

Flower show graces Civic Center

The East Jordan Civic Center was transformed into a bower of blooming plants Aug. 22, when the members of the East Jordan Garden Club and the Lake Country Garden Club (Central Lake) went to work. Their purpose was to present a standard flower show, sanctioned by the Federated Garden Clubs of America, the first as a collaborative effort between the two clubs.

From noon to 5 p.m., a wide variety of flowers were displayed in artistic arrangements with a number of themes. All the design themes were generated by the show theme of "Endangered Mother Earth."

Horticulture specimens of all types of flowers, vegetables, and fruit were also on exhibit. A panel of judges from across northern Michigan selected their favorites in horticulture and artistic design divisions to present ribbons to the top four winners in each classification.

Chosen as Best in Show was a two-piece table setting including a flower arrangement with baby's breath, yellow heliopsis, and orange zinnias, by Thelma McKinnon of East Jordan, in the Artistic Design Division. The theme of the winning presentation was "Birds of a Feather."

Chosen as Best in Show in the Horticulture Division was George Alley of East Jordan, with his Johida pink lilies. (See the box on back page for other winners.)

Those just wishing to display the products of their green thumb were also encouraged to enter all types of arrangements and horticultural specimens in the non-juried division.

There were educational exhibits as well, including a presentation by the Friends of the Jordan River, assembled by FOJ vice president John Richter; a display explaining the art of attracting butterflies, by Cynthia Tshudy; and a slide presentation on wildflowers by Roselle Bier. The East Jordan City Commission heard the first report of new city administrator Carolyn Sutter at the Aug. 15 regular meeting.

Included was the beginning of what Sutter promised would be a number of revisions necessary to bring city ordinances in line with the new charter. Sutter said ordinances will be updated, made more consistent with the charter and made easier to administer.

Many of the ordinances will just be changed to name the city administrator rather than the city council as the primary enforcer. Sutter said she is working presently on some farther reaching changes in the grass and weeds nuisance ordinance to allow:

• The city to mow neglected properties.

• The city worker mowing to cite the property owner.

• The city to include billing of the property owner for expenses, plus 10 percent administrative costs.

• The city to bill the property taxes of owners neglecting to pay mowing costs. Sutter also clarified the policy affecting direction and supervision of city employees. She noted that according to the charter, employees are under her direct supervision, so any problems or communications should go through the administrator's office.

She said the process allows the administrator to know commissioner concerns regarding city employees, and saves commissioners from having to deal directly with personnel problems.

Sutter took the first step in this policy by announcing that department heads will only be required to attend commission meetings when they have an item on the regular agenda, or when a citizen has requested, in advance, their attendance for discussion at the meeting.

Several commission members previously expressed concern about the lack of attendance by police chief Jerry Alward at com-

mission meetings.

While Alward specifically will not be required to attend future commission meetings, he will be responsible for providing an officer to serve as Sergeant at Arms for security reasons.

Contract arrangements

Sutter told the commission she was ready to complete negotiations on her contract and submit it for their approval.

"I researched the charter for the responsibilities of the city administrator," she explained. "I spoke with the individual commissioners to learn their performance goals and expectations for the position, and I added some of my own ideas."

Sutter offered a summary of the contract, which includes the following points:

• In general, the administrator will assert the authority delegated by the East Jordan City Charter.

• The administrator will help the city with charter-initiated transitions.

Providing floors for East Jordan homes

The East Jordan Flooring Plant, on Brown's Creek near State Street, had a special place in the activities of the Bartlett family.

Dad Ira used the convenient and constant warmth of the open dry kilns to warm five gallon cans of honey he collected, making the honey pourable again. He usually did this without the knowledge of the plant foreman!

Uncle Lou Swafford and his brother Matt had maintenance jobs at the plant, which employed about 25 men. Ira also worked there for a time.

Besides flooring, other products of the plant included lath, shingles, firewood and charcoal. Every day the plant took in about two train car loads of wood for production. Trains came right up to the plant for loading on a rail spur built for the purpose.

Lath, shingles, handles and flooring each product required certain kinds of wood stock. Flooring was maple or oak, although many homes had basswood on bedroom floors. The East Jordan plant produced mainly maple flooring.

All machines in the factories were powered by steam. The steam energy was transferred by shafts, belts and pulleys. In East Jordan, two coiled boilers similar to those on train locomotives powered a huge fly wheel (12 feet in diameter) with a threefoot wide leather belt, and a power shaft long enough and large enough to run many cutting machines 75 feet away.

It took three years to make the 50 x 3-foot leather belt required to run the plant.

The boiler was fired by wood chips and coal. Half of the fly wheel was in a pit below ground level. It had a small alternator (it appears in photographs to be an alternator, although it may be a generator) for lighting. Water for the boiler came from a man-made pond on State Street, fed by Brown's Creek.

Lumber was transferred from rail car to the kilns for drying – the kilns maintained 140 degrees of steam heat.

The sawing of logs into raw lumber was the first step in the process. To manufacture the flooring, select boards were kiln dried, sized, and processed through a special cutting machine.

The finished flooring was tongue and

groove on all four sides and hollowed on the bottom. The finished product was required fit perfectly as the pieces of a puzzle. Then the planks were sanded by hand -Norm Bartlett, Ira's son, said he spent unending hours doing that job.

East Jordan's flooring was popular in all kinds of homes - installation of the new flooring was usually followed by the demand that you take your shoes off on entering!

Once in the home, dining room floors were usually varnished. If the wood was left bare, it was usually scrubbed once a week.

Oak flooring was made in Grand Rapids. Many hardwood boards were sent from East Jordan to the Grand Rapids factory to be used in the seating of desk chairs, and other furniture.

M ost of the East Jordan Line closed by 1928, leaving the foundry ost of the East Jordan factories and canning factory to provide employment to the area. Wages about that time were 22.5 cents an hour for women at the canning factory, and 35 cents for men at the iron works.





I wonder if any of you did as my wife and I did – we dug out the old kerosene lamp. She dusted the globe, trimmed the narrow wick, checked the volume of kerosene and lighted it.

There was light, but not much of it. To further assure ourselves of proper preparation for the ordeal that was to come, we located a flashlight, drew a bucket of water, and waited for the darkness to arrive.

Wouldn't you know it, just about the time the lights were to go off, I remembered that I had a dinner meeting in Denton Township where the electrical power would not be cut off. I know what you women are going to say, "Now, isn't that just like a man?"

My wife was knitting when I left: it's her favorite pastime. When I returned home a couple hours later, she was still knitting in

As I picked up the evening newspaper, it dawned on me that we were seated in the dim light that came from the same lamp, Old Faithful, that had been used by my family at East Jordan more than 50 years ago. It is surprising how close I had to get to the lamp to enable me to read.

I said to myself, "That's the very same lamp you read with when you were a grade school student in a one-room school at

(It's true, I have been known to talk to myself, but I am careful not to accept the answers I get to my questions.)


I had four brothers, a sister, a grandfather, mother and dad, who often shared the dim light emitted by this trusty lamp, which we often carried from one room to another as needed.

Looking back now, it's hard for me to imagine doing without the niceties of life today. We had no television, for obviously, television was only a dream at that time. We

nace, no fireplace, no electric iron, no sewing machine, no refrigerator, no modern toilet facilities, no air conditioning, no typewriter and no vacuum sweeper - you name it and we didn't have it.

Our one prized possession was a batteryoperated radio. It was our lone luxury in the days of the Great Depression, when a can of pork and beans was a delicacy. We were forced to use the radio sparingly however, for we couldn't afford to recharge it.

Armstrong – The All American Boy, and Amos and Andy. Grandpa and Dad tried never to miss the pugilistic exploits of Jack Dempsey.

We were "poorer than church mice," and hard pressed to keep the "wolf from our door." Somehow we survived – we had resourceful parents who kept a cow, several chickens, and a couple of pigs. We cut our own wood, provided our own recreational activities, picked wild berries. Our parents made sure we were clean, and that we attended school regularly. They put a high priority on education.

We seldom went anywhere except to Sunday School, but do you know we were a happy bunch. That isn't to say that we didn't have our battles as kids will. But nevertheless, we worked together, and played together in a home where discipline was an accepted way of life.

Those were the 'good old days." Although I think I benefited from the rigors of life during the Depression of the 1930s, I wouldn't want to go through that era again. Today, we truly have so much to be thankful for – like electricity!

Fuelwood permits discontinued

The Department of Natural Resources today announced that permits for fuelwood from state forest land will be discontinued once again for the period of Oct. 1, 1995 through March 31, 1996.

Permits issued through Sept. 30 will be valid for 90 days after the issuance date and will entitle permittees to gather up to five standard cords of wood. There is a \$20 permit fee, with issuance dependent upon the availability of wood suitable for fuelwood purposes. All fuelwood collected must be for personal use, be from downed or designated trees only, and is not to be resold or traded.

Individuals who would like to obtain a fuelwood permit prior to Oct. 1 should contact their local DNR Area Forest Manager regarding availability. Permits are issued for designated locations in which permittees must exercise care not to trespass on private property and must protect surrounding live trees from injury.

Permit issuance will resume again on April 1, 1996,

Michigan Treasurer Douglas Roberts recommended Aug. 16 the Michigan Education Trust be opened to new investors, four years after Gov. John Engler closed the program.

"Today, tens of thousands of Michigan families struggling to afford college for their children won a victory," State Rep. Pat Gagliardi (D-Drummond Island) said. "The recommendation by Treasurer Roberts is a bold reversal of policy on behalf of the Engler Administration, but it was undoubtedly the right thing to do."

Gagliardi, sponsor of legislation that would reopen the MET program to new investors, also urged the MET Board of Directors to consider measures to keep contracts affordable when it next convenes Oct. 25.

MET was implemented under Democratic Gov. James Blanchard in 1986 to allow parents to pay for their children's full college tuition at set rates years in advance, saving families thousands of dollars. From 1988 through 1990, nearly 55,000 MET contracts were purchased.

Shortly after Gov. Engler took office in 1991, he closed the program to new contracts, claiming MET was headed for insolvency. Instead, MET has been found to be financially stable by independent auditors. A May, 1995, ruling by the U.S. Court of Appeals significantly increased MET's value as an investment vehicle by refunding \$70 million and granting MET immunity from future federal tax liability. Today, thousands of families are waiting to enter the program.

"This isn't a partisan issue, it's a family issue," Gagliardi said. "It isn't a risk issue, because MET is strong and viable." Roberts indicated due to the \$70 million IRS tax refund, the MET fund has a surplus of nearly \$15 million.

"The only choice is to reward Michigan's families by reopening what is the best investment vehicle available to help them afford college for their children," Gagliardi said. "Today, the Administration acknowledged the integrity MET has had all along. It was the right thing to do, and I urge the MET Board to vote to reopen contracts as soon as possible, but keep them affordable."


The City Council, the Tourist Park Staff and the Chamber of Commerce also played a major role in making this a profitable event.

From Jordan Township Chatter by Mrs. Vern Bundy (Rosalind Westcott) Mancelona Herald, August, 1958

northerner. Born in Gaylord, she moved at an early age to Detroit, then later returned to Gaylord. It was while she was going to school in Gaylord that she met her husband, who was at that time working on a road job at Wolverine.

They were married in 1935 in Burnips, and made their home there during the winter season. For five years after that they followed the road jobs from place to place, moving as Arthur's place of work was changed. It was in the second year that their first son, Ralph, was born.

After those years of moving they decided to move to a farm and finally settled on one near Martin (between Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids,) where their second son, Loren, was born. They stayed there for six years, and in 1945 they decided to buy a permanent home here.

The farm they bought was on the highway. The soil was good, and the school was convenient. It was much better than traveling for the family. Mr. Wycoff's job left him some time for working the farm, and as the boys grew older they took over more of the farm work until they were almost handling it by themselves.

They had one bad setback in 1951. when their barn burned just after they had filled it with hay. Since then they have cut down their stock to a minimum, two cows and a couple head of young stock, and one horse. There isn't room for more in the existing buildings, and it has not seemed advisable to rebuild.

Ralph, who graduated this spring, is planning to start college this fall and has chosen Michigan College of Mining and Technology. He will attend at the Soo Branch.

Loren, who is 15, belongs to the Future Farmers of America. He is also looking forward to the time when he will be out of high school and able to take up the study of engineering.

As I came to the end of my afternoon of visiting, I thought to myself that it is too bad that more people don't have an excuse to stop and visit wherever they see a place that takes their interest. Of course, one can always stop, anyway. but I have never before been able to, and perhaps that is why I appreciate this opportunity so much. For you who can not, I write this column.



Insurance savings on students possible

Anyone with children in college knows how expensive higher education can be. But there is a way to actually save money by sending your son or daughter away to school. If you child attends college more than 100 miles from home, the auto insurance savings can be substantial.

Consider a family living in Mount Prospect, Ill. The parents own a mid-size car. Their 19-year-old son qualifies for a "good student" insurance discount, thanks to his "B" average. He also has a clean driving record.

If he lives at home, attends nearby Harper Junior College in Palatine, Ill., and is an "occasional" operator of the family car, the annual insurance bill is 1,124. However, if he attends, say, the University of Iowa 225 miles away, the family's cost of insurance drops to \$988 per year – a savings of 12.1 percent.

Early September goose season

Department of Natural Resources Director Roland Harmes announced the dates of the 1995 early September Canada goose hunting season as Sept. 1-15 in the Lower Peninsula and Sept. 1-10 in the Upper Peninsula.

This represents a liberation from 1994, since the west Upper Peninsula was not included in the early goose hunt last year and the 4994' season in the northern Lower Peninsula ended on Sept. 10. This year's daily bag limit will remain at five.

Huron counties will remain closed to early September goose hunting to avoid the possible harvest of early arriving migrant geese from James Bay, Ontario. Most game and wildlife areas in other counties will be open for the season, as will many of the state parks.

Some state parks and recreation areas will not open until the day after Labor Day; hunters are urged to check with local DNR offices for additional information and maps. The Early September Canada Goose Hunting Season Guide is available at license agents, and contains daily hunting hours time-table.

Michigan had an extraordinarily successful early September Canada goose season hunt in 1994, with over 47,000 birds harvested. Jerry Martz, Wildlife Division Waterfowl Specialist, predicts a fall flight of more than 300,000 locally-produced giant Canada geese. "Hunters that get out now and scout area birds, and secure permission to hunt on private lands, should do very well again this year," Martz said.

save goose parts this year for analysis of the harvest because federal authorities have decided to make the early September hunt an ongoing operational season.

"In the past, hunters' assistance in supplying goose parts was greatly appreciated and did make a difference in securing this additional hunting opportunity," Martz said.

Carrots or caramels for snack?

Who can resist a big slice of chocolate cake? A few pieces of taffy? A glass of soda pop, a stick of gum? The answer is, of course, not many!


Even these foods may be eaten if the diet is wellbalanced. To maintain a balanced intake, food experts recommend choosing food each day from six basic food groups in the Food Guide Pyramid. The question is, "How many sweets, and how often?""

Why are sweet snacks so bad for the teeth? The answer is that these snacks contain sugar which is used by bacteria in the mouth and on the teeth to produce acids that eat away the tooth surface. Each time a sugar treat is eaten, your teeth are attacked by these acids. However, the amount of sweets eaten is not as important as how often they are eaten.

A rule of thumb is, the stickier a snack, the more likely it is to attach to the tooth and break down its enamel-even crackers and the other hand, crunchy foods such as raw fruits and vegetables or liquidy foods such as yogurt are generally not easily attached to the teeth.

There are some things you can do to limit the number of cavities.

• Between-meal snacks could include fresh fruits and vegetables, nuts, pretzels, and cheese.



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



School offices are now open daily to answer questions, and confirm schedules.

Opening day

East Jordan students begin classes Tues., Sept. 5, at 12 noon. Buses will be running.

The first-day schedule includes Tuesday-Thursday kindergarten students. Monday-Wednesday scheduled kindergarten students report at 8:15 a.m., Wed., Sept. 6. Any new students attending East Jordan Schools should already be registered. If you have not done so, contact the school office where your child will attend.



Hot lunch

Hot lunches are \$1 for students K-12, milk, 25 cents. Reduced price for lunches is 40 cents. Adult lunches cost \$1.85. Breakfasts are 80 cents for K-12 students, 30 cents reduced; adults are charged \$1.25.

Sports activities

Most fall sports teams have already begun practices or even competition. Athletic ticket prices for games and meets are as follows:

For adults, varsity games are \$2.50, junior varsity, \$2, and junior high, \$1. Senior citizens are free, but must have a pass. A family all-sports pass to attend all sports events throughout the school year is available for \$60. An adult all-sports pass costs \$35; student passes cost \$20. All passes can be obtained at the central office.

Don't forget that East Jordan School District has a no-smoking policy. In support of their desire to be smoke-free, and also as part of the district's overall effort to better educate students about the potential hazards of smoking and inhaling second-hand smoke, the school board has implemented a policy banning the use of tobacco products by any person in any district building or on school property at any time.

The year-old policy covers all district buildings and grounds, including Boswell Stadium and other athletic areas.



Make your student "street-safe"

With students heading back to school all over the region, it's time to be on the look-out for bicycles, school buses and pedestrians, particularly during the morning rush hour, at lunch time and in mid-afternoon.

Parents whose children will be bicycling to school should make sure they wear helmets. About 1,000 Americans are killed in bike crashes every year, most from head injuries. Helmets could prevent 84 percent of head injuries, according to the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Parents should review rules for safe cycling with children, including signaling turns and obeying traffic control devices; stopping at intersections; riding on the right-hand edge of the road; and keeping two hands on the handlebars.

Bus safety

Safety around school buses affects even more children. While Michigan has not sustained any fatalities of its school-age passengers on a bus in the last eight years, getting on and off a bus can be dangerous or even deadly for children.

Parents should remind children to stay well back from the bus until it is completely stopped. If the child must cross a street, she should make sure to look both ways – don't assume that every automobile driver will stop.

When disembarking, children should immediately move away from the bus, and cross the street a safe distance in front of the bus. Children should be prepared to obey any instructions the bus driver gives.

Automobile drivers should pay close attention to school bus lighting signals. As the bus prepares to stop, the driver will flash overhead yellow lights. As with any yellow lights, drivers should slow and prepare to stop.

When overhead lights flash red, drivers must stop at least 20 feet behind the bus. On most roads, vehicles going either direction must stop for the bus. The exception is roadways divided by a median: the vehicles on the opposite side from the bus need not stop.

Because it is extremely dangerous to children, passing a school bus displaying flashing red lights is punishable by a \$500 fine, up to 90 days in jail, and three points against the driver's record. Such violations are one of the most frequent causes of school bus-related injuries.

After the children are safely on or off the bus, the lights will be shut off. Passing at this time (in a legal passing zone with assured clear distance) is acceptable. Bus drivers often remain to the side for a moment, allowing traffic to pass.

Passing a bus with yellow hazard – not overhead – lights is allowed. Proceed with caution.

Pedestrians

Motorists are required by Michigan law to yield to all pedestrians, and should be particularly wary of young pedestrians.

Children – who may be on their first walking trip without an adult – can be very unpredictable. Watch for darting children, especially from between parked cars or other obstructions. Balls or other toys rolling in the street are a warning – a running child may not be far behind. Parents should remind children who walk to school to cross at intersections or crosswalks only; look both ways every time and more than once; always travel the safest route to and from school; and make their own decisions about safety rather than following other children into the street.


Teenage drivers can be concentrated in large groups at school parking lots and if not thinking, can create hazards for others and themselves.

Parents should review all the aforementioned safety measures with their teenage drivers, especially if sharing a campus with younger students.

Parents should insist on drivers wearing safety belts whenever the car is in motion. Horseplay and speeding in the school parking area, or anywhere vehicles are involved is inappropriate.

With some forethought and common sense, the 1995-96 school year can be street-safe for walkers, bicyclists, busriders and drivers alike.

Board prepares for new school year

East Jordan Schools will begin the school year with an additional two instructional days, a ratified teachers' contract, and another attempt at passing a bond issue for the expansion of district facilities.

The addition of instructional days is one of the benefits for students in the new contract ratified by the East Jordan School Board with district teachers. Instead of a four days of half days during bi-annual parent-teacher conferences, students will have four full days, and conferences will be offered during evening hours as a convenience to parents.

Teachers also benefit from the new contract, receiving an average 3 percent increase each year for the next three school years. For a beginning teacher with a bachelor degree, salary will increase this year from the 1994-95 level of \$24,837 to \$25,557.

The pay raise will increase teacher salaries across the district an estimated \$50,000 this year. Teacher salaries account for 41 percent of the district budget – this school year teachers will be paid a total of \$2,688,063 by East Jordan Schools, not including benefits.

"The contract reflects a commitment to fiscal responsibility and increased instructional time for kids," said district superintendent Chip Hansen. "Both are constant goals of the Board of Education, and the East Jordan community."

Another try at passing the bond

Hansen believes the goal to improve district facilities reflects that same commitment. The bond issue presented for a vote on Thurs., Sept. 28, without any changes in scope, has actually decreased in cost because of fortunate bond market activity. He said the bond, which was expected to cost 1.5 mills for the \$5,300,000 million project in March, will now cost between 1. and 1.15 mills for the same project.

Hansen said the over-crowding in the schools has reached the critical level, with every possible space modification having already been made, including:

• Division of the former middle school band room into two regular classrooms.

Busing of the members of the three middle school bands daily to the high school, made necessary by the loss of the middle school band room.
Re-locating the Chapter One class-

room in the basement of the middle school (a space intended mainly for storage.)

• Renovating the elementary school gym stage for a "time out" room.

• Renovating the middle school book storage room for a counselor's office.

• Renovating the elementary school book storage room as a classroom for hearing impaired students.

• Taking music and exploratory arts classroom's for regular classes; the two subjects will be taught from carts teachers take from classroom to classroom.

• Requiring a three-hour lunch period (10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.) to feed all K-8 students in the shared cafeteria.

Hansen believes the key to passing the bond issue this time is to appeal to parents of school age children to get out and vote.

"They are the ones who really know the situation in the schools – they know how crowded it really is there," he said.

Only 17 percent of K-12 parents voted in the March 20 election, Hansen said. With a margin of only 64 more people (641) voting against the issue than the 577 that voted yes, he thinks the parental vote would have made the difference.

"With a special effort to have as many people vote as possible," said Hansen, "We'll really know how the community feels about this project."



Foundation calls for driver education overhaul

Driver education needs to be "reinvented," advises a new report from the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety.

Traditional driver education methods teach teens how to get licenses, but do little to reduce crashes. The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety recommends that young drivers be taught a broad-based curriculum that focuses more on safe driving attitudes and behavior than on basic skills. gan in its study released earlier this year - Portrait of a Young Driver.

Both studies confirm what many have known all along: young drivers are at a much greater risk for crash-related death or injury than the general population; driver education efforts must be enhanced to provide more on-road experience; feelings of "invulnerability" among young drivers are responsible for risky behavior behind the wheel and alcohol use among teens is at an alltime high.

The Novice Driver Education Model Curriculum Outline recommendations include:

• Developing computer software to teach driving basics;

• Improving in-car instruction with more driver feedback;

• Involving parents in the driver education process;

• Using social pressures to foster safe driving attitudes;

• Enacting graduated licensing systems that restrict new drivers to safer times and locations.

"We're letting our kids down ... we're not doing enough and it's time to do more," said AAA Michigan Vice President of Corporate Relations Larry Givens. "Fifteen- to 20-year-olds account for nearly 15 percent of all driver fatalities, but make up only seven percent of all licensed drivers."

According to Givens, the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety report supports findings released by AAA Michi"Teenagers are inexperienced and do not have the ability to perceive risks appropriately," added David Willis, executive director of the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety. "According to the National Safety Council, 16-yearolds have 40 crashes per 100 licensed drivers each year, compared with a rate of nine crashes per licensed driver in the 45- to 54-year-old age group."

Tin shot okayed for waterfowl hunting

In concurrence with new regulations issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Michigan Department of Natural Resources Director Roland Harmes has approved an interim order to legalize bismuth-tin shot for Michigan's 1995-96 waterfowl seasons.

"Bismuth-tin shot appears to perform much better than steel shot, and very similar to lead shot," Harmes explained. "Devices are now available to assist in making the necessary distinction between lead shot and bismuth-tin shot, and I want Michigan's waterfowl hunters to enjoy the same opportunities as hunters in many of the other major waterfowl hunting states."



• In working with staff, the administrator will engender pride in the city and courtesy to its citizens; and focus efforts on city crews working together efficiently and harmoniously.

• In working with the community, the administrator will assist the DDA in meeting its goals; improve the face of downtown; make grant applications to fund projects; find ways to fund Elm Pointe repairs; give residents and visitors more places to shop in town; and create local jobs in an effort to keep more graduates in the community.

Sutter said she set herself two more longrange goals after discussions and review of the city's situation - to increase the tax base through new business; and to repair and replace old infrastructure.

Sutter incorporated the goals as part of both her contract and performance evaluation process, "with reasonable time frames for their accomplishment."Her performance will be evaluated every six months. She also asked for a clause providing full reimbursement of her moving expenses if she is terminated prior to a 15-month period. She received \$1,500 in moving expenses as part of her appointment to the position.

The commission accepted a contract for purchase on the city-owned house at 301 Bridge St., for \$28,500, from Todd and Jeanine Blatt. The couple offered the full price asked by the city when they listed the property at the beginning of August,

To receive a grant of \$90,000 from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources to pay for the construction, the city was forced to enter a contract requiring work begin by October 1. If the deadline is missed, the city will be fined at least \$500 per day past the deadline.


