Commission appoints Moreau as acting city administrator

East Jordan city commissioners discussed a suggested tool for evaluating the performance of suspended city administrator Carolyn Sutter at the June 18 work session.

Commissioners agreed to look at evaluation formats used by Charlevoix and Boyne City and to consult with the Michigan Municipal League before meeting again June 24 to select a method. Meanwhile, Mayor Russ Peck informed the commission that under the city charter, he cannot serve as acting administrator during Sutter's 30-day suspension, which was imposed at a June 13 special meeting.

"I do have a concern about this," said city attorney Scott

Beatty. " ... I don't think the motion (to suspend Sutter) at the last meeting included in the motion a proposed removal ... "

"I think that in light of the allegations, it's obvious there is going to be an investigation," said commissioner Brian Sweet. "In terms of a proposed removal, I purposely didn't include that because I wanted to get to the bottom of a perceived problem and see what the situation is."

Beatty said under the charter, it is necessary to amend the motion passed at the previous meeting to include the "proposed removal" of the administrator. The amended motion was passed.

Beatty recommended an article five officer such as the clerk or treasurer be appointed as acting administrator. Commissioner Brian Sweet made a motion to appoint city treasurer Susan Moreau, and the motion passed.

Moreau is authorized to appoint an acting city clerk to take over the duties of Kathy O'Rear, who was fired by Sutter two days before Sutter's suspension.

At press time. Moreau had not announced anyone selected as clerk.

In an interview after the meeting, Peck said he had been given "in a roundabout way" some indication as to the reason for O'Rear's firing, but had no comment on it. He confirmed that O'Rear appears to be moving ahead with plans for a lawsuit against the city.

"I believe she is going to sue. She told each commissioner she is going to sue." he said.

At press time, O'Rear could not be reached for comments.







The Jordan Valley is home to many outstanding artists, and, by invitation, they will be sharing their talents with the public for a twoweek period.

The Jordan River Arts Council (JRAC) will open the sixth annual invitational exhibit Sat., June 29 at the JRAC building, 301 Main, East Jordan. The reception is from 2 to 4 p.m. The show will continue daily through July 12, from noon to 4 p.m.

"The show will be a true tribute to the high quality of artistic endeavor in northern Michigan. Don't miss it!" said JRAC spokeswoman Jo Ann Dalto.


As many as 50 artists' work in varying mediums will be available for viewing and purchase. Showcased at the exhibit will be a number of painters working in oil, acrylic, watercolor, charcoal and pastel, and encompassing any number of styles.

Among these are Glen McCune, Marion Shea, Penny Pepin, Pat Tinney and Robert Eary, just to name a few. Photographers will also be well-represented this year - Karen Walker, who is presently featured by the Traverse Area Art Council in "Spatial Enigmas," Jim Galbraith and Julie Brunett are a sampling of the wide variety of work.

Well-known area potters such as the Bolts of Charlevoix, Bonnie Staffel and David and June Tis will be on view. Also, fiber artists Ori Bolt, Maggie Matthews and Diane Strelinski will share their magic.

Students who participated in the scholastic art competition will be represented, and a wide variety of fine-art mediums will complete the show.

To name a few – Pietro Vinotti of Walloon, woodcarving; Peggy Midener, fantasy boxes; Ron Abfalter, furniture; and Linda Beers Aydlott, jewelry.



There is at least one tireless "worker" at the Lake Street FMB Northwestern Bank branch still going strong after over 100 years.

Visitors' eyes are constantly drawn to the handsome oak-and-glassencased antique clock in the bank's lobby. The instrument was manufactured by the E. Howard Watch and Clock Company (Boston) sometime in the late 1800s, and it still keeps good time. Patent dates go from 1876 to 1885.


Branch supervisor Joan Lemerand said other FMB branch offices in East Jordan, Bellaire, Mancelona and Petoskey also have antique clocks, selected from the collection of William A. Porter, a former board member of the bank and grandson of William P. Porter, first president and founder of the bank. William A. Porter's father Howard P. Porter was the second president and was a board member for many years.

William A. Porter's daughter Mary Jason Porter has been a bank director there for about 10 years, giving the Porter family a fourth generation represented at the bank.

"People's attention goes right to that clock when they come in," said Lemerand. "Mr. Porter bought the clock about 22 years ago. He taught us all to wind it and care for it."

Porter said he has been collecting antique clocks for about 25 years, and used to keep the clocks in his former home, the Easterly house. But since he and his wife Esther have now moved to a smaller home, he no longer has room for all the clocks.

The FMB Bank branches have all purchased the clocks now on tisplay, and another of Porter's clocks, a clockwork from an old railroad station, has been donated to the Boyne City office.



"Each clock was hand picked by Mr. Porter to go with the decor of each branch," Lemerand said.

Porter is a member of the National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors.

"It was always fun meeting with other people with the same hobby," said Esther. "We'd find a clock here and there, or Bill would find one that needed restoring and he would restore it. That was a lot of fun."

Porter said the clock remains accurate within three to four seconds a month, but noted temperature and other factors do affect its accuracy. "If you get a warm stretch, it runs a little slower," he said.

Techno-Kids Camp opens in Charlevoix

A new kind of camp is coming to Charlevoix and its focus in hands-on technology.

Founders Teresa Noirot and John Twichel believe tech-ed is the future, and kids learn best by doing. The camp will be based on this philosophy.

The educational goals of Techno-Kids Camp is to provide children the opportunity to take an active role in learning about flight, rocketry and engineering.

Children will learn new theories, concepts, and practical applications of each of these topics in a variety of ways - cooperative learning situations, handson activities which focus on the scientific method and computer programs and simulations. Kids will also blast into cyber-space as they learn to "surf the net."

 Techno-Kids Engineering includes the designing, construction and improvement of various structures. Compressed air systems, earthquake simulators, computer software and internet access are some of the activities which will be included.

• Techno-Kids Rocketry will offer kids a chance to investigate how rockets work and explore NASA's role in the continued development of the space program. The building of different types of rockets, launching these rockets and analyzing the test results will provide opportunities for hands-on experience this session.

· Techno-Kids Flight will teach youngsters basic aviation skills and principles of lift, drag and buoyancy. Kids will be engaged in assembling model aircraft, hot air balloons and computer-designed and generated paper airplanes.

An eight-foot mechanical aircraft, a flight simulator program and internet access will provide a realistic and fun experience for young pilots.

Camp sessions run for one week, three hours a day. Space is limited to 16 kids per session. Children may attend a morning session, from 9 a.m. to noon, or afternoon, 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. Engineering is offered July 1 to 5, or July 8 to 12; Flight is offered July 15 to 19 or July 22 to July 26. Rocketry is offered July 29 to Aug. 2, or Aug. 5 to Aug. 9. Weekly sessions cost \$80, except rocketry, which is \$85 due to the cost of extra supplies. 1905 SALAD

1/2 head iceberg lettuce 2 tomatoes, diced 1 celery stalk, diced 3 oz. ham, julienned 2 Tbl. Romano cheese


3 oz. Swiss cheese, julienned 1/4 cup pitted Spanish olives

East Jordan School Board

June 17 meeting briefs

Board members approved the 1996-97 general fund budget, with revenues of \$7.01 million and expenditures of \$7 million.

Superintendent Chip Hansen said the budget represents a twopercent increase in revenues and approximately 3.8-percent increase in spending over the 1995-96 fiscal year.

The budget includes \$185,000 in allocations for instructional technology and \$93,000 for the purchase of two new school buses. Other allocations support the addition of two faculty members to help accommodate the growth of the district, as well as the continued implementation of the district's strategic plan, said superintendent Chip Hansen.

In addition, the board approved the levy of 18 mills on nonhomestead property to support the budget.

Debt retirement mills reduced

Superintendent Chip Hansen was pleased to announce at the meeting a reduction in the debt retirement millage from last year's 3.40 mills to 3.15 mills, a 0.25-mill drop.

Hansen explained a lower-than-anticipated interest rate associated with the sale of the 1995 bonds provided the opportunity for immediate reduction of the millage.

"The community really stood behind us ... It really is just one way we can say 'thank-you' to the community for supporting that bond, and fortunately we were financially able to do that right now," he said.

Staff resignations accepted

Board members learned of the resignations of elementary school

secretary Lori McEachern and seventh-grade language arts instructor Catherine Meyer.

Hansen said Meyer, who has been with the district four years. has accepted a language arts position in Milan and will be closer to the University of Michigan, where she is working on graduate studies. McEachern, who has been employed by the district since 1987, expressed a wish to have more personal time.

"We really have appreciated the contributions both of these ladies have made to our schools," said Hansen. "They have been outstanding employees and will be sorely missed."

Other business

■ The board appointed the following faculty and support staff members: Patti Anthony (high school business services and technology), Mike Gee (high school woods), Anne Petrie (seventh-grade social studies) and Cindy Bennett (bus driver).




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Sports D&D leads league



for the project area. MEC, based in Lansing, is a coalition of over 35 environmental and conservation organizations, including FOJ. Recognizing the environmental and economic impact of sprawling land use trends, MEC elevated the promotion of a land stewardship ethic in Michigan as a top priority.

MEC's goal is to protect property and natural resources through problem-solving, communitybased demonstration projects, diverse partnerships and responsible public policy. As part of the initiative, the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation of Flint awarded MEC funds to use for a minigrant program.


"We're very excited that Friends of the Jordan will be undertaking this project, as it will support our coalition's overall effort to promote better land planning throughout the state," said Julie Stoneman, director of land programs for MEC.


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

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

The board of directors of First Michigan Bank Corporation approved a cash dividend June 14 of \$0.21 per share and a subsequent four-for-three split on shares of FMB common stock.






