Hundred year-old debate resurfaces

That's how Eveline Township resident Ed Reeves describes the current Charlevoix County facilities in Charlevoix.

And that is why he went before the Charlevoix County Commission at its meeting last week with a request to move the county seat from Charlevoix to Boyne City; or at least

to put the question before voters. Geography was Reeves' biggest

"For people on the east side of the county it's a 60 or 70 mile drive. It just makes sense to have it more centrally located," Reeves said, referring to Boyne City's more central location within the county.

Reeves cited the inconvenience and added costs of having the county seat in the western most part of the county as reasons for his request.

'The parking is terrible, even in the off season. During the busy season you can forget about it," he said.

It isn't the first time the Charlevoix County seat has been under dispute. In the spring of 1885 the county seat was moved to East Jordan. Later that year it was moved to Boyne City. Following several years of controversy, the county seat was eventually returned to Charlevoix in 1897 where it has remained ever since. According to the

"It's a complete horror over Charlevoix County Clerk's office, state law requires a two-thirds commission vote to put the issue before the voters.

> That means that four of the six county commissioners would have to vote for the matter to go on the ballot. That, however, doesn't seem likely after the reaction Reeves got from the commission last week.

"I felt like I got the cold shoulder," he said.

While few people would dispute that Boyne City is more centrally located than Charlevoix, the greatest obstacle to the move will likely be the cost

If such a move were approved the county would have to abandon its recently renovated facility in Charlevoix and would be faced with the cost of purchasing new property and a multi-million dollar county

Dispite the negative response, Reeves said that he hasn't given up hope. He said that he knows a number of people who support the move to Boyne City. He plans to try to organize those people to research both the costs and legal process involved with moving the seat to Boyne City.

"I'm asking for them to give the people the opportunity to vote on it.'

The Charlevoix County Commission will meet next at city hall in Boyne City on May 28 at 7 p.m.

More interest, donations anticipated

The East Jordan School Board authorized the transfer of \$31,614.17 in Boswell Stadium Endowment Fund assets to the Charlevoix Country Community Foundation Monday

School Superintendent Chip Hansen suggested the transfer to the board at a meeting in February. At that time he detailed several reasons why such a move might be benefi-

Currently the fund, which has a balance of about \$34,000, is administered by the board and is invested in Certificates of Deposit which earn about a 5 percent interest rate. The community foundation is a professionally managed fund which has averaged a 12.5 percent annual yield over the past two years.

An additional benefit Hansen cited is the tax credit donations to the Community Foundation would offer to potential donors. The foundation is an approved charitable organiza-This means a donation of \$200 would the prices on these bids," Hansen only cost an individual \$44 after the said.

resulting tax credit.

"With this move we can generate twice the interest income, attract new donors and get the board out of the endowment fund management business," Hansen said.

The endowment fund was established about five years ago to pay for future maintenance of Boswell Stadium with the interest it generates.

The remaining balance will be used to fund the irrigation of the practice field next to the stadium. That project is expected to be completed this summer.

The board also accepted several bids for computer equipment to be used in the new middle school and throughout the district. The bids came in at about \$38,000 under budget and will include the purchase of 131 PC's with Intel Pentium 200 processors, 13 printers and a CD-ROM Tower System that can be accessed from any computer terminal in the

EJHS on cutting edge with technology class

Jerry Hawes has taught Vocational Business at East Jordan High School for the past 19 years, but this year he volunteered to take on a new challenge with the new Applied Manufacturing Technology class.

For Hawes it was like starting all over again. He was now faced with a mountain of new hardware, software and a new curriculum to teach. And he only had a couple of weeks to get ready before the beginning of school

"Probably the biggest challenge is learning all the modules which cover a wide range of subjects," Hawes said.

A wide range indeed. The class uses 13 computers each with a different emphasis (module) including Multimedia Production, Laser and Fiber Optics, Road Transportation, Construction and Cad, Power and Energy, Engineering and Structures, Waste Management, Manufacturing and Automation, Aerodynamic Design, Desktop Publishing, Electronic Control Systems, CNC Mill, CNC

'The goal of the class is to give students exposure to a wide variety of manufacturing technologies,' Hawes said.

Students normally work in groups of two or three on each station and typically spend 15, 80minute sessions on each section.

Hawes said that most students will be able to get to nearly all the sta-

Students keep both written and electronic logs of the work that they do in each module.

The program is not limited to the computers, though, as nearly every section has its own "hands-on" kit to

The program's \$100,000 price tag was funded in part by the recent bond issue, Char-Em Voc-Ed funds and the district's general fund.

In recognition of his efforts with the new program, Hawes was recently presented with a plaque from Great Lakes Training System, the company who installed the computer

The program is the first of its kind in any high school in the state. Hawes said that there has been a great

deal of interest from other districts. "We've had at least a dozen schools come through and look at

what we've done," he said. Hawes said that the school plans to eventually offer the class as a 10th grade elective. Students can then use the class as a springboard into more specialized classes in their 11th and 12th grade years.

Overall the program is going well. It's really starting to come together. I'm learning as we go."

They came from all walks of life and regions of the country. But they all had one thing in common: love of and loyalty to country. This bond cemented ties between them in times of trials, allowing a diverse lot of Americans to achieve monumental

We remember the loss of loved ones, a sense of loss that takes group form. In essence, America is commemorating those who made the greatest sacrifice possible — giving one's life.

Means of paying tribute vary, pausing for a few

moments of personal silence is available to everyone.

Attending commemorative ceremonies is the most visible way of demonstrating remembrance. Placing flags at gravesites, marching in parades,

sponsoring patriotic programs, dedicating memorials and wearing buddy poppies are examples.

Whether done individually or collectively, it is the thought that counts. Personal as well as public acts of remembering are the ideal. Public displays of patriotism are essential if the notion of remembering war dead is to be instilled in the young.

As America's 12 million war veterans fast disappear from society's landscape, there are fewer and fewer standard bearers left to carry the torch of remembrance. Such traditions will live on only if there is a vibrant movement to which that torch can be passed.


I've never seen such a sad look on such a silly dog! Of course, minutes later when our son headed into the kitchen for a snack, his faithful companion wasn't far behind.







BCHS BUILDING TRADES CLASSES HAVE HELPED WITH MANY HOMES BUT NONE LIKE THIS

Students find a real challenge

For 28 years, the Boyne City High School building trades class has been building houses in the community.

But none of the previous 27 houses compare to the home students have been working on this year.

This by far is the biggest and most challenging," said Tom Neidhamer, instructor of the building trades class.

The home is owned by Mike and Mary Long, and Nord Schroeder is the contractor. Students in the building trades class have worked on the house since the beginning of the school year and will continue until school ends. The home is not yet complete, but the Longs hope to move in sometime next month

The building trades program will host

an open house on Wednesday, May 28, from 4-9 p.m. at the Longs' home, located at 810 State St. in Boyne City.

The contemporary home is 3,800 square feet, has four bedrooms, three bathrooms, a spacious kitchen and dining area, a master bedroom suite, a full-size walk-out basement, a two-car attached garage, and a spectacular view of the Boyne River.

With a styrofoam block basement, infloor radiant heat, and 6-inch walls, the custom home is also very energy efficient.

Between 20 and 23 students, including two from East Jordan, have worked on the home during the year. They work for 2 1/2 hours in the morning and then return to school. Unlike building trades programs at other schools where students work in a

classroom environment, the BCHS program offers students on-site training

"Students get a real-world experience," Schroeder said.

Students literally learn from the bottom up, starting with the foundation, to framing to finish work. What work students, under the direction of Schroeder and Neidhamer. can't do, is subcontracted out. Usually that includes plumbing, heating and electrical, but this year students installed the in-floor heating system and it was their first year of working on a basement.

"Every year students work on a unique aspect of building," Neidhamer said.

The public is invited to attend the open house. "This has been a real accomplishment for the class," he said.

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

As the track season is about to come to a close, Boyne City competed in three big meets last week, including the Petoskey-Kiwanis Relays on Tuesday, the East Jordan Rotary Invitational on Monday, and the regional meet in East Jordan on

The Petoskey Relays were exactly that: almost entirely relay events, except for the high hurdles and the 100m dash. The mixed 1600m relay team of Jackie Cyr, David Miller, Ashley Schrader, and Kurt Lockman placed third. Michelle Sulak, Sara Bargas, Alison Polack and Ann Gaudard teamed up in the girls 400m relay to

The rest of Boyne's medalists finished in fourth. They are: Sulak, Beth Stackus, Josh Bernthal, and Chuck Stanek in the long jump relay; Sarah Vincent, Miller, Gaudard, and Lockman in the mixed 1200m relay; Alanna Simonsen, Nicole Kurtz, Gaudard, and Cyr in the girls 800m relay; Lockman, Miller, Nick Dixon, and Sean Ku in the boys 800m relay, Lockman, Josh May, Dixon, and Ku in the boys 400m relay; and Cyr, May, Gaudard, and Andy Douglas in the mixed sprint medley.

The East Jordan Invitational was scheduled to be run on Monday, but due to the weather was moved to Wednesday. Overall, the girls and boys both finished 10th out of the 12 girls teams and 13

boys teams competing. For the girls, Kurtz and Cyr picked up fourth place in the 100m hurdles and 800m run, respectively. Cyr broke the fouryear old school record held by Melissa Williamson by about a second. Gaudard was fifth in the 100m dash, as was Sulak in the long jump. Sulak was also sixth in the 100m hurdles. The 400m relay finished sixth as well.

On the boys side, Ku was second in the 100m dash. Stanek placed third in the high jump, and Lockman picked up sixth in the 400m dash. The 3200m relay rounded out Boyne's scoring with a

The regional meet is what qualifies teams and individuals for the state meet, which will be held May 31. The only qualifier from Boyne is new school record holder. Stanek, who won the high jump. The other medalists were George Grunder in the 800m run, and the 400m relay team, who each took sixth.

For the girls, Cyr smashed her three-day old record by six seconds by running a 2:29.69 in the 800 to finish fourth. The qualifying time for state was 2:29, so she narrowly missed a chance to go. But she is just a freshman, so there will be plenty more chances for Cyr. The 800m relay team of Simonsen, Kurtz, Gaudard, and Cyr finished sixth.

The team will be at the conference meet in Charlevoix May 21, followed by Charlevoix's Twilight Meet of Champions May 27.

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
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


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
