of a few weeks practice.

East Jordan placed second in the relay race. The work of Streeter, Love and Phillips in this event is worthy of mention.

The first track meet held at East Jordan in the past five years was scheduled for May 19, it being a triangular affair between Petoskey, Boyne City and East Jordan. Although Petoskey is naturally the favorite, East Jordan is bound to show Boyne City a real battle for second honors. This will, incidentally, prove the champions of Charlevoix County as Charlevoix claims no representative track team this year.

The men who participated at Petoskey or "also ran," are White, Kling, Whiteford, Wright, Walker and McCalmon. These men, with the exception of White, are first or second-year men and with Streeter, Love and Olson will form a nucleus for next year's team.

The wind-up of the track season will be the Northern State meet at Cadillac, June 2-3. Captain Ed Streeter, Phillips, Love, Hegerberg, and possibly Olson and Little are the probable entries. Possibly next year or the year after, the teams of Northern Michigan will meet at East Jordan instead of Petoskey, Cadillac or Traverse City. Superintendent Duncanson is in favor of such a meet and every effort will be made to get the big meet here.

Health partnership established in area

In a precedent-setting move, health care providers from throughout northern Michigan have formed a Community Health Partnership to improve the health status of communities in the counties of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego. The partnership will lead efforts to assess the current health status of the community and its residents, set priorities and address health needs within each community.

Partnership goals emphasize collaboration and cooperation with all segments of the community to gather and analyze information and set priorities. The group plans to rely heavily on local task forces in each of the four counties to accomplish their goals. These task forces are now being formed and the partnership is seeking volunteers to participate on the task forces.

This is a unique opportunity for community residents in the four counties to become involved in a grass roots effort to influence how our health care system may be made more

responsive to community needs and priorities.

It is expected that these groups will discuss a wide range of issues relating to health. Topics such as access to health care, access to preventive services, adequate prenatal care, transportation, cost, health insurance or lack of health insurance, children's health and nutrition and the needs of special populations may be included in the work of the task forces.

BULLETIN (Reported just as the form for the Annual was closing): At the big Northern State meet, East Jordan tied with Big Rapids for fifth place with 6 points each; Love and Hegerberg earned seconds in the quarter-mile and discus, respectively. Boyne City was sixth with 3 points to their credit.

The meet was won by Petoskey by having the better balanced team. In 11 out of the 13 events, new district records were made – this shows the class of competition encountered.



1978 to open a practice in dentistry, said he was initially motivated to run for the school board in order to be "a voice for academic excellence and high expectations," and is even more committed to those goals now.

Although he feels the district is moving in a positive direction, he expressed disappointment that test scores improved only slightly, and that the district still has not completed a K-12 aligned curriculum. But he also said he realizes now that change occurs slowly in a system where all input must be heard, and where committees do the majority of development work.

"The first four years were a learning experience," he noted, adding that he believes debate is an important part of the decision-making process.

"The next four years I'll be speaking out much more."

In other business, the board:

- Approved general modifications of the high school student handbook for 1995-96. Most changes are simple clarification of policy.

- Approved borrowing \$1,350,000 against anticipated taxes for the 1995-96 fiscal year, necessary because the district does not receive state student allocations in a timely manner for school operations funding.

The loan is the maximum the district

may borrow, and has a 4.25 percent cost. The funds are immediately reinvested until use at a 6.45 percent interest rate.

- Heard positive comments from audience member Larry MacEachern, who voiced his support of the PACE interactive television network courses, especially the German course. He also cited a new study skills course offered beginning in the fall as a very good addition.

"I think it will prove to be a real asset to our kids for the next century," MacEachern remarked.

At another station, students learned how to use Secchi discs - 8-inch metal discs with alternating black and white quarters used to measure water clarity. The discs are lowered into the water until they can not be seen, then the depths where the discs disappear and reappear are recorded.


Water Sampling, the third station, was done from the upper deck, where water samples were retrieved from various depths and examined under microscopes for observation of the tiny organisms

existing in the lake.

The Sea Lamprey station rounded out the series with a video presentation followed by a question and answer session on these parasitic predators.

The stations were manned by volunteers from the Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council, the Charlevoix Coast Guard station, and the Lake Charlevoix Association. The transportation was donated by the Beaver Island Boat Company.

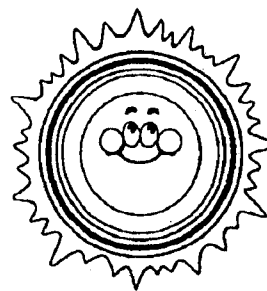

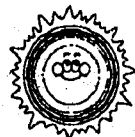

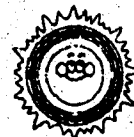
