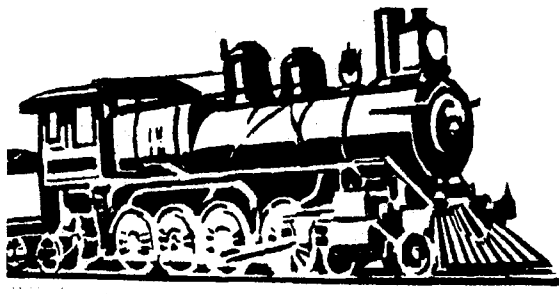

Alward challenges Lasater for county sheriff seat

Incumbent Charlevoix County Sheriff George Lasater faces a challenger for this year's election.

East Jordan Police Chief Jerry L. Alward, 48, has thrown his hat into the ring as a Republican. Lasater, who has served as county sheriff for 20 years, is seeking re-election as a Republican for the four-year term.

"My law-enforcement career spans 16 years and two levels of government, serving a sheriff department for 11 years, ending

with a detective status, and as a police chief for five years," said Alward.

Alward's stated goals if elected are to:

- bring back cooperation between the sheriff department and law enforcement agencies — local police, state police and drug agencies;
- have an open door policy and treat citizens with courtesy and respect;
- work closely with personnel, continually updating their training in the classroom and in the field;

■ coordinate with 911 officials to ensure the best possible service for the county;

- meet with county commissioners, township and city officials on a regular basis to keep current on their concerns;
- create a full-time animal control officer.

"My life and career have been spent in and adjacent to Charlevoix County," said Alward. "I have seen the population increase over the years and with the increase in population, it creates an increase in crime.

"Law enforcement must keep

up with the increases in crime and be prepared to handle all types of situations. I have the knowledge and experience and the leadership to serve the citizens of Charlevoix County as Sheriff. I can and will bring back the best, cost-effective law enforcement available to Charlevoix County."

Lasater's goals if elected include:

- assisting in the implementation of 911;
- continued aggressive law enforcement;
- increased efforts on Neigh-

borhood Watch;

- expanded services to sheriff sub-stations in Boyne Falls, Beaver Island and East Jordan;
- establishing a Crime-Stoppers program;
- establishing a "ride-along" program.

Lasater plans to campaign on the merits of programs he established and changes initiated within the sheriff department. He feels it is imperative that elected officials keep their promises, and states with pride that he has been able to accomplish all of the goals he has promised from the previous five elections.

High-tech math, science center slated for fall debut

East Jordan High School students who show promise in math, science or technical skills will soon reap the benefits of the recently-passed \$5.5-million bond issue.

The district plans to open a new Advanced Math, Science and Technology Center this fall. Next year's high school juniors and seniors will be able to apply for the state-of-the-art program.

"The Advanced Math, Science

and Technology Center is an exciting opportunity for East Jordan students," said superintendent Chip Hansen in a March 21 interview. "There is no question that instruction in the center will better prepare our students for post-secondary education and the world of work."

The center's curriculum and instruction will integrate math, science, communication and technical skills; and provide rigorous, meaningful and challenging course work.

"With broad representation on



the center's advisory committee, we hope to ensure that the program offered in the center will be a program that reflects high expectations, and a program that is valued in the community," said Hansen.

Science Fair profiles young creativity

From crabs to batteries, East Jordan Middle School students created a grand display of over 150 projects during the March 25-29 Science Fair.

Science teacher Bill Chase said this is at least the sixth year the school has held the fair.

"One of the things we found out is that every year, the students do better, and this year was no exception," he said.

A panel of judges came up with

three grand prize winners and overall winners for each grade (sixth through eighth). Projects were scored for originality of ideas, correct following of the scientific method, and the report students were required to write about the experiment's results.

■ Grand prize winners are: Tam Leach, grade seven – first place; Kyle Brower and Steve Kempton, grade six – second place; and Jesse Tison, grade six – third place.

The above students all received prizes.

■ Scoring at top levels at their grade category were:

• **grade six** – Renee Nowka and Jenelle Doble, first place; Chicory Dodge, second; Beth Bavers and Emily Perreault, third.

• **grade seven** – Shean Gee and Ryan Derenzy, first; Jessica Peverall and Erica Murrey, second; Erikka Livingston and Nicole Moble, third.

• **grade eight** – Andy Brower and Rob Vincent, first; Patty Gee and Lindsey Malpass, second; Suzi Malpass and Katie Goebel, third.

Jordan memories

From *Pioneer Potpourri*, by Rosalind Westcott, a collection of columns published in the *East Jordan News-Herald* and the *Mancelona Herald* in the 1950s.

My subject today, Mrs. Emma Shepard, proprietress of Chestonia Store, takes me back to the year of 1905 when she entered the county. But first let's take a look at the county itself.

By 1905 Antrim County was considered settled; and though much of Michigan's virgin forest was already gone, here in Antrim County there were still quite a few acres of the "big trees."

At first the settlers, in order to find room for their buildings, their

gardens and their orchards, cut the big trees by hand. Burning them in big piles, they destroyed what in later years could have made them independently wealthy.

But what else could they do? They had to have a place for their families. There were no roads, no mills and no markets.

Often they used just the outer slabs with the bark attached to make their first rude homes. Later with more time they learned to hew the smaller logs, shaping and laying them one on another and using only wooden pins to hold them together. This made a comfortable home that lasted very well.

In 1905 there were roads of a sort and transportation. There

were saw mills and markets and though the price they got for lumber would seem negligible now, it was life to many of the settlers.

The big lumber camps imported much of their help. These men of the lumber woods we knew as "lumber-jacks."

As financial circumstances improved and population increased, the demand for food, implements and comforts also increased. To meet this demand small towns and villages sprang up.

In Antrim County there were several of them. Chestonia, with its two blacksmith shops, a potato warehouse, a school and 20 shanties with families was a thriving community.

There were also 2 railroad depots, the D&C depot east of the

present 66 highway and the EJ&S depot across the track from the present station and store.

That depot also housed a grocery store, which was named the Davis store. It served as a post office where the mail was received each day from East Jordan and from Bellaire.

At this time a young couple moved into the store. Coming from Barry County in Michigan, they were Homer Shepard and wife, nee Emma Valentine. The next year they built the present store on the opposite side of the tracks and operated it for three years.

During that time their children, Vail, Marshall and Velma were born. They then decided to move to a farm and Mrs. Shepard's

parents, Mr. and Mrs. Valentine, took over the store and operated it as long as they lived.

Mrs. Shepard's husband passed away in 1929. When her mother passed away in 1935, leaving the store unattended, Mrs. Shepard returned to the store.

Today her children are married and she is alone but she continues to tend the store. She takes care of the customers herself and whether you want ten gallons of gas or a spool of thread, you get service with a smile.

Mrs. Shepard also has a very nice furnished cabin which she rents.

You might keep this in mind in case some of your friends would like a home-like place to spend their vacation.

Recipes designed in the kitchen of Debbie Chappuies, with East Jordan cooks in mind

Ham seems to be the traditional Easter meat, but for very small families, that can mean leftovers for a long time. An alternative would be Ham Loaf. This was served the first time I met my husband's family. I was in a panic as I pictured it to be just like meatloaf which I really do not care for. (I mean I really don't like it.) To my gastronomical delight, I loved it! My then future Mother-in-law and I became great friends that day.

HAM LOAF

If you call ahead, I'm sure the butcher will grind the ham and pork for you. Also, the sauce can and will burn if your oven gets too hot and you don't keep an eye on it. You may wish to line your roasting pan with foil for easier clean-up.

1lb. smoked ham, ground	2 eggs
1 1/2 lb. fresh pork, ground	1 Cup milk
1 Cup cracker crumbs	pepper - NO SALT

Mix all ingredients together by hand and shape into a loaf. Place in a roasting pan - not a loaf pan.

Bring to a boil,	
1 1/2 Cups granulated sugar	1/2 Cup water
1/2 Cup vinegar	1 Tbl dry mustard

Pour this sauce (it's the best part) over the loaf. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 2 hours. During the last hour of baking, baste the loaf with the sauce every 15 minutes.

Cygrid Riley will be coordinating this project.

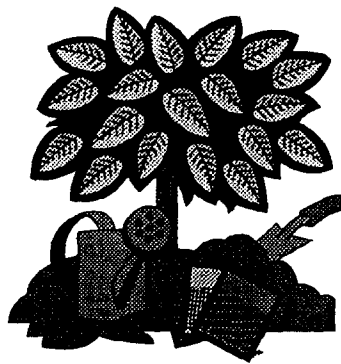
Also at this meeting, members learned techniques of composting and recycling using red worms,

Businesses encouraged to try re-investment program

Local business owners whose commercial buildings have creaking floors, faded facades or other structural problems may be eligible for low-interest loans to upgrade their facilities.

The East Jordan Area Chamber of Commerce recommends for restoration or renovation of existing commercial parcels within the city of East Jordan and designated areas, owners consider participating in the re-investment program. In existence since 1992, the program is a special fund operated through the cooperation of area banks FMB Northwestern and CB North.

A loan fund totaling \$200,000 has been established for the program, which allows business owners to borrow at a low, floating interest rate of two percent below prime (as established by the New York banks and published in the *Wall Street Journal*). Qualified borrowers can

obtain up to \$25,000 with a payback term of up to 15 years.

The re-investment program is intended to encourage re-investment in the Downtown Development Authority district of East Jordan, and is administered by the East Jordan Area Chamber of Commerce.

The purpose of the loan program is to preserve or enhance the existing characteristics of each building. Covered features include landscape architecture, electrical, plumbing, roofing, frontal and rear facades, flooring, and signage.

Chamber executive director Mary Faculak wants to get the word out, because to the business community, because many who are eligible have yet to try the program.

"The goal from the chamber's position is that we want to see all the money being used this year, and we want as many people as

possible to take advantage of the program," she said.

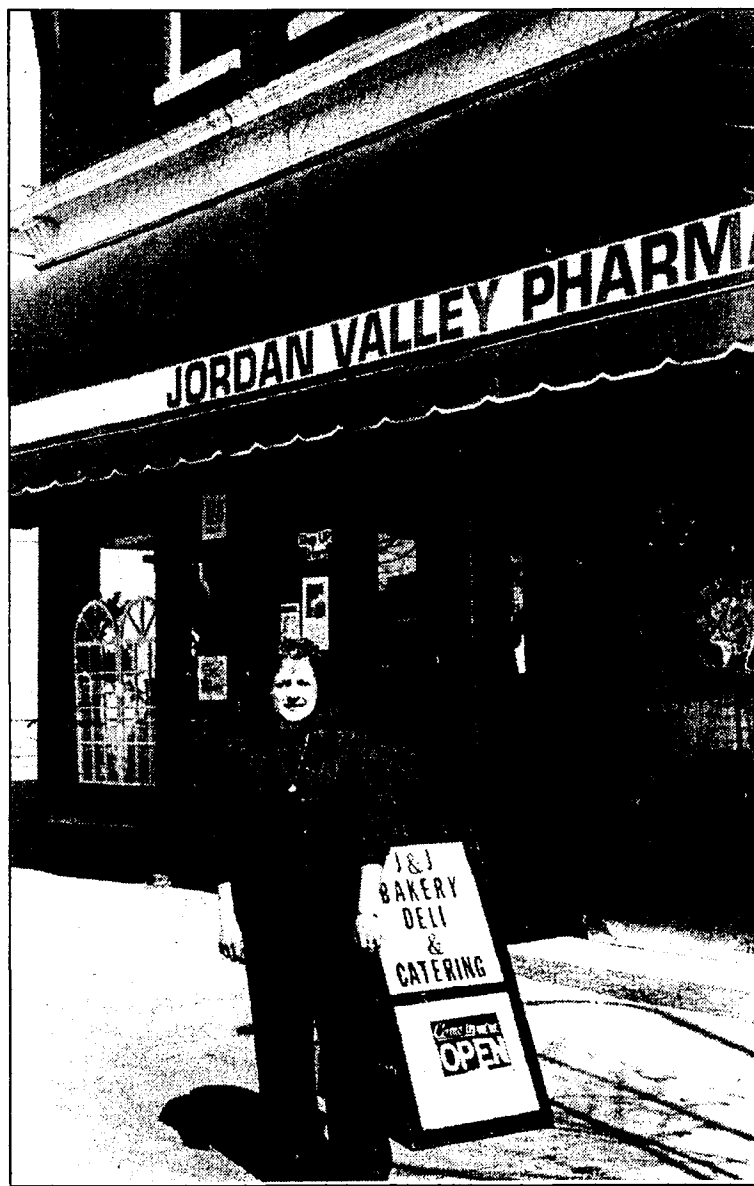
A local business owner who did is glad she took the step.

Jordan Valley Pharmacy owner Deb Chappuies tried the program for the first time in 1992, resulting in a new look for the pharmacy.

"That was a fairly smooth transition," said Chappuies. "It's a smart business decision to take advantage of the investment program. I would encourage people to take advantage of it—it's cheap money."

Those wishing to try the program should contact the chamber office at 536-7351 to set up a time to meet with the design review committee to draw up a description of proposed improvements.

After final approval of the plans is obtained from the committee, owners may apply to the bank of their choice for the loan.
