One-of-a-kind player powers East Jordan's court

On a cool fall afternoon, two figures move around a basketball court on the shores of Walloon Lake. One is a five-foot, nine-inch, 200-pound tower; the other is barely half as tall, weighing in at 80 pounds soaking wet.

Six years later, that small basketball player checks in at five feet, eleven inches, 140 pounds of pure talent rarely seen in this area. His Walloon Lake partner in one-on-one is now writing weekly reports of his accomplishments on the court.

The young player, of course, was Andrew Otis, now a senior at East Jordan High School. Word has gotten out, and he is attracting fans from all over northern Michigan to watch him play.

"Andrew has set himself apart from most of the other players because of his love and dedication to the game of basketball," explained his varsity coach, Del Ingalls. "His passion for the game allowed him to develop into the dominant player he is."

Many fans find it hard to believe Otis has been able to become a "dominant player" in such a short time. He moved here from Germany in March, 1988, with

his parents and older siblings Amy and Aaron. Later that fall, Otis picked up a basketball for the first time in his life. He hasn't put it down since.

"Soccer was the only sport I played in Germany," said the wonder kid. When he came to East Jordan, they didn't have a soccer program, so his dad introduced him to basketball and Little League baseball.

"I didn't like baseball," he explained, "and I picked things up quicker than other kids at basketball. Football was out because of my size."

Otis cites goal-setting as the basis of his success. He was impressed by the lessons in goal-setting he received attending many basketball camps through the years. His present goals include finishing the season strongly, winning the conference, and winning the district.

His personal future goals include attending a Division II or III college - he will certainly have his pick of scholarship offers.

Ingalls said Otis' goal-setting has influenced every athlete in East Jordan.

"He sets the standard for excellence in East Jordan athletics and basketball," said Ingalls. "He sets a goal for everyone to shoot for."

Teens face homicide charges in traffic incident

When two young drivers reportedly dueled in an acceleration contest Nov. 5, the deadly game ended in tragedy.

East Jordan residents Melissa Lynn Charbeneau and Steven E. Moore, both 16, face negligent homicide charges in the death of a passenger in a car driven by Jeremy Morse, 22, of East Jordan.

Jenice Kay Gardner, 21, of East Jordan, died when Moore struck the Morse vehicle while attempting to pass Charbeneau's car.

Moore and Charbeneau are accused of driving in a reckless and negligent manner in the mid-afternoon crash, which occurred on M-32, east of Rogers Road in South Arm Township. A jury trial is slated to begin June 13 in 7th Probate Court, Charlevoix.

Charlevoix County Sheriff George Lasater's report states both teens were driving in excess of 55 mph while westbound on M-32. Moore is accused of attempting to pass in the eastbound lane where the road is both signed and marked with double yellow lines in the center as a no-passing zone.

Moore's 1974 Chevrolet Monte Carlo collided head-on with the eastbound 1986 Pontiac Fiero driven by Morse. Charbeneau is charged with failing to yield or slow down when her 1991 Honda Civic was overtaken by Moore's car.

Moore and a passenger, Robert Kenney, 16, of East Jordan, were both injured in the accident. They were treated and released at Charlevoix Area Hospital the same day. The East Jordan Fire Department assisted at the scene, extricating Gardner and Morse with Jaws of Life equipment. None of the victims were wearing seatbelts.

The East Jordan Police Department and East Jordan Ambulance also assisted at the scene.

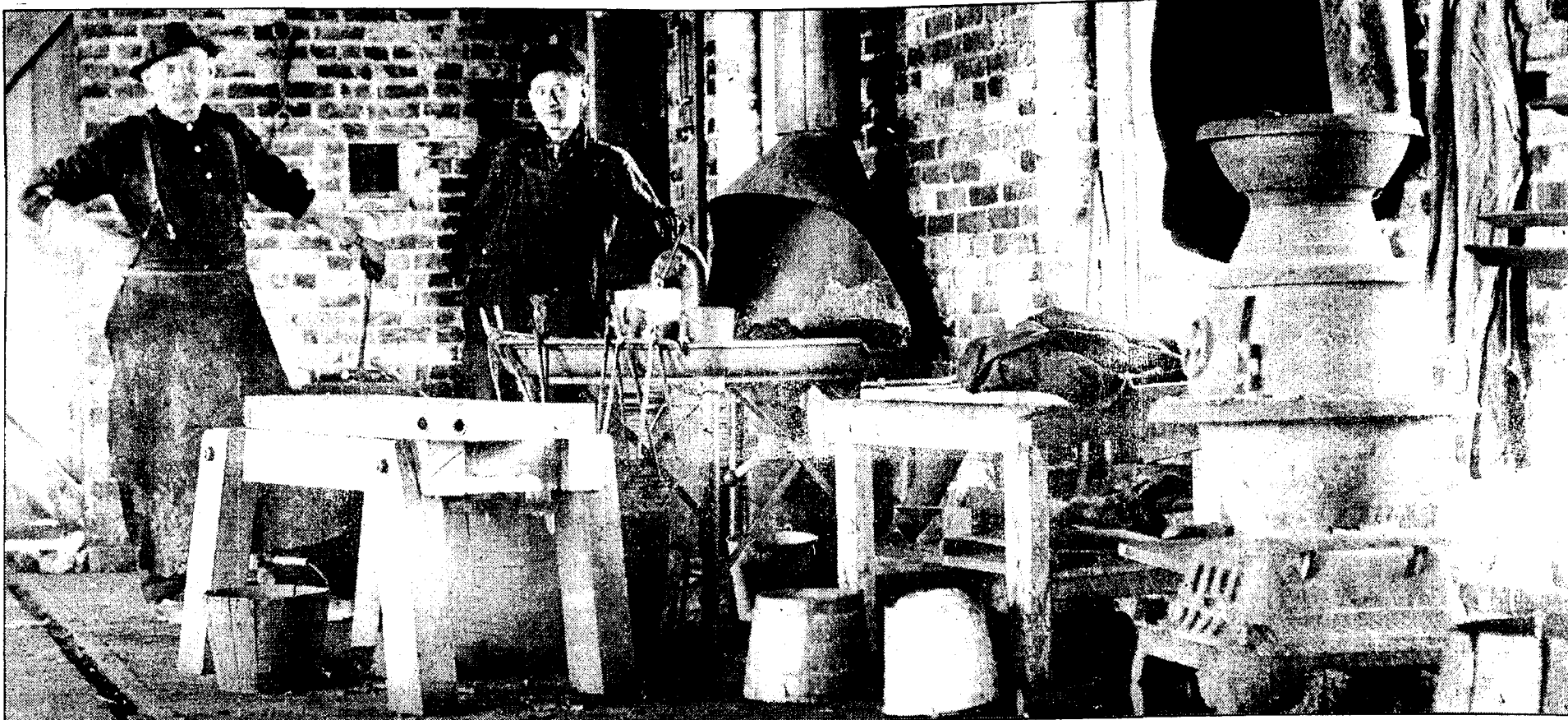

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Epidurals now available to northern Michigan

In an episode of *Northern Exposure*, Dr. Fleischman told an expectant mom's class, "All you have to remember is four words, 'I want an epidural.'"

At that time the epidural anesthetic for labor and delivery was not routinely offered to women in this area. However, Charlevoix Area Hospital has been making this modern anesthetic available to mothers delivering there for the past six months.

"While we have been using epidural anesthetic for some normal deliveries and for C-section deliveries where we could plan for its use," said Kathy Boss, vice president of professional services, "We needed to recruit an additional anesthetist to be able to offer epidurals on demand 24 hours a day for normal

births."

The epidural can be used to manage the pain of both labor and delivery. It can be given throughout labor and delivery rather than only once at the time of delivery as with local, general or spinal anesthetic. It blocks pain from the waist down but does not limit the mother's ability to push during delivery.

Those having a C-section delivery may have the epidural lift place to help ease the pain of recovery from surgery.

James Jeakle, M.D., obstetrician at Charlevoix Area Hospital says, "Where I trained about 70 percent of first time moms had labor epidurals. There is nothing better than an epidural for pain relief in labor. Patients

should inquire about the specific benefits and risks with their doctor." "With the addition of the epidural, we can now say we offer the most modern childbirth program in the area. Combined with our single-room birthing center, our mothers have the ultimate in comfort and security," Boss said.

Charlevoix Area Hospital has two obstetricians and three family practitioners on staff who deliver babies, along with two certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) available to administer the epidural anesthetic. Their single-room birthing center, whereby the mother labors, delivers and remains the full hospital stay in one homelike room, was the first such unit in northern Michigan.

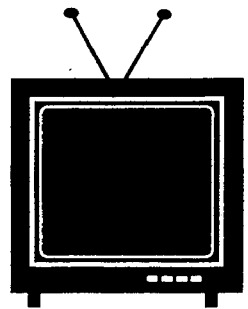

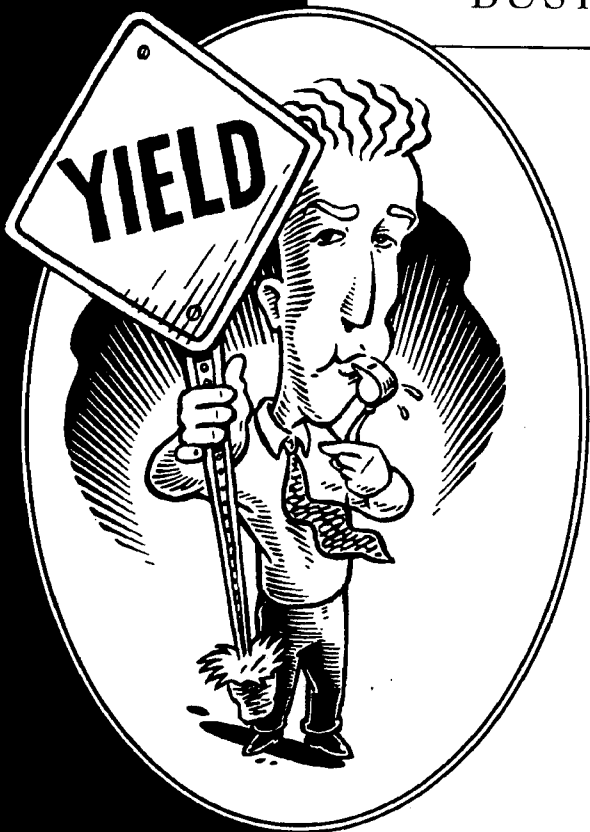

East Jordan Red Devils soar over the Eagles

The East Jordan Red Devils varsity basketball team (15-2) faced a tough and determined Bellaire Eagles team (14-3) that stayed in the Feb. 20 game most of the way, although the devils took a 70-55 win. The game, on East Jordan's court, started out rather slowly as Bellaire played a relaxed and patient style of offense. They broke East Jordan's press repeatedly with good passes, and their defense excelled especially on the boards. This never bothered the devils, who kept their cool and their lead, 17-12, after the first quarter. Bellaire worked the score close with back-to-back Neil Vida triples. Jim Malpass trotted down the court and answered with a trey of his own. The triple started a 9-4 run

toward the half, with East Jordan all over the court.

Josiah Middaugh closed the half when the ball was knocked right to him under the basket. Without hesitation, he flipped the ball over his head and it swished through the basket behind him, bringing the crowd to its feet. The noise was deafening as the Devils went to the locker room up 32-24, at the half.

Bellaire made a quick four points to start the third quarter, pulling within four, but that's as close as they would get. Both teams played hard in the second half. Bellaire never gave up. The score was 45-35 after three, with a final of 70-55.

Andrew Otis led the Devils with 26 points, Malpass finished with 13, Parke Bluhm hit for 12, and Scott Haley chipped in with nine. Otis dished off eight assists, Malpass had six and Bluhm finished with five. Haley grabbed eight boards and Malpass snagged five rebounds.

Neil Vida led all Bellaire scorers with 25, Kevin Bratchi swished 16, and Curtis Menestria added six.

"It was two good teams playing sloppy ball," said East Jordan coach Del Ingalls. "The Eagles weren't able to show what they could do, but they played well under pressure."

The Red Devils junior varsity lost to Bellaire, 58-65. Dave Miller led with 14 points.

East Jordan stopped short by St. Francis Gladiators

The East Jordan High School varsity basketball team fell short of the conference championship by three points, as they were defeated by a tough Traverse City St. Francis team, 53-56.

The Feb. 23 game started out slow - a fact which worked to the advantage of the Gladiators, since they started with only eight players dressed for the game on their home court. After one quarter of play, East Jordan led, 11-9.

East Jordan took advantage of Traverse City's first half turnovers and missed shots to stay ahead at the half, 26-21.

The Gladiators pulled within one point part way through the third quarter, but a Devils' 13-6 burst over the middle three minutes put some space between the opponents again.

That lead was short-lived however, as St. Francis made

a run to pull them within 3 points after the third quarter, 43-40.

Unfortunately, East Jordan couldn't buy a basket for the final two minutes of the third right through to the final buzzer.

Only 12 Devil points were made over that entire span of time, including an Andrew Otis triple at the buzzer.

Otis led the scoring with 18 points, and Jim Malpass canned 14. Andy Eikey paced the Glads with 16.

Parke Bluhm snagged on 6 rebounds. Josiah Middaugh, Scott Haley, and Malpass each had 5 rebounds, and Middaugh racked up 4 steals.

"We flat-out choked," said a dejected coach Del Ingalls.

"We wanted the game so bad that we put added pressure on

ourselves. We played in a fog through most the game."

The East Jordan freshmen met with St. Francis Feb. 22, and were able to pull off a win. The only time St. Francis came close was right at the end of regulation play, landing a triple with five seconds to go, tying the score and forcing overtime.

The Devils held steady though, and took the game, 55-52. Tony Prevo logged in the most points with 15, followed by Josh Evans, 12, Dustin Tinney, 11, and John Snyder, 8.

Snyder and Evans each grabbed 10 rebounds, and Matt Whiteford snagged 8. Snyder also contributed 3 assists.

Dillon Antaya had a good defensive game, highlighted by his four steals.

The freshman record stands at 7-10.

Ladies pull victory over Eagles

Despite a slow start, the East Jordan High School varsity volleyball team took the Bellaire Eagles all the way to the final set to finish them off with a fine victory in the Feb. 22 match at home. Game scores were 6-15, 12-15, 15-4, 15-5, and 15-13.

Top setters were Angie Snyder and Erica Kroush, while leading spiker was Jenny Goebel with six kills. Charissa Gulotta added 5 punches, followed by Kyle Krause with 4, and Amanda Pepin and Dayle Looze with 3 kills each. Kroush and Angie Goebel also contributed 100 percent serving efficiency to scare back the Eagles.

"After losing our first few games," reported coach Meg Fowler, "the girls said they weren't leaving without a win. And that's what we did."

To seal the victory, Pepin and Gulotta were outstanding as target passers, and

Krause performed some impressive defensive digging.

The team was less successful when they met Traverse City St. Francis, Feb. 23. Despite a home court advantage, the Devils were unable to stop the Gladiators' conference winning streak. East Jordan was swept 15-11, 15-7, and 15-12.

On the offensive end, Kroush repeated her 100 percent serving efficiency, aided by Krause and Snyder. Snyder had 4 assists on 17 sets, and Kroush assisted 3 times on 24 sets. Krause led the team with a 94.5 percent passing efficiency.

The Devils were also taken down by conference opponents Charlevoix in a straight three sets, Feb. 15.

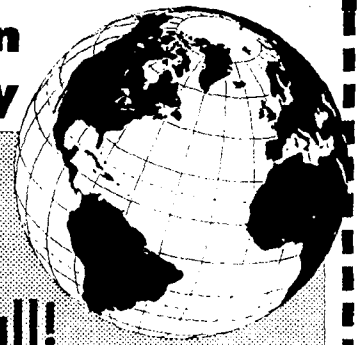

Friends of the Jordan gains charitable status

The Friends of the Jordan River Watershed, Inc. (FOJ) was recently granted federal tax-exempt status by the Internal Revenue Service as an organization described in Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code. The designation means that donors may deduct contributions on their federal income tax forms.

The overall goal of FOJ is to improve and maintain the environmental and recreational quality of the Jordan River and its watershed.

In the past year the organization has campaigned to have the remaining portion of the lower Jordan River, and possibly some of its tributaries, designated under the state's Natural Rivers

Act as a "Wild-Scenic River." Currently, a formal proposal is being drafted by the Department of Environmental Quality.

In addition, through its partnership with the Michigan Energy Reform Coalition, FOJ was instrumental in the withdrawal of Terra Energy's applications for drilling for Antrim gas within the

boundaries of the Jordan Valley.

The Black Attack continued their undefeated streak in the fifth/sixth-grade division by taking down the Michigan

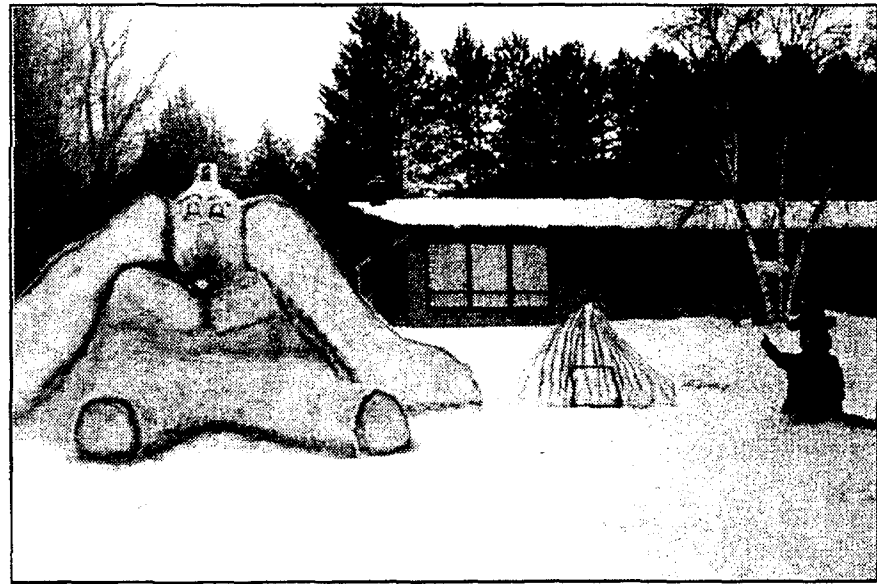



The grant money will be used to purchase a light board, a tool the professionals use when lighting a Broadway show.

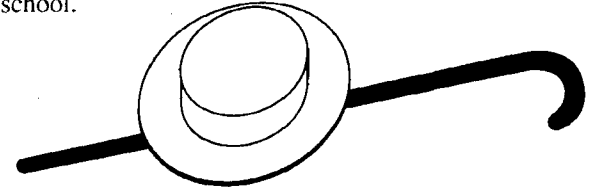
Director Paula A. Vollbach said that of the 25 plays she has directed, *Annie* is her favorite.

The foundation uses a simple form for grant requests, and the staff is happy to provide advice and assistance to organizations interested in applying for funds. Grant seekers may call the office of the Community Foundation at (616) 536-2440 to obtain a

grant application or receive some help.

Since its inception in 1992, the Charlevoix County Community Foundation has distributed nearly \$180,000 to support a host of programs throughout the county. The charitable organization receives donations and manages them in a permanent endowment. Only investment income is used for grant-making, so the endowment continues to grow and serve as a resource for many years. To date, the Community Foundation's assets stand at \$3.5 million.

WHAT'S COOKING

Recipes designed in the kitchen of Debbie Chappuies, with East Jordan cooks in mind

Fat Tuesday is over and Lent is upon us. Doesn't that mean spring will be arriving very soon? It also means many of you have probably "given up" something during this Lenten season. Red meat is often targeted as your Lenten sacrifice, so I've been scouring through my huge collection of recipes to give you some new options for meatless meals. Cooking without beef is not that difficult, certainly not boring and can prove to be very delicious.

DAY AHEAD TUNA CASSEROLE

In to an 8x8 pan, pour 1 stick of butter, melted. Top with four slices of bread and 1 can of tuna which has been drained. (You can also use shrimp, crab or any combination) Top with 1 1/2 cups of shredded Sharp Cheddar. (You can also add peas and/or mushrooms if you like)

Top with a sauce made of: 3 eggs, beaten; 1 can Cream of Mushroom Soup; 1 cup of milk. Let sit in the refrigerator overnight or all day. Top with paprika and salt and pepper. Bake uncovered for 45 minutes at 350 degrees. To test, place a knife in the center, it should come out clean. Your dinner will resemble a souffle.

Hot rolls are great with any meal and this quick and easy recipe puts a little pizzazz in refrigerator biscuits.

QUICK HERB ROLLS

Melt 1/4 cup of butter and pour in a glass baking dish, add:

1/2 tsp of parsley

1/2 tsp dill weed

1 Tbl. onion flakes

2 Tbl. Parmesan cheese

Cut biscuits in quarters, lay on top of butter and spices. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. WATCH CLOSELY!

"The first two years on varsity weren't as great," he noted. "I had to step it up this year."

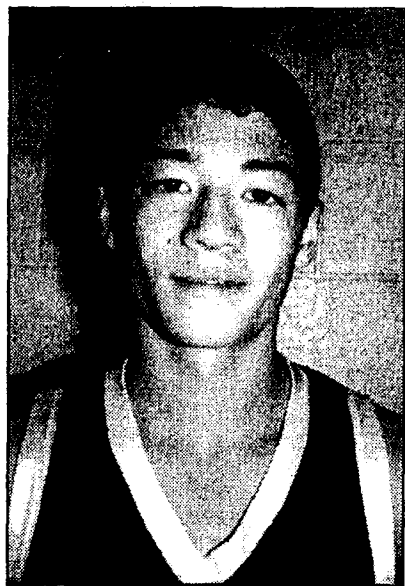
Always a team player, he added, "We have surprised a lot of people as a team. We were picked to be an average team, so it's really fun that we're winning."

Projects chosen for foundation funding

- Boyne City Foundation for Educational Excellence - \$5,000 toward the construction of an outdoor recreational and athletic complex in Boyne City.

- Raven Hill Discovery Center - \$2,997 to purchase a special microscope and video system that will enhance learning at the hands-on science center.

Charlevoix High School also received a \$200 grant for student leadership training from the Tunison-Garlock Fund, held by the foundation. The fund is designated for support of educational or environmental programs.

With these grants, the Charlevoix County Community Foundation has awarded nearly \$180,000 to various projects and programs that improve health, education, cultural and economic opportunities in the area.

The foundation was established as a nonprofit, charitable organization in 1992 by a group of civic leaders from throughout the county.

Like more than 475 other community foundations across the country, the Charlevoix County Community Foundation receives donations which are held in a permanent trust. Investment income from the trust is used to support a variety of worthy programs, while the endowment continues to grow and serve as a source of revenue for the community good.

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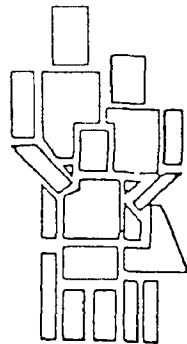

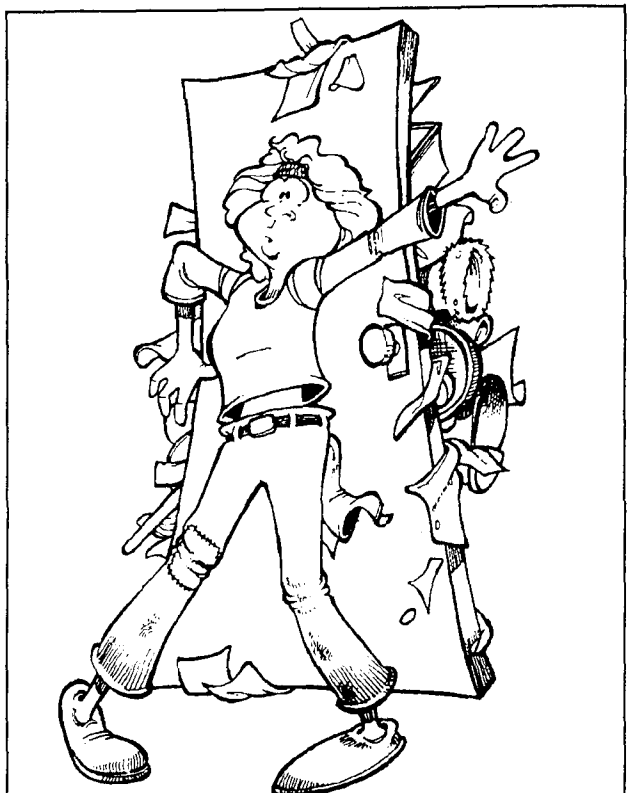
