

Artists gather at Elm Pointe for the Portside Art Fair

The beautiful setting of the 33rd annual Portside Arts Fair at Elm Pointe, on the shore of Lake Charlevoix outside East Jordan, provides an appropriate backdrop for the art works exhibited. The show is set for Sat., Aug. 5, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sun., Aug. 6, from noon to 5 p.m.

Stringent application criteria for exhibitors helps keep the juried show high quality—there are generally about twice as many applicants as the 100 exhibitors selected.

A wide variety of media will be represented at this year's fair, including a number of new exhibitors. New works by well-known artists, and style experimentation by many of the artists, both new and familiar, always adds a fresh touch to the types of art available for purchase.


The highlight, especially for exhibitors, is the Purchase Prize awards. Each artist enters a piece for judging. If selected, the work is permanently displayed at the Cygred Riley Art Gallery, adjoining the Portside Art and Historical Museum. A \$500 prize is awarded for two-dimensional media, while a three-dimensional work is selected for the \$300 Purchase Prize.

Judge this year is Barbara J. Hranilovich, a working artist in commercial illustration and fine art in Lansing. A teacher and member of several arts organizations, Hranilovich has been active as a fine arts juror for 15 years, as well as being the recipient of a number of awards for her own works.

Hospitality really sets the Portside Art Fair apart. Numerous volunteers continued on back

EJ City Commission tackles housing issues

Housing concerns dominated the July 18 meeting of the East Jordan City Commission.

A deteriorating building at 104 Main Street was one of the structures discussed. City clerk Kathy O'Rear said the condition of the property has been an ongoing problem for the last eight to 10 years, with owners notified repeatedly that the situation must be improved.

There was some question of whether the present owner, Gerald Burton of

West Bloomfield, has been cited on the property condition. O'Rear said a registered letter was sent to Burton, with no response. A subsequent postal trace determined the letter has been delivered.

The letter informed Burton that the city commission has determined the structure a nuisance, and it must be removed. O'Rear warned the commission that forcing the issue may be expensive.

"It will cost a substantial amount of money to remedy 104 Main Street," she said. "I think the gentleman's used to continued on back

City administrator hired


East Jordan has a new city administrator – the first in the city's history. The position was created by the passing of a new city charter last April, and Carolyn Sutter accepted the city commission's offer for the position.

Sutter has a variety of experience working with municipal budgets in several Michigan and California cities. She has been working as a private consultant in Long Beach, Cal., for the past five years.

Already at work, Sutter officially began her tenure August 1. She will oversee management of the city, including supervision of all departments and city budget development.

Sutter accepted an annual salary of \$42,500, and will receive the standard city employee benefits package, along with travel and school expenses related to her position, and a \$1,500 moving expense stipend. She is required by charter to have a city residence within 90 days.

Recently I have changed my walking route in the morning. You would too if a dog backed you into a fence and paid no attention to your plea for him to go away. I guess that's one of the drawbacks of walking.

For years, the late Roland Forbes and I served as a committee of two to check out dogs which had been donated for the Leader

Dog for the Blind facility at Rochester. We must have checked out a half dozen dogs or so over the years, and not once did any of the dogs make up to me. Incidentally, none of them made the grade.

Forbes used to say, "If a dog doesn't bite Sax, he will make the grade."

A man's best friend may be a dog but it's some other man, certainly not me.

A friend of mine (Lion Don Peer) who headed up a Leader Dog program at Houghton Lake for several years, has had many dogs. I'm sure that he counts every dog he trained, whether they made the grade or not, as one of his best friends. And further, the blind persons who benefit from the dogs he trained would share the same feeling.

With fellows around like my friend, at least the world isn't going to the dogs.

Editor's note: We just couldn't resist this – we've heard that dogs are pretty good judges of character – just kidding!

Summer safety tip

Avoid strange animals

Summer is the time that children like to play outside, but parents must remember to teach their children not to approach or play with strange, stray, or sick animals, said Bill Marquardt, Charlevoix County Animal Control Officer.

The animal control division of the Charlevoix County Sheriff Department has recently received a number of reports of bites by animals. Fortunately, in the cases that were reported, the animal was found and tested for rabies. If they had not been found and captured, the victim of the bites would have had to receive a series of rabies

vaccinations.

According to Marquardt, the best way to prevent a bite from happening is to avoid the animals in the first place. If you see a stray, sick, or strange animal, stay away from it. Trying to "help" a sick or injured animal will probably result in a bite, and cause the animal to run away.

If you see a sick, injured, stray, or strange animal, stay away from it and report it to your local animal control officer (ACO). The ACO has the training and equipment to safely handle the animal.

Timely contribution from Big Rock helps Raven Hill

A last-minute contribution of \$1,000 by Consumers Power Company's Big Rock Point nuclear plant helped push the Raven Hill Discovery Center over the top in its pursuit of a matching grant from the Frey Foundation.

The East Jordan-based science and technology center was awarded a 3-to-1 matching grant in 1993 by the Frey Foundation of Grand Rapids. In order to receive the \$30,000 grant, the center needed to raise \$90,000 by June 30, 1995. The Big Rock Point Community Partnership Team approved the \$1,000 contribution June 29, helping Raven Hill meet their goal of \$90,000.

"Community support of our facility has been overwhelming," said Cheri Leach, Raven Hill director. "To raise \$90,000 reflects the kind of people we have living in our area, and I believe, the value of the discovery center."

Leach said the money will be used to build and furnish class rooms, more museum space and a greenhouse. Future plans at Raven Hillinclude a theater/planetarium, an arts and crafts studio, and a historical village.

Big Rock Point and the Consumers Power Foundation also approved seven other contributions totaling \$2,750.

Approved was a grant of \$1,000 to the American Cancer Society. The money will be used to support the annual fund raising walk held in Charlevoix County. Money raised during the event funds breast cancer research. The walk will be held September 30. Please call 616-549-2205 for more information.

The Charlevoix Alano club received a Volunteer Investment Program (VIP) grant

of \$400 in behalf of Big Rock Point technical analyst Don Kelly. Kelly volunteers time at the center, which assists those seeking an alcohol and drug-free life. The money will be used to support operations.

The Safe Harbor Youth Group received \$300 in behalf of health physics technician Milford Sliger. The organization prepares children to deal with life's challenges through coaching sessions and outings. The money will be used to enable more children to participate in outings.

The volunteer work of senior engineer Kevin Shields and several other plant employees resulted in a \$300 grant for the local MathCounts program. MathCounts volunteers organize local youth math proficiency competitions. Top performing teams and individuals advance to compete in state and national competitions. The money will be used to fund prizes and travel expenses for the children.

The Petoskey Little League and Harbor Springs Baseball Commission each received \$200. Nuclear control operator Maurice Field is a coach in Petoskey while senior engineer Jacob Toskey is commissioner of the Harbor Springs league. The money will be used to purchase equipment.

Petoskey Troop 7 of the Boy Scouts of America received \$300 in behalf of general engineer Bruce Waggoner. The money will be used to buy a trailer.

The Consumers Power Foundation, the philanthropic arm of Consumers Power Company, sponsors the Volunteer Investment Program to recognize employees who give their time and talent to non-profit organizations and to encourage greater levels of volunteerism by employees.

Pre-school recruitment

The Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate School District, East Jordan PREP Program, Project FREE and Northwest Michigan Human Services Agency will hold a joint preschool recruitment for the 1995/96 school year during the month of August.

Recruitment insures that families are made aware of each of the free preschool programs available to them and to enroll as many eligible children as possible into a program. Parents of 3 to 5 year old children can come to the recruitment and learn about preschool programs offered in their local school district.

Parents are asked to bring the child's immunization records, child's birth certificate, proof of income, Medicaid card or private insurance number, Social Security number of each family member, food stamp card, if applicable, and their child.

Char-Em receives grant

The Charlevoix-Emmet School-to-Work Local Community Partnership has been awarded a \$20,000 local implementation grant, according to area lawmaker Beverly Bodem. State Rep. Bodem (R-105th District) was notified of the grant by Gov. Engler and the Michigan Jobs Commission. The grant will be administered by the Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate School District.

The lawmaker said the partnership will be comprised of at least 51 percent private sector representatives, an employer chair and representatives from K-12 and postsecondary educational institutions. It also will include organized labor, community organizations, local government, parent and teacher organizations and the Job Training Partnership Act Michigan Works! agency.

"Such community involvement is crucial as we enter the 21st century," Bodem said. "The students of tomorrow will be challenged by the ever-changing technology of the information age."

Bodem said funding for the initiative is provided through the \$49 million Schoolto-Work grant awarded to the state last summer by the federal government. Michigan's 45 local partnerships will receive 70 percent of the \$8 million allocated for the first year, and 80 percent in the second through fifth years of the grant.

Michigan's School-to-Work initiative is being implemented through the Michigan Jobs Commission, the Michigan Department of Education and local community partnerships.





receiving stuff from us, so he's probably ignoring it."

Commissioner Ruth Gee wanted to know if city expenses could be recouped from the owner. The commission decided to locate and serve the owner through a process server so the citation is hand-delivered. The consensus of the commission was the structure is a safety hazard, and measures will be taken to continue the process of removal, with or without the cooperation of the owner.

The Cesaro property, at 209 State Street, also recently cited under the nuisance ordinance, has shown signs of progress in rectifying conditions. The commission determined that as long as progress continues, no further action will be taken against the owner.

Unloading Bridge St. property

Another lengthy discussion focused on the house at 301 Bridge Street. The property reverted to the city from the

state last year, and the commission is making preparations to sell.

A July appraisal called the structure in generally poor condition, although it was not deemed unsalvageable. A value of \$28, 500 was fixed - \$21,500 for the dwelling and \$7,000 for the land.

"I think we'd be hard pressed to get anyone to pay that much for it," said commissioner Dan McKinnon. "I've seen the condition, inside and out."

Possibilities for disposal of the property discussed included:

- Sell the property as is, with a sales stipulation that the building is improved to satisfactory condition within a specific time period.
- Improve the property with city funds, to improve the value for sale at a higher price.
- Remove the structure and sell the property.

The commission decided more information is needed and arranged for electrical, plumbing and heating inspections on the dwelling, which is presently considered uninhabitable.

"The house definitely doesn't have any future as it is right now," Gee remarked.

Substandard housing discussion

Fred Ingram, a resident of Milton Street, appealed to the commission to do something about the condition of a home at 207 Mary Street. Ingram has approached the commission repeatedly on the issue.

"We're really sick of it," said Ingram, who cited barking dogs, residents who don't clean up after their animals, noisy late-night parties, and the generally poor and unhealthy condition of the property.

County commissioner Howard Hosler, who lives at 301 Mary Street, voiced his support of the appeal. Hosler said the condition of the house is unsafe and probably uninhabitable. He said he has contacted the county and the district health department without receiving a helpful response.

East Jordan police officer Bob Christensen said such rentals owned by absentee landlords will continue to be a

"We need housing inspections," said Christensen. "We can take care of noise complaints if we receive calls from neighbors, but we can't do anything as far as the structures themselves."

Christensen encouraged Ingram to keep calling with his complaints. He urged residents to call back immediately if the problem continues after officers leave the scene.

An audience member suggested an ordinance requiring inspection of rentals between occupancies.

"We don't need an ordinance," said Gee. "We already have BOCA (Building Office and Code Administration) codes. We just need inspections and enforcement."

Gee agreed that something needs to be done, but she and the rest of the commission do not know what action to take.

Commissioner Mike Dionne suggested appointing someone to research the issue, but no action was taken at the meeting, other than instructing the police department and the DPW to inspect the possibly hazardous condition of trees on the Mary Street property.

Habitat home ready

Nearly a year and a half since she learned she would receive a new home. Carol Clabby and her family can finally stop paying rent.

The brand new Habitat for Humanity home built for the family was dedicated in a celebration July 23, and although there are some details to complete, the house is ready for Clabby and her sons Jeffrey Clabby and Nathan Gagnon to occupy.

The home, at 303 Bridge Street, was built in partnership with the family and Northwest Michigan Habitat for Humanity - the third Habitat home built in the area, and the first in East Jordan. Clabby and her family devoted over 250 hours of sweat equity to construction, helped by over 40 volunteers, and the several area churches and service organizations that contributed to the project.

Clabby will purchase the two-bedroom home, valued at about \$30,000, from Habitat for Humanity on a nointerest, 20-year mortgage. Her payments will go toward building more Habitat homes in the Charlevoix-Emmet County area served by Northwest Michigan Habitat.
