# Lake level nears record high

If the walk down to Lake Charlevoix seems a little shorter this spring than you remember it being last year, it's not because your memory is failing or because you are in better physical condition; the lake actually is closer -- 17 inches higher to be exact.


Many waterfront property owners along Lake Charlevoix and other area waterways are growing increasingly concerned about the rising water level as beaches are slowly consumed, waves lap closer and closer to buildings, and some docks are intermittently submerged.

According to an Army Corps of Engineers report published in mid-May, the Great Lakes are 17 inches higher than a year ago and only nine inches away from the all-time record high mark recorded in 1986.

Anyone who has lived near Lake Charlevoix or any of the Great Lakes for any amount of time is no stranger to the fact that lake levels vary from year to year.

What some aren't aware of is how much they can change. The all-time recorded low water mark was in 1964 when the lakes were 52 inches lower than the 1986 level.

Typically the lakes fluctuate in a cyclical manner, rising in the spring, cresting in the summer and receding in the fall. Last fall however, the lakes did not recede. Then, when

this past winter's above normal snows melted this spring, the lakes began to rise once again.

John McKinney, District Sea Grant Agent at the Michigan State University Extension in Traverse City, said, "No one really knows how much the lake levels will vary because records have only been kept for about the past 100 years; a very short amount of time in geologic terms."

McKinney added, however, that research has found old beachheads that indicate at one time the water was much higher.

"It's hard to tell when or if the

water will go back down. It all depends on how much rain we get and how much evaporation takes place. We are pretty much at the mercy of Mother Nature when it comes to lake levels. About all we can do is help people prepare their shorelines," he said.

The biggest concern isn't the shrinking beaches consumed by the rising water, but the storm damage caused when high winds bring waves crashing ashore. The effects on property and buildings can be devastating.

Scott McEwen, Water Resource

Director at the Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council said, "It's really something to think about when you build near a body of water. Many people built their houses or cottages at what may have been a safe distance at the time, and now have a lake lapping at the door."

Sandbags can act as a temporary fix to erosion problems until a permanent solution can be sought. Sandbags can be purchased at the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office in Charlevoix for 15 cents each.

More permanent fixes include the construction of sea walls, with

cement, rocks or rip-rap, but permits are required for any permanent lake shore work.

McEwen said, "It's important that people don't try to undertake projects of this nature on their own. If done incorrectly, people can actually make the situation worse or make it worse for their neighbor."

# Camp EJ gets ready for debut

With only weeks before the first campers show up for the first day of Camp EJ, Camp Director Sarah Werth has her hands full.

The camp was approved in mid March when East Jordan's Pat Brennen got together with East Jordan School Superintendent Chip Hansen and city administrator David White and presented the idea for a cooperative daycamp between the City of East Jordan and East Jordan Public Schools.

"The concept of the camp is two governmental organizations working together for the welfare of kids," White said.

With the full support of both governing bodies, the trio proceeded.

The next step was hiring a camp director. For that the trio didn't have to look far. In late April, Hansen approached elementary school teacher Sara Werth about taking on the responsibility.

"Sarah seemed to be a perfect match for the job from the start," Hansen said. "We wanted to have a teacher in the position because many of the kids will be from East Jordan and we wanted someone that they would already be familiar with. Sarah was ideal in that sense because she sees all 600 elementary school students on a regular basis by virtue of her position."

Werth is completing her second year as exploratory science teacher at East Jordan Elementary School. She is a 1991 graduate of Caro High School.

"Sarah does an outstanding job in her teaching role and we look for her to do great things with Camp EJ," Hansen said.

Werth said that all but one of the four camp counselor positions have been filled. The counselors already on board include Andrew Otis and Mandy Reid of East Jordan and Sarah Wolf of Boyne

The camp will serve between 35 and 50 children ages 5-12 and will run for eight one-week sessions beginning on June 23, and ending on Aug. 15. Hours for the camp are 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

A mix of recreational and educational activities will be offered such as swimming, surfing the internet, space and rocketry, trips and activities at Camp Daggett, Raven Hill, Au Sable Trails, Brown's Creek, Mill Creek and many more.

Each week of camp would have a theme and would include at least one afternoon of educational activity. Each week would also

culminate in an awards program on Friday. Awards would be given for various events during the week an would include medals, ribbons, and certificates.

The base of operations for the camp will be East Jordan Elementary School, but campers will utilize several facilities within the city including the community pool, city parks and school facilities.

Tuition for the camp is \$50 per week. However, those who attend all eight weeks will pay \$350 instead of \$400. Hansen said scholarships will be pursued for children who would like to attend the camp but might not otherwise be able to afford the tuition.

With an estimated budget of \$16,500 the camp is expected to be mostly self-sufficient. Financial support

is expected to be provided solely from camper tuition. Hansen said the camp has applied for a \$3,500 start-up grant from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation. Hansen expects a reply in the next two weeks.

"We don't anticipate the camp would lose money. In fact, we think that there is such a need for this in our community, that there will be little problem filing the camps," Hansen said.

Registration forms can be picked

up at East Jordan Elementary School or city hall. Applications must be submitted with a non-refundable \$25 deposit to secure each child's registration for each session. The deposit will be refunded if there is no room in the session. The balance of the \$50 fee

will be due at the beginning of each session. Applications are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis Currently there is still room available in all eight

sessions, but Werth said that a waiting list will be created should the need arise.

Werth said she is excited about the camp's inaugural

"The first year for any program like this is a lot of

"The first year for any program like this is a lot of work, but we are expecting to have a great summer," Werth said.





### CITY OF BOYNE CITY **COUNTY OF CHARLEVOIX AMENDMENT 7-97 TO ORDINANCE #A-29** Second Reading and Consideration of Adoption

Notice is hereby given that the first reading of Amendment 7-97 to Ordinance #A-29 was held and approved by the boyne City Commission at its 3 June 1997 meeting. A Second Reading and Consideration of Adoption Ordinance #A-29, Housing Commission Ordinance will be held at the City Commission Meeting on Tuesday, June 10 at 7 p.m. in the Commission Chambers, 319 N. Lake St.

CITY OF BOYNE CITY Amendment to Ordinance No. A-29

THE CITY OF BOYNE CITY ORDAINS: That ordinance A-29 be amended to include the following language

Section 2A. Powers and duties generally; Payments in Lieu of Taxes.

1) The Boyne City Housing Commission shall have all of the powers necessary to carry out the purposes for which it was created and those incident thereto, including all powers granted to a housing com-mission by Act No. 18, Public Acts or Michigan, 1933 (Extra session), as amended ("Act 18"), as now in effect or hereafter amended, and any power prescribed by ordinance or resolution of the city of Boyne City relating to housing facilities – the city or the Boyne City Housing Commission shall also have the authority to act as a borrower for purposes of issuing bonds or notes under Act 18 and exercising all powers conferred upon a borrower by Act 18. The powers herein granted shall be in addition to those granted by any statute, charter, ordinance or resolution, and the enumeration of any power either in city ordinance or in Act 18 shall not be construed as a limitation upon such general powers.

(2) All deeds, mortgages, contracts, leases, purchases, or other agreements regarding real property shall be approved and executed in the name of the Boyne City Housing commission. Any rights to property owned by the City of Boyne City which are under the control of the Boyne City Housing Commission may be conveyed or assigned to the Boyne City Housing commission and the Mayor, clerk and city Manager shall have the authority to take all action necessary to implement and accomplice such Conveyances and assignments

(3) An annual service fee in lieu of taxes shall not be imposed upon property exempt by Act 18 from ad valorem property taxes.







## Sixth grade students go aboard South Shore

the lake



# Prisoners' time put to good use

Last Thursday and Friday prisoners from the Charlevoix County Jail built a storage shed for Boyne Area Head Start located on Cedar Street in Boyne City.

For the past three years, groups of criminals have been visiting many Charlevoix County communities, and they've left behind many good works.

Three years ago Charlevoix County Sheriff George Lasater initiated a prisoner work program for inmates at the Charlevoix County Jail.


Since the program's inception, Lasater's office has supervised prisoner work details doing maintenance and clean-up work in township cemeteries and parks, as well as township halls throughout the county. County jail inmates helped with sandbagging operations in Advance during a flood that struck that community in August of 1995 and last summer a work detail re-painted the Horton Bay Church. This year Lasater has expanded the program to include help

While some people may be concerned about having prisoners working in their community, Lasater said that residents have little to

"We only use prisoners who have been convicted of non-violent crimes," he said.

Although the work does not count toward any community service sentences, the \$10 per day fee that county jail inmates are charged is waived for each day a prisoner works.

Sometimes if we have someone that is a really good worker, I'll ask the judge to let them out a few days early," Lasater said. Lasater said that later this summer, a work detail will be undertaking a project to clean up weeds and overgrowth along the banks of the Boyne River in Boyne City.

"We will also be able to offer more pediatric CPR classes including a session for our childbirth class participants," said Connie Roland, B.S.N., the hospital's education coordinator



# Records tumble at state

### Amanda Pepin saves her best for last in 100 and 300 hurdles

If you heard a sound coming from the south on Saturday, it was probably the sound of two more East Jordan High School track records breaking as senior Red Devil Amanda Pepin made her final appearance in an East Jordan uniform. And she went out in style.

Pepin and six other members of the East Jordan track team participated in the Class C State Track and Field Meet in Comstock Park on Saturday.

Pepin, who led the girls track team all season long, ended her high school career with a bang when she took second place in the 100 meter

hurdles with a time of 15.78 seconds.

But her fastest race was in the semi-finals when she posted a time of 15.71, breaking the school record that she set last year by .17 seconds.

Pepin will also receive All-State
honors as the top three finishers in
each event are named to the All-State
Team.

Although it wasn't good enough to earn another medal, Pepin also broke her own school record in the 300 meter hurdles running a 48.10, beating the old record of 48.41 which she set earlier this year.

Coach Dennis Snarey said, "We made a few changes before going to the state meet, and it looks like they paid off."

Pepin said that one of the biggest keys to her success on Saturday was "three-stepping" all the hurdles in all three races.

"I really worked hard on getting those three-steps down and staying as low over the hurdles as I could,"

And low she was, as evidenced by the bruises on her knees.

"I wasn't too nervous in the final race because I knew that unless I fell down I had a medal. But I never expected to take second."

Pepin missed first place by .21 seconds.

Saturday's competition marked another apex in Pepin's track career. "I was able to beat a girl from Benzie Central and a girl from Kingsley that I've never been able to beat before," she said.

Snarey praised Pepin as he reflected back on her track career. "Amanda was such a joy to work with for the last four years. Not only is she an outstanding athlete, she's also a great person and that's what really counts. She has been a real leader for the team. We will really miss her."

For Pepin, Saturday's meet was her last, as in the fall she will be attending Lake Superior State University where she will play basketball. LSSU does not have a track program.

Q. "Dr. Koskus, why do we have earwax?"

A. Earwax, called cerumen, is a moist waxy substance that is secreted within the ear canal. Too much ear wax can cause a temporary loss of hearing. However, ear wax can also benefit the ear by keeping the ear canal moist and lubricated, deterring insects from entering the ear and trapping dust and other debris before it reaches the eardrum.
