# EJ school district repeats appeal

On Thurs., Sept. 28, East Jordan voters will be asked to consider a 1.15 mill levy to pay for a new middle school and renovations to existing school buildings.

The bond issue seeks a \$5.3 million loan for the construction, with a pay-back of 15 years. If approved, the average homeowner (\$30,000 SEV) will pay another \$34.50 per year in taxes.

This is the second time this year the district is appealing to voters for the millage. The issue was defeated March 20 in a close election – the difference between yes and no was only 64 votes.

Data gathered and studied by a facilities review committee comprised of a variety of community members convinced the board that the only practical solution to overcrowding was to expand. Research has indicated the problem will continue to in-

#### crease.

District superintendent Chip Hansen said the positive aspect of the defeat was that the interest on the bond has lowered since March.

"We were assured by Kemper Securities (a leading public school bonding company) that the present stable rates mean the millage will not exceed 1.15," said Hansen, "and could possibly be as low as 1.0 mill."

The district requested 2.25 mills in March, but a drop in the bond market will benefit voters and the district if the issue is approved this time around. The March bond would have cost the average homeowner \$45 annually in new taxes - \$10.50 more than the present bond.

The district is asking for exactly the same package as in March, which includes construction of a new middle school, an addition to the high school, and renovations to both the existing elementary and high school.

### "Leaf Pickers" converge on East Jordan area



### Reed sentenced on CSC charge

Former East Jordan School District bus driver Michael Wayne Reed, 39, was sentenced to three to 15 years after his conviction of criminal sexual conduct in the third degree.

Reed was sentenced during a hearing Sept. 15, before Judge Richard M. Pajtas, in the 33rd Circuit Court, Charlevoix. He entered a plea of guilty, and was convicted Aug. 24.

Reed was accused of having an ongoing sexual relationship with a 14-year-old girl this past spring. He was arrested July 31, after a complaint was filed by the East Jordan Police Department. Reed admitted to police that the charge was true.

Reed, a furniture refinisher with a residence in East Jordan, was employed by the East Jordan School District as a full time school bus driver until his termination July 25, the day after district superintendent Chip Hansen learned of the charge.

Reed was sent immediately to the Michigan State prison at Jackson to begin his sentence. National Rifle Association president and United Conservations Club executive director Tom Washington supports HB 4720. He reportedly has said, "An armed society is a polite society."

I disagree with Mr. Washington. Based upon 20 plus years in law enforcement, I do not believe that arming our citizens with concealed weapons will act as a deterrent to crime.

I see few reports of crimes that would have been averted had the victim been carrying a concealed weapon. What I do see are a great many reports (domestic violence, assault and battery, traffic disputes, etc.) where the emotional state of the individual, if combined with a readily obtainable

gun, would have made for a far more serious crime, not the prevention of one.

Many, if not most of these, involve alcohol consumption on the part of one or both parties to a dispute, and is yet another factor contributing to an already volatile situation. This factor also raises my concern for the safety of police officers who frequently encounter combative drunk drivers, and the potentially dire consequences that arming these individuals would have.




### Red Devils rambled on



### Howes pleads guilty to murder

A Schoolcraft woman faces life imprisenment for the murder of an East Jordan man in August, 1994.

Barbara Yolanda Howes pled guilty to second degree murder late Tuesday, Sept. 19, before Judge Richard M. Pajtas of the 33rd Circuit Court in Charlevoix. Howes was charged with open murder and felony firearm possession in connection with the death of Donald Lee Baker, 49, at his Wilson Road home, in Wilson Township.

Baker was found dead by a Charlevoix County sheriff's deputy early in the morning of Aug. 23, 1994. Howes admitted shooting Baker with a shotgun, claiming it was an act of self-defense. The two had broken off a relationship a few days earlier, and Howes said she was returning to the home to pick up her things. She brought the loaded weapon with her.

She was arraigned two days later, and



was held on a \$100,000 bond. She was not able to obtain release and has been housed at the Charlevoix County Jail since then.

Howes was scheduled to face a jury trial on Oct. 9, but accepted a plea bargain instead. According to prosecuting attorney Mary Beth Kur, if the case had gone to trial with a charge of open murder, the jury would have the option of convicting Howes of first degree murder, second degree murder, or manslaughter.

Charlevoix County Sheriff George T. Lasater was consulted about the pleabefore Kur accepted. Kur said he agreed the charge of second degree murder was appropriate, "in light of the facts and circumstances surrounding the case."

Conviction on the charge carries a penalty of life, or any term of years. A sentence hearing is set for Mon., Oct. 9, at 9 a.m.
