

Airport accident takes life of Boyne City man

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's office is investigating a fatal aircraft accident that occurred Sat., March 23 at the East Jordan Airport.

Killed was pilot James Carl Gene, 55, of Boyne City, the plane's lone occupant. Sheriff George Lasater reported that the retired DNR conservation officer was approaching the east end of the runway at approximately 2:30 p.m. when witnesses state he dropped the plane nose first onto the runway.

The incident will be investigated by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), with assistance from the sheriff's office.

"The FAA has taken over the investigation, and an autopsy has been ordered," confirmed Lasater Monday. "We're still following up on some eyewitness accounts."

The sheriff department was assisted at the scene by the East Jordan Police Department, East Jordan Ambulance, East Jordan Fire Department, East Jordan Airport Manager Sanford Sweet and several DNR officers.

FMB to offer on-line banking

A strategic alliance that will change the way people bank was announced March 15 by First Michigan Bank Corporation and Intuit Inc. Through this partnership, FMB wil¹ make on-line banking and bill payment available this fall to customers using Intuit's Quicken personal financial management software.

On-line banking, part of the FMB Direct menu of electronic banking services, will also be available via Intuit to America Online subscribers later this year.

"This partnership, as finalized today, expands FMB's commitment to customer convenience," said Steve Stream, president and chief operating officer of FMB. "Research shows that a substantial number of customers have the hardware and software to bank online, and that they are interested in doing so."

About 53 percent of FMB customers inter-

viewed in a December 1995 survey, with access to a personal computer at home or work, said they would be likely or very likely to bank by computer if the option were available.

FMB customers will be able to download and reconcile deposit accounts, and check the balance on their FMB credit card. They will be able to transfer funds between accounts and communicate with the bank via e-mail. Subscribers can save time and postage by paying bills online. Customers will also have the option of getting stock quotes online as well.

FMB is one of 38 financial institutions in the United States to partner with Intuit. It will take several months to install and test the software necessary to run on-line banking, but customers who sign up for the program in advance of its official introduction will have their first monthly service charge waived.

State commission on aging explores issues

Seventeen people were named March 15 to a task force to address the disparity in administrative funding among the state's Planning and Service Areas (PSAs) and the accountability of Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) to local units of government, said Carol M. Parr, Acting Director of the Michigan Office of Services to the Aging, the state agency that will oversee the work of the task force.

"The individuals who have agreed to participate represent a variety of interests, backgrounds and geographic areas. I believe it is a good group to tackle very tough issues with candor, sensitivity, and an abiding concern for meeting the needs of Michigan seniors fairly, and with efficiency and cost effectiveness," said commissioner Elwin Johnson, who appointed the task force.

The group is expected to complete its recommendations by June of this year. The first meeting will be held Thurs., March 28, at the Michigan Manufacturers Association, 620 S. Capitol Ave., Lansing, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. All meetings will be open to the public.


Parents of children who will be 5 by Sept. 1, 1996, can register their child Fri., April 12 at the Ebenezer Christian School "Kindergarten Roundup."

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


Blood drive dedicated to Larry Gee


The American Red Cross has scheduled a community blood drive Tue., April 2, for the East Jordan area.

From Looking around Jordan Township by Mrs. Vern Bundy (Rosalind Westcott) East Jordan News-Herald, Dec. 6, 1956

This story begins for us in 1884, when Lauchlin McClean, who lived on the crossroads east of East Jordan, was at long last able to welcome his relatives who had traveled all the long miles from Glasgow, Scotland to join him in this new country.

East Jordan at this time was embroiled in a bitter fight with Boyne City over the question of who should have the county seat, a battle that East Jordan lost the next summer, giving Boyne the honor; this honor they held for 13 years.

But if East Jordan was a lively little town with a fair population for that time, Antrim County, especially that part joining Charlevoix on the south could still be considered new territory, for although the homesteaders the William Jaquays had settled in the county 17 years before and a few had followed, settling in the valley region, they had to be pretty hardy souls, for there was still a good deal of big timber and the roads (so called) were more like cow trails, winding in and out among the trees so that when someone driving oxen and wagon attempted the steeper hills, they had to contend with an impending possibility of a tongue over tailgate misadventure.

This then was the country as John Craig, lately a railroad office employee of Glasgow, and his family, saw it when they arrived at the end of their journey.

They had started months before and luck had been with them, for the long Atlantic crossing had been made in only 11 days.

When John with his wife, Catherine McClean, and their five sons landed at Mt. Forest, Canada, winter was at hand and weather conditions were such that they decided to wait for spring before going farther, for the trip was much faster and easier in After some time spent with Catherine Craig's brother, Lauchlin McClean, they decided to settle in Antrim County; and the final selection was a well situated place in Jordan Valley, on the section line with a small creek on it and good rich soil.

After clearing a small plot of land, Mr. Craig erected a small log house which was to shelter them for several years. Those years were not easy ones – farming is never easy, and to attempt to support a family of seven on a farm that was mostly virgin timberkept them working from daylight to dark every day.

By the early 1900's John Craig had doubled his acreage by adding another plot he had obtained through negotiation with a neighbor and had now 60 acres under cultivation and had his farm well stocked with sheep, cattle, hogs and horses; the latter being a specialty with him, for horses were at a premium at that time.

It was about time too that he homesteaded another 40-acre strip of swamp land, and from this strip he took logs for lumber to build a new and larger home. It was from here too that the eldest son Jack obtained lumber to build on his place, the farm he had bought joining his father's and on which he settled with his wife, Mabel Richard, whom he married in 1901.

These years were happy ones, but their happiness was not unmixed with sorrow for their second son, Angus, who was 23 years of age, in the prime of his life and the height of expectation, was fatally injured in a runaway accident; and a few years later James the fourth son also lost his life in a hunting accident. These were hard blows but somehow they held up with a true Scottish perseverance.

After a long and full life Catherine Craig passed away in 1915, and John followed only three years later, leaving three sons, Jack, Charlie and George.

Charlie and George stayed on the farm keeping up the house

all married they retired from the farm and moved into East Jordan where Jack enjoyed a few years of comparative leisure, especially enjoying getting with some other old-timers sharing a few good varns.

After Mabel's death in 194?, Jack lived with his children until he joined her in 1953.

There is now only the youngest son George left to tell the tale of the first early years in America, but if you can get him to talk he could tell you many things about the old roads, old farms, and old neighbors – John Chatterton, Bill Webster, David Ranney and John Severance are a few real people to him and his stories include some of the teachers of those times too including Mary Rogers and Frank Porter.


George finally sold the home place but it will still be known as

the old "Craig Place" to many people for many years.

Though tragedy found its mark in many of the Craig name, through Jack the name will be perpetuated for many years; his eldest son, James (deceased) who married Ruby Boyer (also deceased) has three boys as well as three daughters, and Jack Jr., married to Vernette Faust, also had a son and a daughter. Besides these his daughter Elizabeth, Mrs. Clarence Morford, has children. Gregory is now living in Saginaw with his wife Lucille Boyer, while Ruby who is now Mrs. B. Cihak and Flora who is widow as well as brother Jack are living in East Jordan and are a well-known part of the economical and social structure of the town.

This was the way they came to be here, yes, it started way back in 1884 with a spark of adventure in a Scottish heart and the raw courage start over.

Early spring found them afloat again, sailing through the treacherous waters of the Great Lakes. Changing boats at Charlevoix they took to the inland water route and finally arrived in East Jordan. and tending the fields until 1942 when Charlie passed away, leaving George on the farm alone.

Jack who was living with his wife Mabel on the next farm, raised a fine family of three boys and three girls and when their children were raised and nearly





WHAT'S COOKING

Recipes designed in the kitchen of Debbie Chappuies, with East Jordan cooks in mind

Are the kids starting to bug you about coloring eggs for Easter? There is always the question of the best way to boil eggs. I have found great success with the following method. Place eggs in a single layer in a saucepan with enough cold water to be at least an inch over the eggs. Cover and bring to a good boil. Remove from heat and let stand 15-18 minutes. Pour off the water and generously run cold water over the eggs to stop them from cooking. You'll want to be prepared with plenty of eggs and a coloring kit. Don't despair if a kit is not to be found. All you need is 1 Cup of water mixed with 1/4 Cup of white vinegar and a few drops of food coloring. Once the festivities are over, the parents are usually left holding the baskets full of those wonderful eggs children now choose to ignore. There's always egg salad, potato salad or just plain salt & pepper. Another option is deviled eggs. Did you now if the filling has hot and spicy ingredients, they are "deviled": if not, they are stuffed" eggs? This too can become boring, so I have some alternatives to the usual mayo & mustard. In all cases, gently slice the eggs in half and mash the yolks in a bowl. You then add your choice of ingredients, mix well and either spoon or pipe (using a pastry bag) the mixture back into the eggs and garnish with a sprig of parsley, dill or sprinkle of paprika. Hopefully the children's interest in their lovely eggs will be renewed!

The problem was one familiar to teachers – how to make a subject come alive for a class of reluctant students.

East Jordan High School teacher Kathy Drenth came up with a unique plan to meet that challenge for her English class. A certified American Red Cross Association CPR and first aid instructor, Drenth offered to teach her students community first aid and safety.

"Early on, I realized that my students were only going to get out of my class what I put into it," she said. "I had to find a way to teach a dreadful subject to students who were sure they wouldn't like anything I did ... enthusiasm, motivation and determination were key factors."

Drenth started the first aid course early in the second semester, focusing on adult patients. Skills students practiced included rescue breathing, helping the choking victim and CPR.

Next, the class learned to adjust the techniques for child and

infant victims.

"The students did marvelous!" commented Drenth. "They had mastered each skill and could perform it on cue. Now, we are halfway through the unit. The students can't seem to get enough."

A visit by the *Journal* last week to one of Drenth's class sessions showed students' skills. Working on splints and slings, the class first watched as Drenth demonstrated, then took turns practicing their new skills on one another with the available cloth, boards and bandages.

Immobilizing a broken bone is serious business, but the classroom atmosphere was lighthearted as students made jokes during the session. However, they know their stuff, as was demonstrated by their confident responses when Drenth would fire questions at them.

Not only are students involved and motivated, each is expected to earn a first-aid certificate. Drenth notes wryly that while teaching first aid, she "sneaked in some teacher stuff" like English skills. "We have addressed communication, both written and verbal, through demonstrations and reports," said Drenth. "The students were motivated to earn a certificate, which helped develop self-esteem for themselves, and also for others through teamwork and peer encouragement."

Students polled agreed the unusual blend of English with practical skills is working.

"It's neat, it's different. It's easy ... This would help you get a job. If someone got hurt on the job, you could help them out," said Nick Bolser.

"I like it a lot," said Tim Russell, who said he felt confident he can help someone in an emergency. "It's helped a lot as a way to learn English. I like English a lot better now."

"At the end of a two-month unit on Community First Aid and Safety, these students are walking proud, knowing that they can make a difference," Drenth said. "They have mastered the basic skills that could some day save a life. It is important to them, just as it is to our community."






